Landings Of Shrimp Increase

Landings of headless shrimp in Texas during August amounted to 9.7 million pounds, three per cent above landings in August, 1970, but 13 per cent below record landings in August, 1967.

O. H. Farley, of the Department of Interior's Fish and Wildlife Service office in Galveston, said Freeport led all areas in volume landings with 2,830,800 pounds in August. Aransas Pass-Rockport followed with 2,227,000 pounds. Brownsville-Port Isabel was third with 2,092,600 pounds landed.

Farley said brown shrimp landings of 9.3 million pounds were the second highest on record, but white shrimp catches dropped over 300 per cent below the 1970 level.

Trawlers working brown shrimp made trip catches of 500 to 700 pounds each night in waters from southeast of Freeport to southeast of Cameron, La.

Drought conditions were broken in late August in central and northern coastal counties. This intrusion of fresh water into estuarine systems, though late in the season, will produce a heavy late crop of small white shrimp by mid-or late October, Farley said.

Fishermen who operate small bay units and depend upon the bay fishery for their livelihood are having trouble meeting financial commitments made in their anticipation of a near normal bay harvest of white shrimp.

Blue crab landings totaled 650,000 pounds in August. Farley said this was practically unchanged compared with August landings last year. However, with the intrusion of fresh water and the subsequent ecological changes in major bays, a sharp increase in crab landings is anticipated.

Five new, large vessels entered the Texas shrimp fishery in August. Three were lost at sea. In addition, several vessels returned to Texas ports from South America.

SIXTEEN INCHES OF RAIN IN 10 DAYS

During the long dry spell, most local people kept hoping for rain. Well, it finally arrived--and how.

According to the records of Weather Observer Paul Clark Sorenson, a total of 16 inches of rainfall was measured here during the period from Sept. 10 through 19.

His breakdown was as follows: Sept. 10, 4.31 inches; Sept. 11, 3.30; Sept. 12, 1.49; Sept. 13, 0; Sept. 14, 0.15; Sept. 15, 2.43; Sept. 16, 0; Sept. 17, 0; Sept. 18, 1.55; and Sept. 19, 2.77.

Also, on Sept. 19, the temperature dropped to 60 degrees.

As everyone knows, much flooding, damage and inconvenience accompanied the unusually heavy amount of rain. City and county crews have been working almost constantly to relieve conditions.

Arkansas Fugitive Arrested Here

Deputy Sheriff Vernon Duke, while returning from the police school in Ingleside, noticed a vehicle driving all over the roadway just north of Aransas Pass. The vehicle was stopped and its driver, Jerry James Meeks of Pine Bluff, Ark., was arrested on a charge of driving while intoxicated.

A check with the identification and records division of the Department of Public Safety in Austin and a further check with the National Crime Information center in Washington D.C. revealed that Meeks is wanted in Arkansas for robbery. Meeks is being held on the local charge and also the fugitive charge.

Navigation Dist. Holds Meeting

The Board of Navigation and Canal Commissioners met in special session at the District's office Sept. 14. Present were Chairman Richard J. Fox and Commissioners David Magugglin, R. W. Landrum, Wm. M. Brown, Jr., and Francis M. Rouquette; Attorney Ellis L. Clark and Harbormaster B. C. DeForest. Visitors were Jimmie Ankele and Wm. Bill Johnson.

There was discussion of needed repairs to piers in Rockport Harbor and construction of retaining wall, Cove Harbor, at site of proposed oil spill organization warehouse. Requests for bids on these projects will be advertised in local newspaper. Need for replacement of pick-up truck used in maintenance work was also discussed. Request for bids on new truck will be advertised.

Need for repairs to roof of Basin Cafe, Rockport Harbor, was discussed. Motion was made by Commissioner Magugglin, seconded by Commissioner Landrum, and vote carried that \$50.00 be offered to lessee, Will Crow, to be used toward cost of repairs to roof.

After study of treasurer's report, motion was made by Commissioner Brown, seconded by Commissioner Landrum, and vote carried, that amount of \$10,000.00 now on time deposit in Construction Fund, be transferred for current operating expense.

