NEAR RECORD VOTE IS CAST SATURDAY

Tri-District Boy Scout Swimming Meet To Be Held In Lamesa Aug. 8

The Tri-District Swimming Meet for the South Plains Council Boy Scouts, will be held in Lamesa, Monday August 8th, according to announcement released here this week. Scene of the event will be the City Swimming Pool at 7:30 p. m. This meet covers three Scout Districts, the Southeast District composed of Slaton, Post, and Tahoka; The Southwest District with Brownfield, Seagraves, Ropesville, Plains and Gomez and the Southern District which includes Lamesa and O'Donnell.

Ten to fifteen troops are expected to participate in this event and possibly one hundred or more scouts will be in Lamesa at that time.

The meet is divided into three divisions. Junior for boys 12 and 13, Intermediate boys 14 and 15, and Senior for scouts 16 and 17. They will compete in swimming races, relays, diving and plunge contests.

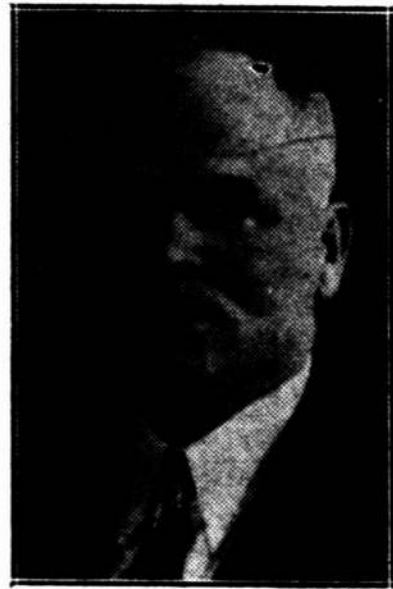
Henry Norris of this city is general chairman in charge of this meet with A. G. Barnard in charge of meet events, A. G. Bearden, promotional and Weldon Lindsey in charge of arrangements. A watermelon feast is planned as a part of the entertainment to be furnished the visiting scouts.

Winners of first and second places in this meet will be eligible to participate in the Council Championship to be held in Plainview, August 12th.

For the past three years, '35, '36 and '37, Troop 22 of Lamesa, under the leadership of Joe Spikes has won first place in the swimming contests in the council and they will endeavor to hold that championship this year. But from present indications they will have some very stiff competition this year and will really have to put forth every effort if they are successful.

There will be no charge for spectators and the general public is invited to come out and witness this big event.

J. D. Dyer came to Lamesa in 1920 from Plainview, shortly after he received his honorable discharge from the United States army in which he served for the duration of the World War. He accepted a position with Moore Hardware Company of this city where he worked more than a year. He then engaged in the teaching profession, teaching one term at Woody, one at McCarty and served one term as principal of the Lamesa high school. While principal he was instrumental in affiliating history for the first time in the local high school. In 1923 he was appointed postmaster of the Lamesa post office and served in this capacity until February 1, 1936.

County Joins Rest of State Going For O'Daniel

That the Democratic Primary Election held Saturday held more than passing interest in Dawson county is shown in the large number of votes cast. Two years ago something like 3,180 votes were polled in this county as compared with 3,762 votes cast in the sheriff's race. This is probably the largest vote ever cast in Dawson county despite the fact that most of the day was rainy and bad.

While some interesting races were had, for the most part they were more or less one-sided. Probably the closest

Allison led the representatives race with 1884, Montgomery 675, Brock 415, Vickers 268, Florence 115 and Martin 96.

Dr. Cox Says:

Austin, Texas, July 27.—"Recent outbreaks of food poisoning show very strikingly the need for special care in handling and refrigerating any food that must be prepared some time in advance of serving," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox state health officer.

"Prevention of food poisoning requires clean food handled as little as possible and consumed while it is fresh. Foods prepared hours before serving, and allowed to stand at warm temperatures become culture media for bacteria. Cooked products of a perishable nature are readily subject to decomposition, and must be kept will refrigerated.

"Most food poisoning is caused by infection by certain types of bacteria which grow rapidly under favorable conditions, such as high temperature and high humidity. The infection may come from dirty hands, utensils, flies, rodents, contaminated water, infected food materials and in some cases in certain types of bacteria, which are rapidly spread and not necessarily associated with filthy conditions.

"Picnic food is particularly susceptible to transmitting food poisoning to the members of the picnic party. Be sure you have sound, fresh foods clean, free from stagnant odors, slime etc. Require all who prepare food for use to wash their hands thoroughly before handling it. Avoid excessive hand contacts with the food. See that clean containers are used and that special care is exercised in wrapping foods and in protecting them from contamination.

