Local elections slated Saturday

Mitchell County voters will go to the polls Saturday to decide a number of local elections including school, city and hospital board.

In addition, Colorado City voters will be deciding upon legalizing bingo games within the city limits. Included on the city's ballot, the proposition asks voters to either vote for or against legalizing bingo games for charitable purposes. The item was placed on the ballot after a petition bearing enough signatures was submitted to the city council.

Absentee balloting was low in both the Colorado City Council and the Mitchell County Hospital District races. Tuesday was the

last day to vote absentee and the city reported 23 absentee votes and the hospital district had 7 absentee votes cast.

While Colorado City voters will be deciding upon city council and hospital district board races, they won't be able to vote in a school board election. An injunction which stopped the Colorado City school board election was granted by a federal district judge following the filing of a suit by LULAC seeking single-member voting districts. Until the injunction is lifted or the issue settled, the school district cannot hold a board election.

Hospital District

In the county-wide Mitchell County Hospital District board election, voters will choose from five candidates seeking two-year terms for four positions on the

board. The candidates are Connie Cooley Penland, Sybil Stevens, L.M. Dawson, August G. (Gus) Armstrong (incumbent) and Marion Bassham (incumbent).

Colorado City

Eight candidates are in the race for three two-year seats on the city council while Jim Baum is unopposed in his re-election bid for mayor. Council candidates are Ricky Thompson, W.R. Upshaw, Melburn Jaco, Brian D. Bassham, Gary Redwine, Oscar Ortiz, Terry Upshaw and Dianne "Dee" Hearn (incumbent).

Loraine City Council

Running unopposed for the Loraine City Council are incumbents Catarino Martinez (mayor), Richard Cooper and Stanley Moore.

Loraine School Board

Running unopposed for the Loraine School Board are incumbents Robert Dale Finley and

Plagens said that Colorado City and Loraine subscribers can expect to find their newspapers early Sunday morning. Mail subscribers will receive their newspapers as usual on Monday.

The Mitchell County Commissioners Court, in a special meeting Tuesday morning, appointed members to the county historical commission and reviewed and approved insurance specifications.

Named to the historical commission are Jim Baum, chairman; Mr. and Mrs. L.B. Elliott, Marion Bassham, Vista Harrell, Katherine Morris, Mrs. A.L. Geer and T.J. Goss II. Goss had been chairman of the commission for several years, but declined to accept it again because of health reasons.

Don Gray, the county's insurance consultant, went over specifications for property and liability coverage prior to the items being let out for bid. Gray said a number of agents have indicated an interest in bidding including Ratliff Insurance Agency and Lovell-Carr Insurance of Colorado City. Two Dallas agencies have also indicated an interest in submitting bids for various parts of the insurance coverage, said Gray.

In final business, the commissioners formally approved a contract with Bertie Kidd to administer the commodity distribution program.

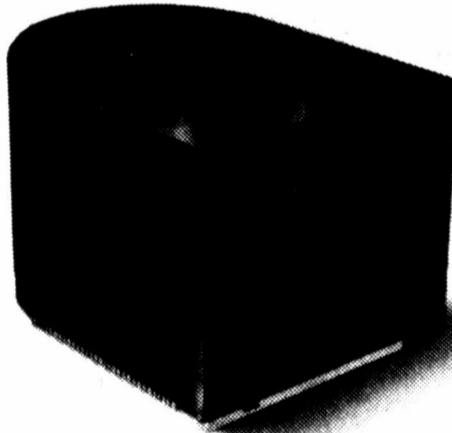

Why are you seeking election to office? Having served three terms, I feel that I have a lot of knowledge and experience that will benefit Colorado City. I have worked extensively in the grant funding process including an appointment by the governor to a state committee of the Texas Department of Community Affairs. Additionally, I was instrumental in formulating an ongoing 5-year Capital Improvements Plan. My experience includes several appointments by the mayor to the budget committee. My husband and I have lived in Colorado City a long time and we will be here for a long time. It is our home and we believe in Colorado City.

