It's a disgusting situation

One can't help but be thoroughly amazed at Governor Dolph Briscoe coming out virtually at the last minute against the entire new state constitutional package to be voted on across Texas Nov. 4.

If this state has such little leadership it can spend five million bucks rewriting the constitution and then have the No. 1 official oppose the whole shebang. It is time a lot of faces were changed on the Austin scene.

The governor sounds to us like a man who figures the amendments will lose so he wants to be on the right side of the issue come Nov. 3 — and thereafter.

For the last two years while the new constitution convention wrote a new constitution that failed to pass legislative muster the first time, but did the second with the "right to work" controversy run onto a siding, where was Briscoe?

He was just sitting in his office with his mouth shut instead of helping to mould the new document to his liking and using his influence to help get it approved by Texas voters.

We agree with our Statebeat columnist, Kurt Johnson, that the new constitutional package has practically no chance, but we are not nearly as cynical of what's in it as he is.

Sure, the new package isn't just exactly the way we would like to have it, but it makes a lot of improvements.

Our 1876 constitution has now been amended 220 times, and if it is to keep pace with our fast changing world probably will

need another 220 amendments or so in the next 20 years alone.

We've complained for 40 years that the old constitution has put state government in a strait jacket and needs to be modernized. Now that it has been updated — no easy chore — opponents argue that it gives the legislature too much power.

Don't forget getting the power to solve problems facing it has been the legislature's No. 1 problem for the last half century.

We don't think the new document has any booby traps or cunning surprises. Nobody has found them yet anyway.

The voter is naturally a suspicious person. The only way Texas will ever get a majority approval of a constitution from the voters is for the leadership at the state level to unite in support of a new constitution.

Since the present leadership is too fragmented and the governor wants no part of the process there is no chance Nov. 4.

The Dispatch thinks the new constitution is not perfect but is progress and supports it. But we think it is doomed to defeat at the hands of the voters who have had little opportunity to understand it and have lost their trust or faith in politicians.

After that happens Nov. 4 we shall vigorously support some new leadership for Texas at the state level, beginning with the governorship right on down the line.

We, the people, have been short-changed by the present bunch, and inflation has nothing to do with it. It's disgusting.

Chamber is moving ahead

The Post Chamber of Commerce is really moving ahead this year.

Merchants were invited to a meeting in the community room last Thursday night to hear some fresh promotional ideas from Jim Ferrell, manager of the Plainview Chamber of Commerce. A good turnout was on hand too.

The retail promotions committee met after the general meeting with Ferrell and adopted a new Christmas promotion plan—an all expenses paid trip for two to someplace nice—as a Christmas giveaway this year instead of the smaller cash drawings.

Chamber President Ed Bruton also announced at the meeting that the Chamber has ordered \$1,132 worth of Christmas tree light pole decorations for the upcoming yuletide season in downtown Post. The city is paying \$500 of this cost and merchants will be solicited for most of the remainder.

Both are good moves. They indicate Chamber leadership is moving ahead with new ideas. And that is what the Chamber needs.

The Chamber is having a good year.

The Post commemorative medals project has aroused a lot of interest and eventually should turn in at least a modest profit. It was new and different.

The Chamber office has been moved to a point of high visibility for travelers through Post

in the former city police building on US-84. And that office has been remodeled and an attractive sign erected. If the parking problem can be solved, the office will be ideal but that needs working on with city cooperation.

New members have been added to Chamber rolls. A successful July 4th celebration has been conducted.

Upcoming next will be a move to increase dues of the organization—something that has been needed doing for several years—so that the Chamber is on sound financial footing. A new dues formula is being explored and you'll hear more on this later. Inflation has just eaten up the Chamber budget so something must be done in this area. It is one of the tough jobs, but one of the essential jobs.

Chamber Secretary Joy Greer has injected a lot of new ideas into Chamber work here and is doing a fine job. Chamber president Ed Bruton is giving the Chamber, firm and businesslike leadership. The board of directors are interested and busy.

Total it up and the Chamber is rapidly moving to the front. The Christmas projects are just another illustration of the fact.

All of which means the Chamber is deserving of all the support the business community and the agri-business community can give it.