"If food must be prepared much in advance of use, cook it thoroughly, keep it refrigerated and other wise protected at a temperature under 50 degrees F. until you are ready to use it. Avoid serving foods that are readily infected, such as certain salads, and cream-filled pastries. Any foods that are not to be served immediately should be kept on ice. Milk, ice cream and dairy products in general should be from approved sources.

"Digestive upsets cannot always be blamed on the food served or eaten at an outing. Sometimes excessive heat and humidity combined with over-exertion and over heating, as well as over-eating, help to bring them about. Remember this, and don't indulge in

Trees Grow in Semi-Arid Plains



No longer is it necessary that the Plains country be a vast, treeless expanse. Farmers are finding that adapted species attain a growth of 10 to 12 feet within three years if given the benefit of additional water and frequent cultivation. TEXAS WILDLIFE

Austin, Texas, July 27.—A method so simple that it scarcely seems worth writing about has been found to be one of the most effective means of restoring Bobwhite Quail in depopulated ranges, the Game Department announced today.

It is the establishment of fenced areas which offer the birds abundant food and cover in which to build their nests and hide from their enemies.

As described in a bulletin by Valgene W. Lehman, field biologist, and just published by the Game Department, the plots should be about a half-acre in size and properly planted so they will be well stocked with food. They may be square or rectangular in shape.

"There are many quail ranges in Texas that produce few quail because they are overgrazed by cattle, sheep and goats, or cultivated so intensely that little food or cover is left for birds," Lehman writes.

He added that experiments with the fenced shelters had been made in

too strenuous exercise when the days are hot and muggy. Don't over indulge either, in unwise combinations of foods.

Wharton county. They did not interfere with normal farm and ranch operations and resulted in an increase of the quail population. Fourteen of the sixteen plots established, he said, held coveys of quail the following fall and winter. In some instances the shelters were located on the open prairie fully two miles from territory where quail had been known to winter before, and Lehman found attracted and held coveys.

The fenced shelters, Lehman found, can be established at little cost, and can be made to produce quick results.

Two types of shelters are recommended, one for regions having native cover and the other for regions where no native cover is present and must be created artificially by brush piles. Crops planted in the shelters should be rotated.

In his bulletin Lehman includes a diagram showing how the two types of shelters should be constructed.

Full instructions for establishment of the shelters are included in the leaflet, which may be secured free upon request from the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, Wlarton Building, Austin.

Evidence that Texas sportsmen are living up to the name was found in June fine and arrest report of the Game Department. Only 46 of the State's 254 counties reported game and fish law violations.

There is an old law on the statute books providing that fish ladders shall be constructed at all dams in Texas. The law, said Will J. Tucker, Game Department secretary, was passed about fifty years ago, when the U. S. Bureau of Fisheries stocked Texas' warm-water streams with Salmon, Rainbow Trout and Shad, all of which are cold-water fish and which expired almost as soon as they were planted in Texas. These fish are "climbers." In the spawning season they go upstream to bring on their young. Hence the fish ladder law.

There are still fishermen who believe fish ladders should be erected for bass and crapple. But these fish, it has been determined, are not climbers, Tucker said. A bass won't climb over two feet.

An elk herd is doing well in the Guadalupe mountains, reports Bob Shaw, Game Department field investigator. Forty-four were imported in 1929. Now the herd numbers more than 300, he said. In the daytime they loiter at waterholes, and at night climb the mountains. They won't jump at automobiles, but they are afraid of horses and men.

est bone in Texas, was found recently in Brewster county by W. S. Strain and twelve men engaged in a digging project there this summer for the Centennial Museum at the College of Mines and Metallurgy here, a branch of the University of Texas. The bone weighs nearly 300 pounds, is a little less than 6 feet long, and is 4 inches broad at the hip end.

Several other dinosaur bones have been unearthed by Strain and his staff and will be placed on exhibit at the College of Mines museum within a short time.

Fire Prevention Posters Unique

Austin, Texas, July 27.—Prize-winning fire prevention posters prepared by Texas public school children last year were recently exhibited in the Library of the University of Texas by the Fire Insurance Division of the State Board of Insurance Commissioners. Each year a poster contest is held by the division in all grades of the public schools, and \$105 in prizes is awarded. Last year more than one thousand entries were submitted.

The display was shown for the benefit of teachers of fire prevention courses who are attending summer school at the university. Miss Olga Juniger, supervisor of the educational division of the insurance department, said. These courses are taught in many towns

and rural schools, which receive actual monetary benefit from the installation of such courses as well as benefits in safety of life and property, she added. Towns which inaugurate fire prevention courses in their public schools are accorded reductions in their fire insurance rates, while rural school districts teaching the courses receive reductions in school property valuations.

