## Lion's Club Hears Project Fund Reports At Meet

Ted Roark, secretary-treasurer (1966-67) of the Lions Club, made the following report of the Project Fund income and expenditures for the past year.

The account shows the many good works performed by the local Lions which go unacknowledged; projects completed without publicity by a very fine organization.

The income report reads as follows: talent show, \$192.27; broom sale, \$348.24; Aunt Jemima Pancake Jamboree, \$936.37; a total income of \$1,476.88.

Expenditures consisted of: eye glasses for underprivileged, \$23.60; tennis tables, for the Youth Center, \$305.84; custodian service-talent show, \$10; advertising tickets-talent show, \$40.30; folding chairs-Youth Center, \$100; Caravan Sales-products sold by Lions, \$270.83; Boy Scout Troop 155-10% of broom sale, \$18.44; State Comptroller sales tax on broom sale, \$6.26; North Texas Rehabilitation Center Telerama, \$25; Jamboree tickets and advertising, \$71.01; kitchen table services-Jamboree, \$47; miscellaneous supplies - Jamboree, \$10.59; food items, Jamboree, \$350.54; Girl Scout Neighborhood, \$50; American Legion-Boys State, \$69.20 and Hardin Cafeteria-meal tickets, \$27; a sum of \$1,425.61. ## Emergency Postal Rules Are In Effect During Railroad Strike

Effective at the beginning of the rail strike, all mailings other than first class, air mail, and air parcel post, destined for points more than 150 miles from Burk Burnett, Texas are unacceptable until the strike is over. Postmaster W. T. Zimmerman announced today.

"This announcement is in keeping with instructions received by me from Washington, that a limited, temporary suspension of service on all but first class and airmail will be invoked during the strike," the Postmaster said.

Emphasizing that the emergency suspension of service was based on the nationwide rail strike which went into effect at midnight Saturday July 15, Postmaster W. T. Zimmerman explained that alternative means of transportation would be utilized to the fullest possible extent to maintain first class and airmail service including air parcel post.

Second class magazines and newspapers, third class matter and fourth class parcel post packages for delivery beyond 150 miles from the point of mailing are included in the temporary suspension announced as part of the rational post office contingency plan prepared for the rail strike emergency.

The postmaster stressed that any emergency shipments, such as medicines, or other badly needed items, should be sent first class or airmail, rather than via parcel post, if destined for a point more than 150 miles from Burk Burnett. Perishable items, such as baby chicks, should not be mailed for the duration of the strike, he said.

He noted that Abilene, Dallas and Oklahoma City are among cities within the 150 mile zone of Burk Burnett which will continue to get full mail service from this post office.

According to the postmaster, planes, trucks, and buses are being pressed into service to handle first class and airmail on a regular service basis and to move all classes of mail within the 150 mile zone.

The Burk Burnett delegation was the second largest group of non-resident high school students at the Workshop.

All students attending the workshop are divided into six groups. Each group is organized as though it were a high school, with a principal, a student council and a set of problems to be solved.

Dan Schaffner, sponsor of the Burk Burnett group, acted as principal of one of these high schools. Mitchell and Todd were named as presidents, Ludeke, treasurer, and Miss Ladd, secretary of their respective Schools. Todd was also one of six nominees for outstanding student of the Workshop.

Principal consultant for the Workshop was Dr. George Mathis, Denver, Colorado, one of the leading authorities on student councils. He lectured each morning and also held an advanced training program for student council officers.

Effective 7:00 a.m., July 12, 1967, Bell Oil & Gas Company is increasing present price of crude oil five cent per barrel in the fields in which they are purchasing in Southern Oklahoma and north Texas. Bell officials say that their inventory has been substantially below desired level for some time and they have been unable to purchase any additional crude.

Bell Oil & Gas Company has approximately 600 miles of crude gathering system in Southern Oklahoma and Northern Texas and are presently purchasing approximately 20,000 barrels per day in this area.

## BURK BOARD BUYS TRUCK

Improvements and new equipment were approved for the school system, Monday at a regular meeting.

A new pickup truck was purchased from Mathis Chevrolet at the bid price of \$1,246, for the vocational agriculture department and a mower, \$335, from Central Seed and Feed.

Also approved was a contract with R. B. Swinford, for blacktopping the campus at Hardin Elementary School, at \$2,974.

