

Former Kaiser Of Imperial Germany Dies

BERLIN, June 4 (AP)—Former Kaiser Wilhelm II of Imperial Germany died today at his estate of Doorn in the quiet backwash of a new German conquest almost 23 years after he fled from the crumbling failure of his own European war plan.

DNE, German official news agency, reported from Amsterdam that the 82-year-old, white-bearded former emperor died at 11:30 a. m. (4:30 a. m. EST) in a sudden relapse of an illness which brought members of his family to his bedside last week.

An intestinal disorder, complicated at the last by a lung trouble, caused his death.

Even in death, the "Old Man of Doorn" is not to return to the land he once ruled.

He is to be buried at Doorn next Monday but, on the orders of Adolf Hitler, a military funeral with full honors is to be accorded Imperial Germany's last emperor.

The German high command has

taken full charge of the military phase of the funeral, a token, perhaps, that reconciliation between the funder and the former emperor had been complete.

At his bedside when he died were only a few close members of his family—his second wife, Princess Hermine; his daughter, the Duchess of Brunswick; and his grandsons, Louis Ferdinand, Karl, and Franz Joseph, and the latter's wife, Princess Henrietta.

The first kaiserin died April 11, 1921, and was buried at Potsdam. The former emperor's eldest living son and successor as head of the Hohenzollern family, Crown Prince Friedrich Wilhelm, had been at his father's side earlier, but left late last week when the former kaiser seemed to rally.

Second in the family line, Prince Louis Ferdinand, also was away from Doorn.

It was reported here that the former emperor talked for several hours yesterday afternoon with his



major domo, but showed signs of a relapse later, approached a crisis at 8 p. m., and shortly thereafter lost consciousness.

The Hohenzollern flag flew at half-staff from Castle Doorn.

The "Old Man of Doorn," who in his time commanded the world's mightiest military machine, regarded the ascendancy of Adolf Hitler to the leadership of the reich in 1933 as "a step in the right direction."

When Hitler picked up the saber dropped in 1918 by the kaiser and turned it into terrifying blitzkrieg in 1939, 13 of Wilhelm's family were in Nazi uniform. One son, Prince Oscar of Prussia, 11 grandsons and one grandnephew of the kaiser marched with the gray-green legions. Two of the grandsons since have fallen in battle. Another grandson was interned by the British.

Tumor on rumor had cropped up since 1933 that the kaiser was ac-

tively "behind-the-scenes" of rejuvenated Germany and that he would one day triumphantly return to Berlin to claim his "divine right" as emperor. All such reports were quickly spiked.

"Old trees can not be transplanted," the kaiser often remarked, seemingly content in his orderly life at the Doorn estate.

In the past decade his routine of breakfast at 8:45 a. m., morning wood-chopping, tea, correspondence, walk, lunch, nap, tea again, a walk, dinner and light out at 10 p. m. had been disturbed by attacks of rheumatism or colds.

He followed the present war painstakingly as though he had a commanding position at the Nazi general headquarters. He marked the progress of the Nazi war machine by affixing tiny flags on detailed maps of European countries and by maintaining a remarkably complete index of naval and merchant shipping losses.

Next Theatre Of War May Be Defined

RAF Attacks Oil Depot, Open Conflict Is Near

With the British clamoring for action, RAF warplanes today bombed the oil depot at Beirut, French-ruled Lebanon, in what may have been the opening blow in the next great campaign of the war.

Simultaneously, authoritative quarters in London said Britain had now taken "necessary precautions in regard to Syria"—neighboring French colony in the Middle East—and imperial headquarters at Cairo announced that British troops had occupied Mosul, the center of Iraq's rich oil fields.

As the war momentarily threatened to boil over into this new theatre in the eastern Mediterranean, the Syrian high command declared that the army of the Levant was ready to defend its territory against any attacks.

