Most towns over the United States will have their celebrations on Tuesday night, but owing to the fact that a suitable band was not available on Tuesday night, and further that some people of Lamesa would like to attend both celebrations, it was decided to have on Wednesday night.

## First National Bank To Remodel And Redecorate

### Interior Will Be Completely Changed

Announcement is made this week by officials of the First National Bank of a complete remodeling program on their bank property, to get under way within a few days.

Contract has been let to Harvey C. Allen, Lamesa builder, for the general remodeling of the building, while Mailander Bank Fixture Company of Waco, have the contract for furnishing and setting of new fixtures.

According to the plans the interior will be completely refinished and the set-up of fixtures will be reversed so that they will face the north instead of the south as is now the case. The fixtures will be modernized by removing all grill work, and running glass up a short way above.

The building will be completely remodeled on the inside. The partition on the west will be removed which will give more room in both the bookkeeping department and the lobby. New floors and ceilings will also be put in.

Two offices will be installed along the north side for bank officials. When completed this will make the First National among the most modern banking quarters in the Southwest. Work is expected to get underway within the next few days.

## Dr. Myron Tanner Killed When Car And Bus Collide

### Accident Occurred Near Ottawa, Kansas

In a head-on collision with a bus near Ottawa, Kansas, last Thursday afternoon, Dr. Myron A. Tanner, well known Lamesa chiropractor, was instantly killed, as was his companion, a young man from Levelland, whom the doctor had given a ride.

Although complete details of the accident were not available in Lamesa, it is understood that the roads were covered with ice and were very treacherous. According to dispatches to the daily press, the driver of the bus is reported to have said that apparently the driver lost control of his car and it came into the bus head-on.

It was also reported that it required more than an hour to extricate Tanner's body from the car, due to the twisted wreckage which completely surrounded him.

He was on his way to his old home at Scotts Bluff, Nebraska, to transact some business when the accident occurred. He left Lamesa alone, Wednesday afternoon of last week.

Mrs. Tanner and her mother, received word of the accident in Lamesa late Thursday afternoon, and left immediately for the scene. Funeral services were held at Scott's bluff Tuesday afternoon. A complete list of survivors was not available. He left no children.

Dr. Tanner came to Lamesa to make his home several months ago and formed a partnership with Dr. Hall W. Cutler. They owned and operated the Lamesa Drugless Clinic.

## Ex-Convicts Are Captured Today Near Goldsmith

### Offer No Resistance As Officers Arrest

Two of the three escaped convicts who have been in this section for the past several days, were captured at Goldsmith about 8 A. M. Thursday morning, according to information released from the Sheriff's department at Odessa.

J. E. Mann and Andrew Nelson were both captured without any trouble as each surrendered without offering resistance. The other man of the famed trio, Lacy Cash, was not apprehended at the time.

The three, driving a 1940 Ford sedan, eluded Dawson County officers Sunday night in a three mile chase by outdistancing them, even though the officers car was making 85 miles per hour. It was estimated that their car was traveling one hundred miles an hour over the country roads north and west of Mullins.

The escaped felons are reported to have been seen in various places over this section for the past several days and a conversion of peace officers and highway patrolmen was made in Lamesa Sunday night, when an estimated fifteen carloads of officers were in the city.

A false alarm was sounded from Brownfield the first of the week and sheriffs and deputies from several counties again congregated in the vicinity of Brownfield, but the hunted men had managed to elude all officers until Thursday when they were taken.

The new location is in the lake bottom and is almost on a line between the discovery well and the company's No. 1 Riley, three and one-half miles northwest of the discovery.

Reports from the Johnson well state that casing has parted about thirty-two hundred feet in the hole and operators are now attempting to recover.

The Riley Wildcat is reported pumping sand. Indications in this well do not look so good, according to reports in Lamesa.

Another Farm Auction Sale is announced this week, to be held next Wednesday, beginning at 1:00 p. m. on the farm of E. C. Bartlett.