CPL WORKMEN RESTORE POWER

Electric service was completely restored to all Rockport, Fulton, and Lamar customers by Saturday afternoon, Sept. 11. C.P.&L. manager, Bill Janeczek, reports that they had only minor damage, but the gale force winds and the torrential downpour kept servicemen from climbing the poles.

Three crews from Alice were sent to Rockport Saturday morning and helped to speed up the restoration of electricity to all customers.

Janeczek said he'd like to express his appreciation for the patience of those customers who were without electric service Friday night. "It makes our job easier when we have people like our customers who understand our problems during emergency situations," he said.

Verdict Rendered In Court Cases

District Judge John Miller last week made the following decisions in cases heard by him in the district courtroom here:

William Kelley, charged with burglary of a private residence in the daytime, found guilty and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.

Jimmy Marshall, charged with burglary of a private residence during daytime, found guilty and given two years probation.

Oscar Lara, charged with unlawful possession of heroin, case dismissed.

Henry Munoz, fined \$500 for unlawfully carrying arms; five years probation after being found guilty of assault with a prohibitive weapon. On a charge of unlawful possession of marijuana, the case was dismissed.

Farm Damage Put at \$90,000

Flood damage caused by Tropical Storm Fern to agriculture in Aransas County has been estimated at \$90,000, according to Glen Drachenberg, executive director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service for this county.

He said the greatest damage was erosion to farmlands and added that many acres will have to be graded and smoothed because of erosion and silting.

Financial assistance from the federal government is being sought by the eight south Texas counties, including Aransas, which were declared disaster areas Sept. 17 by President Nixon.

Total flood damage to agriculture in the area has been estimated at \$10.9 million.

Assistance for cleanup and repair is being requested by the eight counties from the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The requests are being made under emergency conservation measures of the Rural Environmental Assistance Program, according to Robert Sprgen, district director of the ASCS.

Under the REAP emergency measures, the ASCS will pay up to 80 per cent of the costs for repairs and reconstruction of farmlands.

Shopping Center Construction to Start In 90 Days

Construction work on Bay View Center, Rockport's first complete shopping facility, will begin within 90 days, it was announced this week by W. L. Matthews, Jr., of D. B. Harrell Co., San Antonio, business property management firm which is handling the development. He said the grand opening is planned for before Easter.

The shopping center, covering 50,000 square feet, will be located at the north edge of Rockport, facing on Highway 35 North, covering the entire block between Cherry and Maple Streets, and located across the highway from Bryan Trailer Sales. The land is owned by W. J. Black of San Antonio.

Matthews also announced that Perry Brothers Stores, a Texas owned and operated chain of variety stores with headquarters in Lufkin, plans to open their 108th store in Bay View Center.

"This Perry Brothers Store will be one of their largest with a full range of merchandise, including fabrics, toys, housewares, clothing, books and confections," Matthews said.

Plans for the shopping center are complete, according to Matthews, and bids are being taken for the construction work. He said discussions are under way with a number of prospective businesses, including a supermarket chain. Additional leases will be announced soon, he added.

Sewage Plant To Be Enlarged

The City Council Monday appointed Laddie Janeczek of First Southwest Company, San Antonio, to act as its fiscal agent in the planned expansion of the city sewage treatment plant.

Janeczek said the estimated cost of the expansion project is approximately \$265,000 and it is anticipated that the city will receive about \$145,000 in government grants to aid the financing.

Historical Tape Recordings Planned

Emory M. Spencer, chief sponsor of the project, "History of Aransas County, 1871-1971," received word this week that Dr. A. Ray Stephens, professor of history at North Texas State University at Denton, will be here from Sept. 28 to Oct. 3.

Stephens, who spent the summer here doing research and gathering material for the history he will write, is returning this time in connection with a different phase of his data gathering.

He plans to interview several local persons well versed in the history of Aransas County and make tape recordings of the interviews. Stephens points out that the tapes will be transcribed by the Oral History Collection Department of North Texas State University and will be a part of the permanent research collection of Texas history.

Fake Advances As Semifinalist In Scholarship

Principal C. R. Barre has announced that one student at Rockport - Fulton High School has been named Semifinalist in the 1971-72 National Merit



Scholarship Program. The student is David Fake, son of Rev. and Mrs. Charles F. Fake.

The approximately 15,000 Semifinalists appointed today are among the nation's most intellectually talented high school seniors. They will compete for some 3,000 Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1972.

