## Robbie Hawkins Named Outstanding Young Farmer

Robbie Hawkins, 33-year-old Hart farmer, was named by the Dimmitt Jaycees recently as Castro County's "Outstanding Young Farmer" for 1966.

Chosen by a committee that included business and agricultural leaders from throughout the county and also Jaycee members, Hawkins will be recognized at the Jaycees' annual distinguished service award banquet tonight at the Colonial Inn, in Dimmitt and his records will be sent into the state competition.

Judging was on the basis of progress in agricultural career (50 per cent), conservation of natural resources (25 percent) and civic contributions (25 percent).

Hawkins, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Hawkins Sr. of Hart, is a lifetime Castro County resident. He was born in Tulia, reared at Nazareth until the age of eight and has been a resident of Hart since that time.

Outstanding in athletic program at Hart High School, Hawkins lettered four years in basketball and made the all-district team as a guard for two years. He also boxed one year, graduating from HHS in 1951 and attending West Texas State University before coming back to Hart to farm.

He and his wife, Leta, have four children -- David, 13, Theron, 11, Lisa, 6, and Philip, 3.

Hawkins farms 896 acres, southwest of Hart, of which he owns 361 and rents 535.

He has had 40 acres of pecan trees since 1960, and he raised a 60 bushel wheat crop in the orchard this year. On 63 total

acres, his overall average was 58.6 bushels of wheat.

Milo, which he considers his main crop, totaled 267 acres last year, averaging 7,111 pounds per acre.

With 105 acres in cotton, he produced 652 pounds of lint per acre this year, coming out much better than the county average.

He "laid out" 395.8 acres in 1966, partly through the government's diverted acreage program and partly because of his own rotation program, of which he is a strong believer.

"Rotation is one of the best things a farmer can do for his land, but it's a shame that we don't make enough off our products to enable us to rotate land on a profitable basis without government subsidies," he said. "The farmer basically is in business for reasons of personal freedom, and when you have the government subsidizing you, you don't have as much freedom."

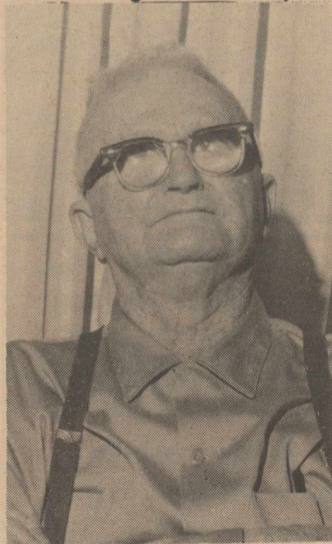

The Rev. Dinzel Leonard has accepted a new post in Dalhart and began moving this week.

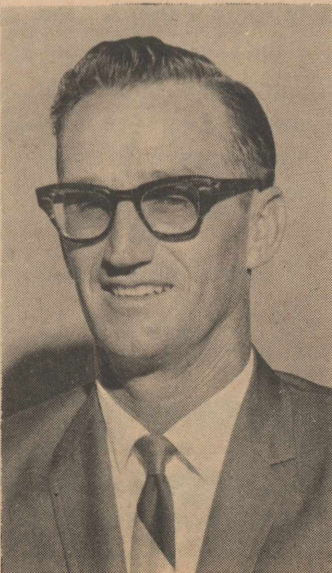
Rev. Leonard came to Hart in 1958 to begin an eight-year stay as minister of the First Baptist Church.

## Case Of Rep. Powell Shows Need For National Rule

The resignation of Homer Garrison from the Plainview School Board is an example the Federal government might do well to follow.

Garrison resigned so that his wife could take a position as librarian in the Plainview school system.

State law forbids persons who have relatives on school boards from accepting jobs in the same system.

The current furor over New York Representative Adam Clayton Powell points out the need for a similar rule in big government.

Powell has been censured by his fellow congressmen for his general disregard of the law and of the position of respect which he should occupy.

Among the many questionable practices in which Powell has been engaged is placing his wife on his government allotted payroll.

This in itself would not be so bad except that Mrs. Powell has never turned a hand to earn a dime of the money given by taxpayers

to support the government.

It seems, in fact, that Rep. Powell has been keeping most of the money himself, and Mrs. Powell, from who he is now separated, was getting publicity and little else.