Council move applauded

The Dispatch is pleased that the city council has given the go-ahead to a Lubbock architectural firm to draw up plans for the first phase of the conversion of the former Parrish Grocery building into a community-youth center.

What's more an overall plan for the whole project will be sketched by the architect so that the council and Post folks can see how the project can be developed after the first phase.

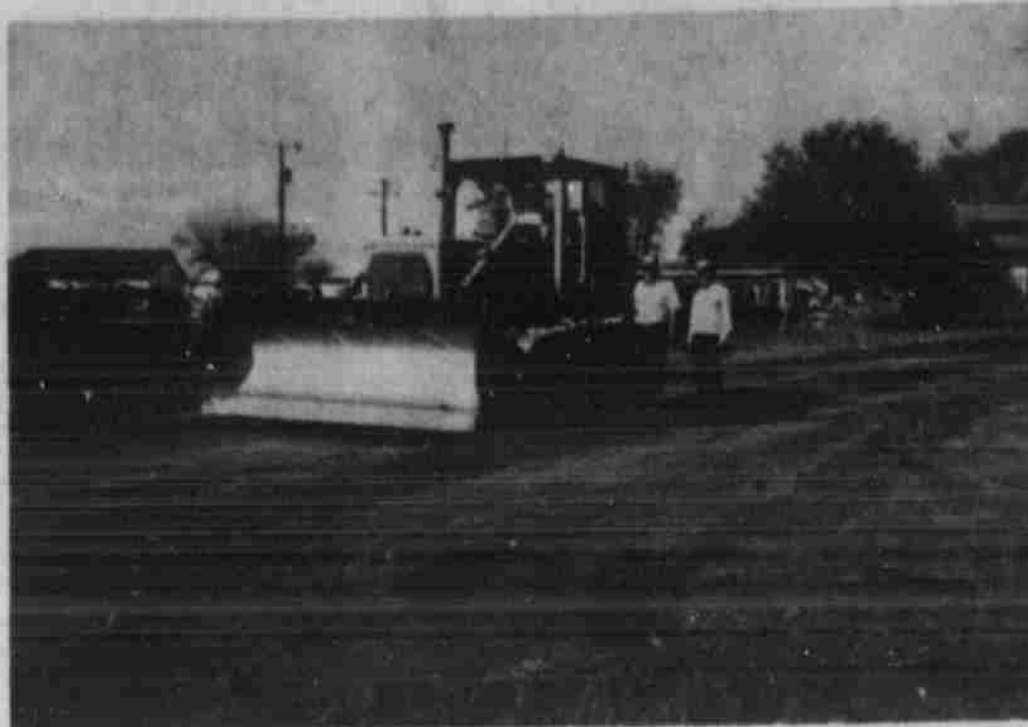
What the council obviously will be trying to do will be to finance the conversion without a bond issue and on their own, with the county stepping into the joint effort by providing the operational budget once the center gets rolling. Of course a whole lot of planning and work

remain. But we are happy to note the plans didn't bog down at the very beginning. A worthwhile center is within reach.

And all you folks who have wanted one for so long can help your cause by continuing to tell your mayor and councilmen so. The "antis" don't have to be encouraged to express their opinion. For some reason negativism is like that.

It will be a month before preliminary plan can be looked at and it probably will be around the first of the year before a construction contract can be let and work actually begun.

Planning takes time and this one needs to be planned right.

Statebeat

AUSTIN — The big news in dome city this week was that Governor Briscoe called a press conference on one-hour notice and then spilled the beans all over the new constitution. Not only did he say that he's against it, but he said that he's against all of it and in general thinks the whole thing is pretty rotten.

It was a semi-turnaround for the Governor, who on April 8 of this year, during the regular session of the 64th legislature, released a statement exhorting both houses to pass the document on to the voters for a vote. It sounded at that time like he was really backing it. But, after months and months of failing to take a stand, he surprised observers by really lambasting the whole program. Most folks thought he would just sit silently on the matter and let the vote process on through.

Probably the most wounded of all Briscoe's political aficionados was House Speaker Billy Clayton, who had worked hard for passage and was obviously hostile at the Briscoe position. They might well be friends no more.

