FORT WORTH, May 22.—A charter for the Fort Worth and Denver Northern Railway company, a subsidiary of the Ft. Worth and Denver and Burlington systems, to construct a new rail line from Childress to Pampa, a distance of 110 miles, yesterday was issued.

Articles of incorporation for the line have been approved by the attorney general and filed with the secretary of state.

The new railroad will tap a vast agricultural section, ninety per cent of which is now under cultivation. Connecting with the main line of the Denver, the new line will go to Pampa by way of Wellington and Shamrock. Much of this territory is now unserved by rail service.

According to Frank E. Clarity, president and general manager of the Fort Worth and Denver, all preliminary steps looking to the construction of the road have been completed. The Interstate Commerce Commission is expected to have a hearing on the petition for the line next six days. Officials of the company feel reasonably sure that the commission will grant a franchise.

WEATHER NOT
MUCH AID TO
COTTON CROPSTATE IN FAIR SHAPE
BUT BALANCE OF
BELT IS POOR

WASHINGTON, May 22.—The Department of Agriculture's weekly weather and crop summary for the week ended yesterday, says in general the weather continued unfavorable for the cotton crop in most sections of the belt because of too much rain and a general coolness in the northern districts.

The Texas rains were beneficial in the South and West, but in the upper coast and eastern and north-eastern portions they were unfavorable with considerable damage by excessive rains; the general condition of the crop in the state is fair to good, but the weekly progress as a whole, was mostly rather slow.

Hoover Cuts Down Handshaking Bees
WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—President Hoover has decided to limit public receptions at the White House to one day each week and will put the new schedule into effect next week.

Originally such receptions were held daily but shortly after Mr. Hoover's inauguration the number was reduced to two each week with the announcement that later it would be further curtailed. It is expected that eventually the receptions will be entirely eliminated from the president's program.

For the last two months the receptions have been held each Monday and Thursday, but after this week they will take place only on Wednesdays.

They had been married only nine days when Markin left her on May 13 on an announced business trip to New Sharon, Iowa.

Gilmore To Capital
AUSTIN, May 22 (AP)—Clarence E. Gilmore, chairman of the Texas railroad commission, will leave Friday for Washington where he will sit in at a joint hearing of all states and the I. C. C. on a petition affecting grain rates interstate from and to every state west of the Mississippi river and intrastate in every individual state.

ANNUITY PAYMENTS OF
DEFEATED NATION
MAY BE CHANGED

PARIS, May 22.—A modified draft report agreed upon by reparations experts and a covering letter making clear the Allies' views was transmitted to Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, chief of the German delegation this afternoon.

Chief interest centered on whether the creditor nations' draft report made any changes in the total annuities to be paid by Germany in addition to the reservations made on several of the German conditions of acceptance of the figures proposed by Owen D. Young.

May Reject Plan
From all information available it appeared likely the Germans would reject the report if there were such changes.

A talk of scheme to prolong the life of the Dawes plan after August 31 when the fifth annuity year ends also would be rejected by Dr. Schacht if included in the modified report, in the opinion of responsible circles.

Up To Germany
With receipt of the draft report setting forth the views of the creditor experts, the next move is now again up to the Germans, who had been waiting for more than a week for the Allied delegate to act.

The Germans probably will take a day or two to study the new situation although they have been kept informed in a general way of the progress of negotiations among the creditor experts.

Robison Will Not
Give Out Statement

AUSTIN, May 22 (AP)—Land Commissioner J. T. Robison has abandoned his intention of issuing immediately a statement answering the report of the senate-house investigating committee, he announced yesterday.

The Texas high school has been a subject of his transactions, making reference especially to an accounting of the one cent revaluation fund.

"I shall prepare a statement, but I do not intend to disclose it until possibly the second special session," the commissioner said.

Honors Are Given
Tahoka's Schools

Provisions have been made for the holding of a business course next year including typewriting, shorthand and bookkeeping. A high school band will also be added in 1929-30.

The high school quartet under the direction of Mrs. Jack Jackson won first place this winter over quartets of the South Plains. The school boasts the largest glee club of any school its size in Texas.

