Financial assistance loans available

Small businesses in Mitchell County may be eligible to apply for financial assistance from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) under that agency's Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) program.

Small business concerns, including farmers and ranchers, sustaining losses due to severe drought beginning Jan. 1, 1984 and continuing may be eligible for the EIDL loans, according to Phil O'Jibway, district director of Lubbock's SBA office.

West Texas counties included in the declaration and the related expiration dates are: Hansford, Martin and Knox—June 3, 1985; Howard, Mitchell and Nolan—June 24, 1985.

"Agricultural enterprises requesting \$100,000 or less must first apply to the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA)," O'Jibway said. "SBA will accept applications only on a referral basis from FmHA on those applicants requesting \$100,000 or less."

Eligible agricultural enterprises requesting over \$100,000 may apply directly to SBA. The program is available only to small businesses which are able to meet SBA's size standards and which do not have credit elsewhere, according to O'Jibway.

The interest rate for loans processed under this designation is 4 percent for small business concerns without credit elsewhere, and 10.5 percent for small agricultural cooperatives without credit elsewhere.

O'Jibway said individuals seeking more information or requesting loan application forms should contact SBA's Area 3 Disaster Office at 2306 Oak Lane, Suite 110, Grand Prairie, Tex. 75051 or call toll free 1-800-442-7206.

The latest announcement from the SBA follows an announcement from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) last week that applications for emer-

gency farm loans for losses caused by the drought are being accepted.

FmHA acting county supervisor Alton R. Pyburn said that Mitchell County is one of 12 counties in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought.

Pyburn said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue in business, or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate on the first \$100,000 borrowed is five percent; interest rate is eight percent on the balance borrowed over that amount. For farmers who can obtain commercial credit but who choose to borrow from FmHA, the interest rate is 13.75 percent.

As a general rule, farmers must have suffered at least a 30-percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan, Pyburn said. Farmers participating in the federal crop insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until June 24, 1985, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly carry over into the new farming season, Pyburn said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living.

The FmHA office in Colorado City is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Loraine council studies request

The Loraine City Council Thursday night agreed to seek another bid for concrete work after a resident asked the council to have his driveway repaired after a garbage truck damaged it.

George Lee addressed the council and said he has received one estimate for \$500 to have the repairs to his driveway made. He said that the truck damaged the driveway after driving across it to pick up garbage.

Mayor Tommy Green explained that the garbage truck and its driver acts as an independent contractor, but told Lee that the city will make sure the repairs are made. Green explained that the city will require more than one estimate.

City secretary Kaye Nell Cornutt said a claim had been turned in on the city's insurance policy, but the claim was rejected.

For high school students Financial aid night set

Colorado High School will host a financial aid night on Tuesday at 7 p.m. in the auditorium.

All parents of junior or senior students are encouraged to attend if the students plan on attending any college, university or technical school after graduation.

James B. Parker, director of student financial aid at Western Texas College and Ann

Duncan, director of financial aid at Howard College will be on hand to cover the subject in detail and to answer any questions the students or parents may care to ask.

The federal government appropriates \$16 billion annually in the form of student financial aid and this assistance is available to any student who meets the established criteria. The money is based on need as well

as scholastic excellence. Most medium income families can qualify for this assistance and Tuesday's program is intended to inform students and parents of the steps to be taken in submitting the appropriate application.

Parents and students from Loraine and Westbrook are also invited to attend the meeting.

Sales tax rebate shows increase

Colorado City received a check for \$31,342.07 as its share of the one-percent local sales tax on taxes collected on sales made in September and reported by Oct. 20.

The check compares to \$30,829.13 for the same period last year and brings the 1984 payments to date to \$229,525.10, an 8.89 percent increase over last year.

Loraine received a payment this period of \$1,212.75 compared to \$700.25 for the same period last year. Loraine's payments to

date are \$5,960.75, down 20.55 percent from last year.

Westbrook's payment this period was \$2,008.17, bringing its payments to date to \$13,116.76.