In addition, the Lt. Governor (Hobby) and Attorney General (Hill) are for the new treaty, and Briscoe had to come down at least a notch in their books. Clayton was still contending on the day of the press conference (Oct. 14) that the submission will have a good chance of passing (contrary to all the evidence presented in STATEBEAT, but it is obvious that the Speaker is only grasping at straws. Even with Briscoe's blessing, the new constitution would not even have been a long shot. At this point the gun isn't even loaded.

On the morning of the 14th, a fellow named Richard Harvey of United Business and Industry Inc., (registered as a lobby group with the Secretary of State) announced the results of a poll, indicating that 96 per cent of its membership is opposed to the new constitution. The conclusion is consistent with interpretations of voter sentiment as expressed in this column before. Harvey, by the way, is from Tyler and a good friend of Sen. Peyton McKnight of that same city, leader of the Citizens to Preserve the Texas Constitution.

At another press conference at the capitol this week (this time on Oct. 15), the Commissioner of Agriculture, John C. White, announced that he is heading up Lloyd Bentsen's presidential campaign from Texas. Reporters were pretty tough on the Bentsen candidacy, asking questions like, "Will the fact that Bentsen will be running both for the presidency and a senate seat hurt his chances?" White's answer was no, but the fact is still in dispute.

Latest word has it that Judge O. P. Carrillo will get the full dose from the state Senate after he gets back from his sentencing in Corpus Christi on Nov. 18 for income tax evasion charges. He also has yet to face theft charges emanating from a Jim Wells County Grand Jury, and the state's Judicial Qualifications Commission is only now beginning what will probably be an excruciating inquiry. The Senate is tough to predict, and anything is liable to happen when that body comes out of adjournment to take up the case again. But the best current guess is that no matter what any other court or board of inquiry does, the matter will boil down to a final vote in the Senate after weeks of belabored testimony.

The publication date is drawing near for a new state document known as THE TEXAS REGISTER, published under the auspices of the Secretary of State, Mark White. The 12-page volume will come

out twice a week and contain all kinds of new rules being adopted by State Agencies, along with Governor's proclamations, opinions of the Attorney General, and other goodies. Subscription price will probably be around \$25 per year, according to an inside source. Information can be had by writing to the TEXAS REGISTER DIVISION, OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE, Commodore Perry Building, Suite 550, Austin, Texas 78701.

The Register is actually an outgrowth of the Administrative Procedure and Texas Register Act, which was passed during the 64th session. It requires the public disclosure of information about state government which was previously held in very inconspicuous places. At the very least, it will give citizens' attorneys easier places to look when filing suits regarding this state's policy and process on matters of administrative law.

With the virtual certainty of the new constitution's failure, there of course will not be a session of the legislature in 1976 (particularly since Briscoe is not about to call a special session). It also means that a lot of political activity that was being anticipated by both lobbyists and legislators as of last spring simply won't occur, thus making nerves edgy for the long wait until the next session rolls around in 1977. You had better believe that the

65th session will be one of the hottest on record, and the issue of personal income taxes will be right up there at the top of the list.

And since the old constitution will be preserved, the big issue of State Agencies owning printing presses will come to the fore like a dog after a rabbit. The old state charter prohibits agency ownership of such equipment, and commercial printers are already lining up the ducks to get on the big state printing gravy train.

When you think about it, there won't have to be a session in '76 in order for things to stay hot. The real principle is that, if state politics really cooled off, you'd know for sure that something was wrong. Nowadays you only suspect it.

