ASC Committee Nominations Being Accepted

Farmers are being reminded that nominations for membership on ASC community committees will be established at the ASCS County Office. A special effort is being made to get the greatest possible participation of eligible voters in the election.

E. J. Pope, Jr., Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Hale County Committee, said today that farmers who are eligible to vote in the committee elections also have the right to nominate as candidates for committee membership any farmer who is eligible and willing to serve. Such petitions, signed by six or more eligible voters, may be filed at the County Office any time before August 20th.

Local nominations may be made by the incumbent ASC community and county committees, if these are required or determined desirable.

"We want the best men available to serve on the ASC committee," Chairman Pope declared, "because the committee system is the backbone of farm programs—those dealing with conservation of soil and water, as well as the price support activities in various commodities. In the last couple of years, the farmer-elected committee system unique in the history of agriculture, has come under considerable scrutiny. As a result of intensive study by official groups, the system is not only being retained, but has been greatly strengthened."

"Farmer eligible to vote" is taking part in one of the national farm programs which the ASC committee helps to administer. A person eligible to hold office as a committeeman among other qualifications is a local resident who is eligible to vote in the election. Further information on these and other qualifications may be obtained from the ASC county office.

The election of ASC community committees throughout Hale County will be held in September and will be by mail. The final date for return of ballots will be August 15 in the August ASCS Newsletter.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new subsection which reads as follows: "(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

The ultimate goal of the High School Student Citizenship Seminars sponsored by Texas Farm Bureau is to convey to students of junior and senior high school age a better understanding of the American system and way of life. Two basic types of finishes are used on velvet fabrics: A crush-resistant finish on rayon and cotton types—usually urea or melamine formaldehyde, which are not used on acetate, nylon or silk; and spot resistant finishes, which are usually achieved with durable type, water-repellent compounds. The new-type oil and water-repellent finishes are also used in some cases.

Keeping clothing immaculately clean actually extends its life. Extension Service clothing specialists emphasize. They remind that the National Institute of Drycleaning says it is unwise to

specify "press only" for clothing which has been soiled with body oils. Pressing just sets these damaging soils into the fabric so they are harder to remove.

To give potato salad a new look and convenience for picnics, dissolve a package of unflavored gelatin according to package directions and add it to the regular salad ingredients. Put the potato salad in a loaf-shaped pan, lightly oiled and lined with slices of tomatoes. When the salad is unmolded, the sliced tomatoes are on top.