What do you see as the top three problems facing the city and what are your solutions? Water quality: Ongoing work is being done in this area; however, the current treatment facility was state of the art in the early 1950's but now requires upgrading to meet current and future demands. We must explore the possibility of outside funding such as grants that are available through the state. Crumbling tax base: We must pursue economic development and formulate a workable economic development strategy that firmly states what, how and when certain things are to happen. Positive interaction between the Council, citizens, the Chamber of Commerce and the Industrial Team is essential.

Paving: Many streets are not paved and become extremely difficult to travel during heavy rains. These areas must be targeted and money made available for paving and street repair during the budget process.

What changes would you like to see made in our city government? The authors of the City Charter exhibited a tremendous amount of insight and foresight in the composition of this document. Our City Charter has been changed very little since its adoption and it embodies the format our city government will have. I prefer the council-manager form of government that we follow. Many cities are currently debating the mayor-council form;

however, extensive research shows that form to be quite expensive to the taxpayers.

What should be city's responsibility be toward economic development? We must put UNITY back in community. It is only through a community-wide cooperative effort that we can develop a workable economic strategy. The mayor, a councilmember and the city manager should be required to attend the meetings of the Industrial Team and should then provide a report each month to the City Council. This practice would assure community awareness. Positive interaction between the City and the Industrial Team is essential for economic development success. The Texas Constitution (Art. 3, Sect. 52) places certain restrictions on cities; however, the Industrial Team is an indirect financing mechanism that can work with the local governing body. The Industrial Team does not possess the legislative powers that are essential for zoning, ordinances, etc. The local government does not possess the powers to negotiate with private enterprise. A spirit of cooperation must be forged. It would also be to the city's benefit to develop a positive relationship with the Texas Department of Commerce. Since its restructuring in 1987, this State agency provides an extensive amount of information that would be beneficial in pursuing economic development goals.

Should the city's present clean-up campaign continue? The city must continue the clean-up campaign. This project is beneficial to the community in many ways. Property values will be enhanced or maintained. Fire hazards are being removed. The key rate, which has a direct impact on insurance rates, should stabilize due to this effort. Persons who consider locating in Colorado City are more inclined to do so if they find that the city takes pride in its appearance.

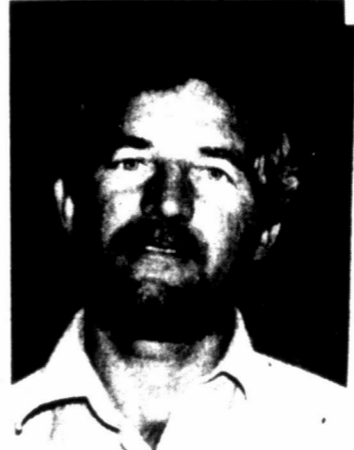

Hoover scores in high jump

Tracy Hoover, Colorado High School freshman, came within two inches of reaching the Class AAA state track and field meet to be held in Austin next week. Hoover placed sixth in the girls high jump for Colorado City's top finish in three events at the Region I-AAA meet held at Odessa's Ratliff Stadium Friday and Saturday.

Hoover took sixth with a career best of 5'2" while the first and second place finishers both made Austin with jumps of 5'4". First place went to Shelly Cyert of Graham and second went to Darla Barnes of Clyde.

"I was elated because it was my highest," said Hoover. Hoover

cleared the opening height of 4'6" on her first attempt and did the same at 4'8". Hoover again needed just went attempt to clear 4'10"-the height she cleared to win the district 7-AAA title. Hoover missed on the first attempt at 5' then cleared the bar on her second try. Hoover made her career high 5'2" jump on her third and final attempt.

That left eight in the competition and Hoover missed three times at 5'4". She clearly had the height on all three attempts. Hoover grazed the bar with her ankles on her second attempt and on the third attempt her legs hit the bar on the way up. Hoover's top jump as an eighth grader was

Post, with former Colorado City resident Kim Wulfjen running third leg, won with a 3:59.53 and Perryton was second at 4:07.17.

