

OKLAHOMANS LEAVE TODAY FOR AMARILLO

PARTY SPENDS NIGHT HERE; PRAISE IS GIVEN CITY

The Oklahoma City good will party of 125 left Lubbock early this morning for Plainview, Amarillo and intermediate points, following the courtesies of a banquet and a dance given in honor of the visitors in this city last night.

Lubbock's program of entertainment, which started yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock when the good will special arrived, was described by the Oklahomans as the climax of the entire trip.

Banquet Held
The Lubbock Chamber of Commerce and the Rotary Club were hosts at last night's banquet, presided over by J. J. Clements, president of the club.

A. B. Davis was introduced by President Clements after a short address of welcome, who further emphasized this city's pleasure in

entertaining the distinguished group. Davis in turn introduced Claude W. Stone, of the visiting delegation, chairman of the entertainment and speakers' committee.

R. A. Singletary, manager of the good roads division of the Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce, was the first speaker to appear for the visitors. Mr. Singletary is well known in Lubbock, having been connected with local citizens in the work of the Carlsbad Cavern highway association for some time.

As a prelude to his address, the official announced that on last Thursday an agreement was reached between the Texas highway commission, the Oklahoma highway commission and the county commissioners court of Jackson county, whereby the toll bridge between Quanah and Eldorado will be eliminated. Contract for erection of a five bridge is expected to be let within the next thirty days.

Progress Reported
"We have made good progress on the Carlsbad highway," said Mr. Singletary, "and we hope to be able to report even greater progress within the near future. We are experiencing some little trouble at this time in New Mexico but hope to have all of this ironed out before long. I want to express my appreciation for the towns along the route of the highway in sending delegations to Lubbock today to meet and bring information needed to present our claims for federal designation. If we don't get what we are after now, don't

get discouraged, because we'll get her after awhile. In the next two years I hope to see Oklahoma City, Lubbock, Carlsbad and El Paso linked together with a long ribbon of hard surfaced road."

Ralph Miller, business manager of the Oklahoma Farmer-Stockman, was introduced by Mr. Stone and responded with a short talk regarding the advertising work of the South Plains, Inc., subsidiary of the Lubbock Board of City Development.

"My paper has carried the message of Lubbock and this country to almost 200,000 farm homes and we have watched the progress and things you are doing down here," he stated. "In my opinion, you have the greatest possibilities from an agricultural standpoint of any section in the entire country. You do not yet know yourselves just what you have in the way of advancement and opportunities for advancement and progress. You have land, climate, location, citizens of real merit and a determination to forge onward."

A variety of wit and humor expressed in his every action and word, Walter Harrison, managing editor of the Daily Oklahoman and Times, followed Miller. Harrison held his entire address to the lighter vein and, though he flung a bolt of friendly criticism at Lubbock in his afternoon address regarding the lack of airport facilities, refused to take serious topics at the night meeting.

"Fellow, it's a funny thing to me, here we have all been selling Lub-

bock to ourselves and have seemed to forget that we are on a good will trip for Oklahoma City," laughing declared Ed Overholser, president of the Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce.

"Let me tell you this, Lubbock don't need any help in selling, she's got everything it takes and then some plus. But they have the right idea, we've got to get together, pull together and in that way all of us will advance and progress. In my opinion Lubbock is destined to be the outstanding city of the southwest. I like this country, I like the people and we are natural allies. All you have to do now to keep going forward is keep in close touch with us."

The Oklahoma City boosters visit was climaxed last night by a dance held in the ballroom of the Hilton Hotel. An orchestra from the visiting capital furnished the music and ladies of Lubbock were guests of the trippers.

In connection with the visit, delegates from every town along the route of the Carlsbad Cavern highway from Quanah assembled at the local chamber of commerce yesterday afternoon for a conference with Mr. Singletary regarding planned federal designation for the route. No definite action was taken at the meeting other than a discussion of the problems now facing the organization.