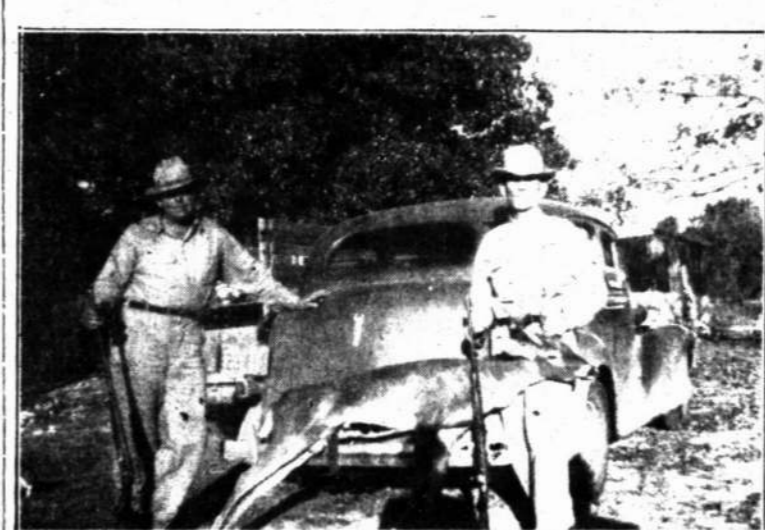
In another place in this issue you will find an ad, in which is listed many of the articles to be sold.

## Must File For Sod Allotment Before Feb. 1st

Recent information from the State Office states that all operators of sod farms in 1940 must make application to the county office not later than February 1, 1940 for a cotton allotment. Applications for sod allotments filed later than February 1, will be accepted but no payment will be made to the farm this year.

This ruling applies only to a farm which is to be all sod land in 1940. Sod may be broken out on an old cotton allotment farm without making application to the County Office, however, no increase in the cotton or feed allotments will be made where sod is broken out on a farm with a cotton record. Farmers are asked to remind their neighbors who expect to have a new sod farm this year to come to the county office before Feb. 1st in order to receive payment this year.

## Many Water Pipes Burst By Freeze

Continued cold weather has held this section of the country for the past several weeks, and the past week has seen possibly the coldest weather of several years, when the thermometer dipped to 8 above last Friday.

Only three times during the past week has the temperature ever risen above the freezing point. Saturday, Monday and Tuesday saw a temporary thaw, but every night saw it turn cold. The average temperature for each day has been below the freezing point. Your attention is called to the complete report at the top of the front page of the Courier.

Thursday continued cold with little change in temperature, and reports from all over the country state that this is the coldest wave in many years.

Water pipes have been frozen over Lamesa for many days and it is not an uncommon sight to see residents carrying water in the old fashioned bucket from some more fortunate neighbor. Plumbers and city water men have been having a very busy time. When (and if) the weather ever thaws, it is expected that plumbers will be deluged with calls from irate housewives, whose water pipes have burst, but who will not be aware of the fact until the thaw comes.

Old timers here do not recall of a more prolonged cold spell than this one has been. For more than thirty days there has hardly been a single day that freezing weather has not been experienced.

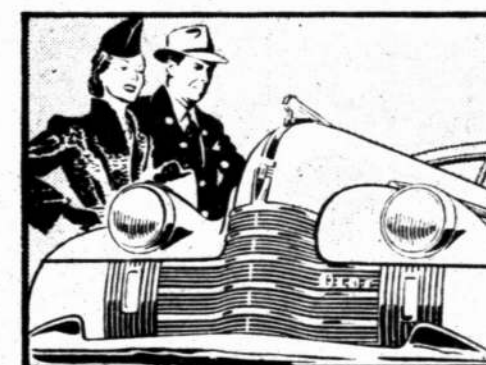

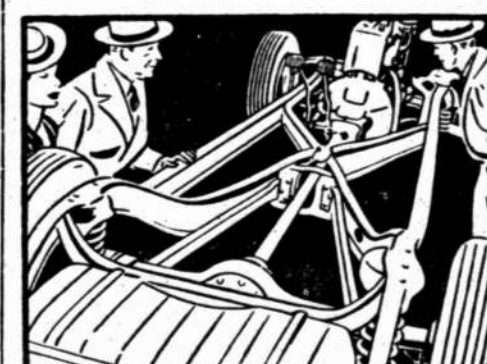

**TO GIVE ORGAN CONCERT SUNDAY**



In view of some conflicting announcements regarding the hour of organ recital to be given by Frank W. Asper, noted Mormon Tabernacle organist, the public is urged to note that the hour is four o'clock. The program will be held in the First Methodist Church, Sunday afternoon, January 28. Tickets will be on sale all this week by members of the Finance Committee of the Parent-Teachers Association. Those failing to contact members of this committee may secure tickets at Taylor-McCall Drug Store until the hour of the program.