AUSTIN, May 22.—W. A. Knox, convicted in Dallas for robbery with firearms of J. Lee Corcoran, must serve one year for each 80 cents he obtained in the alleged holdup. The Court of Criminal Appeals today affirmed the verdict carrying 25 years in the penitentiary he took \$20 from Corcoran.

The case of J. W. Adamson, convicted in Haskell county of arson and given fifteen years in the penitentiary, was affirmed.

WHITE SLAVE
CASE MAY BE
LODGED HEREOFFICERS HOLD WOMEN
AND MEN AS PROBE
IS OPENED

Sensational exposure of an organized white slavery traffic ring, operating throughout West Texas, Oklahoma, and possibly other states, was promised here today with the arrest of two young women and two men.

Another man, thought to be the leader of the alleged ring, is being sought by county officers in an intensive search.

Three Jailed Sunday
The two women and one of the men were arrested here Sunday by Chief Deputy O. B. Conley. They claimed that they were married, but each pleaded guilty to charges of vagrancy and paid fines in justice court.

The women were released but shadowed by officers in an effort to locate the other man. Then the women failed to give any clue to his whereabouts, they were again arrested today and are being held for further investigation.

According to County Attorney Vaughn Wilson, each of the three under arrest admitted, when questioned separately, that they were not married. Officers believe that they were brought to Texas from Oklahoma.

Third Man Held
A third man thought connected with the other group, was arrested this morning when he met the women, following their release. He told Wilson that he came here from Lakeview with the alleged ring leader of the gang, who was, he declared, afraid to meet the women here. He said that he was to meet the women here, then take them to the other person at the canyon east of the city.

Officers will continue their search for the other person, it was said this morning.

Explosion Wrecks Bakery At Lockney
LOCKNEY, May 22 (Special)—A gas explosion wrecked the plant of the Quality bakery here this morning when Manager Lawrence Hill ignited escaping gas at an oven burner preparatory to opening the day's business. Windows in the bakery and adjoining buildings were smashed by the blast, which also destroyed the oven, but Hill was unhurt.

The bakery had been broken into during the night and officers believe the gas jet was turned on purposely. About a month ago Hill received a threatening letter which was not signed.

Admits Murders
WASECA, Minn., May 22 (AP)—Joe Nymaster, 33, of Hopkins, Minn., confessed last night to state authorities that he had killed Julius Schuch, 54, and the latter's two children, Ernest and Ida, at Schuch's farm house Saturday night.

Nymaster said he first struck the girl with a hammer and then "something went wrong inside" of him, causing him to kill Schuch and his son. Details of the slayings were not divulged.

EIGHT THOUSAND DOLLARS IN
LOOT TAKEN AFTER FOUR MEN
FORCE OFFICERS INTO VAULT

TEXARKANA, Ark., May 22.—Forcing five officers and two customers into a vault of the Miller County Bank and Trust company here, four unmasked robbers today escaped with between \$7,000 and \$8,000 in currency.

Stationing one man on the outside of the bank in an automobile, the other three dashed into the building. T. F. Booker, president, who was in his office, was forced to face the wall as were other persons. Marching the seven persons into the vault, the robbers slammed the door, snatched up two sacks of currency and fled.

The alarm was not spread until the prisoners had freed themselves from the vault.

A bookkeeper was said to have identified two of the robbers as residents of Texarkana.

Robbery Not Suspected
Although the holdup occurred at 10:30 a. m. when the streets outside the building were crowded, the robbery was not suspected by the crowd until four men dashed out and fled in a green automobile. Officers of both Bowie county, Texas, and Miller county, Arkansas, joined in a search for the men, although the direction in which they fled had not been determined.

Phil Huckabee and Joe Bland, customers, were imprisoned in the vault with Booker, as were Miss Josephine Stropent, assistant cashier; A. R. Plenken, cashier; Robert Able, bookkeeper, and Brice Williams.

Doors Not Locked
The two vault doors which the robbers slammed shut did not lock and were pushed open from the inside.

Held For Probe
MARSHALL, Tex., May 22 (AP)—A suspect held here in the Harrison county jail for questioning in connection with the murder of H. B. Alston in a Marshall cemetery in February, has attempted to commit suicide by slashing his wrists with a razor blade.

