Radio Station XER To Be Sold Under Hammer

Eagle Pass, July 1.—The machinery, furniture, apparatus and furnishings belonging to the Cio Radiodifusora de Acuna, popularly known as radio station XER will be sold at auction in Piedras Negras on July 15, at 11 o'clock. The sale will be conducted at the Federal treasury office in the two-story building across the street from the Market House. The famous XER station, erected in Villa Acuna, opposite Del Rio, is being sold by the Mexican government for payment of 516 fines of 500 pesos each, amounting to 335,000 pesos, imposed by the Federal health department. Alfonso Amaya Gonzalez, chief of the federal treasury office in Piedras Negras, will act as auctioneer. —Del Rio Evening News.

Noted West Texas Juror Dies After A Brief Illness

Friends in this city of Judge John J. Foster regretted to learn of his death, which occurred at his home in Del Rio last Thursday morning. He had just recently returned from a month's stay in a hospital in San Antonio where he went in an effort to recuperate from an attack of influenza.

Judge Foster was a widely known attorney and a prominent citizen of Del Rio, having resided in that city since 1904. He came to Del Rio from Waco, where he began his law career in 1898, following his graduation from the law school of Georgetown University, Washington, D. C., in 1897. Prior to that he was employed in the printing department of many large daily newspapers over the United States.

Judge Foster was born in England and came to the United States when he was 13 years of age, to make his home with an uncle and aunt in Pennsylvania. He is survived by the widow, Mrs. Mary Foster, and six children, Phil B. Foster, Rodney Foster, and Mrs. Marion Clingman, all of Del Rio; Mrs. Helen Seymour of Westwood Hills, Calif.; Ben F. Foster of San Antonio and Mrs. Marguerite Easton of Los Angeles, Calif. There are also seven grandchildren.

Funeral services were held from the family residence Friday morning at 10 o'clock, the Rev. H. Conger Jones of St. James Episcopal church officiating. Interment was made in the Foster family vault in the Masonic cemetery.

Terrell Wildcat Will Be Drilled To 6,500-Ft. Level

The test for oil on their joint block in northeastern Terrell county drilled to 5,606 ft. in shale by H. H. Sides has been taken over by F. C. Bates, Jr., of Sheffield, and J. H. Felps, Girvin, who plan deepening to 6,500 feet, and farther if necessary, to test the Ordovician. This was announced by the two land owners here yesterday. They expected to begin operations by Aug. 1, either under a new contract or by employing crews.

In terminating his contract, Mr. Sides relinquished all interests in the test and equipment, and received leases on 500 acres. His feat in drilling more than a mile deep during the depression with little support was praised by Mr. Bates and Mr. Felps. Mr. Sides earlier completed a wildcat on the Blackstone and Slaughter ranch in Pecos county and later a test on Mr. Felps' ranch in Crane county. His first contract on the Terrell county wildcat was 3,500 feet, the second 6,500 feet. Mr. Sides' home is in Durham, Okla., where he has a farm, but he has spent most of his time the last few years in west Texas, coming to San Angelo from McCombs.

No. 1 Bates-Felps was spudded with standard tools in November, 1931, and suspended operations in February, 1934 in the black shale section above the Pennsylvania. It had several small showings of oil and gas. Twelve-inch casing was set at 250 feet, 10-inch at 600 feet and 6-inch at 1,470, below which the hole is open but in good condition. Parting of the line left the tools on bottom but the string was not dropped. The hole now is full of water, coming in around the casing from upper levels.

Mr. Bates with 6,680 acres and Mr. Felps with 6,760 acres combined their holdings for the drilling of the test, which is on Mr. Bates' ranch only a short distance east of Mr. Felps' property. Leases on about 5,000 acres were returned to the land owners by Mr. Sides, who had sold leases on the balance of the block. Little royalty has been sold by either of the land holders.

No. 1 Bates-Felps is 2,157 feet from the north line and 2,482 ft. from the west line of section 5, block A-4, G. W. Turley survey, about 17 miles southeast of the Yates pool and on the same side of the Pecos river—the west. It has an elevation of 2,185 feet.

