

Casey's resignation 'another Washington rumor'

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan says CIA Director William J. Casey has no plans to resign in the face of a Senate investigation into his past business dealings.

Casey, meanwhile, is quoted as saying his opponents are trying to drive him out by spreading false rumors that his departure is imminent.

From the White House to Capitol Hill, the Casey resignation report engulfed Washington on Wednesday, only to be dismissed as untrue.

Reagan, entering his limousine after leaving a Capitol Hill

reception, was asked if his long-time acquaintance planned to quit. The president stopped, shook his head and mouthed the same word "no."

Casey, who has been publicly unavailable for a week, was quoted by CBS News on Wednesday as saying he intended to stay. The network said Casey told one unidentified senator that reports he was leaving were started by people trying to force him out.

White House deputy press secretary Larry Speakes said he did not know the source of the reports.

The scrutiny of Casey's business dealings follows recent disclosure of two different federal court rulings criticizing his role as a director of Multiponics Inc., a failed New Orleans farming venture.

Casey, 68, a self-made millionaire, took the CIA job after running Reagan's campaign last year. He held three top-level jobs during Richard M. Nixon's presidency, including chairman of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

Casey has steadfastly denied the charges that his business ethics are questionable and has

said the suits involved in the court decisions were the type faced by any successful businessman.

The speculation about Casey's imminent resignation came as the Senate Intelligence Committee staff prepared to investigate the CIA director's business career. Last January, the panel approved Casey's nomination after a hearing lasting only 2½ hours.

"The committee assumed that someone at that level (CIA director) is subjected to an extraordinary and demanding background check," said Sen.

Patrick J. Leahy, D-Vt., a member of the committee. "That was certainly the case during the Carter and Ford administrations."

Another senator, who asked not to be identified, said "committee members are anxious to do now what they didn't do before" — thoroughly check Casey's background.

Spencer Davis, a committee spokesman, said Wednesday that information about Multiponics and other suits against Casey was in a briefing book for senators, but no questions were asked about those cases.

Attorney General William French Smith has pledged cooperation in the Senate inquiry, and investigators on Wednesday began searching Justice Department background files on Casey.

Many of the complaints against Casey have been previously reviewed by other Senate committees that approved him for previous government positions, although most of the reviews were brief.

A source on the committee said investigators want "additional details...about legal matters that might be hanging."

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Texas cities won't be new relocation centers

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal officials have ruled out two Texas cities — Big Spring and Los Fresnos — as future centers for Cuban or Haitian refugees, says Sen. John Tower.

The Texas Republican said that after he registered a strong protest, Justice Department officials assured him that neither Big Spring nor the Port Isabel training center at Los Fresnos fit into future plans for relocating Cuban or Haitian refugees.

Big Spring residents were caught by surprise last week when 100 Haitian refugees were moved to West Texas from the Krome Refugee Center in Florida.

But Tower said Wednesday that no more refugees will be sent to Big Spring and that those already there will be moved elsewhere in the near future, possibly within 30 days.

"The Department of Justice has notified me today of an agreement between the attorney general of the U.S. and the governor of Puerto Rico that will provide for the acceptance of approximately 800 Haitian refugees into facilities in Puerto Rico," Tower said.

As a result, there will be no further transfers to the former Air Force base at Big Spring, he said.

"Those Haitians already transferred to Big Spring will be

retained there only temporarily," Tower said.

The senator also said that the government is no longer considering relocating about 1,000 Cuban refugees now being housed at Fort Chaffee, Ark., at the Port Isabel facility.

"I have been assured by the attorney general's office that it is extremely unlikely that any further consideration will be given to the use of Port Isabel as a Cuban refugee center," he said.

Tony Bonilla, national chairman of the League of United Latin American Citizens, had on Tuesday released the contents of a memo from Attorney General William French Smith that discussed the possibility of housing about 1,000 Cuban refugees at Port Isabel.

"While no decision has yet been made regarding the Cuban refugees now being held at Fort Chaffee, Port Isabel is no longer under active review in either the Justice Department or the White House," Tower added.

About two weeks ago, Ellington Air Force Base at Houston was mentioned as a possible relocation site for Cuban refugees. Tower protested then, also, and won Air Force assurance Ellington would not be used to house refugees.

New criticism of Begin cropping up in capital

WASHINGTON (AP) — Embarrassed by Israeli bombing of Palestinian neighborhoods in Lebanon, American officials are becoming increasingly exasperated with Prime Minister Menachem Begin, calling him a major obstacle to peace in the Middle East.

A growing crisis of confidence in U.S.-Israeli relations was marked Wednesday by unusually strident criticism of Begin by Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger and Deputy Secretary of State William P. Clark.

But even though the White House said Weinberger was speaking for the administration, President Reagan indicated sympathy for the Israeli cause.