Charges have not been filed against the man, said to be a member of an old and respected family of Jefferson, Texas. It was learned.

To Discuss Oil

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—President Hoover has invited the governors of western oil producing states to send representatives to a preliminary conference at Colorado Springs June 10 to consider the possibility of creating an interstate compact for conservation of oil.

This announcement was made today at the White House. The president's action was made upon recommendation of the federal oil conservation board.

Floods Threaten
LONDON, May 22 (AP)—A dispatch from Basra, Iraq, to today's Daily Mail said the city of Bagdad was imperiled by floods on the Tigris river. The Euphrates river has risen also and many deaths and widespread destruction along the two streams were reported.

Chief loss of life has been on the Tigris at Mahmudiya, 15 miles south of Bagdad, where the survivors were suffering from a food shortage.

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Local Man Alleges His Wife In Error
Charging that his wife frequently "low class hotels and rooming houses and that she had been arrested and placed in jail a number of times on various charges, a local man this morning filed a petition for divorce in district court here.

An injunction is sought enjoining the wife from removing their one child from the county. The husband seeks custody of the child in connection with the divorce.

Mrs. Doggett and Mary Louise, 13, were rushed to Houston for treatment.

A neighbor, A. J. Beck, discovered the house in flames and aroused the Doggetts. Mrs. Doggett was so badly burned she died at a neighbor's home.

The house, a two-story building, was destroyed.

Mrs. Robbins waved and smiled at her husband while he was at the stick, but Mrs. Kelley could not see her husband. Later it was learned he had been asleep in the hammock.

Air sickness bothered Robbins for the first two days but later he overcame it. Several boxes of aspirin were given the men at their request.

Newspapers were lowered by rope so the pilot of duty can while away the time. Photographs taken just before the flight began were given to the men as were letters from their wives and friends.

Kelley suffered a burn on the back of one hand yesterday when he greased the rocker arms of the motor. To grease them he crawled out of the cabin and made his way between the wings by means of a "cat walk." Then he swung below the nose of the plane on a perch specially constructed for the purpose.

DARING LADS OF AIR PUSH ON TO HONOR

ARMY PLANE 'ATTACKS' GOTHAM; OCEAN FLIERS READY

(By Associated Press)
A theoretical bombing of New York by air and two attempts to establish endurance flight records featured aviation news today while unfavorable weather conditions held to the ground two planes poised for Trans-Atlantic hops.

Fighting its way through fog and heavy clouds from Wright field, Dayton, Ohio, a huge Army bomber dropped three parachute flares over the Army post on Governor's Island lighting New York harbor brilliant.

Lands At Washington

The twin motored bomber with its crew of five left Dayton at 1:15 p. m., eastern standard time, and after a 540 mile flight emerged from the mist over New York at 9:27 p. m., daylight time and dropped its first bomb at 9:40. It then continued on to Washington where it landed at Bolling Field at 10:45 p. m., eastern standard time.

Plans to refuel the plane enroute and broadcast a description of the bombing were abandoned when the two accompanying planes were

forced down at Uniontown, Pa., by weather.

Of two attempts to set a new refueling endurance record, one at Fort Worth, continued while another at Roosevelt Field, N. Y., was terminated after six hours by a damaged stabilizer.

After High Record

At Fort Worth, R. L. Robbins and James Kelley, commercial aviators, who started their endurance flight Sunday, equalled at 11:40 p. m., central standard time last night the mark of 60 hours and 7 minutes set last July by the Belgian fliers, Adjutant Louis Crooy and Sergeant Victor Groenen. They continued their flight in an attempt to pass the record of 150 hours, 40 minutes and 15 seconds, set by the Army plane Question Mark.

Fliers known as "The Three Musketeers" were forced down at Roosevelt Field. After the plane had been fueled from the ground four times, a hook on the end of a cable suspended from the plane became entangled and tore a hole in the right stabilizer.

Another Flight Halted

An attempt at the refueling record planned for today at Wichita, Kas., by Owen L. Haughland and Gene Shank was indefinitely postponed when a sealed barograph failed to arrive.