Powell's whole case is a bad example for a national government figure to be involved in.

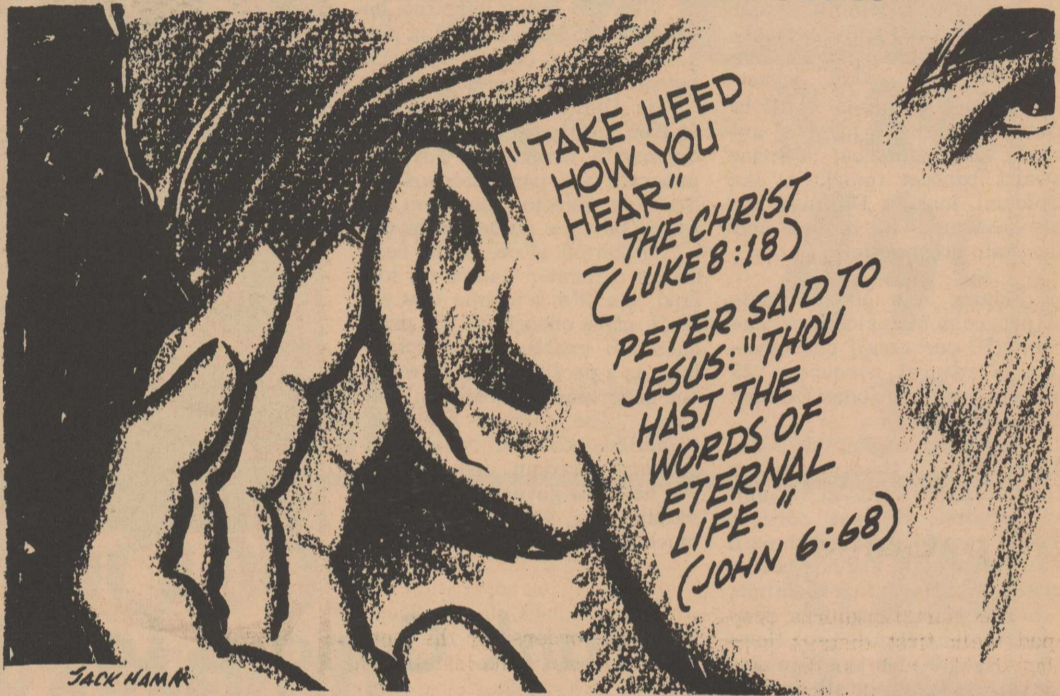
But the sad part of Powell's case is that the House of Representatives is so unwilling to accept the responsibility for refusing to allow him his House seat.

It's doubly sad since one of the reasons many representatives are probably unwilling to unseat him is that they, at one time in the past, or possibly now, are doing the same thing.

A rule that national legislative officials could not hire relatives to work on their own staffs might not cure all the ills of government.

But it might cure one.

## KITCHEN KORNER

This cool weather has been staying with us with the exception of a few warm days mingled in. Have you ever realized how many different dishes can be made quickly with a prepared biscuit mix or even your own biscuit mix and they are really delicious. Here are some that taste good this time of year.

### DUMPLINGS

Add 3/4 cup milk to 2 cups Bisquick. Mix thoroughly with fork. Drop by spoonfuls onto chicken, meat, or vegetables in boiling stew (not into liquid). Cook over low heat for 10 minutes with kettle uncovered and 10 minutes with kettle covered. Liquid should just bubble gently. Remove dumplings. Makes 10 to 12.

### CHICKEN FRICASSEE WITH BISQUICK DUMPLINGS

1 chicken (4 to 5 lb.) cut up  
1/4 cup fat  
2 sprigs parsley  
4 celery tops  
1 carrot, sliced  
1 slice of onion  
2 tsp. salt  
1/8 tsp. pepper

Brown chicken slowly in fat. Place in kettle with just enough boiling water to cover. Add rest of ingredients. Boil 5 min. Turn down heat and simmer until tender (2 or 3 hr.) Pre-

pare and cook Dumplings except add 1/4 cup chopped parsley. Remove dumplings and chicken and place on platter. Keep hot while making gravy.

### GRAVY

Leave chicken broth (about 4 cups) in kettle over low heat. Skim off excess fat. Mix 1/2 cup Bisquick and 1 cup milk or cold water to a smooth paste. Stir into broth. Cook until thickened (about 15 min.) stirring occasionally. Season to taste.