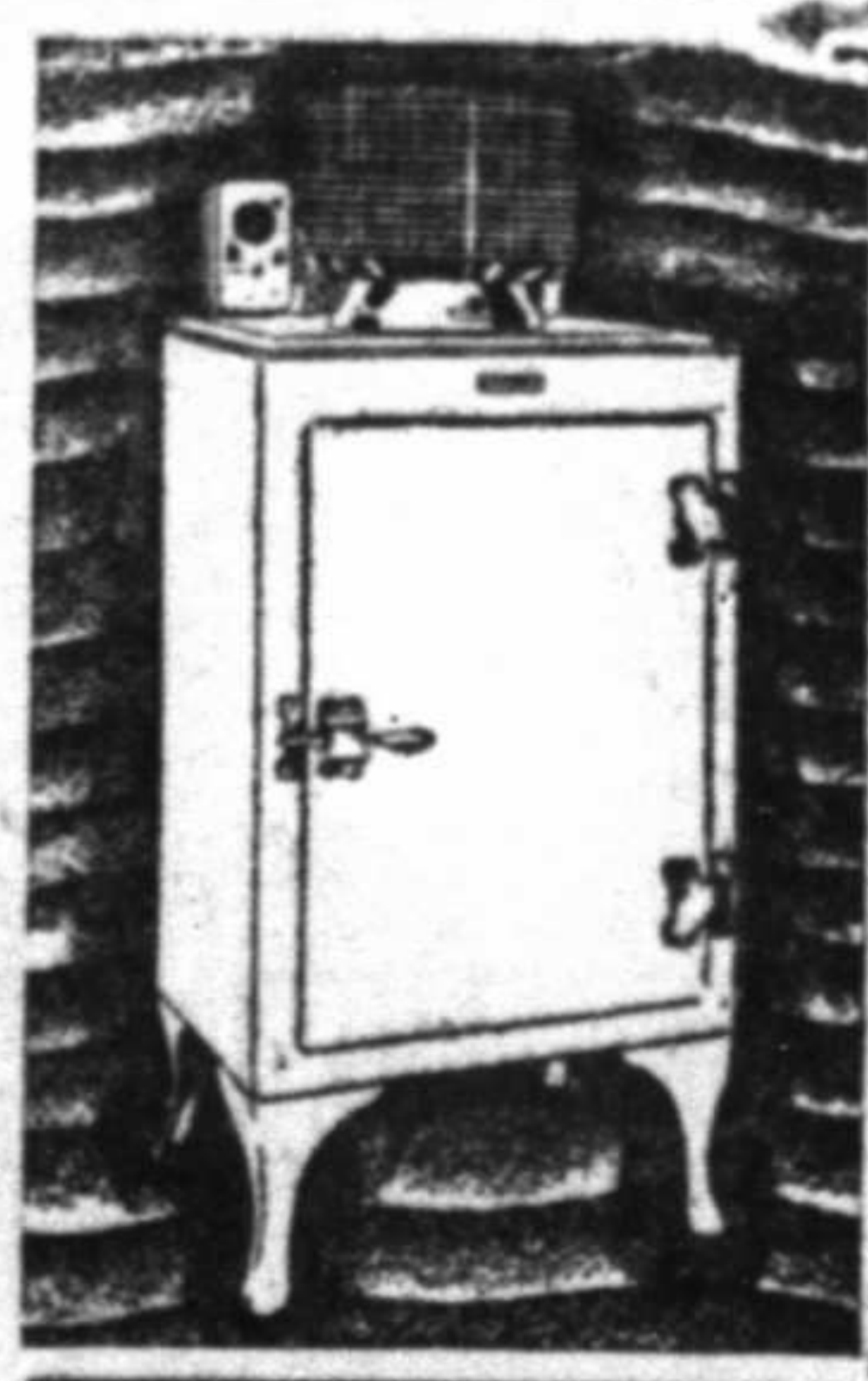

MOODY HAS ANSWER FOR E. MAYFIELD

GOVERNOR SAYS HE HAS LULLABY FOR JIM AND EARLE

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, May 15.—In a statement here in answer to allegations made at Willsboro Saturday, by former United States Senator Earle B. Mayfield in his opening address for the democratic gubernatorial nomination, Governor Dan Moody predicted that "Ferguson and Mayfield will be wallowing in the same bed again before the July primaries," and that he would gently tuck the covers around them and sing them to sleep with a lullaby he has prepared for the occasion.

Governor Moody's answer to Mayfield's opening shot said in part: "There are many, many things upon which I differ with Mayfield that he didn't mention. I had rather be defeated for public office than to be elected as the result of the support and influence of Jim Ferguson; he differs with me on this, for in the run-off for United States senator two years ago, Earle Mayfield, with open arrangements, welcomed and accepted the support of Ferguson who six years ago denounced Mayfield. Old Jim and Earle got into the same bed two years ago and put their heads on the same little pillow when Earle was trying to get back into the United States senate."

