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## No bids are offered on Fulton bait stand

FULTON — The town council failed to receive any bids on the bait/concession stand at L.E. Casterline Fishing Pier from potential concessionaires during a special council meeting March 29 to open bids on the stand. However, the council did receive a letter from two men interested in starting business there who said that the specifications must be clarified and worked

out before they would consider it.

The letter, from Larry L. Boyer and Donald C. Hair, said that the men were not able to meet the requirements set forth by the council in the prospectus. Boyer and Hair were present at the meeting and told councilmembers the question remains as to who is responsible for the installation of sewage, water and restroom facilities. As the business would be new, it would be impossible to determine if this type of

investment would pay off for the proprietors. "We couldn't place a bid not knowing how much it will cost," said Hair.

Aransas County Navigation District Commissioner Kirk Holman told the council that there were three possible solutions to the problem of sewage and water facilities — the businesses at the harbor could pitch in and share the cost of their own self-contained sewage treatment system; running a high-pressure line from

Chaparral Street to Hwy. 35 and hooking onto City of Rockport sewer lines; or having the town of Fulton build and finance their own self-contained sewage system.

Fulton Mayor L.E. Casterline asked council members what steps they wanted to take concerning the problem.

"I think that we didn't do our homework," said Alderman Leslie Cole. "I think that we should have had answers for these people."

The bait stand will not pay its way until food can be served, which cannot be done until water and sewer requirements are met, added Holman.

Other considerations include a promise by the developers of the Nautical Towers Condominium project on Fulton Beach Road to install sewage lines and some 300 connections at the time the condominiums are built.

## Ernie Hogue continues voyage

About six months ago adventurer Ernie Hogue arrived in Rockport with his spirits about as beaten as his battered little sailing canoe and after a winter of repairs and learning how to live on the sea, Hogue is ready to continue his voyage.

Hogue departed from his home in El Paso last year with the Grumman canoe he had converted to a sailboat and a home and after being sunk in the Rio Grande River, capsized in Laguna Madre, and discouraged almost everywhere, he arrived in Rockport and decided he needed to learn more about the world of cruising in a small boat.

At the invitation of a Key Allegro resident he tied his boat up and began learning. But about a week into the learning

process Hogue awoke one morning to find he was lying in about three inches of seawater.

Hogue pulled his canoe from the water and an investigation revealed that several rivets had come loose allowing the seawater to enter the boat.

Hogue decided to move the boat to a trailer park for repairs when a further investigation revealed that 427 rivets needed to be replaced. Hogue had just received his first lesson in electrolysis. The saltwater had been eating on the soft aluminum rivets.

With some advice from the manufacturer Hogue refastened the boat, repaired and beefed up the mast and its reefing system and relocated the oar locks so power under oar could be done from the cockpit area

instead of from port holes in the cabin.

The work is completed now and the canoe has been refloated and after a week or so of sea trials Hogue and his CanoeWagon will enter the Intracoastal Canal and continue the sail east.

His next port-of-call or mail port as he calls it will be Seabrook where he will give his mail time to catch him then he will sail on to Florida and perhaps the Bahamas.

Hogue will winter in the Florida Keys then during the spring of 1984 he will sail for New England and spend a winter there.

When asked what he will do after arriving in New England, Hogue says he will either sail back down to Texas by the same route he took up, sail back down through the river system or call someone in El Paso to come get him.

## Bridge project gets county go-ahead

The Aransas County commissioners unanimously approved a motion to enter into a contract with the state for preliminary planning, road realignment and construction of a bridge on a section of FM 1781 during a meeting of the commissioners court Wednesday, March 30. The county is to act as a middleman between the state, who will do the work, and developer George Strickhausen, who's subdivision will benefit from the work done.

The portion of FM 1781 involved lies from a point four miles west of the Hwy. 35-FM 1781 intersection, west six-tenths of a mile.

Strickhausen intends to dig a canal through from his proposed subdivision out to Copano Bay. This canal must be bridged where it crosses the road. The contract requires him to put up a certified check guaranteeing payment for the work done.

The county will make the preliminary surveys necessary, for which Strickhausen will reimburse them. The State Highway Department will let and receive bids on the work and will assume responsibility for maintenance — except for any widening of the bridge, which Strickhausen must pay for. In addition, the county has the right to abandon the work at any time prior to entering a contract for the construction — provided that the state will be reimbursed for expenses.

Aransas County Judge John D. Wendell read a letter from State Representative Dudley Harrison concerning House Joint Resolution 91, which would introduce a

constitutional amendment to let counties with populations of 30,000 or less limit the number of justices of the peace and constables to one if they so desire. The letter stated that less populated counties do not need the expense or the service of numerous JPs or constables.

Commissioner W.B. "Pete" Sanders said that this option seemed to make sense, and moved the court support the resolution. Commissioner Ray Longino seconded it.

Judge Wendell stressed that the move had nothing personally to do with any of the county JPs and called the motion to a vote, which was 3-0-1, with Commissioner Mike Womack abstaining.

Wendell asked if the commissioners wanted to make a motion to get started on a constitutional amendment to do away with the office of county treasurer. A Sander-Longino motion to do so was later withdrawn due to lack of support.

The judge also read House Bill 1490 concerning county subdivision controls. Although the county does not have any ordinance-making power, the Aransas County Commissioners already invoke almost every requirement in the proposed bill. A motion by Sanders and seconded by Commissioner Mike Womack supporting the bill was approved. Sanders also suggested a workshop meeting to discuss the width of roads suggested in the bill and road elevation requirements.

The court approved the appointment of Paul H. Brown and Michele Marvin Jones [See County, page 14]

## Volunteers have 'essential' role in operation of public library

They're year-round residents and Winter Texans, they come with previous experience — or no experience at all — putting in approximately 3,000 hours a year of their time, without pay . . .

"They" are the women who make up the volunteer staff of Aransas County's public library, and they are essential, says Head Librarian Eunice Hamon, to that facility's operation.

The library only has two paid staff members: Mrs. Hamon and Suzanne Boatwright who recently joined the staff as her assistant. The remainder of the staff, who keep it open five days a week, donate

their time and abilities.

The number of volunteers, Eunice said, fluctuates between 15 and 20 and the present "staff" ranges from a woman who's been donating her time for more than 20 years to one who literally walked in off the street and went to work some six to eight weeks ago.

"Some are winter visitors," Eunice added during a recent combination interview-work day at the library. "We had three winter volunteers this year."

"The nice thing about volunteers," she added, "is that each brings to the library a different talent, new ideas . . . and every one of them is essential."

The record for tenure as a volunteer is currently held by Gladys Gibson who's been donating a portion of her time to the library since around 1961 — starting when the library was still located in the county courthouse. Library facilities were moved into the present building in 1964, and Gladys went with them. She's a member of the library board and "does everything," Eunice says (to which Gladys replied, "One at a time . . .").

The newest volunteer is Vivian Schoon "who just came in off the street and started working," Eunice said. Asked why she did it, Vivian says, "I'm retired and I decided to do some reading on subjects I hadn't had

time for." She came in looking for books and wound up straightening shelves.

Among the duties Vivian has taken upon herself, Eunice noted, is assisting children with research for reports.

"There's more involved in library work," Eunice noted, "than just sitting behind the front desk checking books in and out."

A major job is "accessioning" — the logging of books acquired by the library. "Every book acquired is logged," Eunice said, adding that the logging includes how the book was acquired (purchased or donated), how much it costs, the publisher and year of publication. If the book is later removed from the shelves, that too must be

logged, with the date and reason for removal.

Gladys does some of the accession work. So does Cepha Jessee, a volunteer for nearly four years. Cepha's big job, though, comes after the book has been accessioned — she's the one who decides how the book will be classified under the Dewey Decimal System that determines placement of books on the library shelves. She spends Wednesday mornings accessioning and classifying books — and Friday mornings entertaining the preschool youngsters who come to the library. There are two Friday morning sessions and entertainment varies

## Protests by sleeping sounds a little far-fetched

There have been many interpretations of First Amendment rights since adoption of the Constitution, but one of the strangest of all is now before the Supreme Court.

Principals in the case — the Justice Department and The Community for Creative Non-Violence (CCNV) — may have to wait several months for the high court to decide whether persons occupying tents near the White House have a constitutional right to express themselves by sleeping.

That's why the case landed in the courts. The park service enforced the no-sleeping ban as protesters calling attention to the problem of homeless people put up more tents and erected signs saying "Welcome to Reaganville" and to "Congressional Village."

The CCNV lost the first round of its legal battle with the Justice Department in District Court, but won the second round when the U.S. Court of Appeals in Washington ruled 6-5 that the group's free speech rights under the First Amendment outweigh the government's reasons for

wanting to prohibit sleeping in parks.

The Supreme Court had previously prohibited sleeping in protesters' tents, granting without comment the Justice Department's request to temporarily enforce the park service's no-sleeping ban.

That ruling set the stage for a full-scale appeal to the high court challenging the appeals court decision that demonstrators and the city's (Washington, D.C.) homeless people have a constitutional right to express themselves by sleeping.

The government contends protesters can make their point without sleeping. Further, Justice Department lawyers argue, sleeping will attract even more people to tents and cause serious sanitation problems and possible damage to the grounds, which are under control of the park service.

Whether sleeping as a constitutionally permissible mode of protest is indeed an interesting legal question, but a little far-fetched, we think.

## Ford-UAW job security pact innovative in the U.S.

A pattern that may prove difficult to follow in the automotive industry was set in Chicago when Ford and United Auto Workers (UAW) reached tentative agreement on a landmark contract guaranteeing lifetime job security to employees at the No. 2 automaker's assembly plant.

The lifetime provision of the contract is attractive to most workers who are looking for such a guarantee, but in the case of the Ford-UAW accord, some workers who must vote to ratify it are offering resistance.

Their contention is the agreement calls for work rule concessions in bargaining for job security.

Contracts between unions and industry normally contain minimum job security protection clauses, but stop short of indeterminate protection similar to that included in the Ford-UAW accord.

The tentative agreement in principle on the proposed contract is similar to Japanese contracts, which for years have contained lifetime job security clauses.