In Berlin, a Nazi spokesman said France had taken "certain protective measures" along the borders of some of her colonial possessions—an evident reference to Syria and Lebanon.

Reports reaching Vichy, the French capital, said British planes this morning attacked Beirut, blowing up reservoirs and bombing the oil depot there.

Recapitulating the 12-day battle of Crete, the Germans asserted that 12,000 more British and Greek troops had been captured on the blitz-ravaged Mediterranean island, making a total of 25,000.

The latest group of captives, it was said, included 8,000 British and 4,000 Greeks.

Previous British reports said 15,000 troops had been safely withdrawn from Crete, out of an original contingent of some 30,000.

Amid official silence, Britons waited for word that the war may already have flamed into action in France's Middle East colonies of Syria and Lebanon.

Cabinet Minister Lord Beaverbrook's newspaper, the London Evening Standard, declared British troops should occupy Syria at once—if necessary for the defense of Palestine and Cyprus—and demanded:

"Are we afraid of war with France? It would be better if we saw the issue as clearly as Admiral Darlan (French vice premier).

The newspaper asserted that Darlan, bitter foe of England, had offered Syria to Germany as payment in his "betrayal on the installment plan."

The British press and public alike demanded that Britain "act boldly and stop placating Vichy."

Solon Drops Dead In The Capitol

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Representative Edelstein (D-NY) dropped dead outside the house chamber today a few minutes after making a speech on the floor.

Dr. George W. Calver, Capitol physician, said heart failure was the cause of the death of the 53-year-old bachelor congressman.

Shocked colleagues gathered around the stricken member as Calver made his examination.

Wichita Falls Homes Flooded

WICHITA FALLS, June 4 (AP)—The rain-swollen waters of the Wichita river and Holiday creek seeped into houses in lowland areas and caused the evacuation of 40 families last night.

Cloudbursts along Beaver creek in the Electra district caused the river to rise. A two-foot flow over the spillway of Lake Wichita swelled Holiday creek. The overflowing river forced the creek to back up and burst its banks.

Conservation Areas Given Approval

Approval on five watershed or complete problem areas for concerted programs of soil conservation were announced at the Big Spring office of the Soil Conservation Service Wednesday. The announcement followed a meeting of the Martin-Howard County Soil Conservation district board of supervisors at Stanton Tuesday.

Included in the group, all approved since the May 6 meeting of the board, are areas northeast of Coahoma, south of Vealmoor, near Luther and at Soash-Garner in Howard county and around Lenora in Martin county.

In addition, two divide units out of 10 applications not grouped were given the stamp of approval.

By groups, the watershed area northeast of Coahoma embraces 10 applications for 2,614 acres of cultivated land and 7,553 acres of pasture.

Lenora—21 applications, 2,384 acres cultivated, 441 pasture.

Umer Lake (south of Vealmoor): Four applications, 1,180 acres cultivated, 114 acres pasture.

Luther: 10 applications, 2,329 acres cultivated, 6,270 acres pasture.

Soash-Garner: 31 applications, 8,993 acres cultivated and 2,073 acres pasture. Field work on this group has been completed and individual farm information compiled.

Dudley Mann, SCS supervisor, said that this data had been distributed to farmers and that SCS men would begin contacts on contemplated programs of work Thursday morning.

In the ungrouped classification of applications, there were 2,614 acres in cultivation and 7,553 acres pasture. However, only two out of this amount had been sanctioned for development by supervisors.

LEASE BIDS OPENED

AUSTIN, June 4 (AP)—The state school land board today studied bids on seven tracts of public land opened to leasing for mineral development. June 5 was set by the board for action on 20-odd offers.

Gasless Sundays, Less Power May Be The Answer To Oil Shortage In Eastern Area

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Secretary Ickes said today "all of us" would have "to make some kind of adjustment" to meet the prospective oil shortage which industry representatives have said might lead to gasless Sundays and less heat from oil burners.

