Officers are elected either orally or written at a call meeting in June of each year. Policy of the group is set up by the members. Dues are \$1.00 per year. Regular meetings are on the second Tuesday night of each month at the Center Point School unless members are notified of a change. Objectives of the organization shall be to: Protect and/or regulate the shooting of quail on members farms and ranches. Each landowner or long term tenant to have exclusive right to say whether or not they may be hunted. If he allows hunting he is requested to save at least fifty percent of the total number for "seed stock."

No member is to allow any deer hunting on his farm or ranch for a period of five years beginning in November 1955. The years no hunting of deer will be allowed will be 1955 through 1959.

Each member promises to abide by the game laws of the state of Texas and to report any violations to a state game warden.

Fire Prevention Theme By Tommy Rainey

Every year, hundreds of fire prevention drives are organized throughout the nation. Rubbish is removed, cellars and attics cleaned, and stoves, heaters, and other appliances checked. Various organizations throughout the land conduct drives such as these. And yet, every year over ten thousand lives are lost in fires. Many of these are the lives of children. The annual property loss incurred in fires is well over three hundred million dollars.

What is the answer to this? Thousands of people are paid for the job of attempting to answer this question. Many answers have been advanced. None are fully correct. If an answer could be found to prevent all fires, it could also be used to prevent all other accidents, such as highway accidents, hunting accidents, industrial accidents, etc. For the cause of most accidents, and for that matter a large portion of the world's troubles, is quite simply neglect and carelessness.

People do not mean to cause fires and other accidents, they just don't try hard enough to prevent them. Surely few people enjoy watching a building burn with people trapped inside. However, they simply don't seem to care enough to prevent it. They seem to have the attitude that fire is something that only happens to other people. Everyday, you see people take chances with fire that could easily result in their own death and the death of several other people.

What can be done about this? Several things might work in theory, at least, if not in practice. Strict laws would undoubtedly reduce the fire accident toll some what, but would the end justify the means- To enforce these laws would only put another burden on the already burdened law enforcement organizations. No laws, no matter how strict, can take the place of genuine concern for preventing fires.

Let's face it! To prevent all fires would be completely impossible. As old hazards are eliminat-

The flashy gray and gold Buffaloes from Cross Plains spoiled the Homecoming Game for the Gorman Panthers and handed the Panthers their second straight district loss last Saturday night at Gorman, to the tune of 38-0. The speedy Cross Plains backs broke loose for long touchdown jaunts and the Buffalo defense kept the Panther offense stymied. As memory serves, this was the least number of total yards that the Panthers have made in any game this season. The Cross Plains defense kept the Panthers in their own end of the field most of the game, and about the deepest penetration the Panthers could make was to the Buffalo 40-yard line. This drive came in the second period when the Panthers started on their own 18-yard line after receiving a punt and marched 42 yards in 13 plays to the Buffalo 40-yard line. There the red and blue failed to gain and were forced to punt. That was the only real drive of the game for Gorman.

Cross Plains received the opening kickoff and wasted little time in scoring. They ran the ball back to their own 40, and four plays later halfback James Foster romped 38 yards for the tally. The extra point try was unsuccessful. Later in the first quarter, the Panthers were set back on their own 6-yard line by a beautiful 41-yard punt from the Buffs. Two plays lost yardage and then the Panthers were penalized to their 1-yard line. Pierce worked the

ball out two yards and then attempted to punt. The ball was blocked by the hard-charging Buffs and they recovered the ball on the Panther 1-yard line. From there Don Hutchins went over The extra point try was good. So for the score on the first play. In the second period, Gorman was forced to punt after receiving the kick. The ball went out of bounds at the Buff 23-yard line. On the first play, halfback Don Jennings broke into the secondary and raced 77 yards for the third Buff touchdown. That was the longest run of the game. Extra point attempt was no good, and the half ended with Cross Plains 19 points ahead.

To begin the second half, Gorman received the kickoff and returned it to their 47-yard line. The Panthers tried one play and then fumbled. The Buffs recovered the ball on their own 43-yard line. The gray and gold advanced the ball to mid-field, and then were penalized 5 yards back to their own 45-yard line. On the next play, James Foster scamper ed 46 yards to the Panther 9-yard line. Foster carried the ball over for six points on the first play, making the scoreboard read 25-0, Cross Plains leading. Extra point try failed.