The Semifinalists were the highest scorers in their states on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMQT), which was given last February to more than 655,000 students in about 16,600 schools nationwide. They constitute less than one percent of the graduating secondary school seniors in the United States.

The Semifinalists are representative of the country's most intellectually able young people, according to Edward C. Smith, president of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). "From this group will come many future leaders in business, industry, and the professions," he said.

"These students bring honor not only to themselves, but also to their families, their teachers, and their communities. The future success of these young people will, however, depend upon their ability to become productive at the high intellectual levels that they are capable of attaining."

Indian History Display at School

The first Americans on the continent of North America were the Indians who came across, as some historians think, from Asia to Alaska. Later as the need for food became essential, these people migrated to what is now continental United States, Mexico and Central America. Some even ventured as far south as the continent of South America.

No study of America's early history would be complete without studying our earliest settlers. Mrs. Virginia Chernosky's fifth grade class has just completed a unit on these Indians. The class members have made the traditional tepee and pueblo where the Indians of the southwest lived. Canoes cut from cardboard, decorated and sewed together, were constructed. Shaped stones were tied to sticks to show the crude tools we think the Indians used.

These objects are now on display in the main building of Rockport Elementary School for others to see.

Fighting mosquitoes and repairing roads damaged by tropical storm Fern were the main topics of discussion at the Sept. 17 meeting of Aransas County Commissioners Court.

County Judge John D. Wendell and Commissioners W. B. Allen, Mrs. Wanda Sparks, Raymond Owens and Charlie Hale reported that every section of the county has been sprayed twice since Fern in an effort to get the mosquito problem under control and the spraying will continue as long as necessary.

Regarding repairing roads washed out or badly damaged by the flooding that accompanied the tropical storm, Judge Wendell estimated that the cost will exceed \$40,000 and that the state already had notified Aransas County that some state financial aid will be forthcoming.

In another action the Commissioners nominated seven local citizens to serve on the Aransas County Airport Advisory Board. They are Homer Traux, Bob Mosier, Frank Yosemite, W. D. Heidenfels, Jimmie Hunt, Harold Picton and John Kinsey.

In another matter, the county received word that as a result of recently enacted provisions of the state's general appropriations act, the state will provide ALL the funds needed for the foster care program for children in Aransas County, eliminating the need for the county to allocate funds for this purpose.

The following letter from Mrs. Hugh R. Cook, Corpus Christi, regional administrator, State Welfare Department, explains the new situation:

"In June, 1970, your Court entered into a contract with this Department to provide foster home care for children receiving, or eligible for, benefits through the State Welfare Program of Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC). This agreement enabled the Department to use available federal funds for part of the cost of foster care for such children. The portion of foster care cost met by federal reimbursement was charged back to the county. The contract also provided that these children would have benefit of the State's Medicaid Program with the same sharing of county and available federal funds to meet monthly premium cost.

"Recently enacted provisions of the General Appropriations Act, 62nd Legislature, included some funds for AFDC Foster Care. Beginning September 1st this appropriation can be used to meet the part of payment for AFDC Foster Care which has been charged back to the county. Also, it will provide the part of Medicaid premium which has been the county's responsibility in the past. Fur-

