Rivercrest Rebelettes Capture District Title Again

Girls Win For 4th Year, Boys Look To Next Year

The Rivercrest Rebelettes have captured the district 20-AA title for the fourth consecutive year and earned the right to post-season play once again. But the Rebels with their third district loss, have slim hope of recapturing the district crown, but they are already looking to next year.

The Rebelettes were put to the test last Tuesday as they hosted the New Diana Eaglettes and had to fight off a last quarter rally by New Diana to gain the victory. The Rebelettes held a four point lead at the end of the first quarter and had increased their lead to 27-19 by halftime. As the final period began, the Rivercrest fems held a six point lead and the Eaglettes rallied and came

close to capturing the win, but the girls tightened and came out on top 53-51.

Veronica Howerton led scoring for the Rebel fems with 17 points. Freshman Carla Belcher had 12 and senior Jean Ann Norman added ten.

But the story changed as the Rebels and Eagles took the court. The Rebels, much too uptight and under pressure, did not play up to their full potential and found themselves down 17-5 at the end of the first quarter. The Eagles increased their lead to sixteen points by halftime. The Rebs did not give up though, but they could never catch back up and ended on the short end of a 62-45 final score.

Bradley Moore held top scorer honors with 14 points.

David Wisinger put in 13, and Stan Wood had ten.

The time was a little different Friday night as the Rivercrest cagers traveled to Harmony and all but demolished the Eagles.

The Rebelettes jumped out to a 16-6 lead at the end of the first quarter, and did nothing but widen the margin throughout the rest of the game. The final was 52-22 with the Rebelettes on top.

Veronica Howerton again led scoring with 14 points. Kristy Foxworthy and Nelda Anderson each added eight to that.

Then a changed Rebel team came into the gym. Playing without the pressure of the Tuesday before, and with all players healed from injuries and sickness, the Rebs were back to true form and showed it by crushing the

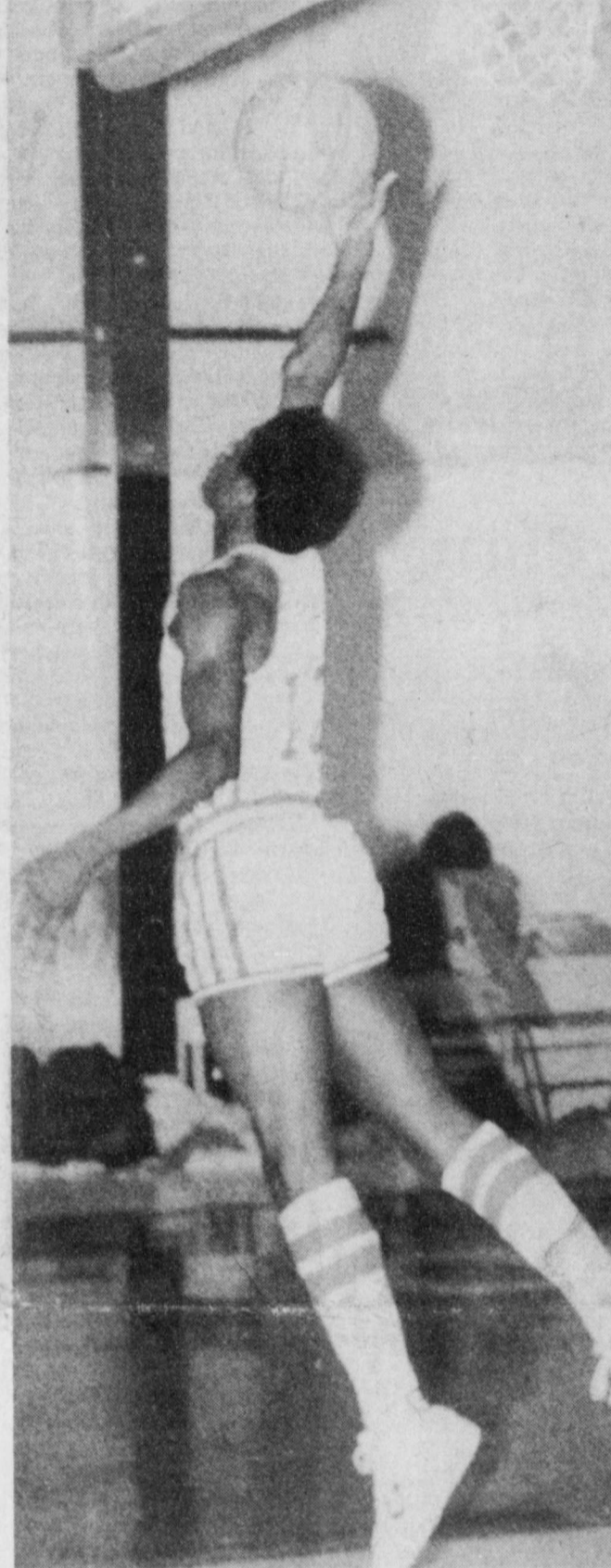
Eagles 91-49.

