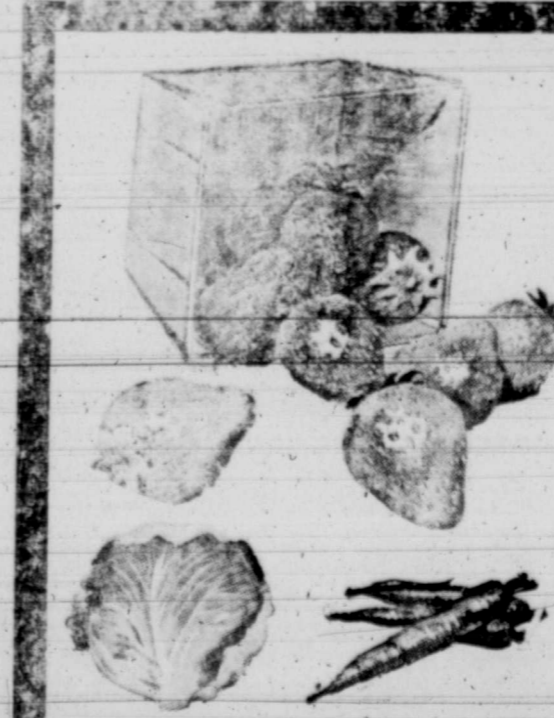

Phamphlet In Spanish For Military Mailing

The Post Office Department is publishing this week a Spanish edition of its new military mail pamphlet for helping families pick the best possible service for sending letters, packages, and other mail to the servicemen and women stationed overseas. Representative Omar Buleson has announced.

ry mail services is PAL. Package up to 30 pounds in weight and 60 inches in combined length and girth may receive airtel service from a U.S. city through the overseas base on a space available basis. The family sending a 10-lb. parcel from Anson to Vietnam, for example, will only pay \$2.75 on a package marked "PAL" while the air-parcel post rate for the same package is \$6.59.

On parcels weighing under 5 pounds, it might be more advantageous for a family to use the older SAM service, and with packages less than 2 pounds, air parcel post is often the patron's "best buy," the pamphlet suggests.

When we are identified to death in the resurrection of the life of Christ, Paul and receive his message of hope and victory in the 15th chapter of 1 Corinthians.

Dr. William Barclay in speaking of Paul says: "We are saved by hope." The one blazing truth that lit life for Paul was the tremendous fact that the human situation is not a hopeless situation. Paul was not pessimist. H. G. Wells once said "Man, who began in a cave behind a windbreak, will end in the dense soaked ruin of a slum." Not so Paul. He saw man's sin; he saw the state of the world and the state of the human situation, but he also saw God's redeeming power, and the end of it all for Paul was hope. And because of that, to Paul life was not a despairing waiting for an inevitable end in a world encompassed by sin and death and decay life was an eager anticipation of a liberation, a renovation, and a recreation wrought by the glory and the power of God. Paul describes the attitude of a man who scans the horizon and with head thrust forward eagerly searches for the dawn of a new day.

C.L. Wilson Buried Here

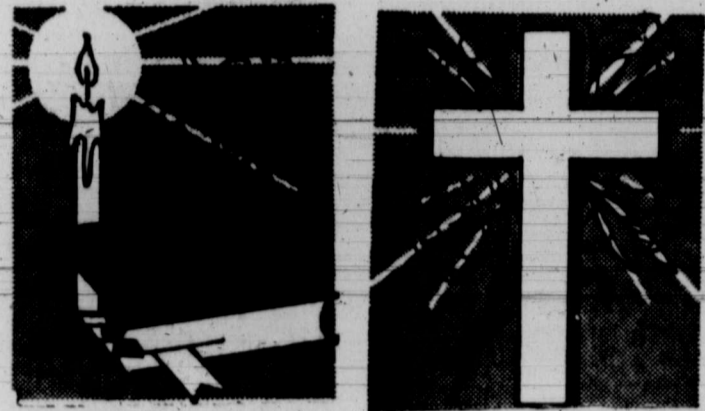
Clyde L. Wilson, former Colorado City resident and brother of Arthur C. Wilson 1927 Hemphill St., died at his home March 28, after a long illness.

Davall did not know the boys' clothing had been a fire. But heat or fumes had penetrated so completely, burns resulted on their bodies in some places under clothing without even scorching the material.

Seconds after the boys left the pickup and walked into the hospital emergency room, they were being treated.

Fire Marshal Eaton told the Record that investigation had not been completed into cause of the explosion. His investigation will not be completed until a full report from Lone Star Gas Company, he said.

His inspection of the cellar revealed burned spots on a mattress, only meager signs remaining in wake of the flash explosion.

"Some kind of gas vaporized," Eaton reported, "but there was no odor the next morning."

"There was an empty fruit jar in the cellar. There was no odor that indicated it had contained anything."

Spokesman for Lone Star Gas told the Record the gas company was investigating its gas lines in the vicinity, but that this investigation had not been completed.

Fire Marshal Eaton said he was informed by the gas company that gas was cut off between meter in the alley and the house when the accident happened.

Neighbors reported Saturday that gas company crews had worked in the area since the explosion, that digging had been carried out at gas lines and a meter removed.

not play baseball." McMath said, "should be based upon what would be best for our students, the school program and the athletic program."

A recent check of students revealed more than 60 interested in the sport for next season.

McMath said, though, as pointed out earlier to the board by Coach Nix, that the number of boys actually playing in competition would be small in comparison to the overall group.

"These are the students who perform exceptionally well in all sports activities," the superintendent said, "if the baseball program is initiated, then this elite group of athletes would be split between the two sports (track and baseball), which could result in our not being able to field a real competitive team in either of those activities."

"This does not mean that the student who is not an excellent athlete does not benefit from the athletic program, for he does in many ways and he does make a definite contribution."

But, the superintendent added, there is a limit to how far a small student body can be extended.

"This is experienced in our academic and vocational programs of courses that we would like to offer."