Israeli officials, meanwhile, defended Begin's actions, declaring that Palestinian forces have been receiving weaponry of "the most sophisticated kind" in recent months.

The harshest criticism of Begin came from Clark, Reagan's longtime friend, who was quoted as telling reporters during a closed breakfast meeting that the U.S. attitude toward the Jewish leader is one of "disappointment and maybe some embarrassment."

"Begin without question is making it difficult for us to help Israel," Clark was quoted as saying. "Our commitment is not to Mr. Begin but to the nation he represents."

The Begin government is pressing the administration to release F-16 jets ordered held back by Reagan, first because the Israelis used American-made warplanes in the June 7 bombing of an Iraqi nuclear reactor and later because of the fighting in Lebanon.

"Israel is simply not our only friend in the area," Clark was quoted as saying Wednesday. "You just don't ship gasoline to a fire. We have something of a crisis on our hands."

Weinberger, speaking on ABC's "Good Morning America," said presidential envoy Philip Habib was on the verge of a breakthrough in his marathon shuttle negotiations with several nations in the region when Israel launched air strikes against Palestine Liberation Organization targets in civilian neighborhoods of Beirut.

"I think that his course cannot really be described as moderate at this point," Weinberger said of Begin. "It is essential there be some moderation and some general realization of how volatile the region is and how quickly individual acts of violence or individual acts of aggression or retaliation, or whatever, can lead to something much more violent."

Reagan appeared more tolerant of the Israeli actions.

"Remember...that they are subject to repeated rocket attacks on civilian quarters themselves," the president told reporters as he returned to the White House from horseback riding in nearby Virginia. "We want an end to the violence on both sides."

Reagan refused to comment on Weinberger's statement that the Begin government has become an obstacle to peace, but the comments of Clark, Weinberger and other officials suggested the administration is holding Begin responsible for the latest escalation of fighting.

According to one estimate, for every Israeli who has died since the Israeli raids began July 10, some 80 Palestinians and Lebanese have died.

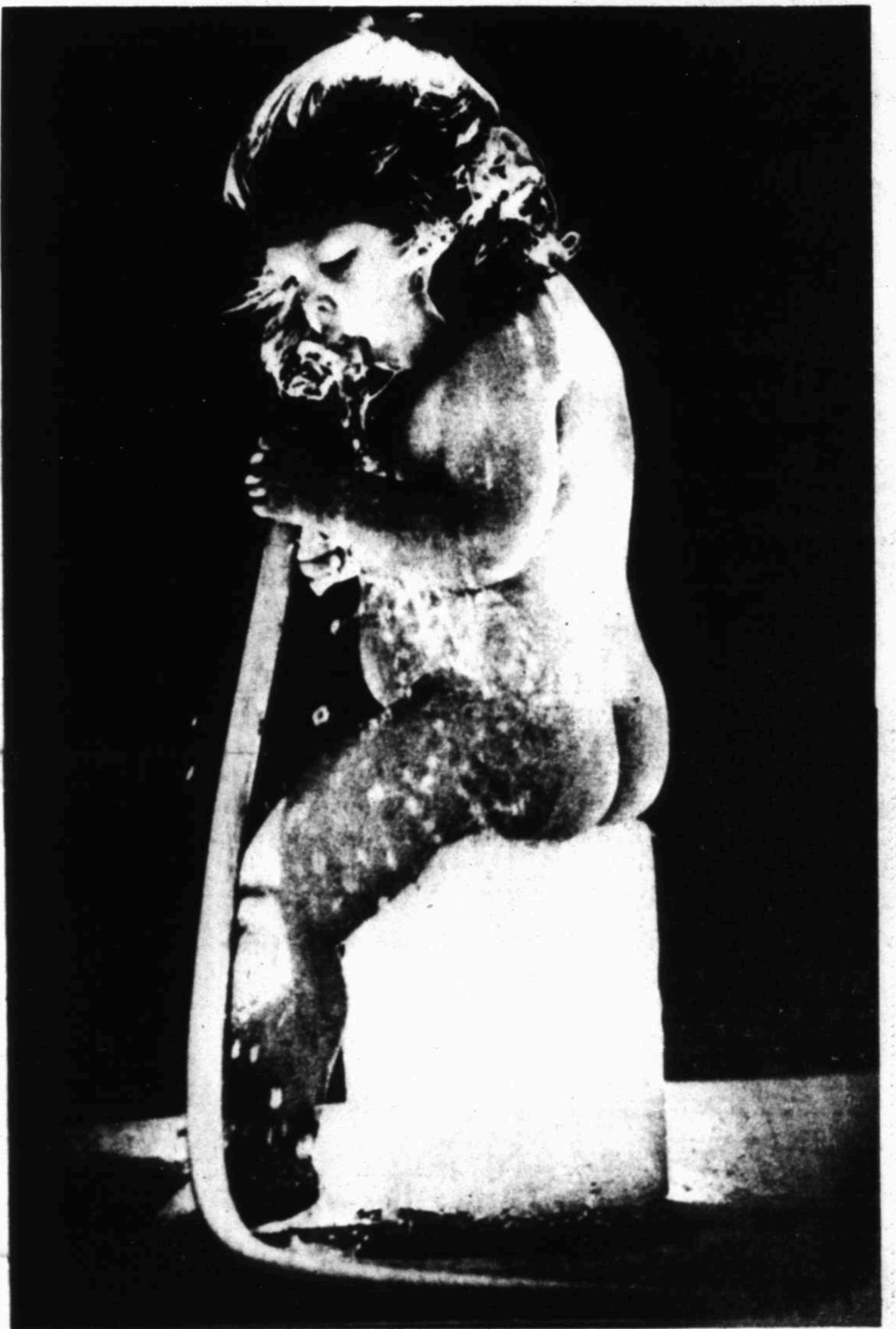
One official also denied Tuesday's decision by the Israeli cabinet to authorize Habib to meet with Lebanese officials on a cease-fire.

