BEST TAX COLLECTIONS IN FOUR YEARS

Sheriff J. S. Talley, collector for the state and county taxes, Abe Green, collector for city taxes and H. I. Hudson, collector for the Perryton Independent School District, all report better tax collections this year than for any year since 1920. Less than ten per cent of the taxes went delinquent. Sheriff Talley's office collected a total of \$93,296.43. This amount does not include the car license fees. The delinquent taxes for this year in this office amounts to only \$8,578.76. The January collections were the largest in the history of the county. There was a total of 948 poll taxes paid. This is about 300 short of the assessed list. More cars were registered this year than ever before, licenses being paid 474 passenger cars and 46 trucks.

Abe Green, city tax collector collected \$13,792.75 out of a possible \$15,093.10. This was a 92 per cent collection and better than any previous year.

In the school district, Mr. Hudson's office collected \$36,353.95 of this year's taxes out of a total due of \$39,921.73. Since May 1st, this office has collected \$4,899.06 of the delinquent taxes which is about one-half of the total taxes delinquent.

The splendid showing made by our tax collectors shows that Ochiltree County is now getting back on its feet in a financial way, and with another good year almost assured, the tax rolls should be cleaned up.

OUR POSTOFFICE MAKES BIG INCREASE

At the Chamber of Commerce banquet of last Tuesday evening Postmaster Beaver gave some very interesting figures concerning the growth of the Perryton office since he took charge two years and eight months ago. During that time the postal receipts of the office have increased 100 per cent with a 35 per cent increase in 1924 over 1923. The receipts for 1924 were sufficient to raise the classification of the office from third class to second class. The change will not be made until July 1st. Another interesting item Mr. Beaver brought out was the fact that the postal department now pays out \$9160 per year in salaries in Perryton. When Mr. Beaver went in, they paid \$2,900.00. When Mr. Beaver took the office, we had no rural service and now we have 146 miles of rural service, and this does not take into consideration the Liberal route which is a part of the Liberal office. Mr. Beaver now has two additional routes before the department which he expects to get established soon, and he has several more outlined which he will get in operation in the near future. It is Mr. Beaver's hope and plans to some day have Perryton with more miles of rural service than any postoffice in the United States.

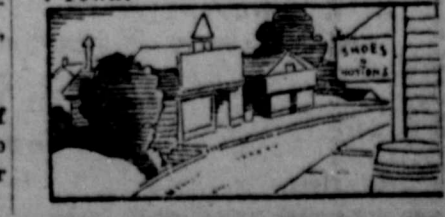

Dear Miss Flo:—

I have been reading your column, and wonder if you could give me a little information in regard to children's etiquette.

(1) Is it considered good form for a child to use the expressions "Yes, ma'am," and "No, sir." (2) Should a child be permitted to express his opinions when he is taking part in a conversation—contradicting his elders? (3) When giving a party for a child who is not old enough to write, should the mother write the invitations or have them engraved? (4) Should the invitations be sent to the child or the child's mother? (5) Please give me a form which can be used.

The expressions "Yes, ma'am," and "No, sir," are not considered good form for any one except servants. The child, however, should be taught answer, "No, father," or "Yes, mother," or "Thank you, Mr. Brown." (2) Contradictions are never becoming in children. However the child, if old enough to take part in a conversation, should be allowed his own opinions. If he does not agree with something which is said, he may say, "I beg your pardon, but—" (3) Engraved invitations are seldom, if ever, used for a child's party. The mother should write the invitation, which may be sent to the child or the child's mother. Below are two forms—one to be sent to the child, and the other to the mother.

Dear Betty:—

Mary is planning to have a little party for her friends Friday afternoon, and would like to have you come about three o'clock. Tell your mother that we both want you very much, and will see that you get home safely about five.

Dear Mrs. Brown:—

I am going to give a party for some of Mary's friends Friday afternoon, and we are both anxious to have Betty come. If you will permit her to come about three o'clock, I will see that she gets home safely about five.

