Rains Cover Most Of Texas

The damaging hurricane which hit the Galveston - Houston - Laporte area early today brought torrential downpours to a number of East Texas points and the Weather Bureau said more rain and high winds were in prospect for that area this afternoon and early tonight.

Heaviest rain for the 24 hours ending at 6:30 A. M. today as reported to the Dallas Weather Bureau was 7.21 inches at Beaumont. Palacios reported 6.43 inches, Victoria 3.17, Palestine 3.06, Lufkin 3.02, Dallas 2.34, Fort Worth 2.34 and Mineral Wells 1.73. Houston had 5.32 inches for a 48-hour total, 2.55 inches of that falling in the last 24 hours.

The rains extended over virtually the entire state including the Panhandle and South Plains. The rains are expected to end tonight and partly cloudy weather was forecast for tomorrow.

The Dallas Weather Bureau placed the center of the hurricane at mid-morning approximately 60 miles northwest of Houston. Its force was diminishing rapidly with winds of not more than 50 miles when it reaches the Palestine - Lufkin area early this afternoon. It's expected to blow itself out in northeast Texas early tonight.

Although the hurricane struck a damaging blow to the rice crop in the Liberty - Chambers county area of East Texas, the rain it generated brought a halt to drought conditions existing in many parts of the state. The rains again allowed the harvest of the cotton crop, but other crops were expected to benefit from the moisture.

Overnight, the low was 49 degrees at Dalhart and 73 at Laredo. Yesterday's high was 90 at Palestine with the 72 the low maximum.

U. S. To Ignore Communist China

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (UP)—Foreign policy experts said today there appears to be no possibility that the United States will recognize the new Communist regime in China now or for a long time to come.

They said any Chinese regime, regardless of its political views, will need the United States far more than this country needs China. By withholding recognition, they said, America could be able to gain important cold war advantages.

Political quarters here face without concern the possibility that British recognition soon may be extended to the Reds. Such a step, they said, might well be dictated by the commercial interests of a nation facing bankruptcy, but it would not mean any Anglo-American split on Far Eastern policy. U. S. officials said an "effective concern" of far eastern policies was reached at big three talks here in mid-September.

HURRICANE DAMAGE PLACED CONSERVATIVELY AT \$1,500,000

HOUSTON, Tex., Oct. 4 (UP)

A small but savage hurricane struck Houston and Galveston today, driving 50,000 persons from their homes and causing damages estimated conservatively at more than \$1,500,000.

The howling winds hit the Gulf coast near Freeport, just west of Galveston about midnight and then roared inland, buffeting Houston with winds up to 90 miles an hour on the outskirts at an early morning hour.

As it moved slowly toward this teeming city of 750,000, the hurricane struck the small town of Laporte, inflicting several hundred thousand dollars of damage to bulkheads and wiping out piers.

However, it was believed that rice farmers suffered heaviest damages from the big blow.

A Liberty County agriculture agent said the winds struck heavy blows at the Liberty - Chambers County area.

County rice crop.

Great gusts of winds whipped the rice paddies early today, and farmers were not able to definitely determine their losses, but it was expected they would exceed \$1,000,000.

J. H. Trousdale, president of the Rice Growers Association, was making an overall survey but could not be reached for an official report.

Harris County Agent Dan Clinton said that half of the 27,000 acres of rice planted in the county would be lost and that the high winds and heavy rains had ruined 75 per cent of the 500-bale cotton crop.

Fortunately, Clinton said, about 70 percent of Harris County's 10,000 acres of corn already had been harvested but at least some 1,200 acres of standing corn would be lost.

The hurricane began losing some of its steam as it left Freeport behind, but heavy rains gave the farmers more misery.

At Palacios and Port Arthur, the 48-hour rainfall exceeded 10 inches. Galveston reported 6.07 inches, and Houston 5.32.

Leaving Freeport, the hurricane whipped a path through Angleton, Rosharon, Sandy Point, and then toward the surf pounding the seawall. But the rear wheels caught on the edge of the wall and the car was still hanging there early this morning.

Schools were closed at Galveston, but classes continued as usual at Houston.

RUSSIA REPORTED PREPARING TO SET UP EAST GERMAN STATE

BERLIN, Oct. 4, (UP)—Top Communist officials in the Soviet zone of Germany are preparing to establish an East German state by proclamation before Oct. 20, reliable sources said today.

Reliable German sources close to the Russian military government said Otto Grotewohl, co-chairman of the Communist Socialist Unity Party, would be appointed chancellor in the new state.

These sources said a foreign ministry would be included in the new government. Soviet satellites and Russia would immediately recognize the East German State, they said, and there would be an exchange of ambassadors.

Top German officials from the Soviet Zone have been summoned to Berlin for conferences on proclamation of the new state, it was reported.

These sources said the Soviet move would be aimed at preventing incorporation of the Western State into the western European union by playing on German desires for a single government centered in Berlin.

NLRB Rules Against Texas Freight Firm

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (UP)—The National Labor Relations Board today issued a "cease and desist" order to the Hearne Motor Freight Lines, Inc., Seagraves, Texas, directing it not to discourage membership in labor organizations.

The International Brotherhood of Teamsters, Chauffeurs, Warehousemen and Helpers, Local No. 577, filed the complaint.