Pirates Play Poth Friday

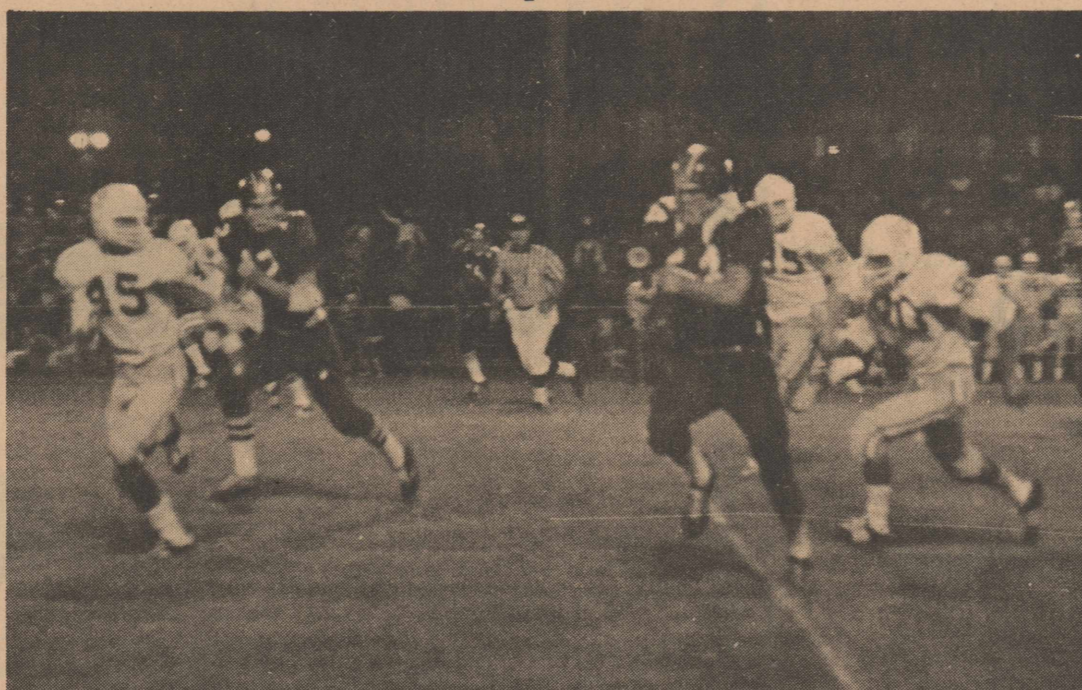

Using a running and passing attack which netted a total of 350 yards, the Rockport-Fulton Pirates crushed the Taft Grayhounds in a non-district game at Pirate Stadium last Friday night in the season's opener for both teams.

The Pirates took the opening kickoff and marched 64 yards

in 5 plays for the first score of the 1971 season with Glyn Landrum romping 48 yards for the TD. The point after attempt was no good, the first of four fruitless attempts in the game.

After a Taft fumble recovery by the Pirates in the next series of downs, the Rockport team moved quickly to another score with quarterback Craig Thornton finding tight end Clay Gil-

lis in the end zone for a 9-yard touchdown pass.

On the following kickoff the Taft team fumbled the ball and the Pirates were in business again. The Pirates moved the ball to the Taft six-yard line, but a fumble thwarted the drive.

In the second period Landrum again broke for a long gainer, but he simply outran the ball

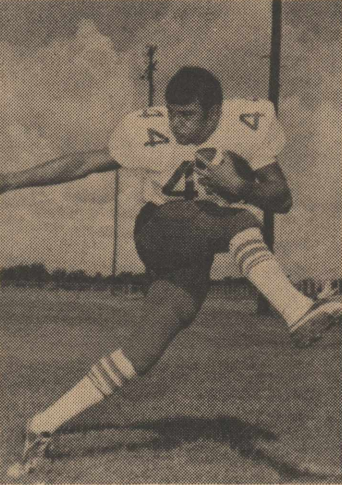

and a Hound pounced on the loose pigskin to stop another Pirate drive.

After this fumble the Grayhounds moved deep into Pirate territory, putting together their only sustained march for the evening, but the drive ended as Steve Arispe intercepted a pass to shut off any scoring opportunity.

With a little more than two minutes remaining in the half, Thornton again spotted Gillis

in the end zone and delivered a 7-yard scoring strike, making the score 18-0 at the half.

Both teams loosened up in the second half, but only the Pirates could score, although Taft did have a scoring play called back by a penalty. The Pirates went 68 yards in 8 plays before fullback Sam Morgan hit up the middle for the final 12 yards, sending the score to 24 for the Pirates and 0 for Taft.

The Pirates used a stiff defense that was led by Clifford

Mixon, Charles Crusser, Jerry Picton, and Travis Bailey, as well as a host of others. Mixon was especially awesome, as the 193-pound senior continually crashed his way into the Taft backfield breaking up plays before they could get started.

Offensively, the Pirates gained 286 yards on the ground, with the bulk of the load being carried by Landrum (22 carries for 125 yards), Bailey (11-76) and Morgan (8-68). Many of the runs were made possible by the blocking of the interior of the Pirate line--Picton, Robert Schendel, V. K. Dullye, Abel Salazar, Kenneth Howland, and Clay Gillis.