"We face a set of hard facts," the interior department chief declared in his first formal statement since President Roosevelt made him petroleum coordinator for defense. He added briefly:

"I am sure that American industry, as well as individual citizens, can help to meet the situation. Conservation of petroleum products is certainly one way."

As another conservation measure, Ickes has recommended establishment of nationwide daylight saving time. It was learned today this probably will be recommended soon by the Office of Production Management.

The recommendation, to save electricity, probably will be made to governors, one official said. It is unlikely any legislation will be recommended.

Secretary Ickes' aides have estimated that Japan now is importing 60,000 to 70,000 barrels daily of oil from the United States, sending ships to the west coast for it.

Oil experts pointed out, however, the Japanese imports from this country bore little if any relation to the threatened petroleum shortage in eastern states, since the deficiency would result from lack of transportation from the southwestern oil fields to the east rather than a shortage of production and refining facilities.

The shortage, petroleum experts said, will begin in the east in late summer and become progressively more acute during the autumn months.

To combat the approaching scarcity and to keep it from curtailing defense production, they recommended that rigid restrictions be imposed on the use of oil. Specifically, it was suggested that "gasless Sundays" be started, and that the temperature in oil-heated homes be kept five degrees lower this winter. No federal program has yet been formulated, however.

Coal Dispute Still Before Govt. Board

The defense mediation board called together in Washington today representatives of northern and southern coal operators and the United Mine Workers (UMW) to hear board recommendations for settlement of their wage contract controversy.

Hanging upon acceptance or refusal of the terms was a threatened new strike of 400,000 coal miners in the seven-state Appalachian bituminous industry. The walkout was postponed by President John L. Lewis of the UMW pending the board's report.

The recommendations were to be made public after they had been submitted to participants in the three-way controversy, but board officials said the closed parleys might last until tomorrow.

A board panel headed by W. H. Davis, vice-chairman, began drafting the recommendations 10 days ago after efforts to mediate the dispute failed. The board has no power to enforce its recommendations, but following President Roosevelt's proclamation of an unlimited national emergency, Davis said:

"The president said that the recommendations of the mediation board should be followed. I assume he meant what he said."

Crux of the controversy is the historic wage differential between northern and southern mines. The northern operators have met union demands for a wage increase of \$1 a day to \$7.

The southerners have raised their rate to \$6.60. The UMW demands a uniform \$7 scale, and its contract with the northern group provides that a strike may be called if a lesser wage is paid elsewhere.

Two other major cases engaged board members.

A panel considered the threatened strike of United Auto Workers (CIO) at the Inglewood, Calif., plant of North American Aviation Corporation, while another group continued its efforts to induce 12,000 CIO lumberworkers in 32 Pudget Sound logging camps and mills to return to work pending settlement of the dispute.

Oil Proration Extension Is Hanging Fire

AUSTIN, June 4 (AP)—Still hanging fire in the state senate today was the vital question—shall Texas oil proration laws expiring Sept. 1 be extended two years without change or amended in an effort to eliminate asserted selective crude purchasing.

The upper legislative chamber again refused yesterday to consider a bill attempting to base allowable on a statewide market demand basis rather than by fields, thus abolishing claimed heavy purchases of crude from some pools and ignoring others.

Also pending was another house-approved proration bill which simply would extend current statutes two years. It has met repeated snags on proposed consideration.

On its way into the lawbooks by senate action was a measure placing into immediate effect two phases of the federal social security act—aid to the needy adult blind and aid to dependent and neglected children.

The recently-enacted \$22,000,000 tax bill allotted \$1,500,000 a year to children's aid and \$400,000 to the blind. Federal matching funds will be distributed with the state money by the public welfare commission.

The senate also sent Governor W. Lee O'Daniel a bill authorizing counties of 100,000 population or more to refund general fund deficits with bond issues to be liquidated by allocation of up to five cents out of the general fund's ad valorem tax revenues.