### DESSERT DUMPLINGS

Mix in saucepan 3 tbsp. Bisquick, 3 tbsp. sugar, and 1/4 tsp. salt. Gradually stir in 1 1/2 cups juice from canned fruit. Bring to boil; boil gently 2 min, stirring constantly. Stir in 1 cup canned or fresh fruit, 2 or 3 tsp. lemon juice, 1/2 tsp. grated lemon or orange rind, and 1/16 tsp. nutmeg or cinnamon. Prepare and cook Dumplings. Serve immediately.

### SHORTCAKE

Heat oven to 450 degrees (hot) Add 3/4 cup cream (or 1/2 cup milk plus 1/4 cup butter, melted) to 2 cups Bisquick. Add 2 tbsp. sugar, if desired. Mix thoroughly with fork. Keep dough soft; if too sticky, add Bisquick. Knead 10 times on floured surface. Pat or roll dough to half the thickness desired in baked shortcakes. Shortcakes double in volume during baking. Cut into individual shortcakes with floured cutter. Bake about 10 min. Split. Butter, if desired. Place fruit between layers and over top. Makes six 3" shortcakes. For 1 large shortcake, pat out 1/2 dough in round layer pan, 8 x 1 1/2", dot with butter. Pat out rest of dough, and place over top. Bake 15 to 20 minutes.

### FRIED CHICKEN, MEATS, FISH

For the crispiest coating you ever tasted, roll fresh fish, sea food, chicken, or meat generously in Bisquick. Fry in a small amount of fat until golden brown on both sides. Turn only once. Use leftover dredgings for making gravy.

### CARAMEL BUNS

1/4 cup soft butter  
1/3 cup brown sugar (packed)  
1 tsp. light corn syrup  
1/3 cup pecans or walnuts  
3/4 cup warm water (not hot 105 to 115 degrees)  
1 pkg. active dry yeast  
2 1/2 cups Bisquick  
2 tbsp. butter  
1/4 cup brown sugar (packed)  
1 tsp. cinnamon

Melt butter; add brown sugar and corn syrup. Bring syrup mixture to a rolling boil. Spread in 8" round layer pan. Add pecans. Dissolve yeast in warm water. Mix in Bisquick and beat vigorously. Turn dough onto surface well dusted with Bisquick. Knead until smooth, about 20 times. Roll out into rectangle, 16x9". Spread with butter, sugar and cinnamon. Roll up tightly beginning at wide side. Seal well by pinching edge of dough into roll. Slice into 10 slices. Place in pan. Place pan of rolls on wire rack over bowl of hot water and cover with towel; let rise 1 hr. Heat oven to 400 (mod. hot). Bake 20 to 25 min. Invert pan and serve rolls warm.