In October, Colorado City received a check for \$14,356.32 and Westbrook received \$1,051.63. September's checks included \$13,175.62 for Colorado City and \$1,906.51 for Westbrook. Loraine did not receive checks in October or September.

The November checks were part of \$99.5 million sent to 985

cities, according to State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

"So far this year, we've sent 13 percent more money to these cities than we did last year," Bullock said. "And they can expect another increase next month as we begin sending them receipts we collect for the new items and services that became taxable Oct. 2. We'll be getting this extra money later in November and sending it to the city halls in December."

Houston's check was the largest—\$16.9 million—bringing 1984

payments to \$134.8 million, up four percent. Dallas received \$11.4 million for a total \$92 million, a 15 percent increase over last year.

San Antonio's payment of \$6.2 million brought the city's 1984 allocations to \$46.1 million for a 16 percent increase. Austin's check for \$4.8 million increased total 1984 payments to \$34.4 million, a 30 percent jump.

Fort Worth received \$3.6 million for a yearly total \$28.4 million and a 15 percent increase

over 1983. El Paso's check for \$2 million pushed 1984 payments to \$16.9 million, up 15 percent. Bullock also sent checks totaling \$41.1 million to the state's four Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston MTA received \$19.6 million for total \$155.3 million. Dallas' DART check was for \$16.9 million, bringing yearly payments to \$93.8 million. San Antonio VIA received \$3.5 million for a total \$25.5 million. Fort Worth's transit authority check for \$942,537 pushed 1984 payments to \$3.5 million.

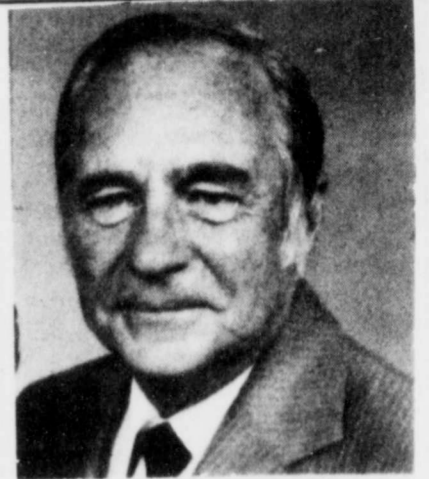
Whitaker

Cook's Corner

Morris enjoys cooking

D'Dee Morris didn't learn to cook by watching her mother like most girls do.

She learned to cook mostly from her grandmother.

"My grandmother is always giving me new recipes to try." So naturally, Mrs. Morris likes to try out new recipes.

Her favorite things to make are candy and bread, but in the summer, she does a lot of canning. She cans a lot of relish, pickles, picante sauce and vegetables.

Her husband basically likes beef and potatoes but "he will eat nearly anything I cook."

Mrs. Morris usually prepares a big lunch and then has enough left over for supper. "Tommy likes foods hot and spicy, so I try to fix something for him, then I have to fix something else for the kids that isn't too spicy."

Mrs. Morris does a lot of baking at Christmas time.

"My mom and I get together and bake about 10 different kinds of candy around the middle of December.

"I like to bake bread, so I usually give homemade bread for Christmas gifts. I really enjoy the holiday season more when I give home baked things to my friends."

Mrs. Morris is married to Tommy and they have three children—Jennifer, 8; Paikke, 5 and Kristian, 4.

Today she is sharing four of her recipes with RECORD readers.

SQUASH RELISH

- 10 cups chopped (diced) squash
- 4 chopped onions
- 1 bell pepper (chopped)
- 6 hot peppers
- 3 teaspoons salt
- Let this set 12 hours or over night. Add:
 - 2 1/2 cups vinegar
 - 3 1/2 cups sugar
 - 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
 - 1 can green chilies

1/4 pound butter or oleo
Cook slowly like fudge until it forms a medium soft ball. Beat until firm and then add one pound of chopped pecans. Roll in wet towel and leave until firm and then slice. Roll in a roll and slice like cookies. This really has to be beat a long time.

