UNMASKED MAN ROBBS TEXAS BANK

VENUE CHANGE DENIED ACCUSED PAIR CASHIER AND CLERK FORCED INTO TIGHT VAULT, BARELY AVERT DEATH BY SUFFOCATION

TWO JURORS IN ASSAULT CASE ARE ACCEPTED

PIERCE AND HOLLAND FACE TRIAL AFTER ONE GETS DEATH

(By Associated Press)
COMANCHE, Tex., Aug. 9.—Two jurors had been chosen in the trial of Harry Holland and J. D. Pierce, farm hands, charged with criminal attack upon Velma Bankhead, 19, when court recessed at noon today. The venire of 100 still remained almost intact, and it was expected the jury would be completed before night.

Selection of jurors followed several hours of arguments, during which defense attorneys were denied a change of venue by Judge Joe Edlin. Plea for a continuance also was denied.

Pierce and Holland went to trial here today under charges similar to those for which a jury in special district court here yesterday found Hazzard guilty and assessed the death penalty. Hazzard, who had remained calm throughout the two-day trial, broke down completely when the jury rendered its verdict, arrived at on the first ballot. Defense attorneys gave notice of appeal.

The two routes now on trial are alleged to have participated in an attack upon Miss Bankhead on the night of July 21. In her testimony in the trial of Hazzard, the girl implicated the two companions, declaring all three mistreated her, after stopping their automobile and dragging her a short distance down the highway.

Selection of the jury started at 11:45 a. m. The two jurors selected before noon were A. P. Parrish, farmer, and E. D. Saunders, proprietor of a confectionery.

Under cross examination by defense attorney, A. B. Haworth, J. S. Nance of Le Leon admitted from the stand he had approached Hazzard and warned him that citizens of Le Leon "would not stand for his tactics in defending Pierce and Holland."

MURDER PROBE FUND PLEDGED

"UNLIMITED AMOUNT" IS READY FOR SOLUTION OF FOUL MURDER

(By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Aug. 9.—"Unlimited funds" from the wealth of Evanston, north shore suburb, have been pledged to air police in an intense search for the slayer of Miss Jennie Metta Constantine, 43 year old school teacher who was clubbed to death Tuesday night near Northwestern university campus.

A reward of \$1,000 was offered by Police Chief Pasch for the arrest of the slayer and \$1,000 additional for every person participating in the capture.

A negro with a "Charlie Chaplin moustache" was sought in connection with the slaying. The negro was seen in the vicinity of Foster street, where the body was found, telling stories to a group of boys Tuesday night.

Another Case Recalled
Evanston, home of Vice President Dewey, was shocked by the crime as citizens recalled the murder 15 years ago of Ida Leeson, art pupil of Lorado Taft, who was killed by a negro in a similar attack.

Miss Constantine, who was head of the English department at Bradley polytechnic institute, Peoria, was clubbed to death with an iron pipe and attacked, her body being thrown under a hedge where the gleam of a milkman's lantern revealed it early yesterday.

Police concentrated their search in the negro section of the city where several women have been victims of criminal assaults.

Cotton Breaks \$4 To \$7 In New York Trading Under Heavy Selling Orgy

WALL STREET, LIVERPOOL AND SOUTH'S INTEREST INDISPOSED TO ACCEPT GOVERNMENT REPORT ON PRODUCTION; PROFIT TAKING STARTS

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—Cotton prices broke \$4 to \$7 a bale from yesterday's high levels on the New York cotton exchange today under heavy selling by Wall Street, Liverpool and southern interests. The trade apparently was not disposed to accept yesterday's government report of 14,381,000 bales as a positive indication of crop prospect in view of favorable weather conditions recently in the south.

The market declined to within a quarter cent a pound of yesterday's low levels. October, which sold as high as 20.75 cents a pound, declined to 19.35 cents, while December, which had sold up to 20.33 cents, dropped to 19.25.

MANY CHANGES IN BUS LINES ARE APPROVED

DICK ABBOTT ALLOWED PURCHASE OF PARTS OF THREE ROUTES

AUSTIN, Aug. 9.—Extensive changes of ownership in Texas motor bus lines were effected today in orders by the state railroad commission approving sales and transfers on which hearings were held recently at Dallas.

The commission granted application A. P. Barrett of Fort Worth to transfer to the Dixie Motor Coach corporation three permits covering the Texarkana-Paris, the Paris-Greenville and Greenville-Dallas routes which he bought recently for \$267,500 from individual operators.

R. S. Nabors, one-third of remaining one-half interest in Lubbock-Brownfield route, also to Abbott.

STATE'S DRIVE ON BEER RING OPENS IN WINK

RANGER AND ATTORNEY CONFER BUT PLAN IS NOT MADE KNOWN

WINK, TEXAS, Aug. 9.—No definite information has been made known today as to the course of action the state will pursue in efforts to stamp out an alleged beer ring in this young oil city, following a conference here yesterday of assistant Attorney General Dave Pickle and Ranger Captain Wright, the latter an "undercover" man who has been here the past two weeks investigating the lawless situation.