Quarterback Graig Thornton connected on 7 of 14 passes for 64 yards, with the main target being Gillis, who caught 6 for 49 yards.

Fix-It Tip

Wind and rain take their toll of outside stairs, whatever the material in use—wood, concrete or brick. Even if you never used the stairway, it would need attention.

Wooden stairs, especially, should be checked frequently for signs of weakness or decay. Examine the stringers (the sides that hold the steps) for cracking. You can strengthen a stringer by bolting an additional piece of wood along its length. Use a 2x4 or a 2x6 and fasten it with carriage bolts, as nails might cause further splitting.

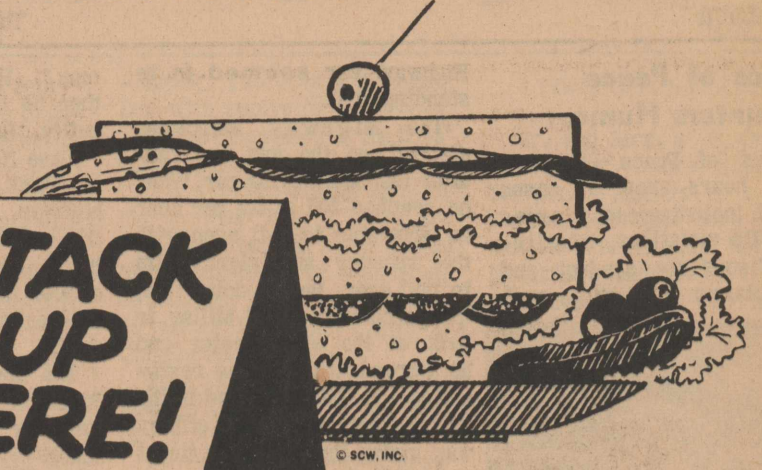

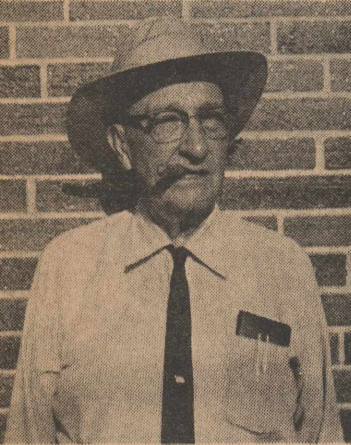

Justice of Peace Encounters Humor

Justice of Peace Lawrence Miller hears about 35 cases a month including such charges as traffic violations, intoxication, disorderly conduct and small claims court cases such



as someone suing for less than \$150. He also performs about four marriages per month.

During a typical day, Miller encounters humor, tragedy, sadness and despair. Here are a few examples:

Case No. 1: One night Miller accompanied a State Highway Patrolman on a drive to Aransas Pass. They were moving along at about 55 miles per hour when a car shot by them traveling so fast that the State

Highway car seemed to be standing still.

The Highway Patrolman stepped on the gas and took after the fast moving car. When he reached 105 miles per hour he was able to pull even with the speeder and signal him to pull over. Before doing this, the patrolman asked Miller to look at the speedometer and he agreed that it was registering 105. Miller stayed in the patrol car while the officer was giving the speeder a ticket and Miller noticed that the man glanced at him several times.

A few days later, a well dressed man entered Justice of Peace Miller's office and said he had been given a ticket for "allegedly speeding."

"You know, I don't know what's going on these days with the State Highway patrolmen," the man said. "They're giving everybody tickets for speeding. Maybe they are trying to set a record for arrests and impress their boss. I wasn't going over 65 at the most."

Miller listened patiently and asked the man to sit down. Then he asked:

"When you were stopped, do you remember seeing a man wearing a white shirt who was sitting in the State Highway patrol car?"

The man looked closely at Miller and then blurted out, "Oh, my God, you were the

man." His face turned red, then he laughed and said, "I'm guilty. How much do I owe?"

Case No. 2: A car was weaving back and forth across the highway. State police stopped the car and found two youths in it, both with opened cans of beer in their hands, plus two six-packs of beer in the back seat.

The boys were taken before Judge Miller, charged with "minors in possession of alcohol."

One boy looked straight at Miller and said, "Judge, we have no idea how that beer got in our car."