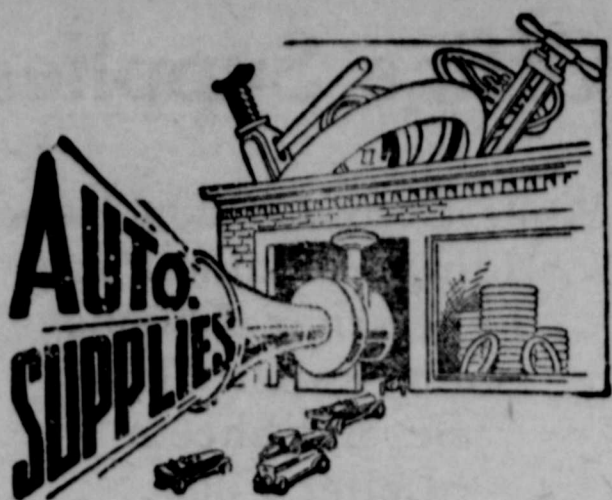

OIL IN BURIED MOUNTAINS

Wheeler, Tex., Jan. 31.—Proof of the theory advanced by Dr. F. H. Lahee, chief geologist of the Sun Company, subsidiary of the Standard Oil Company, that a buried mountain range runs across the upper Panhandle of Texas, connecting the Rocky Mountains with the Wichita Mountains of Oklahoma, and that pools of oil exist upon the slopes of the hidden peaks, is borne out by the bringing in of an oil well a few miles south encountered at a depth of 2,192 feet and the well has a flow of 110 barrels a day.

Charles N. Gould, director of the Oklahoma geological survey, also established to his satisfaction the existence of this range of buried mountains, and he named them "Amarillo Mountains." It was in order to test the theory that oil could be found upon their slopes that J. C. Whittington, owner of a large ranch, drilled the discovery well near here. This well is located one and one half miles north of a gas well drilled by Whittington that has a producing capacity of one hundred million cubic feet a day. In the latter well was found eighty feet of sand that contained oil showings. It is believed that oil in the discovery well is coming from that sand. It is of about 36 gravity. The flow is through 10-inch casing. Six-inch casing is being installed and the well probably will be drilled deeper into the sand.

This well is regarded as proof of the fact that oil exists in paying quantities in the upper part of the Panhandle of Texas. Other wells will be drilled along the buried mountain range between the Sayre field in Oklahoma and the Rocky Mountains of New Mexico. The Whittington well is the shallowest of oil producers drilled in the Texas Panhandle. It is on a section of a block of seven thousand acres set aside by Whittington as a basis for the test. Offerings up to \$50 an acre have been made by oil men on tracts eight miles north of this well. Hundreds of representatives of oil companies have visited the well—K. C. Star.

Demand of Russian agricultural for Fordson tractors has brought another large order and shipment of approximately 2,000 of these power units has just been made, it is announced by the Ford Motor Company.

The shipment also included a large stock of tractor parts for service and checks given in payment for the order totalled nearly a million dollars. One-third of the Fordsons were consigned to Odessa and the remainder to go to Novorossisk.

The first sale of Fordsons to Russia was made last August when 900 of these tractors were delivered. Their efficient performance in the fields, together with the low cost and economical operation, resulted in the present order.

