"Employ The Handicapped" Week Proclaimed

October 2-8 has been proclaimed as "National Employ the Handicapped Week" by Governor John Connally, who calls upon Texas employers to consider the handicapped for employment and promotion consistent with their capacities. Jack Lynch, local head of the Texas Employment Commission, asserts that presently there are ten handicapped available from the local office who are seeking employment. Any employer who may be able to use a handicapped person may contact the office for details and abilities of various persons. There seems to be no indication that Littlefield will have a United Fund drive this year. In fact, some of the organizations that ordinarily are included in the UF effort, are already preparing their separate fund drives. We still think the united way is the best way but, in the absence of community interest, we cannot blame these organizations for preparing to go it alone.

Water Depletion Tax Deductions Being Felt

Farmers, within the range of the thirteen counties encompassed by the High Plains Underwater Conservation District No. 1, are using the opportunity to apply for water depletion tax deductions through Internal Revenue forms.

Some farmers have already received such checks for previous years. When the full force of these applications and refunds will be fully felt in the Plains area, a boost of six to eight million dollars into the area's economy will be felt.

Marvin Schubert, a Floyd County farmer, backed by the High Plains Underwater Conservation District, used his farm as the test case for the historic decision that depletion of the irrigation water table was a tax deductible item. He has now received three checks totalling, \$3,661.30 as income tax refunds for irrigation water depletion for the years 1962, 1963, and 1964 on his 480 acre farm.

In order for a farmer to qualify for such a possible refund,

he must fill out Form 665. These forms are available at the local High Plains Underwater Conservation District Office at 620 Hall Ave. or at the Internal Revenue Office at the VA Building in Lubbock.

The farmer will apply now for the years '63, '64, '65. The Water District and IRS have developed guidelines for the computation of deduction allowances based on the following factors, which the farmer must be able to verify: (1) Average thickness of the Ogallala formation under the land at the time he bought it, (2) Average decline of the water table each year in which depletion is claimed, and (3) The owner's investment in the water at the time he acquired the land.

Knowing the complexity of many government forms, farmers may wish to seek professional services in completing these forms, but any "do-it-yourself" minded person is certainly invited to apply.