The firm, which has terminals in Amarillo, Lubbock and Odessa, Texas and Hobbs, New Mexico, also was directed to "make whole" for any loss of pay they may have suffered by reason of the alleged discrimination against each of the following employees by the payment to each of them a sum set opposite his name: J. C. Meeks \$828; Johnnie Webb \$828, and C. B. Adams, \$1,106.

Rainfall Passes Normal For Year

Ranger's annual rainfall average has already been surpassed this year with 1.57 inches more rainfall than the average for 12 months which is 27 inches.

He pointed with pride to the fact that though living costs have risen 65 per cent in the last five years, the cost of electricity has declined 33 per cent. He said that electricity "is one of the few commodities, if not the only one, that costs less than before the war."

Pickens acted as toastmaster at the banquet and called upon the Rev. Cecil Ellis, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Ranger, for the invocation. He introduced Thomas and other guests, including Jack Lewis, manager of the Eastland District of the Company. Managers of the various company offices were introduced and presented the people from their towns.

During the dinner music was furnished by Ray Judy and his orchestra from Cisco.

Guests included employees of the Texas Electric Service Company and invited guests. Among the latter were T. M. Collier, representative of the 106th Legislative District, of Eastland; Bill Loving, state representative of Graham; E. W. Harrison of South Bend, member of the board of regents of Texas A & M College; and Charles Woolridge of Dallas, member of the board of regents of Texas Technological College at Lubbock.

Two Killed, One Injured In Wreck

WAXAHACHIE, Oct. 4, (UP)—Two men were killed and a woman critically injured three miles north of here last night in a collision on U. S. Highway 77 during a heavy rain.

The dead were identified as Joe Thompson, Jr., of Waxahachie, Ellis County clerk for the two year term ending last year, and J. W. Maupin of San Antonio.

The woman, unidentified as yet, was not expected to live, ambulance attendants said. She was in Waxahachie sanitarium.

The scene of the accident was almost the exact spot where 19 persons were killed in a truck collision two years ago.

To Reject Olds As FPC Member

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4, (UP)—A Senate commerce committee voted unanimously today to recommend that the Senate reject the nomination of Leland Olds for a third five-year term on the Federal Power Commission.

Subcommittee Chairman Lyndon B. Johnson, D. Tex., announced that the group—four Democrats and three Republicans—had voted 7 to 0 to report the appointment unfavorably to the full committee.

Inasmuch as the subcommittee is a majority of the full commerce committee, the unanimous vote is insured that the full committee would disapprove the nomination. Administration leaders privately are conceding that the Senate will follow suit and reject the nomination.

"I don't believe that any Senator who could have heard the testimony on his writings on his work would vote for his confirmation," Johnson told reporters.

Douglas White of Gatesville will assume duties Wednesday, Oct. 12 as assistant supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration in Eastland County. He will serve under George I. Lane of Eastland, supervisor.

White was formerly with the Veterans' Administration and is married.

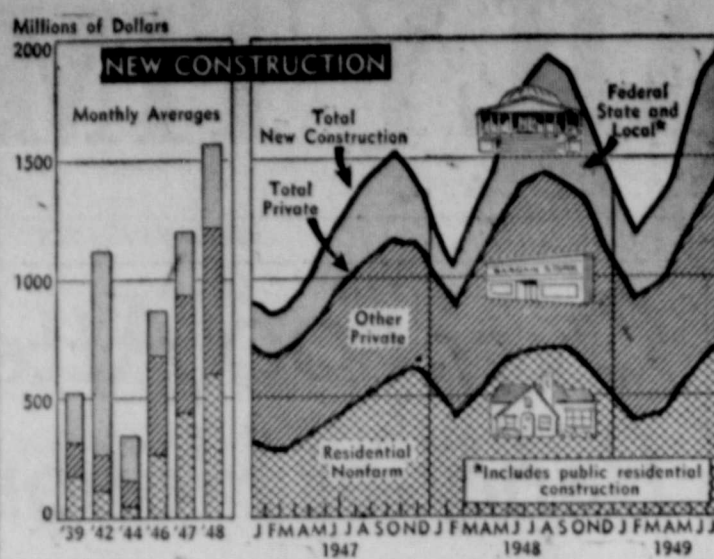

NEW CONSTRUCTION STILL BOOMING—The chart above, based on figures from the Departments of Commerce and Labor, shows trends of new construction in the United States to mid-year 1949. Total estimated new construction in July, 1949, was valued at \$1,913,000,000, compared to \$1,874,000,000 for July, 1948. This represented an increase of more than 9 1/2 per cent over June, 1949. Private building gained somewhat more than seasonally in July, and public construction somewhat less. Monthly averages for years since 1939 are given at left in the chart. New construction for this year appears well on the way to matching 1948's record monthly average value of \$1,565,000,000.

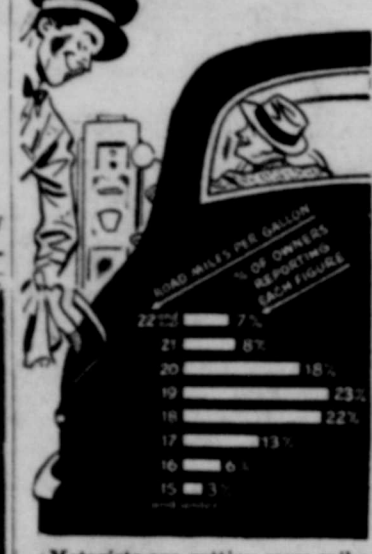