Neither Pickle or Wright would make a statement as to plans, but indications are, they said, that several arrests of proprietors of "beer joints" will be made within 24 hours.

It was learned in authoritative sources that investigation probably will be made of administration of several city and county officials who are allegedly connected with the beer ring.

Rangers who arrived yesterday morning spent the day investigating several hi-jackings that have occurred during the past 48 hours. Four men were robbed of approximately \$200 Sunday and Monday nights and in one instance a man was beaten with a pistol. No arrests have been made by local officers.

Hickman One Step Nearer To Gallows

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 9 (P)—William Edward Hickman, kidnaper and slayer of 13 year old Marian Parker in Los Angeles last December, was brought a step nearer the gallows today as the Superior court docketed him for sentencing.

The resentencing is to follow an order of the state supreme court denying him a rehearing of his case.

One Shot In Hi-Jacking

A new angle was given the investigation last night after Luther Allen, 38, employee of the Gulf Oil company, was shot in the left arm and robbed of \$64, while he, with a companion was enroute to camp shortly before midnight. Two men whose identity has not been revealed, are being held, officers said.

Allen, accompanied by Walter Jenkins, fellow employee, was returning to camp afoot when the hi-jackers suddenly emerged from an alley and opened fire on couple the story given officers said. Surmons at the hospital where the victim being treated said today it might be necessary to amputate Allen's shattered arm.

STORM'S FURY IS SPENT WITH NO LIVES LOST

HURRICANE MOVING UP WEST FLORIDA COAST AND DIMINISHING

(By Associated Press)
JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Aug. 9.—Apparently blowing itself out, after whipping a wide area in the central Florida peninsula from the coast to the gulf and exacting a damage toll estimated in the millions, the tropical hurricane was moving slowly up the west coast today with greatly diminished intensity.

It was expected to reach the northeastern tip of the state late today unless it was dissipated before, but due to its rapidly decreasing force the weather bureau here saw nothing further to fear from it.

No Known Loss of Life

Reports sifting through the mass of tangled communication lines showed no loss of life thus far, but revealed what was expected to be extensive damage to the fruit crops in the rich citrus belt, over which the disturbance passed late yesterday and last night after ravaging a 200 mile strip on the east coast from Jupiter to Titusville.

In contrast to heavy damage wrought to homes and business establishments in the east coast communities hardest hit, fragmentary reports today indicated that the central and west central sections of the state had escaped with minor blows in this respect.

Finley J. Shepard, vice president of the Missouri Pacific and Arthur W. Looney, president of the Equitable Trust company of New York, have been elected directors of the Denver and Rio Grande Western railroad, succeeding Mr. Raskob and the late Alvin L. Kroc, who headed the Equitable Trust.

Kellogg Treaty
GENEVA, Switzerland.—Great Britain officially brought the Kellogg treaty of nations today by transmitting copies of its two notes to Washington and the Kellogg treaty, which also was informed by Britain that signature of the Kellogg treaty will not involve a conflict with her obligations resulting from membership in the league.

Lowenstein Case

LONDON.—The Evening News says that Captain Alfred Lowenstein, Belgian financier, who recently was killed in a fall from his airplane over the English channel, left £8,000,000 to be equally divided between his widow and son. The newspaper adds that it understands in the last three weeks before his death, Captain Lowenstein lost about £12,000,000.

Lake Big Menace

OKLAHOMA, Okla., Aug. 9 (P)—A heavy rain today over rising water in Lake Okemuchee resulting from a 30 inch rain yesterday. Taylor's creek, which runs through the city and was a sluggish stream fifteen feet wide Tuesday, today was more than half a mile wide and rising six inches an hour. There was no way of estimating flood damage to farms and fruit. The Kiamichi river, the largest stream flowing into the lake, is rising rapidly. There is almost a solid sheet of water between this city and Fort Pierce, a distance of 37 miles.

Oil Man Jailed

DALLAS.—J. B. Alford, president of the Alford Oil company here, was in jail today after his failure to make \$5,000 bond set at a preliminary hearing before United States Commissioner Lee R. Smith yesterday on charges of using the mails to defraud. Earl H. Silven, Dallas, civil engineer, also appeared before Commissioner Smith in connection with the same case. His bond was temporarily set at \$3,000 pending a separate hearing. The Alford Oil company promoted the Carrollton oil boom several miles from Dallas.