The appearance of Dr. Asper promises to be one of the highlights of his fifth brilliant tour of cities and towns in various parts of the country. It will afford the local citizenry the opportunity to hear the country's distinguished "poet organist", an artist who has played on the most renowned organs of the nation and whose concerts are in demand by music lovers everywhere.

Among the notable places where Dr. Asper has appeared in organ concerts in recent years are the following: University of Chicago; Skinner Hall, University of Illinois; Lewis and Clark Auditorium, Spokane; Bates College, Maine; and the Third Baptist Church, St. Louis.

Dr. Asper says one of the most interesting organs he has ever played is at St. John's Church, Portsmouth, New Hampshire. This rare instrument, imported from England to be used in the King's Chapel, Boston, was first unpacked on the porch of the church, where it reposed for seven months while the members debated whether or not it was a device of Satan. Both Benjamin Franklin and George Washington were, in their time, enthralled by its sweet music.

But the most beloved instrument of all, from Dr. Asper's point of view, is the Tabernacle organ in Salt Lake City, at whose console he has sat through upwards of

thirty-five hundred recitals and broadcasts. The tradition of nearly a century has enshrined the great instrument in the hearts of the Mormon people and hundreds of thousands of visitors from all parts of the world have heard it played by such masters as McClelland and Asper, two names that are readily associated with organ music in the grand manner here in the United States.

Also to be heard with Dr. Asper in this outstanding concert is Hollywood's great contralto, Beatrix Mayo. Dr. Asper has selected Miss Mayo because of her glorious voice and her remarkable achievements in the world of song. The combination of her rich voice and the tones of the organ will bring music to the audience never to be forgotten.

Lamesa is fortunate to be able to secure this fine team on a single musical program. Such an event may not come again in years.

**SPECIAL DAIRY DAY COMING APRIL 26TH**

"How good is my dairy herd?" "How are dairy cows judged?" "How good does butter have to be to be good?" - these are questions that will be answered in the course of a series of 23 Dairy Days scheduled for the principal dairy centers of Texas during April and May.

In 1939, 15 official dairy days were held, while a large number of similar meetings were staged on a local scale. The fifteen meetings drew an attendance of more than 12,000 dairymen, 4-H club members and home demonstration club women.

Although no prize money was offered, 920 head of dairy cattle were brought out for classification. Of these, 120 head received the blue ribbon for excellence, 549 red ribbons, and 190 white ribbons. Under the classification system, cattle do not compete against each other but against the score card.

Men, women, boys and girls took part in the dairy judging with 3,793 cards turned in. In addition, 1,674 people took part in the dairy products judging.