Indicative of the tendency among the school children to relate their posters to modern times and to their recent experiences is shown by the fact that in the last contest approximately thirty entries had for their theme, "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs." Miss Juniger pointed out. Many of the posters exhibited remarkable skill and artistry.

First place in the high school division was won by Magie Wayne Bird of Fort Worth, for her poster, "When Habit is a Hazard," showing a lighted cigar on the edge of a desk, drawn in appropriate colors; in the intermediate division, by Preston Hatcher of Texarkana, "The Attic is No Place for Children to Play with Matches," and in the primary division, by James Hardwick of Mineral Wells, "Careless Campers Cause Fires."

There will also be a run-off in the Treasurers race, when Mrs. Annie Crow, present incumbent and Miss Eunice Gaines will vie for this office. Miss Gaines lead the ticket with 1549, followed by Mrs. Crow with 1351 and Mrs. McMahan 820. Miss Viola Thruston, present County Clerk defeated Mrs. Meek, 2463 to 1153. A run-off will be necessary in the Weighers race also. Wyatt lead with 1393, McHenry 1114 and Terral 835. In the Constable's race Pace set the pace for the others receiving 1209 votes, followed by the

present Constable Aldridge with 879, closely followed by Turnbow with 872 and Carrel 174. In Precinct 1, Commissioners race, Shofner and Moore enter the run-off. Shofner lead the ticket with 301, followed by Moore with 251, Randolph 164, and Brandon 120. In Precinct Two, Hodge and Aten will engage in the run-off. Hodge received 215 votes to lead, with Aten receiving 172. Vinzant 165 and Echols 94. Hodge is present Commissioner from Precinct Two. In Precinct Three Kelley retained his office by defeating O'Brien 460 to 433. Beeman will remain Commissioner of Precinct Four by reason of his defeating Duff 798 to 491.

It was an unusually clean campaign all the way through and, although there was a great deal of interest Saturday night when the returns were posted, it was a real jolly crowd, and there was no trouble of any kind.

Out of thirteen races in the county in the first primary seven of them were settled, while six offices will be contested in the August Primary.

continued clear weather, crops are expected to grow and develop at a very rapid rate. greater than the last crop.

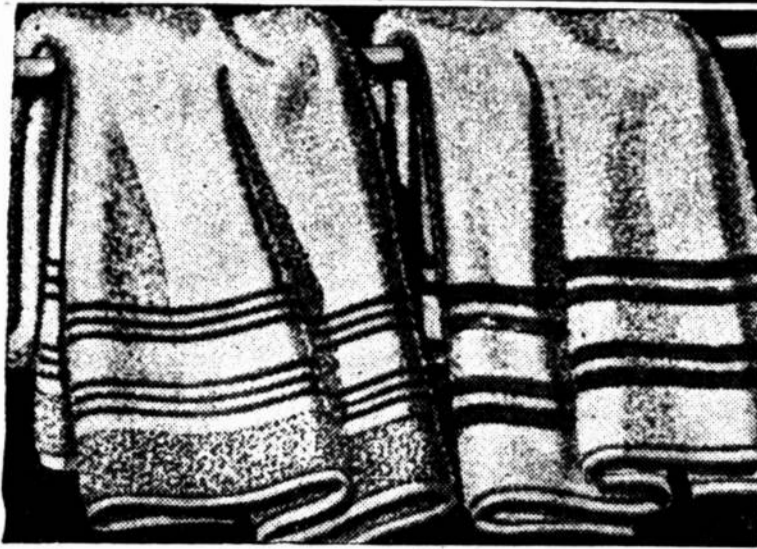

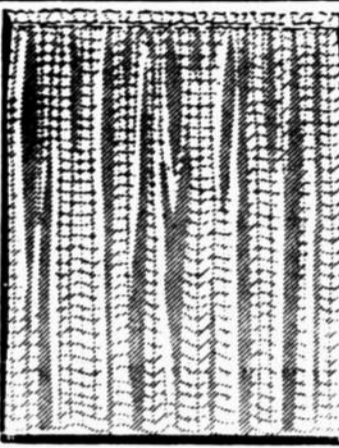

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all offices of the State of Texas; providing for an election upon such Constitutional Amendment, and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Article XVI, Section 1. Official Oath. Members of the Legislature, and all officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:

_____ do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly nor indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money, or valuable things, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected. So help me God."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this state, qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1938, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"For the Amendment of Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas.

"AGAINST the Amendment of Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against said proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election in conformity herewith to determine whether or not the proposed Constitutional Amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and the Governor shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election.