The Rome-bound monoplane Green Flash remained land bound to Old Orchard, Me., awaiting an improvement in weather conditions not expected before Thursday. Likewise, the Paris-bound French plane Bernard-191 was held at Roosevelt Field and Armand Lott, Jr., backer of the flight, left for Old Orchard to investigate possibilities of a takeoff from there.

The Gangster

This is an age of specialization
and efficiency. Quick disaster over-
takes the man who does not keep
himself strictly abreast of all the
most modern developments.

It isn't surprising, therefore, to
read that the Chicago gangsters
have taken over a desolate, wooded
island in the Rock River, below
Rockford, Ill., and made it into a
proving ground for their machine
gun shock troops.

Press dispatches indicate that the
gangsters went about their work in
a highly systematic way.

The island was a lone place, not
apt to be spied upon by outsiders.
So the gangsters fixed up a sort of
target range on it. To the island
they sent their machine gunners to
spend several days popping away at
targets, studying the use of their
new weapons with all the earnest-
ness of a battalion of doughboys
preparing for service on the battle
line.

The machine gun spraying bul-
lets at a garden hose spray was
one of those weapons with which
you can hardly miss what you're
shooting at anyway. If you hold the
trigger down long enough, but the
gangsters, evidently, would not be
satisfied with any slipshod meth-
ods. Good marksmanship they felt
was necessary, even if the day of
the sharpshooter is ended.

Hence the island proving ground
where the business of murder can
be put in line with other up-to-date
practices.

This mechanized age has wrought
changes in every line of endeavor.
No one, however, has been quite so
affected as the crook.

From a disorganized mass of
drifting, maladjusted plug-uglies
who realized that the odds were al-
ways against them, the criminals of
a major American city have become
a cohesive, well-organized, amply-
financed and thoroughly equipped
band that has the odds all in its favor.
The new age has put splendid new
weapons into the criminal's hands,
and they know how to use them.

Automobiles, machine guns, bul-
let-proof vests and such-like things
are in their arsenal. Clever lawyers
are in their councils. Vast sums from
the liquor traffic are in their war-
chests. They have alliances with
politicians and police officials.

Yet, in the face of all this, we
continue to fight them with the
same weapons we used in Civil War
days.

Our law enforcement machinery
has practically stood still. Naturally,
it has bogged down, so that crime
of violence are commonplace, rarely
punished.

You can't subdue the underworld
with out-of-date methods—not in a
day when the underworld maintains
its private target range for its ma-
chine gunners.

A Good Law

The present session of Congress
will be presented shortly with a
measure which would require all
cabinet members to attend one sit-

It is to be hoped that this mea-
sure will pass.

This system is already in vogue
in practically every European coun-
try and has yielded excellent results.
Under it, Congress would get a
better idea of what the executive
branch of the government was do-
ing, and co-operation would be
greatly enhanced.

In addition, a cabinet officer like
Fall would find his style vastly
cramped if he had to answer ques-
tions on the floor of Congress every
week. Teapot Dome would never
have become a national scandal if
this law had been passed a decade

E. Hailey, Lubbock country
farmer, lost his life and several
hundred dollars worth of prop-
erty the other night while acting
as a good Samaritan.

While aiding motorists stalled
near his home a gasoline tank
on an automobile caught fire
and the unfortunate man re-
ceived burns which resulted in
his death. It is a sad case.

This is not an editorial urging
people not to act as good Samarit-
ans. It is a warning to others to
be careful when they strike matches
around gasoline.

The death of E. Hailey marks the third death of this
kind in this vicinity during the past
several months—a record entirely
too high.

Gasoline is a high explosive.

When you look into your gaso-
line tank to find out if it's dry
better use a flashlight rather
than a match and when you
try to take ink out of Willie's
Sunday pants with an open pan
of gasoline and a brush better
get out doors while you do it—
and be sure there is no fire
around.

J. T. Robinson, better known in
Texas politics as "Old Man" Robinson,
has been a land commissioner for
almost a generation but he's still
learning.