Army Favors 3-Year Terms

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—The war department emphasized to corps area commanders today the desirability of enlisting selective service trainees where possible, for full three-year terms of service with the army.

The department sent out instructions listing the sources of regular army enlistments in order of preference.

Reenlistment of regular soldiers was given first rating. The enlistment of trainees who "have demonstrated that they are qualified" for regular army service received second place and regular recruiting of civilians was put third.

Selective service men under the law are inducted for a one-year training period. War department officials said that a few already have been listed for regular terms of service, and the publication of today's instructions indicated the possibility that corps area and other army unit commanders over the country might put renewed emphasis on enlistment of these men.

Airport Blueprints Being Turned Out

Blueprints on airport changes were being turned out Wednesday as the city's engineering staff rushed work on completing specifications and estimates.

Prospects were that complete plans would go into the state WPA office at San Antonio by this week-end.

Additional personnel was assigned Wednesday to the job of typing figures into break-down forms. Since bulk estimates have been available for several days, it was anticipated that the period for advertising for bids would have been largely dissipated by the time final approval is given the project, so that contracts may be let immediately. There were not estimates available on the total, but it was unofficially predicted that it would run well past \$400,000 for the four-runway surface, lighting, fencing, and other improvement.

Insect Menace Pointed Out By Griffin

Unless precautions are taken, insect damage may offset Howard county's good crop conditions, County Agent O. P. Griffin fears.

He fears that losses to several insects, notably jumbo grasshoppers and cotton flea hoppers, may prove serious.

Jumbo grasshoppers have appeared in a few small areas, he reports, and will spread. Infestation by this insect is heavy wherever he has been found.

Griffin urged every farmer to inspect pastures around his cottonfields to find if jumbos are there. If many are found, he advises poisoning with the popular bran mash and arsenic mixture.

"There is no danger in scattering poison bran in pastures if it is carefully done," the county agent pointed out. "Care must be taken that not too much moisture is used for this will cause the bran to lump. But if the bran does not lump, there is no danger of cattle picking it up."

Griffin suggested a formula of 25 pounds of wheat bran to each pound of white arsenic, half gallon of black strap molasses and gallon of water. The bran and arsenic should be thoroughly mixed, the water and molasses mixed separately, and the poison bran dampened with the water and molasses mixture with plenty of stirring.

It is helpful to allow the entire mixture to sit overnight. Mash should be sowed before eight a. m. where the hoppers are found. A strip of bran spread in pastures for 100 yards back of the fences bordering cotton fields should protect the fields.

The same mixture will also kill May beetles, many of which have been found this year.

The cotton flea hopper menace is not so immediate, but the county agent fears it will develop to major proportions. The fleas are now in their second generation of the year and are working mostly in fields. The next generation will likely take to the cotton.

These must be dusted with sulphur while young, dusting after they have developed wings being ineffective. The next generation is likely to be on cotton by the last week in June, and should be dusted then and again the middle of July if found in large numbers.

Griffin says there are less flea hoppers evident than were found in 1937, but that there are also less of certain other types of insects that feed on the hoppers.

Results Of Patrol Yet Undetermined

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Secretary Knox said today that the navy had been unable to determine yet whether expansion of the American naval patrol had substantially reduced the effectiveness of German submarine operations.

American Ships May Take Over All British Routes

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—An agreement for American merchantmen to take over all British shipping routes from the United States and Canada to Australia and New Zealand was regarded here today as the probable forerunner of a complete British withdrawal from maritime activities outside the war zone.

Such a withdrawal, with United States vessels taking over the abandoned routes, long has been considered likely, but the first formal action did not come until late yesterday.

In a brief formal announcement, the maritime commission reported the agreement and said that a dozen British vessels would be released for Great Britain's war effort.

The agreement was interpreted in some official circles here as further evidence of Britain's acute need for cargo tonnage in the battle of her South American trade would soon follow.

