Hepatitis cases confirmed here

There have been two confirmed cases of hepatitis in Colorado City. One case involves a 15-year-old high school student and the other case is a 17-year-old youth who does not attend school.

Hepatitis is an inflammation of the liver and early symptoms are similar to flu with fever, nausea and vomiting. There is a tenderness in the liver area (right upper side; and finally jaundice.

Colorado Independent School District school nurse Mary Petty, RN, explains that hepatitis is not an airborne virus and that the virus is usually transmitted by eating or drinking after someone who has hepatitis or by kissing someone with the virus.

Mrs. Petty explained that th-

ere is another virus going around now that has alarmed many because they think they have hepatitis.

She said the Department of Health is trying to locate the source of the virus and has questioned both youths to see what they have in common. Family and friends of the two have been contacted and many have taken a gamma globulin shot which reduces the severity of the case if they do come down with hepatitis.

There is a 3-6 week incubation period for the virus. There is a slow recovery time which involves lots of bed rest and a high-protein diet, explained Mrs. Petty.

"We're just hoping no one else comes down with hepatitis," she said.

Cooperative has served area for 45 years

May 11 marked the 50th anniversary of the Rural Electrification Administration (REA). It was less than five years after REA was formed in 1935 that the rural area of Mitchell County was brightened by the formation of Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative.

According to Kenneth Rogers, manager of the local cooperative since 1969, company records and past issues of the RECORD tell how the cooperative was organized in 1939 and that the first electricity to Mitchell and western Nolan counties was to start flowing "through lines east and north of Colorado City and around Loraine and Roscoe on or before March 25."

The company started with less than 140 miles of rural electrification lines installed to serve 396 "farm premises."

Presently, the company maintains 1,500 miles of line, explains Rogers, with 3,377 meters in six counties—Mitchell, Scurry, Nolan, Fisher, Borden and Howard. The company has 20 employees and boasts a total plant value of \$7.2 million.

Rogers estimates that it cost about \$485 a mile to build the first rural electric line. That cost today has soared to about \$10,000 a mile.

According to an April, 1940 edition of the RECORD, the electrification started in April of 1939. Prior to that time, there

had been several unsuccessful attempts to get rural electrification in the county. Only about eight farm homes in the county had electricity.

Early in 1937, about 14 miles of lines were installed in northern Mitchell county, extending from northeast of Colorado City to the Mitchell-Scurry county line and serving 36 homes. This line was built by the Texas Electric Service Company without involving an REA loan.

Joe C. Williams, a county agent, was instrumental in promoting REA. Among the men who were active in the work from the very beginning were Emmett Hale, Earl Brown, J. H. Carlock, Blane Morgan, R. C. Morgan, J. P. Nunn, Chester Beights, Mrs. Chester Hart, A. K. McCauley Sr., U. D. Wulfjen, A. J. Duncan of Roscoe, Lon Strain, Will Berry, W. T. Brooks and B. T. Webb.

In mid-June of 1939, the Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative was organized in order to obtain REA funds. The cooperative was granted its charter on Aug. 2, 1939.

Membership in the association was \$5. Each individual was responsible for wiring his own home. The rates were not to run more than \$2.25 per month for a minimum of 25 kilowatt hours where there were the three required memberships per mile.

Early officers of the cooperative include J. H. Carlock, presi-

dent; L. A. Strain, vice president; G. B. Slaton, secretary-treasurer; B. T. Webb, J. P. Nunn, E. B. Hale, T. W. Daughtrey, E. O. Mahon and A. J. Duncan, directors. Originally A. K. McCarley was president of the board. Charles C. Thompson and Dell Barber served as legal advisers.

The cooperative was granted an REA loan of \$145,000 on Oct. 18, 1939.

O. I. Griffin was project superintendent with Blanche McCarley as bookkeeper and R. C. Compton as project lineman. Contract for the building of the first unit was let on Nov. 24, 1939 to the Oman Construction Co. of Nashville, Tenn. Work began on Jan. 10, 1940, east of town.

The first section of 25 miles was energized on Monday, March 25, 1939. Homes served by the first unit of the project were located in the Longfellow, Valley View, Lone Star, Bauman, Looney, South Champion, Brownlee, Dorn, Fairview, Cuthbert and Horn's Chapel communities.

While A. K. McCarley Sr. was instrumental in the formation of the Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative, the tradition continues today with his son, A. K. McCarley Jr., serving as president of the current board. Other officers and board members include George Martin, vice president; Robert Holman, secretary-treasurer; Hubert Dunn, Danny Thompson, Martin Murphy (immediate past president) and Floyd Ritchey.

Medicare Update...

The volume and seriousness of cases involving the routine waiver of deductibles and coinsurance by some physicians and suppliers has grown dramatically.

