

# Phone Restriction Likely Because Of Line Tie-Up

Unless the intense popularity of the new campus phone system wanes sometime within the next week, dormitory residents may find themselves without their phones for a couple more hours each day.

Everyone likes the new phones, all right, and everyone is using them—everyone except the administration.

The key hours involved are just before noon and just before supper, according to D. M. McElroy, assistant comptroller. Those are the times most students are in the residence halls and, accordingly, the times when most calls are made.

AND ALTHOUGH most of the calls are to some other phone on campus, McElroy told the TOREADOR Friday the off-campus calls were the ones which are placing the administration in its present dilemma.

"We have 90 outside lines to service the entire campus," he said, "and any time all 90 lines are in use, either incoming or outgoing, the only thing you'll get when you dial '9' for an outside is a busy signal."

This has been the case almost every day in the past week. Affected most is the teacher who is calling home to see if he needs to buy a loaf of bread for lunch or supper or the wife who calls her teacher-husband to see if he is ready for her to pick him up.

RARE BUT more serious calls are also involved in the "Operation Tie-up." Several Tech professors

are engaged in research activities with professors of universities in other time zones, such as Mountain and Pacific Standard times. To offset the time difference, long distance calls from Tech must be placed later in the afternoon when students are also taking advantage of their phones to call off-campus.

According to McElroy, the only solution to this seems to be a restriction upon dormitory phones during the rush hours. Calls during this time would be handled in the same manner as those which come between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m., the usual hours of restriction.

"WHAT I AM hoping is that in the next few days the novelty of this new system will wear off," McElroy added. "These are the only hours that we have trouble, and if we can have the help of the students in this we won't have to restrict their phones. If we slow down on outgoing calls in this rush period, we will be all right."

To illustrate the large number of calls that have been made, McElroy told of one day last week when 6,346 calls to the campus were made in an eight-hour period. The incoming calls generally are about one-third of all calls made.

ACCORDING to figures he received from Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., the average number of calls on phones throughout the nation is about one and one-half per day. At this average, Tech should handle approximately 4,300 calls per day.

**DIRECTORIES GIVING** name, address, home town and phone number of all students of Texas Tech will be out sometime next week. There will be plenty of happy students because of this, but even more joyous will be the 12 college switchboard operators who have been swamped with calls from students wanting the number of a particular person on campus.

"That is simply running them crazy," McElroy said. "The girls are really frustrated from having requests for numbers. They are so busy handling the great number of calls that they don't have the extra time to look up the numbers."

At present there are 2,862 phones, not counting extensions, on campus. They have been divided into 29 different groups of approximately 100 phones each.

AT ANY ONE time seven phones of a particular group are in use, no calls can be made to another phone in that group. In an instance such as this, the caller will hear a rapid, staccato-like busy signal, unlike the slow, steady busy signal given when the phone is in use.

The groups are composed of phones spread over different parts of the campus to keep down the possibility of one group being tied up. The only difficulty that has been experienced so far in this respect is that from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m., calls to women's dormitories are so frequent they tie up the line anyway.

# Mortar Board To Host Convention

Tech Mortar Board members will host a sectional convention of Mortar Board from three states Friday.

Mortar Board chapters from the University of Texas, Southern Methodist University, Oklahoma University, Oklahoma State, Uni-

versity of Tulsa, and the University of New Mexico will come to Texas Tech. Presidents and members of the chapters will represent their schools.

"To Go Beyond" will be the theme of the convention. Jacqueline

Stern, a former administration employee at Tech and present dean of women at the University of Arkansas, will be the keynote speaker. Tech graduate Mrs. Catherine A. Evans, new sectional director from Fort Worth, will also speak.

Mortar Board chapters and representatives in this section and the former Mortar Board sponsors at Tech will attend. After the speeches and during the weekend the Mortar Boards will break up into discussion groups.

Guests will be taken on a tour of the campus by last year's President's Hostesses, Kathy Gordon will be in charge of the tour.

Each chapter will present a dis-

play telling about its activities on its own campus. Tech's display will be a silhouette of a Mortar Board member called "A Year with Mortar Board." It will show the tapping of junior members and different events that Mortar Board partakes in during the year.

During the convention the "Mortar Song" will be played from the towers in the Administration Bldg.

The school song is usually played only during the time Mortar Board taps for new members.

The Texas Tech chapter of Mortar Board volunteered last year to host this year's sectional meeting for Mortar Board members. The convention usually meets every other year. Last time the convention was at Texas Christian University.

