

Tornadoes Win Athletic Meet

Clovis Johnson Is High Point Man

Dawson county was represented at the District meet held in Lubbock last week in every event including golf. The results published Sunday showed several winners of Dawson county representatives. Lamesa High School placed three pupils in declamation as follows: Billie Ruth King, third in Senior girls declamation; Charlotte Lockhart second in junior girls declamation; Joe Morris, second in junior boys declamation. Weldon Debnam of McCarty was second in the senior high school boys declamation and Pearl Ansley of Hancock and Billy Jones of Hancock won third and first in their rural school declamation events.

Pauline Tapp of Weaver won first in rural school essay writing.

Lamesa elementary school represented by Estelle Billingsley, Mary Ellen Lambeth and Mary Margaret Ridings won second place in Music Memory.

The Lamesa schools won second place for the entire meet being defeated by Lubbock schools by thirteen points. Lamesa authorities point out that Lubbock because of having more than 4000 children do not suffer eliminations in the county meet but go directly to the district in all events and that if the entries from Dawson county were totaled as were Lubbock's, that Dawson county would have led the field by a wide margin.

The one act play put on by the Lamesa High School pupils under the direction of Mrs. W. A. Stephens and Miss Thelma Merrick was awarded second place in this event with three of the four characters of the play being ranked in honor positions. Miss Marguerite Flanniken was voted the ablest player among the girls and Dick Collins and Elizabeth Arnett were voted honorable mention in recognition of their performance.

Lamesa was high ranking school in declamations by virtue of the points gained. Other points scored in other events with the exception of track and field were not listed.

Lamesa Wins Field and Track
Lamesa High scored another district victory in the colorful track and field meet. This school team piled up fifty-one points to the nearest competitor's fourteen and one-half points. Heretofore 20 to 30 points have been enough to win the meet. Clovis Johnson of the Lamesa Tornado squad accumulated individually more points than were obtained by any other school, by winning 16 1/2 points and now holds the district record for individual scoring. Johnson won first in the 100 yard dash, 440 yard dash, relay race and broad jump. Dawson county winners in the respective track and field events are as follows:

1 mile relay: Lamesa first, Johnson, Hill, Davis, and Cox.

Broad jump: Johnson, Lamesa, first.

Discus throw: Jack Hughes, Lamesa, first; George Gable, Lamesa, third.

Shot put: Sturdivant, Lamesa, second.

Javelin throw: Smith, Lamesa, first; Britt, Lamesa, third.

High jump: Cox and Britt of Lamesa tied for second and points were divided.

This victory following district victories in football and basketball completes the possible athletic victories for the 1933-34 school year in district circles. An unusual precedent has been set by local athletes by their all-around showings and they are bringing favorable comment by their spirit as shown when under the fire of competition.

District winners will compete in the regional meet to be held this week in Canyon at West Texas State Teachers College from which winners will go to the State meet held in Austin the first week in May.

Lamesa Postal Receipts Gain

Despite the cotton crop failure over most of Dawson County in 1933 the postal receipts of the local office show an increase of 9 1-2 per cent for the quarter ending March 31, 1934. Over the corresponding quarter of last year according to Post Master J. D. Dyer. He states that the volume of mail has increased to a considerable greater degree and that the money orders issued has amounted to nearly 30 per cent over the corresponding quarter for last year. Money orders issued during the quarter ending March 31, of this year amounted to \$44,452.59, as compared with issue of \$37, 304.36 of last year. From these figures it may be seen that apparently there is still too much money leaving LaMesa.

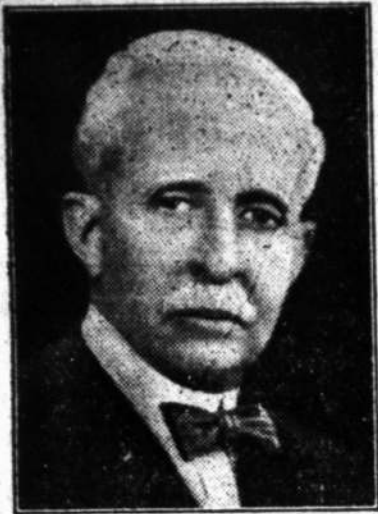
A. Trojan Dies At Home of Daughter

LOCAL STORE JOINING IN NATION-WIDE CELEBRATION

Store Looks for Biggest Business Since Opening, Says Manager

P. V. Alexander, Manager of the J. C. Penney Department Store here announced today that the local store had just completed receiving shipments of the huge quantities of new Spring merchandise purchased some months ago for special selling during the 32nd Anniversary Celebration of the founding of the company. The Anniversary, which is celebrated nationally in all Penney Stores begins tomorrow and will continue throughout the remainder of the month.