Bradley Moore led scoring with a career high 26 points. David Rozell netted ten and other scoring was evenly distributed.

The team also set a school record of 51 rebounds in one game.

Girls head coach Frank Stubblefield, boasting a 25-2 district mark, is preparing his young Rebelette team for post-season play. Stubblefield has decided not play any "warm up" games, but to work the girls out with practice only. The Rebelettes are to play Sabine's fems, winners of District 19-AA this coming Monday night, Feb. 22, in Gladewater at 7:30 p.m. The support of the communities and schools will be appreciated by the squad.

Boys coach Wake Wood is very proud of his Rebel team and praises their good attitudes. Wood is looking forward to next year as he will have eleven of his twelve varsity men back. The Rebs finish their season Friday night at Redwater.

Property Tax Exemption Forms Arriving By Mail

A special mailing to a large group of taxpayers is set by the Red River County Appraisal District which includes persons in the Talco-Bogata Consolidated School District.

According to Chief Appraiser Gary Lesniewski in Clarksville, all taxpayers who received a property tax exemption in 1981 from any of the 11 taxing units served by the district will be receiving a renewal form through the mails.

"The form taxpayers will be receiving should be completed as best as possible, signed and then simply returned by mail," Lesniewski explained. "This should help make it as easy as possible to renew the appropriate exemptions with out a personal visit to the appraisal district office here in Clarksville."

In addition, Lesniewski explained that those who have not previously qualified for any of the property tax exemptions may request an application form by mail or by calling the appraisal district office. As a further convenience, the forms are available at the Talco-Bogata Consolidated School District Tax Office at Rivercrest High School.

Lesniewski also explained that farm and ranch owners should be aware of the agriculture-use valuation program which will have a real impact on 1982 property taxes. The so-called "ag values" are traditionally substantially lower than the normal "market" values that all property normally is assessed at. In the past, low "market values" have negated the need for the ag-value program, but this

year's reappraisal in the Red River Appraisal District area has already resulted in widespread interest.

"Ag-values have resulted in 50, 75 and even 90 percent tax reductions from what farm and ranch normally would be assessed under a simple market value for the property," Lesniewski stressed. "Although the program may be new to this area, all rural property owners need to become familiar with it this year."

Ag-value applications again are available at the appraisal district office in Clarksville and at Rivercrest High School. The forms can be returned by mail or in person minimizing taxpayer inconvenience.

TABS Tests Scheduled

Talco-Bogata third, fifth and ninth graders are taking part in the statewide TABS (Texas Assessment of Basic Skills) tests on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of this week, according to Talco-Bogata TABS coordinator, Bonnie Huddleston.

The assessment plan is scheduled once each year under the requirement set forth by the Texas Legislature during its 1979 regular session.

Testing areas include basic skills in reading, writing, and math. Each of the tests requires a maximum of 40 to 60 minutes to complete.

Results of the tests will be released at the June meeting of the Board of Trustees, according to school officials. Individual student scores will be available only to the student, parents, and school personnel directly involved.

This will mark the third year that the assessment program has been administered in Texas schools.

Ambulance Has Increase In Calls

The Red River Ambulance Service has made a total of 322 calls for December of 1981 and January of 1982. One hundred and sixty seven calls were made in December and 155 in January. Sixty of those calls were made with the Bogata based ambulance in December and 54 in January.

This is a large increase over the number of calls made in the same months only a year ago. The total of calls made in December of 1980 and January of 1981 was 221, 101 less than this year.