EXHIBIT OF HALE COUNTY JERSIES TO BE ENTERED AT FAIR HERE THIS FALL, WITH B. C. D. AIDING EXPENSE

PLAINVIEW, Aug. 9.—An exhibit of Hale county jerseys will be entered in the Panhandle South Plains Fair at Lubbock this fall according to a decision reached by the Plainview Board of City Development who were asked to underwrite the exhibit being arranged by R. M. Millhollin, county agent of Hale county in co-operation with several breeders of this county.

The Plainview Board of City Development has underwritten the expense of taking a carload of dairy cattle to the South Plains Fair, the Tri-State Fair at Amarillo, and to the Southwestern Dairy Show at Dallas which will be held in connection with the State Fair of Texas this year.

The animals which will comprise the exhibit have been selected by T. S. Simons, secretary of the Texas Jersey Cattle club, assisted by county agent Millhollin. Among the breeders who are furnishing them are J. R. May, B. W. Willis, Luther Griffin, M. P. Cornett, and W. B. Rogers of Plainview; L. E. Hendrick and J. L. Howard, of Hale County; and Fritz Fuchs, and H. O. Pettigrew of Abilene.

Pettigrew is the owner of the cow which won the first place in the State in May on the honor roll of cows on official tests.

Practically all of the breeders were exhibitors at the First Panhandle-Plains Dairy show held in Plainview during April of this year.

CASHIER AND CLERK FORCED INTO TIGHT VAULT, BARELY AVERT DEATH BY SUFFOCATION

INEZ, Victoria County, Texas, Aug. 9.—An unmasked robber held up the Inez State bank about 9:30 a. m. today and escaped with between \$400 and \$500 after locking the cashier and clerk in the vault.

The robber entered shortly after the bank opened and another waited outside in a car.

"Stick 'em up," he told Cashier John C. Bianchi and Miss Willie Lee Bailey, clerk, as he entered. "Where's the money?" he demanded, according to Bianchi.

Forced into Vault
Told that the money was in a drawer, the robber forced the two bank employees into the vault, scooped up some small change, and dashed out a door to a closed automobile, in which two men were seen to leave town.

The vault was almost airtight and the two employees had begun to suffer from lack of oxygen when they were liberated. John Prupok, blacksmith, coming to the bank to cash a check soon after the bank closed, heard appeals for help from the vault and immediately turned in the alarm.

Mr. Bianchi yelled the combination of the vault lock to those outside but the door refused to open. Some one suggested an acetylene torch but soon it was piled open and Bianchi and Miss Bailey liberated.

Henry C. Koonitz, vice president of the bank, said a complete check up of the loss had not been made but that it was between \$400 and \$500.

Bandit Wore Overalls
The bandit who entered the bank wore overalls and was clean shaven, Bianchi said.

The other man, waiting outside in the car, was described as about the age of his companion, 40, and to have a moustache.

A posse was organized by Deputy Sheriff R. A. Hogan as soon as the alarm had been given and roads in all directions were guarded.

One arrest was reported at Olatid and officers were sent there to see whether they could identify the suspect.

Muskogee Bank Is Robbed Of \$3,000

MUSKOGEE, Okla., Aug. 9 (P)—The Citizens National bank of Muskogee was robbed of approximately \$3,000 by three robbers about noon today.

The three men a few minutes previous to the robbery were seen in the city and Fort Pierce, a distance of 37 miles.

PARTY PLEDGE APPEAL FILED

COUNTY'S CASE TAKEN TO STATE BOARD BY MEETING CHAIRMAN
Settlement of the question of whether candidates in Lubbock county will have to pledge their support to the party nominee before entering the second primary will be made at a meeting of the State Democratic Executive committee in San Antonio next Monday. James H. Goodman, chairman of last year's county convention which passed the resolution asking for the candidates' pledge, said today.

His statement came as an outgrowth of Democratic county chairman, Frank R. Wheeler's refusal to approve the resolution calling for the candidates' pledge.

Notifying State Chairman
Mr. Goodman stated today that he was notifying State Democratic Chairman W. D. Wilcox of Mr. Wheeler's action in the matter, and that he felt sure that his ruling on the resolution would be overruled.

The approval of the resolution by the county executive committee was all that was necessary to pass them, Mr. Goodman said. The consent of Mr. Wheeler not being necessary.

Tom Carward, local attorney and state committeeman from the 20th congressional district, will attend the meeting in San Antonio, Monday, and present the question brought up here, it was said.

The calling of another convention will follow the announcement of the state committee's ruling on Monday, Mr. Goodman said today. If Mr. Wheeler's action is sustained, a new convention will be called.

Activities For Camp Fire Encampment Outlined In Messages Sent 70 Girls

General plans for the annual Camp Fire encampment in Ocala, Fla., this month, along with instructions, application and health certificate blanks, have been sent to about seventy Camp Fire girls of Lubbock this week by Mrs. W. B. Price. The letters were prepared by Miss Cecilia Peterson, executive director of Phoenix, Ariz., who is to be director of this camp.