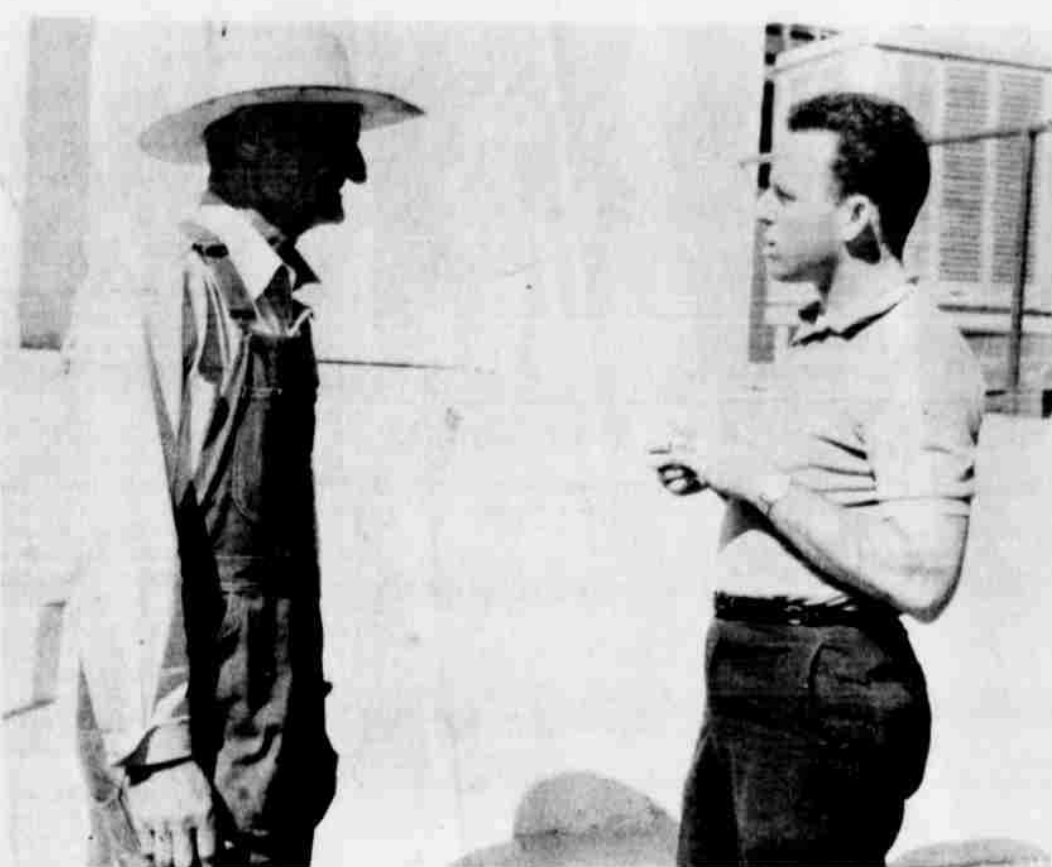

Seven "Peace" Essays Already Submitted

Seven contestants have already taken application forms and are working on their essays in the International Lions Peace Essay Contest. Being sponsored by the Lions as their major project this year and part of next, Doyle Patton, local Contest Manager announced. He has three entry forms left which any interested person may pick up at his office at the Security State Bank.

The contestant must be between 14 and 21, inclusive. Each applicant is limited to one entry which must be written without an adult's help.

The Littlefield Lions Club is offering a prize of \$15 and an award certificate for the winner here, Doyle states. This winner will be entered into wider competition, and has an opportunity to advance up the ladder to either a \$1,000 regional prize or the first prize of \$25,000.

Three local judges will be appointed. Deadline for entries here will be December 10.

Punt-Pass-Kick Competition Slated For Saturday

Over one hundred entries are expected in the Annual Punt, Pass, and Kick Competition this Saturday, Oct. 8, at the Junior High Practice Field. Boys from ages 8 thru 13 will compete against other boys their own age in the three football skills - punting, passing, and place-kicking from a kicking tee.

Points are awarded for each foot the ball travels in the air. Points are deducted for each foot the ball lands to the left or right of a center line.

If a boy reaches fourteen before Jan. 8, 1967, he is not eligible nor are boys who are on their junior high teams. Fur-

ther, boys who are in the ninth grade, but in a senior high school are not eligible.

First, second, and third place winners of each local competition will receive meticulously crafted Medal of Achievement awards on plush velvet ribbons. Some of the winners have an opportunity to advance to zone competition at Dallas and those surviving Dallas have the opportunity to go to Washington D.C. and Miami to attend the annual NFL Play-Off game in the Orange Bowl.

Locally the Littlefield Optimist Club co-sponsors the competition with Mitchell Ford, Inc. Entry blanks are available until Friday night at Mitchell Ford.

Chamber Adopts New Method Of Seeking Manager

Joe Montgomery, Chairman of the Chamber of Commerce Screening Committee, reported today that his committee, in seeking a new executive vice-president for the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce, had adopted a new policy in this search.

Montgomery stated that his committee had sifted through numerous applications for this job and none seemed to be exactly the person needed for the Littlefield Chamber. After several weeks of this type experience, the chairman said the committee had decided to seek out actively, persons they would like to apply for the job. In this manner, only those known to be qualified and suited for the position would be considered.

Several people are now under consideration for the vacancy created when former Executive Vice-President Leon Slaughter accepted a similar position at Sweetwater.

By adopting this new method of screening, Chairman Montgomery said he hoped that the search would be successfully ended in a short time.

A homeless person CAN find a bed for the night in Littlefield. A hungry person can find a meal. A person in need of clothes or shoes can find help.