Three Children And Father Are Burned

CARLTON, Minn., May 15 (AP).—Three children and their father were burned to death in a fire which destroyed the farm home of Perry Lynch, near here Wednesday. The mother and one child escaped. The father perished while trying to rescue the other three children. The home burned to the ground.

Sunday Dr. W. F. Dixon of Lubbock, delivered the baccalaureate sermon in the morning. Monday

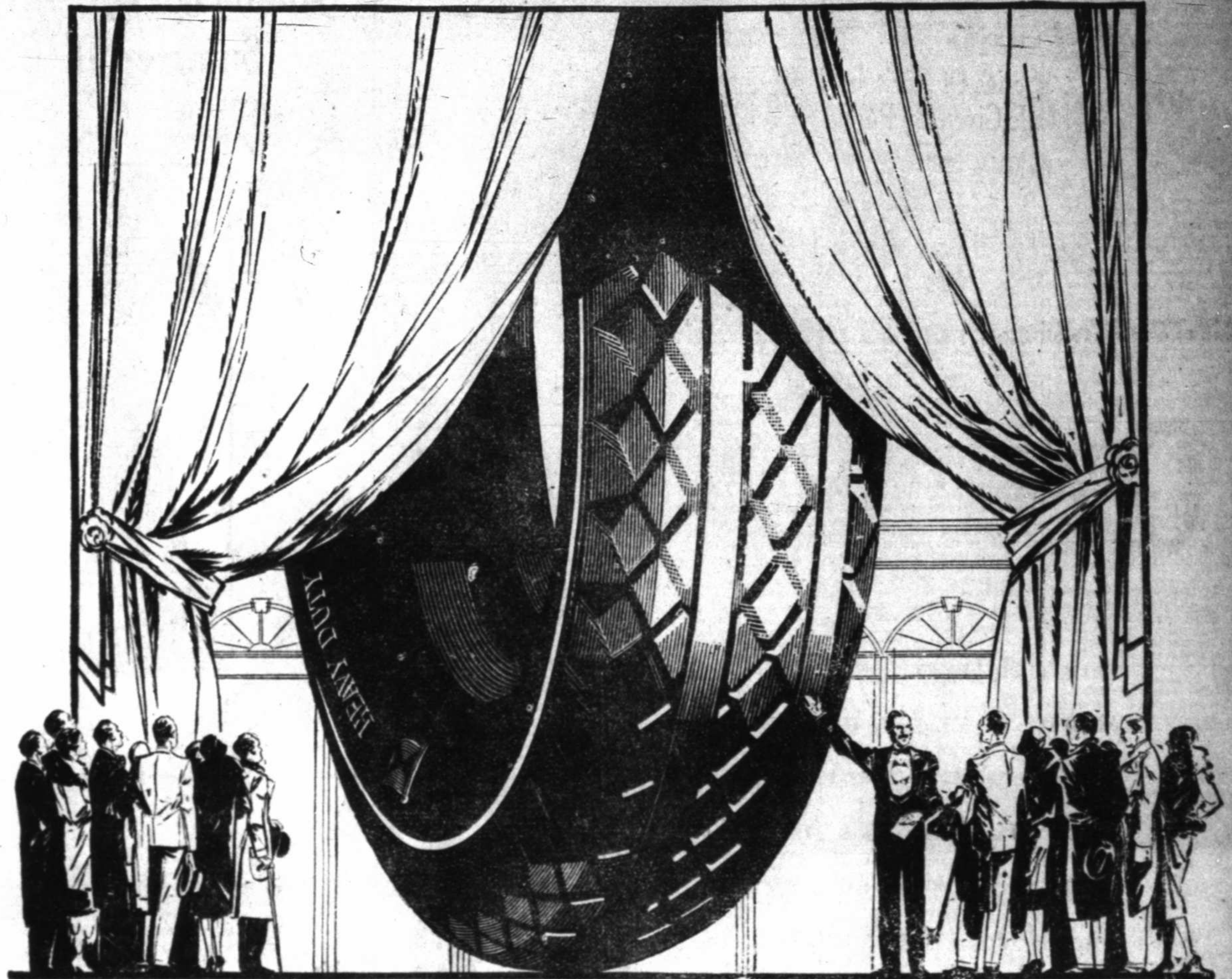

DAWSON COUNTY BOASTS OF EXCELLENT SYSTEM OF SCHOOLS; TWO NEW UNITS ARE STANDARDIZED; GROWTH IS RAPID

(By Staff Correspondent)
LAMESA, May 15.—Each of the four commissioner precincts of Dawson county has two or more high schools with a three-year course of study doing accepted work. W. T. Webb, county superintendent of schools said in announcing the standardization of two new schools for the county.

