

County Plans Heave-Ho For Engineer

Three members of the commissioners court agreed Tuesday afternoon to ask County Engineer Foster Dickey for his resignation. They asked County Judge, R. H. Weaver to inform Dickey of the decision, but the judge said he had been unable to contact the engineer up to a few minutes before noon today. Dickey was not in his office during the morning. Commissioners Earl Hull, Ralph Proctor and Arthur Stallings said this morning they agreed to request the resignation. Commissioner G. E. Gilliam said he opposed the action. All four were present for the discussion which led to the decision late Tuesday afternoon. Proctor, Hull and Stallings said they thought their action was in the best interest of the county, in view of divergent viewpoints between them and the engineer. Gilliam said he opposed the decision, although he "respected the views of the others and is willing to abide by the will of the majority." He said he believes it is essential that the county have an engineer. The commissioner stated that he believes Dickey "got off on the wrong foot" and that he should have been permitted to organize a road maintenance program "before being pushed into a paving program."

"I believe in giving the man a chance," he declared. Hull said his reason for joining in the decision was disorganization in the county road department. He said an example of this was an instance in which a maintainer was moved 60 miles to perform a small job while other equipment was available nearby. Stallings said he thinks there is too great a difference in the viewpoints of the commissioners court and the engineer. "I couldn't see any chance of any improvement," he added. Proctor said that he also believes too much disorganization exists within the road department. Dickey became the engineer for Howard County last Feb. 20. He had retired from the Army a few weeks earlier and lived at San Angelo.

He and some of the commissioners have frequently disagreed on operation of the county road department. Control of road equipment and whether it should be assigned primarily to construction or maintenance work has been the cause of much of the disagreement between Dickey and Hull and Proctor. Stallings, Gilliam and Weaver have sided with the engineer in several instances. In the most recent dispute, Stallings, joined Hull and Proctor in revising the engineer's proposed road budget for 1956. They whittled proposed outlays for equipment and salaries to more than double the amount to be set up for paving. Dickey called that action "a vote of lack of confidence."

All of the commissioners said this morning they favor continuing with the "unit system" in operation of the county road department. They said they also want to continue with an extensive paving program next year. A petition calling for an election on abolishing the mandatory unit system road law was presented to commissioners yesterday. Some of the petitioners said they had "a real grievance" although they weren't opposed to the unit system of county road work.

Former Taxman Sues U.S. In Whitewash Deal

WASHINGTON (AP)—A former Internal Revenue Service official is suing the government for \$36,823 in back pay, charging he was fired in 1953 for refusing to "whitewash" an unfavorable character report on a key figure in the tax collection service. The suit has been filed in the U.S. Court of Claims by Edward E. Hoppe, now a Dallas lawyer. Hoppe was formerly assistant commissioner of internal revenue. At the time of his dismissal he headed the service's inspection unit, set up to guard against corruption within the service. Hoppe said in his petition that his dismissal by Commissioner T. Coleman Andrews was approved by Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey and the Civil Service Commission and was "based on political considerations."

His lawyer, John P. Witsell, said Hoppe—a Republican-appointed veteran of 24 years in the service—was fired solely as "a matter of political expediency" because he refused to tone down "a critical adverse report on a new political appointee."

Witsell, in a telephone interview from Jefferson City, Mo., where he is vacationing, refused to name the "political appointee" but said that Hoppe will name him "when he takes the stand" in the law suit. The attorney said the appointee now holds a high post in the Internal Revenue Service. Andrews and other officials declined to comment on Hoppe's charges. The Justice Department, which is defending the suit, has until mid-October to file an answer.

The New York Herald Tribune broke the story of Hoppe's suit in a copyrighted Washington dispatch calling the affair "a major political scandal" which "will almost certainly produce repercussions from the White House."

Hoppe said Andrews and Deputy Commissioner O. Gordon Delk Jr. first tried to get him to tone down "derogatory information," he had turned up about the new appointee. Hoppe said that when he refused, the officials at first asked for his resignation and then, on Oct. 7, 1953, fired him. He contended this was a violation of the 1912 Lloyd-Lafollette Act which protects civil service employees from summary dismissal.