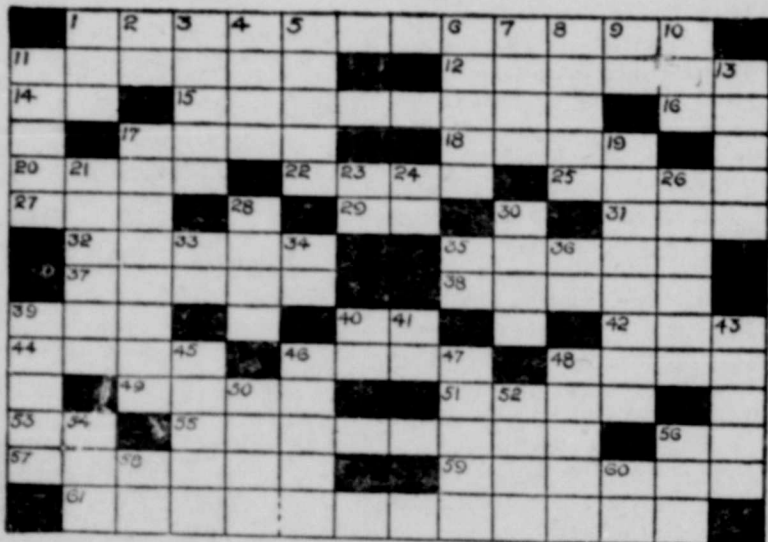

LIBERAL MAN GETS

BIG WHEAT CHECK

T. F. Hopkins, who owns and farms several sections of land twenty-five miles north of Liberal, marketed his wheat crop last week which he has had in storage since harvest time. While he had shipped three carloads at harvest time he still had 57,840 bushels on hand and the price netted him \$1.60 per bushel, which was a gain of almost 100 per cent over what the price was at harvest time. Since wheat sowing time Hopkins informed the News he had made \$30,000 by waiting until now to sell.

Hopkins' entire crop amounted to over 63,000 bushels, was grown on 1,900 acres of land that was originally bought for \$20.00. The first two crops he raised on this land more than paid for the land three times which makes wheat land in the country north of Liberal look like a great investment.

Mr. Hopkins has always been a great exponent of summer fallowed land and has made a wonderful success of wheat raising. We doubt whether there has ever been a dirt farmer in Kansas who has received a larger check than this one just paid Mr. Hopkins. It shows what can be done in wheat growing and marketing in southwest Kansas.

Mr. Hopkins recently purchased three 20-35 "Regular" farm tractors to be used on his ranch in Haskell county. Mr. Hopkins has used the Allis-Chalmers tractors during the past two or three years and he intends to break out the four new sections recently purchased in that vicinity to put to wheat.—Liberal News.

After a distribution of the poison, there was not a dog remained alive in one town, and in the other only one dog escaped to tell the ill fate that had befallen his comrades, but a single shell from that trusty Winchester sent him to that long home from whence no prairie dog ever returns. This dog evidently was suspicious of the poisoned dope and refused to eat it, or else he was immune to the poison. You need not expect to find the dead dogs lying about the fields. Out of approximately 200, only one was unable to reach its home before death overcame it.

INCOME TAX IN NUTSHELL

WHO? Single persons who had net income of \$1,000 or more or gross income of \$5,000 or more, and married couples who had net income of \$2,500 or more or gross income of \$5,000 or more must file returns.

WHEN? The filing period is from January 1 to March 15, 1925

WHERE? Collector of internal revenue for the district in which the person lives or has his principal place of business.

HOW? Instructions on Form 1040A and Form 1040; also the law and regulations.

WHAT? Two per cent normal tax on the first \$4,000 of net income in excess of the personal exemptions and credits. Four per cent normal tax on the next \$4,000. Six per cent normal tax on the balance of net income. Surplus on net income in excess of \$10,000.

YOUR INCOME TAX

No. 3.

If you are single and support in your home one or more persons closely related to you and over whom you exercise family control, you are the head of a family and entitled under the revenue act of 1924 to the same personal exemption allowed a married person, \$2,500. In addition, a taxpayer is entitled to a credit of \$400 for each person dependent upon him for chief support, if such person is either under 18 years of age or incapable of self-support because mentally or physically defective. Such dependent need not be a member of the taxpayer's household. For example, an unmarried son who supports in his home an aged mother is entitled to an exemption of \$2,500 plus the \$400 credit for a dependent, a total of \$2,900. If from choice the mother lives in another city, the son, although her chief support, would be entitled only to the \$1,000 exemption, plus the \$400 credit. The mother not living with him, he is not considered the head of a family.

An exemption as the head of a family can be claimed by only one member of a household.

The \$400 credit does not apply to the wife or husband of a taxpayer, though one may be totally dependent upon the other.

OUR AGRICULTURAL SECTION

With this issue of the Herald we are printing a full page which is devoted to agricultural and farm interests. It will be our intention to try and get articles that will be of benefit to the farmers and stockmen of this community. This page will be under the direct and personal supervision of C. J. Hutchinson, County Agent of Ochil tree County. We realize that it means a lot of work for Mr. Hutchinson but he will each week have a number of articles dealing with local conditions. Read them and then put them into use for they will do you good. If any one has any suggestions to offer, Mr. Hutchinson or the Herald will be glad to consider them. We want the farmers to feel that this page is their page and we want to make it worth while. Will you help us?