The official, who asked not to be identified, said Israel is well aware the Lebanese government is too weak to exert any authority over the Palestinians.

In an interview on the Public Broadcasting System's "MacNeil-Lehrer Report" Wednesday night, Israeli U.N. Ambassador Yehuda Blum acknowledged that the Lebanese government lacks authority over Palestinian guerrilla forces.

But he said Israel had no choice but to launch the attacks because the PLO has been receiving military hardware of "the most sophisticated kind" in recent months with the help of the Soviet Union, Syria, Libya and some Soviet bloc countries.

The PLO buildup has included tanks, rockets, rocket launchers and surface-to-air missiles, posing a "very serious threat" to civilians in the northern part of Israel, Blum said.

Temperatures nearing 1964 record

With no relief in sight, temperatures topped the 100-degree mark for the ninth straight day Wednesday, closing in on the 1964 record of 12 straight days of 100-degree weather, according to the National Weather Service at Midland Regional Airport.

Wednesday's high temperature was 103 degrees, breaking the record of 101 degrees set in 1974.

Wednesday's high was also the fifth time that an old record has been broken or tied in the past nine

days. The mercury was again expected to top the century mark today and Friday, with 101-degree highs expected both days. Tonight's low will be in the low 70s.

Winds will be out of the south to southeast tonight at 5-10 mph, increasing on Friday to 10-15 mph.

The record low for today was 53 degrees, set in 1978. This morning's low dipped to 70 degrees.

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Discrepancies difficult to trace

STANTON — The shortage or overage of crude oil piped through a maze of lines to a Big Spring refinery may not be readily detected, a Cosden Oil & Chemical Co. executive testified here Wednesday in the trial of an Odessa oil operator charged with trying to con the refinery out of money for crude oil which the plant allegedly never received.

"It's pretty hard to do," Sam Hunnicutt, Cosden's vice president for pipeline operations, said of discovering any shortages, losses or overages.

Between 40,000 and 50,000 barrels of crude oil daily are piped to the plant, which is a subsidiary of American Petrofina Inc.

And Cosden is alleging that D.C. "Butch" Wheeler, 52, the Odessa oil

operator who owns Jaco Oil Co., and his pumper and co-defendant, John Thedford Sims, 68, last January attempted to swindle Hunnicutt out of more than \$16,000 for about 450 barrels of crude oil which the prosecution claims the refinery never got.

The crude oil then was bringing \$37 per barrel.

IN A RELATED civil case, Cosden is suing Wheeler, Sims, Wheeler's Jaco Oil Co. and Wheelco Oil & Co. for "not less than \$1 million." Cosden is seeking recovery of money for crude oil the refinery allegedly never received from Wheeler.

The prosecution is contending that Wheeler and Sims had shut off the valve which allowed the flow of oil to the refinery after Cosden's gauger, Rayford Liles, had opened the valve on Wheeler's 250-barrel stock tank and left to care for other chores.

That and alleged similar ploys would indicate that crude oil was being piped to Cosden but supposedly never was. The prosecution also is speculating that Wheeler and Sims may have diverted the oil to a holding tank while the gauger was gone and then pumped the same oil back to the tank stock in a scheme to sell the same batch of oil over and over again.

Hunnicutt, a former gauger himself, testified before an eight-man, four-woman jury in 118th State District Court here that under Cosden's feeder pipeline system, it would take approximately two months to isolate and eventually to track down the source of any losses or shortages from the field.

Testimony indicated that gauger Liles, who still works for Cosden, had certified on run tickets that approximately 225 barrel of oil was pumped

from Wheeler's W.B. Currie lease south of Big Spring on Jan. 1 and again on Jan. 5.