These schools are the Fairview and Ackery districts, both of which have standardized four-year terms. Both schools, Mr. Webb said, intended asking for affiliation credits. Besides these, the Lamesa system, an independent district, has a four-year affiliated school with some 20 credits.

Districts Standardized
Hancock and McCarty have re-standardized this year, the former with four years of instruction. Five other districts have standardization credits. Lake View, Key, Ackery, Grand View and Five Mile.

Dawson county has 25 school districts, 12 independent and 16 common school districts. Scholastic enrollment for the coming year according to the census just taken will be 4,055. Of these, 1,140 are in the Lamesa district and the others under the jurisdiction of the county superintendent.

Three newly created districts, Key, Hancock and Klondike, applied recently for permission to be under the supervision of the county superintendent.

Spend \$100,000
For the scholastic year 1928 and 1929 the schools of the county, outside the city of Lamesa, spent around \$100,000 for school work, Mr. Webb said. This sum included \$65,000 for salaries and the rest for bonds, etc.

It is estimated by the county school board that the 1929-1930 total not yet complete, will be in excess of \$120,000, possibly as high as \$125,000.

School bonds have been retired amounting to \$30,000 for common school districts and \$10,000 for independent districts.

"We had 82 teachers for the year that closed last spring," Mr. Webb said. "This year we have 90 teachers. I expect there will be four or five more next year, possibly more than that. I know of one school that is increasing its teaching staff from three to four next year."

Teachers Selected
"At least 90 per cent of the teachers, possibly more, have been employed for the coming year. Last year and the year before we have re-hired 70 per cent of the teachers for the coming year, I believe."



we will do this year."

The schools are constantly endeavoring to increase their scope and their educational standing, the county superintendent explained.

Lake View and McCarty are the only rural schools now that give home economic instruction, while Miss Lillian Peek, of the state department of education has approved the work for Lamesa and Lake View to receive state aid next year.

McCarty school has manual training instruction, the only one in the county.

No school is now giving vocational agricultural work under the Smith-Hughes act but Lamesa is asking for the work.

Three rural schools, Key, Hancock and McCarty, are asking about vocational work and their proposed applications have the support of J. B. Rutland, of the state vocational department. Mr. C. L. Davis, head of the department, inspected the Lamesa school and has approved it. Mr. Rutland is his assistant.

Valuation of school property in Dawson county, outside the city of Lamesa, is virtually a third of a million dollars. Figures include:

Buildings \$200,000
Furnishings (14) 20,000
Furniture, etc. 60,000
Library equipment 5,000

State aid for 27 schools this past year amounted to \$14,805, Mr. Webb reported. "This does not include high school tuition," he added.

Enrollment figures show that there are more boys than girls in the rural schools. Figures for the year 1928 showed an enrollment of 1,175 boys and 1,063 girls, a total of 2,238 in the grades and 186 boys and 172 girls, a total of 358, in the high schools, a total of 2,596.

A two-day rodeo will be held in Andrews, capital of Andrews county and located sixty miles southwest of Lamesa, as a part of the welcome program. Besides the rodeo, a baseball game has been scheduled for Thursday as another feature of the program. It is believed that some thirty cars from Lamesa will roll in Andrews Thursday morning bearing goodwill from this city. The motorcade will be led by Lamesa officials and is being sponsored by the Lamesa Reporter, edited by Elbert W. Smith.

KANSAS CITY, May 15 (AP).—Purchase of factories at St. Paul, Minn., and Denison, Tex., by the Cowden Manufacturing company here has been announced. The company, which manufactures work clothing, signed contracts to take over the plants of the A. C. Barrow corporation in the two cities.

FILIBUSTER MAY RESULT IN BILL

WASHINGTON, May 15, (P)—Threats of a filibuster in the senate against the \$110,535,027 house rivers and harbors bill were encountered today with warnings that the house would keep congress in session this summer until the controversial measure is enacted.
