MD. TROOPS FIGHT INFURIATED MOB

Nazarene Church Opens District Meet Here Tomorrow

MEETINGS ARE HELD BY WMS, YOUNG PEOPLE

The vanguard of the West Texas district of the Nazarene church arrived here yesterday and this morning for sectional conferences preliminary to the opening of the annual assembly of the district at the First Methodist church tomorrow morning.

At the Nazarene Young People's society and the Women's Missionary society was held at the church last night.

This morning the two societies went into separate business sessions at the Nazarene church. Presiding over the women was Mrs. W. R. McClure, of Quanah, and over the young people, the Rev. O. M. Hoek, of Lubbock. The devotional last night was conducted by the Rev. J. W. Whitaker, of Hamlin, who brought a message under the subject "Go Forward". The message was a recapitulation of the progress made by the two societies since their organization, a survey of the situation before them and a reminder of the responsibilities which rest upon them for the future.

Welcomed By Pryor

The gathering was welcomed by the Rev. Luther Pryor, pastor of the Nazarene church. Mrs. H. J. Hart, of Wichita Falls, sang a vocal solo. When the general session opens tomorrow morning, Dr. John W. Goodwin, of Los Angeles, California, general superintendent of the denomination, will preside. Asst. general superintendent will be the Rev. V. B. Atteberry, of Abilene, district superintendent.

W. H. LaRue will welcome the delegates in behalf of the city; the Rev. Frank L. Turner, pastor of the First Methodist church and president of the Nazarene pastors' association, will preside in the afternoon.

To Close Sunday

The session will come to a close Sunday evening. At that time ordination ceremonies will be held and licenses conferred upon new ministers. Officers for the various district societies will be elected during the course of the convention.

Business sessions will be held each day and each evening devotional services will take place. All of these are open to the public.

Delegates, the majority of whom were to arrive today and tomorrow, will be quartered in the homes of Cisco people. Their meals will be served in a large mess hall, established in the lower floor of the telephone exchange building where a kitchen has been installed in charge of Floyd Henbest and Mrs. Vera Doyle. Three meals will be served there each day.

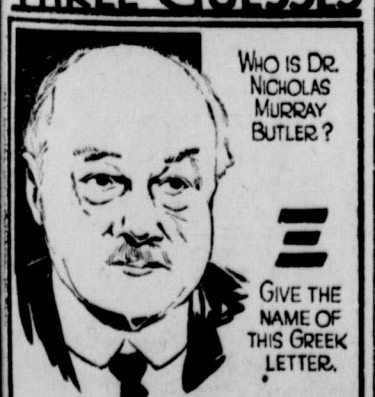
Between 400 and 600 people are expected to attend the convention.

Victims of Mob Vengeance



Jack Holmes, 29, left, and Thomas Harold Thurmond, 28, right, confessed kidnaper-slayers of Brooke Hart, 22-year-old San Jose, Cal. youth, whom a mob of 10,000 seized from the San Jose jail and hanged in the public park Sunday night after the decomposed body of their victim, son of wealthy parents, was found floating in San Francisco bay.

Issue Between Lobo and Eagle Unclouded

The action of the executive committee of the oil belt district in denying Ranger's demand that Cisco be required to make simultaneous forfeiture of the Cisco-Ranger game here Armistice day, leaves the issue between the Cisco Lobos and the Abilene Eagles Thanksgiving day unclouded.

The game will mean a title for the Abilene Eagles or a tie with the Cisco team and the necessity of a play-off.

Ranger had protested that Cisco knew of the ineligibility of the Ranger boy, as being too old, prior to the game and had held back the information as a committee weapon in the event of such a defeat as the Lobos sustained.

The protest, however, fell flat when the Cisco authorities proved to the satisfaction of all the committee members empowered with a vote, that the evidence upon which the ineligibility of the Ranger lad was declared, was obtained after the game and not before, and that all evidence obtained prior to the game was inadequate and confusing.