COUNTY AGENTS NOTES

In that spring will soon be here a great many will be busy getting ready to start incubators or making preparations to begin raising baby chicks for this summer and fall flocks. It is probably advisable to leave a few points towards the production of better and more poultry on the farm.

In the first place if you have pure bred, get some good eggs, baby chicks or pullets and gradually eliminate the mixed flock as the pure-breds increase. You will find that they will grow faster and be more uniform, lay more eggs and be more economical with the feed consumed. Breeders from good stock are always marketable at a good price and it cost little more to raise purebreds, and they and their products are worth many times an equal amount of mongrels and mongrel products.

It is well to begin making preparations to start setting eggs. It is advisable to start setting the heavy breeds as, reds, Rocks, Wyandottes, etc., so as to bring the chicks off in February, March and April, while it is probably more advisable to bring chicks of the lighter breeds as Leghorns, anconas, etc. off in March and April.

Pullets—Hatched at the time stated will generally come into laying in the early fall when eggs are scarce and will produce good returns. If these birds go through a partial or complete molt they will not be very good winter layers but will make excellent breeders the next spring. If it is desired to produce winter layers hatch them a month or two later than stated and they will begin laying in October and November and not molt the first year.

Breeding hens should be mated at least ten days before the eggs are saved for hatching. Select only strong, vigorous, well matured males. They should conform to standard type and color markings, be free from disqualifications and from good laying stock.

Females should have breed type and variety color. They should be strong active, vigorous, deep bodied. Never use a knock-kneed, sunken-eyed long, thin beaked, weak female, regardless to breeding.

The male bird is more than half the pen and a like amount of consideration should be given to his selection, as the egg production can best be improved through male birds. In the heavy breeds one male will care for 8 to 10 females, in the general purpose breeds one male with 9 to 12 females, while in the lighter breeds one male will care for 12 to 18 females.

The following points should be observed in selecting hatching eggs. Nests should be kept clean and sanitary.

Eggs should be selected twice daily and should be kept in a room with a temperature of about 60 degrees, as extreme temperatures destroy hatchability.

Hatching eggs should not be kept more than ten to twelve days before setting as the fresher the egg the better the hatch.

Select only good sized eggs having well, formed, strong shells of proper color.

22 ounces to the dozen is the minimum size that should be used for hatching.

Natural or artificial incubation may be used. If natural incubation is to be used be sure to set only hens showing quiet dispositions and persistent desire to set.

The setting hen should be set in some quiet ventilated place away from layers.

The incubator will be more economical where it is desired to raise a large number of chicks or when early hatches are desired. The incubator should be set in a good ventilated room where an even temperature can be maintained.

Only incubators made by reliable manufacturers should be considered as cheap incubators are often the most expensive. Where the directions are properly followed reasonable hatches may be expected from most and reliable machine.

Now is the time to get rid of external parasites of poultry, as good results cannot be expected from a flock that is infected with mites, lice and fleas. During the summer months parasites of all kinds are most prolific and a step taken now will make them much easier controlled. One pound of sodium fluoride will treat about one hundred hens and is one of the most effective remedies for getting rid of lice. In applying sodium fluoride place only a small pinch under each wing, breast, back neck and under the vent and it will be sufficient to rid the bird of lice, there is no ill effects of this chemical upon the bird.

Head lice may be eradicated by greasing the head of the affected birds with lard or vaseline.

Mites cause thousands of dollars worth of damage each year and can be controlled by spraying the interior of the poultry house and roosts with kerosene or better with carbolineum and then applying a coat of white wash.

Scaly legs are very prevalent in this section, and is caused by a small mite that lives and breeds underneath the scales of the legs, often causing pain and severe lameness. The simplest remedy for this disease is to dip the scaly part of the leg in kerosene oil for one half minute, and repeating after a couple weeks if necessary.