Also among key elements in the document is an employment guarantee in which 80 percent of hourly Ford workers, selected on a seniority basis, would be shielded from indefinite layoffs.

Sections of the contract resisted by some Ford workers are merger of job classifications, use of part-time employees and crackdowns on absenteeism.

For example, in the job classification merger, the welder classification would be eliminated and all trades requiring welding would do their own work. Ford officials believe it would provide more efficient use of manpower.

The employment of part-time workers to fill "temporary" needs, a common procedure in non-union companies, is another provision on which some Ford

employees disagree because, they contend, the provision would cost union jobs.

The agreement was described by Ford officials as a "dramatic turn-around for the American auto industry and removes the cloud of insecurity that hangs over people. However, to achieve its implementation means rethinking some of our old ideas."

The proposed contract, on which a date for ratification voting has not been set, is the outgrowth of a nationally recognized Ford-UAW pact negotiated last year, which

included a pilot program for lifetime job security for employees at two then unspecified plants. Later chosen were a Livonia, Mich., transmission plant and Ford's Torrence Avenue plant in Chicago.

It will be interesting to see how Ford employees vote on the contract. They are likely to approve it after their objections to some provisions have been settled.

If this proves to be the case, lifetime job security provisions may become more prevalent in unionized industries in the future.

## World protests help Soviets' arm plan

While nuclear disarmament talks between the U.S. and Soviet Union drag on in Geneva, and advocates of a nuclear weapons freeze marshal their forces across the world, the Soviets are pushing a relentless drive to gain military superiority in all fields, including space warfare.

The desires of millions of people over the world who are working to ban use of nuclear weapons are understandable, but unrealistic as long as the Soviet Union persists in ignoring them while building up its nuclear strike force.

In the U.S., where everyone who wants to be is fully informed about what is happening here and abroad, it is a question of credibility when the government tries to convince citizens of the danger posed by the Soviet arms buildup.

Many congressmen of both parties remained unconvinced the nation faces any great peril from the Soviets. And for that reason, they are reluctant to support President Reagan's defense outlays.

It appears at this point the president will get only part of the funds he seeks for national defense, which may further slow deployment of missiles in Europe by NATO forces and curtail production of what Reagan and his military planners perceive to be weapons essential to the nation's strategic defense system.

Defense Secretary Casper Weinberger has issued a report that should be viewed with alarm in this country, especially in Congress, where the power to deal effectively with the problem reposes.

Weinberger said the recent change in Soviet leadership gives every indication that neither the direction nor the pace of military programs is likely to slacken, according to a document dealing with Soviet arms gains since late 1981. That was when Weinberger issued his first such report.

The Soviet Union, the report said, has pushed ahead during the past year with force modernization, expansion and forward deployment on a scale even larger than before.

In a foreword of the report, Weinberger wrote that updated facts herein presented leave no doubt as to the Soviets' dedication to achieving military superiority in all fields.

It goes without saying that if they achieve this goal, the United States will be in deeper trouble than ever as far as being able to ward off a Soviet attack is concerned.

For that and other reasons, it is important for those who are advocating a nuclear weapons freeze and other steps toward disarmament to know the risks of their advocacy.

Soviet military leaders are deftly turning the fear of nuclear war expressed by millions across the world to their own advantage. If protests can generate enough pressure to influence actions of Western governments, the Soviets' head-long push for military superiority in all fields will become much easier.

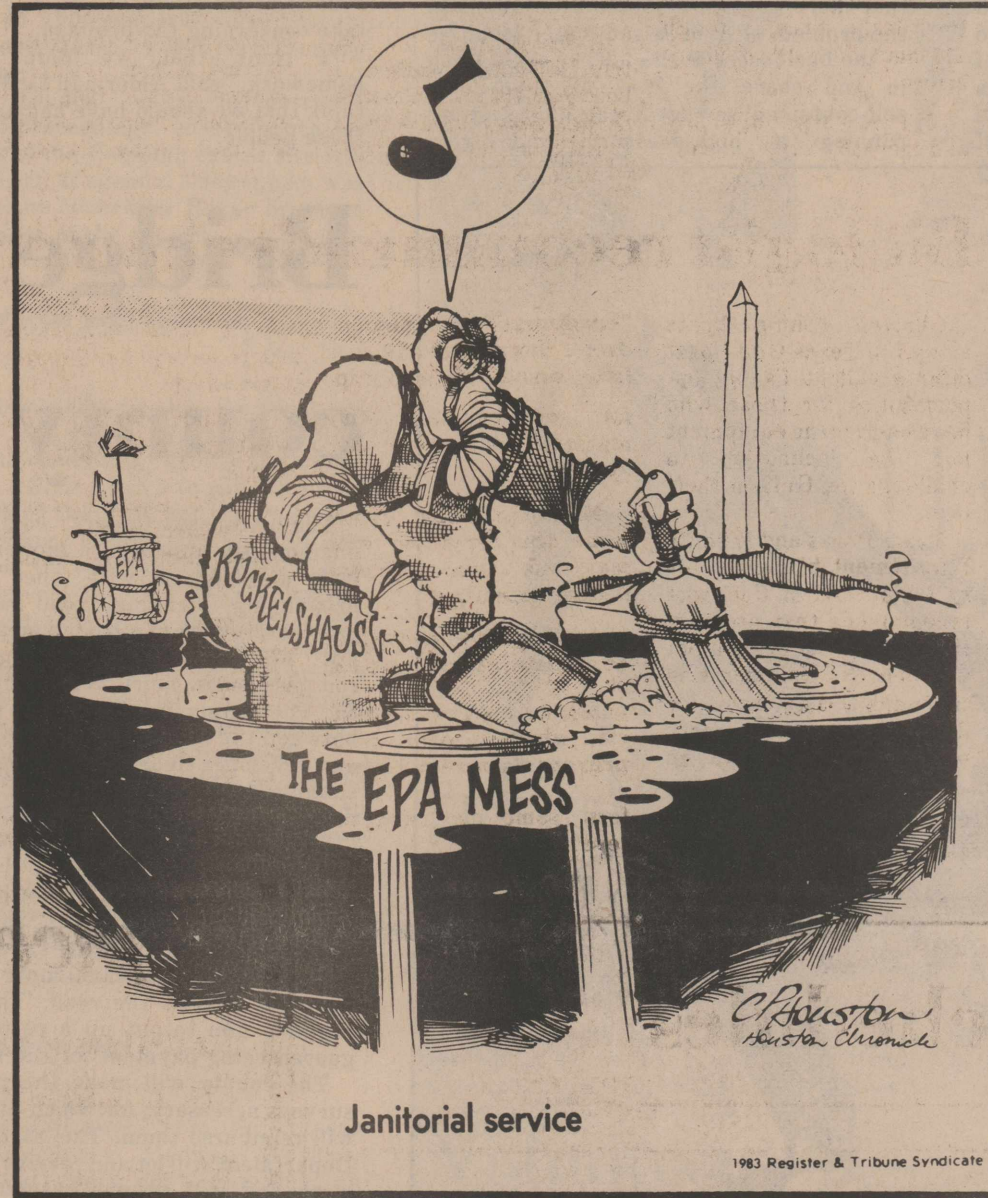

shouldn't have been surprised. We've lived with Key Allegro Isle for a bit of a while. Key and isle each have exactly the same definition, so why key or isle on either side of Allegro? ## We hope the shakeup will strengthen the EPA

With appointment of William D. Ruckelshaus to head the embattled Environmental Protection Agency, the way has apparently been cleared for reorganizing and redirecting one of the largest of federal bureaus.

That, obviously, is not going to be an easy task because of problems within the agency brought to public attention during the past few months.

Although it will be a difficult undertaking, President Reagan believes Ruckelshaus, first head of the EPA, is the man who can put the agency back on track.

Said Reagan, "It has become crystal clear there is one man in this country better qualified than anyone else to take charge. . . Bill Ruckelshaus is staunchly committed to protecting the nation's air and water and land. And I have given him the broad, flexible mandate he deserves. He will have direct access to me and on all important matters affecting the environment."

Said Ruckelshaus, "It is our job, my job, the job of that agency to serve the public interests. That includes all of the public. And when we have charge, we are charged with regulating a segment of our society, we're going to do so fairly. . . I don't think that necessitates confrontation. I don't think it necessitates us shaking our fist at anybody."

Ruckelshaus sees as his immediate task stabilization of the EPA so it can resume as quickly as possible its congressional mandate to protect the nation's environment. Ruckelshaus' credentials are impressive. As acting

director of the FBI in 1973, he replaced L. Patrick Gray, who was involved in the Watergate coverup, and helped restore credibility to the bureau.

Later that year, as deputy attorney general, he was fired for refusing to follow President Richard Nixon's order to dismiss Watergate special prosecutor Archibald Cox.

And as head of EPA, Ruckelshaus also rejected appeals from the White House staff to tone down enforcement actions against a prominent industrialist who also was a Republican fund-raiser.

President Reagan, who is seeking to restore public trust in the EPA, praised Ruckelshaus as a man who could resist White House pressure.

Smarting under charges in recent weeks by con-

gressional probers that they have uncovered evidence suggesting EPA leaders made environmental policy based on political directives from the White House, President Reagan has apparently adopted a soft stance toward environmental leaders.

The president feels attacks on the EPA have been "unwarranted and a misreading, and a misunderstanding. All I've ever proposed is that we be fair," he said.

There isn't much doubt some of the attacks were politically motivated aimed at discrediting the Reagan administration. It is also obvious there were problems in the EPA that might not have come to a head as quickly as they did if the congressional spotlight had not been switched on.

## Little League opening ceremonies date set

Opening ceremonies for the Aransas County Little League's 1983 season have been scheduled for Saturday, April 23. A complete game schedule for the season is now being finalized and registration for all divisions of Little League play is still open. "Everything is getting pulled

together," according to Lynette Jennings, this year's Little League Association president.

Jennings noted that one of the highlights of opening day will be an exhibition game with league coaches and managers taking on Channel 3 TV's softball team. The game will be in

Memorial Park and game time will be announced shortly.