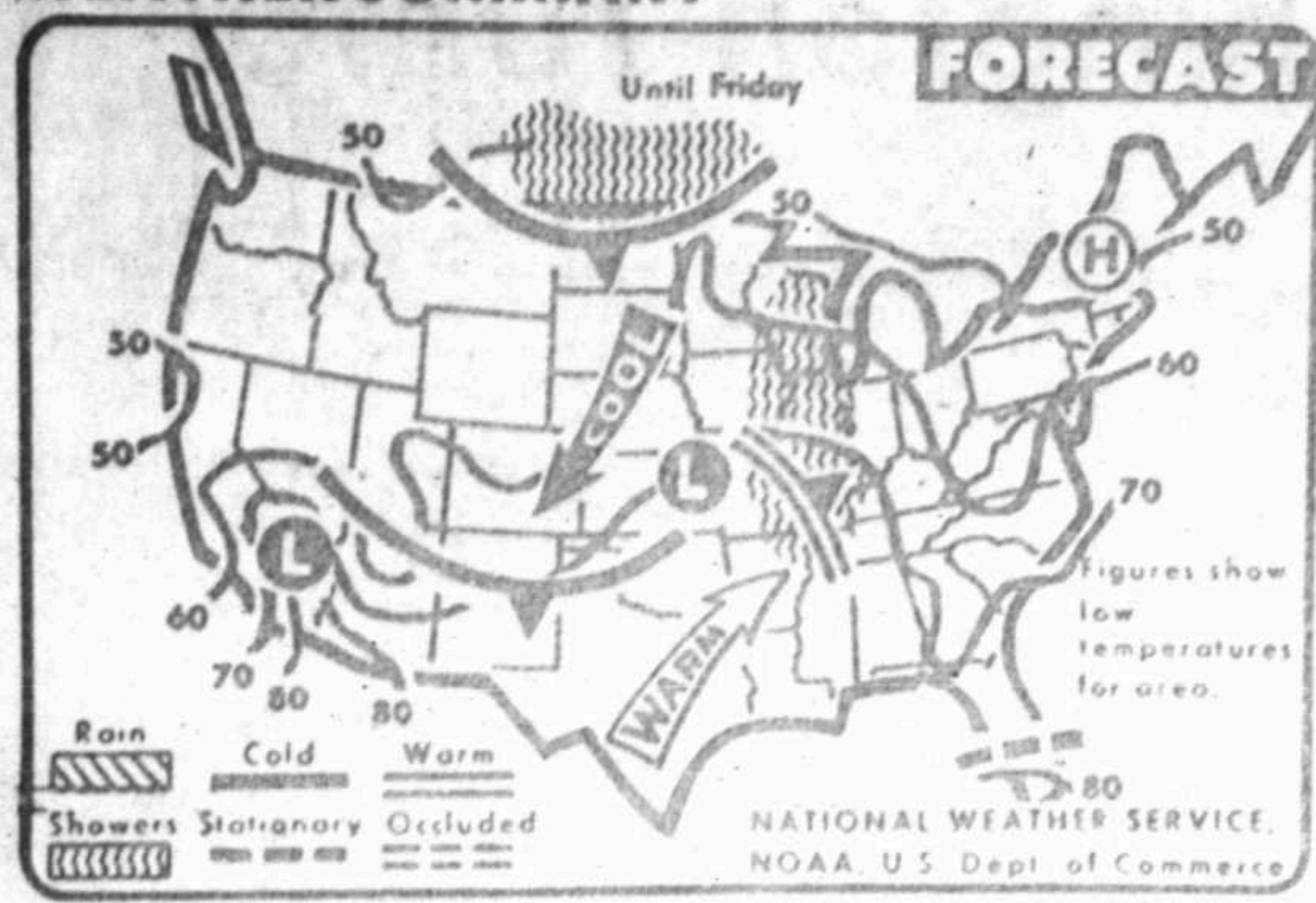
The daily allowable on the three production wells at the lease is 76 barrels, but Texas Railroad Commission officials said the lease was not capable of such sustained production.

Under questioning by prosecutor Don Richard of Big Spring, Hunnicutt said that he had never authorized payment for oil which was not transported by Cosden's pipeline system.