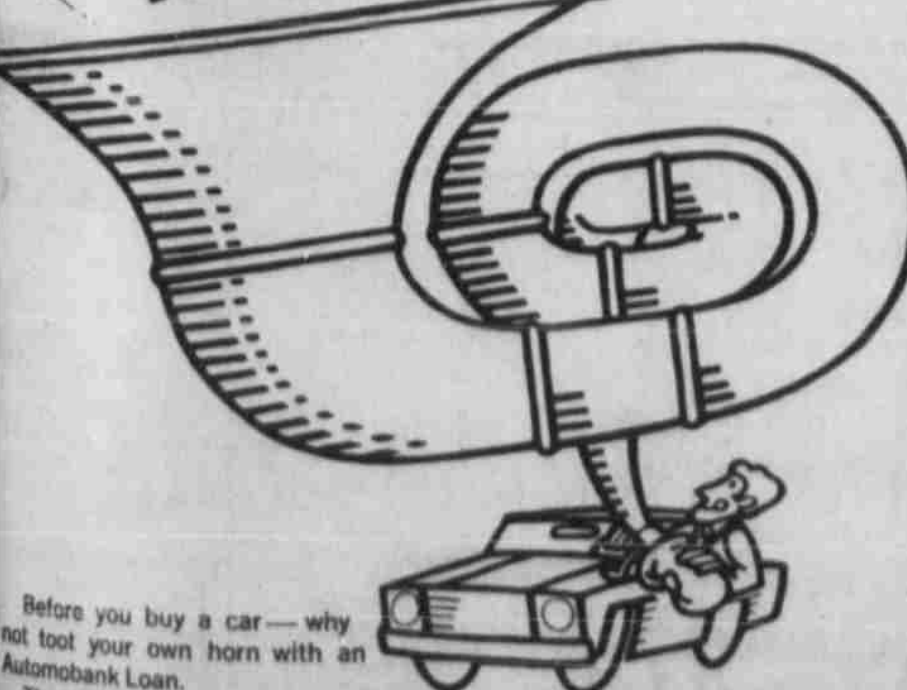

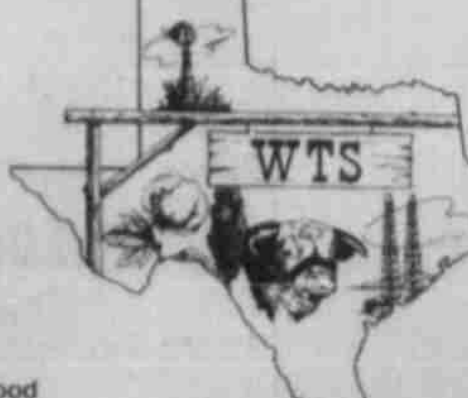

Solar heat collectors on a commercial scale will probably show up on the farm before anywhere else. Exactly when solar energy units can practically be used is still an open question. Certainly not right away, but tests performed in six states by the Agricultural Research Service indicate that low temperature drying of grain by use of simple solar collectors is technically feasible. Technically feasible and economically practical are often some distance apart. It appears this is still the case with solar drying since the main thing the ARS testing ascertained was a need for more tests. The new series of tests will be conducted during the next two years and will provide more information on economics of the various commercial systems as well as increasing the technological information available on solar energy collection.

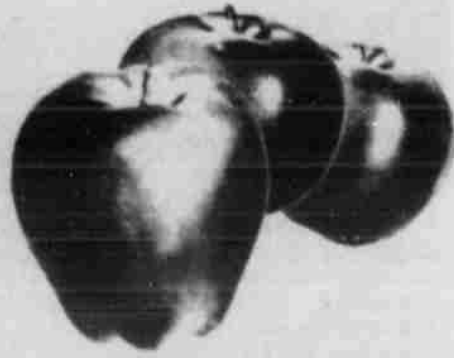

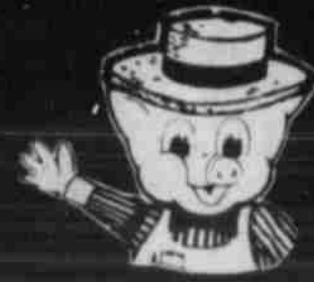

Rotary history---

meeting for some 18 months on a regular basis prior to the chartering of the Rotary club.

Tom Bouchier is the only charter member of the club who has remained active through the club's first 50 years.

Probably the club's most widely publicized project and its first major one was sponsorship of the Post Old Timers Reunion, beginning in 1925, the same year the club was organized.

It was held one day annually usually with a free barbecue included for the cowboys still living who drove cattle up the trails to Kansas City, Abilene and Dodge, for the Indian fighters, the buffalo hunters, the early day ranchers and for others who came into this area before 1906.

This made the "old timers" a select group indeed. They would number up to 100 or so and came from far and wide.