Threats to impeach him
as the result of alleged mishandling
of public funds are being heard
throughout the state and it looks
like the old fellow may have some
trouble before it is all over.

The Plainsman doesn't know
anything about the case except
what he has read in the papers.
But politics in addition to making
strange bedfellows likewise
make strange situations and it
might not be amiss to go back
a few weeks and remember that
Land Commissioner Robinson
crossed up with the powers that
be over the Small River Red
Bill and the University lands
problem. Perhaps these charges
and counter-charges grew out of

knows?

If J. T. Robinson has been mis-
handling funds he has started doing
it mighty late in his political career
—something that looks entirely
doubtful. He's held office long

It's a waste of time to tell the

million simoleans.

Believe the ballyhoo, if you will,
but Gene Tunney likely hasn't a
million dollars in his own name.
Counting his wife's fortune, he
is nothing to sneeze at—the Tunney
team probably has several millions
in assets. But Gene himself, at the
end of the pugilistic trail, probably
hasn't saved that much money de-
spite the gate-pulling and given his
efforts by that popular roughneck,
William Harrison Dempsey.

A million dollars is a lot of money.
It's easy to get it, yes. He's a
millionaire, but it's a hard thing
to prove. A million dollars doesn't
come easy—even to a fellow who
specializes in punching people to
sleep for the benefit of a howling
mob.

Gene Tunney has been married
for about a year. The Plainsman
doesn't recollect the date of the
nuptials but it's a mighty late hour
for Mrs. Ruth King Fogarty and her
last husband to decide upon court
action to soothe their breaking
hearts. Something should be done
in our law books to make silly suits
impossible. Plaintiffs rarely collect
on them and important personsages
should be given that much protec-
tion.

WASHINGTON, May 22.—The

The flivver is new and shiny
and the chauffeur in the driver's
seat, it stands out almost like a
purple and yellow fire truck.

It is one of the White House cars
of course, and is used by Mrs. Long

Mrs. Long came to the White
House in March, succeeding Mrs.
E. R. Riech, who is now open to of-

der the Calvin Coolidges. The new
housekeeper is a pleasant, middle-

years as both social secretary and
housekeeper in the household of
Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Rogers of New

Hoovers had placed an order with
a New York agency for a capable
woman with experience in large en-
tertainments. So Mrs. Long came to
the White House.

