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FIRST NATIONAL ADDS 2 NEW DIRECTORS DEPOSITS TOTAL \$3 MILLION OVER 1970

The First National Bank held a stockholders meeting Tuesday, January 23. The bank reported an increase in

deposits on one million, two hundred thousand from a year ago. In announcing the increase

in deposits, Charles R. Brown, president of the bank, stated, "This is a direct reflection that Wheeler County is prospering. We, the community, have a lot of things going for us -- the Feedlots, Gas and Oil, Farming and Ranching."

Wheeler can also be proud of its "good schools, Parkview Hospital and doctors", Brown continued. These along with the community's other assets help the First National a growing and prosperous bank.

Established in 1906, the First National has always taken an active part in the growth of the community. In 1969 the entire stock of the bank changed hands. The 1973 report to the stockholders showed an increase in

assets and deposits of near three million over the report of 1970.

At the business meeting of the Annual Stockholders meeting, two new directors were named to the Board. T First National Bank is happy to have John C. Vise and Adrian Risner of the Board of Directors. PCA Loans Increase 22 Percent Over 1971

A amount of money loaned for agricultural production soared in the area served by Canadian Production Credit Association in 1972, according to James H. Verden, vice president of the PCA's Wheeler office.

Verden said his association loaned more than \$95 million to farmers and ranchers in a six county area, an increase of more than 22 percent over the \$77 million recorded by the PCA in 1971.

Canadian is one of 33

Roy Gewant, Les Hart, Arlene Heede and Don Thornton have three purposes in their current Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico trip: to thank the cattle industry for the tremendous support it has given Synanon in the past, to impart the need for continued support of Synanon in its efforts to reshape the lives of the many additional troubled individuals who are seeking help, and to provide information to anyone who may wish Synanon's help in solving their own problems of drug addiction, alcoholism, alienation, or other character disorder.

It takes 400 head of cattle a year to feed the Synanon population, and organizations like the National Livestock Feeders' Association, Texas Cattle Feeders Association, Kansas Livestock Association, Nebraska Livestock Feeders Assoc., Nebraska Livestock Feeders Assoc., Colorado Cattle Feeders Assoc., Ariz. and

similar Texas associations which collectively in 1972 extended more than \$1 billion in short and intermediate term credit. This was the first time in PCA's 40-year history that the associations surpassed the \$1 billion figure in one year, Verden pointed out.

Canadian PCA makes loans in Gray, Hemphill, Lipscomb, Ochiltree, Roberts, and Wheeler counties. The organization is owned and operated by local farmers and ranchers who are member-stockholders.

Calif. Cattle Feeders, and Iowa Livestock Feeders Assoc. and Iowa Beef Producers Assoc. have given Synanon their full support.

Synanon continues to grow and provide a service to the community, and a home to those in need. In addition to cattle, the American business community provides other food items, clothing, automotive parts, building materials, and other essential items.

Education is a key word in Synanon today. A wide variety of one-the-job vocational training takes place. The Synanon School (approved by the State of California Department of Education) offers a full range of subjects. A research institute, where Synanon will study its own processes, has recently been added to the educational opportunities available to Synanon residents. A full-fledged animal husbandry training program is conducted at the Synanon Ranch.

Synanon has revitalized the Good Samaritan concept. It has become everybody's good neighbor, not just by

Additional Band Uniforms Needed; Donations Requested

Synanon Seeks Aid Of Area Cattlemen

Four former drug abusers are in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico from January 8 to February 20 contacting cattlemen to procure the beef necessary to feed young men and women who live in Synanon, the drug rehabilitation center which has grown in fourteen years from a small group of addicts to a unified community with centers in five California cities and in Michigan.

The four are Roy Gewant, Les Hart, Arlene Heede, and Don Thornton.

Roy Gewant used heroin and other drugs for 15 years, served time in many state and federal institutions, and was considered incurable when he arrived at Synanon's door five years ago. Roy is an example of what can happen at Synanon for those declared "incurable" -- he has remained free of drugs for five years now, and is a role model for newer residents of Synanon. Roy, 36, is now married and he and his wife live in Synanon's ranch community near Tomales Bay in Northern California.

Les Hart is from Gruver, Texas, where his father, Don Hart, operates feedlots. In 1971, two Synanon representatives were in the Gruver area, contacting local cattle feeders. They met Don Hart and told him about Synanon's program for drug rehabilitation and reeducation. Don asked them to talk to his son, Les, who was using pills and psychedelics and had found other "cure" tries totally unsuccessful. The Synanon representatives talked to Les, and four days later he came to Synanon where he has been successfully rebuilding his life for almost two years.