Testimony indicated that payment for the Jan. 1 and Jan. 5 flows from Wheeler's stock tank had been authorized but that payment was stopped by Cosden's legal department

Acid leak forces evacuations near California town

BLYTHE, Calif. — A poisonous cloud billowing 1,000 feet into the sky forced an estimated 2,100 people to evacuate homes Wednesday on

both sides of the Colorado River when nitric acid began to leak from a tank truck on the outskirts of Blythe. Officials said no one was seriously injured by the bright-orange acid fumes, though about 10 law enforcement officers

suffered breathing difficulties or heat exhaustion during the day. The cause of the leak was not immediately determined, but a spokesman from the California Highway Patrol said that a repair crew from the W.S. Hatch Co. of Los

Angeles — operators of the vehicle in charter to the Air Force — arrived to repair the damage Wednesday afternoon. Meanwhile, the leaking tanker remained parked on the side of Interstate 10, about a quarter mile from the Colorado River, and work

crews had built a dike around the vehicle in hopes of containing the spill. Although no traffic jam was reported on the California side (highway patrol officers blocked Interstate 10, and de-

toured traffic to other bridges over the river to the north and south) westbound vehicles were reported backed up in an almost stationary mass stretching for four miles on the Arizona side of the river, and Arizona State Police reported a few

"minor" traffic mishaps. Lt. Arthur B. Wilson III, Blythe commander for the CHP, said the fumes from the spill constituted the real danger.

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16 wildcat tests scheduled in Permian Basin counties

Area operators have announced plans to drill 16 wildcats and a discovery announced in Runnels County.

MITCHELL COUNTY

Cabana Oil Corp., Abilene, will drill the No. 1 Walker, a 5,000-foot wildcat in Mitchell County, two miles east of Colorado City.

Location is 1,500 feet from the south and 1,450 feet from the west line of section 37, block 26 of the TPRR survey.

Drill site is four miles south-southwest of Belco No. 1 Barkley, abandoned Aug. 26, 1974 at 5,000 feet.

CRANE COUNTY

Gulf Oil Corp., Odessa has scheduled a 3,900-foot wildcat re-entry in Crane County, 15 miles southwest of Crane.

The No. 36 J.B. Tubb "A" is located 660 feet from the south and west lines of section 21, block B-27 of the PSL survey.

The original completion was October 1979 but due to uneconomic production in the Tubb formation an attempt will be made to recomplete in the San Angelo formation.