He does not need to beg - or knock endlessly at doors - or lose his self-respect.

Why? Because help is always available - day or night - at Littlefield's headquarters of the Salvation Army located near the heart of downtown.

Without seeking to replace the individual's or church's role and privilege in helping the needy, the Salvation Army has nevertheless played a major role in serving the needs of oftentimes desperate people.

In 1965 alone, the center handled 1,001 homeless and transient cases. This figure could be deceiving unless one realizes that 377 lodgings were given for overnight stays, 901 meals were served, 3,797 garments given and 619 pairs of shoes fitted.

Total cost to accomplish this came to \$10,571.41 of which \$5,200.00 came from Salvation Army headquarters.

This then means that Littlefield citizens who love this work and have caught its vision contributed \$5,371.41.

In 1966, \$6,563.37 has already been spent.

When people come for help, actual cash money is never given. If a worthy need is established, the needy person receives the help they need in whatever form it is needed, whether it be a bed for the night or clothes or some other item in the home.

Cold statistics can never reveal the joy and happiness brought to each worthy recipient.

Neither can one realize the many severe handicaps under which much of this work is done. A vexing sewer problem often forces water into the basement, sometimes invading the Lieutenant's study. The shower room, with half the plaster gone, is situated right next to Sunday School rooms. The Board of Directors is considering including these needs for their future requests for funds in a drive this fall.

For those who have no spiritual home or church base, the Salvation Army also provides many spiritual services for the community. Lt. Harvey Harwell conducts two worship services on Sunday and leads a Wednesday evening prayer meeting. A Sunday School is conducted with upwards of 35 children attending. Youth services and activities, marital counseling, together with other religious gatherings round out a busy schedule.

The Board of Directors have now set a definite date for the drive this year with the Kick-Off Dinner on November 3. Colonel Thrumburgh, head of Salvation Army work in Texas and Louisiana will be present at that time to lend inspiration and information to the workers to conduct the most effective campaign possible. The amount to be sought is not yet fixed as the cost for physical improvements has not yet been determined.

1 lb. ground beef
garlic salt (to taste)
1 can tomatoes
18 oz. can tomato sauce
1 1/2 teaspoon oregano
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon thyme
1 bay leaf
1 cup water

Cook onion in hot oil until golden. Add meat and garlic salt and brown lightly.

Add remaining ingredients; simmer uncovered 2 to 2 1/2 hours. Remove bay leaf before serving.

PECAN SQUARES
2 eggs
1 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup pecan meats
1/2 cup flour

1/3 cup butter
1 teaspoon vanilla

Beat the eggs and add the sugar. Then add the broken pecan meats, sifted flour, and melted butter. Add the vanilla. Pour into a greased 9-inch square pan and bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes. When cool, cut into squares. This yields about 16 squares.

1967 Cadillac On Display At Jones Motors

Highlighting the Cadillac line-up of 1967 models is all new styling, unexcelled safety, comfort and convenience features and a completely new luxury personal car - the front-wheel-drive Fleetwood Eldorado.

Calvin J. Werner, Cadillac Motor Car Division general manager and General Motors vice-president, said that the 1967 Cadillacs will be on display in dealer showrooms October 6.

"The 1967 line has 12 models—same as last year—with the new Eldorado replacing the Eldorado convertible in the Fleetwood series," Mr. Werner said. "The styling theme of the standard line is dramatically different, yet unquestionably Cadillac inspired, and the Eldorado has its own design distinct from the rest of the line but definitely in the Cadillac tradition."

"Safety has always received primary consideration at Cadillac and this year is no exception," he continued. "Prominent among the product improvements related to safety is an energy-absorbing steering wheel used in combination with the energy-absorbing steering column that is standard on all General Motors cars. The wheel deflects under severe body impact and cushions the driver against a padded surface inside the circumference of the wheel."

