

Phillips Is Chosen 'Coach Of The Year'

Barry George, senior, and Bryan Irons, sophomore, have been selected to coveted positions on the All South Plains Defense Team. Also cited for Lubbock Avalanche Journal's All South Plains laurels was head coach Lonnie Phillips who was named Coach of the Year.

A number of Longhorns were selected to All South Plains Honorable Mention Teams. Chosen to the offense team were lineman Dean Hill, senior; end, Irons; and back, George.

Cited for listing on the honorable mention defense team were linemen, Hill; Gary Jackson, junior; and Berto Minjares, junior. Lester Aven, junior, was named back for the team.

The AJ announcement, made

in Wednesday's morning paper, states: "Hart's Lonnie Phillips grabbed the coaching award in a close race with Seagraves' Jim Eddins. Hart was tabbed for a third-place finish in 3-A but went through the five loop games undefeated and posted a 9-2 regular season mark, bowing to New Deal in bidistrict." (Editor's note: The Horns actually went 9-1 in regular season, the second defeat of the year was the New Deal loss)

"Defensively," the article continues, in reporting the selection of players, "the team is star-studded from top to bottom. Welch (Bobby Welch of Seagraves) averaged some 13 tackles a game for the Eagles and his partner at end, Hart's Barry George, was

runner-up for player of the year honors.

"George was a terror on offense, gaining 953 yards and scoring nine TDs, but his forte was defense. He had 75 individual tackles, with 35 for losses, he sacked the QB 12 times; he blocked one pass and caused three fumbles plus recovered four bobbles and intercepted two passes.

"The linebacking corps of Kent Abbe (New Deal), Bryan Irons of Hart, Johnny Willis of Plains and Rex Paine of LCHS were also terrors.

"Irons, whose older brother Kent was the area's Player of the Year in 1974, was one of only sophomores on the team." (Editor's note: the word "two" preceding sophomores was deleted from the story.)