Other action included authorization of alterations in the Sheppard - Burk Burnett School to centralize the library and approval of the transfer of \$1,200 to the athletic fund for expenses including coaches' school.

The employment of Judy L. Smiley, Maurine Tunnell, Dorothy Trunnipseed, Mary Kay Vaughan and Glen Veach was approved and resignations of Kay Carter, Frances Reppond, Kent Reppond, Selma Ryan, Brenda Vaughn, Essie West and Virginia Mundlin were accepted.

Dow Estes, tax assessor-collector, reported the collection of \$186,681 in current taxes and \$6,878 delinquent taxes for the period ending June 30.

## HIGHWAY BEAUTIFICATION PROJECT FOR 277 RECEIVES STATE DEPARTMENT'S OK

A Texas Highway Department beautification project will include a park and a roadside park along U.S. Highway 277 from the northern edge of Wichita Falls through Burk Burnett.

The decision was made after a delegation from Burk Burnett conferred with D. C. Greer, state highway engineer.

Greer told State Rep. Dave Allred, who had supported the Burk Burnett group's request for beautification, that the project may take some time because of planting seasons and growth.

The group which Greer termed "enthusiastic citizens from Burk Burnett," included Jim Frye, president of the Chamber of Commerce and a former mayor; Dub Zimmerman, Burk Burnett postmaster and chairman of the Chamber of Commerce's Tourist Committee; C. J. Lippard, a member of the Tourist Committee and a former mayor; and Joe Salter, immediate past president of the Chamber of Commerce. State Sen. Jack Hightower helped arrange for the group to see Greer and also supported their request.

Greer said funds for the project will come from federal money for beautification.

The office of the district highway engineer, L. B. Dean, said beautification will include the small park at the south end of the Red River Bridge on U.S. Highway 277. The triangular park is formed by the entrance and exit ramps on the limited access highway.

Beautification under the project will extend from the northern edge of Wichita Falls to

the Red River. It will also include planting shrubs and some trees.

In addition, plans call for two roadside parks about three miles south of Burk Burnett. The park on the west side of the highway is partially completed. Another is planned on the east side of the road, south of the park already started. In addition to shelters and tables and related items, comfort stations are also planned.

The Highway Department said the project will be completed as funds are made available over the next two years—with completion of the roadside parks probably requiring the longest time.

In planning the highway beautification, Highway Department planners will confer with local officials on some aspects, such as the park.

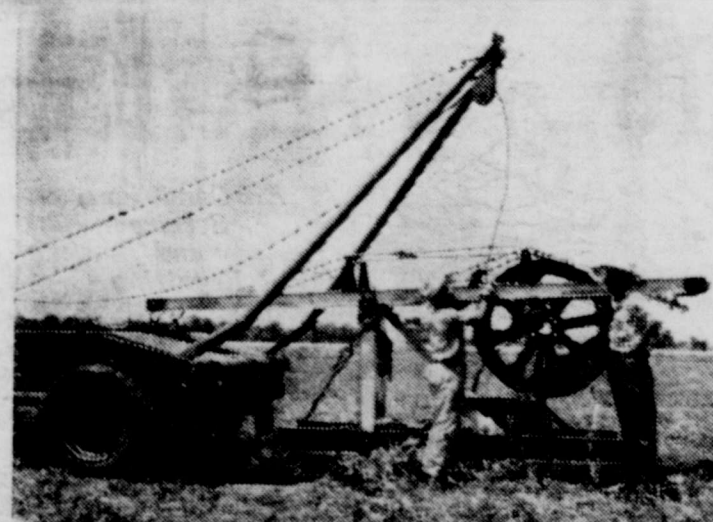
## Local Firemen At Randlett Blaze

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## LIFESAVING BLOOD

Twenty years ago, as anniversary articles recall, a French ship exploded causing America's greatest peacetime fire disaster at Texas City. Hospitals and community blood banks in many states rushed blood and plasma to the 3000 injured. As an example of how good can sometimes result from ill, the institutions involved later organized the American Association of Blood Banks with a view toward being better prepared for any future disasters. The Association, which now has 4,025 members in the 50 states and 25 foreign countries, maintains in Chicago a central file of rare blood donors. This file has saved the lives of many Americans and ill patients in other countries by finding rare matching blood when needed.