Witsell made available to the Herald Tribune a statement by Hoppe to the Civil Service Commission. In it Hoppe said Andrews told him he had to go because "I was a controversial figure because he said I had been named under the former administration."

'Red Plot' Is Blamed For Turk Outbreak

ISTANBUL, Turkey (AP)—Violent anti-Greek riots have swept over Istanbul and Izmir, Turkey's largest cities, causing millions of dollars worth of property damage. The government imposed martial law on both cities last night after a four-hour wave of destruction and yet uncounted casualties. It was able to lift the state of siege today, however. A communique issued in Ankara, the capital, said Istanbul and all of Turkey were "objects of a Communist plot and incitement."

It was the first outbreak here stemming from the dispute over the future of the strategic island of Cyprus, the British colony in the Mediterranean which once belonged to Turkey. Greece demands that the islanders be allowed to vote for union with Greece, but is opposed by Britain and Turkey. The Turkish government has declared that if Britain gives up Cyprus it should be returned to Turkey.

Turkish Foreign Minister Fatih Rostu Zorlu announced in London today that a nine-day conference of British, Turkish and Greek foreign ministers on this issue had ended without agreement.

The communique issued in Ankara implied that Red agents had inspired the mobs of young Turks last night, playing on their resentment of the Greek demands for Cyprus.

It expressed sorrow for the disorders and regret for the grave damage to shops, homes and other property owned by persons of Greek descent. It promised speedy compensation and added: "All necessary steps have been taken and will be taken to restore immediately public peace and order, violated by these incidents."

Istanbul and Izmir—formerly Smyrna—both originally were Greek cities and have retained large Greek populations throughout Turkish history.

Premier Adnan Menderes flew to Istanbul from Ankara last night to take charge personally of the restoration of order. Even before martial law was imposed, troops and marines, some in tanks, moved into the ancient metropolis on the Bosphorus to quell the thousands of rioters.

Cyprus itself was the scene of violence and armed police guarded the Greek consulate against any possible demonstrations by pro-Turkish elements there. A Turkish shepherd was shot to death while tending his flock near the village of Chatos.

Britain has moved to forestall any more serious outbreaks on Cyprus and has ordered more than 600 Royal Marine commandos to the island from Malta to reinforce its security force there.

In Athens, a Foreign Ministry spokesman said Greece had requested a meeting of the permanent NATO Council in Paris to consider the riots and that Deputy Foreign Minister Panayotis Kanelopoulos had delivered personally a Greek ultimatum to the Turkish government.

Greek authorities also ordered special security measures in Western Thrace and on the island of Rhodes, both of which have large Turkish minorities, to forestall any reprisals for the riots in Turkey.

There was no official estimate of casualties but the Istanbul newspaper Milliyet said more than 300 were injured. Newspapers estimated about 500 persons were arrested in Istanbul.

Disorders Feared On Disputed Isle

LONDON (AP)—Turkish Foreign Minister Fatih Rostu Zorlu said today British-Greek-Turkish talks on the future of the Mediterranean island of Cyprus have ended without agreement.

The Turkish statesman told newsmen foreign ministers of the three countries have arranged to meet tonight only to approve the terms of a final communique. The three-power talks opened nine days ago. Zorlu has arranged to fly back to Turkey tomorrow with his delegation.

He said there will be further discussions through diplomatic channels but there has been "formal agreement to disagree."

Apparent break-up of the talks came on the heels of rioting and violence in Istanbul and Izmir last night by mobs of young Turks inflamed by the Cyprus issue. The Turkish government blamed Communists for stirring up the rioting which caused millions in property damage.

Dispatches from Athens said the new developments had plunged Turkish-Greek relations to a new low.

Zorlu met newsmen after conferring two hours with British Foreign Secretary Harold Macmillan and Greek Foreign Minister Stephanos Stephanopoulos.

He said that during the conference Turkey and Britain were "in complete agreement" that Cyprus must continue under British rule and that the question of self-determination should be avoided at least for the immediate future.

He indicated that the conference broke up over failure to resolve a Greek demand that the 500,000 Cypriots should be given the right to choose their own political future within a reasonably short time.

The Athens government is convinced the Cypriots, mostly of Greek descent, would vote for the union with Greece.

