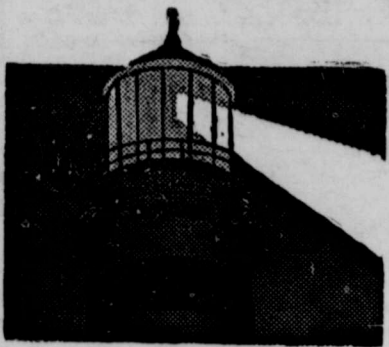




On The BEAM

Hearing Set Dec. 20 on Gilroy Estate

December 20 has been set for the initial work on the settlement of the estate of the late C. C. Gilroy, a Loraine merchant who died Oct. 5, 1964. Mr. Gilroy left an estate valued at over \$100,000, which is claimed by several would-be heirs.

After his death, an application for letters of administration was filed by Hettie Wallace Branch. In November Mrs. Branch was appointed by the court as administratrix of the estate. At this time she also stated that Gilroy had died without leaving a lawful will.

Early this year, an inventory and appraisal of Gilroy's property was made by court appointed appraisers, consisting of Herbert Mearse, M. A. Dunnahoo and W. H. Narrell.

On June 23, 1965, C. E. Erwin of Tecumseh, Okla., filed a document stating that he was an heir of Gilroy. The statement said that the father of C. E. Erwin -- one Richard Erwin, was a brother to C. C. Gilroy.

On Sept. 3, 1965, a motion was filed in Mitchell County Court seeking to remove the present

administratrix and appoint another. The motion was made by lawyers, Dell and Parry Barber, along with Frank Ginzel in behalf of Mrs. Maria Ana Cabrera Perez Gilroy of Old Mexico.

In her motion, the woman said she was married to C. C. Gilroy on Jan. 3, 1915, and had never been divorced from him. She asked to be appointed administratrix.

Later an affidavit for citation by publication was filed by Carlos (Charlie) Gilroy Jr., of Old Mexico. In addition he filed an action to declare heirship to the estate. In his motion he stated that C. C. Gilroy was married to Mrs. Maria Ana Cabrera Perez Gilroy on Jan. 3, 1915 in Buena Vista, Sonora, Old Mexico and that they were never divorced. He further stated that he was born of those parents Dec. 23, 1915, and that the couple had lived as husband and wife for about two years in Cananes, Old Mexico, until C. C. Gilroy returned to the United States.

Gilroy asked that half the estate be given to him and half to Mrs. Gilroy as the only heirs.

More Funds Needed For Mitchell County Library

Judge Elmer Martin has received word that construction project application of the Mitchell County Library, has been approved, and as a consequence, federal funds are now available through the State of Texas to the extent of approximately \$50,000, if a matching sum is raised locally.

Thus, the hopes, backed by hard work, of the county library board, headed by Mrs. George Witten, assisted by Ruth Dozier, librarian, seem near realization. The job is now up to the public.

The county already has the real estate, which has been approved by Texas State Library, consisting of lots East of the courthouse, North of the Colorado City Hall, and cornering on 4th and Oak streets.

The building will be of brick construction, air-conditioned, with shelves for 35,000 books, a multi-purpose room to seat 40-50 people, a children's department, magazine and browsing area, besides loan desk and librarian's office.

Overall cost of approximately

\$90,000 plus, will include equipment such as durable, practical, tasteful furniture, always a costly item in any library to meet library standards will run approximately \$20,000.

The public must now raise approximately \$6,000 (a like sum having already been raised by clubs and organization and by private individuals). Also the library is depending on the Commissioners Court's appropriating from \$37,000 to \$40,000 from funds soon to be available from 1965 tax collections, a sum which would not otherwise be used for operating the county through 1966.

Bids are being received now for the construction, and will be opened Dec. 13th. The contract can not be let until the county has in its possession funds to match the promise of \$50,000 from the federal government. As a consequence, it is urgently requested that gifts be made now.

The board feels this is the opportunity for citizens to make gifts of lasting memorials, as one does to his church in stained glass windows, to deceased loved ones. As those working in behalf of the new library feel, a gift to the library is a gift that keeps on giving.

Gifts, which are deductible on income tax returns, should be mailed to Box 427, Loraine, or Box 206, Colorado City, made payable to Mitchell County Public Library.