In commenting on his unusually

large shipment of goods, Mr. Alexander pointed out that the local Penney store was enjoying a good business since opening in Lamesa. "March went over big with us here," he said, "and the company as a whole had a large sales increase. The outlook is very encouraging and we are all set to shatter records in April."

Mr. Alexander called attention to the fact that the Penney Company in planning for this year's Anniversary Celebration, had bought in enormous quantities to supply all of their nearly 1500 stores, and hence had been able to buy very advantageously, so that prices could be kept at a low level.

"Regardless of increased costs in wages and overhead," said Mr. Alexander, "the Penney Company is maintaining its long established policy of passing to its customers every possible saving from advantageous buying and economical operation. This Anniversary was planned months ahead," he said, "and because of advantageous buying operations at that time we are now able to offer some items at prices even lower than last year's level."

"It is true," he continued, "that increased manufacturing costs have to be met, but the Penney Company, realizing that wages and incomes of a great many people have not kept pace with increased production costs, has endeavored to absorb these costs in economies in operation and carefully planned buying. In this way we are able to keep prices scaled down more in line with the income levels. RETAIL TOTAL OF 97,194 UNITS FOR CHEVROLET

Chevrolet dealers during the month of March delivered at retail a total of 97,194 units, according to William E. Holler general sales manager of the Chevrolet Motor Company.

This compares with retail deliveries in March a year ago of 41,093 units or more than 236 per cent of the 1933 March retail figure. This is the largest March retail sales reported since March 1930, Mr. Holler said.

Sales during the month just past bring the total up for the first quarter of the year to 177,271 units as compared to 124,574 units in the first three months of 1933, making the period 142 per cent of the 1933 quarter.

Large gains in retail deliveries of commercial cars and trucks are also reported by Mr. Holler. Deliveries by dealers in March were more than three times those of March a year ago, amounting to 25,974, commercial

cars and trucks and bring the total for the first quarter of this year up to 59,312. First quarter sales in the commercial field were more than doubled those of the same period in 1933. Mr. Holler pointed out, and established a record first quarter figure unequalled in five years.

600 SCHOOLS OF INSTRUCTION BEING HELD FOR CHEVROLET SALESMEN THIS MONTH

Detroit, Michigan, April 4.—In order to instruct Chevrolet's 25,000 retail salesmen on the extensive engineering advances in the 1934 models, 600 schools of instruction are being held this month throughout the United States.

The schools follow the general plan of instruction courses given under the direction of E. W. Timper, sales promotion manager, and J. M. Crawford, chief engineer of the Chevrolet Motor Company, at important points during the automobile shows. Some 4,000 retail salesmen got first hand information on the new mechanical developments at that time, and found the instruction so valuable as an aid in selling that the courses have been extended to include the entire sales body.

Preliminary to the opening of the schools, four men from each of the nine Chevrolet regional offices spent a week in Detroit and Flint, where Mr. Crawford instructed them thoroughly, bringing out the facts about each new engineering feature and the significance of each fact from the standpoint of the owner and operator. The new Y-K frame, with its vastly increased rigidity; new and more powerful engine, with greatly improved performance; "knee action" wheels, resulting in revolutionary comfort and driving ease; and other important developments, were explained fully, after which the 36 members of the class were dispatched to their respective territories to pass the information along to the sales organizations there.

Commenting on the program, W. E. Holler, general sales manager, said: "The policy of making the retail salesman 'engineering conscious' was determined upon because our 1934 line introduces the greatest array of engineering improvements made in recent years. By acquainting the salesmen with the magnitude of our engineering achievement, we expect to equip him with ammunition to make a real sales record this year."

Purity In Advertising

In turning through the advertising section of a nationally known magazine recently, I noticed several almost blank pages. In the center of each page was printed a stale joke. Right under the joke the notation was made that "We had a liquor ad scheduled for this page, but liquor advertisements are prohibited in your state so we had to print this 1921 joke." One can imagine the keen disappointment felt by the average reader.

There has been a good deal said in recent years about truth in advertising. Advertising agencies, better business clubs and trade journals have taken the position that advertising should build up confidence, and that the policy is to refrain from doubtful and extravagant claims for a product. But the line of cigarette advertising we have seen in newspapers and magazines in recent months seems to approach the extravagant if not the ridiculous. The old line "reach for a Lucky" was not so bad; you could do it or not as you chose. The fellow who would "walk a mile for a Camel" was perfectly within his rights. The brand that carried "not a cough in a carload" might have worked fine for some. "Nature in the raw is seldom mild" could be believed if one is not sentimental, and it gave the kiddies a fine opportunity to collect a zoo of the mightiest denizens of the jungle at no cost. The blindfold tests of brand A, B, and C seemed reasonable if one is very discriminating in taste.