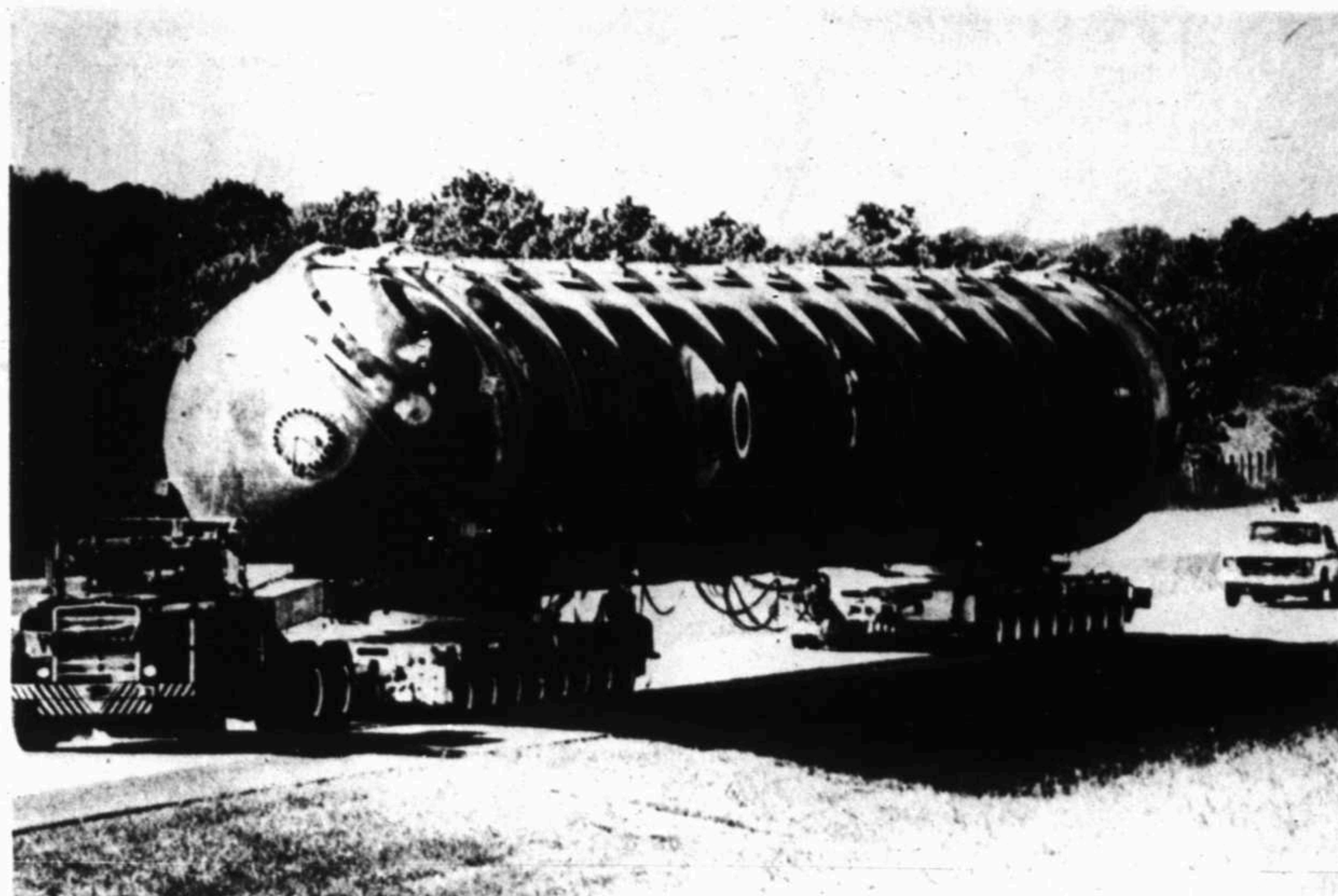

New void not significant, officials say

HOUSTON (AP) — A void found in the latest major concrete pour at the South Texas Nuclear Project was termed "not significant" by a team of officials of two companies involved in building the plant, a federal licensing board has been told.

Ralph Hernandez, a supervising engineer for Houston Lighting and Power Co., said Tuesday that a group of top officials from that utility and Brown & Root termed the void insignificant after inspecting the pour, which was made June 26.

The new void occurred even though

House committee approves tax relief for oil industry

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Ways and Means Committee, ending more than two months of work on a huge tax-cut bill, saved the trickiest issue until the end. Two hours past midnight, the panel today voted tax relief for the oil industry.

The Democratic-controlled committee, claiming it was forced by the

Republican-dominated Senate Finance Committee into a bidding war for votes of oil-state lawmakers, approved a package worth \$6.4 billion to oil producers and owners of oil lands over the next five years.

That is about \$300 million more than the Finance Committee approved but considerably less than the \$20 billion now advocated by Republicans on the Senate floor.

The amendment was added to the committee's plan for reducing individual and business taxes by \$640 billion over the next five years.

Rep. Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., chairman of a Ways and Means task force that wrote the committee's plan for helping the oil industry, apologized for raising the issue on the tax-cut bill. But, he added, the Democrats' hand was forced when the Finance Committee made the first move.

Since President Reagan won a big budget victory in April with the help of a handful of conservative Southern Democrats, the Southerners have been courted ardently by leaders of

both parties. Their votes could determine whether the president's tax-cut plan or the version backed by Democratic leaders will become law.

Many of those Southerners are from oil states. And that means they are against the "windfall profits" tax imposed last year at the insistence of the Carter administration on revenues derived from decontrol of oil prices.

The plan advocated by the Ways and Means Committee would allow all oil producers, big and small, to exempt from the windfall tax the first 500 barrels of newly discovered oil pumped each day. Oil from old wells could be exempt at the rate of 100 barrels daily in 1982-84, rising to 350 barrels in 1986. But the total daily exemption for any type of oil could not exceed 500 barrels.

Royalty-owners — those who own oil-producing land — would get a \$2 500 tax credit this year and then daily exemption of one barrel in 1982, two barrels in 1985 and 3.5 barrels in 1986. That would be worth \$10,000 to \$20,000 for an average royalty-owner, congressional aides estimated.

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Reagan pleased by summit

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan says French President Francois Mitterand broke the diplomatic ice and British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher provided key practical advice at this week's seven-nation economic summit.

The president made the assessments in post-summit interviews published today in The New York Times and the Washington Post.

When the three-day meeting started with a dinner attended only by the leaders and their interpreters, Reagan said, Mitterand stood and declared, "I want to make it very clear to all of you that France will absolutely honor all of its obligations to the NATO alliance."

That remark by the French socialist led to a "free-flowing discussion" among the group, according to Reagan, who said he was "a little bit" surprised by Mitterand's "resoluteness with regard to the Soviet threat."

"He's a man that, I would say, is more in line with the thinking of all the rest of us," Reagan said. "The statement of his country's position and what it's going to be would have sounded like me or anyone else."

Reagan singled out Mrs. Thatcher as coming up

with acceptable compromise language when several impassioned developed over the wording of the final communiqué.