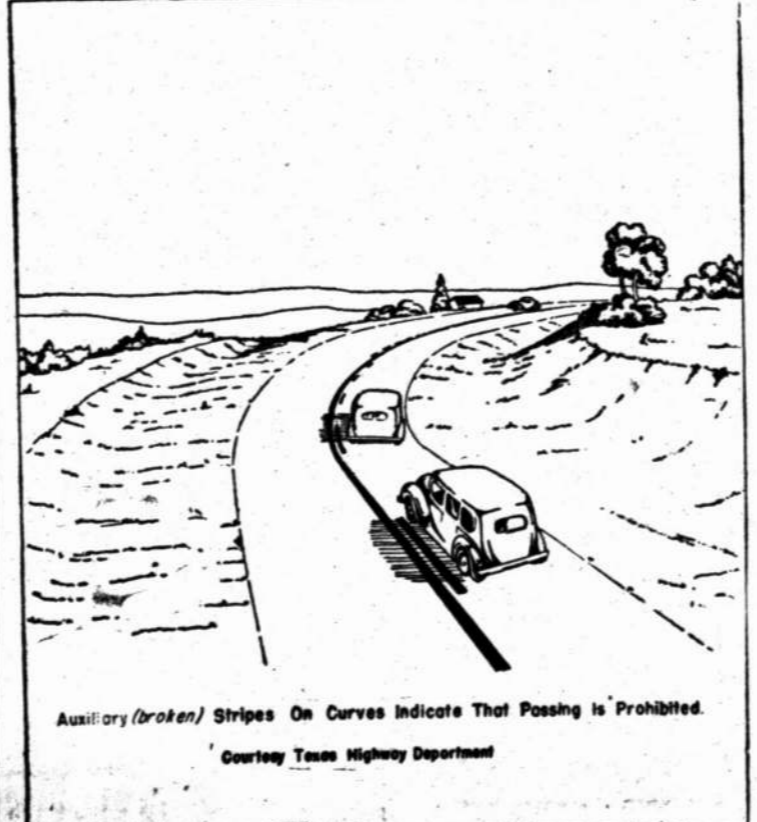

Auxiliary (Broken) Stripes On Curves Indicate That Passing is Prohibited. Courtesy Texas Highway Department