But those ads of a bygone year were just the preliminaries. The ones we have now make us really think. At the risk of being called a "fogey" I will say that I find it hard to believe that it is "the Height of Good Taste" for a dream in a red dress to carry brand "A" jauntily parked in the cupid's bow or between slender fingers, or that brand "B" is a necessity (implied) for the best aviators, skyscraper riveters, rifle shots, and football coaches because "They Never Jangle Your Nerves," or that brand "C" is "Always Kind to Your Throat." If these statements are true every home in the land should keep a supply of all three to make sure that every member of the family would always be free from coughs, throat irritation, jangled nerves and always be in the height of good taste.

Three of the magazines recommended by the state for the schools almost invariably carry a full-page ad on the back cover illustrated in the most attractive colors possible by highly paid artists, showing beautiful women and brave men enjoying their favorite brand, and accompanied by statements that an intelligent mind can hardly accept as fact. This is not meant to be a blast against tobacco or the practice of

smoking, but for the major tobacco companies to conduct a nation-wide campaign to make every boy and girl in the land their regular customer by putting out the tommyrot, by word or implication, that this is "the Height of Good Taste" is a reflection on our intelligence and an imposition on the American people, and I for one protest.

Approval of Cotton Contracts Rushed

College Station, April 10.—Every effort is being made by district cotton review committees and the state review board to rush cotton contract approvals through to completion in order that Government cotton checks may begin pouring into Texas in April if possible, says the Extension Service at Texas A & M College. The first payment of 1934 benefits should amount to more than \$15,000,000 in Texas.

The long drawn out campaign slowed up the making of final county summaries and their checks and approval by district committees and the state board, it is pointed out. Clerical forces have been doubled in district offices to speed up the approval process, which cannot be completed until county figures are available and put in line with known production data of the U. S. Bureau of Crop Estimates.

FOR BIBLE STUDY

A Series of Twelve Brief Lessons

III. Most of the New Testament was originally written in Greek. Jesus himself spoke Aramaic, which was a late form of Hebrew—something resembling Armenian and Syrian languages of today. There have been found, during the past hundred or so years, more than 1400 Greek manuscripts, about forty of which are more than 1000 years old. Six of these date from the fourth and fifth centuries; two of these from the fourth century. These two oldest copies by the scholars, B and Alpha (A in Hebrew). B is in the Vatican library at Rome. Alpha, was found in a monastery on the slope of Mt. Sinai, taken to Russia and just recently it was bought by the British Museum from Russia for some \$500,000.

Now, there was no printing in those days. Everything had to be laboriously copied by hand. As a con-

sequence, no two manuscripts are exactly alike. To find what was originally written is a very hard task, for we haven't the original—we have only these late manuscripts. In order to find just what the New Testament writers really wrote, these manuscripts must be compared minutely.

The King James or Authorized version of the English Bible made in the year 1611, is based on what is known as the Received Text of Erasmus, revised by the Paris printer Stephanus, 1550. This Received Text is based on what is known as the Byzantine Text of about 350.

The English and American Revised Versions are based on the King James Version, along with the two oldest manuscripts we have, called B and Alpha, dating from the fourth century.

Other manuscripts have been found since these versions came out, and such translations as Moffatt and Godspeed are even more exact—they are even closer to what the New Testament writers originally wrote than we have been able to get heretofore.

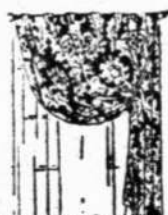

ON TEXAS FARMS

Honey June sweet corn, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station bred corn for Texas conditions, succeeded so well in Palo Pinto county last year that 16 of the home demonstration club pantry demonstrators there are planting it this season.

A feed bill of about \$1500 was replaced last winter by 200 tons of he-gari ensilage put in a trench silo by Joe Culver of Gregg county. In following the county agent's suggestion to do this he thought he was taking a big chance. Instead he made about \$300 on the deal as the silage cost \$6 per ton delivered to the cow. Mr. Culver says he will double his silage this year.

Celery started in a hot bed last spring by Mrs. R. S. McClure, farm food demonstrator of New Hope Home Demonstration Club in Ochiltree county, furnished the family tender, crisp celery late last winter.

A. C. Goodnight of Hays county, who has been operating by Extension Service methods several years, lets cows and hogs harvest the crops. His 219 acre farm is fenced and cross-fenced. The most profitable land on the farm is a permanent pasture, he states. He keeps a trench silo filled, and has sweet clover, alfalfa and peanuts in his fields to balance up the other feed crops.

In Shackelford county 86 home demonstration club women will take the guess work out of gardening by planting for each member of the family 584 feet of vegetables, divided equally between the four classes:

green or leafy, garden fruits, star-cashy and other vegetables.