All Camp Fire girls in Lubbock could not be reached since several guardians are out of the city. Mrs. Price said yesterday. Additional letters and blanks have been left with the cashier at the Minter-Gamel store and may be secured by girls who do not receive letters, she said. Registration fee of \$1.00 to be paid at Minter-Gamel's, also.

The camp is to open on August 16 in the canyon near Happy and is to continue through August 24. Information concerning transportation will be given girls at the time of registration, according to the letters, and the registration fee is to be deducted from the total expense of \$2.50 per week.

Miss Peterson will be assisted by a staff of capable women in conducting the camp. This group will consist of craft counselors, a musical director, a recreational director and a camp nurse. "Each night there is to be a program, planned by the girls, around a huge camp fire. The programs are to consist of songs, dramatizations and other stunts and those who attend camp are asked to bring with them musical instruments, fancy costumes and other paraphernalia for these activities."

To Award Honors
A council fire is to be held at the end of the camp and honors will be awarded. The girls will wear ceremonial gowns and head bands for this fire.

Registration for the camp will close when 50 girls have signed up and the camp director reserved the right to cancel these registrations, to admit girls who have not already been to camp and for other reasons, according to the letter. The health certificates are to be filled out by parents of the girls and a physician. These certificates must be presented with the registration.

"I think the flair of the theater is an instinctive thing and the desire to act or create plays for the stage is just born in you."

"The first essentials of success in the theater—grantsing one has talent—are personality rather than beauty, intelligence and the capability to work. However, none of these help much if an actor or actress lacks talent. Granted the talent, and given these three qualities, an artist is sure to emerge."

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—If little Japanese boys and girls shed their kimono in the next few years for calicoes and blouses and one-piece frocks that their mothers have made in the American manner, an American woman will be largely responsible.

Mary Brooks Picken, America's best known authority on home-dressmaking, has just written a book for translation into Japanese. It gives home-makers three lessons in how to cut, sew and fit American styles.

Made Garments Go Too
Every garment used as illustration has been made up and the exhibit of smart dresses, coats, tunics, blouses, children's frocks and flapper frocks will be sent soon to Japan to travel around that country to towns where sewing classes in American clothes will be established.

Japanese people in this country differ in their opinion of the invasion of their native land by American styles. But apparently, the Japanese in Japan feel that with the advent of modern machinery and modern factory methods the kimono is not the most practical everyday attire.

See Artistic Expression
England, South Africa and India already have courses based on Mary Brooks Picken's books on home-dressmaking, of which she has written 50, all told. Japan will be the first non-English speaking country to adopt her methods.

Mrs. Picken is America's staunchest advocate of home sewing. For 20 years, in the face of an avalanche of ready-to-wear flooding the markets, she has advocated home-sewing, not only as the inexpensive way to get more and prettier clothes for the family, but as one way women can get artistic expression in an age where there is all too little.

"The creative joy a woman can get from making smart costumes is all too often overlooked," she insists. "With lovely yardage goods so inexpensive, and dress-making methods strictly modern, the construction of a party dress or a business frock can be a simple joy within the reach of all."

Mrs. Picken herself has sewed since she was five. By the time she was 15 she was imparting to others the joy and science of making their own clothes, by having a class in sewing of her own school mates, charging each girl the sum of ten cents a lesson.

In turn she has taught sewing in person, written many courses in sewing and been editor of the home-

sewing department of several high class women's periodicals. She was the originator of store courses for fabric stylists.

All Sides of Sewing
Mrs. Picken has many theories about the art of costume-making. She has specialized in what the business woman should wear for work and is emphatic in thinking she should look the part she plays. "If a business girl dresses flimsily," she said, "her employer is likely to assume that her mind is as cluttered up as her dress. Why isn't it a safe assumption? Remember, women's success in the business world was simultaneous with the innovation of the simple, smart type of clothes!"

Charming simplicity should be the business girl's dress motto," she continued. "Clothes for business should have two characteristics; they should be appropriate and becoming."

Simplicity for Business
"By appropriate I mean that while no woman should look her age, she should never try to lower it too much by her clothes. If you are over forty, you may manage to look in your early thirties by the right lines, texture and color in your wardrobe. But don't try to look 20. Flapper clothes accentuate what you are doing to your body. The clothes of youth bring out the lines of age."

Color, fabric and line all have to do with becomingness. The wise older woman will take a day off, sometime, study thoroughly what the years have done to change the color of her eyes, hair and skin and choose all over again the colors she should wear. For color can make or break a woman."