Title at Stake

So, the Cisco boys go to Abilene today after tomorrow with the district title once more at stake in the classic meeting of two rivals of the longest standing in the district. Through one of the most devious courses that a championship trend has ever taken in this area so deeply imbued with the spirit of football, this meeting has gained the primary interest. Not since 1928, when a situation somewhat analogous to that which now pertains existed, has this been true.

But the Eagles, as usual, hold the advantage. They need nothing more than a tie to win the title. The Ranger forfeiture leaves their conference record clear of stain. It keeps one game against the Lobos, however, and the home boys must win.

Roosevelt's New Deal Promise Becomes Actuality for 100,000 Jobless Texans

DALLAS, Nov. 28 — President Roosevelt's promise of a New Deal has become an actuality for some 100,000 Texans and 300,000 odd members of their families.

Since Nov. 15 those 100,000 Texans have been employed in construction enterprises made possible through the \$400,000,000 Civil Works Administration program designed to take 4,000,000 able bodied men off relief rolls in the United States.

For the Texans already employed bleak prospects of a winter of want and suffering have been replaced by the cheerful of a comfortable and sustaining existence that will not come from charity, but from toil.

And those 100,000 Texans are not to be the only beneficiaries of the giant program in which the federal government and the state of Texas have joined hands.

Each day additional hundreds are being added to the work payrolls. Skilled workers are earning \$30 a week on the basis of a 30-work week, with \$12 weekly going to unskilled workers.

211,000 Expected

According to Col. Lawrence Westbrook, Texas relief director, approximately 211,000 Texans—men and women—will have been employed before the program is ended.

Even those not in need of employment will be materially affected

MRS. FERGUSON WILL NOT ASK ANOTHER TERM

AUSTIN, Nov. 28.—Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson will not run for re-election as governor of Texas, she said today.

The state's only woman governor chose the language of the late President Calvin Coolidge, "I do not choose to run," in explaining her desire to retire to private life.

"It is the time honored custom to restrict tenure in the governor's office to two terms. Though delayed, the people have honored me with a second term and I feel that in obedience to a wise custom I should retire."

At the close of my present term I will have served four years as governor and will have presided over the governor's mansion for almost seven years. This is enough honor for one family—in all probability it is more than will ever come to any other family," the governor said.

F. E. HARRELL RESIGNS POST ON COMMITTEE

Resignation of F. E. Harrell, as county relief committeeman from Cisco, was announced following a meeting of the Eastland County Board of Welfare and Employment at Eastland last night.

Mr. Harrell is a charter member of the government relief organization in Eastland county which has been perpetuated under a variety of titles since the county RFC committee was established on September 23, 1932. The RFC organization, financed by relief grants to states out of the federal Reconstruction Finance corporation funds, has been remodeled into a new organization with the dual duties of directing relief out of state and federal funds, and the civil works administration employment program recently put into effect by order of President Roosevelt to take care of winter unemployment.

"Served My Time"

"I've served my time," explained Mr. Harrell, whose resignation was accepted with expressions of regret and a vote of thanks for the service he has rendered in helping to make the Eastland county relief unit one of the most effective in the state. "I've given service at the expense of my company and my personal business. I'm going back to sell lumber and take a vacation."

Harrell is manager of the Cisco house of Rockwell Brothers company.

No committeeman was nominated in his stead. Three new employees, however, have been added to the organization to take over functions which he attended to in connection with his duties as committeeman.

Paying Officers

A. Angus was elected county paying officer for direct relief; Frank Kittrell was elected county paymaster for the CWA program, and E. R. Trimble was made assistant administrator in charge of the Cisco headquarters office of the organization.

Need of new projects with which to provide employment for all who need it in the county was the principal item of business discussion at the Eastland meeting. At present, it was said, enough approved projects exist to provide jobs for only 796, although more than 1,200 are being employed. Some projects are awaiting approval in Austin, however.

Committeemen were asked to make careful surveys of the county and to suggest needed new projects for recommendation.