The maritime commission's announcement capped a day that saw various aspects of Britain's life-line battle figure prominently in capital developments.

One provocative disclosure was that "a number" of the commission's new cargo vessels had already been converted into aircraft carriers. John J. Dempsey, a member of the commission, gave the information to a senate committee investigating the defense program.

British Shipping Takes Heavy Blows

BERLIN, June 4 (AP)—Destruction of a 4,000-ton British merchant ship near the Orkney islands by bombs last night, damage to two others off northern Scotland, and two air torpedo hits on a large British warship were reported by the high command today as German sources declared Britain already had lost more than half the merchant fleet with which she began the war.

Britain is "bleeding to death" from these blows to her shipping, Germans asserted.

The high command said last night's air attacks were directed mainly against the harbor of Hull, England, and port facilities of the south and east coasts.

British planes did not enter German territory during the night, it said, but the British have lost 20 planes in the period from May 29 to June 3, compared with 10 German losses.

(The British government said German air attacks on England, last night were on a small scale, with bombs dropped in the east, northeast and southwest causing slight damage and few casualties.)

Since the beginning of the conflict, German sea and air units have destroyed a total of 11,664,000 tons of British shipping, DNE, official German news agency asserted.

(British merchant tonnage at the outset of the war was estimated at about 21,000,000 tons. British figures on allied shipping losses through April total approximately 6,000,000 tons.)

The newspaper Boersen Zeitung, commenting on these figures, said Britain thus had lost during 12 months of the war as much shipping as English shipyards were able to construct in 11 years of peace.

CROSS THE ATLANTIC

NEW YORK, June 4.—Maritime sources, disclosing the recent torpedoing of eight British ships, totaling 54,268 tons, revealed today that axis submarines had extended their work of destruction two-thirds of the way across the Atlantic to within 700 miles of the American continent.

They said that four British ships were torpedoed in a single day in positions roughly 700 miles east of Labrador and about 350 miles south of the tip of Greenland—an area presumably covered by the U. S. neutrality patrol.

Average Earnings Kept In Tax Plan

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—The house today means committee, rejecting a treasury proposal, voted today to retain the "average earnings" principle in the excess profits tax system.

The action was the first taken by the committee since it voted six weeks ago to follow the treasury recommendation of a \$3,500,000,000 goal for new taxes.

In connection with its proposal for raising this additional revenue, the treasury urged the committee to base further collection of excess profits solely on a ratio of profits to invested capital, with 10 per cent as the maximum any corporation might be allowed without being subject to the levy.

Britain Maps Strategy In Middle East

LONDON, June 4 (AP)—Britain claimed today to have strengthened her hand for the great battle shaping up in the Middle East by two steps aimed at thwarting German strategy, but her position in Iraq apparently still was delicate.

These preliminaries for what may be a portentous struggle for the Middle East's oil and control of the Suez Canal were announced by the British as successfully completed:

1. Reoccupation of Mosul, the oil center of Iraq, by British troops;

2. "Necessary precautions in regard to Syria," the potential bridgehead for an axis thrust into Iraq and back-door drive toward Suez.

Although order was said to have been restored, the Middle East general headquarters conceded that martial law had been declared by the Iraq government in Baghdad yesterday following "serious rioting."

Authorized German sources in Berlin intimated that Britain's troubles in Iraq may not be ended by the armistice and formation of a new regime yesterday. The Berlin view is that the new Iraq government is acting under protection of British bombers and armored cars and that the truce is only partly effective.)

Says Kaiser Not As Bad As Pictured

NEW YORK, June 4 (AP)—James W. Gerard, U. S. ambassador to Germany during the early years of the first World war, said today he was sorry to hear of the death of former Kaiser Wilhelm II and added that "the former German emperor was not all the demon he was pictured to be."

"My relations with him, except for one or two occasions when he was a little hysterical during the war, were pleasant and agreeable," Gerard, a New York attorney, said. "He was a rather kindly, good-natured person who presented a sense of humor that most Americans do not have."