MICROWAVE

PECAN BRITTLE

- (or PEANUT BRITTLE.)
- 1 cup pecans or peanuts
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup white Karo
- One-eighth teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon butter
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 teaspoon soda

Stir together nuts, sugar, syrup and salt in 1 1/2 quart bowl (glass). Cook eight minutes on high stirring well after four minutes. Add butter, vanilla and blend well. Return to microwave and cook two minutes longer. Add soda and stir gently until light and foamy. Spread onto greased cookie sheet. Cool and break into pieces.

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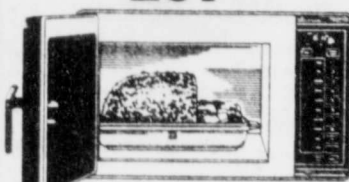
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Bulldogs ride Mustangs to end season 5-5

The Loraine Bulldogs ended their football season with a bang Friday night, sweeping past the Sands Mustangs, 33-6 in District 7-A competition.

Friday's win brings coach Sandy McSpadden's Bulldogs to a 5-5 season record with three of those wins coming in district play.

Lorraine, led by the running attack of Aundra Rose and Tony Morris who each gained their 1,000-yard rushing mark during the game, was first to score when Rose scampered across from the nine-yard line mid-way through the first quarter. John McAdams' kick was blocked and the Bulldogs led, 6-0.

Lorraine's second score came

again in the first quarter after Sands fumbled on their own 25-yard line. Bulldog quarterback Joe Espinoza carried it the entire 25 yards on the first try, giving Lorraine a 12-0 lead. Espinoza connected to Dell Haltom for the two extra points, and the Bulldogs led, 14-0.

Early in the second quarter, Rose scored again, this time from 11 yards out. The try for extra points failed, and Lorraine took a comfortable 20-0 lead into halftime.

The Mustangs came close to scoring late in the second quarter but Lorraine's Billy Mayes picked off a Mustang pass near the five-yard line, ending Sands' hopes for first half touchdown.

Midway through the third quarter, the Bulldogs scored again after Rose dove over for the touchdown. This time, McAdams' kick was good and Lorraine stretched its lead to 27-0.

Lorraine was close to scoring as the third quarter ended, and at the top of the fourth, a pass from Rose to Morris brought the Bulldogs their final score of the

game. The PAT failed, but the Bulldogs led 33-0.

Sands' lone score of the game came midway through the final period of play when quarterback Johnny Willis dove over for the touchdown. The try for extra points failed, and Lorraine still led, 33-6.

Morris was the leading ball carrier for the Bulldogs, rushing for 108 yards before an injury

sidelined him in the fourth quarter. Rose had 73 yards rushing for the evening.

Lorraine racked up 394 yards rushing with 25 first downs. Two of six passing tries were completed for 35 yards.

The Bulldogs held Sands to 147 yards rushing with 22 first downs. The Mustangs completed four of 13 passing attempts for 56 yards.

CHS freshmen, JV split season enders

Colorado High School's freshmen and junior varsity football teams ended their seasons by splitting two games at Coahoma last Thursday night.

The freshmen won 34-12 to finish with a 6-3 record and were led by the four touchdown performances of Randy Hernandez. "They just couldn't stop him," said CHS assistant coach Raymond Zamarippa.

Hernandez made scoring runs of 30, 10 and 45 yards and scored a fourth time on a reception of a Cary Ritchey pass.

Ritchey himself scored the Wolves fifth and only other score. Ritchey and Israel Davila also scored on PAT's.

The Bulldogs scored once in the third and fourth quarters after the Wolves already enjoyed a 26-0 halftime lead.

"They played real well," said Zamarippa. "We pulled off offensively in the second half and tried to get our sixth shutout."

Ritchey also collected an interception for the Wolves and returned it some 30 yards.

Commenting on the season, Zamarippa said "They did an outstanding job. The last five games they were unscored on. It was a big turnaround from the start of the season. They've got a lot of pride and character and showed a lot more confidence in the last part of the season."