Present were Chairman Earl Conner, of Eastland; E. A. Ringold, of Ranger, who was elected secretary of the county committee in Harrell's stead; Frank Kik, of Gorman; E. R. Yarbrough, of Carbon, and Mr. Harrell.

During the first fortnight of the CWA program in Eastland county more than 2,000 workers were given employment and over \$20,000 paid them in wages. Mr. Harrell, County Administrator Gilbert and a staff of assistants worked continuously from Friday through Friday night and Saturday until late Saturday evening to get government checks into the hands of the workers as promised.

POLICE CALLED TO STOCKYARDS STRIKE SECTOR

CHICAGO, Nov. 28. — The Chicago stockyards, largest livestock market in the world, will close at 3 p. m. tomorrow until the strike of stock handlers can be settled.

CHICAGO, Nov. 28. — Police riot squads were called today to the Chicago stock yards where a strike of livestock handlers threatened to develop serious violence.

Fist fighting broke out in streets surrounding the stock yards. Half a dozen affrays were reported with an hour. The fighting was sporadic. Hundreds of men thronged the streets watching progress of the strike.

An armistice that was called in the labor dispute yesterday, noon ended at 8 a. m. and officials called groups of strikers began gathering about the stock pens threatening to tear down the livestock scales.

PROGRAM FOR HOLIDAYS IS BEING SHAPED

A group of merchants met at the chamber of commerce yesterday afternoon, with W. J. Leach presiding, and adopted a holiday business promotion program for Cisco.

The program includes a Santa Claus parade, scheduled for December 9; a three-day carnival and style show to be staged December 7, 8 and 9, under the auspices of the American Legion, and street decorations for Cisco.

Contract for the latter was let to James Haynie of the Oil Belt Decorating company, who is bringing an absolutely new design to Cisco for this purpose.

These decorations will consist of streamers of Christmas bunting across each block, a row of pine trees, studded with colored lights down each side of D avenue, with larger trees at the corners of each intersection, and the shrouding of street lamp standards in coats of grey moss, enlivened with holly berries. Each of the lamps will be hooded with a great star, likewise of moss, pinked with lights, the center being formed of the lamp glow.

The scheme is expected to produce the most beautiful effect of any street decoration used here.

For the American Legion carnival the lower floor of the telephone exchange building will be divided into booths rented and decorated by the merchants for the showing of their goods.

Across the street, on the opposite corner, the lower floor of the Mancill building will be the scene of nightly dances. Other entertainment is being arranged as Cisco merchants, although somewhat late to start, prepare for the most attractive holiday season in recent history.

Former Ciscoan Dies Near Weatherford

FORT WORTH, Nov. 28.—J. W. Stinson, Sr., 70, formerly of Fort Worth, died at his home near Weatherford at 2:10 p. m. yesterday after a long illness. He lived here five years before moving to Parker county nine months ago.

Mr. Stinson was a former manager of the radio department of Veil-Crawford Hardware company and had been employed in the radio department at Monig's before he retired.

Funeral services will be held at 10:30 a. m. tomorrow at Harveson & Coie Arlington Heights chapel. Rev. W. R. White will officiate.

Survivors are his widow, two sons, J. W. Stinson, Jr., Tulsa, and R. C. Stinson, Fort Worth; a daughter, Mrs. Will Anderson, Weatherford, and a brother, Gus Cooper, Strawn.

Mr. Stinson will be remembered by old residents of Cisco as Jasper Stinson who was employed in the John T. Creech drug store, which occupied the building where Collins Hardware company now is. Mr. Stinson left Cisco about 1885 and went to Thurber, a thriving mining community then, and later went to Fort Worth.

Lunch Stand Pair Robbed of \$1,100

MINERAL WELLS, Nov. 28.—A wide search was extended over Texas today for three men who last night robbed James Butler and his wife of \$1,170 at their lunch stand on highway No. 1 five miles east of here.