Wholesome did not recall his statement which appears below:

"A short time ago you published the resolutions passed by the County Convention which was in session last Saturday, and many of our citizens have asked me what I was going to do in regard to carrying out the requests made in the resolutions. I will approve all of the resolutions with the exception of No. 6, which reads as follows:

Resolution No. 6
"Be it further resolved by the Democratic of Lubbock County now in session, that it is the sense of this convention, that all candidates

for office, county, state, and nation, from the president of the United States down to the precinct officers in this county, and that we further request that the Democratic executive committee of this county leave off the names of all candidates for office on the Democratic ticket, who refuse to subscribe to said pledge, to support all candidates as herein above set forth."

"Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be handed the chairman of the Democratic executive committee with a request that he and his committee comply with the sense of the convention herein set forth."

"I wish to state that I would not be a party to taking away the franchise of the free-born or naturalized American citizens in casting their ballot according to the dictates of their own conscience which the constitution and laws of the United States give them."

"For that reason I have declined to approve the resolution as stated above. Lubbock county has as fine a citizenship as there is anywhere and I wonder how many of them would like to have someone dictate to them how they shall vote."

"I certainly hope the day will never come when that condition will prevail. I certainly hope that every legal voter will vote and go to the polls on the 25th day of this month which is the off primary day, and cast his ballot according to the dictates of their conscience."

"And again at the general elec-

tion in November. There is no coercion or implied coercion on any account of the pledge on primary ballot to support the vote for president."

"If the voters will turn out to vote in the elections we will have cleaner politics, and a better government and much better conditions in governmental affairs."

"I hereby extend to the members of the county convention my best regards, but I shall have to decline to approve their resolution as stated above."

FRANK TRAILS PATTERSON IN MISSOURI RACE

HAY HAS GOOD LEAD OVER COLLET FOR U. S. SENATE

(By Associated Press)
ST. LOUIS, Aug. 9. (AP)—Roscoe C. Patterson of Springfield, Mo., United States district attorney at Kansas City, was apparently nominated as republican candidate for United States senator in Tuesday's primary. His plurality over Nathan Frank of St. Louis, continued to climb today.

Patterson was 5,383 votes ahead of Frank on the basis of returns from 3428 precincts out of 4140. The vote was Patterson 96,589, Frank 91,204, and David M. Proctor, of Kansas City 78,479.

The lead of Charles M. Hay, dry leader of the state, over James A. Collet, a wet and whose campaign was sponsored by Senator James A. Reed, stood at 21,531 with 3659 precincts tabulated. Hay had 155,369 and Collet 133,838.

Democrat Governor's Race
Francis Wilson of Platte City had a wide lead over his opponent for the democratic gubernatorial nomination, state Senator A. L. McCawley. Wilson had 233,796; McCawley 64,152.

Henry S. Caulfield's lead over his nearest opponent, Lieut. Gov. Phil Bennett of Springfield, for the republican gubernatorial nomination stood at 39,155. Caulfield's vote was 144,818; Bennett's 85,663.

Hay, who was attacked by Senator Reed on grounds that Hay's dry views would conflict with the stand of Governor Al Smith on prohibition, said he would attend notification ceremonies for Governor Smith on August 23, and while in New York would confer with Smith on the Missouri campaign. Hay said he intends to give Governor Smith his full support in the coming campaign.

Johnson Forces Lead In Oklahoma

OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 9. (AP)—Neck and neck races for congressional nomination in the seventh and eighth districts and a slight shifting in alignment of forces opposed to or favoring the administration of Governor Henry S. Johnston, were manifest in returns today from the state primary election.

Robert Graham, of Oklahoma City, apparently had joined E. P. Hill, of McAlester, another leader in an insurgent group of legislators which last winter attempted to impeach Governor Johnston, in defeat for nomination for house member.

WIDER PROGRAM FOR EXTENSION WORK IS ASKED

AUSTIN, Aug. 9. (AP)—A wide program of expansion for the agricultural experiment station system of Texas A. and M. college was urged upon the state board of control today by A. B. Connor, station director, in a hearing on budget estimates to be submitted to the 41st legislature.

Appropriations of \$1,171,232 were asked for the next biennium, beginning September 1, 1929, as compared to the currently available biennial appropriation of \$691,197.

New activities contemplated include a division of agricultural engineering to investigate new uses of farm machinery to lessen man power on the farms. This division would cost \$5,000 a year.

One hundred thirty three thousand dollars for the biennium was asked as a fund to finance study of cotton root rot, \$30,000 a year for research study of poisoning of cattle by "loco weed", and \$22,300 for study of dairy problems.

Floyd Thompson, democratic candidate for governor, in praising the work of Mr. Brennan added that democracy in Illinois "is not a one-man party," and that the state and national campaign would continue to be conducted as already planned.

The War

A number of waiters in a certain
Paris restaurant have been accus-
tomed to wear on their black uni-
form coats medals won in the world
war. The Croix de Guerre dangled
from many an obsequious chest as
the pale de fete fraise went sailing
through the air.