CHS assistant coach Mike Hart said "It was a good first half offensively and defensive tackling. They still wouldn't have scored but for breakdown on our punt coverage. They

broke the long pass and run."

On the season Hart said, "It went real well. I'm really surprised and pleased. After the fourth game we weren't sure if they could come around. I've never seen one team come around so fast. The loss to Merkel's JV was the turning point. They had four shutouts before playing us. We were ahead at halftime. I'd like to play them again."

The junior varsity, which played with a very limited supply of bodies all season, dropped a 21-8 decision to the Bulldogs.

CISD officials Friday night said the game will definitely be in the afternoon, probably 2 p.m.

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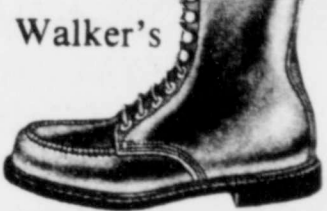


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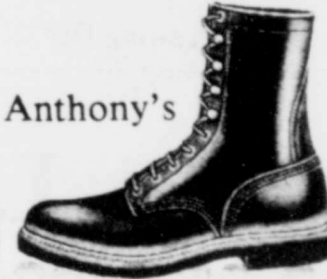
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Wolves explode in 2nd half

The Colorado City Wolves made a second half offensive explosion here last Friday night to defeat the Crane Golden Cranes 34-7.

Crane scored on their very first possession of the game and held their 7-0 lead at halftime before All-Everything quarterback Doug Chitsey and running back Sam Rivera hit high gear

for the Wolves.

The district 7AAA victory gave Colorado City a final 9-1 regular season record—which they will be trying to extend during next Saturday's bi-district clash against 8AAA champion Gatesville.

San Angelo's Bobcat Stadium will be the site and the teams are scheduled to kickoff at either 2 or 3 p.m. Colorado City and

Gatesville representatives were to have met yesterday to set the time.

"I told them that there was a game going on and we hadn't showed up yet," said Colorado High School head football coach Tom Ramsey of his halftime speech. "I said if we got out and make our opportunities we could win this thing."

"It could very well have been 21-0 at halftime (in Crane's favor). I feel we were on the field with next year's district champs. They're a heck of a ballclub but they're young and made young players mistakes. Our kids made up their mind to play. I told them they played a good second half not a good game."

"I'm happy for the kids. 9-1 is something to be proud of. We were shaky at first but Crane came to play. I admire and respect them."

Crane dominated the first half behind some 150 yards rushing. Gerald Mitchell ran for 80 first half yards but finished with only eight more in the second half. Mitchell gave the Cranes their 7-0 lead with a 21 yard run at 8:24 of the first quarter.

That was all the scoring they would do though as a tough Wolf defense led by Gary Marsh and Ruben Rivera put the stop to them.

The Wolves tough defense rose to make a goal line stand early in the second quarter and dodged another bullet when an apparent 63 yard touchdown run by Mitchell was called back.

Colorado City almost tied it up prior to halftime when a 37 yard pass from Chitsey to tightend Don Randle gave the Wolves a first down at Crane's 15. On the next play though Rivera fumbled just before the half ended.

Rivera more than made up for it in the second half—churning out 111 yards after only compiling 10 in the first half. His 121 yards easily put him over 1,000 for the season.

Chitsey, who was the Wolves leading carrier in the first half from his quarterback position, opened the second half with an eight yard run. Two plays later Chitsey found Randle for a 23 yard gain. Then on the next play Chitsey and Chris Aguillon connected on a 52 yard scoring strike. It came with 10:20 left in the third quarter and Chitsey missed the PAT.

Marsh and company held the Cranes, then Chitsey threw a 31 yard scoring pass to Armando Rivera on the Wolves next possession. The drive was helped by runs from Rivera and Billy Jackson and a pass from Chitsey to Perry Conner. The score came with 4:36 left in the third period and an incomplete pass on the PAT attempt left the Wolves leading 12-7.

A Marsh interception ended Cranes next possession but then a determined Chitsey lost the ball while struggling for tough yards.

