Dr. Johnson To Head Round-Up

Dr. Bruce Johnson of Loraine has been appointed area chairman of the 1967 Cattleman's Round-Up for Crippled Children.

The announcement was made by Charlie Morris of Abilene, general chairman of the Round-Up, the chief means of support for the West Texas Rehabilitation Center. Several persons from this area receive free treatment at the WTRC, which has accepted neither state or federal funds during its nearly 14 years of operation.

The area chairmen, supporters of the Round-Up for many years, act as the chief link between the Round-Up and the ranchers in their area. Throughout the years, WTRC has received valuable support from generous area ranchers who have cut out a head or two of cattle - or other livestock - and donated them to the WTRC for sale at the annual Round-Up. This year, the Round-Up will be conducted September 25th at Ranchers and Farmers Livestock Auction in Abilene.

During each of the last two years, the Round-Up has raised nearly \$80,000 toward the Center's annual budget of \$260,000. Other operational funds come from memorial contributions and from various United Funds.

The Center provides free treatment, without regard for race, creed, color or financial circumstances, to more than 1,600 patients from far-flung areas.

"We have the WTRC at our disposal only because we cattlemen care," Morris said in emphasizing the need for an especially good Round-Up this year. "The cattlemen of West Texas haven't let us down yet, and we don't expect them to this year."

Any livestock donated to the Round-Up will be transported free of charge to the Abilene auction site, the chairman added. Anyone wishing to donate livestock to the sale should contact his area chairman or the WTRC in Abilene, Morris said.

Byron Mote, accompanied by his mother, Mrs. Robert Mote went to Houston where Byron entered the Methodist Hospital Monday, to have heart catheterization to determine if open heart surgery will follow.

More Than 250 Register at Baptist Diamond Anniversary Sunday

Sunday was a day to be remembered by the Baptists of Loraine. It was a day long planned to celebrate their 75th anniversary. Sam Bond, age 91, the only person known to have been at the brush arbor revival when the Baptist first organized, was present Sunday. He wrote his name on the Guest Register, along with more than 250 others. They came from 14 Texas towns, Long Beach, Calif., Bloomington, Ill., and Rogers, N. M. for the day's activities.

Each family received a copy of the eight page brochure. It carried pictures of the speakers, along with the day's program, and pictures of the two church buildings, the steeple bell mounted on a frame, and the one-room school.

The name, Loraine, was placed on a map put out by the T&P Railroad in 1881. A post-office was established in 1891 in a box car depot. No town lots were sold until 15 years later. The first Baptist church was a rural church.

In her summary of the church history Sunday morning, Mrs. Hal Bennett said that seven churches were started in nearby communities, in the early 1900's. Loraine's church, being in a railroad town and on Highway 80, survived all the other seven churches and drew members from each of them.

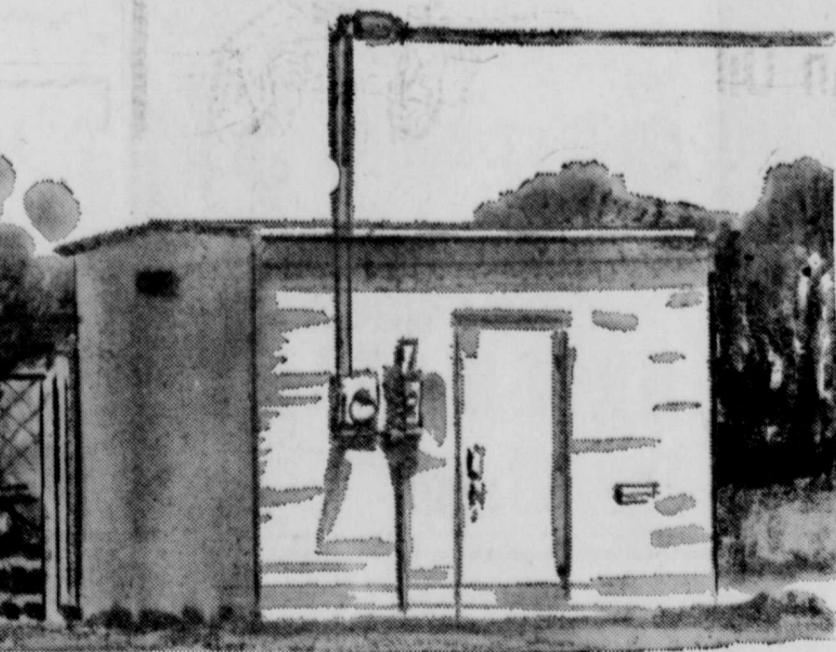

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section 13 thereto to read as follows:

"Section 13. Notwithstanding any other section of this article, the Legislature in providing for the creation, establishment, maintenance, and operation of a hospital district, shall not be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services or mental retardation services including the operation of any community mental health centers, community mental health and mental retardation centers which may exist or be thereafter established within the boundaries of such district, nor shall the Legislature be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility of public health department units and clinics and related public health activities or services, and the Legislature shall not be required to restrict the power of any municipality or political subdivision to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations or to expend public moneys for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities or services or the operation of such community mental health or mental retardation centers within the boundaries of the hospital districts; and unless a statute creating a hospital district shall expressly prohibit participation by any entity

other than the hospital district in the establishment, maintenance, or support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities within or partly within the boundaries of any hospital district, any municipality or any other political subdivision or state-supported entity within the hospital district may participate in the establishment, maintenance, and support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units and clinics and related public health activities and may levy taxes, issue bonds or other obligations, and expend public moneys for such purposes as provided by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."