The robbers entered the lunch stand and ordered food. Butler told officers. When he went to the purse to get change one of the men slugged him with a black jack. Mrs. Butler was knocked to the floor when she intervened, Butler said. The bandits grabbed the purse and ran.

Remembers Cyclone In Cisco in 1893

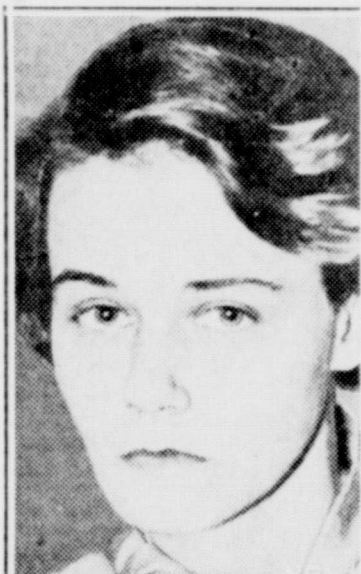

WILL SUE GOVERNOR ATTORNEYS SAY

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 28.—Two San Francisco attorneys who were to have defended Jack Holmes in the Hart kidnapping case today announced that Gov. Rolph and other law enforcement authorities would be sued by members of the lynched man's family. Gov. Rolph will be charged with inciting the lynching of Holmes and Thomas Thurmond, the attorneys said.

Mrs. Tomlinson Is Reported Improved

Mrs. John Tomlinson was reported to be improved today following a sudden illness Friday evening. Physicians diagnosed her condition as due to a cerebral hemorrhage.

Long Seeks Hearing To Refute Charges

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 28.—Sen. Huey P. Long brought three witnesses to the senate sub-committee investigating his political empire today and asked permission to refute charges of Sam Hunter, Shreveport oil man, that Long's organization tried to obtain \$5,000 from him on threats of imprisonment.

ESCAPE WITH RINGLEADERS OF LYNCHING

BULLETIN

SALISBURY, Md., Nov. 28.—Seven newspapermen were besieged in their hotel rooms here this afternoon by members of the mob which earlier had attacked militiamen and had been repulsed by tear gas bombs.

A photographer, unable to escape the mob's fury, was attacked and beaten seriously. He was not identified. Four other news men were in the lobby of the hotel when the crowd approached and fled out the back door. The seven men later escaped.

SALISBURY, Md., Nov. 28.—State militiamen escaped an infuriated mob today with four alleged lynchmen in trucks which rolled out of Salisbury toward Baltimore after a fight in which the soldiers threw more than 100 tear gas bombs at citizens bent on freeing the four men.

The thwarted citizens, who had engaged in wild disorder all morning in front of the armory where the prisoners were held, threw stones and clubs after the fleeing trucks.

The sedan in which Attorney General William Lane and Brig. General Milton Reckord were riding, was struck by the stones. Several windows were smashed, but the officials inside indicated they were unhurt as they signalled for the troop trucks to hasten through the bedlam of Salisbury's main street.

Arrested at Dawn

The four alleged ringleaders of the mob which lynched a negro at nearby Princess Anne last month were arrested shortly before dawn by the soldiers at orders of Gov. Albert Ritchie, who vowed that the lynching should not go unpunished.

Incensed citizens hurried to Salisbury, muttering against Gov. Ritchie.

By noon about 2,000 men and women were shouting down imprecations upon the governor's head, demanding his impeachment, and insisting upon the release of the captives.