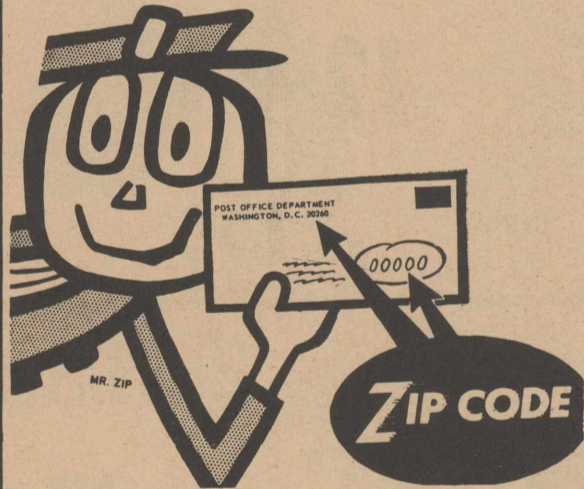

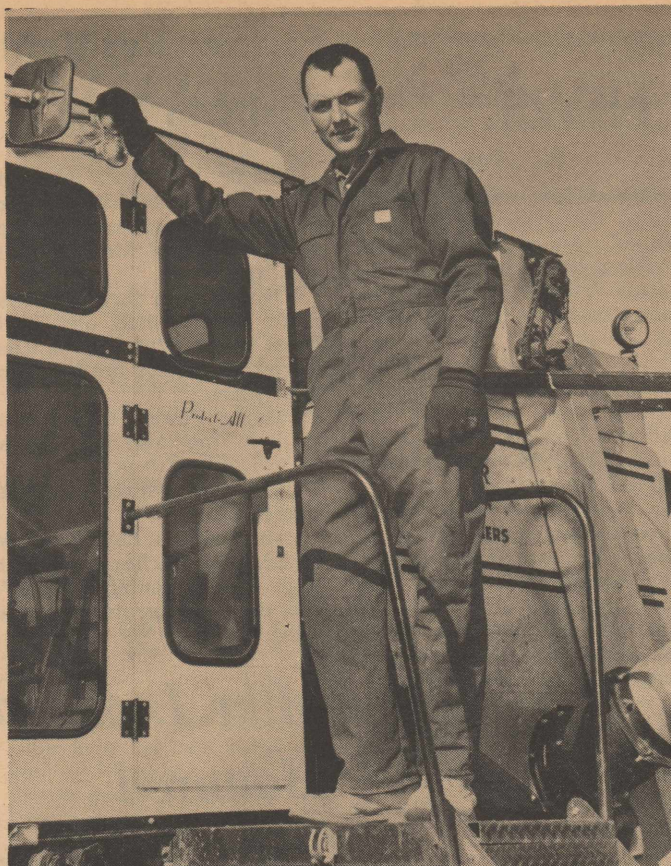

**BAYTOWN BANK ASKED--** An application for a charter for a proposed Bank of Baytown has been filed with the Texas Department of Banking.

No date has been set for the hearing or for investigation of the application.

**AIRPORT AID--** Increased responsibility for the development of Texas air-transportation systems will be placed on the state government, says Charles Murphy, director of the Texas Aeronautics Commission.

This is because the federal government is reducing its aid. Murphy made his statement after studying details of the federal aid program for 1967 as announced recently by the Federal Aviation Agency. Allocated was \$72,500,000 in matching funds for improvements at 341 civil airports. That's \$12,000,000 less than for 1966. Of that total, \$5,680,359 will be available to 29 cities and towns in Texas.

"It has been obvious for some time that the federal government will concentrate on giving assistance for the development of airports in cities that are linked with the national air commerce system and is withdrawing support from small cities that are not in the national air commerce plan," Murphy said.