Now the management of this res-
taurant has forbidden the waiters
to wear their decorations.

The medals give offense, it seems.
Peace time patrons don't like to be
reminded of the war. It has been
over for nearly ten years, and the
restaurant management feels that it
ought to be forgotten.

This is a perfectly natural attitude
toward a war, and a restaurant
serving the better class of people.
It must be rather embarrassing for
a journalist, let us say, who whoops
it up for La Patrie and blood-
shed in July of 1914, and snuggled
down safely at his desk for the next
four years, to reflect, as he nibbles
his hors d'oeuvres, that the man
who served him spent four years in
the trenches.

Yet there are some things that
ought not to be forgotten. And the
world war is one of them.

Human nature forgets things easily.
It is one of the things that
help make life endurable. Bitter
experiences have a way of getting
softened by time. But this is not
entirely an advantage.

The burnt child will never learn
to fear the fire if he doesn't re-
member how badly it hurt him.
And this burning world will never
learn to avoid that "next war"
we're always talking about if it
doesn't manage to remember what
a terrible thing the last one was.

The human suffering brought on
by that conflict was, in its total
sum, beyond computation. It can
only be imagined. No one in this
reigning world could countenance a rep-
etition of it unless there were no other
way out.

But when the next threat of war
comes, that suffering will be for-
gotten. Influential people will re-
member it. They will hear the
bugles and see the banners and
thrust to the third-thud of marching
feet, and they will remember that
war has always been, and it will not
appear to them in all its grisly
realism. And without really willing
any universal breakdown, they will
agree that war, once more, is in-
evitable.

War is seldom or never really in-
evitable. Patience and intelligence
could nearly always find some other
solution. If memory of the last war
could remain alive and throbbing,
people would make more of an ef-
fort to find such a solution when the
next crisis came.

It is not yet time for forgetting.
The world war, in every agonizing
detail, ought to remain fresh in our
memories.

usually has the count's tire tools.