MOB ACTION

Two hapless men, who had succumbed to the eternal ego, failed to profit by the experience of other kidnapers with an aroused American public opinion, and danced off this mortal coil at ropes' ends in the public park of San Jose, California, Sunday night. They had confessed the kidnapping and brutal killing of a San Jose youth, whom they said they had thrown into the waters of San Francisco bay after stunning him by a blow upon the head. Duck hunters found the body, horribly treated and decomposed, floating in the bay and towed it ashore, and a mob of 10,000 Californians, infuriated by the outrage, stormed the San Jose jail, struck down a gallant sheriff fighting in defense of his prisoners, seized the two confessed kidnaper-slayers and meted out mob vengeance in its most grisly form. This summary retribution taken, the crowd milled about its ghastly handiwork while officialdom retired with a faint damns and said there probably wouldn't be anything done about the matter, which, at any rate, was conclusive enough to prove that California wouldn't stand for kidnappings. And so it does. The scene was a re-enactment of the swift justice which pioneer California visited upon an infestation of bad men who turned its fair coasts into cesspools of crime. The dark bodies that dangled against the dark skies of primitive California were recalled by the sight of the wretched pair strung to tree limbs in a San Jose park Sunday night, drastic reminder that the children of the "forty-niners" are just as determined to maintain order and the safety of decent citizenship as were their forebears.

But, there is a difference. The vigilantes of early days of California arose to meet an emergency in which delegated authority had failed them. In the case of the San Jose kidnapers the agencies of the law had ferreted them out, solved their terrible crime, fastened their guilt upon them and were proceeding to a just and proper punishment, not in a spirit of vengeance, but in a spirit of righteous retribution. The orderly and effective processes were overturned in a spirit of monetary unrestraint. The end which fell upon these unfortunate creatures was not undeserved as man's law measures retribution for crime. But for the governor of a state and the officials under him to condone, even tacitly, mob action is a serious thing.

No crime, no matter how heinous, justifies mob law unless, and to the extent that the duly constituted machinery for dealing with that crime has broken down or become corrupted. The function of law is not merely to punish. From the national and state constitutions through all the legal construction erected upon these basic formulae, there are implanted inhibitive measures against unbridled passion. The very form and nature of our courts argue that man is prone to unjust haste and destructive intolerance. Upon the proper and orderly functioning of the judicial functions depend, not merely the assurance of a punishment of crime, but the insurance of the rights of citizens and the preservation of the virtues of the commonwealth.

Kidnaping is a terrible crime, justifying the harshest measures. Mob passion is even more terrible in its fruits. One should not lay too great blame upon the persons responsible for the San Jose incident. The indignation that burst forth was righteous. It may accomplish much good in that it will serve as so ghastly an example to the criminal world that further incitement will not occur. It is to be hoped it will.

PRODUCERS OF THE GOLDEN GRAIN.

American farmers are large producers of wheat. They have not been overlooked in the acreage reduction campaign. Secy. Henry A. Wallace announced Nov. 22 that \$729,395 had been paid to 15,072 wheat growers who are participating in the government wheat acreage control plan. Checks have been mailed to growers in 92 counties in 15 states. Contracts have been received from 362 of the wheat growing countries in the grain belt commonwealth. Millions of dollars will be paid to the wheat growers who stand for the acreage reduction program. There are 38 wheat growing nations. All are competitors in the markets of the world. In bumper crop years the surplus (in the past at least) has fixed the price. Acreage reduction in the United States is on the way.

CIVIL WORKS JOBS GIVEN TO THE JOBLESS.

A compilation of estimates by state officials in the reports made to the federal department of labor on Nov. 21 placed at upward of 500,000 the total number of unemployed that so far had been put to work by the civil works administration. In the District of Columbia 4,000 had been put back on jobs, with another 3,500 to return to work before the end of the week and about 12,500 by Dec. 1. Texas reported 93,000 taken from the army of the unemployed by the Texas setup of civil works administration. The busy workers appear to be smashing "the great big bad wolf" down here in Texas.

COTTON SPINNING HITS A HIGH MARK

The cotton spinning industry is reported by the census bureau to have operated during October at 101.9 per cent capacity, on a single shift basis, compared with 96.6 per cent during September this year and 97 during October last year. All this under the new code of the national recovery act.

Now he is a battered wreck on the shores of time. Why look for hell in the world instead? There is an ever turning hell in this vale of tears.