It has a system of regional laboratories for identifying rare blood types. It has established standards for blood banks and a voluntary inspection and accreditation system. Most important, it has organized a national clearing-house system for the exchange of blood and blood credits in which the Red Cross cooperates. This permits blood given locally to be credited to a patient in a distant city and enables thousands to save on medical expenses.

But, before blood can be used or rushed somewhere, somebody must give it. If you are between 18 and 59 and in good health, you can give a pint of blood regularly at your blood bank or collection center. Your donation of blood may help save a life—possibly your own.

### CONTROL OF THE CAPE

A beneficial by-product of the closing of the Suez Canal is a renewed awareness of the importance of the sea route around the Cape of Good Hope and of the Republic of South Africa which serves as the sentinel of the West at the southern tip of the continent. Less than a year ago, the U.N. glass palace, on New York's East River rang with the angry words of Afro-Asian delegates demanding a crackdown against South Africa and its friendly neighbor to the north, the new independent nation of Rhodesia. The Johnson administration, to the distress of Americans concerned with the strategic interests of the U.S., added its weight to pressure applied against the two progressive African states which are under European leadership.

Today, that same Afro-Asian majority in the United Nations is too busy railing at Israel to devote any attention to South Africa and Rhodesia. And both the United States and England are deeply concerned about the continuing flow of middle East oil, in which South Africa plays an important role which should not be forgotten a year or two hence.

No sooner had the Suez Canal been closed than oil tankers and merchantmen loading in the Middle East were diverted around the Cape of Good Hope. Immediately, 20 British tankers were scheduled to put into Cape Town, South Africa, for refueling and replenishing. This initial group of ships, however, was only the beginning of a vast movement of merchant vessels around the Cape, with hundreds scheduled to drop anchor in the South African ports of Durban, East London, Port Elizabeth, and Cape Town. Approximately 1,500 ships regularly use the Suez route, and now will be using the Cape Town route. Many of these ships will need fuel, stores and repairs at South African ports.

There is a lesson here that the Western maritime nations should never forget: namely that South Africa's harbors are vital to the free world in peace and war. Imagine the results if South Africa's ports were closed to Western tankers and

freighters! Many of the tankers employed in the Suez route are not equipped for the long voyage to England and Europe, without stopping en route.

And what would happen to those ships which, though capable of an uninterrupted journey, suffered mechanical breakdown? South Africa has the only major drydock on the African continent—a drydock large enough to accommodate an American cruiser or light aircraft carrier. Obviously, closure of South Africa's ports would be disaster for the West.

The liberals in power in Washington and London should have thought of this several years ago when they began their campaign of abuse against a loyal wartime ally. These liberals have attempted to promote revolutionary regimes throughout Southern Africa, thereby ignoring the strategic interest of the U.S. and England. If a Castro or Lumumba were in power in Pretoria, one can be sure that South Africa's ports would be closed in sympathy with the revolutionary Arab nations. Indeed suppose the South Africans, outraged at the abuse directed them, had a neutralist government on the lines of the DeGaulle govern-

ment in France. Even a mild policy of non-cooperation could have disastrous effect on the Western powers.

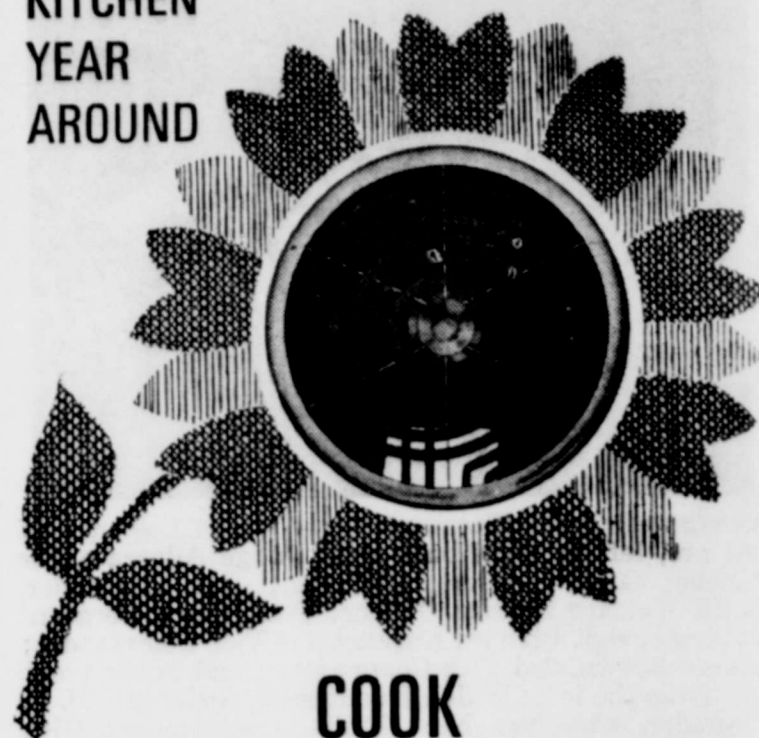
Without ready access to Middle East oil and without continuance of its other vast sea traffic, England would have an overnight fiscal crisis. Its solvency could disappear, and the United States suddenly would be confronted with a gigantic and enormously expensive financial rescue operation.