This year's turnout for Little League is still "a little under last year's," said the president, though more youngsters are expected to sign up before opening day. "There's plenty of room for everybody,"

said Jennings. Boys and girls ages 8-18 are eligible for Little League divisions — Pee Wee, Major Little League, Senior Little League and Big League. Girls' divisions are softball, boys', hardball.

Jennings explained that league officials will soon have a season schedule

finished and are now "trying to work around all the school activities — commencement, concerts and six weeks tests." Some teams are already practicing, though Senior division players cannot begin practice until after April 1, according to Little League rules.

## Biologist recommends chartered fishing trips

Charter fishing boats along the Texas Gulf Coast offer excellent fishing opportunities for those who have neither the equipment nor the inclination to challenge the Gulf on their own.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologist Jerry Mambretti of Rockport recommends that prospective coastal visitors contact Chambers of Commerce in the major coastal cities for lists of available party boats in the area to be visited.

For many vacationers, the larger boats, called

"headboats" can accommodate large groups of fishermen on offshore trips for red snapper, king mackerel and other fish species.

Mambretti also offers some tips for those who may not have offshore fishing experience.

— If you are susceptible to motion sickness (seasickness), contact your physician about medication to prevent the severe discomfort sometimes encountered offshore.

— A small sharpening tool is handy for keeping hooks sharp.

— Start fishing only when the captain gives the signal.

— Fish several feet from the bottom to keep the smaller fish from stealing your bait.

— Take a book or deck of cards for the long ride out and back.

— If you catch a small fish, try using it for bait.

— On offshore head-

boats, try fishing just a few yards below the surface under the boat. Dolphin (dorado), kings, bonita and

sharks often congregate below the boat's hull, attracted by small pieces of bait falling off hooks.

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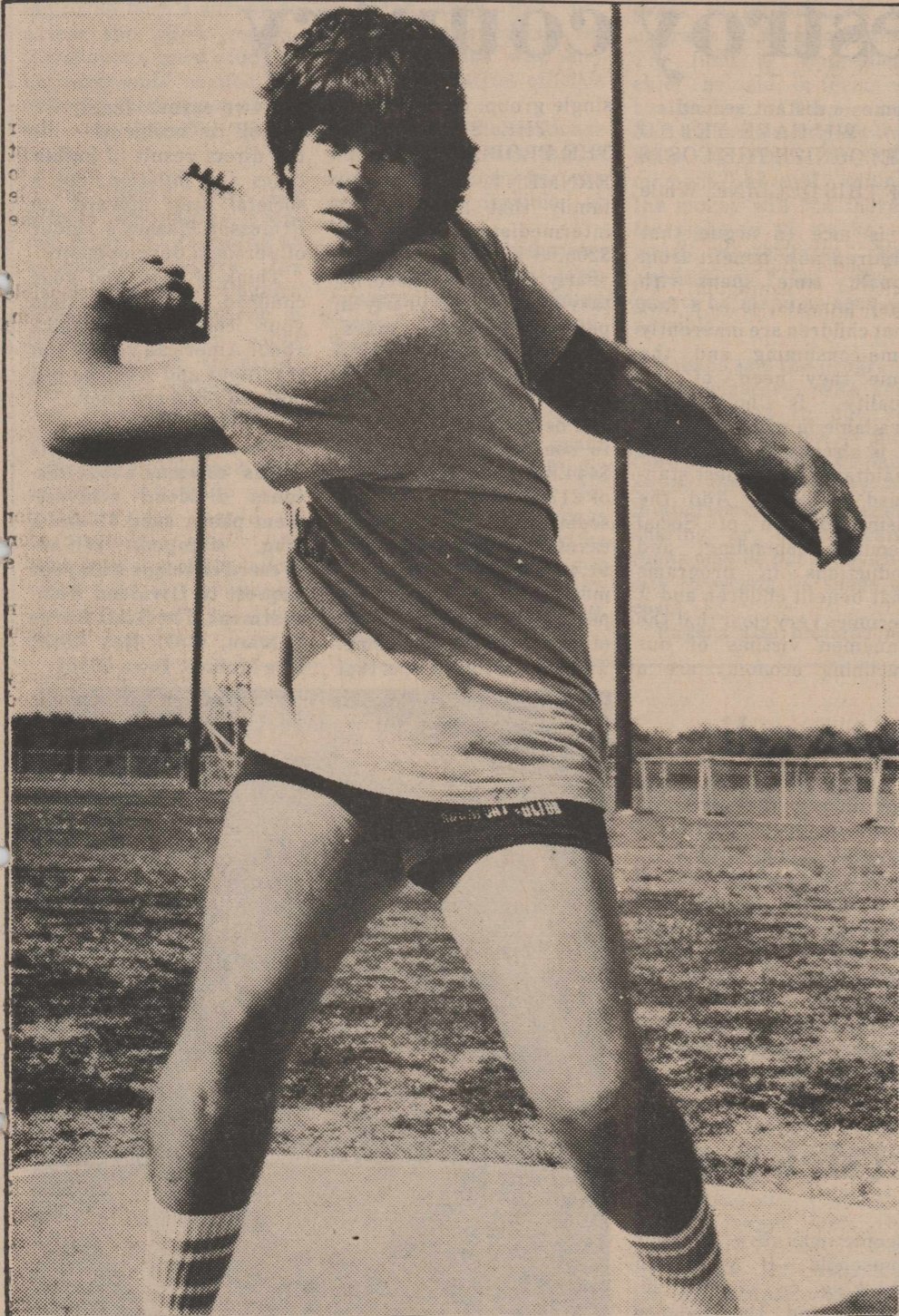

# Failure of the family could destroy country

The most important economic institution in America is threatened by circumstances that could destroy our entire society. No, the problem isn't the difficulties faced by our credit and banking institutions.

Nor is it our ailing heavy industries, the decline of the automobile industry, the dilemma facing our farmers, the threat of rising high-technology imports from Japan or any of the familiar industrial hobgoblins.

The problem is the family.

While it seldom is seen as

an economic institution, it is a fact that no society has ever functioned without the family. Its value is beyond price and it could not be replaced by any

substitute institution or collection of agencies.

In spite of that, inflation and rising taxes have combined to reduce the time and energy responsi-

ble people have for their families. You can understand this by comparing the cost of raising a family with the average weekly earnings of workers in non-agricultural industries and measuring the rising gap.

As you can see, a family with only one earner in 1970 fell \$85.25 a week short of what the Department of Labor calls the intermediate level. From there the earnings gap fluctuated with the economy but rose. By 1980 it has reached \$209.78 a week — 89.2 percent of the average worker's weekly paycheck. Just as the situation deteriorated from 1972, the top of an economic cycle, to

1975, another recession, it has not improved since 1980 to the present. The bottom line here is that it now requires two full-time workers to support a moderate standard of living.

This is not a minor fact. Here are some implications:

— MUCH OF WOMEN'S LIBERATION IS HYPE.

While there is no doubt that many women have greater opportunities for development and personal fulfillment by working outside the home, the brute fact is that the working mother is an economic necessity for most American families and personal development

comes a distant second. — WE HAVE YET TO RECOGNIZE THE COSTS OF THIS DECLINE. While

it is nice to argue that children now benefit from "quality time" spent with busy parents, it is a fact that children are inherently time-consuming and the time they need, of any quality, is no longer available in many families. It is already committed to maintaining a modest standard of living. Add the rising burden of Social Security spending and reductions in programs that benefit children and it becomes very clear that the unnamed victims of our declining economy are a

single group: our children. — THE SOURCE OF THE PROBLEM IS GOVERNMENT. In 1970 the family that lived at the intermediate level on \$205.08 a week paid \$387 yearly in Social Security taxes and \$1,533 yearly in personal income taxes. This totaled \$1,920 or 18 percent of their income.

By 1980, if that family had been fortunate enough to see its income rise to \$444.88 a week, an increase of 217 percent, it also had seen its Social Security taxes rise 369 percent to \$1,427 and its personal income taxes rise 247 percent to \$3,781 for a total of 22.5 percent of income. The bottom line here is that

the two-earner family — and all its problems — is the direct result of higher taxes and inflation, not a societal step upward on Professor Mazlow's ladder of personal development.

Think of that, and your children, the next time your congressman talks about American values and traditions and what he has done to preserve them.

## Club moves closer to opening date

On Wednesday afternoon, March 30, Professional Golfer Jimmy Demaret stepped up on the back tee of the number seven hole at the Rockport Country Club championship golf course and hit an orange Top Flight ball some 220 yards down the middle of the fairway and captured the title of first golfer to tee off on the new Rockport course.

Demaret has captured many other accomplishments including the honors of being a three-time Masters Tournament champion, former Ryder Cup player and founder of the Legends Tournament in Austin.

Demaret was a little early to walk down the fairway and continue play but not by much. Developers of the Rockport Country Club said in a press meeting Wednesday that they are planning to have the first nine holes of the course open and ready for limited play — no carts — by mid July 1983. The remaining nine holes are scheduled to be completed

about March 1984.

Demaret wasn't just a casual golfer looking for a course that wasn't crowded, he is the consulting designer of the Rockport course and was in Rockport to inspect the progress of the Rockport Country Club Golf Course.

According to the supervising architect, Bill Coore, things are moving along very well with construction. Coore says he doesn't see any problems in meeting the projected July playing date and he says he is excited about the course.

Asked about his philosophy of designing the golf course Coore said that golf is probably the only sport where the playing field is revered as much as the players and he said he believes Rockport Country Club will be a great course some day.

Coore said he likes the old style course where the conditions can challenge a professional but be enjoyable for a hacker. He said there isn't a hole on the course that couldn't be played with just a putter

because there isn't going to be a hole on the course where a tee shot must carry a hazard.

According to the developers of the club and the course designer golf at the Rockport Country Club will be unique for the Coastal Bend area and this fact will become apparent to any player as he stands on the first tee.

Most golfers who have played the sport in South Texas expect a course to be flat and boring, not so at RCC. Designer Coore says the players at RCC will experience the thrill and challenge of gentle contours, as they wind their way between more heavily contoured roughs and bunkers.

