

Henderson, Richardson Victorious Burleson, Temple Dickson Keep Seats

2 Counties Put Dickson In Lead

State Rep. Temple Dickson led Big Spring legislator Roger Brown over a thousand votes late Saturday night and appeared headed for certain victory in his reelection bid for the 72nd District seat in the state legislature.

With only one, Howard County box out, Dickson had piled up an unofficial count of 6,250 votes to Brown's 4,964. Only an estimated 300 votes were uncalled.

Dickson used tremendous

majorities in Mitchell and Nolan counties to overcome a strong margin for Brown in Howard.

Incumbent Wins In 17th District

Congressman Omar Burleson appeared late Saturday night to have scored a smashing victory over Abilene attorney Eldon Mahon.

At 11:30 p.m. Saturday,

incomplete and unofficial returns from the district's 24 counties giving Burleson a buffer of 31,061 votes to 18,038 for Mahon.

Victory seemed within Burleson's grasp in a scant few hours after the polls closed and at last count Mahon had whittled the incumbent in only one of the 24 counties—that being in Glasscock where Mahon took a 78-77 margin.

Re-entry Set At Two Sites In County

Re-entry is scheduled on two projects located 20 miles southwest of Colorado City in the Ray Albaugh (Wolfcamp) Field by Coastal States Producing Co. of Abilene.

TESCO Readies Business Office

Texas Electric Service Company business office opens for operations in a new location Monday at 406 Walnut.

Open house activities are scheduled in the newly remodeled facilities throughout Monday and TESCO manager Don Benson invited the public to stop by for refreshments and a tour of the building.

The new office contains approximately 2,000 square feet of floor space and is completely air conditioned and heated.

Customer parking facilities are provided at each end of the building.

Front area of the office contains a display area for electrical appliances and the accounting department.

Other areas include an office for the manager and working and storage space for service men.

Texas Electric moves to the new location after more than a half century of occupancy at the office at 153 Oak Street. Plans call for the old building to be razed in the future.

2,398 Ballot On Saturday

Incumbent Precinct Four Commissioner Moody Richardson and Precinct One Justice of Peace challenger Leonard Henderson each whipped two opponents to highlight races in Mitchell County.

A moderate turnout of 2,398 voters went to the polls Saturday in the Democratic Primary.

In the race for the 17th District Congressional seat, incumbent Omar Burleson staged an unexpected victory over former Mitchell County Attorney Eldon Mahon with the unofficial total giving Burleson 1,257 to his challenger's 1,122.

Sweetwater's Temple Dickson carried away an expected win over Big Spring's Roger Brown by 1,729 to 602.

Henderson took wins in all three boxes to garner an unofficial total of 804 while incumbent Justice of the Peace T. E. Arnold had 313 and Fred Smith, 237.

Longtime commissioner Moody Richardson got 308 votes while challengers totals went like this, C. E. Walker, 186, and Price Hall, 73.

Mary Lee Moore won the JP's seat in Precinct Three despite a converted write-in campaign on behalf of Sam Thompson. Final unofficial

count was 144 for Moore and 96 for Thompson.

Statewide races gave expected margin victories to Waggoner Carr seeking the Democratic nomination for the U. S. Senate, to Governor John Connally and Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith.

Crawford Martin polled 1,966 votes in Mitchell County in the attorney general's race with State Senator Franklin Spears getting 580 and Galloway Calhoun close behind at 571.

Byron Tunnell ran away with the Railroad Commission seat drubbing two other opponents.

A nip-and-tuck battle developed countywide between W. T. McDonald and John F. "Jack" Onion for the court of criminal appeals. McDonald had 1,082 and Onion 1,078.

Ever notice that Mother's Day cards all go to extremes — either too, too sweet and wonderful and tender... or as impersonal as a prescription, reading like a formula for a greeting to any mother from any son or daughter.

There just isn't any in-between for Mother's Day cards. Either you get one decked in paper roses and lace and dripping with angelic symbols. Or settle for one that sounds as stilted as "Dear Madam."

Only other alternative is to forsake tradition and buy one of those far-out funny ones — which your own particular mother might not find one bit funny.

AMONG the little jewels in the comic vein discovered this season was one which tempted. It was bright red and featured a little black lamb frolicking inside.

Might have bought it because it read "Happy Mother's Day from your little black sheep" which tickled me. Only the front line read "To Mom," and the particular mother in mind is allergic to the term "Mom," instead of Mother.

Another joker pictured an old lady in a rocking chair with the printed advice, "Don't just sit there!" and when you opened the thing further it read, "Slip a little gin in that cup of tea and have yourself a ball on Mother's Day." (Now there's a touching sentiment for some little old Whistler's Mother waiting to be remembered.)

CONVERSELY, the stacks of serious cards are often just as inappropriate.

They praise, laud, extol the virtues of motherhood. Almost without exception they're in the "read 'em and weep" vein.

Now I personally feel that most mothers can find, in the average lifetime, enough to cry about without having to go through the second Sunday in May each year weeping for joy.

Choose one of those strictly impersonal ones and your mother may think you're mad at her about something.

What to do? Well? Why not design your own for a change... or scribble a very special, personal message to a very special lady... even if it's just the well-known "I love you."

THING IS, that no stranger can express for you your own feeling about your own mother.

Because mothers are as different as their children are different. They come in all sizes, ages, complexions, temperaments, looks. Mothers, just like fathers, friends and other fine people, are blessed with such a wide, wide variety of lovable ways... along with such endearing little assortments of faults.