# Tech Retains Place As Second Largest

As final registration figures for the fall semester began rolling in, it appeared that Tech was still the second largest state-supported college in Texas.

The final registration figure, released Thursday afternoon from the office of the registrar, Dr. Floyd D. Boze, revealed that 11,181 students are enrolled at Texas Tech this fall.

This places Tech second only to the University of Texas in total enrollment. The projected figure for UT was estimated to reach 21,400.

Tech's new total of 11,181 is an increase of about nine per cent over last year's 10,212 figure.

This semester's record enroll-

ment shows the men of Tech are in a definite majority. Male students numbered 7,354, while the women could only muster 3,827 members for their ranks.

The population in the School of Arts and Sciences more than doubled its closest competitor. Thursday's final total for that school was 4,624, a figure greater than the total enrollment of eight state-supported colleges in Texas.

The School of Business Administration was a distant second with 2,208, and is closely followed by the School of Engineering, which boasted 2,110 students. These three schools are followed by: Agriculture, 901; Graduate School, 756; and Home Economics, 582.

# Trustees Given New Warning

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — The University of Mississippi has not been suspended from membership in the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools but the trustees and Gov. Ross Barnett were warned such action might be forthcoming.

Dr. Henry King Stanford, chairman of the southern regional accreditation group, said Tuesday the warning was sent after the executive council of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools commission on colleges met in Atlanta Friday.

"We believed a warning would be in order because the Ole Miss board seemed unable to control its own policies," an official said.

One of the conditions of association membership is that a university board of trustees must be free from political control. The council believes that on one occasion the board surrendered its authority and on another was prevented from exercising it.

## Student Union Offers Pool Lessons To Girls

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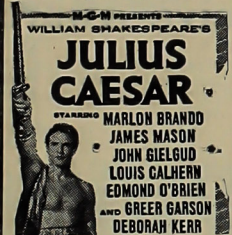
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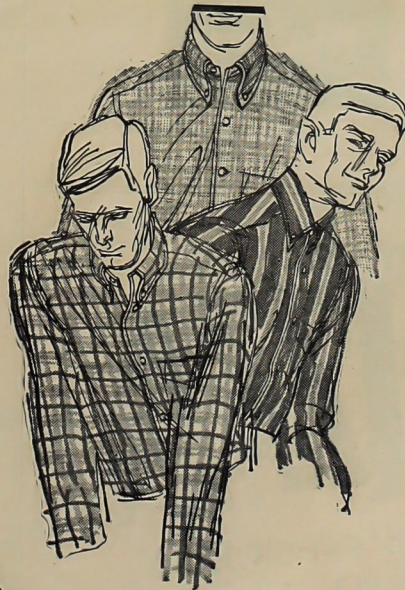
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## Dr. Blaisdell Cites Changes In Communist Philosophy

"Bureaucratic industrialism and incipient democracy from below are the tendencies that seem to be manifesting themselves in Communist Russia; and, if we are patient enough, may gradually win out," Dr. L. L. Blaisdell said last night in a speech sponsored by the Tech Union Ideas and Issues Committee.

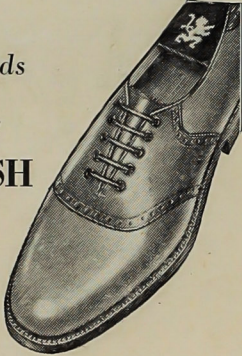
In his speech on "Changes In Communist Philosophy," the Tech associate professor of history suggested that there are other tendencies toward Russian leaders continuing their goal for a Communist world Utopia."

"Communism began as one thing in the time of Lenin, but it soon became something else; and for that matter, there are evidences of changes in the writings of the intellectual father himself, Karl Marx," Dr. Blaisdell said.

This situation, at the time of Stalin's death in 1953, presented a dangerous period in Russian history. The leaders were concerned about the possibility of a rebellion. Khrushchev, frightened of rebellion, lightened the suffering of the people, pointed out Dr. Blaisdell in his talk.

The award is presented to students who rank in the upper one-half of their academic class in college. They also must rank in the upper one-third of their AFROTC class and they must rank in the upper one-half of their training unit.

"For a man to accomplish all three," according to Captain Williams of the department of air science, "is very difficult."

Upon reception of this award, the Distinguished AFROTC student is eligible to accept a regular com-

mission in the Air Force, if he maintains his academic standing and graduates as a distinguished graduate.