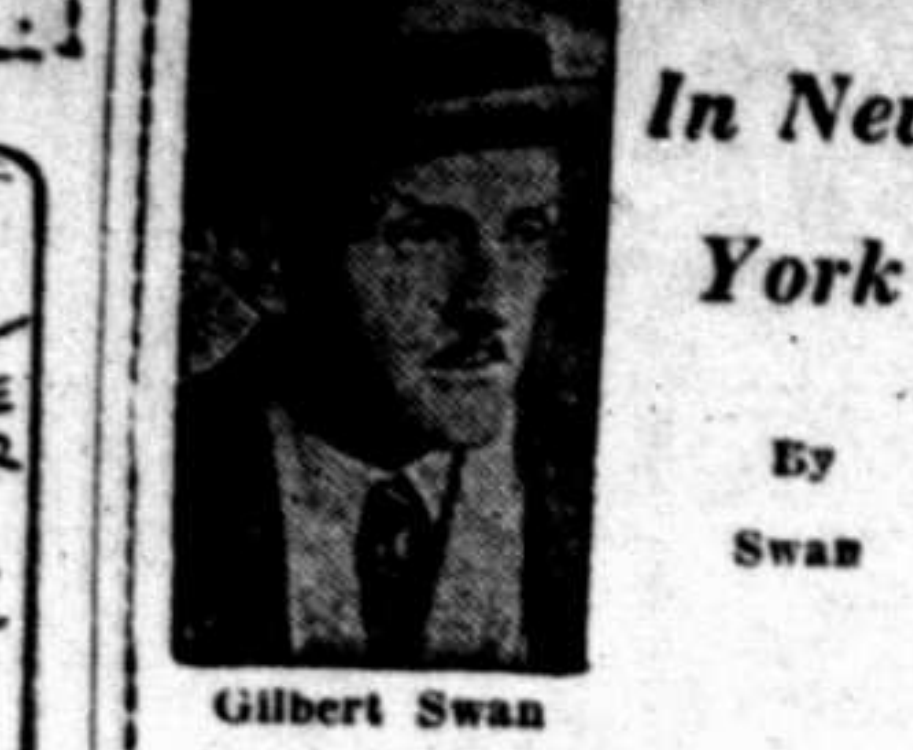
Man Confesses To

NEW YORK, May 22.—In the
Chinese theater, which occupies one
of the oldest and most tumble-down
quarters in the lower Broadway belt,
all the traditions of the playhouse
—as known to the American—are
violated by customs centuries old.

In Chinatown the theater is a
family affair. The youngsters romp
up and down the aisles, inventing
various games. And on the night
I attended there were skipping the
rope within a few feet of my seat.
A half dozen had found a stack of
programs and were going about
handing them to the cash custom-
ers.

Hawkers go continually about, in-
terrupting the actors in the recita-
tion of their lines. Bits of candied
melon, melon seeds and ginger can-
dies seem to be the favorite wares.
If the actors are disturbed, they
give no indication. The play seems
to go endlessly on. It runs until
about 12:30.

The heavy rush of patronage be-
gins just about midnight. I was
told that at 12 o'clock balcony seats
are free. To that time there had
been but an average audience. Sud-
denly, as the free list crashed in,
the theater became jammed. This,
I understand, is considered good ad-
vertising, since a Chinese play tells
a continued story which may run
for many days and a crowd arrives
in time to pick up the "to be
continued in our next."

Chinese actors, by the way, are
among the highest paid in the world.
Performers, imported to the little
Bowery playhouse under bond, re-
ceive sums comparable to those of
movie stars and Broadway headlin-
ers. Several of the leading people
get \$20,000 a year—and work but a
fraction of this time. They are fed
by the leading Chinese groups of
America and occupy a high place in
artistic circles.

Each district in Manhattan pro-
vides its own particular theatrical
favorite for that matter, and is
jealous of intrusion from the out-
side. Only within the past year have
the up-towners discovered the pride
of the East Side—Molly Picon—who
never fails to attract vast crowds of
neighborhood folk to her theater on
Second avenue.

A diminutive comedienne, reminis-
cent of the hoyden tradition in
musical show ingenues, Miss Picon
performs her comic stunts in the
best Yiddish of her East Side fol-
lowing. Still her reputation has
outgrown her theater and Broadway
laughs in Connie's Inn at least three
times a week. Recently it was hinted
that the talking pictures might suc-
ceed in securing her for a limited
engagement.

Out in Harlem, the negroes ad-
ored the coming of Rhina Winters
last before Broadway had ever
heard the name, and the stepping
of Bill Robinson was the delight of
the Harlem cafe goers many a
month before he had become the
outstanding tap dancer of the big
street. Johnny Hudegens was prob-
ably the best dancer in the city
before the coming of Rhina Winters.

The Bronx once held the Schil-
krauts close to its heart and the
senior Schickelraut was operating a
successful little theater before
the films had ever heard of his
little boy, Joe, who is quite an up-
and-coming feature of the cinema
today. Maurice Schwartz is an-
other product of the Yiddish art the-
ater movement figures to gain a
general Manhattan following.

The best way to get your brain in
the whole wheat breads and
cereals, although the inclusion of a
small amount of the bran itself in
the diet is found beneficial to many
of these foods.

You lost at the rate of almost
eight pounds a week. That's a terri-
fic rate, but where there is such a
great excess as yours, this can be
done, for all the tissues of the body
are saturated with excess water (as-
well as fat) which had to be re-
tained before to dilute the concen-
tration on account of the enor-
mous amount of food eaten.

Of course, counting calories is not
a necessity. Reducing your food in-
take automatically reduces the cal-
ories. Calories simply are the meas-
ure of the energy and heating val-
ue of food. But counting calories
makes reducing very much more in-
teresting for you are not eating
by guess work.

If the reducer goes on a liquid
diet to begin with, for three or more
days, he may lose from five to ten
pounds the first week. After this
he should lose from one and one-
half to two pounds a week, and this
is enough for a steady loss for the
average case. Twelve hundred Cal-
ories a day usually will cause this loss.