The other said, "Yes, sir, that's right. We have no idea who in the world would put that beer in our car."

Judge Miller reminded them that the state officers had reported that each youth had an opened can of beer in their hands when their car was stopped.

"You don't believe a word we said, do you?" asked one boy.

"No," replied Miller.

"Then I guess we might as well plead guilty," one youth said, and the other agreed.

In connection with performing marriages, Miller recalls one ceremony that caused a young man and woman to become so grateful that they said they never had seen such friendly, helpful people as those they met in Rockport.

The reason for their gratitude was that they were from out-of-town and they wanted to get married one night at about 10 p.m. Someone told them to call Judge Miller at his home and he might accommodate them.

They called and he met them at his office. They submitted some legal papers pertaining to marriage and Miller examined the documents.

"You have everything necessary," he said, "except one necessary document -- a marriage license."

The distressed youths explained that they thought they had gotten all the necessary documents in their home town. "What can we do?" they pleaded.

Judge Miller said Aransas County had a very kind County Clerk in the person of Mrs. Ruby Hart and maybe she would come down to the Courthouse and issue a marriage license. Miller called Ruby and she obliged--and two young people got married and came to the conclusion that Miller, Mrs. Hart and Rockport "are simply wonderful."

Benefits For Severely Disabled

Many severely disabled World War II veterans are not taking advantage of the special features of Public Law 91-666 which, in addition to increasing the amount of the grant to purchase an automobile on a one-time basis, provides funds for the purchase, repair or replacement of special adaptive equipment for their automobiles. P. J. Mims, VA Regional Director, said today.

He pointed out the VA is authorized to grant money toward the purchase of an automobile for veterans who suffered the loss or loss of use of one or more hands or feet or both eyes in military service. The new law raised the VA auto grant from \$1,600 to \$2,800 and also authorized VA to pay for adaptive devices needed on replacement cars purchased in the past.

P. J. Mims said, judging from the number of applications on hand, VA officials feel many veterans are not aware of their eligibility for the special equipment addition to their cars. He explained that those who previously received grants--whether the amount was \$1,600 or \$2,800--cannot receive a second purchase grant, but they can receive payment for the costs or installation of adaptive devices purchased since January 1, 1971.

Interested veterans are urged to contact their nearest VA office or veterans service organization representative. VA offices are listed in the phone directory under "United States government."

C of C Happenings

The Chamber of Commerce was highly pleased with some fine publicity about the Rockport area which appeared in the Sept. 19 issue of THE TEXAS STAR, newspaper magazine supplement which is distributed with the Sunday issue of many newspapers throughout the state.

Under the title "Wings Along the Gulf," the article included the following praise regarding our area:

Except for the practiced eye, it now is very difficult to distinguish the juveniles from the adults of the bird population. Some of the younger ones have even brighter plumage than the older birds; these, of course, didn't have to go through the molting period.

One of the greatest concentrations with many varieties is around the Bird Island group, south of Corpus Christi not far off the mainland--in the vicinity of the Atascosa refuge. But perhaps the Rockport area, because of the frequent visitations of ornithologists and the availability of the Whooping Crane excursion boat, gets the greatest traffic of bird watchers.

Each year the dicky bird lovers from practically every state in the Union flock to Texas just to study such interesting creatures as the pelicans, roseate spoonbills, egrets, the great Frigate birds and the smaller birds that prance along the sand, picking up the minute crustaceans.

From October to February each year--the Whooping Cranes bring countless thousands of persons to Rockport and the Aransas Wildlife refuge. Right now these birds are at the summer breeding grounds somewhere north of the Pre-Cambrian shield in Canada. Forecasts indicate they will bring back an increase in their family, bringing the total to 60 or more birds this fall.

Such official groups as the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the Audubon Society, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the Texas Ornithological Society are constantly exercising protection, not only for the birds that are seen, but those in the rookeries back where access by humans is difficult.

The Texas birds are for everyone. Organized trails and watch towers make it easy to study avifauna. Persons with powerful field glasses and bird check lists walk these trails almost every day. They study the nesting birds at a comfortable distance and catalog their findings.