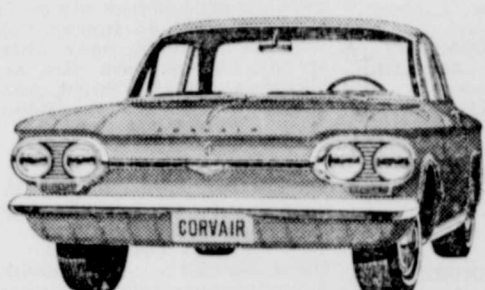

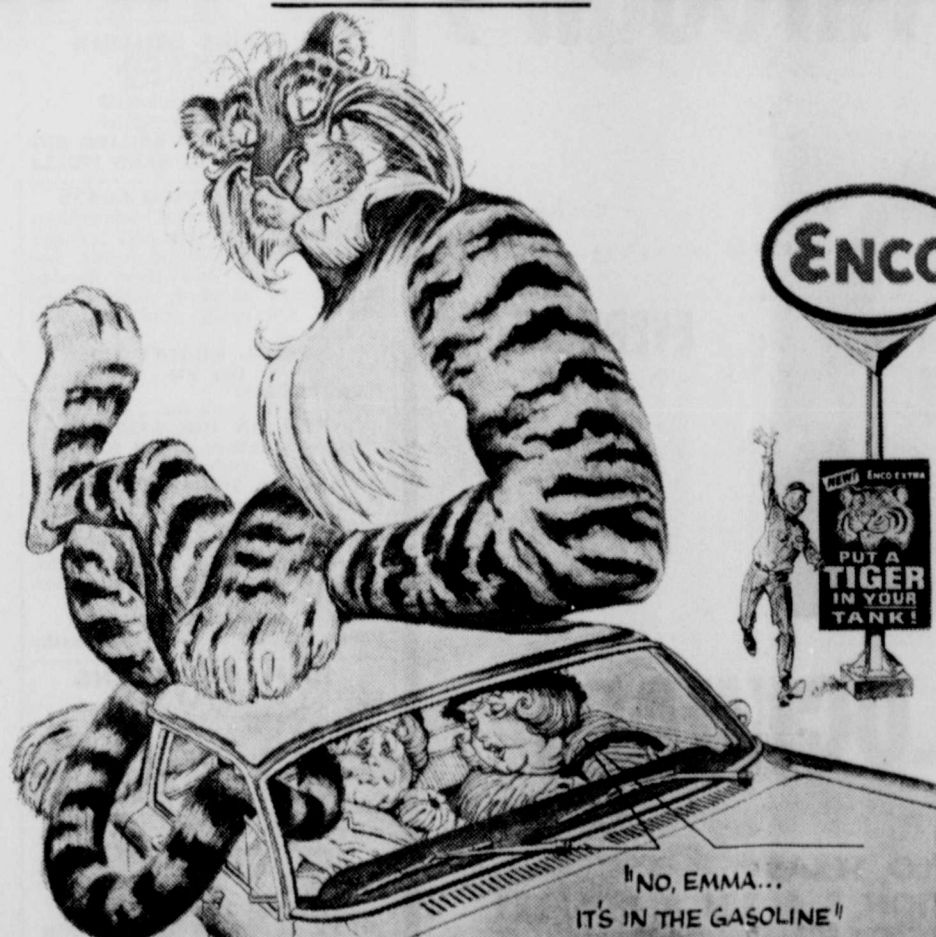

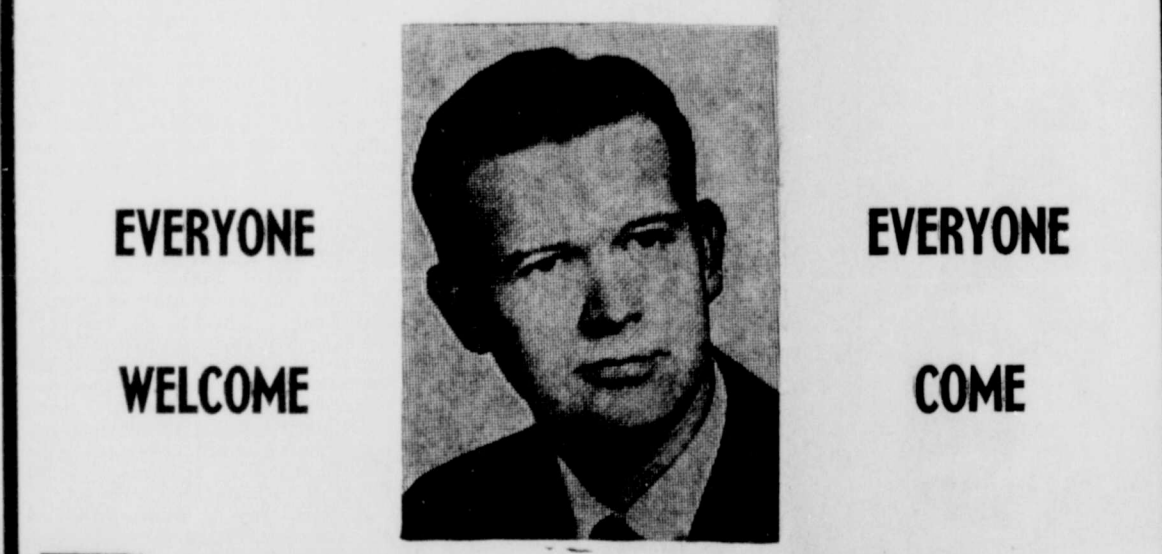