In determining the reasonable charge for a service or item, the amount a physician or supplier actually expects to collect from the patient and/or third party payer, etc. must be considered. In this regard, a billed amount that is not reasonably related to an expectation of payment should not be considered as the "actual" charge for processing current Medicare claims or determining future Medicare payments.

Therefore, physicians or suppliers who routinely waive coinsurance and deductible amounts are at risk of having their customary charge reduced and an overpayment assessed, and subject to criminal prosecution.

Specific instances of routine waiver should be reported to the Medicare Program Integrity Department, P.O. Box 660031, Dallas, Texas 75266-0031.

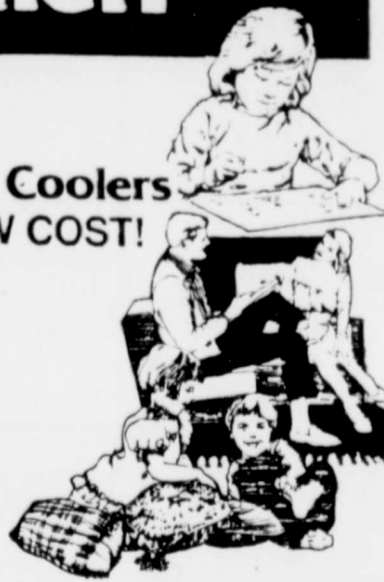

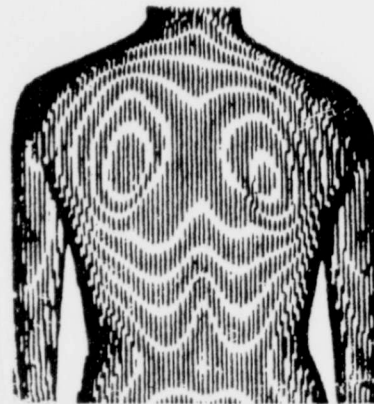

"Tomorrow Together" is the theme of the 1985 observance. As the 1985 booklet for the observance points out, human survival depends on other living things: the grasses and grain, fishes and birds, wild and domestic animals. And we all depend for our basic necessities on soil and water. Together, we must think about ways to preserve and renew the topsoil from which all our food comes. Together, we must work to purify and protect our waters.

In 1985, the soil conservation movement in America marks its 50th anniversary. During the Dust Bowl era of the 30s, conservation districts, local units of government, were founded to take soil conservation information and techniques out to farmers and ranchers. But their task has grown. Now conservation districts also work with urban and suburban citizens in protecting construction sites, school yards, shorelines and parks from erosion. And they are involved in work to clean up the nation's resources.

Since 1955, the National Association of Conservation Districts has sponsored Soil Stewardship Week, in cooperation with the nearly 3,000 conservation districts, as one way to emphasize the

"My father farmed, so lunch was the big meal and I had to prepare quite a bit of food because he was always hungry."

She learned to cook from her mom and she also took Home Ec in high school.

All of Mrs. Birmingham's children are grown and away from home. Her husband is not a picky eater, but he doesn't like

casseroles very much.

"The only time I prepare a casserole is when company is coming over."

Mrs. Birmingham likes to cook, but she likes to cook better in the winter.

Her favorite thing to prepare is whatever her children like best.

"When one of them comes for a visit, I'll make whatever their favorite dish is."

Mrs. Birmingham tries to prepare balanced meals and likes to broil meat.

Most of her cooking is from scratch and she doesn't like to

get a recipe unless she has tried it.

"We will be at someone's house and I'll try something and then ask for the recipe."

"I go by the recipe the first time and then I may change it up the next time."

There was a time when Mrs. Birmingham was growing up that she may have wished she hadn't tried the recipe at all.

She continues with the story.

"I had decided to make candy. My mom wasn't home. It was when the war was going on and sugar was rationed."

"I made the candy and tasted

of it and I guess I cooked it too long, because it tasted burned."

"I didn't want my mom to know I had goofed up, because of the sugar being rationed, so I got the candy and went outside and buried it."

She eventually told her mom and they get a good laugh about it now, "but I sure didn't tell her the day I did it."

Mrs. Birmingham and her husband Jim have five children—Mark of Littlefield, Linda and Vicki of Odessa, Patti of Garland and Joe, who is stationed in Camp Casey, Korea. They also have nine grandchildren.

Today she is sharing four of her recipes with RECORD readers.

SCALLOPED POTATOES

1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
Thick white sauce—1/4 cup flour

2 cups milk
1 teaspoon salt (pepper)
1 can mushroom soup
1/4 cup chopped pimento
1/2 cup carrots, shredded
1/2 cup celery
2-9 oz. bags frozen French fries
1/2 pound American cheese grated

Heat oven to 400 degrees. Melt butter, add green pepper and celery, cook until tender. Blend in flour, salt and pepper, add milk. Add other ingredients, 1/2 of cheese. Add potatoes and pour sauce over. Bake 25 minutes, sprinkle remainder of cheese, bake 5 minutes longer.