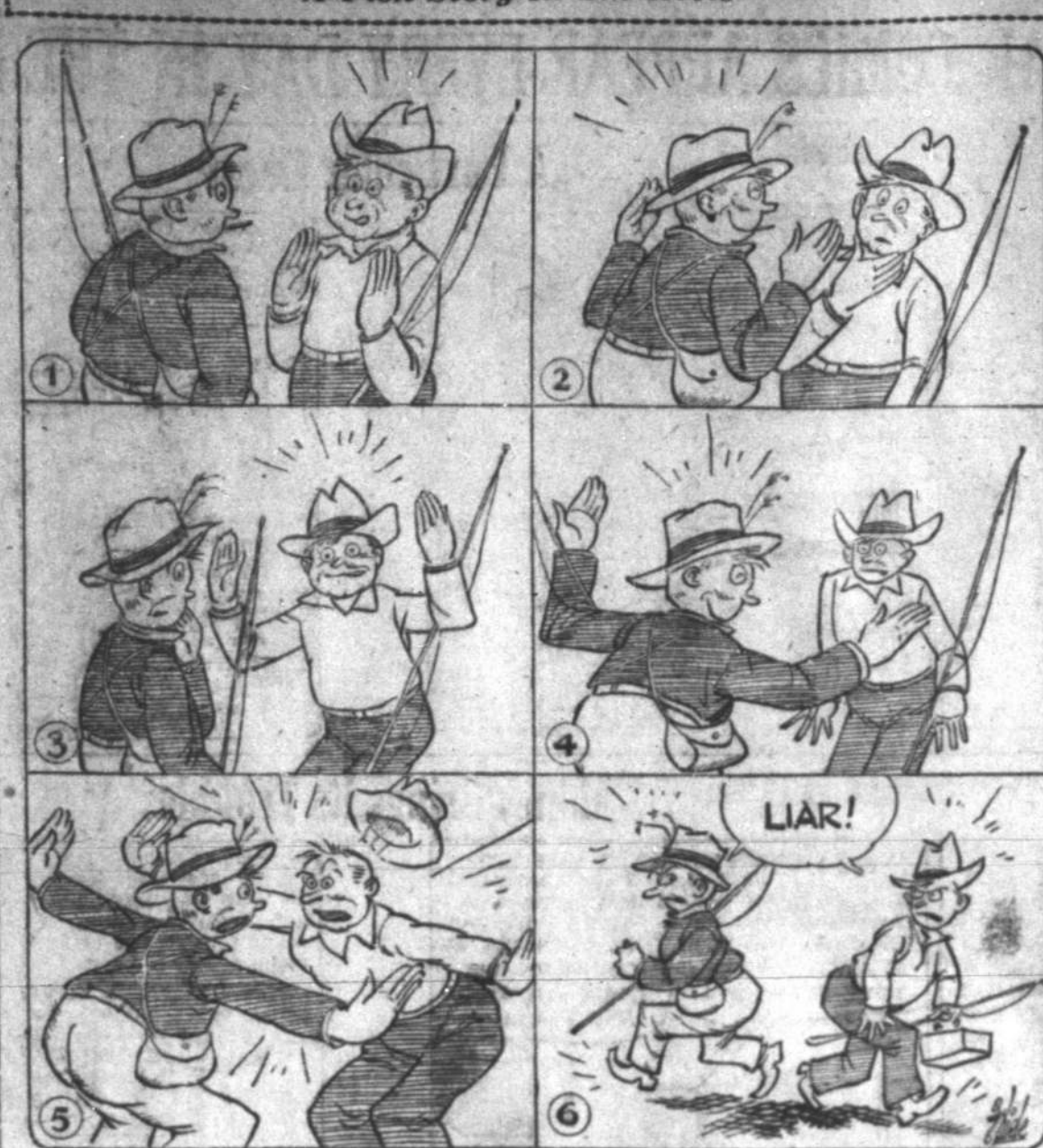
The paper didn't say whether

A REAL EXAMPLE

The weakness in our handling of
crime is aptly illustrated by the
record of an Eastern criminal. Dur-
ing the twelve years he "practiced"
crime he was arrested twelve times
and imprisoned but twice.

On this first arrest for assault, he
was convicted and his sentence sus-
pended. Within two days he was
discharged, but two weeks after he
was arrested and imprisoned for
violation of parole.

Three years passed. Again he was
arrested and convicted of grand larceny.
Again his sentence was sus-
pended. A year later he was sen-
tenced to prison for the same crime
for a term of 2 1/2 years. Within
six months he was taken on an-
other larceny charge, convicted and
his sentence suspended.

At least six more times he was ar-
rested, only to be freed without
punishment. He continued crim-
inal activities until he was sur-
prised by a policeman during a hold-
up. The officer was in the first
shock and killed him.

Anyone curious to find an ad-
equate reason for our successive
crime wave gets his answer in the
story of this career. Yet profes-
sional salvationists continue to ad-
vocate anti-prohibition laws as a re-
medy for the reign of the criminal. The
real cure is simple. Unflinching en-
forcement of the law that gives
only those who have worked and
deserved it by chance for parole
and which sees that "the repeater"
is given no further opportunity to
ravage society.—Terry County Her-
ald.

There is no doubt that when a per-
son can repeatedly commit crime
and get away with it, they will
continue to do so, especially if they
make any financial gains by their
operations. We are of the opinion
that every citizen should be given
a chance, but when the same person
commits crimes continually, they
should be handled in a way that
will teach them a lesson that they
cannot continually violate the laws
and go unpunished.

Oklahoma To Aid
Anti-Smith Drive

DALLAS, Aug. 9.—B. D. Sar-
tin, who will direct the activities
of the anti-Al Smith democrats of
Texas in their attempt to carry
this state for Herbert Hoover, re-
publican presidential nominee, an-
nounced today that former United
States Senator Robert Owen, dem-
ocratic senator for Oklahoma for
many years, will be brought to
Texas to aid in the campaign
against Governor Alfred E. Smith.
Senator Owen announced recent-
ly that he would support the re-
publican nominee.

Headquarters of the anti-Al
Smith democrats will be opened
here today, Mr. Sartin said. He
declared that the organization
probably would send at least 30
speakers on a tour of the state,
asking voters to cast their ballot
for Secretary Hoover.

Under the new voting bill, which

women of England, the latter will
outnumber the men by more than
two million.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—Gov-
ernor Al Smith's statement reit-
erating his stand for modification of
the prohibition laws, followed as it
was by representations from some
eastern Republican national com-
missioners, that Herbert Hoover
should say something to help
them corral wet votes in their
area, is not going to stampede Ho-
ver on the wet and dry issue.

Hoover is likely to be found tak-
ing the position that prohibition is
not properly a partisan ques-
tion. It was effected
by legislation on a non-partisan
basis at a time when two-thirds of
the nation was already dry by law.
The history of the prohibition move-
ment shows that it has always had
this non-partisan character. Ho-
ver's reluctance is therefore likely to
be that, if the experiment of pro-
hibition is a failure, or if the present
laws are too drastic or inadequate,
the situation ought to be solved
without any of the complications of
partisan politics.

The Smith statement seems un-
fortunate, as a matter of fact, to
some advocates of modification.
They have felt that if solution of
the problem lay in any direction
other than a continuation of the
present national policy, that solution
must be worked out intelligently,
free from personal or political
prejudice and with only the national
welfare in mind. They see Smith
making a social problem a political
football.