Beau Rees, CHS senior, competed in the discus as the district 7-AAA runner-up. Rees scratched on his first and best attempt at regional and finished with a 136' throw. District champion Duke Carter of Kermit won regional with a 168'5" effort and second went to Darrin Bragg of Childress at 158'4 1/2".

Graham won the boys team title and Perryton claimed the girls crown.

fish, up to 50 pounds of fish per acre per year, with only fertilizer.

For higher production, consider providing an artificial feed. Channel catfish readily accept prepared feeds and most sunfish

do also. Largemouth bass will normally not eat pelleted feeds but will grow well on a diet of small fish which are spawned by the bluegill stocked in the pond.

When feeding fish, always use a prepared fish food. Cattle feed makes poor fish feed just as it does poor hog feed. Similarly, hog feed makes poor fish feed. Straight grain feeds such as corn, wheat and soybeans also are poor fish feeds. Fish will grow slowly and often ponds will become polluted with the uneaten grain, and a fish die-off will result.

As far as fishing habits are concerned, there is no state limit on the size of bass that can be caught in a privately owned pond or lake. The owner must decide what size to catch and what size to throw back. What about stunted bluegill? If a pond has a

good bass population, bluegill will not become stunted, and many will grow to a catchable size. If small bluegill are released unharmed to the pond, they will become food for the bass or live to be caught at a larger size on another day.

Fish in farm ponds are safe to eat. They are rarely harmed by parasites such as grubs or tapeworms. Anyway, thorough cooking of fish will kill any parasites. "Wormy" fish look bad but are no health threat to humans.

For more information on managing a fish pond or stock tank, contact the county Extension office.

Dorman speaking at CHS banquet

Randy Dorman, guest speaker for today's Colorado High School spring sports banquet, is a true example of the life to which he likes to challenge young people.

A 1982 car wreck left the Roscoe athletic standout paralyzed from the chest down and with only partial use of his arms and hands. Dorman, now living in San Angelo, bounced back with more than just rehabilitation for his quadriplegic condition.

Last October he ventured to the Paralympic Games in Seoul, South Korea and returned as a gold medalist in the 100 meters.

He also finished fifth in the pentathlon which consisted of the 100, 800, shotput, discus and javelin.

Dorman's win in the 100 erased the world record of 19.83 that he set at the 31st Annual National Wheelchair Games in Edinboro, PA. Also at those games Dorman was a member of the world-record-setting 400 relay and the 800 relay that finished second. At Seoul he gave up positions on those winning relays to another team member.

Dorman's preferred "gold medals" are not those that he can drape around his neck. Evans

likes to talk to young people and tell them that he is physically challenged rather than physically disabled. He wants others to realize their potential, to be challenged. "It's so important to point somebody in the right direction early in life," said Dorman in a San Angelo *Standard-Times* interview. "Our goal is to get more disabled people active. Don't dwell on the disability, look at the ability of the person."

Post Office will hold mail

Postmaster, Colorado City, TX
"If work or vacation should ever take you away from home," says Postmaster Charles Greer, "the Postal Service would like to remind you that there are several options available to you when determining what to do with your mail."

If you will be away for a few days and don't have time to notify the Postal Service, you may want to ask a friend or neighbor to pick up any mail from your box. Accumulated mail in a box is an advertisement that the house is vacant.

"We will be glad to hold your mail at the Post Office for up to

30 days," said Greer. "Either stop by your local office or ask your carrier for a hold mail card. Be sure to specify the dates which you would like your mail held. Fill out the card and hand it to a clerk or your carrier a day or two before you leave. The Postal Service does not accept requests to hold mail for one day or requests made by telephone. Upon returning, you can either pick up the accumulated mail at the Post Office, or call and ask that it be delivered the next day. Someone should be available to receive the mail since it may not fit in the box."

