Hospital Board Meets

Tuesday night, July 28, was the regular meeting of the Mitchell County Hospital Board.

The board granted permission to advertise for bids on hospital insurance. Also, the financial reports for the hospital and Root Valley Fair Lodge were read.

Bids were opened for an energy control system. The contract was awarded to Honeywell of Lubbock. An energy control system regulates the amount of electricity that is consumed and thus reduces cost.

The board authorized Ray Dillard to advertise for a lease agreement on a hospital car for the upcoming year.

Youth Finish A Long Summers Work For CETA

Some 51 Mitchell County youth are finishing up their summer jobs as part of the Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP) sponsored by the West Central Council of Governments. The program is funded by the United States Department of Labor.

According to Tom K. Smith, assistant manpower director at Abilene, the purpose of the C.E.T.A. (Comprehensive Employment Training Act) was to provide eligible youth with work at non-profit agencies, giving them a chance to earn money and provide experience in the world of work.

He stated, they also provided them with counseling programs in the labor market on career opportunities. Smith added that this was also aimed at teaching them job responsibility and how to earn a pay check.

The 51 local youth were among some 600 in the 19

counties served by the WCCG.

Each of those employed by C.E.T.A. put in 320 work hours at their various job placements. They worked at the Wallace Center, Colorado Independent School District, Mitchell County Chamber of Commerce, Civic Center, Community Action Program, Housing Authority, Westbrook Independent School District, City of Colorado City, Woodland Activity Center, Texas State Park and Loraine Independent School District.

Their jobs entailed anything from tutoring, answering the phones to painting and any other jobs necessary at their designated positions.

In conclusion, Smith stated that he was pleased with the program results and he felt it definitely was a success.

Bids On Remodeling Are Opened Monday

Monday night, July 27, was a called meeting of the Colorado City School Board. The first item on the agenda was to open bids on some remodeling projects that are being planned.

The first bid to be opened was to remodel two classrooms in the Administration Building for the tax appraisal office. This project was awarded to H&H Systems of Colorado City who had a bid of \$35,313.73.

The second bid to be opened was to remodel the inside of the Middle School Band Hall, choir room and practice rooms. The contract was awarded to Haney Construction of Abilene with a bid of \$44,372.

The next bid accepted was to close in the windows of Hutchinson Elementary on the outside of the building. When this is completed, there will be a rock fi-

nish placed over the windows. This bid was awarded to Haney Construction who put in a bid of \$25,124.

Also, there were two bids opened that were awarded to Bob and Bobby Nobles Dirt Contractors of Colorado City. The first was to put a parking lot in front of the Administration Building which would have the entrance off of 11th Street.

The second was to remove the curb in front of the Administration Building and make it into head-in parking.

Coach Tom Ramsey presented his athletic program for the upcoming year to the school board. The board gave its permission to sell two used 1965 Dodge buses. Also, the board discussed the vacancy of Fleta Lewis on the Mitchell County Appraisal Board.

New Swimming Pool Is Discussed At Meeting

The Colorado City Council met in a called meeting Tuesday night at the City Hall. The meeting was held to discuss the application for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Grant for the rebuilding of the city swimming pool.

The grant is from the Outdoor Recreation Division of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and will be \$85,000. The chances of getting this grant for Colorado City are good because few cities are applying, stated Brenda Tarter, city manager.

The swimming pool is presently in very bad condition, stated Mrs. Tarter. According to a representative of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, there are no other swimming pools in the state in worse condition than Colorado City's pool.

The proposed swimming pool would be a junior olympic size pool with a wading pool for the smaller children. This pool will use the same amount of water

as the old one, but would be more of a square size in shape, giving it more swimming space.

This new pool would be built on the same site as the old pool and would take from eight months to a year to build, stated Mrs. Tarter.

The present pool was built by the Works Projects Administration in the 1930's.

Bond Sales

Sales of Series EE & HH United States Savings Bonds in Mitchell County were reported by County Bond Chairman Wayne Shawn to be \$3,268. Sales for the first six month period totaled \$17,975 for 39 percent of the 1981 goal of \$120,000.

