Town Talk

What seems to be an odd situation has developed in this area.

The jails in Scurry, Fisher and Nolan Counties have been deemed as not fit to house juvenile prisoners. So any juvenile prisoners from those counties are brought to the Mitchell County jail.

Other counties which house prisoners in Mitchell County are charged \$3 a day for each prisoner. There haven't been many juveniles brought here from these other counties, says Sheriff Bill McGuire. The average stay for juveniles here from other counties is from a day to two weeks.

It seems kind of odd that Scurry County, with all its oil money, doesn't have a jail that can handle juveniles. I understand that a bond issue was passed in Scurry County some time back to build a new jail and a new gas barn. The new gas barn has just about been finished but the new jail has not yet been started.

In Fisher County, a new courthouse was recently completed that did not include jail facilities. Nolan County only recently had its jail "condemned" for housing juveniles so apparently they haven't had time to work out a solution.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe and many other Texans are upset by the fact that while Texas is doing everything possible to produce more oil and gas, New England states are now allowing offshore drilling in areas by their states.

At the same time, they have asked the Ford Administration to exempt them from import fees because of their reliance on imported oil.

In addition to being the nation's largest energy producer, Texas is also the nation's largest consumer of energy. Briscoe has pointed out, "Thus we suffer doubly from the energy crisis," the Governor said.

"If we were to follow the lead of the New England governors, I could call for Texas' energy-related industries to fill the needs of Texas consumers before we begin to send our natural gas and domestically produced oil from state owned lands to the rest of the country," Briscoe said.

"The attitude of provincialism would allow me to consider preserving the oil which is now being drawn from Texas land... But I disagree with this provincial attitude which has been taken by some of our sister states."

Keeping Texas oil and gas for Texans isn't a bad idea, especially if other states continue their provincial attitudes. On top of all this, Congressmen from non-oil producing states are working to do away with the oil-depletion allowance, an allowance that is sorely needed to insure exploration for new sources of energy. It seems that Congress fails to understand the petroleum industry.

However, it does seem that Congress is finally awakening to the plight of the farmer. A bill has just come out of committee increasing the target price of cotton from 38¢ to 48¢ a pound. That isn't nearly enough, but it will help.

Seedling Pines Donated To State Park

Mrs. Sam (Louise) Geisenberger has donated between 100-200 seedling pine trees to Lake Colorado City State Park.

The seedlings were delivered Thursday afternoon by Mrs. E. H. Winn to Park Superintendent Joe Robinette.

Mrs. Geisenberger, who lives in Natchez, Miss., part of the year and in Colorado City some of the time, owns a ranch south of the city and made the donation of Mississippi pines in memory of her mother and father, county pioneers Mr. and Mrs. B. L. Wulfjen.

Robinette said that some of the trees will be planted around residences and the remainder put into a nursery at the park until landscaping plans utilizing the pines can be worked out.

Four Candidates For Four Places

Two more candidates for the city council in Colorado City filed for election Friday, the final date to file.

J. O. Dockrey Jr. filed for election Friday morning and Dr. Elton Berkman filed late Friday night.

There are now four candidates for four positions on the council, incumbents Jody Neff and Rick Perkin having filed earlier.

Dockrey and Berkman will be running for places left vacant by Hank Bryant and Mayor C. C. Burt. Bryant stated his intention earlier that he would not seek re-election, but Burt said that he was undecided.

Election date is April 1, voting box in City Hall open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Both the new candidates have been active in the Chamber of Commerce, and both are especially concerned with the Chamber's Aviation Committee.

Berkman was instrumental in the development of a city-county airport and Dockrey, for the past few years, has been in charge of the Fourth of July Fly-in.

Dockrey said that he is running for election to the council in order to be of service to

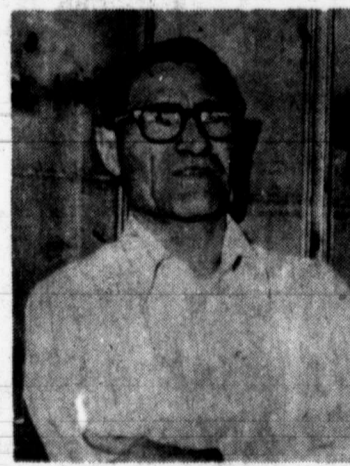
the city. He has been associated with Dockrey Motor Co. with his father and brother and is now owner of the agency. He and his wife, Betty Jo, have a daughter who is a sophomore at Colorado High School. Dockrey and Frank Derregibus own and operate Colorado City Flying Service, offering charter airplane service, and flying is Dockrey's hobby as well.

Dr. Berkman is also a licensed pilot and besides flying, his hobbies include gardening. He and his wife, Dr. Virginia Berkman, own and operate Chiropractic Health Clinic on the Snyder Highway.