Coore says on several of the holes of the championship course the golfer will realize the sensation of playing down hill when in fact there are no hills on the course.

Coore says the course is designed for all caliber of players. He says that RCC is a course dedicated to the philosophy that an outstanding course would be of

such character as to instill into the player the inspiration of a game played in harmony with nature.

The \$15,000,000 Rockport Country Club will sit on 530 acres of oak-covered terrain in the city limits of Rockport.

A \$1 million club house and swim-tennis center have been designed by the San Antonio architectural firm of Hesson, May, Andrews and Sotomayor.

The RCC will have all the facilities and amenities of any major country club including meeting and entertaining rooms, pro shop and recreational support facilities.

The Rockport Country Club Estates are a project of Rockport Country Club Inc. The board of directors include Major General George S. Eckart, Chairman; Carl Krueger, president; Carl Moore Jr., vice president; Gordon Stanley, secretary-treasurer; and Robert F. Reimers, W.A. Christian, Jerry Wendell and Kenneth Callaway.

## Veterans benefits expert due in CC April 8

Local veterans and their families are not alone if they're confused about their veterans' benefit entitlements, according to the nonprofit Disabled American Veterans (DAV).

During the past six years, 23 bills have been enacted, bringing about 445 changes in services, benefits and programs available to veterans and their families. In addition, nine provisions, reducing veterans' benefits, were included in the 1982 and 1983 federal budget bills.

However, local veterans

and their families can get straight answers to their questions when a DAV veterans' benefits expert visits Corpus Christi on April 8. The DAV's field service unit will be parked at VFW Post 4441 on Ayers St. from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

During the nine years that the DAV's field service units have traveled from town to town across America, more than 350,000 veterans, dependents and survivors have taken advantage of the free services offered by the DAV's highly trained national service officers.

## S.S. tax can be a credit

If you work for two or more employers during 1982 and received wages

totaling more than \$32,400 IRS suggests you check the Social Security amount on your W-2 form. If it shows more than \$2,170.80, you can claim the excess as a credit on your tax return, the IRS says. However, if

you file a joint return, you and your spouse must make separate computations.

The IRS added that, if you worked for only one employer and more than \$2,170.80 was withheld, you may not claim the excess as a credit against your income tax. Your employer should refund the overcollection to you.

## Changes effect sick pay

This is a special reminder to persons receiving supplemental security income (SSI) checks! A change in your monthly income or your address may affect the amount of your SSI check. These changes must be promptly reported to the social security office by telephone (888-3492) or in person at our office located at 619 S. Staples in Corpus Christi.

Other events that must be reported include marriage, divorce, death and changes in the number of

people who live in your household. If you own checking or savings accounts and the balance added together exceeds \$1,500 (\$2,250 for a couple) on the first day of any month, you should report this immediately.

Prompt reporting of changes will help us pay you the correct amount of SSI and prevent underpayments, or overpayments. Failure to promptly report changes may result in a penalty deduction of \$25 from your next SSI check.

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## Parks & Recreation approve survey

Rockport's city board of parks and recreation has approved both a survey to assess the city's recreational needs and a study of improvements needed for existing facilities with an eye on possible grant funds.

The board took the actions Wednesday evening, March 30, following an appearance before the board of Ken Pagans, Texas A&M Research & Extension Center parks and recreation specialist, and Richard Tillman, marine extension agent in Aransas County.

Pagans and Tillman were originally invited to speak to the park board in conjunction with the board's study of the feasibility of a community swimming pool, but Park Board President George

McCague and board member Kathryn Winkelman reported they had not received encouraging response in talks with city and school district officials on the matter.

They said the response they received was that a swimming pool is not economically feasible at this time.

Pagans told board members there is a short-term opportunity for funding through the federal Land-Water Conservation Fund offered through the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department and urged the board to consider trying for grant monies through this fund.

"This is not just for swimming pools," Pagans said. "It (a grant) could be used on property you already have, for children's playgrounds, picnic facilities, things like that."

He emphasized the money available through this grant could be used to upgrade existing facilities. The fund is "unpredictable," he said, in terms of availability. "There are \$3.3 million available in the state of Texas at this moment," he said, adding the money will "be there" for eight to 12 weeks — which necessitates that applications for these grants be made as soon as possible.

Pagans said the program is participatory, with the city required to put up one-half of the cost — but the city's share may be paid either through money or in-kind service and revenue sharing or block grant funds may be put up by the city to satisfy its share of costs.

Pagans also brought up

the needs assessment survey, giving board members rough-draft copies of a survey done recently by the City of Victoria.

Winkelman subsequently observed she would "feel more comfortable" if Rockport did such a survey to determine the recreational needs of its citizens.

Pagans suggested the board consider doing the survey and applying for grant funds to upgrade existing park facilities at the same time.

Board member Bobby Jackson moved to do the survey then, in a second motion, to initiate a study of improvements needed to existing park facilities with an eye toward the possibility of applying for grant funds.

Both motions were approved.

## Contract changed

# Problems surface with boat ramp

Aransas County Navigation commissioners Hal B. McKnight and Kirk Holman met briefly Wednesday morning at the navigation district office in Rockport to discuss a possible problem in the boat ramp agreement between the district and Texas Parks & Wildlife Department and decided after a discussion that the matter could be put on the April 5 monthly meeting of the ACND.

The problem arose when TP&WD sent a new contract to the ACND with a paragraph added that was not in the original contract signed by Commissioner Holman.

The paragraph added by TP&WD reads: "It is agreed and understood the operation of said facility shall be exclusively under the control of and governed by the lessee and assessment of fees to the public for use of or access to said leased premises or any part thereof is prohibited except as expressly approved by the lessee."

McKnight said that he was only interested in keeping the grant alive until August and he felt the new contract should be signed and returned to the TP&WD.

Holman, who signed the original contract for the district at a meeting where Commissioner Bobby Landrum was absent, said he would not sign the new

contract because action had to be taken in the next public meeting of the ACND April 5.

McKnight explained that the location at the end of Palmetto was the best location for the boat ramp because there is a possibility that Baker/Haldeman Development Company might lease the navigation district a 20-foot easement next to the Nautical Towers for boat-trailer

parking. Holman suggested writing a letter to TP&WD explaining the situation and asking for an extension on signing the contract until after the April 5 meeting.

Holman said that TP&WD had changed the contract and he said he would not sign the new one until it was discussed in the next ACND meeting, April 5.

McKnight said he thought it should be signed. "What I want to do is get the grant money," said McKnight.

"Well, I'm not going to sign this," said Holman.

Holman called marine agent Ken Pagans at TP&WD and was told the contract did not have to be signed right away and the two commissioners placed the item on the agenda for the April 5 meeting.

# Optimism on jobs program

There is optimism being expressed by county officials that what is being called the "rural component" of the Jobs Training Program of the Coastal Bend will have the flexibility to achieve results. The results they are talking about are in terms of men and women being guided down paths that will lead to life-long employability.

The Jobs Training Program will begin Oct. 1, replacing CETA. There will be two designated delivery areas in the Coastal Bend. One is Corpus Christi's metropolitan area in Nueces County for which the City of Corpus Christi expects designation. The other consists of the remaining counties of the Coastal Bend: Aransas, Bee, Brooks, Duval, Jim Wells, Kenedy, Kleberg, Live Oak, McMullen, Refugio and San Patricio. Bee County College expects to be designated for administration in these counties.

Judge W.C. McDaniel, at a recent meeting held in Sinton, said that Bee County College has done more than any other institution in the Coastal Bend to get out and find people who need job training and help them get

involved in the multi-county job training program. One of these, the Council of Elected Officials, made up of the county judges, is functioning. San Patricio County Judge J.M. Edmondson has been elected chairman; Brooks County Judge Joe B. Garcia, vice chairman; and Doris Choate of the Bee County College staff, recording secretary.

Working closely with the county judges from the college are President Grady Hogue; Dr. Neal McBryde, occupational dean; Carlos Herrera, who has worked with CETA, and others who have track records well-known to the elected officials.

The Coastal Bend Council of Governments (COG) is serving in a planning and coordinating function, making sure that the Texas Department of Community Affairs hears and under-

stands the desires of the people of the Coastal Bend in the conduct of such a program.

The other Council involved is known as the PIC. The Private Industry Council. It will be representative of industry, business and labor. These council slots will not be honorary positions. The council will take much of the responsibility and be extremely influential. This program is designed to provide for the needs of private industry.

The guidelines have not yet been drawn by the state. This is the area in which the COG is working, to communicate the desires of the elected officials and business and industrial community of the Coastal Bend to those drawing up guidelines in Austin. The idea is to have guidelines within which it is possible to get a job done.

The Anticipation Feature finals saw a 15.66 clocking at 300 yards which was only one-hundredth of a second off the track record at that distance.

The second weekend crowds were excellent according to Ticket Manager, H.L. Aouelle. Track Manager, L.H. Von Dohlen III, is predicting record crowds to close out what has been a super meet to date.

## Pet talks

By Dr. Hap Lutz

Dear Dr. Lutz, I just purchased two Doberman Pinscher puppies, eight weeks old. They are litter mates. One puppy has a good appetite and one does not. Can you tell me why there should be a difference? Signed, Bob

Dear Bob,

Changing the puppies environment can result in a loss of appetite. Make sure that each puppy is given an equal amount of attention. Puppies, eight weeks of age, will usually eat dry puppy chow though some are reluctant to do so. If

this problem occurs, try moistening the dry food with skim milk or canned dog food. When the puppy begins to eat, reduce the supplement.

Intestinal parasites are another reason a puppy won't eat. A microscopic examination of the stool by a veterinarian can give you this answer. A stool from each puppy should be examined separately.

Separate crescent rolls

into triangles. Place a heaping tablespoon of preserve mixture on wide end of each triangle; roll up, starting at wide end.  
Place rolls, seam side down, in two rows in a lightly greased 9-inch square baking pan; brush with melted butter. Bake at 375° F. for 30 minutes. Cool in pan 5 minutes, remove and invert on serving platter, sprinkling with powdered sugar. Serve warm.