Wright Moore, the old buffalo hunter, made most of them until the reunions were discontinued in 1939 because by that time not enough old timers were left or well enough to come eat the beef, sing the old songs, and recount the old stories.

Attending such reunions were men like Rollie Burns, manager of the old Curry Comb Ranch in 1883 when the Indians made their last raid in this area; John Slaughter, who ran the first cattle in Garza County and five times was wounded by Indians; Ken Elkins, trail driver and Civil War veteran who was 94 when he attended his last reunion and sang a solo for the group, "We'll Be Rounded Up in Glory By and By"; and Newt Graham, who was present when the Texas Cattle Raisers Association was formed in the 1870s.

Dr. W. C. Holden, who headed the Texas Tech Museum and is recognized as the ranking historian of this West Texas Area, would come regularly to the reunions. He put into his books the stories of the region's early days the old timers would tell him here.

One depression era project which went awry was in the late 1920s when Post Rotarians purchased ten registered Jersey heifers on a loan from the bank as a youth project, giving the animals to Garza farm boys to raise.

The plan was for the boys to raise the calves, sell them and pay the club back for the initial cost of the calves and keep the gain as incentive money.

But a severe drought hit the area, wiped out the feed crops, and the boys all lost their calves. That left the Rotarians who signed the note in debt to the bank.

The club adopted a unique method of repayment, according to Tom Bouchier and Dr. B. F. Young, a Rotarian for 33 years.

The amount from the membership dues which would have gone to ladies to prepare the club luncheons went to the bank instead for interest and some of the principal. For several years, Rotarians brought sandwiches from home to the First Methodist church each Tuesday, ate their sandwiches together and then held the weekly club meeting. Eventually the call loan was paid off.

The Post club sponsored and organized the Tahoka Rotary club in 1936 when Phil Bouchier was the club president.

The club's weekly bulletin is "The Branding Iron."

It got its name when J. R. Slaughter, club president in 1934-35, went to the Rotary International convention in Atlantic City in his ranch working clothes. His wife dressed as a cowgirl at the convention and would play the ukelele and sing western songs at convention gatherings.

Slaughter had a calling card printed up which contained all the ranch brands of this area on it. He handed out these cards to Rotarians from all over the world at the convention.

When he got home, the club thought so much of his "calling

card" it adopted all the brands for the front of the club bulletin and named it "The Branding Iron." All the brands are still on the cover of the bulletin, 40 years later.

The club brought a foreign student to Post in the 1961-62 club year to spend the entire nine months school year as student in Post High School. She was Susanne Krause of Copenhagen, Denmark, who was graduated from Post High in the spring of 1962. She lived much of the year with Dr. and Mrs. B. E. Young, became a dentist when she returned home, still corresponds with the Youngs and has invited them to visit her.

The Post club shared a Rotary Exchange student with the Slaton club in the summer of 1958. She was Miss Danielle Thuillier of Paris, France, and lived most of her stay here with the Giles McCrarys.

The club's biggest youth project of many was the contributing of \$3,541 from the club over a 14-year period for the Post Student Loan Fund. This

fund over the last 30 years has helped 50 local youngsters to go to college — some for a year or two, some for the time required to obtain a degree. Many individuals also contributed to this loan fund. The fund has loaned \$29,733 to college students and is still in operation using repaid loans to finance others.

For 27 years, the club sponsored a banquet for the teachers each fall after the start of school. This was discontinued

only two years ago after the faculty had grown so large there was no place big enough to hold such a banquet and it had been shifted to an ice cream and cake outing at Antelope Stadium.

Marvin Hudman was a Rotarian here for 19 years and had the unique record of never having missed attending a Rotary meeting somewhere every week for all those 19 years for a 100 percent attendance. He made up from Florida to California and most points in

between on his vacation jaunts. Mrs. T. L. Jones served as the club's pianist and sweetheart for 11 years, faithfully playing the piano for club singing from 1961 until she "retired" in the 1972-73 club year at the age of 90 when she no longer could climb the stairs to the city hall auditorium.

The club has lost a lot of members too over the years

because they could no longer climb those stairs.