ADDED FUNDS ASKED FOR RESEARCH ON DISEASE
PREVENTIONS

By DR. C. C. PIERCE, Acting U. S. Surgeon General
(Claude Connor Pierce was born at Chattanooga, Tenn., June 15,
1878. He is a graduate of Chattanooga Medical College. He served in
the Spanish-American war and was appointed assistant surgeon of the
United States Public Health service in 1900. In 1918 he was made
assistant surgeon general. He is now acting surgeon general. His home
is in Washington, D. C.)

Important recommendations for
the promotion of the public health
of the United States have been
submitted to congress by Surgeon
General Cummings.

These recommendations
emphasize that the promo-
tion and preservation
of the public
health, from the
economic as well
as from other as-
pects is of great
importance to the
nation.

It is necessary,
therefore, to rec-
ommend additional
measures not only to prevent
the spread of dis-
eases, but to con-
duct studies relating to their origin
and mode of dissemination. Studies
of public health problems are be-
coming more and more difficult.

It is believed that a larger ap-
propriation could profitably be ex-
pended in the furtherance and develop-
ment of studies which are designed
to promote the public health. The
results of the scientific investiga-
tions in this field have given con-
clusive evidence that this is a worth-
while investment.

It is felt that the recent progress
made in connection with the impor-
tant problem of cancer should be
extended and developed. The pub-
lic health aspects of cancer are be-
coming of increasing importance.

Undulant fever in certain areas
is of even more importance from
the standpoint of public health than
is typhoid fever. Studies relating to
this disease should be carried out
more intensively. Heart disease has
been one of the leading causes of
death in the United States for sev-
eral years. It is felt that funda-
mental studies relating to the cause
of this important condition should
be undertaken by the service.

The recommendation has been
made that a reasonable increase in
the sums allotted to the scientific
investigations conducted by the
public health service be made over
an extended period of time, which
would permit the economic ex-
penditure of such an increase and al-
low time for the securing and train-
ing of skilled workers.