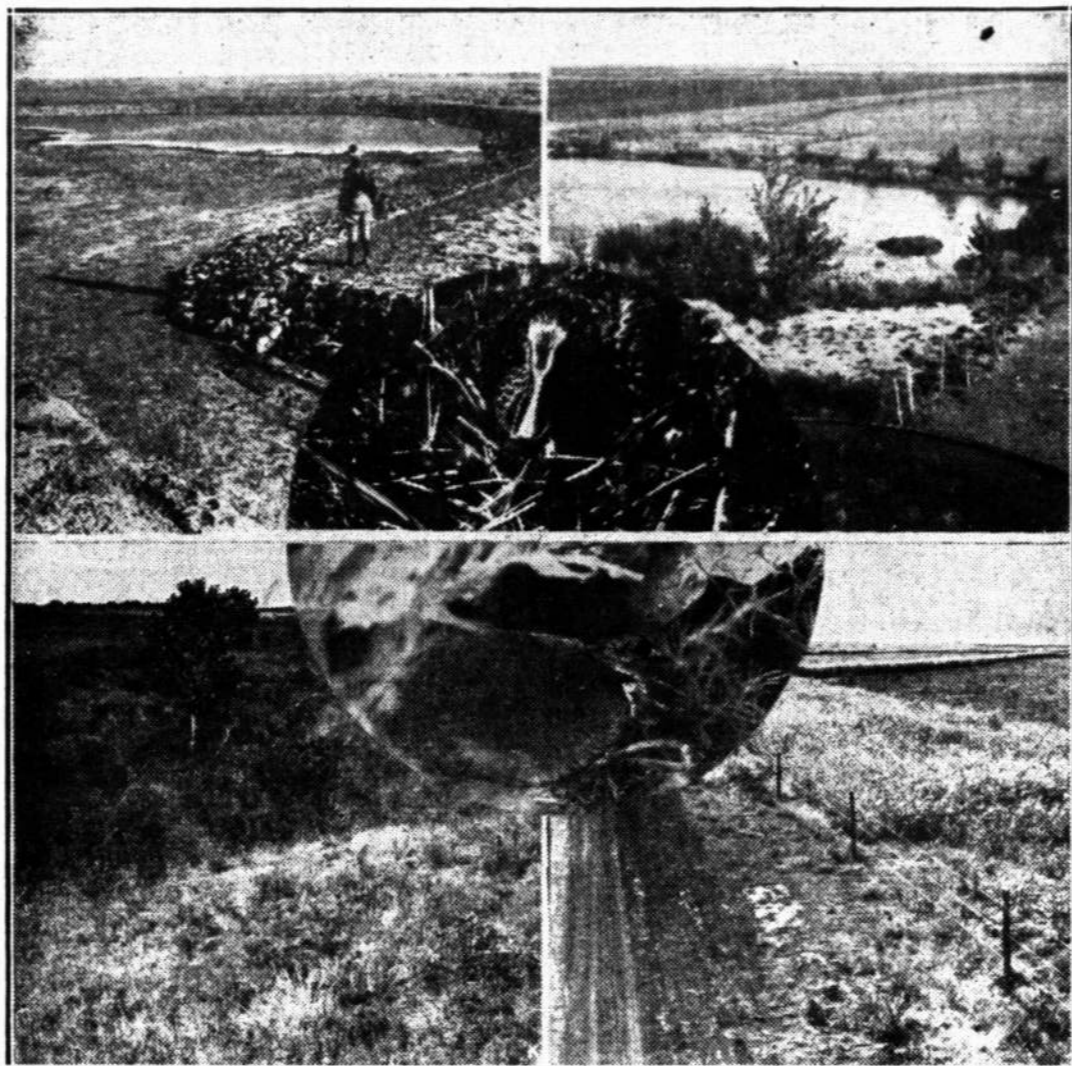

## Wildlife Increases in Southern Great Plains



During the long period of drought in the Southern Great Plains which brought the black blizzards and dust storms, food and shelter for wildlife was reduced to such an extent that some species almost disappeared from the Plains. Within recent years the ever-increasing use of soil conservation practices has been of great benefit in increasing valuable wildlife. Lack of vegetation around stock watering ponds (upper left) prevents use by wildlife, while development to encourage wildlife (upper right) results in production of ducks and other valuable species. Plants along the banks also reduce wave-cutting and catch silt. Control of gullies by use of trees, shrubs and grasses (lower left) provides homes for quail and song birds. Field border plantings for wind control (lower right) supply food and shelter for wildlife on the Plains. Such birds come to the aid of this help by aiding in insect control. **ORANGES ARE NO LONGER A LUXURY**

In grandmother's time oranges were a rare delicacy. But now Americans have taken oranges out of the class of luxuries and put them on breakfast tables throughout the land.

Although oranges are available throughout the year, the big orange season begins this month. And oranges are most welcome during these winter months when supplies of many other fresh fruits and fresh vegetables may be low.

Nutrition workers have also looked into the orange eating habit, and discovered that this fruit has a real place in the well-balanced diet. Their studies show that oranges are an excellent source of vitamin C.

Vitamin C is a rather special vitamin that must be supplied each day for both children and grown-ups to have all around good health. It has an important function in keeping bones and teeth in good condition. A real shortage of vitamin C will produce scurvy—that disease so dreaded by old-time sailors who were often without fresh foods for months at a time.

Orange juice has become a breakfast tradition in many homes and it is one of the finest foods given to infants. So it is no wonder that a glass of refreshing orange juice is the happy ending for so many

oranges—especially those from Florida.  
To get the most juice for your money, select the heaviest and smoothest oranges, ignoring discolorations which affect only the outside of the fruit. Russet spots or slight scarrings which may appear on the outside of the skin, will not affect the flavor or the amount of juice. Lower grade oranges frequently are the best bargain for juice purposes.

If the orange is to be used for purposes other than producing juice, the dessert or salad type is usually preferred. These oranges are easy to peel and easy to eat when divided into sections or when sliced.

Navel oranges, most of which come from California, probably are the commonest variety of dessert oranges now on the market. Temples and Mandarin type oranges, such as tangerines, are other varieties that are easily eaten out of hand.

The orange itself makes a perfect dessert. But it may be combined with other fruits to make a satisfying fruit cup. Oranges add sparkle to a mixture of canned fruit, or they may be used with bananas, apples, grapes or any other fresh fruits. As a novelty, try serving the mixed fruit in the half orange shell.

Ambrosia is another simple dessert. To make it, peel the orange and remove the white membrane

