Cotton Growers Inc. To Meet At Stamford

Washington, D. C. -- Congressman Graham Purcell (D-Texas) announced today that he will address a meeting of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., on Friday afternoon in Stamford, Texas.

Mr. Terry Julian, Executive Director of the organization, said the meeting would be held at 2:00 p. m. in the Stamford High School Auditorium. Julian said, "We sincerely urge all our members to attend, and we will welcome any others who are farmers or involved in agriculture related industries to hear this late report on farm legislation in Washington."

Purcell, who is chairman of the wheat subcommittee of the House Committee on Agriculture, said he would discuss the omnibus farm bill which was approved by the House Committee on Agriculture last week. The bill contains program extensions for cotton, wheat, feed grains, dairy products, and wool, in addition to a new proposed Cropland Adjustment Program.

The Congressman said he believes the proposed legislation is vital to Texas, and that he believes Texas farmers and rural residents need to be aware of the content of the legislation, and aware of the possible consequences if it fails to pass the Congress this year.

"The cotton program proposed in this bill," said Purcell, "involves some new concepts for this important commodity, and cotton producers should learn all they can about it in order to express themselves properly. The programs proposed are four-year programs, and they will be with us for some time to come. I hope those Texans interested in agriculture will take advantage of every opportunity to become more familiar with the legislation."

Abnormal growths or galls are often found on ornamentals and shade trees.

Certain species of insects and mites cause the distinctive deformity which develops on the leaves, twigs or stems of the plant. Immature stages of pests can often be found within developing galls.

Mites, bidges, plant lice, Cynipids (tiny wasps) and jumping plant lice are some of the more important gall-forming pests. It is difficult to outline a complete control program for gall insects since very little is known about their life history.

The insect eggs are laid in the tissues of the leaf, stem or twig usually prior to full development of

the leaves. The jaying and hatching stimulates the plant to form an abnormal growth at the point of attack inside which the immature pests develop. Control of the abnormality cannot be accomplished after it has formed since it contains and protects the pest from insecticidal contact.

Most ornamental plants and shade trees can tolerate galls with no apparent injury but under certain conditions a sufficient number of the insects can damage the plants. Unhealthy trees are more susceptible than those in a vigorous state of growth.

Preventive spray treatments early in the growing season may lessen gall infestations. Applications of DDT plus malathion, beginning with the new growth and continuing at weekly intervals until the leaves are fully developed, will also be of some benefit.

For more information on these ornamental and shade tree pests, ask for L-199, "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Ornamental Plants," available free of charge at

the local Extension office.

Although it is important to use good quality aggregate in making concrete on the farm, its strength depends primarily on the ratio of water to cement.

For example, a ratio of six gallons of water per sack of cement is 20 percent stronger than a ration of seven gallons of water per sack. Proper water-cement ratios are based on required strength, amount of exposure to the elements, and the need for wear resistance.

Floors such as these in milking parlors should be made with a ratio of five gallons of water per sack of cement because the floors are washed often and wear is heavy.

Paved barnyards and driveways should have a ration of six gallons of water per sack of cement. For massive footings under buildings, seven gallons of water per sack of cement is satisfactory because the surfaces are not subject to wear and are generally protected from the elements.