Mr. Bates still is walking with aid of a crutch and cane as the result of injuries sustained Feb. 22 when his car and another collided five miles west of San Angelo. He sustained fractures of the left jaw and left hip and was in a local hospital five weeks. Mrs. Bates suffered a fracture of the left leg below the knee and a severe cut on the forehead. She was in a hospital for two months and still is confined to a wheel chair but is improving. The Bates and Felps ranches have received about 8 inches of rain in the last 40 to 50 days and range and livestock conditions are good.

Mrs. Ferguson was a native Texan, born in Dewitt county, but had made her home in Wilson county since 1886. Being of sturdy pioneer stock, she was very active in her later years, but an accident about seven weeks ago, in which her hip was broken, sapped her vitality and hastened her end.

Mr. Ferguson was called to her bedside last Friday, and on his return to Sanderson the first of this week, received a message advising him that his mother had passed away.

Surviving this good pioneer mother are eight children, six boys: John, Ira and George, of Floresville; Jesse, of Navasota; W. J. of Sanderson, and Frank of Austin; two daughters: Mrs. Era Carmichael and Mrs. Nellie Atkinson of Floresville.

Two Millionth Ford V-8 Car Is Exhibited Here

The two-millionth Ford V-8 on its way overland to the International exposition at San Diego, Calif., arrived in Sanderson last Friday afternoon about 6:30 and its driver, and others accompanying him, spent the night here.

The car was on display at the Ferguson Motor Co., and despite the lateness of its arrival hundreds of our people inspected the car and other models in the caravan.

The 2,000,000th car was a deluxe touring sedan, and it marked a significant advance in the progress of the Ford V-8. This type of engine for low-priced cars was introduced by Henry Ford in 1932, and remains unique in that field.

The two-millionth Ford V-8 represents more than 23,000,000 Ford-built automobiles that go back to the early years of the industry. The car left here early Saturday morning going west via Marathon, Alpine, Marfa and El Paso, and it was exhibited in each town along this route.

On Buying Securities

No. 3 of a Series

"I own a piece of royalty near an oil field. I want to sell this interest," one man recently inquired of the Secretary of State. "I understand that oil and gas leases and royalty interests are classified as Securities under Texas' new Securities Law. Will I have to register and get a license before I can sell this interest?"

In answering the question the Secretary of State pointed out that isolated transactions are exempt under the terms of the law. But if a person is engaged in the business of buying and selling oil leases, royalty or other such interests, he must qualify as a dealer and in some cases as an issuer of securities. The lease "peddler" must qualify.

In a single deal, it is not necessary to qualify under the Texas law.

The same applies to vendor's lien notes and other forms of commercial paper. However, if a person makes a practice of selling commercial paper, the transaction is not an isolated case and that person must qualify under the law. The simple rule is—Single and individual transactions are exempt. Multiple transactions are not.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

CHARGES MADE AGAINST THE UTILITIES

Charges have been made by the Federal Trade Commission that the Utilities interests are using propaganda to prevent the government from taking over the operation of all public utilities.

It is indeed difficult for the average man who thinks with an open mind, and who is not so prejudiced that he cannot give the subject fair and intelligent consideration, to get excited over such charges. As a matter of fact, just why should not a company, or firm, whether engaged in public utilities or selling groceries, be permitted to do everything possible so long as he neither circumvents nor breaks the law, to keep from losing his business, especially if that business is a paying one.

Is not a man entitled to the fruits of his labor? Is he to be shorn of his business without a chance to protect himself simply because it happens to be a utilities business? Such action is comparable only to the unfair procedure taken by the government when prohibition was voted in the land when millions of dollars of property were scrapped by such action without restitution being made to those who had their money invested in legal enterprises. Regardless of one's thoughts or sympathies, such is not right nor equitable nor can any amount of argument make it so.