Combine sugar and orange rind. Separate biscuits; dip each in butter and coat with sugar mixture. Stand biscuits on sides, overlapping edges, in a 9-inch tube pan. Bake at 350° F. for 30 minutes. Remove from pan and invert on serving platter.

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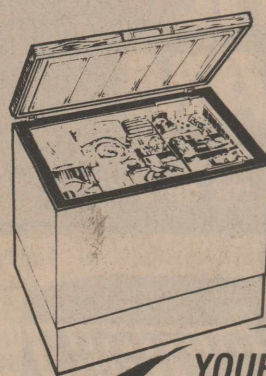

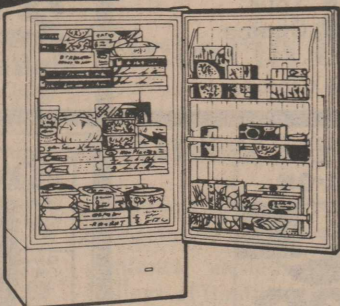

## Heimlich Maneuver can save life

If you saw someone choking, would you be able to offer assistance? Many people would probably not know what to do.

A technique often successful in clearing a choking victim's airway is the Heimlich Maneuver. It involves pushing the patient's diaphragm upward to get rid of an obstruction in the throat.

Performed immediately and correctly, the technique can save lives. An American Heart Association survey found the maneuver to be successful 85 percent of the time it was performed.

The Texas Medical Association suggests the following steps in using the technique:

— Stand behind the victim and put your arms around the waist.

— Let the victim's head and upper torso hang forward.

— Make a fist with one hand and place your thumb against the victim's abdomen. The thumb should be between the navel and the rib cage.

— Grasp your fist with the other hand, press into the victim's abdomen and thrust upward quickly.

— It may be necessary to repeat this procedure several times.

collapse from oxygen loss. If this happens, the procedure is basically the same:

— Straddle the victim, who is face up.

— Place your hands on top of each other just below the victim's diaphragm.

— Push forcefully toward the victim's head.

— Repeat the procedure if necessary.

The purpose of the maneuver is to compress the air already in the lungs. This should force what is in the victim's throat to be expelled.

Promptness is the key factor in saving a choking victim because death can occur within four minutes.

Also important is performing the maneuver correctly. Improper technique can damage the liver, spleen or stomach. Your doctor can advise you on where to receive instruction on the Heimlich Maneuver.

In many cases, choking occurs while eating and sometimes in restaurants. Bystanders often feel helpless because they think the victim is having a heart attack, prompting the term "cafe coronary."

Before performing the Heimlich Maneuver, be certain the victim is choking from an obstruction in the throat or windpipe.

## Travel folders are now available

AUSTIN — Just in time to explore the springtime landscapes of Texas, interpretive folders for the series of pleasure-driving routes called the Texas Travel Trails are being reissued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, after a lapse of several years when the popular folders were unavailable.

The Hill Country and Mountain Trails, which sample some of the state's most spectacular scenery, are the first of the new folders now available, according to Tom H. Taylor, director of the highway department's travel and informational division.

"The highway routes as previously established remain the same," he said, "but Trail drivers should find these new folders even more rewarding trip companions." Taylor explained that greater emphasis is devoted to actual driving landscapes — how the hills and mountains came to be, the flora that Trail travelers will be seeing and the wildlife that inhabits the varied terrain.

The Hill Country Trail ambles through the most dramatic landscapes of the Edwards Plateau west of Austin and north of San Antonio. It bisects Texas' most popular dude ranch and summer camp areas, finds the Lost Maples of Sabinal Canyon and winds past the scenic chain of Highland Lakes.

The Mountain Trail explores the mile-high rooftops of Texas in the

trans-Pecos region from El Paso to Big Bend National Park. Mountain Trail drivers will discover the largest volcanic region in Texas, hidden pools of water in the vast desert and crumbling

ruins of frontier cavalry posts.

Taylor said the free Hill Country and Mountain Trail folders are available now at any of the state's dozen tourist bureaus or by

mail from TRAILS, Box 5064, Austin 78763. The other renewed trail folders, exploring eight other distinctive regions of the state, are expected to be available soon.

## Samson replaces Meyer on county appraisal review board

The Aransas County Appraisal District board of directors accepted the resignation of appraisal review board member Jody Meyer during a special meeting of the board of directors Tuesday, March 29. Frank Samson has been

appointed to replace her. Meyer was appointed to a two-year term on the appraisal review board during a special meeting of the board of directors March 24. The appraisal district gave no reason for the resignation and Meyer

was unavailable for comment.

Samson will serve a two-year term on the appraisal review board. He is also a member of the Aransas County Conservation and Reclamation District board of directors.

## Widening of 35 North advised

Hwy. 35 North should be widened from four to five lanes in an area from Rockport through Fulton — including the area around Wal-Mart and the proposed new Harbor Oaks Shopping Center — in the opinion of state highway department officials.

That opinion was delivered recently in a letter to City Administrator Herman Johnson following a meeting of State Department of Highways and Public Transportation officials in which traffic movement on Hwy. 35 was discussed.

The letter, copies of which were handed out to members of Rockport's city council Monday night,

March 28, noted a recent traffic count of approximately 13,600 vehicles on the segment of 35 around Wal-Mart, compared to approximately 10,500 vehicles in 1981. Highway department officials estimated 10,700 of the vehicles are local, as opposed to through, traffic.

As a result of their meeting, highway department officials recommended four measures to be taken on an immediate basis:

— A reduction of the existing 50 mph speed limit to 45 mph on the highway from Rockport through Fulton.

— Installation by the highway department of signs along this section of Hwy. 35 North encouraging through traffic to use the right traffic lane. Purpose of this measure is to provide some protection for traffic turning left.

— The highway department will proceed with plans for installation of a traffic light at the Cactus-35 intersection in Fulton. The letter notes that the

department is "experiencing difficulty in acquiring the necessary materials."

The letter notes that the highway should be widened to five lanes in that area to provide a left turn only lane. Participation by the local government in funding storm sewers, curb and gutter would be required.

Officials also suggested in the letter that consideration be given to providing parallel arterial streets in the area to take some of the traffic load off Hwy. 35.

The letter was presented to the council as point of information only and was not on the council's agenda. No council action could be taken.

## Tips offered for safe swimming

COLLEGE STATION — Thousands of people will take to Texas beaches this spring and experts at the Texas A&M Sea Grant College Program offer tips for safe swimming.

Drowning is the second leading cause of accidental death for Americans between the ages of 1 and 44, said Jim McCloy, director of the Coastal Zone Laboratory of Texas A&M at Galveston. Most victims are teenaged males. The second largest group of victims is children four years old and younger.

In a Sea Grant pamphlet entitled, "Water: How Safe Are You?" Texas A&M researchers outline important things to know when persons are around swimming pools, rivers, lakes and oceans.

Here are a few rules to follow on the beach:

— Do not swim in water more than waist deep and stay in shallow water if you can't swim.

— Do not swim if you're sick, tired or if you've been using alcohol or drugs.

— Do not swim in boating or surfing areas.

— Do not swim during thunderstorms or in strong winds.

— Stay at least 100 feet away from rock jetties, groins and piers. Strong currents form around the obstructions, cutting deep holes in the sea bottom.

— Be alert for sea animals which may sting, bite, sting, cut or even shock you. Get out of the water if you encounter one and seek immediate medical attention if you are injured.

Rip currents, the strong seaward flow of water near shore, are frequently a danger in the Gulf. If many

waves break one after another, the water collects on the beach faster than it can flow out. Eventually so much water collects that it flows out in a fast, narrow current — the rip current — that is sometimes so strong it cuts a channel in the bottom.

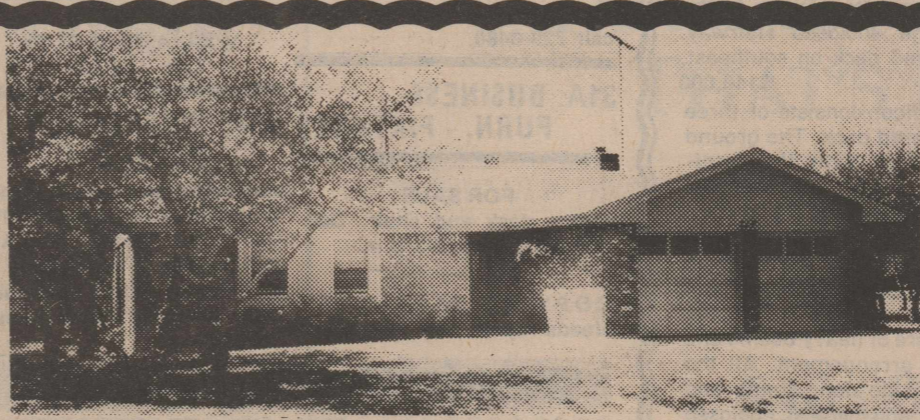

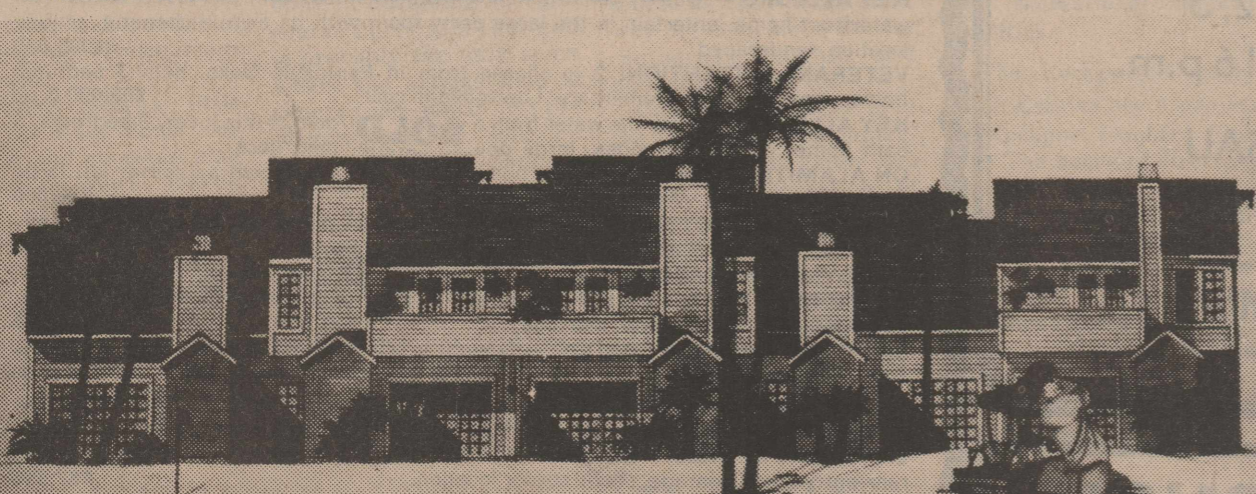

## State of the region

The aging program in Texas is another of a growing number of areas in which the state will make decisions previously made by the United States Government.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services published new regulations March 2 in the Federal Register. Comments will be received on the regulations as proposed through May 2, allowing a 60-day comment period. Copies of the regulations are available to the public at the offices of any of the senior services in the Coastal Bend counties and at the Coastal Bend Council of Governments, which is the Area Agency on Aging.