Lou Marks has served as club secretary since July 1, 1966, and will have served a full ten years in the post under 12 presidents when the present club year is concluded next June 30.

Mrs. Viola Terry has been preparing the club's weekly luncheons for the last 17 years and has given the club the

Rotary reputation of being "the best eating Rotary club in West Texas."

The club has sponsored Boy Scout Troop 316 here for the last 45 years since the troop was first issued its charter May 8, 1930.

The club has had a variety of youth projects even sponsored an interest here for high school boys in 1969. Interest clubs sponsored all over the Rotary clubs.

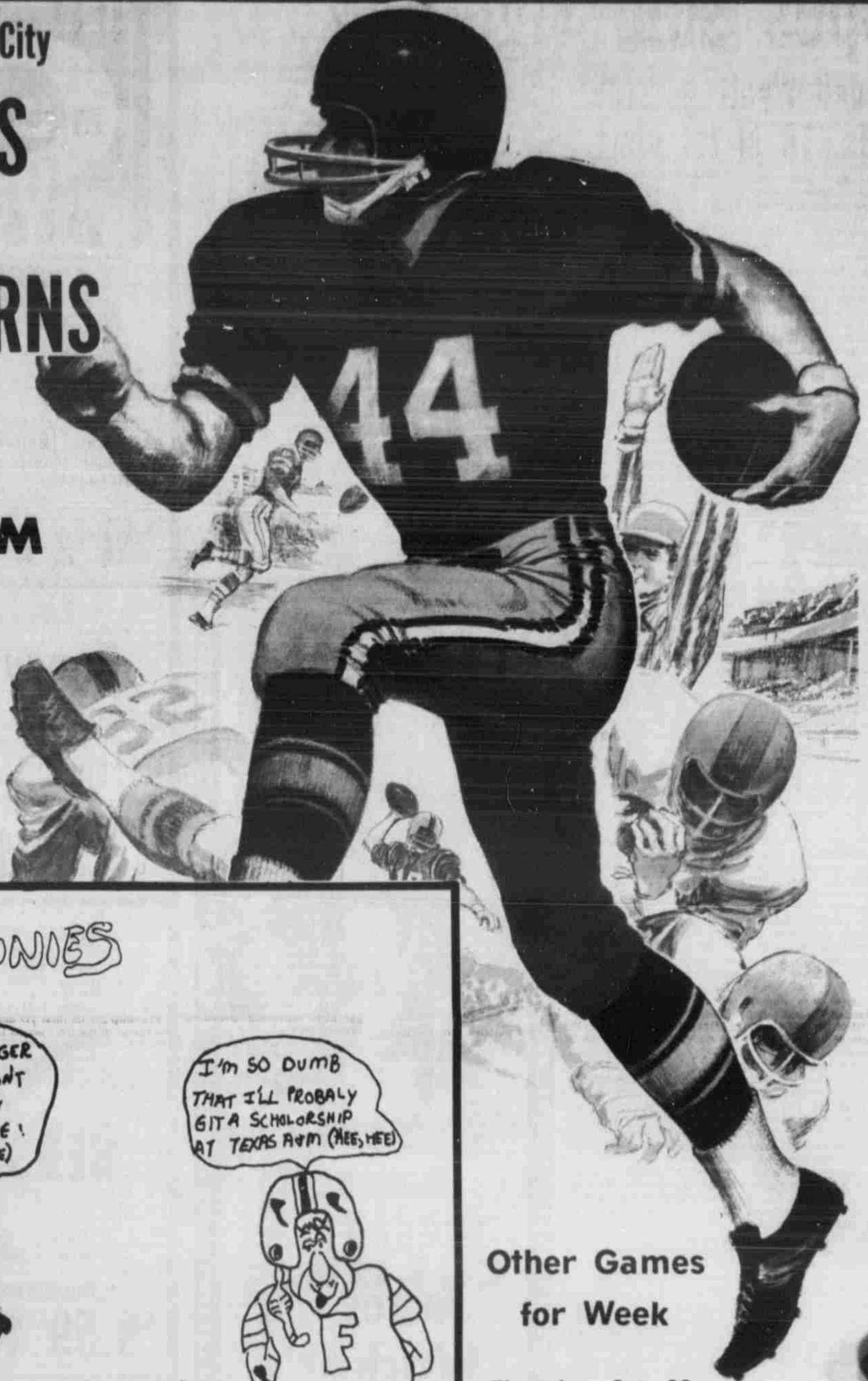
POST ANTELOPES VS LOCKNEY LONGHORNS

given by Rex Webster of Lubbock, who in 34 years in Rotary has served as a vice president of Rotary International as well as director, and has filled many committee positions with the international organization.