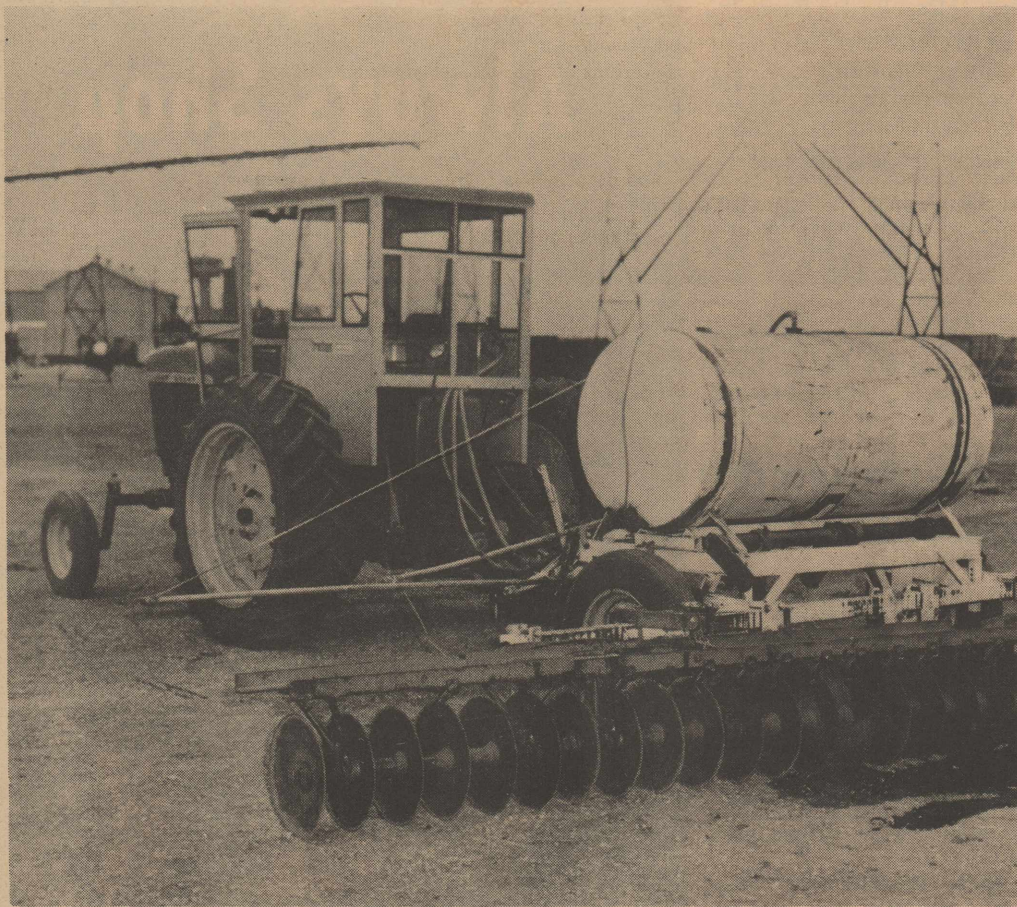

# Plains Memorial Hospital Experiences Rapid Growth

Plains Memorial Hospital is growing.

Use of the Dimmitt facilities was more than doubled in the two and one-half years since the new plant was opened. This growth is the result of both an increase in local population and a greater use by local citizens of the County-wide hospital.

This growth is reflected in all hospital departments. In 1964, when the new plant was opened, the hospital employed a part-time technician in the laboratory and X-ray departments.

They now have two full-time technicians. This same kind of comparison could be made in all hospital departments.

Training programs have been held in the nursing department to try to meet this growth. At a time when there is a growing crisis in professional personnel, the needs of our hospital have more than doubled.

Since being in the new plant a school for surgical technicians was held, three schools for nurse aids, and at the present time, the first class of a state approved program for Licensed Vocational Nurses is nearing completion. It is anticipated that these programs will continue and be expanded to meet future personnel needs of the local medical facility.

This growth has also brought on a need for additional plant facilities. Many times in the last year there have been days when there were no beds available for additional patients. Rooms normally utilized for purposes other than patient room care have been converted to meet these emergency situations.

The Board of Directors of the Hospital District have been working to develop plans for expansion of the plant facilities. They have developed a plan calling for expansion of the plant to fifty beds from its present thirty beds.

This new wing of twenty patient rooms also includes a classroom for training purposes. Expansion of the laundry facilities also are planned at the same time.

Some interior changes in the present structure are included. A three bed intensive care unit and recovery room combination are to be put in the existing building.

Total cost of the project will be approximately \$270,000. The board will make application for a Federal Grant for 1/2 the cost of the construction project. The balance will have to be raised through a local bond election and the sale of these bonds.

Two major pieces of Federal Legislation are destined to have a terrific impact on hospital costs and hospital finances.

First, Title 18 (Medicare) and Title 19 of the Social Security Act of 1965 have already begun to affect the hospital. Title 18 of the act establishes uniform standards for the operation of a hospital.

These standards will benefit the patient because it will improve the professional services in our hospitals.

It will also increase the cost of hospital services. Title 18 will also pay the hospital bills, up to a certain specified limit, for those people over 65.

Title 19 of the law has not been made effective in Texas, but it has the promise of adding additional millions to the list of those with Federal coverage of their medical care. The beneficial effect of this part of the act on hospital financing could be tremendous and may offset the damage to hospital costs created by Title 18 of the act.

Second, hospitals are placed under the Federal Wage an Hour Law effective Feb. 1, 1967. This regulates the payment of a minimum wage of \$1.00 per hour and overtime at time and one-half after 44 hours worked in a week. The minimum wage will be increased 15¢ per hour each February 1 until \$1.60 per hour is reached in 1971. This has the effect of increasing salaries all the way up.

There is another force in the cost picture that is having an impact on the hospital.

This factor is the need for increasing salaries of various professional groups to become more competitive with education and industry so that young people will have additional inducement to enter a health career.

Everyone is aware of increased costs for most of the things that we purchase. Hospitals are effected here the same as other business and individuals.

The experts tell us that the combination of these factors will increase hospital costs about 35 per cent in the next twenty-four months. These increased costs will be reflected in rates paid at the hospital you use.