Greer adds, "If you expect to be away for more than 30 days, you should consider a temporary

address change." Simply pick up a change of address order form at your local post office or from your letter carrier. Fill it out completely, making sure to include the effective date and the date you wish to terminate the order. This service is commonly used when families travel to vacation homes. It allows them to stay current with bills and correspondence. Once again it's a good idea to call when you return so that normal delivery will resume.

"If one of these options doesn't meet your special needs, contact us and we will recommend the best solution and work with you to ensure uninterrupted service," said Greer.

NOTES

Texas boasts more than 840,000 fish ponds or stock tanks which provide a wealth of enjoyment and recreation. But a good fishing pond does not come about by accident.

A good fishing pond requires planning, knowledge and a lot of hard work. And now is the time to decide how you will manage your pond this year. By the time the water temperature gets up to 60 degrees F., you need to have your plan in effect.

A key step in pond management is proper stocking of fish. Many people believe that it is not necessary to stock fish in a pond as fish will be stocked by waterfowl. This is highly unlikely. First, the chances of a fish getting stuck to a duck's foot are small, and for a delicate fish egg to do so is almost impossible. For a duck to fly to another pond with fish or egg attached to it and survive exposure to the air is even more unlikely.

Fish will swim into a pond during times of overflow from another pond or stream. But if you want a good fishing pond, you must stock it.

For most ponds or tanks of less than one acre in size, only channel catfish should be stocked. For ponds larger than an acre, a combination of largemouth bass, bluegill, and channel catfish have given the best results. Crappie or "white perch" do well in large reservoirs but often become overcrowded and stunted in small ponds and tanks.

The complex is located directly behind and to the east of the senior center and provides Loraine and surrounding communities with comfortable, convenient and economical housing for seniors.

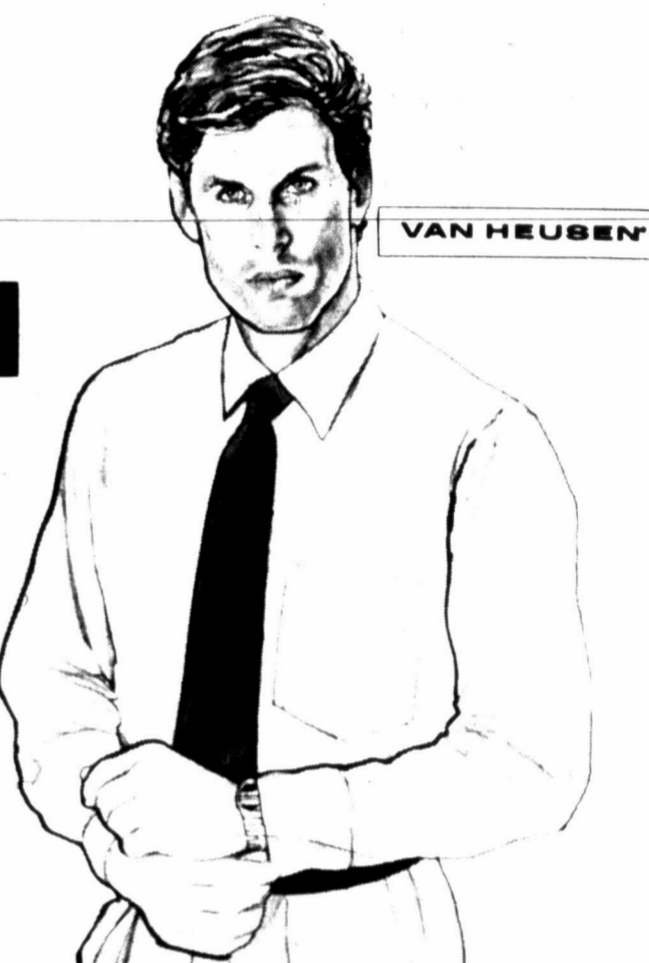