Webster spent a portion of his talk recalling what America was like and what it was doing and who were its heroes in 1925 when the Post Rotary club was born.

"It's a new world 50 years later," he declared, "but Rotary still strives."

"The Rotary Foundation," he explained, "is Rotary's one big united effort and it has grown to be a real factor in promoting international peace and understanding with contributions from Rotarians and Rotary clubs, and some non-Rotarians, at a rate of more than \$5,000,000 a year."

"Most of the money goes to an educational program which enables young persons in each of some 350 districts of Rotary International to study in, and have the cultural advantages of a country other than their own. More than 6,400 young people have benefitted from this tremendous Rotary Foundation program during the last 27 years," Webster said.

Ten Lubbock women who are members of the women's singing group known as the Sweet Adelines (a feminist counterpart of barber shop singing by men of old songs) provided the musical portion of the program.

Concluding the program, Bob Connel led the entire banquet group in the singing of the national anthem with Mrs. T. L. Jones, "93 years young" and a special guest of the club for the occasion, at the piano. Mrs. Jones had served the club as its pianist for 11 years until she retired at the age of 90 three years ago.

An oddity of the game was that neither team punted in the second half. In the first half Dudley booted three for a 39 yard average.

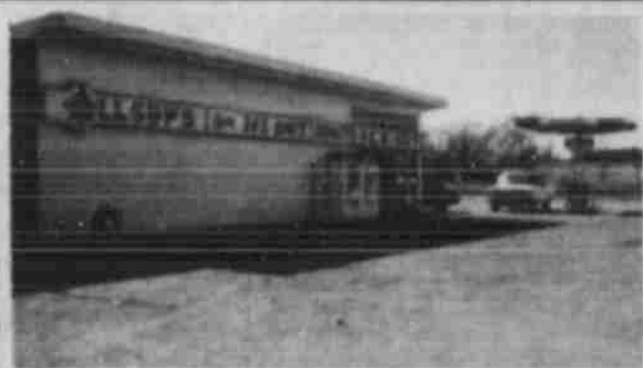
The victory gives the Lopes a 3-1 record in District SAA play and a 5-1 mark for the season.

plan for the entire project.

The architect estimated it will require about three months to get all plans and specifications ready and the construction contract let for the renovation of the building.

The council will make definite cost decisions when Whitaker brings back preliminary plans for the first phase.

Mayor Giles McCrary declared after the council had authorized the architectural fees and referring to the move to completely renovate the building the council purchased for \$32,500 at an auction two weeks ago:

"I think this is great."

McCrary earlier had told the council that he had asked the center committee and Whitaker to present the council with a three-phase renovation plan for the center.

From the council's discussion, it appears councilmen now desire if possible to finance the center on a year to year basis, without a bond issue if possible.

The financial aspects were not discussed in detail. But that will come in the next few meetings.

Four members of the center committee — Mrs. Maxine Marks, Mrs. Ruby Kirkpatrick, Mrs. Patty Kirkpatrick and Syd

Wyatt — met with the council and architect.

In another major action, the council authorized the purchase of 12,000 gallons of an oil emulsion with a chemical additive to be applied to all Post streets within the next month to seal them from winter water damage.

Mayor McCrary said the city has the equipment to apply the emulsion and that city labor can accomplish the work. The \$4,000 cost for the oil to be applied is already in the city budget.

A building permit was approved for the remodeling of the former Forrest Lumber Yard building into offices by its new owner as long as the remodeling meets city ordinance requirements.

In other actions the council voted to join the American Association of Small Cities and authorized the Green Thumb crew to paint the city hall auditorium with the city buying the paint.