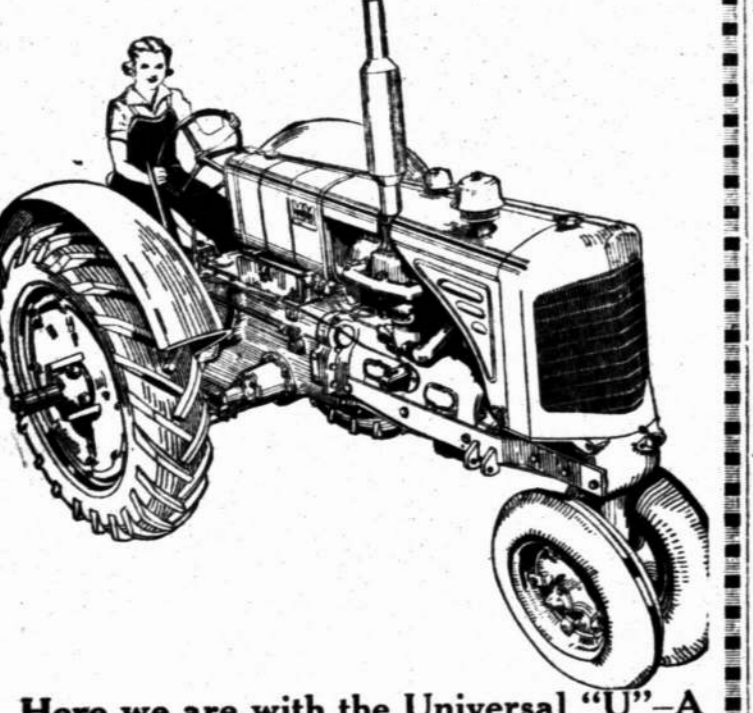

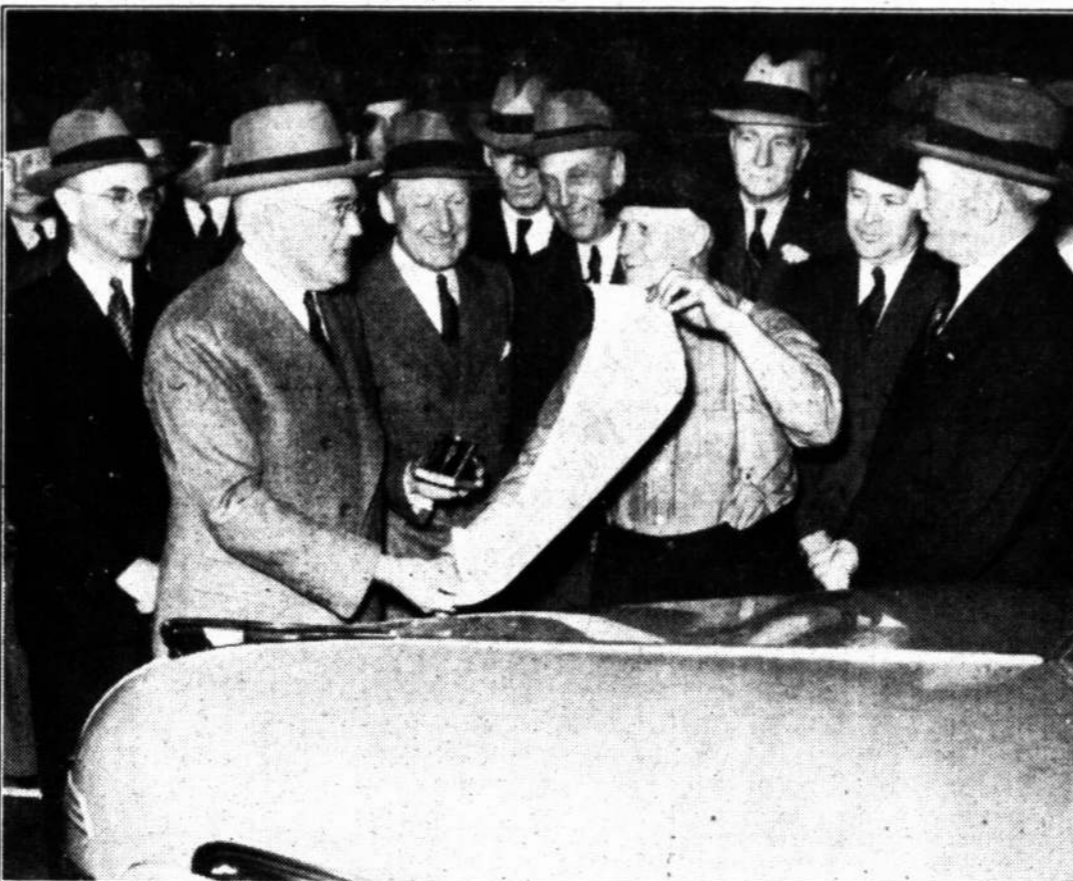

### CONSERVATION OF SOIL

#### THEME OF U. S. EXHIBITS

Conservation of the soil and other resources, plus bringing to public attention the latest research findings, was the theme of United States Department of Agriculture at 21 of the Nation's largest State, national, and international fairs and exhibitions in 1933. More than 14,000,000 people saw the exhibits at these and smaller fairs during the year, reports the department's exhibit section in the Extension Service. Seventeen of the 21 new exhibits were built during the year in furtherance of sound soil conservation and balanced farming practices. These and exhibits revised during the year make up 10 full carloads of exhibit material, each on a special subject or selected for a definite region.

#### IT'S AN ILL WIND THAT BLOWS NO GOOD

It's an ill wind that blows no good. Grover C. Johnson, who is looking forward to the brightest farming prospects in more than 20 years, readily agrees with this old adage for it was a storm sweeping through the Shallowater area last June 20, leaving destruction in its wake, that has indirectly improved the outlook for him.

For more than 20 years Johnson and his family had resided near Lamesa. By hard work and economical living they finally had succeeded in paying for the 10-acre farm upon which they resided. During most of this period they had rented and farmed additional land in order to make a living.

Two years ago, Johnson's son rented a farm in Lubbock County near Shallowater, and the father commuted back and forth between this land and his Lamesa farm while assisting with the work. Then came the storm of last June.

Soon, Johnson learned that one 252-acre farm upon which the storm had destroyed the house, windmill and outbuildings was for sale. He decided that this farm was just what he wanted, and a deal was consummated whereby he traded his 10-acre Lamesa farm as down payment on the larger tract.