Band rehearsal is set for freshman students, new students and upper classmen wanting to join in, stated Shipp.

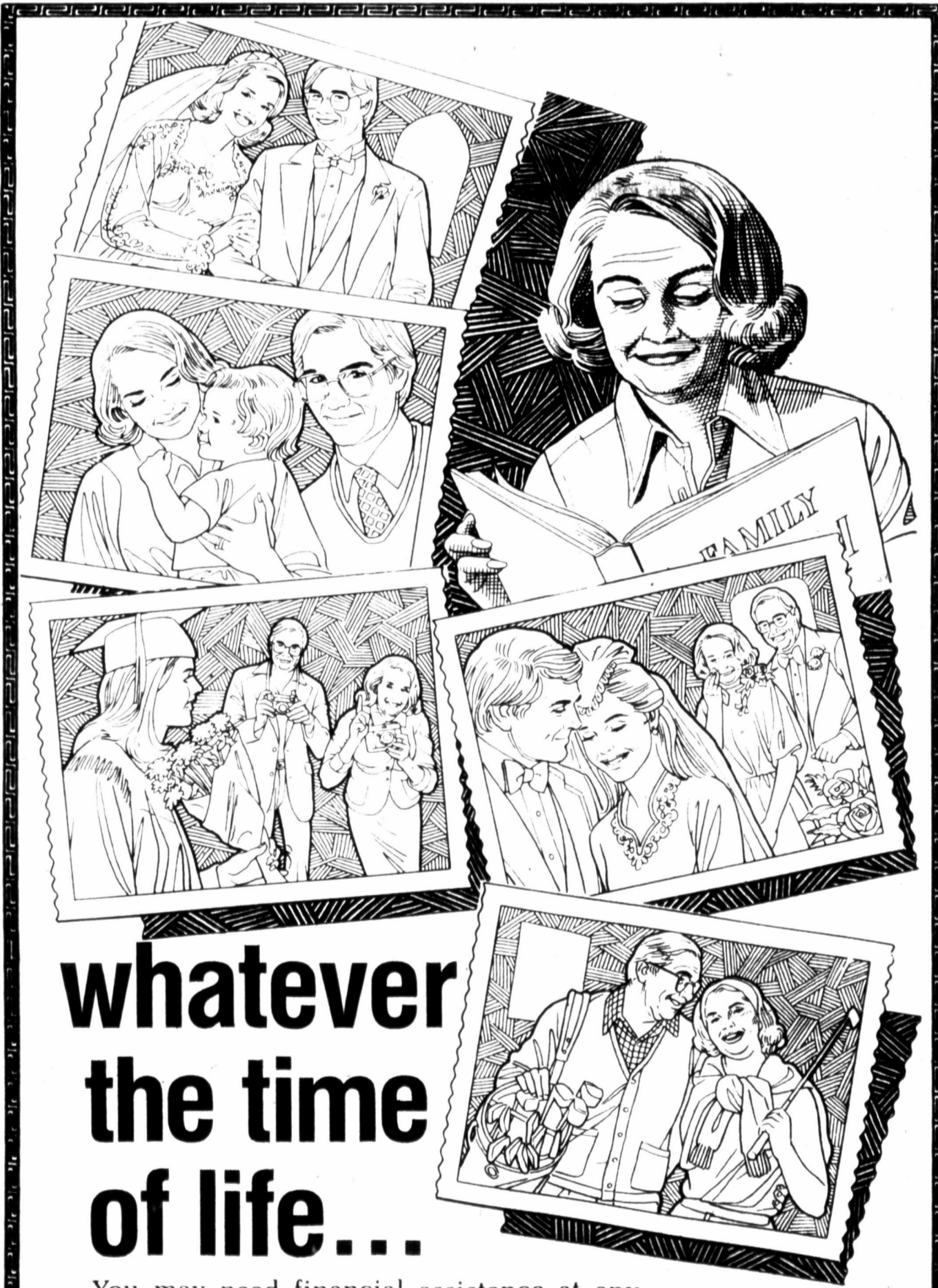
Shipp comes to Colorado City with 12 years of teaching experience: Andrews High School, 1969-76 and Alpine High School, 1976-81.

