State Democratic Chairman Visits Here Monday

Eugene M. Locke, lawyer of Dallas, Chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee and State Chairman for John Connally, stopped in Deport, Bogata and Talco on Monday.

He is travelling through the state getting information from the grass roots and also trying to help the local organizations, meeting with local leaders. He has been through 26 of the 31 Senatorial Districts.

Mr. Locke said, "Democrats are on the move throughout the state. The situation is better in every section of the state than two weeks ago, but it is necessary not only to win, but to win big. This year, for the first time in a half century, Republicans are challenging Democrats for offices at every level of state and local government. There are 87 Republicans running for House of Representatives; 15 Republicans running for State Senate; 19 Republicans running for U. S. Congress, and over 500 Republicans running for other state and local offices. If we don't win big this time all local officials will face future Republican opposition."

Mr. Locke said: "In this Nov. 6 election the Democrats clearly have the best candidates and the best platform. John Connally has always been a leader, from the time he was born on a farm near Floresville in South Texas, through his presidency of the student body at the University of Texas, his much-decorated Navy career in World War II, his distinguished business career and his appointment as Secretary of the Navy. Jack Cox, on the other hand, is distinguished primarily by the fact that while in the legislature he pitched a puppet on the Capitol lawn, lobbying for higher legislative salaries. Austin. — Attorney Gen. Will Wilson issued an opinion that the Constitution Party of Texas cannot nominate members for district offices at its state convention. But the opinion came a bit late. Election ballots already have been printed, and the tardy nominations are listed.

Secretary of State P. Frank Lake made the request for an opinion on Constitutional Party nomination procedure in September. The "third party" didn't release its list of nominations until early summer, whereas Republicans and Democrats had to comply with a law that says candidates must announce by the second Monday of February.

According to Wilson, the same law applies to the Constitutional Party.

HIGH COST OF LEARNING—Tuition for Texas' 20 state universities and colleges may be doubled by the time members of the 1964 high school graduating classes are ready to enroll.

Texas Commission on Higher Education decided to ask the Legislature to double tuition—from \$50 to \$100 a semester—and increase appropriations by 55 per cent during 1964-65.

Commission approved a \$4,000,000 in the previously-recommended biennial budget of \$162,000,000; agreed to raise college presidents' salaries; and ordered its staff to look into the elimination of remedial writing and reading and tours from college curriculums.

Requests for more money came after it was noted that this fall's enrollment of 110,000 students in 19 colleges was an increase of 9 per cent over last year, and the "war babies" will soon be knocking at the doors.

DEFICIT RISES—Deficit in the State's General Revenue Fund increased by almost \$13,000,000 during mid-October, according to a report from State Treasurer Jesse James.

On October 9, the State was in the red to the tune of \$41,250,349. By October 24, the deficit was \$54,074,283.

ATTRACTIVE NUISANCES—State Health Department officials issued a warning against the use of arsenic acid containers for water bottles.

Field engineers recently found about 40 of the one-gallon size containers along the highway in Collin County. One had about one and one-half ounces of arsenic left in it—enough to kill more than 100 people.

Death of three members of a Josephine farm family was attributed to accidental poisoning caused by drinking water out of a container which had been used for cotton defoliation.

"These plastic bottles are attractive nuisances . . . and deadly," an official said.

MOST SCENIC—Two Texas highways are finalists in Parade Magazine's Scenic Highway Award contest, and rank among the 20 "most scenic" in the U. S.

One is Interstate Highway 45, "The Way of the Pines," which runs through a wooded area southeast of Huntsville. The other is a section of F. M. Road 170, "El Camino del Rio," which traverses rough country along the Rio Grande between Lajitas and Redford.

JOB TRAINING OFFERED—A plan to discourage high school "drop-outs" and retrain adult workers was implemented when the Texas Employment Commission and the Texas Education Agency appointed an advisory committee to assist in carrying out the terms of the 1962 Manpower Development and Training Act.

Act, which became effective on August 1, was designed to provide occupational training in skills which can be learned in 52 weeks. Adult students who show satisfactory progress may be entitled to unemployment compensation while attending classes.

State Vocational Agency will arrange for facilities and instructors for local schools, but training will be under the complete direction of local educational systems.

Training programs for household appliance repairmen and for auto mechanics already are in operation, the former in Corpus Christi and the latter in El Paso.