So long as the utilities use methods which are fair, moral, as well as legal, certainly there should be no objection to their efforts. As a matter of fact, the government should keep its fingers out of private business, public utilities included. If and when interests in the various businesses, whether they be utilities or other, do not follow or conform to the law, certainly there are means of prosecuting those individuals who are guilty of such law evasion.

If and when laws now in effect are properly enforced and honest officials see that competent engineers properly fix valuations for utilities and set rates accordingly there never will be any reason for governmental interference or ownership of utilities. And if such actions are taken, the people will receive lower rates than they will get under governmental operation with the grafting methods extended to the field of Public Utilities.

But regardless of that or any other angle to the situation, certainly no one should be unjustly accused merely for trying to save a business and property which it has taken years of effort and a great amount of money to build into its present paying state.

INTERESTING TRIAL

Those interested in the relationship that exists between lawyer and client will take deeper interest in the result of the trial of two lawyers in Oklahoma City. They were charged with accepting and even directing the disposal of the Urschel kidnapping ransom. Many laymen have felt that this relationship of which we are speaking needs re-stating. Perhaps it has never actually been stated. We are all agreed that an attorney must look after the interests of his client and that every person charged with crime is entitled to counsel. But there are limits beyond which even legal council is not expected to go and should not be permitted to go. Frequently, it seems to us, we forget the purpose of courts, which is to interpret and to apply law to the end that justice may prevail.

The lawyer at the bar is part of our system. When he manufactures evidence, misstates his case or directs his client to violation of law or to further violation of law, he has gone further than the ethics of his profession or our own laws will permit. But proof is often lacking in such cases and at times, we suspect, proof is not sought. In holding that a man charged with crime is innocent until proved guilty, we have placed the burden of proof on the state, and that is where it should be. But it is quite possible to make proof or guilt so difficult that the ends of justice are defeated. We feel that we have gone entirely too far and that too much freedom is permitted defense attorneys, perhaps the prosecution as well.

At times one feels that there should be some way to brush aside court procedure as we now have it. To cut short delays that are granted astute criminal lawyers, to reduce concessions, and thereby go by a more direct route to a determination of guilt. The present trial is an instance of what does at times happen and suggests the need for some kind of change or reform. — Ponca City (Okla.) News.

Automobile Industry Good Farm Customers

The farmer's job used to be keeping the nation's dinner table supplied. During 1925 he will work to help supply materials for one million Ford cars this year.

Ford dealers point out that the Ford Motor Company will purchase many products of the farm and the forest in order to complete its announced intention to build one million cars this year.

Here are some of the things that will have to be purchased:

2,200,000 pounds of wool requiring 80,000 sheep to produce it will go into upholstery, floor-coverings, fabrics and anti-rust preparations. The production of glass made from silica, glass made from silica, stearic acid, grease, glycerine, soap chips and 1,500,000 square feet of leather for upholstery will utilize 30,000 cattle. 20,000 hogs will supply lard oil for lubricants, stearic acid and bristles for brushes. The goat will yield 350,000 pounds of goat hair for the mohair upholstery. This means that farms will shear 37,500 goats. Beeswax is not so much used as it was, but tons of beeswax will be used for electrical insulating compounds. 90,000,000 industrial honeybees will produce this beeswax.

Every four-door Ford sedan uses 70 pounds of cotton. A million cars will require over 70,000,000 pounds of cotton. The pick will supply 112,000,000 pounds in baling, cloth, brake linings, battery box, timing gears and safety glass. It will take 433,000 acres of cotton to produce this material. The cornfield will produce half a million bushels of corn to make butyl alcohol and starch needed in manufacture. The flax field will furnish 2,400,000 pounds of flax seed. Even the fields of sugar cane will help build the Ford car, for they will furnish 2,500,000 gallons of sugarcane from which come solvents, anti-freeze and shock absorber fluids. Growers of the rubber tree will supply 240,000 pounds of rubber oil for leathers and artificial leathers.

The trees will make its contribution. 112,000,000 feet of lumber, mostly for packing purposes and 5,000,000 feet of paper board will be needed.