Persons Over 65 May Apply For Home Energy Assistance For Heating Bills

The Home Energy Assistance Act of 1980, Public Law 96-223, Title III, establishes the Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP). The program is designed to assist low income households in meeting the increased cost of energy for heating and cooling their homes. It is federally funded through the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). In Texas, the program is administered by the Texas Department of Human Resources (TDHR).

Low income families containing members age 65 or older may receive needed assistance this summer to help in cooling their homes. Under the cooling phase of the federally funded Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) the Texas Department of Human Resources proposes to make a one-time payment to qualifying households which:

Have energy costs that are subject to increases; have both low income and low resources; contain a member age 65 or older by August 31, 1981 and meet income limits.

Under TDHR's plan those households not receiving an automatic payment can apply between August 3 and August 31, 1981. Each county in Texas will have a designated location for members of such households to apply. If certified as eligible, the household should

have their benefit payments within 20-30 days. All applicants have the right to: a timely determination of eligibility (within 30 days of application); courteous service; reasonable assistance in completing the application; a review of any decision and, if necessary, a formal hearing; and confidential treatment of all information required for eligibility determination.

This program helps low-income households pay for cooling their homes. Households should apply in August 1981 for cash payment. Applicants must be interviewed to find out if they are eligible.

Some eligible households containing a member aged 65 or over that get AFDC, Supplemental Security Income (SSI), or Food Stamp benefits in July 1981 may get an Energy Assistance payment automatically if they returned by June 18th the HEAP questionnaire mailed to them in June 1981. All others may apply for benefits at: Texas Department of Human Resources, 136 E. 3rd Street or phone 728-2618.

Benefits will be provided without reference to race, sex, color, religious preference, political belief, or disability. If you believe you have been discriminated against, contact your local Department of Human Resources office.

Folklife Festival Set For This Week

Governor's Report

By William P. Clements, Jr.

We are moving forward full speed with a plan to relieve the problem of over-crowding in the Texas prison system.

Through a new conditional parole program utilizing existing halfway houses and a temporary tent encampment within the perimeter of prison security areas, we will be able to get 3,000 inmates who now sleep on Department of Corrections floors into more comfortable facilities.

Our plan is responsive to the order of Federal District Judge William Wayne Justice to eliminate triple-celling of inmates by August.

Inmates were paroled to halfway houses on June 1 and 750 was paroled by July 1. Meanwhile, I have recommended \$16 million be appropriated for intensively-supervised halfway houses during the next biennium.

Board of Pardons and Paroles contracts with halfway houses and individual parolee contracts will be drawn tightly to insure protection of law-abiding citizens, restitution to victims of crimes and minimum cost to taxpayers.

A supplemental grant of \$1.25 million from the Governor's Office of General Counsel and Criminal Justice to the Board of Pardons and Paroles permits immediate placement of conditional parolees in halfway houses. Inmates will receive the highest degree of supervision to assure protection of the public. Initial conditional parolees have been identified and are being processed to halfway houses with advice of local judges, prosecutors and sheriffs.

Meanwhile, we are obtaining military tents from the Texas National Guard to house another 1,500 low risk inmates temporarily within prison unit security areas. The tents, which have been used by our loyal servicemen in the field, will certainly be a preferred alternative to triple-celling of inmates during a brief, five-month period.

The Legislature already has approved my emergency request for a \$35 million appropriation to construct additional permanent housing for inmates. When this construction is completed November 1, inmates who have spent the summer and early fall in the tent encampments will be transferred to the new quarters.

Texas Department of Corrections is studying possible purchase of the Harris County Rehabilitation Center or building new facilities on state land to expand work furlough programs under my \$18 million appropriations request. We have also increased funding for adult probation programs.

The TDC construction program for the 1982-83

biennium will provide 10,800 additional permanent bed spaces by August 31, 1983.