Others work along the coastline in boats, spotting the birds in the low flats and tall grasses. The Texas Ornithological Society has annual field trips, made up of serious members and occasional watchers, who spend weekends bird spying. G. A. Newman, a biology instructor at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene, is this year's president.

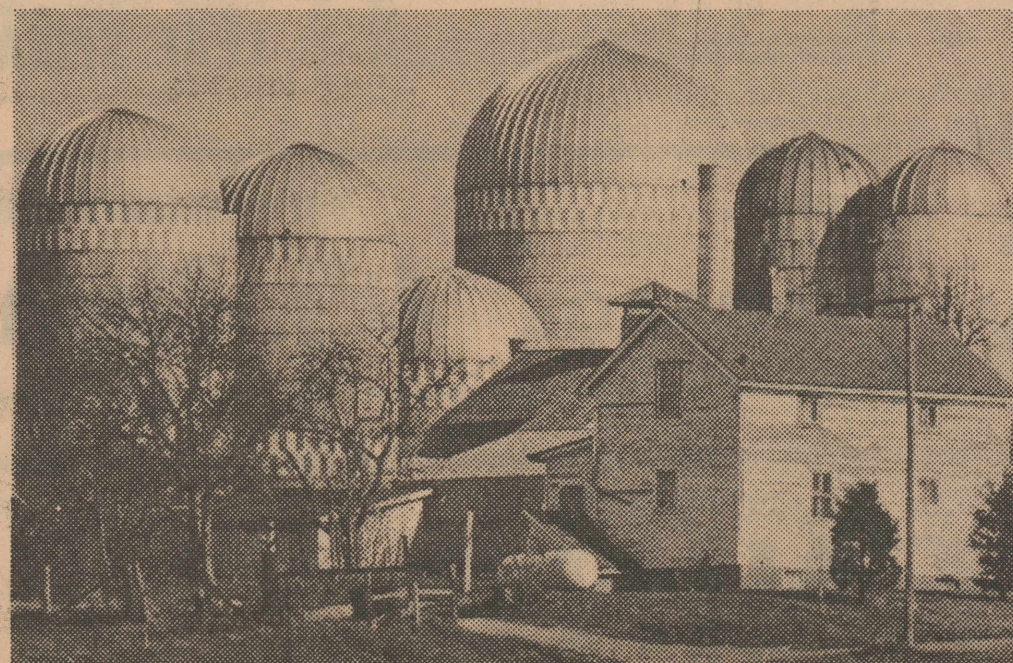

Oil News

Petroleum Management, Inc. has completed its No. 2 Heist Gas Unit as a dual gas discovery in Aransas County East Aransas Pass Field, five miles northwest of Aransas Pass.

The casing completion was gauged for an absolute open flow of 840 Mcf of dry gas a day from perforations at 7,227-31 feet in the proposed A-1 reservoir. On test through adjustable choke the zone flowed 403 Mcf with 1,013 pounds casing pressure. Shut-in pressure was 2,280 pounds.

Producing from perforations at 7,740-56 feet overall in the proposed E-1-2 Sand, the tubing string was gauged for an absolute open flow of 7,400 Mcf of gas a day. Gas-condensate ratio was 61,025-1 and liquid gravity was 61.8 degrees. On test through adjustable, choke the zone flowed 1,612 Mcf with 2,034 pounds tubing pressure. King Mackerel Can Be Good

Austin - The merits of kingfish is a much debated subject along the Texas coast.

The controversy centers not around the fish's sporting qualities -- everyone seems to like the fast action connected with fishing for kingfish -- but with its palatability. Many of those who go after kingfish choose to discard their catch and then stop off at the supermarket for something else to take home to mama.

This is an unfortunate waste of good meat, according to Ann Holden, home economist for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

"Kings need extra special treatment, but they can be quite good to eat," said Mrs. Holden. The secret lies in the handling

of the fish as soon as it is boated. If the fisherman is careless in the handling, the cook can hardly be blamed if the fish is unfit to eat.

First, the fish must be bled as soon as possible. This can be done by slashing the king across the gills and then holding the fish upside down so the blood can drain.

The fish must be iced down quickly. Letting it lie around on a hot boat deck will ruin it.

As with other large fish, kings may be either filleted or cut into steaks. The meat along the lateral line should be trimmed away since it usually has a bitter taste.