The new Eldorado is distinguished as the only car in the world offering the mutually complementary features of front-wheel-drive, variable ratio steering and automatic level control as standard equipment. This model is being built on its own special assembly line at Cadillac's Detroit plant.

Length of the Eldorado is 221 inches, only three inches shorter than the Coupe de Ville. Its 53.3 inch height is less than an inch lower than the Coupe de Ville. The Eldorado's wheelbase is 120 inches compared to 129.5 inches in the De Ville and Calais models which have the same dimensions as last year. Other models also retain their 1965 dimensions. The Fleetwood Brougham and Sixty-Special sedan are 227.5 inches long with a wheelbase of 133 inches. The Seventy-Five sedan and limousine have a length of 244.5 inches and wheelbase of 149.5 inches.

STYLING OF STANDARD MODELS
The front view of standard models is fresh in concept but retains a traditional Cadillac flavor with the cross-hatch grille design and vertically mounted twin headlamps. A broad, bold look is achieved with wider spacing of the grille elements.

While the dimensions are unchanged, the new silhouette gives the car a longer appearance. A powerful horizontal design line sweeps the entire length of the car—emphasizing length and a sculptured look. A distinctive new roof structure is exclusive to the two and four-door hardtop models. The more formal style of the coupe upper structures was influenced by Cadillac's Florentine show car at the World's Fair in New York.

Highlighting the rear view is a completely new bumper and taillight configuration. All lighting functions are housed in the vertical bumper outlets which provide positive nighttime Cadillac identification.

SAFETY EMPHASIS CONTINUES
Cadillac's continued emphasis on built-in safety is stressed even further in 1967 with the addition of many improvements related to safety.

All established safety requirements are included as standard equipment except exhaust emission control which will be incorporated at extra charge in cars sold in states where it is required by law. Additional product improvements related to safety include a red warning light on the dash panel to indicate any malfunction of the dual power brake

system and folding seat backs in two-door models that lock into position and are unlocked by a control button on the outer side of the seat back.

The upper portion of the all-new instrument panel is fully padded and all controls have been relocated, recessed and padded. Coat hooks are of flexible vinyl. The inside rear view mirror has a soft vinyl-padded rim and is designed to break away upon impact.

Door hinges and lock mechanisms are stronger and all door locks are of the free-wheeling type formerly used only on rear doors. When locked, doors cannot be opened accidentally with inside handles.

The turn signal control is redesigned with two functions including a new lane-change signal which activates when the lever is held in place and shuts off when released. This was incorporated to eliminate dir-

ectional lights remaining on after moving into another lane. The second function is the normal signal for a turn and it cancels automatically after the turn is completed.

All models feature a hazard warning signal which flashes all four directional lights in case of emergency.

ELDORADO STYLING
Crisp, tailored lines dominate the styling theme of Cadillac's five-passenger Eldorado. The design is fresh, individual, yet unmistakably Cadillac inspired.

A long hood, distinctive roof, and short rear deck set the character for Cadillac's new luxury personal car. Its appearance is dignified, but youthful, with a roof design reminiscent of a formal opera coupe and full-wheel openings that give a sporty flair. Front ventipanes are elimi-

nated to aid the uncluttered side view. The rear windows slide back into the roof structure. A chrome rocker panel extends along the lower body from front to rear.

340 horsepower V-8 engine is improved with a completely new valve train and Quadrajet carburetor. Better oil economy results from an improved cylinder bore finish and new oil rings.

Providing the power for the Eldorado is the same basic engine only adapted for front-wheel-drive. Exterior changes include new oil pan, exhaust manifolds, accessory mounting arrangement, accessory belt drive and all-new engine mounting system.

The Eldorado chassis features a frame, suspension and drive train unique to front-wheel-drive requirement. The suspension design incorporates a torsion bar system in front, while single-leaf springs, a drop-center axle and four shock absorbers are used for the rear.