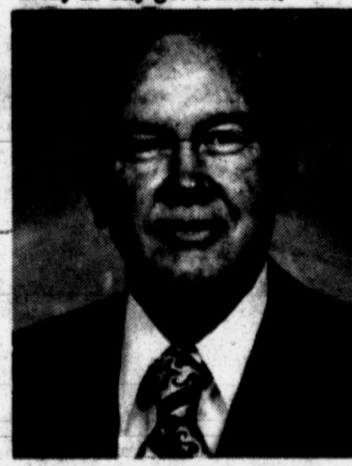
Dr. Berkman is a graduate of Palmer Chiropractic College in Iowa and did pre-professional study at the University of Washington.

City Gets Check Early

4th Quarter Sales Check Is 3rd Largest

Colorado City received the third largest sales tax check, in the amount of \$21,975.33 for fourth quarter sales in 1974, from the office of state comptroller Bob Bullock.

Largest check ever received from the state for the city's sales tax receipts was for fourth quarter sales in 1973, one year ago, amounting to \$26,212.61. Second largest amount was the last check the city got, \$22,231.75 for third quarter sales in 1974.

Checks received in 1973 show the following amounts:

--4th quarter, \$26,212.61.
Sales tax checks received for 1974 show these figures:

--4th quarter, \$21,975.33.

Usually the fourth quarter sales are highest because of the heavy Christmas shopping toward the end of the year.

Lorraine's sales tax check was in the amount of \$654.37, about the same as usual.

The checks came about a month earlier than usual as last year's check for the same quarter was sent March 25.

"I said we would speed up

the payments and we did," Bullock said in a letter accompanying the check.

Bullock said the early payment will help all cities with cash flow problems but he also noted that the total payout was worth some \$400,000 in one month's interest alone if the cities simply invested the money. Speedier handling of the city

money was one of Bullock's primary issues in his election campaign.

Total amount sent to 809 cities and towns in Texas amounted to \$64.1 million. The \$64.1 million for the October-December, 1974 quarter compares to \$58.7 million for the Christmas shopping quarter of 1973 on a statewide basis.

Cotton Meeting Set Monday

A program on cotton diseases and soil fertility has been set for 7:30 p.m. Monday at City National Bank.

Dr. Bob Berry, area plant pathologist, and James Valentine, area soil chemist, will present the program.

"With the poor cotton that was produced due to the extreme dry weather, it should be to our benefit to hear Dr. Berry's recommendations for planting and what we might expect from low germination seed," said county extension agent Bob Benson.

The meeting is being sponsored by the Mitchell County Crops Sub-Committee.

Tax Office-Westbrook Differences Settled

Agreement between County Tax Assessor-Collector C. G. "Skeet" Harkins and Westbrook Superintendent L. M. Dawson over payment made by Westbrook school system to the tax office for collecting school taxes was worked out during a special meeting of the county commissioners' court Thursday afternoon.

County School Superintendent Caddo Matthews was also present for the meeting as Dawson presented copies of an opinion submitted by the state's attorney general to the effect that

the maximum payment under state law is 8/5 of 1% on \$100 valuation for assessing and 1/2 of 1% for collecting taxes for rural high school districts.

A difference of opinion had arisen following Harkins' appearance before the court during its last regular session, when he had requested that the tax office receive more compensation for collecting Westbrook's school taxes. According to a reading of Texas statute 25.07 by Judge Bill Carter, both Harkins and the court thought that the school district could be charged the present 1/2 of one per cent for collecting taxes, plus an additional 2% for assessing taxes.

Dawson pointed out, however, this statute would apply only if Westbrook's board of trustees appointed a private tax assessor, and did not apply to the county tax assessor, who by law, is required to assess and col-

lect taxes for a rural school district.

Dawson stressed the point that he did not want people thinking that Westbrook schools "are beating the county out of money" but rather that in his capacity as superintendent, it was his duty to save the school system money that is not required by law to be paid.

Dawson also stressed that Westbrook pays two clerks in the county tax office \$200 per year for their trouble in updating the school district's tax roll, plus payment in 1974 of \$1,080 to the Fort Worth firm of Pritchard and Abbot for their services in updating the school's tax figures.

The agreement was then reached between Harkins and Dawson that an additional \$1,200 be paid the county tax office by Westbrook school district, the 3/5 of one per cent for assessing taxes. Valuation of West-

brook school district is \$20 million.

Both Judge Carter and commissioner Paul Hunter expressed the feeling that a lack of communication between the Westbrook school and the county tax office was the reason for the difference of opinion.

Westbrook School paid the tax office \$1,768.96 in 1974 for assessing and collecting \$353,790.81 in taxes.

Commissioners also accepted low bid of Frank Motor Co. for a 1975 GMC pickup in the amount of \$3,832.48. Other bids were: Hutchins Ford, \$3,984.38 and Jay Adams Chevrolet, \$3,860.

The county officially entered the Emergency Job Program and will get \$24,000 during the next year to provide jobs. Applications are being taken through the office of Judge Carter. See TAXES Page 11

trict honors and defeated Matador Thursday night in a play-off game, 90-78.