The new regulations are comparatively brief and contain little detail. In the past, the state government wrote a plan to comply with the guidelines already written in Washington. The new regulations are shorter and general in scope. The states will write their own guidelines and the regulations are flexible enough so guidelines can differ greatly from state to state.

This means the state plan takes on new importance. Those administering aging programs or benefitting by them can no longer assume that these programs will follow patterns of the past. Now, public hearings will be the opportunities to be sure that anything of importance to an individual remains in or is inserted in the plan.

Eight public hearings are to be held throughout the State of Texas this spring. There will be one public hearing for all of Texas south of San Antonio. This will be held Wednesday, April 13, at 2:30 p.m. at Casa REAL, the senior center in Alice.

A proposed two-year plan will be discussed at the hearing. Drafts of the plan have not yet been distributed but will be available to those attending the hearing. The services are now being provided in the state in the last year of a three-year plan.

The plan covers all aging activities, whether paid for by federal or state funds. The Texas Department on Aging administered a total of \$42,203,624 in 1982. Federal funds paid for the serving of a total of 6,701,914 meals in congregate settings and 1,484,988 in homes. Of the state total, \$1,566,592 came into the Coastal Bend, where 394,052 congregate meals were served and 69,538 meals served in homes. Support services were provided to approximately 360,225 persons in the state and 33,200 in the Coastal Bend region.

I grew up during the big depression, and our family had its share of problems. Lots of times we didn't have food or money to buy it. I put cardboard in my shoes during the winter to keep from walking on the ice, and wore patches on my overalls before it was fashionable. But I'm not complaining. I remember my childhood as a very happy one.

We knew everybody in the neighborhood and borrowed from one another when we didn't have enough of whatever. I remember when one neighbor's house burned down my daddy helped him rebuild it for free. Instead of going to a psychiatrist for their problems, the women used to sit down and share them with one another. Sometimes our problems were common knowledge in the neighborhood, but at least we didn't have to try hiding it.

Nowadays people can't talk very much about their neighbors, because they don't know who lives in the block, or sometimes who lives across the hall. Some poor soul could get sick, die and be in the ground before the neighbors knew about it. These days, try borrowing food from your neighbors, or charging groceries at the supermarket. Medicare is looking after the sick and food stamps will help with the groceries.

Last Sunday I preached on gossip, and after the sermon the choir sang "I Love To Tell The Story." Wouldn't it be wonderful if we were close enough to talk about each other!



### Rheumatoid Arthritis A Stubborn Condition

Dear Dr. Esse: I suffer from rheumatoid arthritis. I consider this type is the worst of all. I'm only in my thirties and have had all kinds of treatments, ranging from aspirin to gold injections. I'm in daily pain, but what's worse is being without hope of ever feeling better. Has the medical profession given up on rheumatoid arthritis? — Mrs. O.

Dear Mrs. O.: Keep on hoping, because the medical profession hasn't given up trying to help. Admittedly, the condition is stubborn and tests the faith and courage of each patient. Especially, when there's little response to treatment. But doctors are still trying.

For example, there have been recent reports in the JAMA and in the New England Journal of Medicine about a new treatment for rheumatoid arthritis. It is still experimental, Mrs. O., so don't get too high on hopes.

It's called "total lymphoid irradiation." In one study, 11 patients were so incapacitated they could not care for themselves. Yet, within a month after full course of radiation, nine of the 11 showed significant reductions in morning stiffness, tenderness and joint swelling. Treatment takes from 5 to 14 weeks.

According to Dr. Henry S. Kaplan of Stanford University Medical Center, after further study he hopes "We'll be able to say with some conviction that this really is an efficacious and apparently well-tolerated, low-morbidity treatment for these patients."

## Two sentenced for S.S. fraud

Two former Shreveport area residents have been sentenced in the Shreveport Federal District Court following guilty pleas to charges they defrauded the Social Security Administration.

According to David Tutt, manager of the Corpus Christi Social Security office, Ira G. Lewis currently of McNeil, Ark., admitted he purposely did not tell the Social Security Administration he had returned to work so his monthly disability benefits would continue.

Lewis was given a suspended sentence, was placed on three years' probation, and was ordered to repay \$3,271 to SSA.

Rose Marie Moore, now

of Winnsboro, received a similar sentence and was ordered to refund \$3,136 to SSA, Tutt said. Moore has pleaded guilty to charges she failed to report her daughter's marriage so that her own Social Security benefits would continue. Moore had been getting benefits as the widowed mother of an unmarried, minor child.

David Tutt said his office routinely forwards suspected fraud cases to investigators of the Department of Health and Human Services where cases are prepared for referral to U.S. attorneys.

"While we are primarily concerned with getting Social Security checks to people who are entitled to

them," Tutt said, "we are also determined to prevent and detect fraudulent claims and to recover any money that should not have been paid."

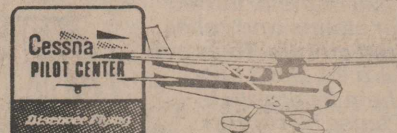

# Utility district signs contract for water plant repair

LAMAR — Work is scheduled to begin "immediately" on repair of the water plant serving residents of Goose Island Lake Estates in Lamar, after the Aransas County Municipal Utility District directors signed the repair contract in a special meeting Tuesday night, March 29.

"We will have drinkable water within 120 days," Steve Shenk, secretary of the board of directors, announced Wednesday morning following the special meeting.

Shenk was referring to the provision in the contract with Membrane Technology, a

subsidiary of Membrane Systems Inc. of Corpus Christi, that calls for completion of the work within 120 days after it begins.

Money for the \$68,000 project will come through a loan from South Most Savings & Loan of Brownsville. At Tuesday's meeting, Herman Little, attorney for the utility district, said he has secured a verbal commitment from South Most officials to loan the district up to \$80,000 in a five-year note.

Directors Tuesday night signed a promissory note that was to be mailed to South Most this past week for the loan and requested the first advance on the loan —

*'We will have drinkable water in 120 days'*

\$20,400, approximately 30 percent of Membrane Technology's bid.

First payment by the ACMUD on the loan is due Oct. 1 and will be on interest on all funds borrowed to that point. Repayment of remaining principle and interest will begin Nov. 1.

Efforts to repair the water plant — a reverse osmosis unit that went on-line in

early 1978 and malfunctioned soon afterward — began last summer when the utility district went out for bids.

The low bid, submitted by Membrane Systems Inc., calls for reconstruction of the water plant to deliver 125,000 gallons of water per day by reverse osmosis process with a total dissolved solid content of 200 parts per million or less (less than the minimum required by the state). The company pledged a six-month money-back guarantee on the entire system, a 12-month money-back guarantee on all elements except the membranes and a three-year money-back guarantee on the membranes.

To finance the loan for the work, the district last month signed a contract with Lamar Water Systems Corp. under which the district will sell water to residents of Lamar through LWS in exchange for sufficient payment to offset loan costs. The district will also pay a portion of costs for maintaining the Lamar system.

In other action Tuesday night, utility district directors authorized a payment of \$15,337 by April 1 to meet 1978 bond payments due on that date. Payment is made under the district's recently implemented debt adjustment plan to pay off the district's \$1.6 million bonded indebtedness.

## Hearing, vote canvass set Monday by city council

An annexation hearing and canvass of Saturday's voting results are scheduled in special meetings of Rockport's city council Monday, April 4.