A REGENT
H. H. Weinert of Seguin has been

named by Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson regent of the Texas university to fill the vacancy caused by the death of M. T. Yount. He is a member of the noted Weinert family of the Comal-Guadalupe section. His grandfather was one of the pioneer builders of the section. These pioneer builders came from Germany. They did not believe in the plans or the programs of that Bismark who created the German empire and made the Hohenzollerns the divine right to rule emperors of a great people and a powerful nation. Regent Weinert is a product of the University of Texas. He is the son of a very distinguished sire who has been a history maker in the political and industrial and agricultural life of Texas. He is a successful banker, a successful lawyer, a successful farmer and should make an able and progressive regent of the rapidly advancing university of the Lone Star commonwealth. All the Weinerts are for education, for the public schools of the state as well as the university and minor colleges supported by the tax money of the people.

PUBLISHER FAHEY OUTLINES HIS PROGRAM
Publisher John Fahey of Massachusetts is the new chairman of the federal home loan bank board. He has let the public know that 20 chapters have been granted to federal loan and savings associations to provide new funds for home financing. These associations are being formed in seven states and preliminary approval has been given to 86 more in 26 states. A reminder that the federal home loan board modeled after the federal reserve system. Each of the federal and loan associations will be members of

the federal loan system "much as commercial banks are members of a reserve system." Chairman Fahey has been in public life for many years. He has been a successful editor and publisher and man of affairs. Now why a new agency set up? Let Fahey tell it: "Due to the practical withdrawal of many insurance companies and commercial banks from the home finance field, hundreds of thousands of American homes from now on must be financed through other existing institutions which are in a position to extend loans of sufficiently long terms to meet actual home credit conditions." AUSTIN, Nov. 28 — In working out a plan for setting up the substance homestead projects, it has been suggested that machinery exists now for translating the plan into action. The machinery is the A.M. extension service and its district and county farm agents over the state.

This service is actively concerned in working up potential projects and no more effective agency could be found for selection of the eligible homesteaders and their placement and supervision on the farms until they get started.

One theory of the homestead plan is the communal system of joint facilities, so far as possible, cooperative or pool buying and marketing. This would differ from the principle of the soviet kolkhoz or sovkhoz in that the farmer would have a definite, small tract of land, and would be tending toward its ownership, instead of the land being communalized.

Another theory, backed by practical experience, would be to decentralize both the selection of homesteaders and their location. It would take one suitable family study the man's experience and capacity, then find a farm somewhere in a region suited to his type of effort, locate him there, and finance him through two or three crop seasons. This calls instead of five acres and a communal canning plant, gin and commissary, a real farm of 25 to 50 acres, livestock and equipment adequate, when the man gets well started, actually to support him and his family on the products of the farm all costs being borne out of its revenues. Basically, his plan proposes that the farmer shall pay as he can out of his crops for the land over a 15-year period, and that at the end of the period, if he stays with the farm the land shall become his property, so that he and his family are taken out of the city's breadlines or, in petition in overcrowded city job-hunting.

The first trend, in experimental stages, is to locate colonies or groups of farmers on extremely small acreage and a general centralized supervision during initial progress. But even this is capable of broadening out to the other type, where one county agent might supervise and assist only 10 to 25 subsistence homesteaders or families located on substantially larger farms.

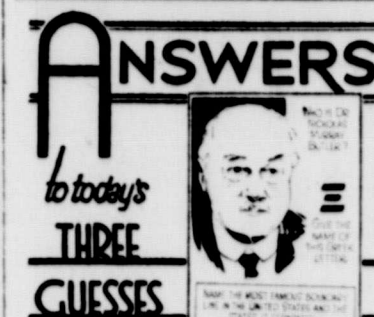

BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON.—Russians are wondering whether their deal with America has stalled off war with Japan or speeded it along. Litvinoff arrived with the Far Eastern situation foremost in mind. Diplomats and military men assume Japanese militarists hope next to take the far end of eastern Siberia in a Pacific expansion program.