The Eldorado transmission is located alongside the engine and is connected directly to the differential which drives the front axles and wheels. The exhaust system uses dual pipes from engine to rear axle and a single outlet pipe to resonator and tail-pipe.

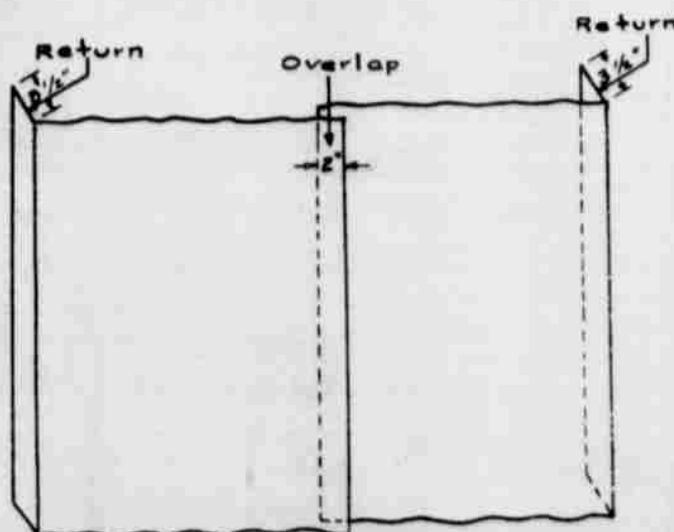

Indications are that cotton producers on the High Plains and elsewhere will get considerably higher prices for cottonseed this year than they've gotten in many many years. It's the result of an old law almost forgotten in High Plains cotton circles -- the law of supply and demand.

The estimated national 1966 crop of just less than 11 million bales -- about 30 percent below 1965 production -- has brought on a proportionate reduction in the prospective supply of cottonseed for crushing. The demand for cottonseed and cottonseed products has not seen a similar drop. Unlike lint, there's no surplus from which to fill the gap.

On the Plains, cottonseed at the gin has opened at about \$70 per ton, basis quality index of 100, as compared to from \$42 to \$50 per ton paid in recent years. How this price will hold through the season is anybody's guess, but most observers see little chance of a decline back to \$50 a ton or less.

There's about 800 to 850 pounds of seed per bale, worth \$28 at \$70 per ton. Ginning charges including bagging and ties, averages from \$10 to \$20 per bale. So farmers, as of now, can expect to realize from \$8 to \$10 per bale above ginning.

Certainly there's no assurance that this seed price will hold for the year. But the current price would bring farmers from 160 to 200 points net over loan value for their cotton.

And percentage-wise this factor takes on added importance in view of declining loan values -- from 32 cents basis middling inch in 1963 to 29 cents in 1965. Loan price for 1966 is 21 cents, basis middling inch, but the value of both diversion and price support payments must also be taken into consideration this year, with each individual farmer calculating his own price.

Miss Castle, who holds numerous musical degrees, has been a regular on the Welk Show each week since August, 1959.

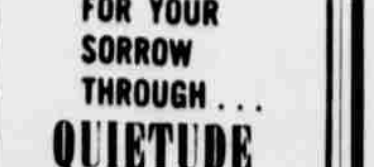

Advisory Committee On Grains Appointed

Secretary of Agriculture, Orville Freeman, on September 29 announced the appointment of 34

individuals to serve as members of an Advisory Committee on Grains--representing wheat, feed grains and soybeans. Texans named to the committee were: Bill Nelson, Executive Vice President of Grain Sorghum Producers Association, Amarillo and Kenneth Kendrick of Stratford, a grain sorghum and wheat farmer and past Executive Director of the National Association of Wheat Growers.

Other Plains area members named were Albert Matlock, President of the New Mexico Grain Sorghum Producers Association, of Clovis along with John Budde of Towner, Colorado and George Meeker of Kansas. Mr. E. A. Jaenks, Associate Administrator of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in USDA was named by Freeman as Chairman of the new grain committee. He has called the first meeting of the advisory group in Washington, Thursday and Friday, October 6 and 7, and said that the main order of business will be the development of administrative policies for the 1967 Feed Grain Program involving corn and grain sorghum acreage, price and stocks.