In the fourth quarter, the Buffs were set back to their 1-yard line by a booming punt off the toe of Pierce. The kick traveled 45 yards and went out of bounds on the 1-yard stripe. This did not hold the Buffs, however, for on the very first play, they completed a pass for 28 yards and were rolling for the promised land again. They were forced to punt after a series of plays, but the Panthers were off sides, so they were awarded the ball again. On the very next play, Don Hutchins traveled 40 yards for another TD. Extra point was good and the score rose to 32-0. The Panthers received the ball after the score and advanced the ball a few

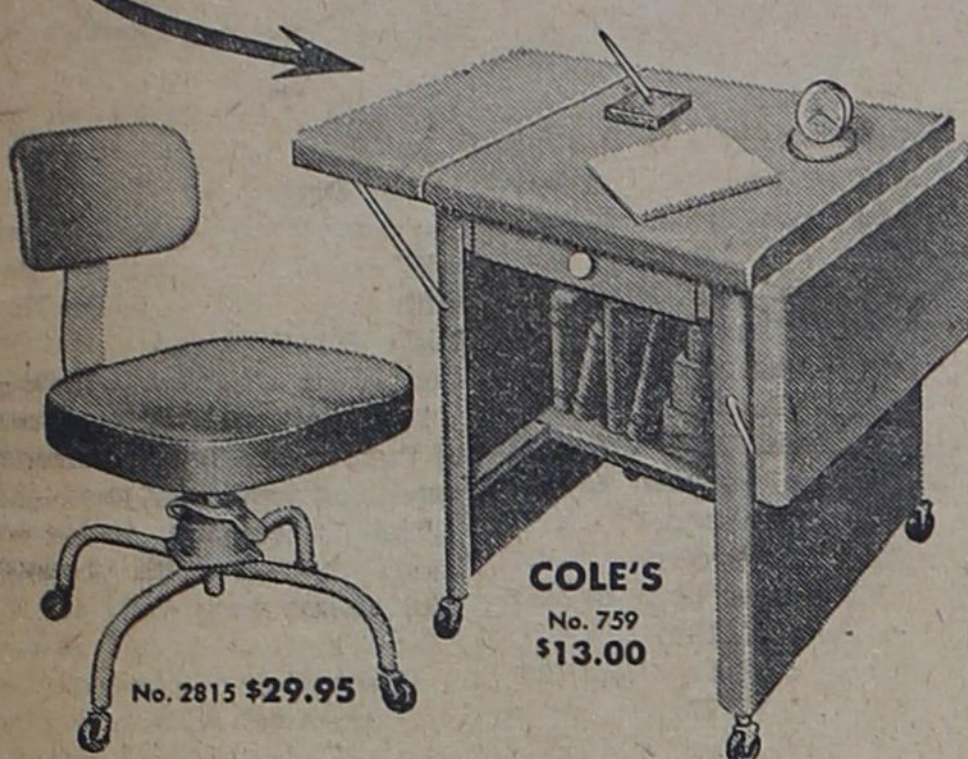

Farm Bureau Special Reopening Approved

BLUE CROSS - BLUE SHIELD RE-OPENING SCHEDULED BY COUNTY BOARD

Mr. Campbell, President of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, has announced a special re-opening of their Blue Cross - Blue Shield Group. Application for a special re-opening was voted by the Board of Directors in a recent meeting. Approval of their application has been received and Farm Bureau members who are not now enrolled may join between October 15 and November 15.

The Texas Farm Bureau Board of Directors approached Texas Blue Cross several years ago with a request that a special group plan be developed to offer to the various County Farm Bureaus throughout Texas. A program of benefits and rates was prepared and presented to the State organization for study and approval.

Today, Blue Cross - Blue Shield groups are found in most of the counties of Texas that have Farm Bureau organizations. Membership in Blue Cross - Blue Shield and C. I. E. (Catastrophic Illness Endorsement) is offered to each farm and ranch family when they join Farm Bureau. The present special campaign is designed to permit those who belong to Farm Bureau, or who join during the Blue Cross - Blue Shield campaign, to enroll for Hospital and Doctor prepayment without serving the usual 6 months eligibility period.

Texas Farm Bureau members have already received millions of dollars in benefits from Texas Blue Cross - Blue Shield. Mr. Campbell stated that those who belong to Farm Bureau, or who join now, may enroll for Blue Cross payments to the Hospital, Blue Shield for the Doctor, and C. I. E. C. I. E. gives added protection of up to \$5,000 for treatment of eleven dread diseases, including Cancer, over a period of up to five years for each specific disease.

Application may be made through the County Farm Bureau office and payments are made through Farm Bureau each quarter.

Each Farm Bureau member not now enrolled in Blue Cross and Blue Shield will receive information on the services and their cost. Almost continuous entertainment will be presented on the Foods Building Stage.