Soviet officials were primarily anxious to line up with us on the friendliest possible basis in answer to that threat. Hence their concessions to Roosevelt. We entered no entangling alliance—but look at Litvinoff's smile and recall Roosevelt's assurance that prospects of peace are "greatly strengthened."

Realistic Russians and ever-suspicious American generals and admirals nevertheless feel that the warlike Japanese faction may prefer to strike now—before Russian-American rapprochement strengthens and before Russia is better prepared.

DREADING war in a critical economic period, but with backs stiffened in their Japanese relations, Russians grimly deny in private that they would be a mere setup for Nippon.

They have pleasant visions of a Red air force bombardment of Tokyo—of Red aviators racing gloriously to lively death while showering an inflammable capital city with thermite.

Also, Siberia's vast plains are a

huge buffer for European Russia. Falling back to a secondary defense line, Russia believes she could carry on war while building up behind.

Confidential reports here also say that Russia has some 250,000 fighting men available east of China and that anti-Japanese uprisings in Manchukuo also might be anticipated.

Roosevelt took every possible precaution to assure favorable American reception of the recognition deal.

By design, discussions of the religious issue were the one thing permitted to leak from the White House during negotiations. Roosevelt feared backfire from the churches and sought to reassure them.

Their representatives had been to see him. Russia's religious guarantees were in line with guarantees of the Russian constitution and present practice.

American churches still will be unable to own property, proselytize, or engage in secular affairs.

STRUCTURAL steel will be one of the primary Russian requirements from this country. You haven't heard much about that because Russia has been inclined to brag of her rich ore deposits. The truth is that most Russian ore is too magnetic for large construction purposes, too difficult and expensive to process. Thus her industrial program has been handicapped.

John, in spite of his injury, will not doubt get into the game, so that the entire Cisco team is in condition at least physically for the fray.

Whether it is in condition spiritually is a different question, and one that can only be answered at Abilene next Thursday.

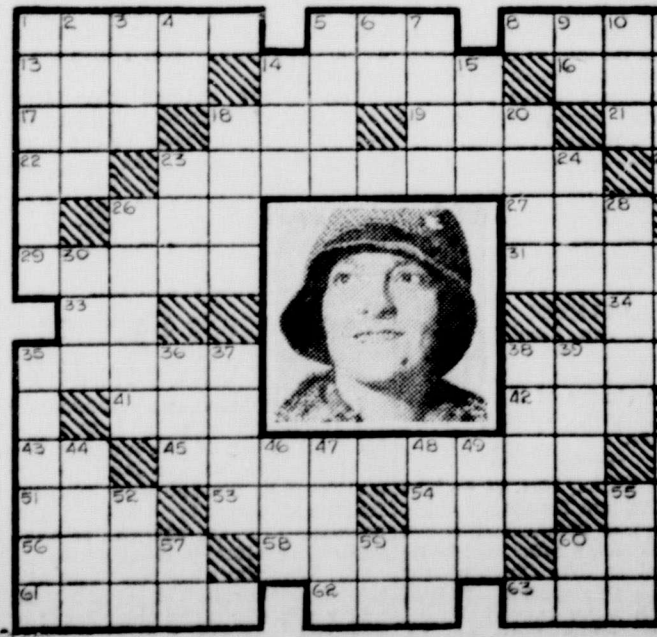

HIDALGO LEADS IN PRODUCTION OF VEGETABLES

DALLAS, Nov. 28.—Hidalgo, rich Rio Grande valley county, led the nation for production of mixed vegetables during 1930, a report by the U. S. Department of Commerce Bureau of the Census, disclosed.

The report represents a survey taken from 50 of the leading counties based on acreage of mixed vegetables harvested in the United States, and giving the rank of these counties by value of the crop.

Of nearly 100,000 acres in mixed vegetables in the 50 counties, valued upwards of \$17,000,000, Hidalgo county had 3,739 acres. It ranked 10th in value of the crop harvested which was \$213,474.

