Bond Chairman Guy Parker Cited For Topping '63 Quota

Eastland County Savings Bonds sales chairman Guy P. Parker of Eastland was among four chairmen cited in Abilene last week for their leadership in putting their counties over the 1963 quotas. This county has consistently led in U. S. Savings Bonds sales, and Mr. Parker was cited for having surpassed his goal by the greatest margin. During 1963, a total of \$546,524 in bonds were sold in the county, representing 116.2 per cent of the county's quota. Others cited were Shackelford County, (over with 114.3 per cent); Stephens County (107.9 per cent); and Jones County (100.2). District Chairman Dan Jones Castles, made the presentations.

Sale Of Savings Bonds Is \$38,093 For First Month

Savings bond sales in Eastland County totaled \$38,093 during January, 1964, according to Guy Parker, Chairman of the Eastland County Savings Bonds Committee. The sales represent 8.6 per cent of the yearly sales goal.

During January sales of E & H Savings Bonds of Texas totaled \$14,777,595. This represents 9.8 per cent of the state goal of \$150,000,000.

"During the coming few months a great many taxpayers will be eligible for tax refunds from their 1963 income tax. We would like to remind these people that they have the option of taking their 1963 refund in Savings Bonds.

There are two big advantages to taking refunds in Savings Bonds: the taxpayer will be more apt to hang on to his refund if it is taken in Savings Bonds, plus the fact that if they keep the bonds until they mature the person receiving the tax refund will get back \$4 for every \$3. Then too, the purchase of Savings Bonds helps provide for country's future as well as our own," chairman Parker stated.

Event Scheduled For March 12-14

Plans are now complete for the annual Eastland County Livestock Show on March 12-14, according to Sam Kimmell, Cisco, president of the county livestock association, sponsors of the annual event, which will be held at the show grounds near Lake Eastland, about a mile northwest of that city.

The show, one of the largest of its kind in the area, is not expected to have as many animals on exhibit as they did in 1963 when over 600 animals were shown. According to show officials, the local event is a show window of the \$4,000,000 annual livestock industry in the county, an important segment of the overall general economy.

All animals must be properly entered and in their stalls by 10 p. m. on March 12th. Classifying, sifting and judging will start promptly at 8 a. m. the next morning. The judging of all animals is expected to be completed by 4 p. m. on March 14th with the auction of the 176 fat lambs, 34 steers and 81 pigs to follow at 7 p. m. at the local livestock auction sales barn.

Only the 4-H and FFA Club Boys and girls will compete for the \$1600 cash premiums. Adults and others will compete for ribbons only.

The judges from Abilene, Tuscola, Coleman, Mason, Santa Anna, Llano and Fort Worth will have a real job, as the quality of the animals will be good, said Robert Kincaid, Morton Valley rancher who is serving as general superintendent. The Eastland County Sheriff's posse will hold a parade at 2 p. m. on Friday, March 13, as one of the show's top features.

Eastlander Cyrus Frost Speaks At Pollution Meet

Cyrus Frost, Eastland resident now residing temporarily in Louisiana, was among a group appearing before the Texas Water Pollution Control Board in Austin this week.

Mr. Frost, a native Eastlander and former mayor of this city, was cited in an Associated Press account of the meeting, as being a landowner who agrees with the oil representatives.

He was quoted as saying that since 1956 when oil was discovered on his Cochran County, 10-section oil-producing ranch, the total value of agriculture each year on the

ranch has been \$45,500, compared to an annual total value of \$444,000 for oil.

"To force the oil industry to put in expensive disposal systems just because some theory says seepage from unlined pits might some day pollute the water is not justified," Mr. Frost is quoted as saying.

The board has indicated the hearing on the eight-county area may serve as a test for future action by the board on the unlined pits. In January, the board admitted it was considering a no-pit order for all 48 counties. The oil industry contends this is not necessary, it is reported.