These realities concerning South Africa—and they apply generally to the strategically important inland country of Rhodesia (which is a barrier to revolutionary advance in Southern Central Africa), show up the folly of policies adopted in the past by the Johnson administration in the U.S. and the Wilson government in England. One is reminded of the incredibly foolish and offensive decision by the White House not to allow crewmen of the aircraft carrier Franklin D. Roosevelt, returning from the Vietnam war, to enjoy liberty in Cape Town.

Clearly, it is time that the Johnson administration make a public statement, repudiating the anti-South African policy which endangers the vital interests of the United States and other friendly maritime nations. Control of the Cape must remain in the hands of a stable, European-type government which will stand by the West in a time of crisis.

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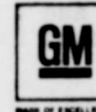
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## TELL ME WHY

## Mrs. Horst K. H. Heugle Is Busy Housewife And Coed

SHEPPARD AFB, Texas — Seeing Mrs. Horst K. H. Heugle, one would think of her as the typical housewife with a busy husband and growing son to care for.

Yet, to meet and talk with her, one soon finds her more than typically intelligent, bright, interesting and interested.

She does the usual cooking, washing and shopping, characteristic of wives. But, during her "off duty" hours in the

endless career of "wifery" she transforms from Mrs. Horst K. H. Heugle — homemaker, to Elisabeth Heugle — coed.

She came to the United States in 1960 after meeting and marrying Horst Heugle, now a technical sergeant assigned to the Medical Service School here. They are both native Germans.

Having the bare minimums of a high school education, she qualified for her diploma by taking the General Educational Development test and with some prodding from a profes-

sor friend, began studying French at Midwestern University.

In 1962, her studies were interrupted by the assignment of Sergeant Heugle to Wiesbaden AB, Germany. During their tour, Mrs. Heugle earned a few credits through the University of Maryland Overseas Extension Course program and taught German in her "spare time."

Sergeant Heugle was later selected through the United States Air Force in Europe Language Institute to live with a French family so he might learn the language and culture. There, Mrs. Heugle again added more credits to her education program.

In 1965, the Heugles returned to Sheppard and their adopted home of Wichita Falls. Sergeant Heugle had qualified to

attend Midwestern University through "Bootstrap" and they continued their studies together.

Sergeant Heugle graduated cum laude from Midwestern last June and is now working on his master's degree in government.

Mrs. Heugle graduates Saturday and will leave for France to attend the University of Grenoble until August. She graduates with a 2.62 grade-point average.

While taking classes at Midwestern, Mrs. Heugle also taught German and French at Burkburnett High School and German at the Base Education Office. Frank Ezell, base education officer, termed her assistance . . . outstanding.

Upon her return to the Unit-

ed States in August, Mrs. Heugle plans to attend the University of Oklahoma where she has been accepted as a graduate assistant.

Sergeant Heugle has been commended countless times for his outstanding achievements. He has been named NCO of the year, graduated from many military and civilian courses with honors, termed "an outstanding NCO in the top one per cent of enlisted medical personnel," and titled "a mature, highly motivated individual sincerely dedicated and loyal to the Air Force and its medical service."

Yet, in his modesty, Sergeant Heugle takes little credit and says his "wife-student" is his greatest inspiration. Mrs. Horst K. H. Heugle is truly the ideal Air Force wife.