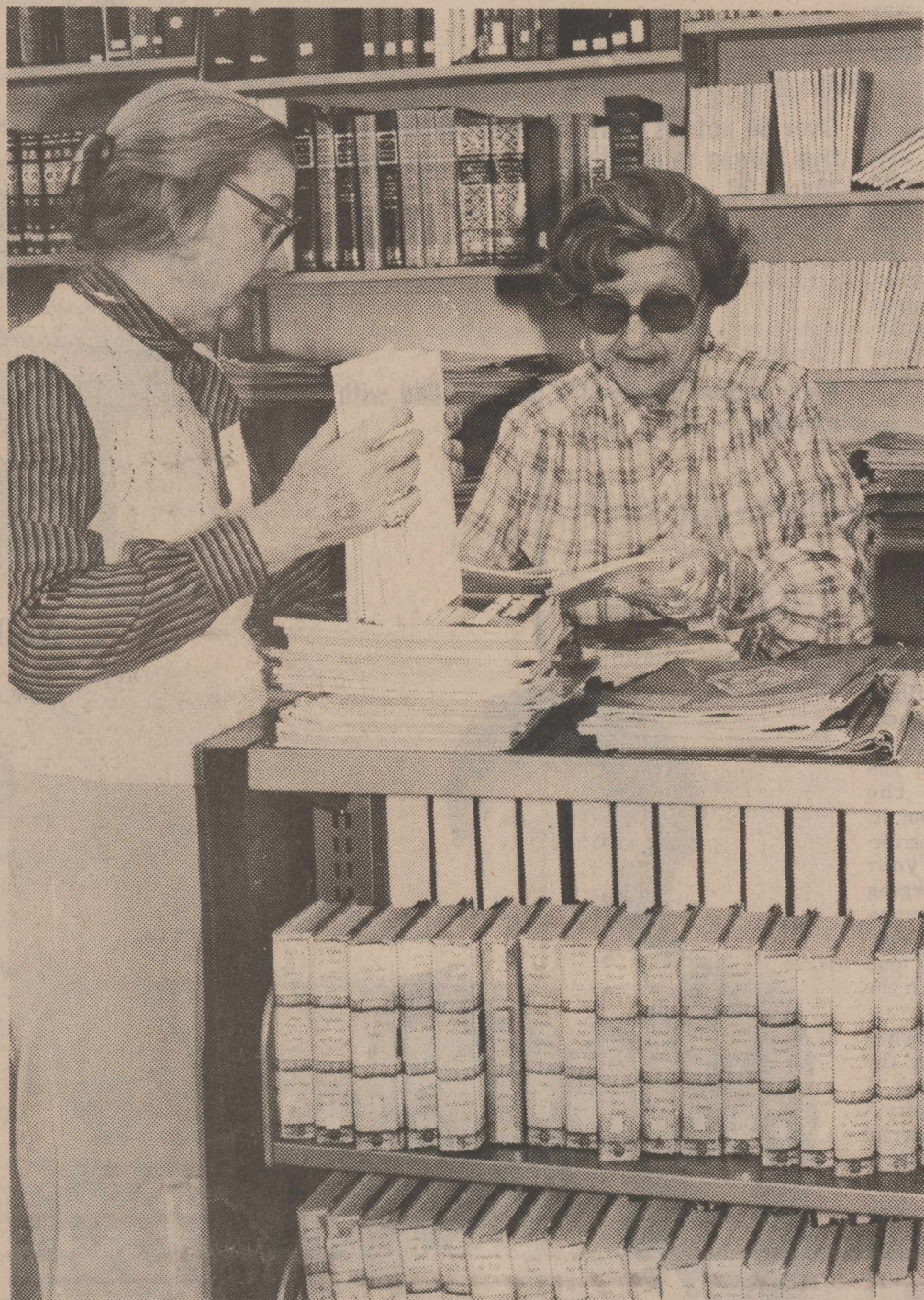
A public hearing on requested annexation of 3,572 acres near Enterprise Clinic is scheduled for 5 p.m. at the site of the land. Annexation is being requested by the Retirement Corp. of America, developers of proposed Oak Villas Retirement Community.

Total area of the development is nearly 11 acres but the remaining acreage is already in the city limits. Monday's will be the second of two required hearings on the request; the first hearing was held March 14 at Rockport's City Hall and drew no

protests. At 5:30 p.m., the council will meet to canvass results of Saturday's elections, including a special city charter election.

Also expected on the agenda will be consideration by the council of the institution of annexation proceedings for the Harbor Oaks Shopping Center site. Hearings on this request were held in February and March 14 and no objections were raised.

If the council votes to institute annexation proceedings, an ordinance for annexation of the shopping center site will be on the April 12 agenda. The request was brought to the council by Roger Seamans Jr., developer of the project.

Alderman Elgin Dietz said that it would be a waste for Fulton to go ahead and install a sewage system and then have the Nautical Towers development connections render it obsolete.

Holman suggested the council approach the Navigation District about a special permit to tie into the septic tank which handles the public restrooms at the harbor until a more permanent solution could be reached. This would avoid a delay in allowing a concessionaire to begin business in the bait stand.

Fulton attorney Allen Lee suggested that the specifications for the bait stand prospectus be rethought and changed if necessary. Fulton would then give notice and rebid the stand.

The problem will be discussed during the council's next workshop meeting at 6 p.m. April 5.

Alderwoman Pat Loflin told the council

and audience members that the town has formed a non-profit organization with several other community groups and will go before the ACND April 5 to ask for a land lease on which they will put the Paws and Taws Building. Other members of the organization include the Rockport-Fulton Tourist Association, the Fulton Volunteer Fire Department, the Rockport Area Chamber of Commerce, the Aransas County Medical Services Inc. Women's Committee, the AARP and Ducks Unlimited — all of which would be allowed to use the building after it is moved.

The building, which currently belongs to Juanita Wagley, will be donated to members of the non-profit organization. Loflin estimates that it will cost approximately \$40,000 to move the building if they do get a lease from the Navigation District, but that fundraising shouldn't be a problem.

The commissioners supported a resolution approving the use of federal block grant funds for public transportation for the elderly, sporting equipment for underprivileged youths and for park facilities. The Community Action Agency in Sinton is in charge of handling the funds for Aransas and San Patricio Counties.

Judge Wendell read two other letters to

the court; the first was from the Aransas County Emergency Medical Services, thanking the court for approving an increase in their budget several months ago.

The second letter, from Aransas County Sheriff Robert O. Hewes, thanked the county's road and bridge department for the fine work they have done repairing the county's patrol cars.

The court then adjourned for an executive session to discuss personnel matters. No action resulted from the session.

from films to puppet shows to stories, all handled by Cepha.

Library volunteer Jeannette Stalker is the "weeder," coming twice a week to check the shelves, removing books that, for one reason or another, are no longer useable.

"We're very fortunate," Eunice says. "The recommended procedure is to weed books twice a week — other libraries envy us."

Jeannette has been a volunteer at the library here for 10 years, starting when she first came to this area as a visitor. "When we moved here, I just continued (volunteering)," she added.

Another long-termer is Alice Moore who's been coming "since 1965 or around there. I don't have any specific things to do," she said. "I just come in and work." Among the tasks she works at is keeping

the library's card files up to date.

Processing — getting the books ready for the shelves — is one of the tasks handled by volunteer Hilde Kaigler. "She comes once a week, or twice if we have a need for her," Eunice said, adding, "when she's not leading a birding trip." Hilde has been a volunteer for eight years.

Other volunteers include Penny Benjamin, Nellie Anderson, Mary Jean Brownell, Ruth Davis, Hazel Eller — who's been coming to the library twice a week for "at least 12 years," Eunice said — Dorothy Leslie, Joyce Thornton, Lucille Fleming . . .

Gertrude Fisher has been volunteering for the past four and a half years and is currently revising the periodicals, weeding out the old ones. Carol DePuma began working as a volunteer six months ago because "I like books. I worked in the library in high school and college and I had some spare time, so I volunteered." Like the other volunteers, she "does whatever is needed" during her volunteer hours.

Marian Shaw became a volunteer worker last October because "I knew Mrs. Hamon needed help. I work at the desk, put books away — I'm more at the desk than anything."

Sally Groom, who's been a volunteer for about three or four months, also works mostly at the desk. She came in to the library looking for books on the Galapagos Islands — and stayed to help.

"I think this is an exceptionally good library for a town this size, and I wanted to do what I could to help," she said when asked her reasons for volunteering.

As for Eunice, she feels she has a good group in the current crop of volunteers — "but we still need more," she added. She asks anyone who can devote a few hours of their time a week to call the library.

There's always room for one — or a few — more.

The second annual Sea-o-Rama events were decided upon by the Sea-o-Rama committee. The theme was "Fun in the Sun." Can Can girls, a barbeque and beauty contests were among the first day activities while the second day

would host boat races and a water ski show.

The Texas Game & Fish Commission planned to expand their building to accommodate some inland fisheries tanks and a wildlife panorama. The expansion would begin in the summer if the plans were approved.

15 years ago — 1968

2,500 mile trip.

10 years ago — 1973

Debbie Brown won the title of "Miss Rockport-Fulton 1973" which qualified her to enter the Miss South Texas contest.

Mr. and Mrs. C.G. (Pete) Melton won the 'Yard of the Month' contest. The Mel-

tons not only had a beautiful yard but also one that produced fruits and vegetables.

The world champion live oak tree at Goose Island had a width of 19 youngsters as shown in a picture of the March 29, 1963 Pilot edition. The 2,000-year-old tree had a girth of 32 feet, a height of 44 feet and a 89-foot crown.

An article in the March 29, 1963 Pilot edition stated that W.S. Hall built the first meat packing company at Fulton in 1865. The packeries flourished for about a decade. However, Rockport and Fulton were also home of the first mechanically-refrigerated packing company in America.

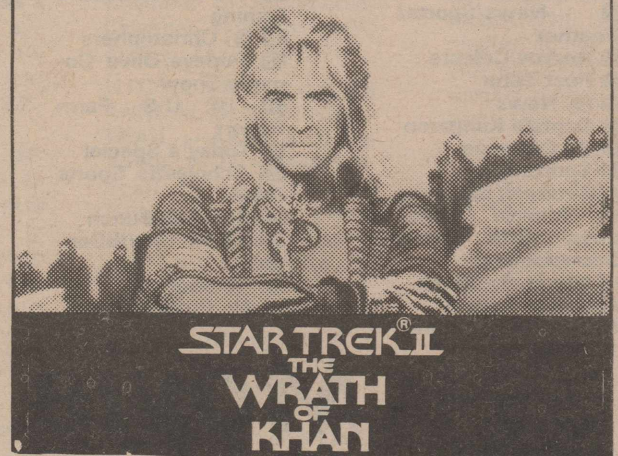

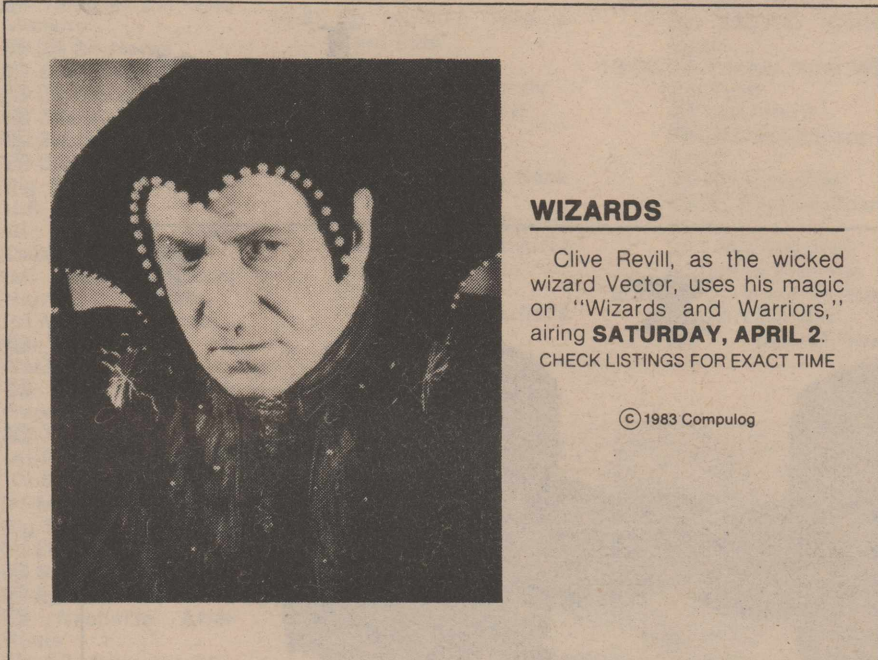

When "The Black Stallion" premiered at the New York Film Festival a few years back, the film was quickly recognized as a success on many levels. The critics loved it, horse lovers loved it and kids (of all ages) loved it. Moreover, it showed that a children's film could be made with great care and intelligence and not be simple, saccharine or just plain sloppy.