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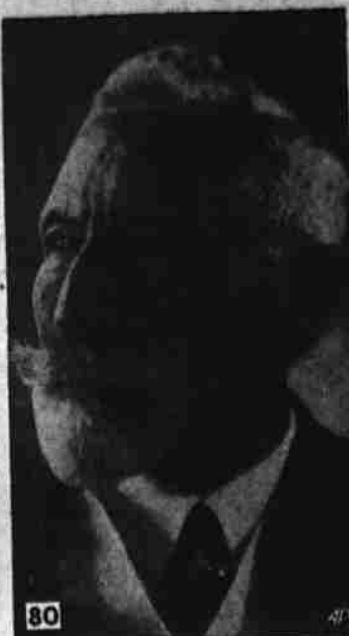
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Fledgling Pilots Being Sent To Air Bases In The Pacific



At Four Ages—The span of years experienced by former Kaiser Wilhelm II of Germany is evidenced in four photographs, showing him at the ages of 20, 40, 60 and 80. The one-time Imperial warlord died at the age of 81 early today at his exile estate in Doorn, whence he fled after the collapse of his war empire.

Kaiser Was Sociable And Personable, Had No Bitter Words For America

(Perhaps more than any other American in recent years, Louis F. Lochner, chief of the Associated Press bureau in Berlin, had the confidence and friendship of the former Kaiser and the Hohenzollern family. In the following dispatch, Lochner recalls some of his impressions and conversations with the woodchopper of Doorn during more than a decade.)

By LOUIS F. LOCHNER
BERLIN, June 4 (AP)—My personal contacts with Wilhelm II date back to 1928 when the former German ruler was in his 69th year.

From all I'd heard and read about the Kaiser, I expected to find an austere, unapproachable, self-willed, opinionated, haughty, fire-eating, merciless individual.

Instead I encountered a mellowed, affable, sociable old gentleman—a man who captivated me by the charm of his personality, who listened eagerly to what anybody coming from the outside brought into the quietude and uneventfulness of his exile, who accepted his lot in humility, whose concern for others was often touching.

Time and tribulation evidently had changed greatly this erstwhile self-reliant autocrat.

Never once while I was at Doorn did I hear one bitter word said about America nor about England, who in the last analysis was responsible for his dethronement. On the contrary, he seemed genuinely happy when on the occasion of his 75th birthday anniversary the late King George V and Queen Mary for the first time sent him congratulatory messages familiarly signed "George and Mary," thereby indicating bygone were bygone. One day during the Italian-Ethiopian war he said to me

with great concern: "I don't understand the English. They're otherwise always so clever about winning other peoples over to their cause. Why don't they rouse the Mohammedan world against Italy?"

Noting my surprised look he continued "the trouble is they don't remember history. Why, when some of Mohammed's followers in 622 sought refuge from persecution, the then Ethiopian king took sides with Mohammed and gave the prophet's followers shelter. Mohammed never forgot this and enjoined upon Moslems everywhere not to harm any Ethiopian. You see how easily England could have reminded the Moslem world of this historic episode and stirred it up against Italy as the country making war upon the great prophet's friends."

As regards the United States, Wilhelm followed its progress and development with the greatest interest. I was a luncheon guest one day at a time when the mid-western dust bowl was causing great concern to the administration. "I've seen this coming for some time," Wilhelm observed. "In Germany we've always paid the greatest attention to reforestation. In your country I fear the forests were ruthlessly cut down with no concern for the future. The dust

bowl was inevitable. We should gladly have loaned you some of our experienced foresters." I saw him last on his 80th birthday anniversary, Jan. 27, 1938. Later visits were rendered impossible by the European holocaust. Already then, clouds of war were gathering.

"Europe's fate rests with God," he said to me devoutly. "In our calculations we must never forget (here he raised his eyes) Him above."