BANANA NUT CAKE

1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 cup Crisco
2 eggs
3 medium bananas
2 cups flour
Pinch of salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup nuts
1 teaspoon soda
Cream sugar and shortening. Add eggs one at a time. Beat well. Add other ingredients and mix well. Bake at 25-35 minutes at 350 degrees.

ICING

1 box powdered sugar
2 bananas
Nuts
Coconut
Mix and put on cake.

AMBROSIA

1 can 8 1/4 oz. crushed pineapple, drained
1 can 12 oz. mandarin orange sections, drained
1 cup mini marshmallows
3/4 cup flaked coconut
1 cup sour cream
Combine ingredients. Cover and chill several hours or overnight. Makes 4 cups-6 servings. Double recipe for more people.

POPCORN CAKE

1 cup butter
1 (1 lb.) pkg. marshmallows
4 quarts popped pop corn
1 cup peanuts
1 cup M&M candies
1 cup gum drops
In a large saucepan, melt butter and marshmallows together over low heat. In a large, deep bowl, mix all other ingredients. Add the butter-marshmallow mixture. Stir well. Pack in greased tube pan. Cool in refrigerator. Remove from pan, cut in wedges.

News from...

Root Memorial Hospital

The most common question that I am asked from Medicare patients is "When am I going to get my bill?" I would like to explain in simple terms the process that Medicare billing requires.

When a Medicare patient is admitted into the hospital, the insurance department sends to Medicare a report of admission. Medicare, in turn, sends the hospital a R.O.E. (Report of Eligibility). This report will give the hospital permission to file the claim or hold the claim until further notice. The report also tells the hospital if the patient has met their deductible or not. When the Medicare patient is discharged, they will be given a bill for \$400 (deductible) or for \$0.00. The hospital bill will be checked and reviewed for errors and then sent to Medicare. The payment of that bill is based on the doctor's diagnosis, commonly known as the D.R.G., and the hospital has to accept whatever Medicare pays. If the payment does not cover the total bill, the hospital cannot bill the patient for the difference. We have to accept it as paid in full. On the other hand, if the payment based on the D.R.G. is more than the bill, we can use that difference to help offset a loss on other bills.

It may not appear to be "just and right," but those are the rules. Medicare patients don't need to concern themselves with the hospital bill as a whole, because Medicare is only going to pay according to the doctor's diagnosis. The Medicare patient's concern should be with the deductible and getting that filed with their supplemental policy if they have one. Not only does Medicare pay according to the doctor's diagnosis, but Medicare patients have to meet certain criteria before they can be admitted and expect their bill to be paid by Medicare. Once admitted, the patients' charts are reviewed daily to see if they meet the criteria for staying in the hospital. If they fail to meet the criteria for staying in the hospital, the doctor has to make a justification for a longer stay or dismiss the patient.

This method is no longer being practiced only by Medicare, but is beginning to be implemented by a lot of common insurance companies as well.

We are in changing times where emphasis is being placed on medical necessity before treatment, and it should be, but this is creating nightmares for hospital and doctors alike. It is almost like a "cookbook" concept; if the hospital and doctor do not follow the recipe exactly, the end result will be less than desirable.

Additional justification and documentation requirements are being placed on the doctors and hospitals to justify that a person is sick and needs treatment, and that is not all bad, but the rules are changing and we all are having to change our ways of thinking and doing things.

Stock ponds now

Ponds are full of water and temperatures are rising, which means now is the time to stock fish. By June, water temperatures are usually too warm to safely handle fish. Fish farmers have been preparing all winter for the spring stocking season. Place your order now while the selection of species and sizes are good. Later, the species you want may be unavailable.

The USDA Soil Conservation Service normally recommends channel catfish, or blue catfish in ponds less than one surface acre. A commercially available catfish ration can be fed, or flathead minnows can be stocked for the catfish to eat. If largemouth bass are already in your pond, stock catfish that are at least 8 inches long and do not stock flathead minnows. You can feed your catfish a commercial ration which largemouth bass will not eat.

In larger ponds, several combinations of fish may be suitable. Species often recommended include largemouth bass, bluegill sunfish, redear sunfish, channel catfish, threadfin shad, golden shiner, and flathead minnow. For larger ponds and lakes, stocking recommendations should be tailored to each water body.

SCS personnel at Colorado City can help you with most aspects of pond management, including construction, stocking, fertilization, weed control,

and harvest. The county extension agent and game warden can also provide helpful information.