In his speech of acceptance
Hoover is not expected to go far be-
yond the utterance of the Republi-
can platform for enforcement.
Smith is expected to stress again
the wet issue in his speech. But
it is not believed here that Hoover
will be found making any declara-
tion that will establish prohibition
as an issue beyond the point which
the democrats may be able to carry
the question themselves.

Hoover has called prohibition "an
experiment, noble in purpose," and
beyond acceptance of the Republi-
can platform has said nothing fur-
ther.

Strangely enough, the theory that
prohibition is not a party issue has
been most frequently uttered this
year by Hoover's arch-enemy, Sen-
ator Jim Reed of Missouri. Reed,
however, was inspired by a desire
for party harmony and for his own
nomination. He understood too well
somewhere between the extreme
drys of his party and the extreme
wets.

They Smith he is nomination
and his subsequent words and ac-
tions, has antagonistically forced the
issue. Calling Al Smith's record and
character a "disgrace" it would have
been an issue anyway. But he
wanted to leave no doubt about it.
The fundamental difference be-
tween the positions of the two can-
didates seems to be that Smith be-
lieves most voters in this year's
doubtful states are opposed to pro-
hibition in its present form, where-
as Hoover believes the country is
by no means yet convinced that his
"experiment" noble in purpose, has
failed.

VOLCANO WRECKS
ISLAND KILLING
OVER THOUSAND

BATAVIA, Java, Aug. 9.—Ac-
cording to reports transmitted by
a resident of Timor, nearly the en-
tire island of Paloekeh, Dutch East
Indies, has been destroyed by erup-
tion of the Bokatsinka volcano on
August 4 and 5. Six villages were
destroyed by fire. The death toll
was believed to be nearly a thou-
sand.

Remainder of the islanders, num-
bering 5,000, were stated to be safe.
It was feared nine native boats
enroute from Celebes Island to Pa-
loeweh foundered with their crews.
The Dutch resident of Timor is
proceeding to the scene of the dis-
aster.

Six hundred persons were injured
when hit by fragments.
Further casualties were caused by
submergence of the whole seaboard
of the island through an earthquake
accompanying the eruption.

Paloekeh is off the north coast
of Flores island, one of the larger
of the Malay archipelago islands.
It is 15 miles in diameter and
rises to a peak 4,593 feet high
which is covered with trees to its
summit.

Traffic Violations
In City Are "Cheap"

It costs only \$3 to run an amber
light in Lubbock, and probably be-
cause of the "excursion rates" many
Lubbock people are availing them-
selves of an opportunity to get the
tickets during the past week, and
most of them have paid fines.

RADITCH DIES FROM SHOT IN RECENT SCRAP

EUROPE UNEASY WITH CIVIL WAR THREAT GAINING HEADWAY

(By Associated Press)
VIENNA, Aug. 9.—Death of Stefan Raditch, fiery Croatian peasant leader, as a result of a shooting in the chamber of deputies, is causing anxiety in Europe as well as Yugoslavia.

Belief was held in some quarters today that the situation contained at least possibility of civil war for Yugoslavia unless outside influences were exerted.

Troops were parading today through streets of Zagreb, where Raditch died last night. All places of entertainment were closed.

Great disturbances in view of the intense resentment of the Croats against the Yugoslav government party whom they hold responsible for the shooting were feared.

That such disorders might not long remain local was the fear that was causing deep anxiety elsewhere. The bitterness of the Croats towards what they regard as Serbian domination is well known. Prospects of a reconciliation seemed hopeless at present, especially since a parliamentary commission has voted in favor of ratifying the Nettuno convention with Italy in the face of bitter Croatian opposition. The Nettuno convention permits Italians to own land along the Dalmatian coastal plane.

M. Prebitchevitch, leader of the peasants, upon hearing of Raditch's death, immediately issued a summons for the executives of the party to assemble on Saturday. After Raditch was shot his adherents withdrew from the cabinet, and his party has refused to acknowledge the legality of the Yugoslav government. A separate parliament was set up in Zagreb and a demonstration was held favoring a "free Croatia."

July 27 were bound over to the grand jury on murder and assault to murder charges after examining trials here.

The charges are in connection with slaying of Dog Sergeant Henry Ward, and wounding of several officers in gun battles preceding capture of the convicts.

The men are Raymond Hall, alias R. H. Tucker, who prison officials say switched identification tags to escape a 99 year sentence; R. R. Carter, serving 99 years from Dallas county; Bill Tompkins, one armed Alvin Ireland, Irving Davis,

Johnny Collins and Fred Burkett. Carter, Tompkins and Ireland were held on assault to murder charges in connection with wounding of Deputy Sheriff Tom Davis, Deputy Sheriff P. P. Bell and Deputy Sheriff R. L. Wheaton, Fort Bend county officers.