Arlene Heede, 25, began smoking marijuana in college, then went on to pills and finally heroin. Three years ago she came to Synanon, after spending time in hospitals and jails trying to end

her addiction. Now she's one of the team members for Synanon's Supply Department, the department with the responsibility of seeing that Synanon obtains the food and other needs to keep it operating.

Don Thornton is 38. He started using pot and pills when he was in his teens, and after he got out of the Army began with heroin. For the next eight years he was in and out of jails and hospitals because of his heroin addiction. Then he came to Synanon in 1965 and he's been completely free of drugs ever since, able now to offer a helping hand to others still caught up in the drug scene.

Roy, Les, Arlene and Don personify the clean-cut, personable, healthy young men and women produced by Synanon, where the emphasis is on hard, rewarding work, wholesome socializing, self-reliance, honesty, and personal responsibility.

While in the three states, the four Synanon people will be available to local youths who may be in need of Synanon's environment. They will speak publicly or privately to individuals or groups requesting their appearance.

From a storefront operation in 1958, founded by Chuck Dederich, an ex-alcoholic, and subsidized by his \$33 unemployment check, Synanon has become in 1972 the oasis for nearly 2,000 men, women, and children from every corner of the United States.

Synanon is responsible for the pioneering and development of the self-help concept of drug addict rehabilitation, an approach that is now widely accepted as being, by far, the most effective.

In late 1971, Synanon turned its energies toward the lost generation -- America's teenagers. At no charge, with no federal or state welfare aid, Synanon welcomed 500 addicts, mostly teen-

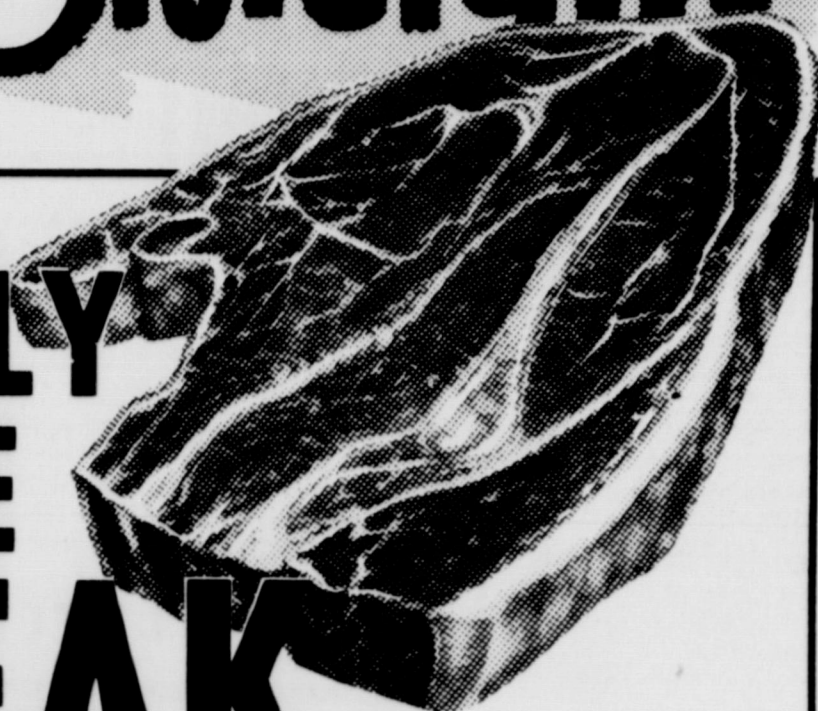

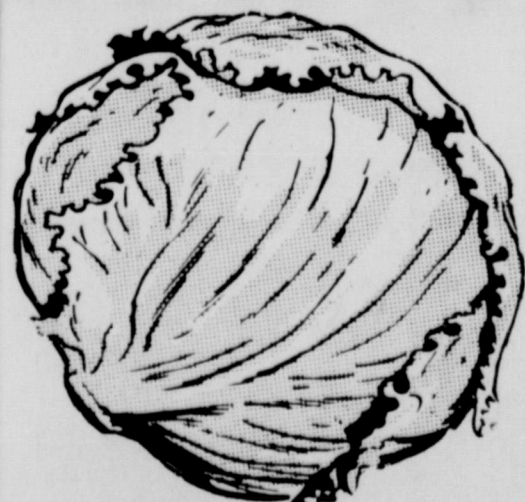

Cotton Farmers don't have a lot to smile about. One man we know sold a thousand bales of his cotton earlier. The price went up a couple of weeks later and he said

he lost \$25,000. We saw a lot of cotton being stripped this week. If the weather holds, a lot of people look for the harvest to start winding up this month.