The oil representatives described themselves at the meeting as part of a hard-working, tax-paying industry that is as concerned about possible pollution by oil and gas wastes of underground water as are landowners.

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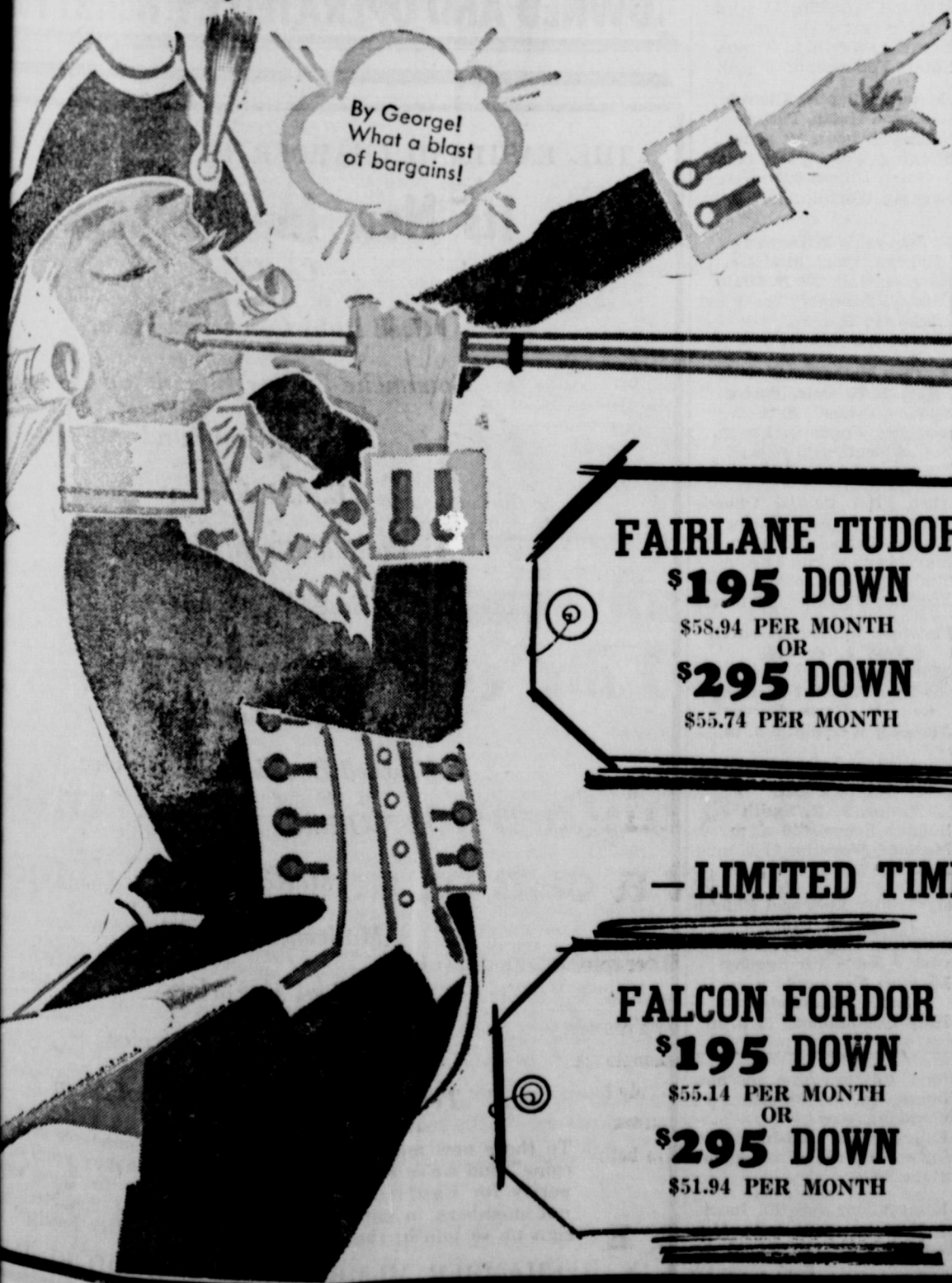
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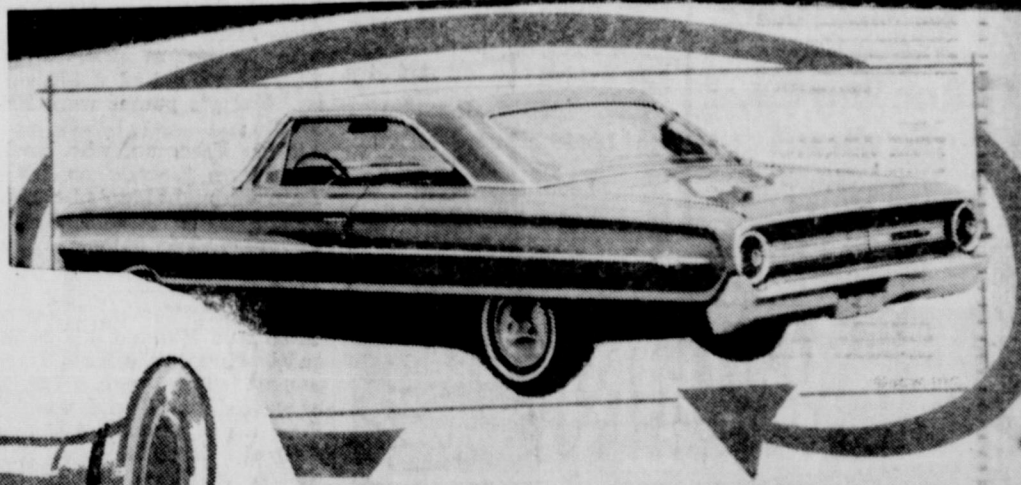
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UofT EXES SELECT RANGER FOR 1965 MEETING PLACE