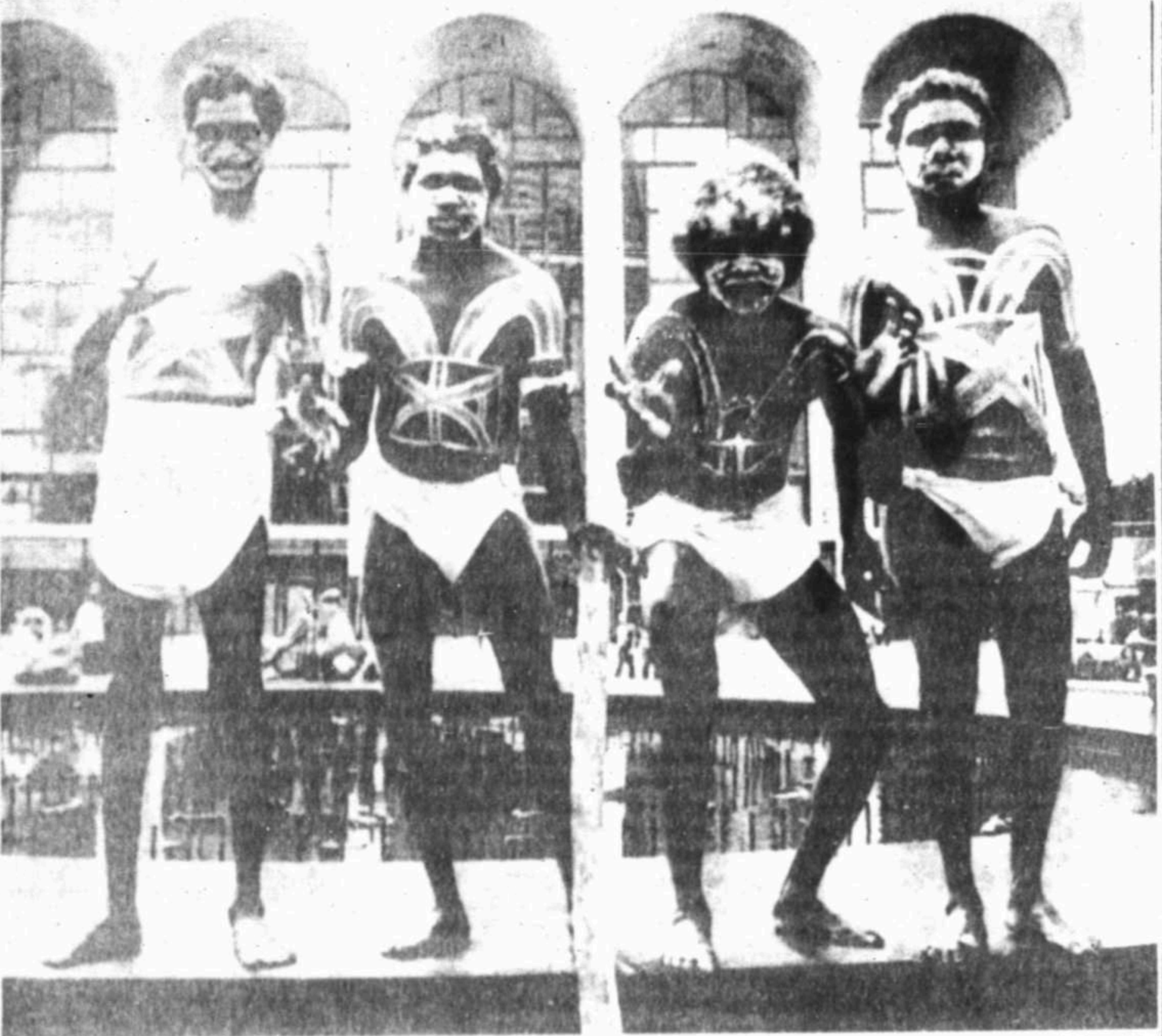
"There were many times in those meetings when it was Margaret Thatcher who spoke up and put her finger on the thing we were trying to resolve," he said.

Reagan also said that at the first dinner meeting she proposed eliminating prepared statements, which resulted in a "free-flowing discussion."

"The funny thing is, and maybe this is what made it such a successful summit, it happened that first night. I think that by the time that evening was over, it was really loosened up. We were all acquainted," he said.

Reagan said he went to Canada concerned that he would be on the defensive because of European criticism of high U.S. interest rates but left feeling that the other nations understood American policies better and "wish us well."

"Why, just the very fact of negotiating all the various problems and getting to personally know these other individuals, getting into a really first-name basis, I think, is worth it in gold," he said.

Soviet lashes out at comparison

MOSCOW (AP) — A senior Soviet official lashed out today at "democratic" political figures who find similarities between NATO and Warsaw Pact policies.

Vadim Zagladin, a ranking member of the party's international information department, implied criticism of leftist politicians in Western Europe and elsewhere who argue that both Moscow and Washington are responsible for the arms race and other world problems.

Zagladin, writing in the party newspaper Pravda, said equating "socialism and imperialism or the Warsaw Pact and NATO... papers over the question of the struggle against the real source of the military threat — imperialism — and confuses the masses and weakens their peace-loving potential."

Zagladin offered praise for the work of Communist parties in West Germany, Belgium, Holland, and

some other areas. But he did not mention the French and Italian parties, among the world's largest.