Neither PCG nor the NCPA is recommending this or any other variety. They point out that with the current value ratio between lint and seed, farmers can afford to plant glandless cottonseed only if it is equal to the best glanded varieties in yield and quality of lint.

"However, it is important that the opportunity for additional research into uses for glandless seed products, provided by the current year's production of 25-V, not be missed," Johnson said.

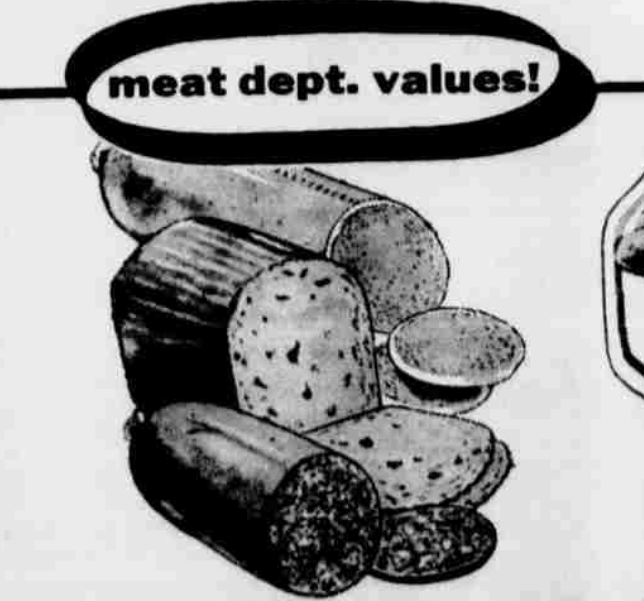

Republicans have nobody but Nixon warming up in the bullpen. I refuse to believe that there is such a dearth of available statesmanship that he is the only possible nominee.



President Johnson's waning popularity -- and any President's always precarious health -- should be sufficient incentive for the GOP to get busy grooming a whole bunch of contenders. It is not "too early." The Democrats are ceaselessly seeking to advance strong Democrats.

I can imagine several Republican tickets deserving of a public test hop. I do not know the personal persuasion of each of these -- nor do you. That's the trouble. If they were flushed out into the open, required to commit themselves on big issues, some of them would almost certainly prove to be first-class vote bait.

I can imagine a potentially appealing ticket including: George Romney and Bo Calloway.

Or: Chuck Percy and Jacob Javits.

Or: Gormley Goozley and Ron Reagan.

Conceded, each of these has some hurdles to top between now and then, but the point is that Republicans should stop publicly pleading bankruptcy.

The GOP has Nixon warming up on the back burner but, again, he is failing to "catch fire": some disappointing speech at

tendence in places where he should be most welcome.

Nixon's surrender to the White House on many issues, including the unpopular war in Vietnam, has left many Republicans uninspired. Instead, it has inspired a revival of third-party talk.

Alabama's Governor George Wallace could divert enough anti-Johnson votes to bury alive any "liberal Yankee GOP ticket."

If only for this reason, the Republicans should be contributing to an increased national image for Georgia's Bo Calloway. His is a magic name in Dixie, but his fast-increasing political stature has been almost unnoticed outside his home state. Conceivably, Calloway could bail the Republicans out of an otherwise hopeless situation.

About Richard Nixon: The GOP's willingness to give this workhorse another crack at the White House is understandable. After all, he came within a Cook County ballot box of beating Kennedy. He has kept himself briefed on international affairs. He has campaigned tirelessly for Republicans, even those who didn't have a prayer. Nixon has, since 1964, logged 127,000 miles visiting 40 states to try to put Humpty-Dumpty together again.

But neither political party dares put all its eggs in one basket. Too many impossibilities could upset that basket.