The ambulance service is performing admirably, but is encountering some difficulties in obtaining subscriptions at a satisfactory rate, and rising costs.

It has been stated by many that if they need an ambulance they have insurance which will cover the costs, therefore they do not need a subscription. The main point being overlooked by that thinking is that without memberships there can be no ambulance service, with the end result being that there could be no ambulance available when needed.

An addition to the payroll in January of 1982 raised salaries, which are high by \$1,825 than in December of 1981.

Payroll taxes also went up by \$135.34.

In order to keep an ambulance operating efficiently a new motor had to be installed in January. This cost \$1,794.68. Ambulance maintenance is expensive, due to the extreme number of miles they incur.

Gas and oil bills from the city of Clarksville have not yet been received, so that comparison cannot be made at present.

Utilities have been lower

by around \$94, and office supplies and miscellaneous expenses have dropped. However, the drops on smaller items cannot compensate for the bigger increases.

Subscriptions are still needed if the service is to maintain its high level of efficiency.

Talco-Bogata School Board News

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools met in regular session at Rivercrest on Tuesday, February 9, 1982 at 7:00 p.m. with all members present.

Gary Lesniewski, Chief Appraiser of the Red River County Appraisal District, met with the Board to review the work of the Appraisal District and to answer questions of concern by Board members.

Approval was given to a resolution by the Board approving Section 33.07 of the Property Tax Code whereby a 15 percent penalty will be imposed on taxes that remain delinquent on July of the year in which they become delinquent to defray the cost of collection.

The 1982-83 school calendar was approved calling for the 1st student day to be on Thursday, August 19th. Holidays will be September 6th (Labor Day), November 25-26th (Thanksgiving), December 23-January 2 (Christmas) and March 28-April 4th (Spring Break-Easter). The last day of school will be on May 18th.

In matters related to personnel, the contracts of Tillman Hale, Rivercrest High School Principal, and Gerald Stegall, Bogata Elementary Principal, were extended for an additional year. Robert Giddens, Talco Elementary Principal, has stated his intentions to retire from the school district at the conclusion of his present contract at the end of the 1982-83 school year so no action was taken on this contract.

Information was presented to the Board concerning an amendment of the Texas Constitution which was approved by the voters of Texas and became effective January 1, 1982. Essentially, it provides authority for the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of a residence homestead. The Board will

take this matter under consideration.

In final matters, the various financial reports were approved and approval was given to a division order with Dorchester Gas Corporation for the school interest in the Talco-Bogata CISD-Calvary Baptist Church property in Talco.

The next regular meeting of the Board will be on Tuesday, March 9, 1982 at 7:00 p.m. at Rivercrest with the public cordially invited to attend.

Sweetheart Banquet Held

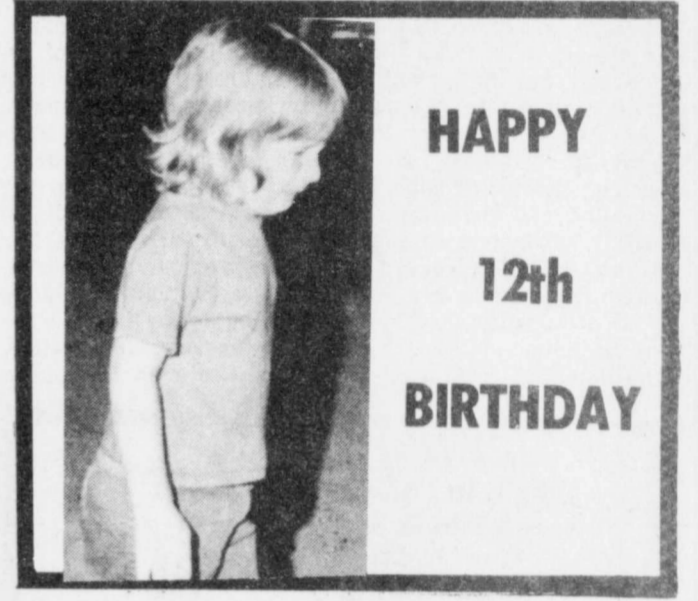
The annual Sweetheart Banquet was held in the Fellowship Hall of the First Baptist Church, Talco on Saturday night.