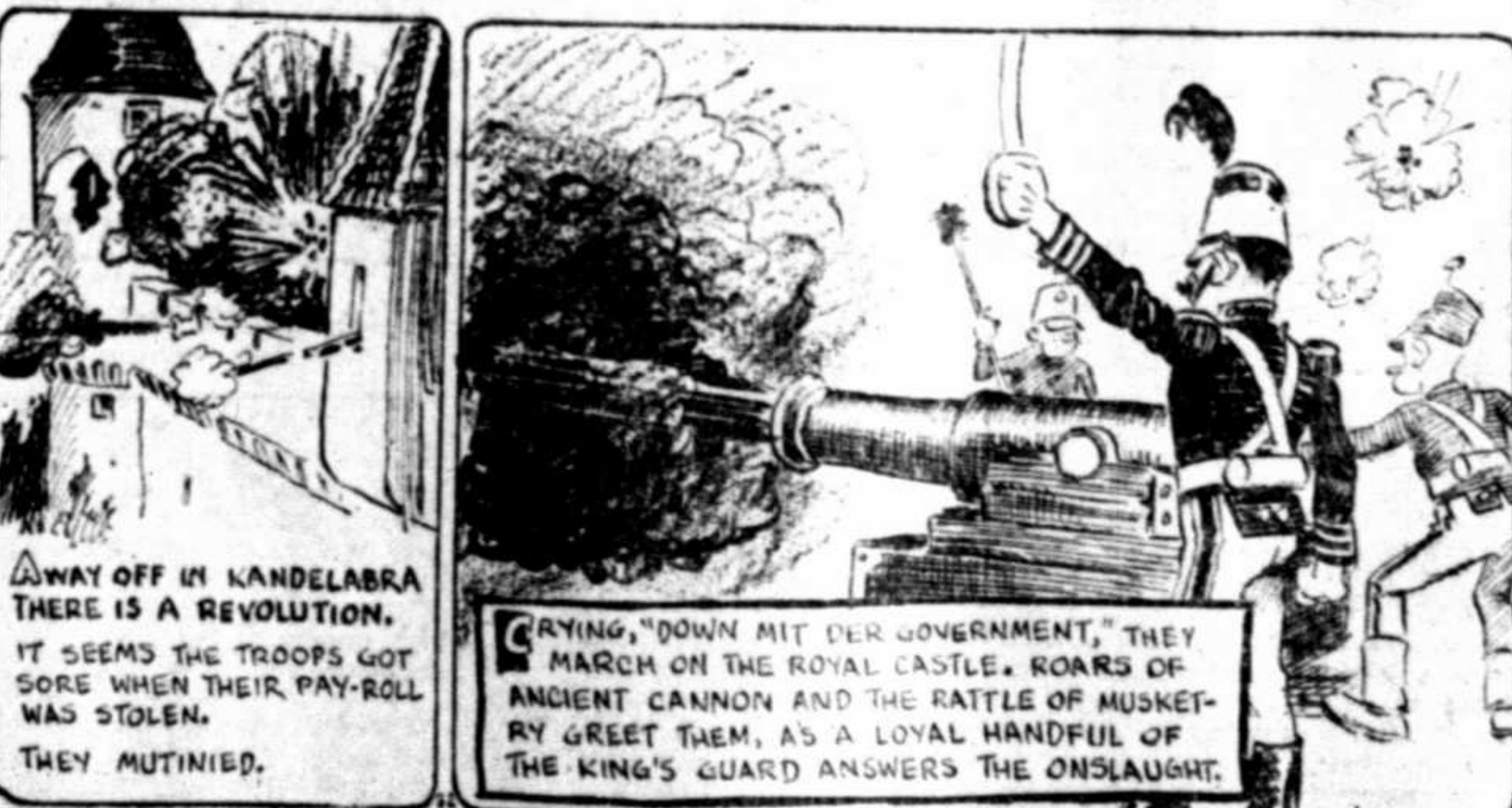

ALL STREET IS HIT HARD

RESERVE BANK PLANS SEND STOCKS TO STAGGERING

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, May 22.—Prices on the New York stock exchange broke sharply at the opening of today's market on the announcement that the Federal reserve advisory council recommended that an increase of 5 to 6 per cent in rediscount rates be permitted by all federal reserve banks seeking permission of the Federal reserve board for the higher charge. Such permission already is understood to have been granted by the New York and Chicago branches. Initial declines in the market followed the news, with the railroad an industrial shares falling from \$1 to \$7 a share.

Early selling was inspired by action of the Federal reserve council recommending that the Federal reserve board grant permission to federal reserve banks to increase recent rates from 5 to 6 per cent.

Few Sales Made
Early liquidation was not unusually heavy in volume, few blocks of 5,000 shares changing hands. The largest was a block of 500 shares of General Motors at 4.00 off 13-8.

House continues general tariff debate.

Senate continues discussion of census reapportionment bill.

STUMBLING BLOCKS SEEN
WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP).—The export debenture controversy and the dispute over sugar duties stood

out today as the big stumbling blocks in the way of legislative progress on the two measures—farm relief and tariff readjustment—which top the administration program for the special session of Congress.

As a result, while the Senate was in position to proceed with its discussion of the census-reapportionment bill, the House was still engaged with general debate on the tariff measure, and the joint conference committees of the two chambers on the farm proposal remained in a deadlock.

Leaders Are Hopeful
Republican leaders in the House were hopeful, however, that they would be able to shut off the general tariff debate today or tomorrow and start consideration of amendments. The latter has been republican majority on a special held up pending agreement by the

rule to fix a date for a final vote and give precedence in the meantime to amendments introduced by members of the ways and means committee.

The final draft of the tariff rule has been practically completed and republican leaders had hoped to be able yesterday to call a party conference to act on it. They were prevented from doing so, however, by inability to agree on a question whether to open the proposed sugar schedule to amendment from the floor.

Garner Declares
Some of the republican leaders that course pursued, favoring the idea of substituting a sliding scale of duties for the 2.40 cent schedule proposed for Cuban sugar, so that high sugar prices at New York will operate to reduce the tariff rate, and vice versa.