TOO MANY UNFINISHED
HOGS LEAVE HERE

Bradley Anderson, who by the way is one of our most successful hog raisers, has very kindly given us his views on the most profitable method of marketing hogs. Mr. Anderson has made a marked success of the hog business. He is a man who goes into the hog raising and feeding business from a business standpoint. He keeps accurate records and does no guessing as many farmers are prone to do. We are also reprinting an article which was written by Mr. Anderson for the Oklahoma Farmer in 1913, when he was living at Supply, Oklahoma.

Mr. Anderson says, "I kept a book on my feeding in 1913 and am keeping one on my feeding this winter. When I close out in the spring, I will give you figures on same if you would like to print them. There are too many unfinished hogs leaving Ochil tree County. Every bushel of feed should be fed at home, and let the railroads pay less dividends. Keep more money at home. It is a bad policy to ship feed and unfinished hogs from the same neighborhood. I fed out 800 hogs in this county in 1922 and am feeding 200 head now and have sold 142 head to date this winter."

Feeding Hogs for Profit

It takes lots of grit and labor, Mr. Farmer, to feed high priced feed to hogs that sell on the local market at \$8.50 a hundred and make a profit but it can be done. I live 14 miles from a railroad and as I raised nothing this year, all my feed, except a little wheat that I bought of a neighbor, must be hauled this distance. Corn costs me 93 1/2 cents a bushel and shorts \$1.65 a hundred, delivered, and I think I am making a little profit besides saving a lot of good manure.

Six cents a pound was offered me for my stock hogs on September 16. I had 312 at that time, but have since then sold 119 that brought \$1,390.87. The feed I have bought cost \$1,478.67, and I have 200 bushels of corn left. I have butchered four hogs and now have 30 ready for market that will weigh 6,058 pounds besides 159 stock hogs. I have also fed corn chops to one cow and five horses. 30 hogs wt. 6,000 lbs. at \$6.50 a cwt. \$ 390.00
200 bu. corn 93 1/2 cents a bushel 187.00
119 hogs sold 1,390.87
Total \$1,967.87
Cost of feed \$1,478.67

Balance \$ 489.20

My herd is worth more now than it was on September 16 when I began feeding. The lowest selling price was \$5.40 and the highest \$7.60 a hundred. This gave me from 40 cents to \$1.60 for every 100 pounds original weight of my stockers over what I was offered in September. If grain had sold at 30 cents a bushel as it did in the fall of 1912 there would have been an added gain of 63 1/2 cents on every bushel of corn fed, and as I have fed more than 1,500 bushels this would be about \$945. If farmers would figure a little more and work less they would not sell their grain and stock hogs to be shipped from 400 to 1,000 miles where the grain will be fed to hogs that were raised on the same farm. The grain buyers and the hog buyers each gets a profit, the railroads get a toll, while the dealer and the feeder at the other end of the line must each have a margin and after they have all had a slice and you do the work you may break even or you may lose your labor.

Here is another instance. I weighed two pigs on September 16. They weighed 98 and 96 pounds each. I fed them 36 days, they then weighed 337 pound thus making a gain of 143 pounds or practically two pounds each a day. They were fed ground milo, wheat and kafir. Valuing the feed at one and one half cents a pound the gain cost \$7.50 or approximately five and one half cents a pound. I sold them for \$7.00 a hundred, thus making a profit of \$4.25. Again: On December 1 thirty of my hogs weighed 5,670 pounds and after being fed five days they weighed 6,059 pounds, thus making a gain of 389 pounds. They ate 16 bushels and 24 pounds of corn and 200 pounds of shorts. The feed was worth \$17.90. The 389 pounds of gain at \$6.50 a hundred would be worth \$25.28 or there would be a profit of \$7.38. The feed was fed dry and the hogs were healthy. The hogs were free from lice and were fed in a dry barn. Plenty of good water and salt were given them. Now I don't mean to say that everyone will do this but he can if he tries. Throwing feed in the yard and fast will not do it.

I have sold my stock hogs for the last four years at public sale on 12 month's time, but this year has taught me a lesson. If the crops had been good I would have sold my stockers, but my experience of the past season has shown me that it will pay to feed them.