I am encouraged, based on my meeting with U.S. Attorney General William French Smith, that the Reagan Administration is re-examining its position in the lawsuit involving the Texas prison system. I am increasingly hopeful of a stay on appeal of the Ruiz v. Estelle suit.

We are, indeed, in a crisis situation however—one which could cost the state billions of dollars.

I am confident the programs I have set out will eliminate the problem of inmates sleeping on floors by the end of July, without need for wholesale release to homes via an inadequately-supervised work furlough arrangement.

All of this has been undertaken in good faith and with integrity to alleviate the situation in our prisons. I believe that Judge Justice will be pleased with our efforts.

man they were traveling with was killed.

It was a terrifying experience. There was the initial call in the early morning hours, the glum appraisals of Debra's critical condition, the thought of my son, Shannon, though unhurt, quite alone in a strange place, not knowing whether his sister would live or die.

However, from the moment we were informed about the accident, it became apparent that all that could

be done was being done. Monte Jones, the Episcopal priest who made the first phone call handled those first critical moments with aplomb. He told me what I needed to know in a way that I needed to hear it. His manner triggered the calm I needed to face quite a few problems that were to follow.

At Root Memorial Hospital, the attending doctor was patient and honest, laying out the candid options that led us to transport my daughter to Lubbock and a specialist's care.

In the days that followed, I learned more about what had happened. From the passers-by who discovered the accident to the woman who heard a call on the radio to the workers that cut the car to free my daughter, each did his or her part carefully and quickly. They, along with the medical teams that followed, quite likely saved my daughter's life.

But there was more. In the weeks that followed, Officer Johnny Hirst and his partner went out of their way (and beyond their duty) to help us recover our wits and our property. The Dosses at Dossey's Wrecker Service searched for sentimental trinkets as though they were looking for their own.

In short, the people of your town helped pull our lives back together. They did it for strangers, out-of-towners, asking nothing extraordinary in return. There were acts of kindness we'll never know about by people we'll probably never hear from, but I think it important that your community realize they were there.

My daughter just returned from what should be one of her last visits to the doctor. She is well on her way, he said, to recovering completely from the wreck that night. Yesterday, she returned to her job, her life recovering much of the rhythm of before.

For that we owe one to the kind people of Colorado City. You have every reason, in these eyes, to be proud of yourselves. May you continue your kindness to others who just pass through.

I send you my family's good wishes, and a father's thanks.

Date Brings Memories

August 7, should be an historic day for farmers, ranchers, soil and water conservation district directors, and all of us who depend upon agricultural products for our food and clothing.

The date will be the silver anniversary of the Great Plains Conservation Program, Van Mills, district conservationist for the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, stated this week.

Just 25 years ago, on August 7, 1956, President Eisenhower signed into law the bill authorizing the program, Mills said. "It is available to producers in the ten Great Plains states—stretching through the Nation's breadbasket from North Dakota to Texas."

GPCP helps farmers and ranchers solve problems of wind and water erosion, drought, and other resource-related problems with technical and financial aid based on conservation plans tailored to each farm or ranch.

The first Great Plains contract in the local Mitchell Soil and Water Conservation District was signed by J. M. Sterling in February of 1958. The land is owned by Sterling who continues to add conservation practices under the program. Two hundred three contracts protecting 294,000 acres have been signed in Mitchell County. Charles Dockrey, of the Spade Community, signed the 20,000th Great Plains

contract in the designated states on September 29, 1965.

"Grass seeding, terraces, grassed waterways, livestock water facilities, cross-fences, and livestock grazing programs are among GPCP practices on which a landowner can receive technical and cost-sharing assistance," Mills said.

The conservation practices in a GPCP plan are scheduled to be applied over three to ten years. The U.S. Department of Agriculture has assigned leadership of the program to the Soil Conservation Service.

"All problems aren't solved in the Great Plains," Mills said. "But since the program has been in operation, wind erosion has not caused the tragic damage of the dust bowl days of the 1930s and the drought of the '50s."