Johnson erected a temporary shack on the storm-swept farm and moved in with his wife, son and two daughters. He and his son then set about salvaging all usable lumber from the wrecked buildings and started work on a new home, going practically all of the work themselves.

"I already had observed results of soil and water conservation practices being demonstrated by the Soil Conservation Service CCC camp near Lamesa, and had decided to use such practices on my newly-acquired farm," Johnson said. "While discussing this plan, I learned that loans for development of small water resources were available under provisions of the Department of Agriculture water facilities program."

"The result was that I obtained a loan through the Farm Security Administration which provided a good well, windmill, 1,500-gallon storage tank, a milkhouse with overflow water running through the cooling troughs, and piped water to the poultry house, barn, stock drinking tank, and an earthen tank which will be used to irrigate a home garden. Water also was piped to the house for use in the kitchen and bathroom."

Last November, the Johnson family moved in a modern, six-room stucco home which had been constructed largely from the salvaged materials. Johnson's \$4,200 gross income from the two farms cultivated last year was sufficient to pay all costs of erecting the new home as well as the usual family living expenses.

### Electricity Use In Texas Off

Despite a 25 per cent increase in residential consumption of electric power last month, the State burned only 159,855,000 kilowatt hours, or almost 6,000,000 k.w.h. less than in either October or November of last year, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research has reported. Industrial consumption fell 3.7 per cent and 3.5 per cent from the two periods respectively, but still totaled 73,120,000 k.w.h., or almost half the entire state's consumption.

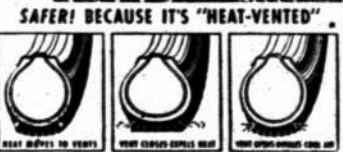
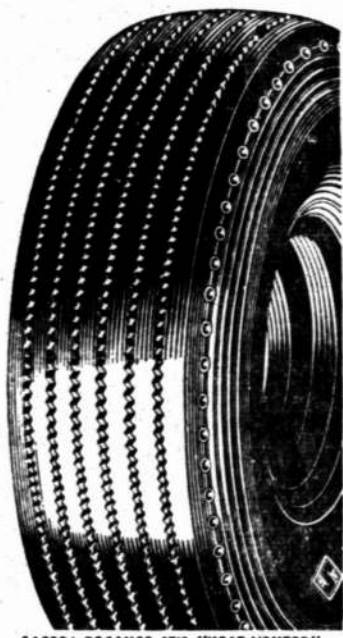