A Rivera came up from the secondary to stop Mitchell on third and nine from the Crane six yard line.

On the very next play, Chitsey threw a 34 yard bomb to Randle and the Wolves led 20-7. Chitsey again passed to Randle for the PAT.

An interception by Conner and a fumble recovery by Freddie Pineda ended Crane's next two possessions.

Following Pineda's recovery, S. Rivera, Jackson and Chitsey alternated carries to Crane's 12. From there S. Rivera busted through the left side for a score. Chitsey's kick made it 27-7.

Crane's Mark Allen came in to replace Abel Sena for their next possession but again the Wolves defense held. R. Rivera's tackle of Carl Claunch forced them into punting.

The Wolves took the ball, used S. Rivera and Jackson to rush for 81 yards and the score. Rivera himself got the score on a one yard run with 16 seconds left to play and Heath Blassingame kicked the PAT.

The win more than made up for last year's loss to Crane that kept the Wolves at home during the playoffs.

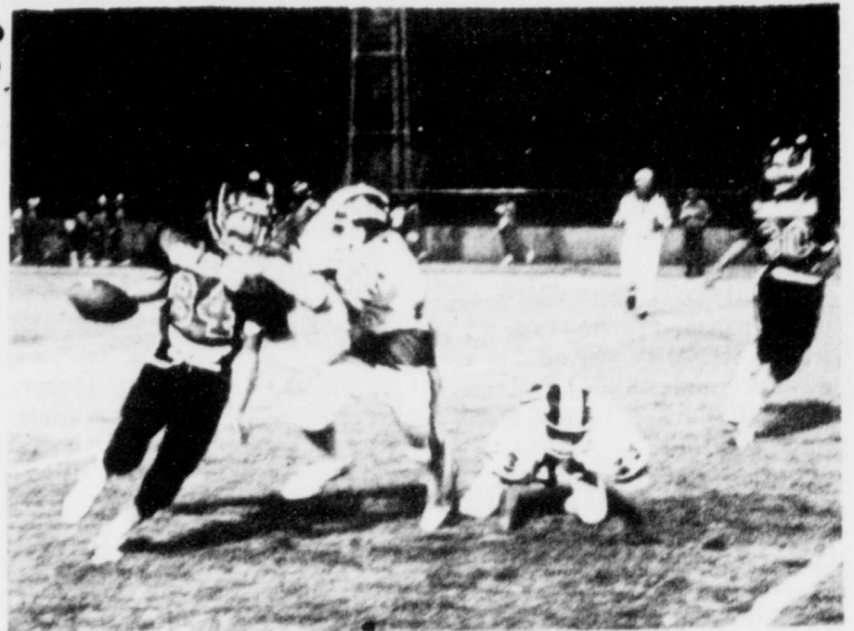

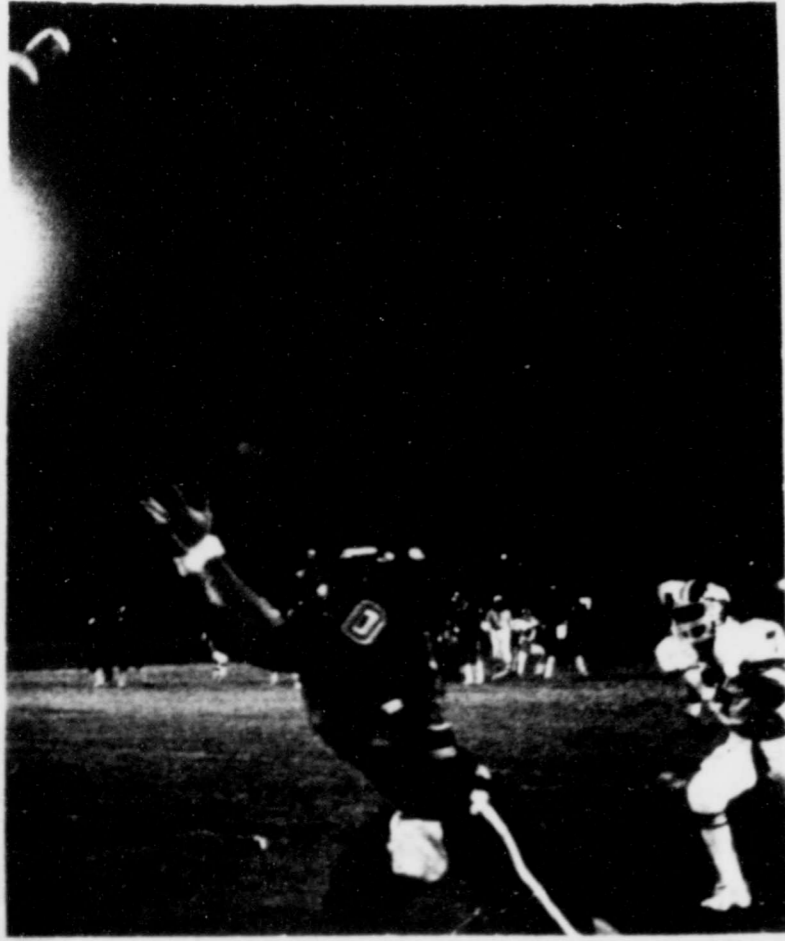

"I'm real pleased because they gave 100 percent effort," said Merrell.