A statewide hay shortage

appears to be developing in some counties in Texas as the after effects of the blizzard. Our county hay supply is very short. Another cold spell could put us on the ropes. The old cowboy phrase that January shakes 'em, February breaks 'em, and March takes 'em is so very true. We may see some bailing of sorghum stubble before the winter is out.

The new "Farmer's Tax Guide" is now available at our office. The publication

gives information on filing farm and ranch income tax returns.

Written in easily understood language, the guide gives a number of examples of completed forms.

The guide contains a new section on investment credit which explains what property qualifies, the amount of credit available, limitations, and how to complete credit on unused property and recapture information.

The guide also has a chapter on credit for gasoline and fuels used on a farm for farming purposes. Another chapter deals with self-employment taxes for Social Security. It explains what income is and is not taxable for Social Security.

The tax guide is indexed so producers can easily find information on specific subjects such as selling a farm, sale of breeding animals, de-recitation, involuntary conversion and other topics.

Whether you have your return filed by a tax practitioner or do it yourself, I believe the new publication will be useful.

If there ever was a year when top dressing winter wheat should pay off, this should be the year. With the moisture we now have, 100 pounds of ammonium nitrate to the acre, as a top dressing should increase the grazing capacity of stocker cattle.

Livestock feeding is in full swing in Wheeler County, and producers are faced with paying a high price for a major protein supplement, cottonseed meal.

What are the alternatives? We suggest that cattlemen consider whole cottonseed as a substitute along with guar meal, castor meal, alfalfa hay, dehydrated alfalfa pellets and commercial dry supplements.

However, the price of whole cottonseed may increase due to pressure from the high-priced cottonseed meal which is now more than \$150 a ton.

In determining whether to feed whole cottonseed or the 41% cotton seed meal, consider the cost of each as well as handling and hauling costs. Feed the whole cottonseed if 100 pounds of it can be fed cheaper than a mixture of 35 pounds of cottonseed meal and 65 pounds of meal.

In feeding whole cottonseed or any of the other alternative protein supplements,

the main concern is to provide the minimal amount of protein for livestock.

Feed no more than five pounds of whole cottonseed per cow per day since it contains 22% fat which is laxative to cattle. The 5 pounds is usually more than enough to meet the protein needs of the beef cow.

Since other protein supplements are also high-priced, we suggest combining these supplements with a high quality forage to minimize

the amount of supplement needed. Forages can be tested for protein content so that the cattleman can determine the amount of supplement to feed along with the forage to meet the daily protein requirements of his stock.

Forage samples may be sent to the Forage Testing Laboratory at Texas A&M for a protein analysis. Information for submitting such samples as well as additional information on supple-

mental feeding of beef cattle is available at the county Extension office.

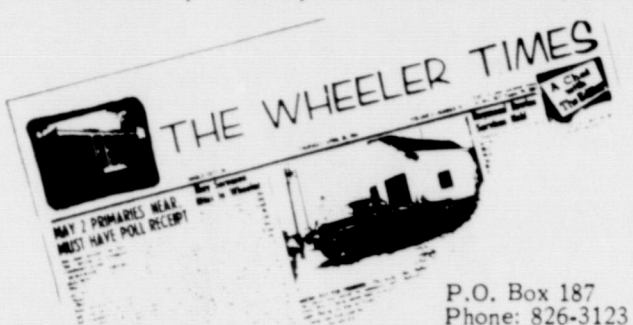

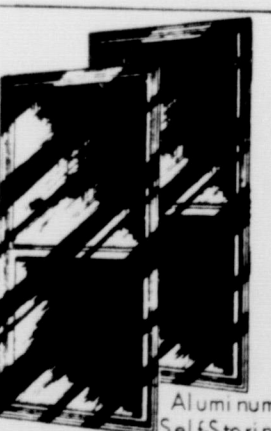

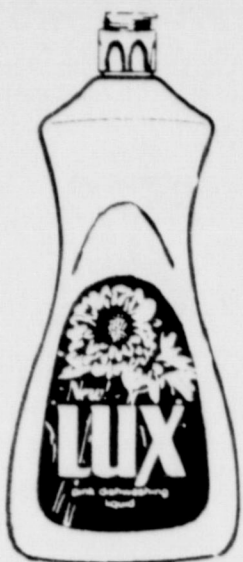