The film was based on Walter Farley's novels about the Black Stallion. Since there are 16 of them, there was little doubt that a sequel was in the offing. So in this movie, the Black Stallion returns to the Sahara Desert, his original home.

The first film was lyrical, enchanting, exciting — everything a children's film should be. The first 45 minutes to an hour of the movie had virtually no dialogue, but the superb cinematography told a riveting tale of shipwreck and survival, and of the boy's love for the stallion.

"The Black Stallion Returns" wants to be what its predecessor was, but this particular horse opera falls flat.

The lyricism is gone, the adventure is preposterous. For instance, when the horse is abducted back to the Moroccan desert from whence it came, the boy calmly stows away on a plane to Casablanca, makes his way across the burning desert and finds his beloved horse, without even a goodbye to mom.

He makes it, of course, with barely a parched lip or blister, while still wearing his long-sleeved shirt and sneakers. Moral: No 15-year-old should cross the Sahara without his Adidas or trusty pocket knife.

The film is badly paced and poorly written and will appeal only to the younger members of the audience. Francis Ford Coppola, executive producer of the first film, serves the same function here, and the editor of the original movie, Robert Dalva, returns as director of this sequel.

As such, it should have been a better movie, but with the exception of some fine cinematography, "The Black Stallion Returns" is disappointing.

### Maitland sensitively portrays bulimic on 'Y&R'

The Abbott family of "The Young and Restless" outdoes "Dynasty's" Carrington clan when it comes to being the most sensational group of lookers on TV.

Patriarch John (Jerry Douglas) is a mature cross between Tyrone Power and Kirk Douglas; his wife, Jill, (Deborah Adair) closely resembles Ava Gardner; daughter Ashley (Eileen Davidson) is a stunning Lauren Bacall clone.

But during the last few months, "Y & R" viewers have turned their eyes and their sympathies to the family's "ugly duckling," the overweight and insecure teen Traci, who has been marvelously portrayed by 24-year-old actress Beth Maitland.

"Traci has quite a few of the common symptoms of bulimia," Miss Maitland says of Traci's eating disorder, which in real life is said to affect approximately 30 percent of female college students in America today.

"She very seldom eats in front of anyone, but binges in private, gorging on brownies or cookies in her room and then vomiting. She feels terrible guilt about her problem and is almost obsessed with hiding it. As with many bulimics, she is from a middle-class home and is ambitious. But she has low self-esteem and feels that if she were only thin she'd be completely happy."

Miss Maitland recalls a time in her life when she had similar characteristics and she uses these memories in her portrayal.

"I'm always on a diet," she says, "but I've never experienced anything as extreme as bulimia. But since getting my role I've read articles and talked to people who have it."

The response to Traci and her portrayal by Beth has been great.

"It's amazing how many people have this problem. I've received an overwhelming response in favor of seeing someone on television go through it. She's not perfect, not a size five. She is real to the viewers."

Miss Maitland was working as an assistant casting director when she got the role of Traci. Since then she's learned a lot about bulimia and its real-life victims.

\* Italian wines held 60 percent of the total import market to this country in 1982, an increase of 7 percent over the previous year. Following the popularity of the Italian imports, French wines were a close second, and German wines, third. Imports from all other countries of the world were less than 10 percent in 1982 of the wines imported from Italy last year.

\* The David Bruch Winery of Los Gatos, Calif., has released two excellent new wines (available in April) at very good prices. The David Bruch Vintage 1981 California Chardonnay (\$10) was aged for six months in French barrels to produce an elegant, complex wine with lots of oaky tones. Pleasant to

drink now, this wine will reach a superb peak within two to three years of bottle-aging. David Bruch 1980 Amador Zinfandel (\$6.50) is a big California zin with a crisp finish and a full body. Blended from about 70 percent zinfandel and about 30 percent Petite Sirah grapes, the wine was aged in American oak barrels for added complexity. It is an excellent choice for short-term bottle age — three to five years.

\* An exciting new white wine to try is Sterling Vineyards Estate Bottled Cabernet Blanc 1982 (\$6.50). This Napa Valley wine is produced in the blanc de noir style from cabernet sauvignon grapes and is the first of the '82 vintage wines to be released from this award-winning winery. The wine has a slight salmon blush and a delightful fruitiness and characteristically varietal bouquet; a crisp, round balance in the mouth makes it a white wine that will stand up to hearty food, as well as strong, pre-prandial cheeses.

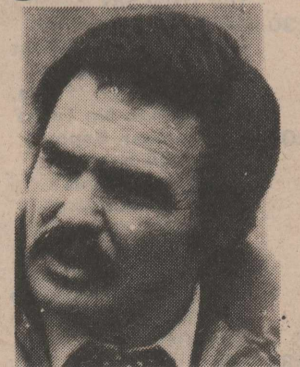

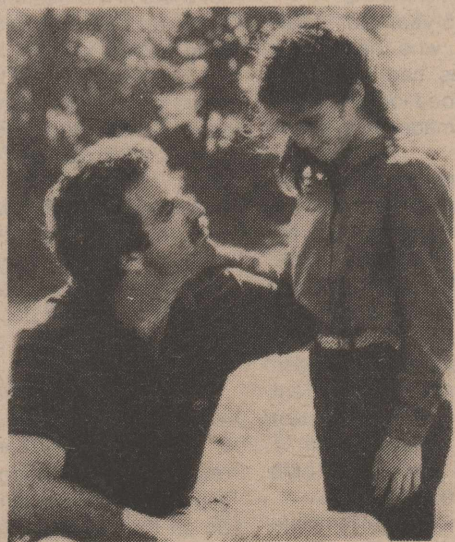

You have many good points in your letter. However, I think you know that your problems will not go away until your in-laws and your husband know what's up. Tell your husband firmly that you are tired of the situation. He ought to realize that if you are happy with him and his family, everyone can be happier. Outline your plan of every other letter to him. If he doesn't

follow up and his folks start to gripe, tell them about your schedule for letters and phone calls and tell them that their son didn't hold up his end. Once they begin to receive letters every other month and only from you (sign only your name), they will know that you are doing your share. Let him feel the heat.

DEAR DEBBIE:

I have been married for 11 years. I love my husband very much. The problem is that I have had my mother-in-law living with us off and on for at least nine of those years. She has been staying with us now for over two and a half years. She has a mental problem. She sits and stares at me a lot and she makes me very nervous. She has two other sons but they never want her at their houses and most of the time they don't call or come to see her. I am always the one to take her to doctors' appointments and everywhere else. She is putting a big strain on my marriage and I don't know what to do about it. I have tried to get my husband to put her into a hospital, but so far no luck. Please tell me what I can do to solve my problem. All she does is lie around and she doesn't do a thing to help in the house. Please advise me.

**DEAR FRUSTRATED:**  
 Tell your husband again how you feel. Tell him that his mother is putting a strain on your relationship. Suggest that he and his brothers make some arrangements for her care. You may want to consult with your clergy or a doctor. They may be able to make an impact on your husband and your in-laws. In any event, your present situation is not fair to you or your mother-in-law. Once everyone realizes this, things should change.



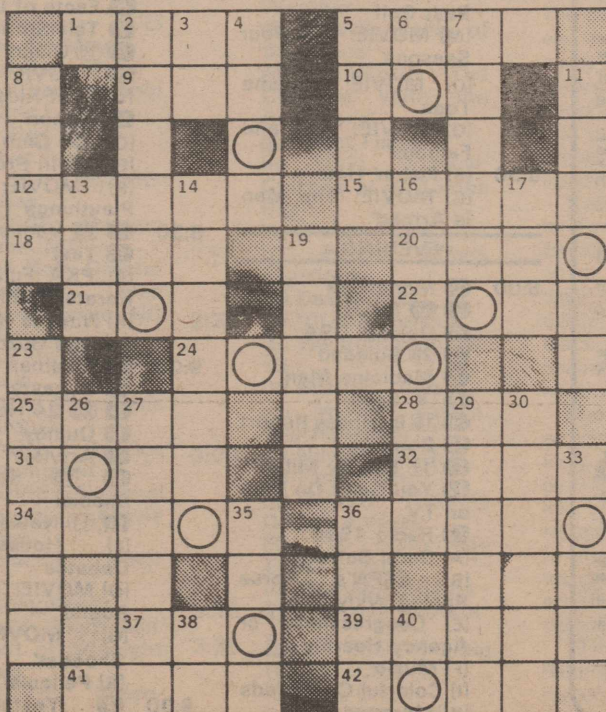

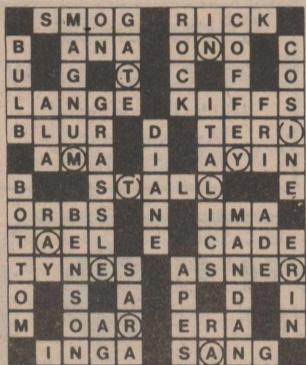