Three other Texas counties qualified in production among the first 50. Dimmitt ranked 12th in production and 49th in value of the mixed vegetable crop harvested. Cameron was 19th in production, 76th in value. Wichita was 36th in production and 65th in value.

Atascosa county headed the list for watermelon production. Eight other Texas counties were listed among the leading 50 counties in the United States. They were Wilcox, Parker, Frio, Wise, Willacy, Henderson, Brooks and Bexar counties named in production rank. Parker county, famous for its melons, ranked 6th in value of the crop which was in 1930 valued at \$182,764. The crop represented about 5 per cent of the value of all vegetables harvested for sale in 1930, excluding potatoes, sweet potatoes and vegetables grown under glass.

four Texas counties. Atascosa county headed the local counties with a rank of 28th. El Paso, Parker and Bexar counties followed.

The tomato crop had the greatest value of all vegetables, according to the report. It totaled \$33,247,599, or 18 per cent of \$296,063,373 crop valuation of all vegetables harvested for sale. Cameron county, Texas, ranked 8th in acreage and value, with Cherokee, Hidalgo and Smith counties listed as among the 50 leading producing counties in the United States.

Four Texas counties were allotted positions among the first 50 in the acreage of all vegetables harvested for sale. Hidalgo county was 7th in acreage and 31st in value. Other counties were Cameron, Rattasosca and Zavala.

Camp and Harris counties were cited for sweet potatoes production. Camp county was listed 20th with an average yield of 884 bushels per acre. Harris county ranked 36th. Forty-six of the counties were in the south.

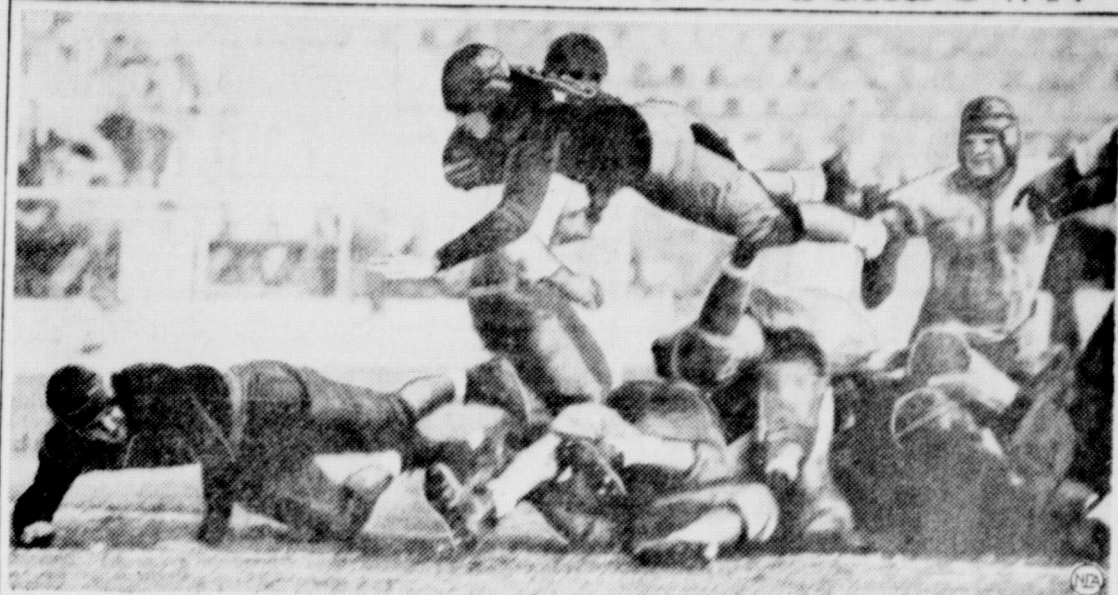

Largest Mass Flight Planned by Soviet

PARIS, Nov. 25.—"The flight that will darken the skies" is being awaited here eagerly, but so far there is no official promise that it will take place.