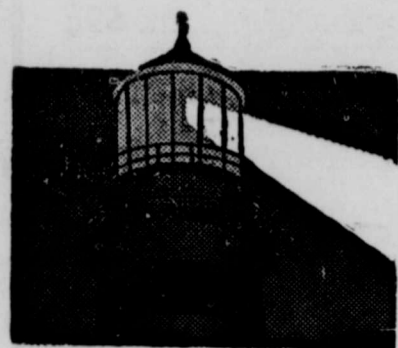

Hearing Set Dec. 20 on Gilroy Estate

December 20 has been set for the initial work on the settlement of the estate of the late C. C. Gilroy, a Loraine merchant who died Oct. 5, 1964. Mr. Gilroy left an estate valued at over \$100,000, which is claimed by several would-be heirs.

After his death, an application for letters of administration was filed by Hettie Wallace Branch. In November Mrs. Branch was appointed by the court as administratrix of the estate. At this time she also stated that Gilroy had died without leaving a lawful will.

Early this year, an inventory and appraisal of Gilroy's property was made by court appointed appraisers, consisting of Herbert Mease, M. A. Dunahoo and W. H. Narrell.

On June 23, 1965, C. E. Erwin of Tecumseh, Okla., filed a document stating that he was an heir of Gilroy. The statement said that the father of C. E. Erwin -- one Richard Erwin, was a brother to C. C. Gilroy.

On Sept. 3, 1965, a motion was filed in Mitchell County Court seeking to remove the present

administratrix and appoint another. The motion was made by lawyers, Dell and Parry Barber, along with Frank Ginzel in behalf of Mrs. Maria Ana Cabrera Perez Gilroy of Old Mexico.

In her motion, the woman said she was married to C. C. Gilroy on Jan. 3, 1915, and had never been divorced from him. She asked to be appointed administratrix.

Later an affidavit for citation by publication was filed by Carlos (Charlie) Gilroy Jr., of Old Mexico. In addition he filed an action to declare heirship to the estate. In his motion he stated that C. C. Gilroy was married to Mrs. Maria Ana Cabrera Perez Gilroy on Jan. 3, 1915 in Buena Vista, Sonora, Old Mexico and that they were never divorced. He further stated that he was born of those parents Dec. 23, 1915, and that the couple had lived as husband and wife for about two years in Cananes, Old Mexico, until C. C. Gilroy returned to the United States.

Gilroy asked that half the estate be given to him and half to Mrs. Gilroy as the only heirs.

More Funds Needed For Mitchell County Library

Judge Elmer Martin has received word that construction project application of the Mitchell County Library, has been approved, and as a consequence, federal funds are now available through the State of Texas to the extent of approximately \$50,000, if a matching sum is raised locally.

Thus, the hopes, backed by hard work, of the county library board, headed by Mrs. George Witten, assisted by Ruth Dozier, librarian, seem near realization. The job is now up to the public.

The county already has the real estate, which has been approved by Texas State Library, consisting of lots East of the courthouse, North of the Colorado City Hall, and cornering on 4th and Oak streets.

The building will be of brick construction, air-conditioned, with shelves for 35,000 books, a multi-purpose room to seat 40-50 people, a children's department, magazine and browsing area, besides loan desk and librarian's office.

Overall cost of approximately \$90,000 plus, will include equipment such as durable, practical, tasteful furniture, always a costly item in any library to meet library standards will run approximately \$20,000.

The public must now raise approximately \$6,000 (a like sum having already been raised by clubs and organization and by private individuals). Also the library is depending on the Commissioners Court's appropriating from \$37,000 to \$40,000 from funds soon to be available from 1965 tax collections, a sum which would not otherwise be used for operating the county through 1966.

Bids are being received now for the construction, and will be opened Dec. 13th. The contract can not be let until the county has in its possession funds to match the promise of \$50,000 from the federal government. As a consequence, it is urgently requested that gifts be made now.

The board feels this is the opportunity for citizens to make gifts of lasting memorials, as one does to his church in stained glass windows, to deceased loved ones. As those working in behalf of the new library feel, a gift to the library is a gift that keeps on giving.

Gifts, which are deductible on income tax returns, should be mailed to Box 427, Loraine, or Box 206, Colorado City, made payable to Mitchell County Public Library.

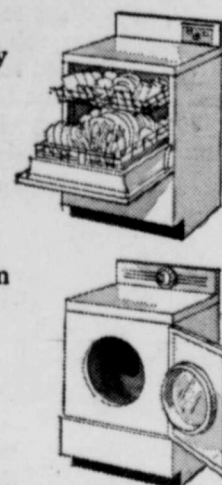