Assistant coach Linda Mathis said, "As far as attitude and trying they were real good. We didn't face enough pressure situations until the playoffs. It's hard to handle when the stakes are high. Like Crane, we need to play consistently tougher competition—which we didn't have. I enjoyed working with them. They all improved and did a good job. What we did accomplish was a great accomplishment. We're thankful for all the support we got."

"We're very happy about being bi-district champs," said Merrell. "The girls should feel proud because of the things they've gotten through."

Coach Merrell and Mathis both felt the volleyball programs success would help to build for an even better year in basketball since most girls do play both.



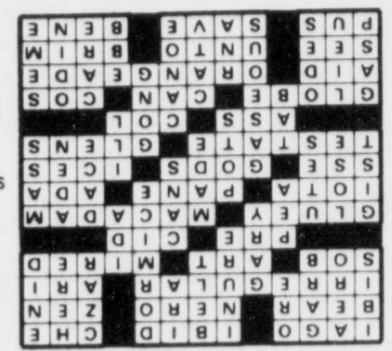

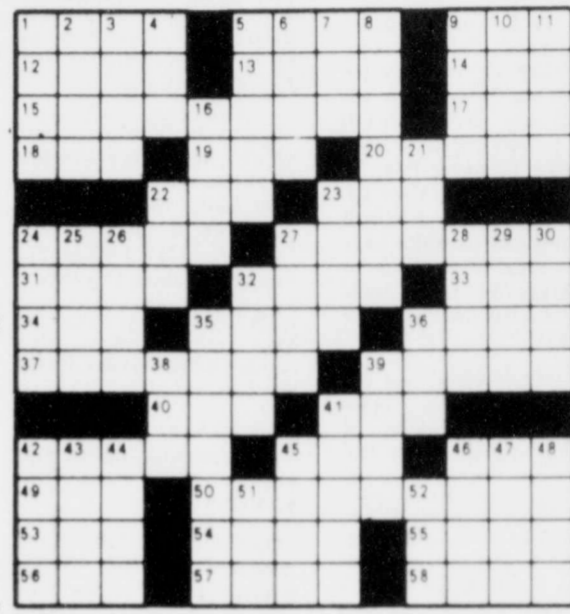

Drifting along: A drifter known as Bernard Roy Kramer was found dead in an old downtown Sacramento, Calif., hotel room. A routine inspection of his room turned up a cheap vinyl suitcase in the closet. It contained \$199,812.05 stuffed in several socks, much of it in \$100 bills bound by bank wrappers. Chief Deputy Coroner Bob Bowers said investigators are puzzled about the small fortune amassed by the shabbily dressed old man. "We've called the Secret Service, and they've documented that the money is real," Bowers said. Let's hope it's all relative.