Students at South Plains College this year are from 136 towns in Texas; 13 other states in the United States; and five foreign countries.

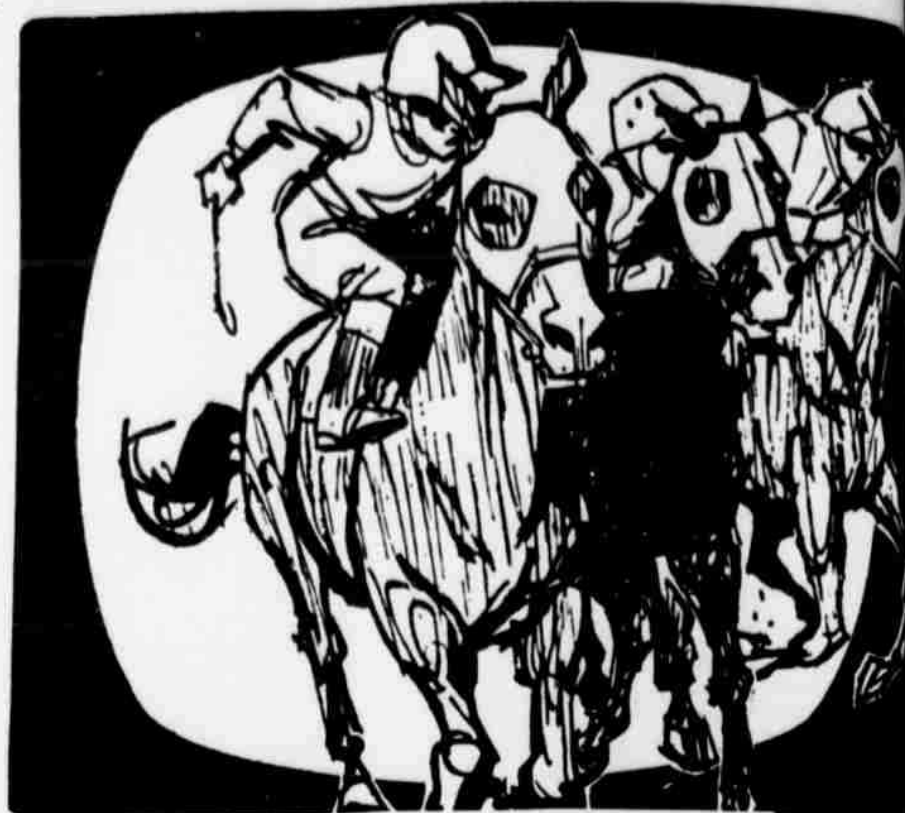

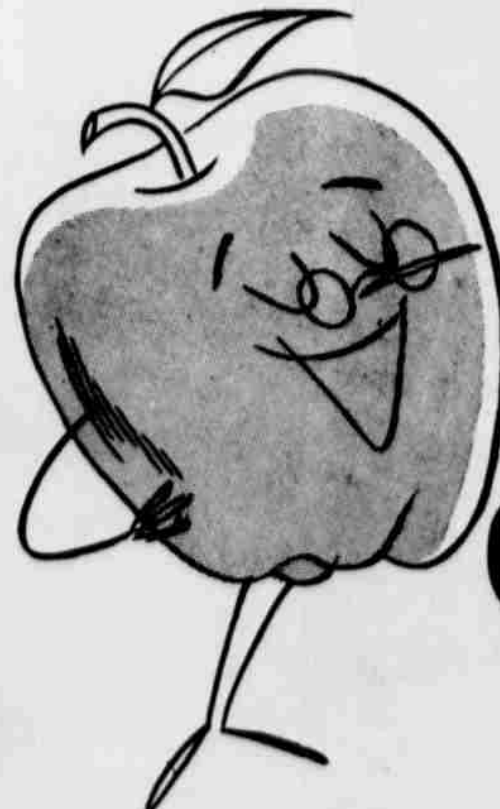