King steaks have a round or "eye" muscle which can be cut out and prepared as a special delicacy in the same manner as scallops. Since it is boneless it

can be dipped in batter and deep fried.

Steaks can be barbecued or smoked outdoors over coals, but it is important to keep the meat basted well with oil or a sauce with fat in it.

Fillets can be covered with a creole sauce, wrapped in foil and baked. As with most seafood, a lemon-butter sauce is great with kingfish.

Here are some recipes which can be used with kingfish or any other species:

- ORIENTAL KING MACKEREL STEAKS**
2 pounds king mackerel steaks
1/4 cup orange juice
1/4 cup soy sauce
2 tablespoons catsup
2 tablespoons melted fat or oil
2 tbs. chopped parsley
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 teaspoon oregano

1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 clove garlic, finely chopped
Cut steaks into serving-size portions. Place fish in a single layer in a shallow dish. Combine remaining ingredients. Pour sauce over fish and let stand for 30 minutes, turning once. Remove fish, saving sauce for basting. Place fish on a well-greased broiler pan. Broil about 3 inches from source of heat for 4 to 5 minutes. Turn carefully and brush with remaining sauce. Broil 4 to

5 minutes longer or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork. Serves 6.

When cooking over the coals be sure the flame is very low. If a smoky flavor is desired, soak hickory chips or other hard wood overnight and put on the fire to create smoke. Cook fish slowly, basting often with sauce. Use well-greased, hinged wire grills for easier handling of fish.

BARBECUED SPANISH OR KING MACKEREL
2 pounds mackerel fillets or

other fish filets
3/4 cup vegetable juice
1/2 cup hickory-flavored barbecue sauce
1/2 teaspoon salt

Cut fish into serving size portions. Place in a single layer, skin side down, in a well-greased baking dish, 13 x 9 x 2 inches. Combine remaining ingredients. Pour over fish. Bake in a moderate oven, 350 deg., for 25 to 30 minutes or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork.

This committee was named at a general meeting of parents and teachers held last May. The committee was given the responsibility to draw up an organizational plan for the League and to establish a general policy plan.

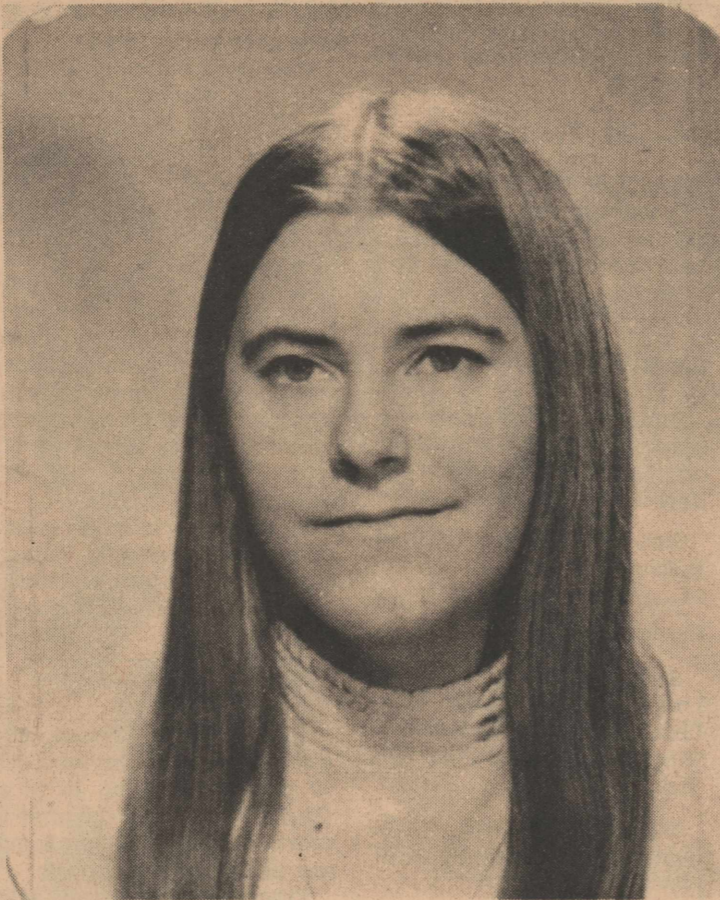