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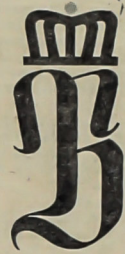
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# Council Bares Ballot

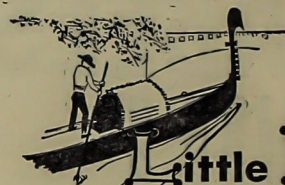

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# Ford, Yankees Throttle Giants, 6-2

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Steady Whitey Ford rose to the occasion once again Thursday, settling down after a shaky start, and won his 10th World Series game for the New York Yankees with a 6-2 decision over the weary San Francisco Giants in the series opener at Candlestick Park.

The stocky 33-year-old left-hander, who has won more series games than any other pitcher, saw his scoreless streak broken after 33 2-3

innings but calmly set down the Giants while scattering 10 hits along the way.

Only Willie Mays, his tormentor in All-Star games, and Jose Pagan gave Ford trouble consistently. Each collected three singles.

The American League champions, who have won 19 of 26 previous series, went about this in methodical fashion against the Giants, who Wednesday finished a wild best-of-three playoff with

the Los Angeles Dodgers for the National League pennant.

Clete Boyer, the fielding member of the baseball family from Missouri, contributed the big hit, a 365-foot home run off loser Billy O'Dell that snapped a 2-2 tie in the seventh.

Not content with that slender margin, the Yanks kept snapping and snarling away at O'Dell, Don Larsen, and Stu Miller until they had stretched their lead to four runs.

The crowd of 43,852 seemed unusually quiet for a city seeing its first World Series game. Apparently they had celebrated so long into the wee small hours after Wednesday's victory in Los Angeles that they were all worn out.

A light breeze that blew up ruffled Ford's blouse and pantaloons as he came down the stretch for a strong finish. It was his seventh complete series game and his 18th series appearance in all.

Roger Maris, the 61-homer hero of 1961, but a .256 batter this season, gave the Giants a quick taste of Yankee power with a long blast to the right field fence in the first. Bobby Richardson and Tom Tresh had singled before Maris laced the ball to the fence. Felipe Alou jumped high into the air and managed to keep the ball from going over the barrier for a homer but couldn't hold it. It bounced away for a two-run double.

The Giants scrambled back with a run in the second on Mays' first single, another single by Jim Davenport and a beautifully-placed drag bunt by Pagan that got Mays home from third.

Ford knew he was in for trouble when the Giants lit into him again in the third. With one out, Chuck

# Reds Tip Whites, 34-32

Trailing 25-13 early in the fourth quarter, the Reds stormed back to score 21 points in 13 minutes to squeak by the Whites in the yearly freshman football intra-squad game, 34-32.

Red quarterback Danny Scarborough, a standout all evening, scored on a 25-yard end sweep with 1:16 left to put the Scarlet ahead to stay. Big gainer in the series which began on the Reds' own 23 yardline was a 19-yard pass from Scarborough to halfback Johnny Agan.

A six-yard plunge by White halfback Bill Deacon just 50 seconds before the winning Red TD had put the Whites ahead 32-27. Spark-plug of that drive was quarterback Tom Wilson, who pitched a 19 yard pass to end Rocky Hill to set up the tally.

Prior to the White go-ahead score, the Reds led briefly when quarterback Dich Carmichael plunged 4 yards for a TD with 4:33 left. Big gainer on the drive was a 20-yard pass to halfback Robert Yancer from Carmichael.

Early in the fourth quarter, the Whites scored on a 37-yard pass from quarterback Ben Elledge to end Jerry Shipley. The tally gave them a commanding 25-13 lead, which seemed destined not to be overcome. Then after the kick-off Red quarterback Scarborough faked beautifully and sped around end for a 26-yard gain. The romp seemed to ignite the Red offense and four plays later halfback Hal

Hudson scrambled from the 14 for the score. The extra point by Phil Brown was good and the Whites led only by 5 points. Carmichael then scored his TD to put the Red ahead.

White halfback Billy Weise, a converted quarterback from Austin High in Austin, scored 2 touchdowns in the first quarter to lead the Whites to a 19-13 halftime

lead. The Whites other TD came on a 49 - yard run by QB Elledge on the first offensive series of the game. Red first tallies came on Carlos Klaerner's 1-yard blast late in the first quarter, and Scarborough scored on a 4-yard sweep.