WEST CHESTER, Pa.—Attending a public auction out of curiosity, a tailor thought it was time to act when there were no bids on a three-story building. He started the ball rolling with \$10,000 and that turned out to be the only bid. "It was just a joke," he explained afterward. "I thought the building would fetch several times \$10,000 and I only wanted to get the bidding started. I don't want the building and I don't have the money to pay for it."

A trust company agreed to another sale but the tailor will be liable for the difference if the property brings less than \$10,000.

Outposts Are Strengthened In Manpower

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Scores of fledgling air corps pilots are being sent to Hawaii and the Philippines, it was disclosed today, for duty with the rapidly expanding air fleets based in the Pacific. The latest transfer orders published by the war department show that some 116 second lieutenants who have recently won their wings have been ordered to embark for the Pacific outposts in the next three weeks. The fliers are from Brooks and Kelly fields in Texas, and the advance flying school at Stockton, Calif.

The number of these assignments was regarded as evidence that the air squadrons at Hawaii and the Philippines have been heavily reinforced in the last several months. Some authorities consider it possible that the number of combat craft now at Pacific posts runs into several hundreds. There has been speculation that this expansion was preparatory to relieving substantial units of the

Pacific fleet for duty in the Atlantic. But military experts generally discount this, saying that while aircraft would be capable of taking over some patrol duties from surface vessels they could not offer the threat to a potential enemy fleet which is offered by the powerful naval forces now on Pacific duty.

Rather, the strategy which dictated the creation of strong air squadrons in Hawaii and the Philippines apparently is based on building up a powerful, coordinated striking force of both air and surface craft.

Body Of Dead Man Recovered In Court

CHICAGO — Judge Harry M. Fisher, acting on the petition of Giachino Guzzardo, handed down a legal rarity—a writ of replevin to recover the body of a dead person.

Guzzardo said that his 99-year-old mother died at a relative's home on the south side but the body was taken to a north side undertaker. He asked that it be removed to south side mortuary as a "convenience" to friends and relatives.

PGA Champ's Practice Play Swing Tide

FORT WORTH, June 4 (AP)—Byron Nelson, the likeable P.G.A. champion, is riding a tide of popular favor that appears ready to make him No. 1 choice for the U.S. Open golf championship about the time the first round gets started tomorrow morning.
Everywhere you go, whether you ask player, sideline expert or pure spectator, the name that almost invariably comes to their lips first is that of the lean, thin, blonde pro who came up like a rocket from the caddy pen at Fort Worth's Glen Garden club.
The way Nelson was playing in practice at the Colonial club yesterday, when he and Lawson Little finished all-square with the "old masters," Gene Sarazen and Tommy Armour, he'll give anybody a good run for his money.
On a course where drives have to be hooked, faded or strung out on a trolley wire, Nelson was doing just that. In addition he was smacking his long and short irons with authority.
Not so with Ben Hogan, who started out as co-favorites with Byron in the betting books. Little Ben has been in the money 47 straight times since he missed out in the open at Philadelphia in 1939, and even if off his feed should make it 48 straight here.
But he seems to lack mental assurance. The confidence which, when he's right, amounts almost to a swagger isn't there at the time. Though he hasn't finished worse than a tie for sixth since Jan. 1 by his own calculations he's been in a slump since mid-March, and still hasn't got back to where he hits the ball with the conviction he knows it's going where he wants it to go.
There is, however, another Texas not to be overlooked. That's Ralph Guldahl, who learned the game in Dallas. Big Ralph had an even unhappier time than Hogan on the winter tour (Ben, after all, was top money winner). Guldahl couldn't get his putts to drop and that falling crept on into the rest of his game.
Since then he's trimmed off about 15 pounds, and he's been at Colonial as long as any of the topnotchers, working hard and often in a quiet, Monday, for instance, he shot a 67, three under par, but he wasn't telling even his best friends.