ENFORCEMENT FUND—Railroad Commissioner Bill Murray says an enforcement tax of 1c per barrel of oil is not needed.

According to Murray there would be enough money for oil and gas law enforcement if the Legislature would allocate all the funds collected for the purpose.

His comments were inspired by the enforcement tax of 1c per barrel of oil recommended by the Gregg County grand jury.

Legislature authorized the commission to take \$300,000 a year from the gas utilities fund to supplement oil enforcement tax income.

Chairman Murray feels that

the commission's main need is for 15 more inspectors, to supplement its staff recently bolstered by 15 men.

PLEDGE "NOT BINDING"—A party primary pledge is not binding on a voter at the general election.

That is an opinion handed down by Gov. Price Daniel when he was attorney general of Texas. State Republican chairman Tad Smith of El Paso, and other Republican leaders, are using the "Democratic" decision as grounds to urge voters to vote however they please on Nov. 6, regardless of party primary pledges.

Daniel's opinion noted that the courts of Texas have answered this question by holding "that the pledge . . . does not create a legal obligation."

MILITARY DUTY RULING—State employees requesting another year of active duty with the 49th Armored Division can have their jobs back when they get out. So says Attorney General Will Wilson.

He held that those staying on for another year "are entitled to restoration of state employment."

Many members of the 49th Division were recalled to active duty when the Berlin situation became tense last year. Most of the men were released in August. Some requested and were assigned another year of active duty.

LONG BALLOT—Texas' general election ballot will be about as long as a newspaper.

November 6 ballot will contain not only the lists of party nominees for congressional, state, legislative, district, county and precinct offices, but also "for" and "against" questions about 14 proposed constitutional amendments.

VALUABLE MARKERS—Historical markers are worth their weight in gold according to the Texas Highway Department. Three tourist markers recently erected to mark significant historical sites are proving this.

THD says each of the markers earns nearly its original cost in added tourist revenues each month. Original cost was about \$630 each. They will earn this cost ten times in a year. Each marker is credited with earning an average of \$17.55 per day.

Markers—first of 25 to be erected during the next year—are at Camp Ford near Tyler; at Meteor Crater near Odessa; and at Castle Gap in Upton County.

CPS Wins Third In National Safe Driving Contest

National honors for outstanding safe driver performance were conferred on Community Public Service Company at the National Safety Congress and Exposition in Chicago November 1 when Shrader Moore of Fort Worth, representing the utility, accepted a plaque for third place in the Public Utility Group 1 of the 31st National Fleet Safety Contest.

It is the eleventh award for Community since 1947 in the annual competition, sponsored by National Safety Council, reports Floyd Hamilton, CPS manager here. The utility company has won seven first-place awards in its group, two second-place awards and two third-place awards.

Winners in the current competition, which ran from July, 1961, through June, 1962, were honored at a luncheon in the La Salle Hotel's grand ballroom with General Motors Corporation as host. Principal speaker was K. E. Staley, vice-president in charge of the distribution staff for General Motors. More than 700 safety experts from the nation's transportation industry attended.

During the contest period, Community Public Service drivers operated a fleet of 276 vehicles for 4,059,679 miles with only 3.94 accidents per million miles of operation. All accidents were counted in the contest except those occurring when a company vehicle was properly parked.

Over 2,500 fleets competed in the contest, operating 305,200 vehicles which travelled over six and one-quarter billion miles. The combined average frequency rate of 13.02 accidents per million miles (against Community's frequency rate of 3.94) is the highest rate since the 1957-58 contest.

Brief Digest Of Amendments To Be Voted Nov. 6

A brief digest of the 14 proposed amendments to be voted on at the upcoming General Election on Nov. 6, follows:

No. 1 on the Ballot (HJR 25)—Provides workmen's compensation insurance for the employees of all political subdivisions.

No. 2 (SJR 9)—Raises the limit on use of state funds to assist needy blind and needy children from forty-seven million dollars (\$47,000,000) to fifty-two million dollars (\$52,000,000).

No. 3 (SJR 22)—Permits creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree and Hopkins Counties.

No. 4 (HJR 46)—Provides for a State program of acquiring conservation storage facilities in reservoirs.

No. 5 (HJR 51)—Creates hospital districts and limits their power.

No. 6 (HJR 36)—Authorizes retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more.