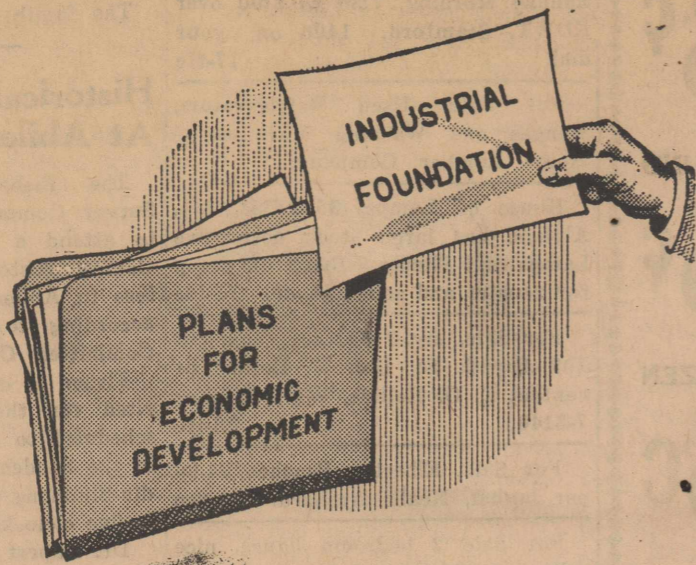

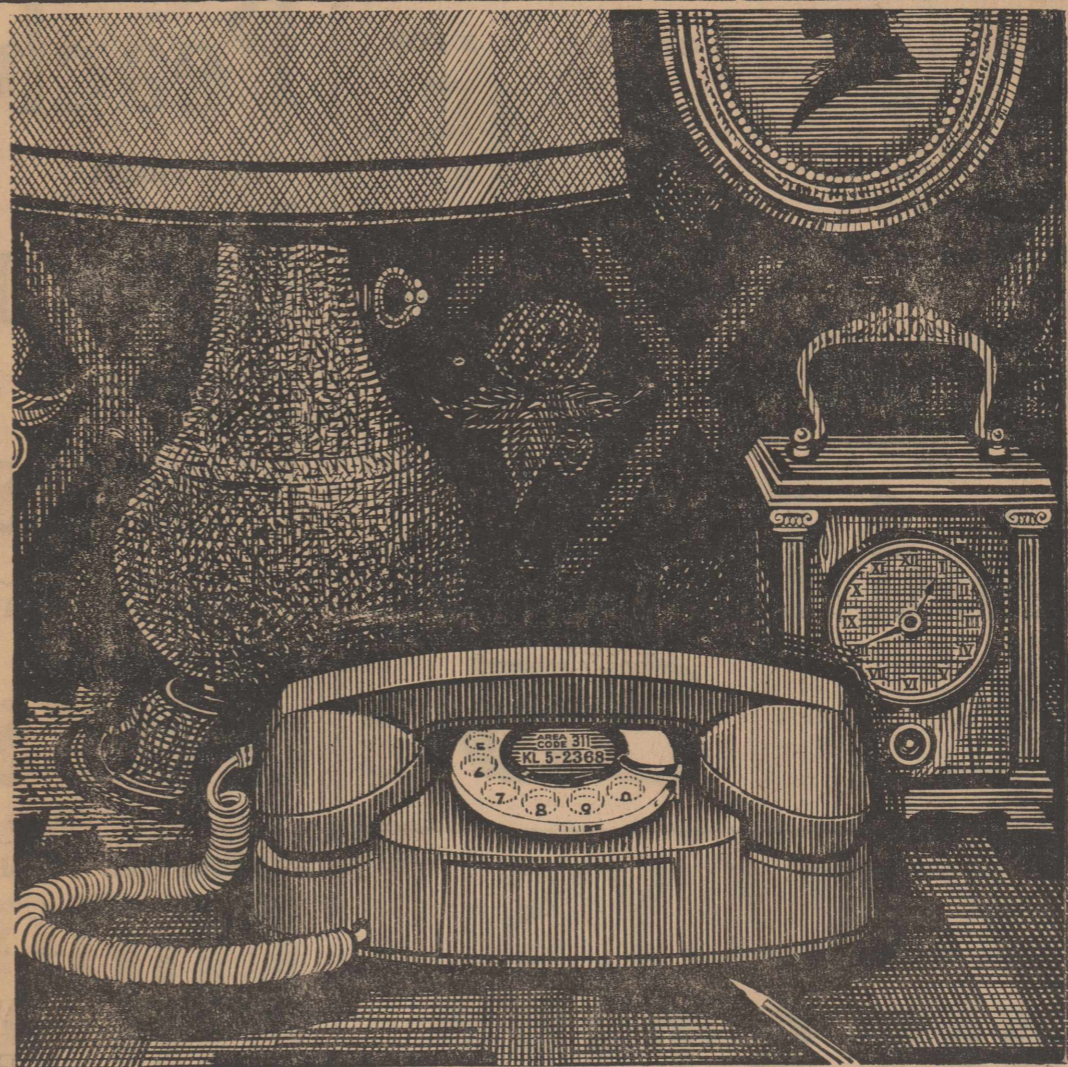

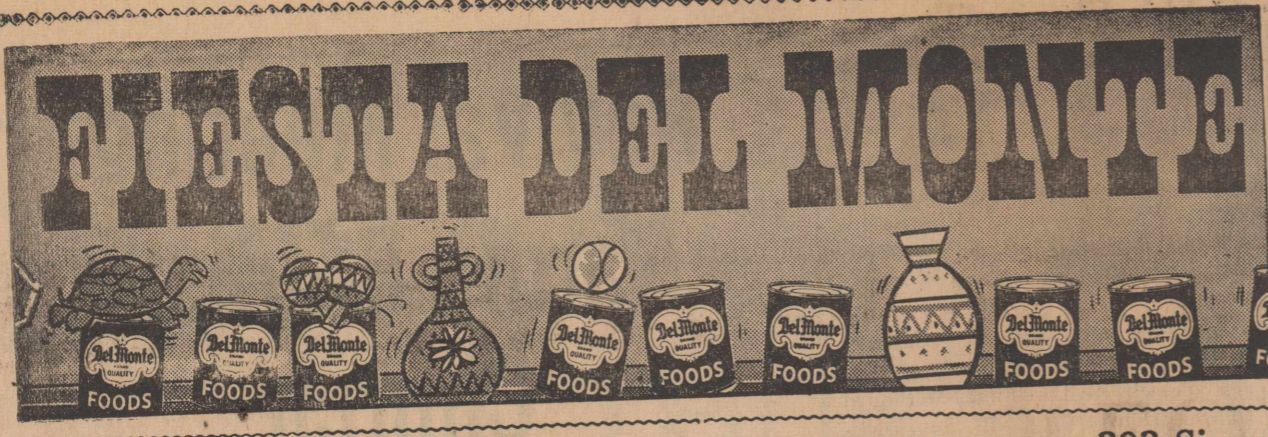

Summer offers its own brand of fun - outdoor recreation, cookouts, get-togethers and the like.

But summer enjoyments, like others, have their hazards or pitfalls.

Take sunning for example. It's practically an all-American sport. For those who participate, a beautiful tan is a status symbol well worth baking for. Too much roasting, however, results in a burn.

Everyone reacts differently to the sun. But, no matter how easily you tan, follow the rules for even baking.

First, take it easy. Ten minutes on a side is enough for the first day. Increase the time by about five minutes on each successive day. And, don't be fooled by a cloudy or hazy sky. You can burn on cloudy days, too.

Be choosy about where you sun. If you are near reflections from aluminum, water or sand, the sun's rays are intensified.

Keep your defenses up while you sun. Suntan creams and lotions contain chemical sunscreens which help prevent sunburn by absorbing ultraviolet rays. One coat of lotion is not enough for a day at the beach. Apply it as directed after each swim and whenever it seems to have rubbed off. Since eyes and hair need protection, too, wear dark glasses and don a hat.

And, don't forget that continual exposure ages skin prematurely. Year-round exposure or excessive summer tanning can cause a permanent leathery look. The correlation between continual exposure and skin cancer indicates additional danger.

The back yard barbecue is another traditional part of summer fun. But barbecuers would do well to restrict all cooking over charcoal

State Draft Quota Is Announced

Austin, Texas, July 20 -- The state draft quota for August calls for 891 men, compared to 908 for July, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Tuesday.

The state quota of 891 for August is the Texas share of a national call for 16,500 men, all of the Army.

The state Selective Service director also announced pre-induction physical and mental examinations for around 5,000 men in August.

Local board quotas for the August call already have been figured and sent to the state's 137 local boards.

The August quota will be filled mostly with men who are volunteers under 26 years old and nonvolunteers ages 19 through 25. Most of them will be 21 years old.

No man whose draft board file reflects that he is maintaining a bona fied family relationship with a wife or a child or children will be selected in response to this call.

All males are required to register under the draft law on their 18th birthday or within five days thereafter.