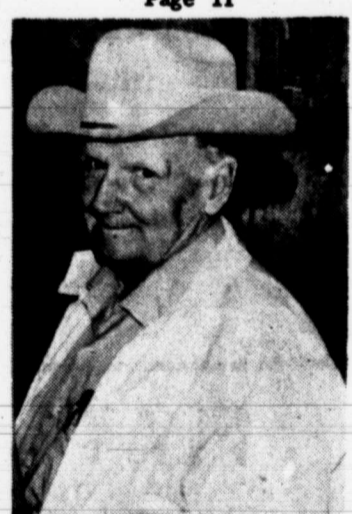

Colorado City Chapter Poetry Society of Texas met for their regular meeting Thursday.

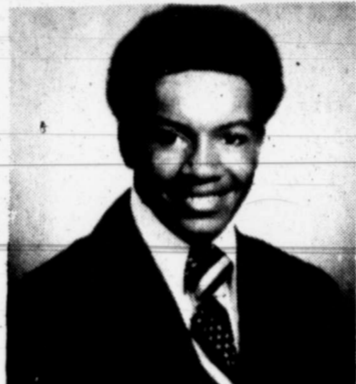
Joe Earnest brought the program. Several members read original poems.

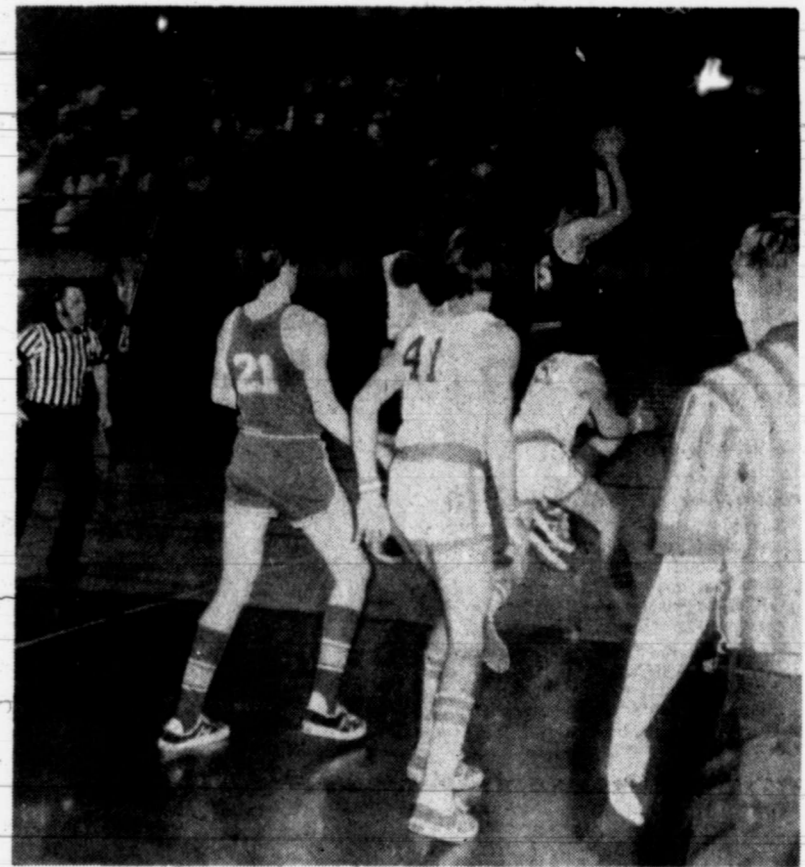

er and submitted to Abilene for final approval.
Western Riding Club's request to use the county ag barn at the fairgrounds for a dance to conclude their May 1-3 junior rodeo was granted, with the stipulation that the north side be closed, the kitchen be closed unless the county Home Demonstration Clubs agree to open it, and that the club make a deposit of \$100 in the event of damages or that the grounds and building need to be cleaned up after the dance.

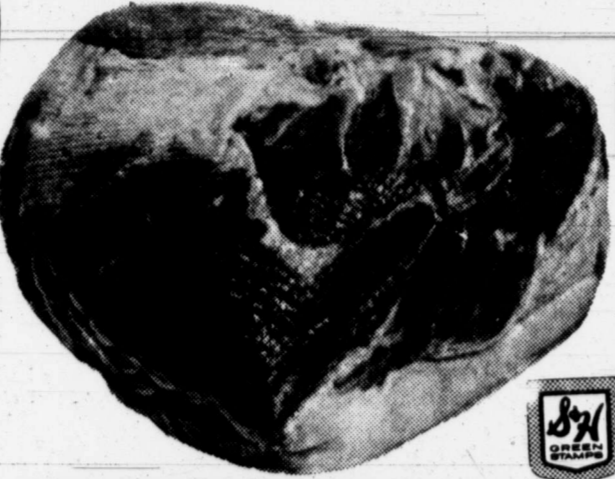

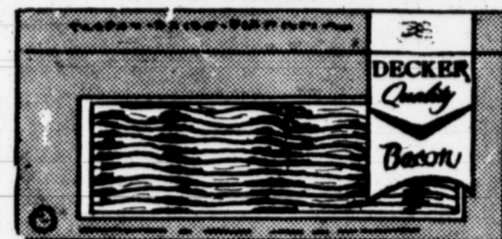