"The terrible drought of 1980, however, threatened approximately 11 million acres with wind damage," Mills said. "While the disaster didn't happen in 1980, the drought and the resulting threat shows that we can never let our guard down when it comes to protecting our natural resources."

Extension Course Offered

Texas Tech University will offer a graduate extension course titled General Public School Administration at Western Texas College in Snyder in the 1981 fall semester.

This course focuses on general administrative theory, including motivation theory, leader behavior and organizational climate. The application of these theories in school settings is illustrated.

Registration will be held at 6 p.m., on Sept. 3 in the WTC Administration Building. Persons wishing further information may contact the office of Dr. Ben Brock, WTC vice president.

August 31st Is Date Set For Truckers To File Federal Use Tax Return For Highway Use

Owners of most large trucks, truck-tractors, tractor-trailers or buses must file a Federal Use Tax Return for Highway Motor Vehicles by August 31, 1981, the Internal Revenue Service says. The return is filed on Form 2290, available at any IRS office.

The tax year for the Highway Use Tax begins July 1, 1981, and runs through June 30, 1982. Taxpayers who place vehicles in service after July must have Form 2290 filed with the IRS Service Center which services their area by the last day of the month following the month a vehicle is first

used on a public highway.

The Highway Use Tax applies to single unit trucks weighing 13,000 pounds or more, 2-axled truck-tractors weighing 5,500 pounds or more, three or more axled truck-tractors regardless of weight, trucks of 9,000 or more pounds equipped for use in combinations, and buses with a gross weight of more than 26,000 pounds.

The tax is imposed on those vehicles using any public highways, city streets, state roads and interstate highways.

Revenue from the tax help states in financing the Interstate Highway System.

Form 2290 and the free IRS Publication 349, "Federal Highway

Use Tax on Trucks, Truck-Tractors and Buses," can be ordered by phoning the IRS forms-tax information number listed in the telephone directory.

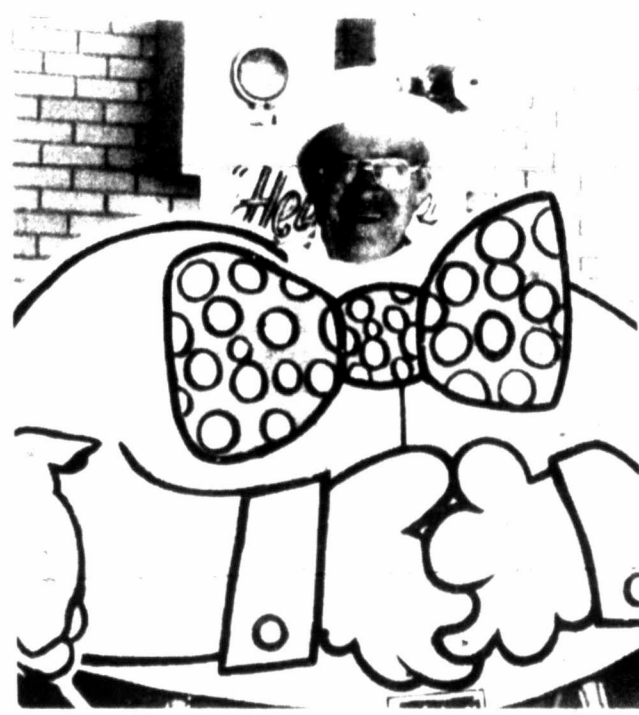

YOU AUTO KNOW

Q. My car is prone to overheating occasionally, especially when stopped at a traffic light or sign with the air conditioner going. Is this a serious problem, or is there a quick remedy?
 A. It probably isn't serious especially if the overheating only occurs periodically. This is, in fact, quite common in cars with small engines. In the situation you described - stopped or crawling along with the air conditioner going, the best remedy is to suffer with the heat for a while, at least until you're going again. Turn off the air conditioner, roll down the windows and, to get coolant circulating in the system faster, turn on the heater for a few minutes. And, of course, make periodic checks of your coolant level and keep fan belts in good condition and at the proper tension.