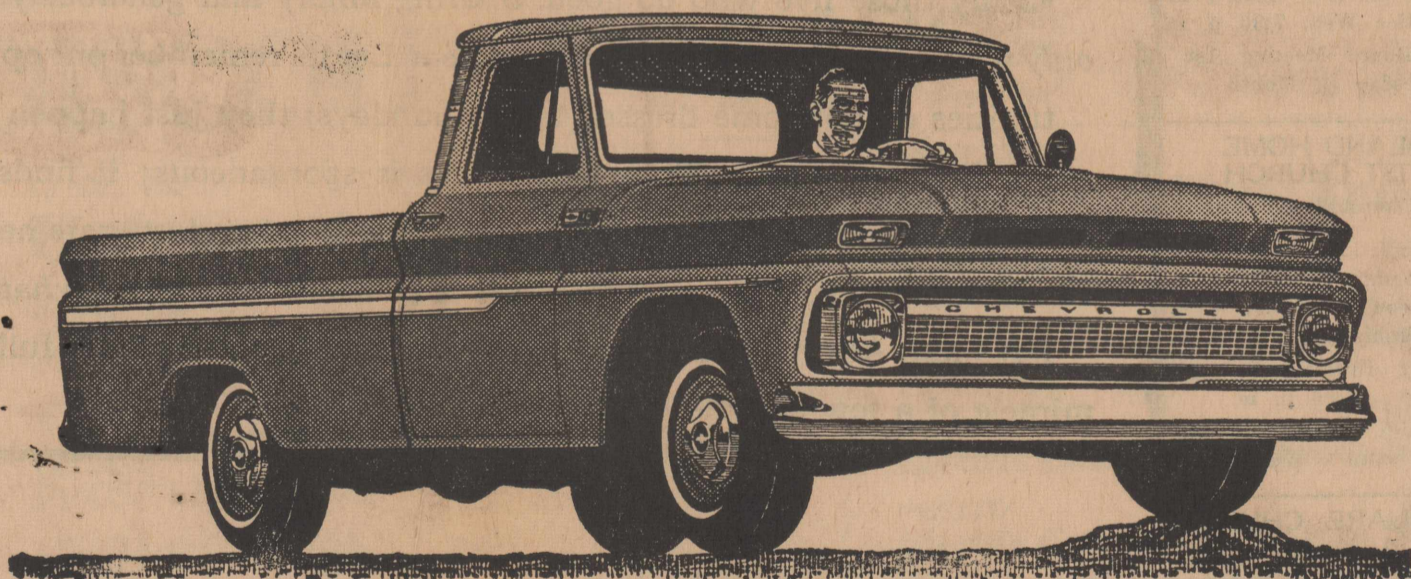

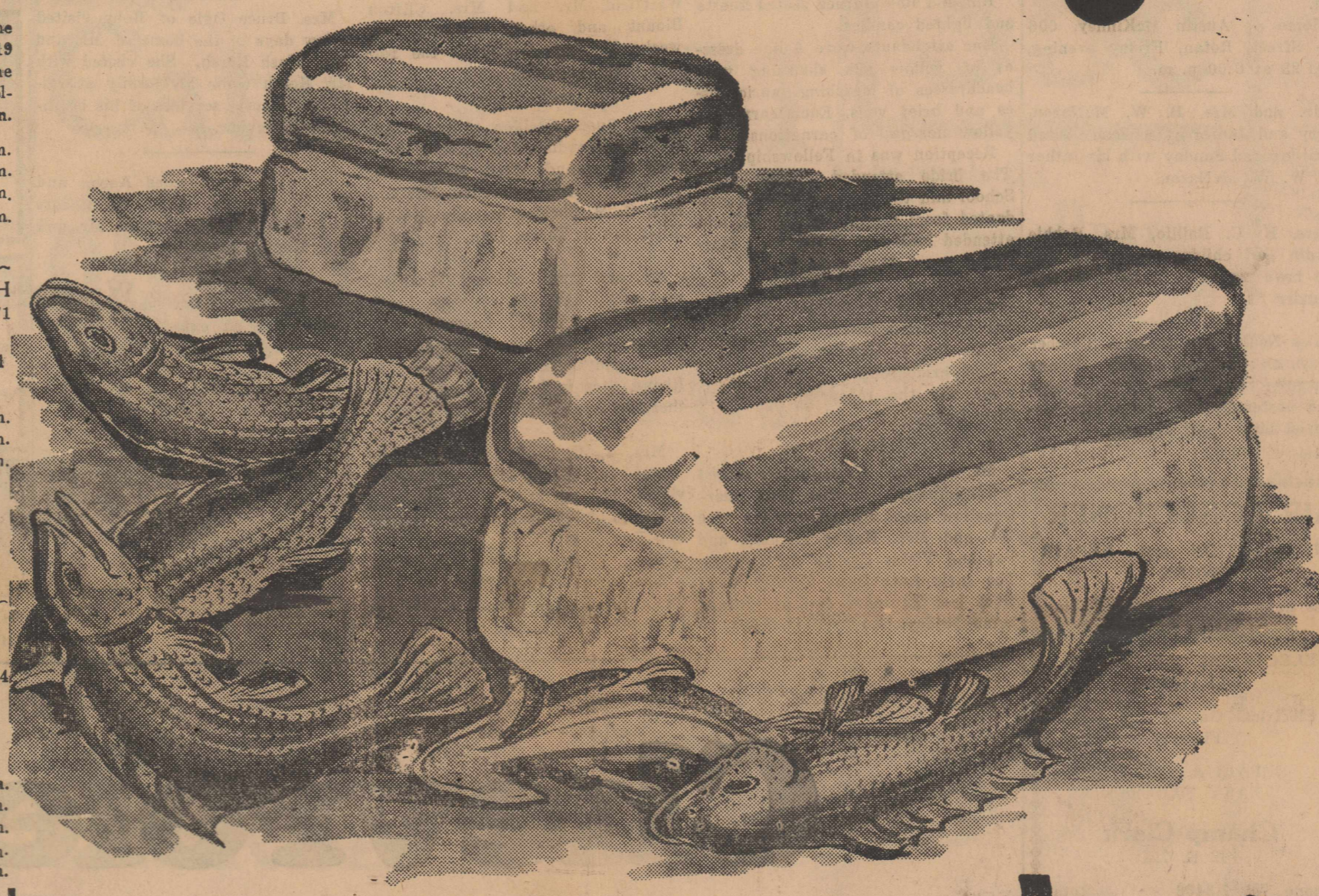