The hall was decorated in the red and white Valentine theme with red and white check table cloths.

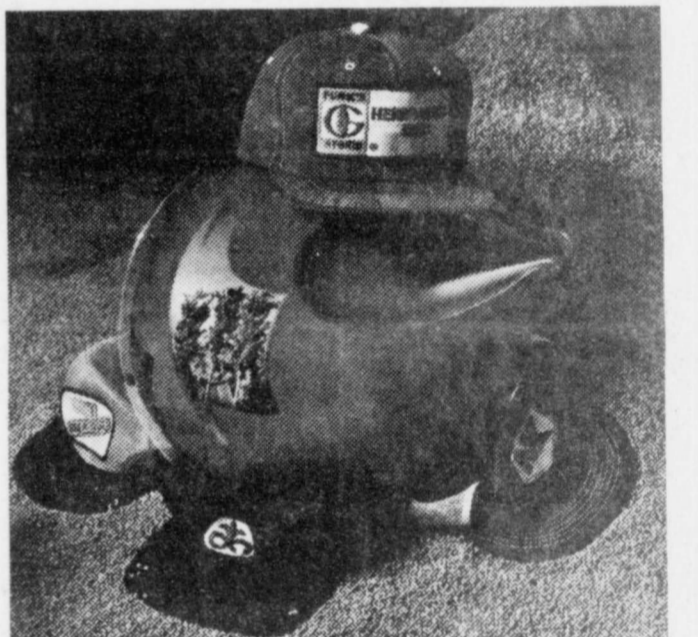
The young people selected Vickie Smith and Keith Logan as Valentine King and Queen.

PJC Sponsoring Cardio Pulmonary Course

A course in the techniques of cardio pulmonary resuscitation will be offered for the public on Monday, February 22, at Paris Junior College. The course will be taught from 6 to 10 p.m. in the Alford Center at PJC, and sponsors will be the college continuing education division and the American Heart Association, explained June Jones, director of continuing education at PJC. "Cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) is a method of restoring a heartbeat to victims of cardiac arrest," said Janet Phillips, registered nurse who will teach the course. "It is a combination of artificial respiration and chest compression," she added. Upon successful completion of the course, Heartsaver cards from the Heart Association will be present to participants. Fee for the four-hour course is \$5, and reservations should be made by paying the fee in the continuing education office, Alford Center, or mailing a check payable to PJC. More information may be obtained by calling 785-7661 extension 145. "Many lives have been saved by those who know CPR techniques and can perform them while professional help is on the way," the instructor noted. "You can be a life saver, and the life you save may be someone you love."

Savings Bonds Sale Announced

Sales of Series EE & HH United States Savings Bonds in Titus County were reported today by County Bond Chairman W.L. Means to be \$5,551. Sales for the first twelve-month period totaled \$74,857 for 52 percent of the 1981 goal of \$145,000. 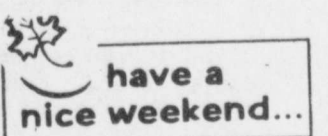

Improvements On Highways Scheduled

Approximately 10 miles of roadways in Franklin and Red River Counties should soon receive construction improvements after bids are accepted by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation in February. An 8.4 mile section of State Highway 37 between Hagansport and Bogata in Franklin and Red River

Counties is scheduled to be widened from the present 20-foot roadway to two, 12-foot traffic lanes with 10-foot paved shoulders. Richard L. Stauter of Paris is project engineer.

Another project in Franklin County calls for the construction of a new roadway, FM 3357, which will run from the section of FM 115 south of Lake Sandlin southwestward approximately two and one-quarter miles. Engineer for the project is Kirby Pickett, Sr. of Sulphur Springs.



Talco OES Holds Regular Meeting

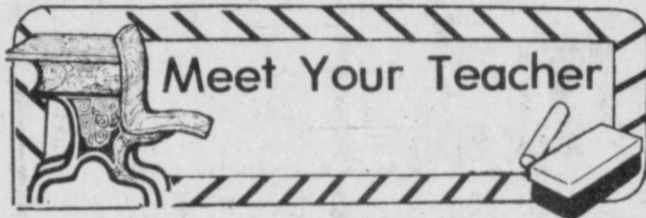