No. 7 (SJR 13)—Insures continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency, resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature.

No. 8 (SJR 7)—Establishes a ceiling of two million, five hundred thousand dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled.

No. 9 (HJR 70)—Authorizes the construction, equipping, maintenance and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County and permits the Legislature to authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County.

No. 10 (SJR 12)—Permits state employees to serve as consultants or on advisory committees, or as members of a Public School Board, provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency or any political subdivision thereof.

No. 11 (SJR 25)—Authorizes resale or repossession of lands in the Veterans Land Fund, to any buyer, after having been first offered for resale to veterans.

No. 12 (SJR 19)—Delegates limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

No. 13 (SJR 6)—Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated.

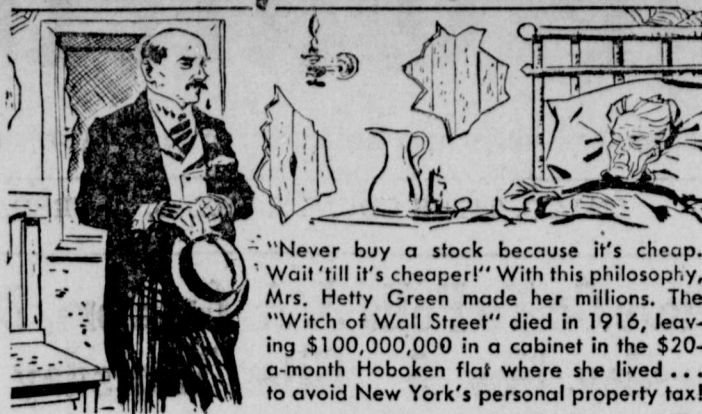

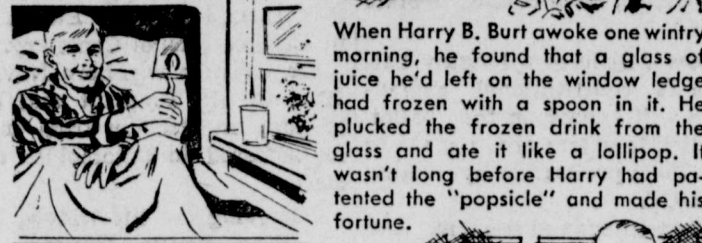

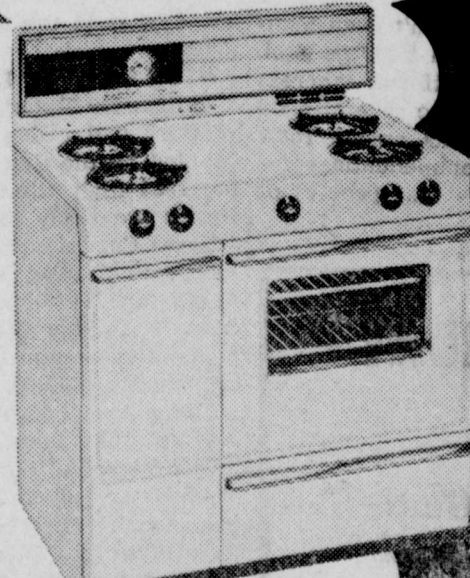

Plentiful Foods For Thanksgiving

College Station. — An abundance of farm-produced foods this fall emphasizes one of the many things for which we Americans can be thankful, reminds the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Eleven items will particularly abundant this Thanksgiving month. They make up the official November list of plentiful foods, as determined by the Agricultural Marketing Service in cooperation with producers, processors and the food trade.

Tukeys and cranberries, two traditional Thanksgiving Day features, head the list, along with frozen orange juice.

Also expected to be in supply that exceeds normal trade needs are broiler-fryers, apples, shortening grapes, pears, potatoes, Maine sardines, and dry beans and peas.

A record-large cranberry crop is being harvested this year. There'll be enough to fill 1.4 million barrels, or 30 per cent more than average; 13 per cent more than last year.

Turkey supplies may be down. Boosters Club, are urged to attend.

nearly 10 percent from last year's burdensome record. Stocks in storage are substantial. Prices are expected to be some higher than last season's extremely low levels, but still economical.

Frozen orange juice prices are substantially lower than a year ago. The record-large pack of 116 million gallons, this year, is one important reason.