Leading rusher was Scarborough with 108 yards on 11 carries. Second high went to Elledge, with 51 yards on 3 carries.

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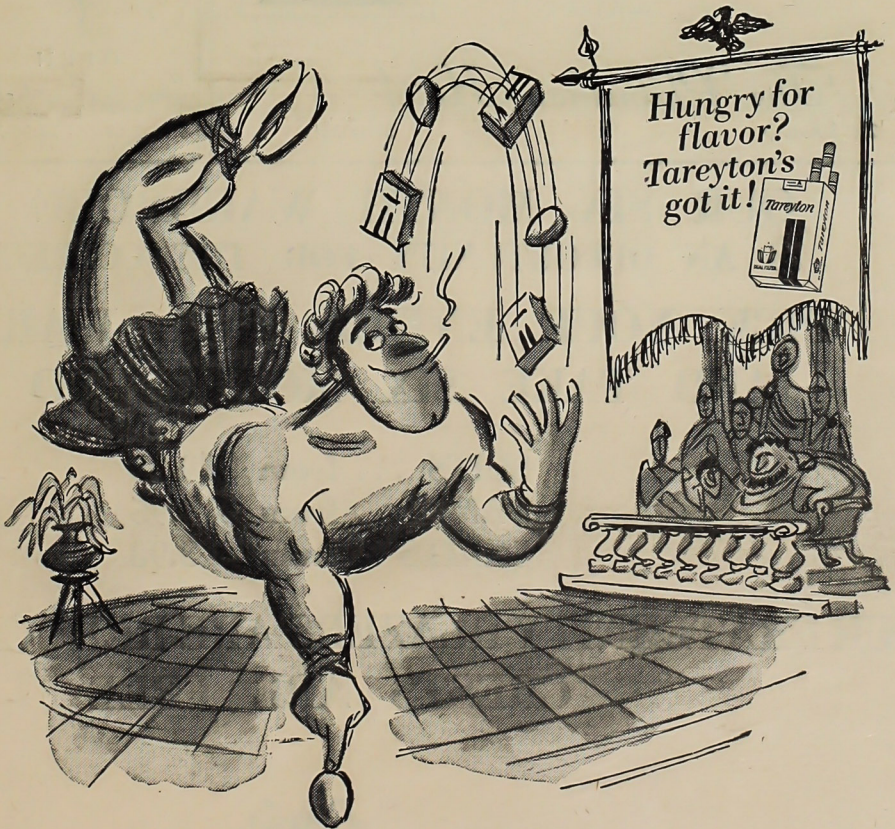

O'Dell stayed in because the Yanks had a left-handed batter coming up next in Dale Long, who had replaced Bill Skowron. But Long singled, scoring Maris.

Don Larsen, the Yanks' perfect game pitcher of the 1956 series, came in to face his old mates under series conditions for the first time. Boyer lifted a fly to short left on which shortstop Pagan collided with Harvey Kuenn. Pagan held the ball but was

knocked off balance. His throw to the plate, trying to get the slow-moving Howard, came in on a bounce and catcher Ed Bailey couldn't handle it. Howard scored on the sacrifice fly.

Still hungry for more runs with Ford always a question mark in the late innings, the Yanks picked up a sixth run in the ninth. After Tresh singled with one out, Dark called in Stu Miller to replace Larsen. Mickey Mantle, who went hitless, fled out but Maris walked after Tresh stole second, and Howard singled to right, scoring Tresh.

Manager Ralph Houk of the Yanks named Ralph Terry, a 26-year-old right-hander with a 23-12 record in regular season, to pitch Friday's second game here. Jack Sanford (24-7) will pitch for the Giants.

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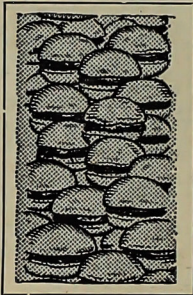
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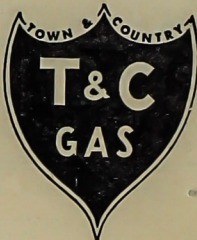
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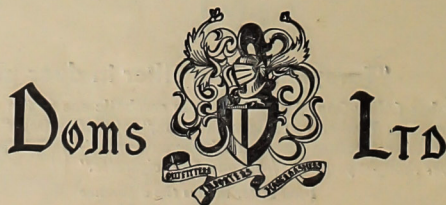
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