Ickes Appointment Seen As Forestalling US Oil Control

AUSTIN, June 4 (AP)—While the production end of the oil industry admittedly was in healthy condition, distribution and other perplexing problems tinged the future gloomily for some operators today.

A shaft of optimism pierced the picture as member Jerry Sadler of the Texas railroad commission, which regulates the industry in the biggest producing state, expressed the view appointment of Secretary Harold Ickes as oil coordinator eliminated possibility of federal control.

Meanwhile, the Texas senate refused to clear a shadow over production by turning down recent efforts to act on house-approved bills, one of which would amend the law toward curtailing of possible selective crude buying and the other simply extending current statutes two years. The law expires Sept. 1.

Wheat closed unchanged to 3-8 lower compared with yesterday, July 97 7-8 to 3-4, September 99 1-8; corn 1-4 to 1-2 down, July 78 5-8, September 74 3-4; oats unchanged to 1-4 higher. Soybeans finished 1-3 to 1-3 1/2 lower, being weakened by reports of increased plantings in some areas.

Reserve Unit Will Train

SAN ANTONIO, June 4 (AP)—Army officials expect the vanguard of 850 college students to begin arriving today at Camp Bullis, near here, for six weeks of training in the annual reserve officers training camp, it was announced today.

Camp commander will be Col. Cleveland C. Gee, professor of military science and tactics at the Colorado School of Mines. Lieut. Col. E. H. Mitchell, professor of science and tactics at Allen academy, Bryan, Tex., will be camp adjutant, and Lieut. Col. Samuel W. Hite, assistant executive officer for Fort Sam Houston, will be executive officer of the camp.

Lieut. Col. Thomas A. Austin, Jr., professor of military science and tactics for the senior schools in San Antonio, will be plans and training officer.

Texas A. & M. college will send 174 infantry students, 155 field artillery students, 72 for the corps of engineers and 30 signal corps students. New Mexico A. & M. college will send 37 infantry students, Oklahoma A. & M. 88 infantry students and 45 corps of engineers; Allen academy 24 infantry students; Texas Military academy, San Antonio, eight infantry students; Texas Technological college, 35 engineer students; Colorado School of Mines, 95 engineer students, and the University of Oklahoma, 21, students of the ordnance department.

Johnson Gives His Version Of A 'Yes-Man'

Three Texas senatorial candidates converged on Fort Arthur in an appeal for votes last night, while a fourth carried his campaign into West Texas.

Rep. Lyndon Johnson, Attorney General Gerald C. Mann and John C. Williams crossed paths in the Gulf city, while Rep. Martin Dies appeared before a Fort Worth audience.

Johnson, who is generally conceded to be the choice of President Roosevelt, declared that he had been called a "yes man" and admitted the truth of the charge if it meant he would say "yes, President Roosevelt, we must build ships, turn out arms and ammunition."

Speaking at an open-air gathering, Mann reiterated his desire to go to Washington so that he could throw his influence behind mechanization of the army in order that "all the powers on earth combined could never produce an American Dunkirk."

Williams attacked Dies and Johnson for "being away from their Washington posts—if they are so valuable."

Dies told an open-air rally that unless preventive steps were taken immediately, defense industries from coast to coast would be engulfed by a wave of sabotage.

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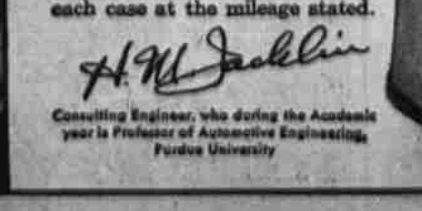
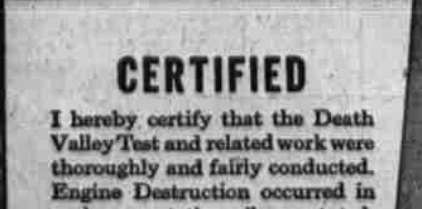