Approximately 100 persons attended the annual reunion of the Oil Belt Club of the University of Texas Ex-Students Association at the Woman's Forum in Breckenridge last Monday night. The event is held each year on Texas Independence Day.

The club selected Ranger as the 1965 host city and elected A. W. Warford of Ranger as president for the coming year. John Bates of Ranger was named secretary.

Dr. Wm. A. Cunningham of the chemical engineering department at the UofT and a native of Comanche was the program speaker. A not her feature of the program was the showing of the 1964 Cotton Bowl film of the UofT's victory over Navy.

Dr. Cunningham, in his talk noted that the University needs the support of the ex-students in its continuing efforts to be "the great university that Texas deserves and needs — a school of which we can all be proud."

The UofT now has a student body of more than 20,000 with an annual enrollment of 3,000 freshmen. Dr. Cunningham said. This number has not been growing with the other classes plus the graduate school due to the increasing numbers of high school students who are attending junior colleges, he said.

The faculty is becoming more and more an organization of recognized leaders in the teaching profession, Dr. Cunningham said. He noted that the UofT now is retaining four out of every five faculty members who are offered positions by other schools.

Commenting on Coach Darrell Royal's recent promotion to be a full professor with a \$24,000 annual salary, Dr. Cunningham said the vast majority of the faculty endorsed and approved the action. He described Royal as a dedicated young man of outstanding ability with students and athletes.

The future holds considerable for the UofT in the way of new buildings and equipment, Dr. Cunningham said. He said the world's finest electronic computer center was in prospect for the UofT. Quarters are now being built for married students because 35 percent of the students are married, he added. Numerous buildings are now under construction on the planning stages.

The UofT's high standards for entrance are the results of demands of the student body, Dr. Cunningham said. He pointed out, however, that no one is barred, although those in the upper half of the high school graduating classes are being accepted most readily.

Bill Thompson of Breckenridge, the president for the past year, presided and presented the speaker.