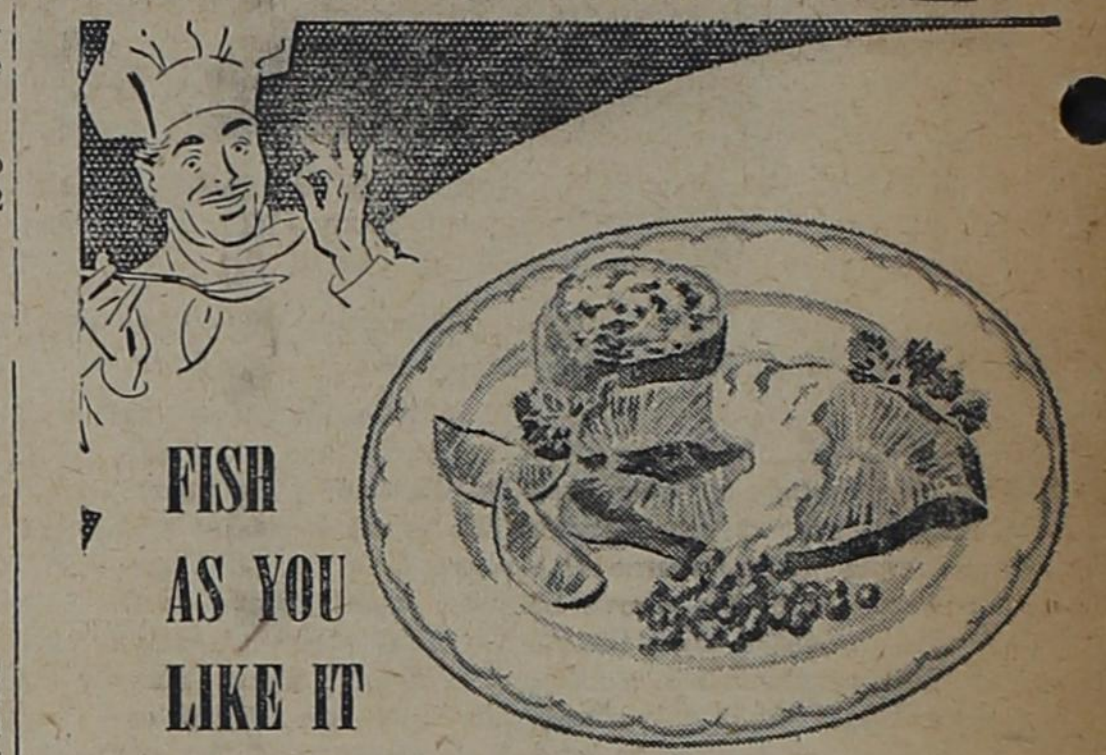

A Hymn Is Born

O God, Our Help in Ages Past

A rebellious youth revolutionizes church singing

The clerk read a Psalm. Everybody sang. That is, everybody except young Isaac Watts. After church that Sunday in 1692 when his Puritan father called him to the carpet Isaac said flatly that there was no music in the Psalms. The young upstart wrote something better. The result of that challenge was a revolution in church singing.

Staid, old Enoch Watts must not have been thinking when he hurled that remark at his teenage son. For at his boarding school in Southampton the deacon himself had taught Isaac five languages before the boy was 14. That is, the deacon taught when he wasn't in jail for acts against the Established Church. And for 12 years Mrs. Watts had tutored her oldest son in the writing of verse. At 7 he had won a medal for writing rhymes. He waxed so poetical that when Enoch threatened to thrash him for rhyming even in his everyday conversation he cried out, "O father do some pity take, and I will no more verses make!"

O God, our help in ages past,
Our hope for years to come,
Our shelter from the stormy blast,
And our eternal home!

Under the shadow of Thy throne,
Still may we dwell secure;
Sufficient in Thine arms alone,
And our defense is sure.

Accepting his father's challenge, 18-year-old Isaac set about "Christianizing and modernizing the Psalms. It had been tried before but not by a mind like that of Watts.

The following Sunday the clerk read, a new kind of hymn. It began: "Behold the glories of the Lamb . . . Amidst His Father's throne; Prepare new honors for His name, and songs before unknown." The congregation went wild. They made young Watts bring in one of his "modernized" Psalms every Sunday for two years!

Isaac Watts had successfully broken a tradition. Before he was 30 he wrote "Joy to the World," "When I Can Read My Title Clear," "Am I a Soldier of the Cross" and 650 other notable hymns and paved the way for Wesley, Newton, Cowper and many others.

Isaac Watts lived in troubled times but he could have written no more appropriately for the present era than when he paraphrased the 19th Psalm more than two centuries ago and wrote:

Before the hills in order stood,
Or earth received her frame,
From everlasting Thou art God,
To endless years the same.

O God, our help in ages past,
Our hope for years to come;
Be thou my guide while life shall last,
And our eternal home.

Mr. Norman Wright of the Eastland Telegram doesn't seem to think that Eastland will have much opposition Friday night when the Mavericks play the Panthers. His reasoning is full of holes. In the first place, the record of Eastland in football this year is nothing to brag about. They have won only one game this season and that was against Granbury by about two touchdowns. If he will check the records of Gorman's game with Granbury, he will find that Granbury made three of its touchdowns in the first quarter on bad breaks against the Panthers before they really got started.