The Italian party has long been a "Eurocommunist" body with an independent line from Moscow. Soviet sources say Moscow is still waiting to judge the wisdom of the French Communist Party's entrance into government.

Zagladin also attacked "certain comrades who make no objective criticisms of socialism, in effect putting its historic achievements in doubt." He did not name the "comrades," but may have been referring to Polish communists who abandon what Moscow sees as key Marxist-Leninist principles.

Zagladin also complained of "some representatives of leftist forces" who worry that support for national liberation movements can threaten peace by raising overall world tension. He said present conditions make the struggle against "imperialism" increasingly important.

Downed plane apparently Argentine

MOSCOW (AP) — Argentine diplomats said today they are trying to confirm that an Argentine cargo plane collided with a Soviet aircraft and crashed over the weekend in mountainous Soviet Armenia.

The official Soviet news agency Tass issued a cryptic report Wednesday on an air collision and crash but did not identify the foreign plane. The Argentine Foreign Ministry in Buenos Aires subsequently said Soviet fighters intercepted an Argentine plane near the Soviet-Iranian border and nothing had been heard from it.

"We have been looking for the plane since Sunday," an Argentine diplomat in Moscow said today. "We have asked Soviet officials, but have received no response."

The missing plane was a cargo craft owned by the private Argentine line Transporte Aereo Rioplatense and was on route from Tehran to Cyprus, the diplomat said. He said there were conflicting reports on the number of crew members, ranging between three and six.

Iranian Ambassador Mohammad Mokri said he received no official notification of the incident from Soviet authorities.

Tass, in the first report of the crash, said:

"On July 18, an unidentified plane entered the airspace of the Soviet Union in the area of the city of

Yerevan from the direction of Iran. The crew of the plane did not respond to any inquiries by Soviet ground air traffic control services and to attempts to render help to it, and continued its flight over Soviet territory, performing dangerous maneuvers. Some time later the plane collided with a Soviet plane, crashed and burned."

The failure to specify the nationality of the aircraft and the number of casualties could indicate that the wreckage was in the mountains, and a search party had not reached it.

In Buenos Aires, a Foreign Ministry official said the Argentine cargo plane "upon entering Turkish territory from Iran changed its route for reasons unknown and headed for the Soviet border, where it was intercepted by that nation's military aircraft."

The last reported incident of foreign intrusion into Soviet airspace occurred in April 1978, when Soviet interceptors forced a South Korean jetliner to crash-land on a frozen lake in northern Russia, killing two people on board.

The pilot and navigator of the Korean plane later pleaded guilty to violating Soviet airspace and were pardoned and released.

The tone and content of the Tass dispatch on the weekend crash differed markedly from its coverage of the 1978 incident, when it said "fighter planes intercepted the violator."

Modern arms flowing into Lebanon

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration's drive for a cease-fire in southern Lebanon is complicated by a steady flow of modern arms into the region, according to Pentagon and diplomatic officials here.

While delivery of American F-16 fighter jets to Israel has been suspended, the United States has shipped howitzers, Hawk surface-to-air missiles and military vehicles to the Jewish state.

Libya, meanwhile, has equipped the Palestinian Liberation Organization with SAM-7 and SAM-9 missiles, a Pentagon official said.

Over the last several weeks, the PLO has received 130mm howitzers, probably from Syria, and F-34 and T-55 tanks, and BM-21 portable rocket launchers from Libya. All this equipment is Soviet-made, although the Reagan administration does not think the Soviets are directly supplying Yasser Arafat's organization, officials say.

Some cannons, which have a range of 27 kilometers, have been fired on northern Israeli settlements, but otherwise the weapons apparently have not yet been trained over the border.

However, the SAMs were shot at Israeli planes flying over southern Lebanon, and Israeli raiders

blew up one of the SAM-9 missile batteries shortly after Col. Moammar Khadafi, the Libyan leader, shipped them to the PLO.

Israel, meanwhile, has been deprived only of 10 F-16 fighter jets by the Reagan administration. Delivery of four was suspended last month after the Israelis bombed the Iraqi nuclear reactor near Baghdad. The other six were delayed this week after Israeli pummeled PLO positions in civilian population centers in southern Lebanon.

This has not interrupted the U.S. commitment to supply Israel with several kinds of missiles, tanks, guns and armored personnel carriers. Two hundred M-60A3 tanks are to be delivered through next summer. Two F-15 jets are scheduled for shipment within a month. Thirteen others are due for delivery by next spring.

The PLO's growing arsenal carries the potential of widening the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, according to Pentagon and State Department officials.

"This stuff isn't as much a serious military threat as a political threat," said a State Department analyst who did not want to be identified. "As long as the cannons are firing on Metulla, Nahariya and Kiryat Shmona (northern Israeli settlements), the Israelis have to take action."