Civil Defense Instructions

IN CASE OF ATTACK:

1. Put your survival plan in effect immediately. Get off the streets and highways; do not attempt to use the telephone. Get inside your own home, and stay there.

2. A basement or storm cellar offers excellent protection. If you do not have one, choose an inside room, or the one with the fewest windows. If there is time, attempt to cover the rafters of the room (in the attic) with dirt, lumber, books, magazines, or any material available. Seal and cover the windows with any available material; obtain ventilation from inside doors, if necessary. An ordinary home offers at least 50% protection.

3. Stock the room with supplies for at least a week. This will include non-perishable food, preferably canned; at least one quart of water per day per person in covered containers; blankets and warm clothing; candles or flashlight with extra batteries; normal first-aid supplies, such as aspirin, disinfectant, and bandages; and, games or books to pass the time.

4. A battery-powered radio is very desirable; tune to the Conelrad frequencies of 640 or 1240, where you may hear all necessary instructions. If you do not have a radio, try to arrange with a neighbor or friend who has one to come by and tell you when it is safe to leave the shelter.

5. If you must go outside, do so only for short periods. Dress in heavy outer clothing, preferably a raincoat or slicker. When you return, leave all outer clothing, including shoes, at the door, and immediately wash all exposed skin surfaces thoroughly with soap and water.

6. The first 48 hours are critical; after this, radioactivity gradually diminishes. But, take no chances; stay under cover until instructions are received that this area is safe.

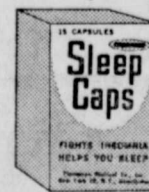

Severe Results
From Insect Bites

Arthropod envenomization is a technical phrase meaning injury produced by the bites or stings of, or contact with, certain kinds of insects and insect-relatives such as spiders, scorpions, ticks, and mites.

Such injuries, or reactions, vary from person to person and are the results of toxin or poison gaining entry to the body. They range from mild responses to the toxin (venom) to severe allergic reactions and death.

In recent years more and more individuals have shown moderate to severe to fatal reactions as a direct result of insect stings and bites causing this public health problem to take on added interest among physicians and scientists.

Death caused by insect stings is not new. An ancient Egyptian ruler, King Menes, died of a wasp or hornet sting in 2642 B. C. Sensitivity to bee stings was reported in the United States in 1811.

A study of 215 human deaths from venomous animals reported from the United States in the five-year period 1950-54 revealed that 40 per cent were caused by insects of the order Hymenoptera (bees, wasps, yellow jackets, hornets, and ants.)

Poisonous snakes accounted for 33 per cent; spiders, scorpions, and other venomous animals accounted for 27 per cent.

When the data are rearranged to eliminate deaths from snakebites, about 60 per cent of the remaining 144 deaths were caused by wasps, bees, hornets and their relatives.

During 1958-61, 43 Texans died as a result of envenomization. Snake bites accounted for about

two deaths per year except during 1960 when nine fatalities resulted from this cause.

As a result of repeated exposure to the stings or bites of certain arthropods, individuals may develop an extreme sensitivity to these venoms. In such persons, the sting or bite of a single arthropod may suffice to cause a severe allergic reaction and death.

Individuals who show severe reactions to insect poisons may be desensitized by appropriate medical treatment.

DPS Training In
Rad. Detection

Austin. — Col. Homer Garrison Jr. has announced a stepped-up training program in radiation detection for officers of the Texas Department of Public Safety would begin Monday.

He said the program to train and equip supervisory officers of the DPS field enforcement services will be extended to all members of the Safety Education Service.

Garrison explained that a need was recognized several years ago to have trained and equipped personnel on the scene of any accident or incident involving radioactive materials as quickly as possible. He pointed out that such materials have widespread use in Texas in education, research, industry, manufacturing and medicine and that they are transported over the state by air, rail and motor vehicle.

"Accidents do occur, and when they do, there is an urgent need for trained men to be on the scene in a minimum of time to make an initial evaluation of the situation, set up protection measures as required, and notify other agencies of government which have direct responsibilities in the field of nuclear energy," the safety director said.

"Because of this training program, we feel that we can have a trained and equipped officer on the scene of any incident of this nature any place in Texas within an average of approximately 30 minutes."

The training covers the basic theory of nuclear energy and the hazards of nuclear radiation and how to use nuclear detection instruments, evaluate their findings in relation to what steps might be required in any accident or
