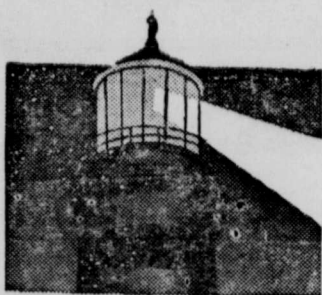

School Tax Bill Will Be Higher To Give Teachers Raise In Salary

The tax bill for property owners in the Loraine Independent School District, both real and personal, will be 12% higher this fall, according to a decision made by the Board of Trustees at the budget hearing Monday night.

The raise in taxes became necessary following the passing by the Texas Legislature of a bill allowing the salary of teachers to be raised \$810 per year.

The State will pay 80% of the salary raise but each school district will have to pay the 20% in order for teachers to get the raise.

Taxpayers will get official notice of the raise of 12% in taxes when they receive notice to appear before the equalization board on September 12 at the Lions Club building.

In answer to several inquiries made regarding Final Payments for compliance with the program. We have been advised that Final Payments will not be made until after September 1, 1961.

1962 WHEAT PROGRAM August 24, 1961 has been set as the date for the 1962 Wheat Referendum. The Congress is still working on this program and just as soon as the details are worked out you will be advised. You will also be advised relative to the polling places, etc.

COUNTY AND COMMUNITY COMMITTEE ELECTIONS

Once again as in past years we approach the time when county and community committeemen are elected. These men which you elect will direct the activities of the Farm Programs in this county beginning October 1, 1961. These committees are very important part in the overall administration of the program and we urge you to Vote for the persons of your choice and then support them in the work they do. More on this in a few days.

1961 COTTON HISTORY

Cotton producers who failed to plant 75% of their 1961 cotton allotment or do not receive planted history credit equal to 75% for releasing or receive credit under the Sell Back or Great Plains Program will lose part of the farm cotton history unless they were prevented from planting due to causes beyond their control and a written application is filed by September 15, 1961 requesting that full history be maintained on the farm setting out the reasons why 75% was not planted. Anyone who did not plant the required 75% should contact this office should he have any questions concerning his farm history credit.

Crop reporters are measuring crops now and have been since early July. If your farm has not been measured it will be in the near future. Please assist these reporters all you can and should you have any question on your notice of measured acres please contact this office.

Thereupon, the Mayor announced that the ordinance finally passed and adopted, and said ordinance as passed and adopted by the City Council and approved by the Mayor of the City of Loraine, Texas, is as follows:

AN ORDINANCE
Calling an election in the City of Loraine, Texas, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified resident property taxpayers voters of said City who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, a proposition concerning and relating to the issuance of \$20,000.00 street improvement bonds; providing for notice of said election; and enacting provisions incident and relating to the subject and purpose of this ordinance.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Loraine, Texas, deems it expedient to issue coupon bonds of said City in the principal amount of \$20,000.00 for the purpose of the construction and improvement of the streets of said City; and accordingly desires to submit to the qualified voters of the City, for their action thereupon, the proposition herein-after set forth for the grant of such authority as therein contained; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LORAIN, TEXAS:

I
That an election be held in the City of Loraine on August 28, 1961, which is not less than fifteen (15) or more than thirty (30) days from the date of this ordinance, at which election there shall be submitted to the qualified resident property taxpayers voters of the City of Loraine, Texas, who own taxable property in said City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon, the following proposition.

PROPOSITION
"Shall the City Council of the City of Loraine, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of the City of Loraine, Texas, in the principal amount of TWENTY THOUSAND (\$20,000.00) Dollars, maturing serially in such instalments as may be determined by the City Council of said City, the maximum maturity being not more than ten (10) years from their date, bearing interest at the rate of four (4%) per cent per annum, interest payable annually or semi-annually as may be determined by the City Council of said City, for the purpose of the construction and improvement of the streets of said City; and to levy an annual ad valorem tax on all taxable property in said City sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to create a sinking fund to pay the principal thereof as the same matures, as authorized by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, including Chapters 1 and 7, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended?"

II
That said election shall be held at the CITY HALL in the City of Loraine, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of said election:

and the boundaries of said City are hereby declared an election precinct for the purpose of holding said election.

That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the general laws of the State of Texas; and only those qualified resident property taxpayers voters of the City of Loraine, Texas, who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be allowed to vote at said election.

Farm Facts

About 51% of the 1959-60 cotton crop was harvested mechanically. An estimated 36% was machine picked and 15% was machine stripped. From the Carolinas to central Texas and in irrigated areas of the Far West, when cotton is harvested by hand, workers pick the fleece from the open bolls. The spindle-type picker duplicates this process as its revolving spindles engage and pull the cotton from the bolls. It does not pull leaves or unopened bolls. Picking, therefore, may be repeated as often as necessary. In cotton yielding 300 pounds of lint per acre, the average hand picker gathers about 20 pounds of seed cotton per hour. The one-row mechanical picker can pick almost 600 pounds per hour. It can do the work of from 30 to 40 hand pickers. Unlike the spindle-type picker, the stripper is a once-over machine. It breaks off the entire boll, simulating hand snapping, a practice followed in the semi-arid areas of Texas and Oklahoma. It can harvest more than a bale of cotton an hour — as much as 30 laborers hand snapping. Virtually none of the cotton crop was mechanically harvested prior to World War II; only 3% in 1947.

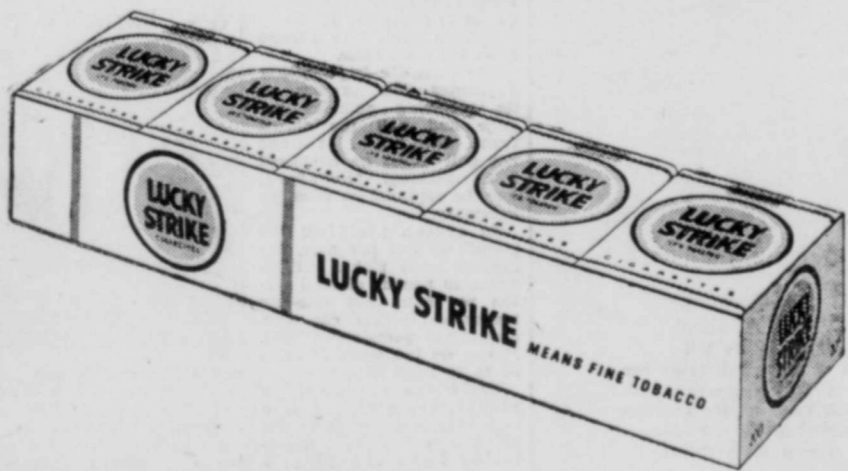