The Turkish diplomat told reporters he had emphasized in the conference room that last night's wave of anti-Greek rioting in parts of Turkey are "the results of Greece putting forward unreasonable demands."

He said he had assured Stephanopoulos the Turkish government has taken measures to prevent a repetition of the demonstrations.

Until now Turkey has not authorized any mass meetings. The demonstrations and parades of last night also were unauthorized. The Turkish authorities had to resort to military force in order to control them. This was a natural reaction of the Turkish people to the damage done to the birthplace of Kemal Ataturk.

He referred to a dynamite attack on the Turkish consulate at Salonika near the birthplace of Ataturk, the father of modern-day Turkey.

It was clear that diplomats at the conference were concerned with the possibility that violence and rioting may sweep the disputed fortress island.

Britain, as the ruling power, already has moved to forestall an expected new wave of disturbances by the Union With Greece elements. The government has ordered ships of the amphibious warfare squadron to sail from Malta for Cyprus with more than 600 Royal Marine commandos aboard. These men are expected to arrive Friday to strengthen the island's security forces.

A light aircraft carrier in British home waters has been alerted to embark military equipment for Cyprus and is expected to leave Plymouth by the weekend.

Top U. S. Beauties Begin Competition

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP)—The nation's top chameleons today prepared for the hectic whirl of preliminary competitions that will lead one of them into the throne as the new Miss America.

With the pageant now officially under way after a glittering boardwalk parade, the 49 entries will be divided into three groups for tonight's first round contests in swim suit, evening gown and talent categories.

The preliminaries continue tomorrow and Friday nights, with the girls rotating in the three events.

On each of the three nights, judges will announce the winners in the swim suit and talent divisions but not the evening gown. The girls also will be judged for personality, but these results are kept secret.

Thousands of spectators lined this resort's famed boardwalk to watch the mammoth parade last night in which the Miss America 1956 hopefuls made their public debut.

Scores of illuminated floats and bands rolled along the two-mile line of march, but it was the girls that drew the attention. All but two of the contestants rode in convertibles. Miss Pennsylvania, Pam Ulrich of Sinking Spring, rode in a float entered by her home state. And Miss Texas, June Priehard of Seymour, who is a color model, paraded on a palomino mare.

June and Miss Idaho, Judy Voiten of Boise, sported cowgirl outfits while all the other girls wore evening gowns.

Marine Wins \$32,000 In Food, Cooking TV Quiz

NEW YORK (AP)—Marine Capt. Richard Sherrill McCutchen has won \$32,000 by dishing up some tasty dessert recipes out of his store of gastronomic knowledge.

Next Tuesday night he can try for the top prize on The \$64,000 Question, CBS television show.

Or he can call it quits and settle for the \$32,000 he reached last night in his fourth appearance on the show. If he tries again and fails, he'll get an expensive automobile as a consolation prize. No contestant yet has tried for the \$64,000.

McCutchen, who had chosen "food and cooking" as his question category at the start, last night described five desserts and gave the country of origin of each. They were: bombe, zabaglione, olykoek, flummery and pfeffernuss.

Another contestant last night—a widowed grandmother—advanced through the \$8,000 mark by telling the last four years the St. Louis Cardinals won the National League baseball pennant.

Mrs. Myrtle Power, 70, of Buford, Ga., and Long Island, answered 1942, 1943, 1944 and 1946. Mrs. Power, who said she has been watching the game since 1895, got the chance at \$3,000 by answering a series of questions in her chosen category, baseball.

Next Tuesday night she will return to the program to announce whether she will try then for the \$16,000 question.

Flummery, originally from Wales, a custard-like dessert with fruit juice.

Pfeffernuss, Germany, a traditional Christmas cookie, made of flour and spices.

'Square Deal' On Insurance

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Defense Department has been urged to make sure American GIs get a square deal in buying insurance.

Gladys Simmers Down As Hard Squalls Chase Coast Residents

BROWNSVILLE, Tex. (AP)—Violent squalls that temporarily chased scores from their homes in Corpus Christi and dumped up to 11 inches of rain on the Texas coast since midnight Monday were expected to die down today.

The squalls are a last reminder of tropical storm Gladys, which flurried with a flood-jittery Rio Grande Valley for three days.

The threat of flood still hung over South Texas, though. Alice, 40 miles from Corpus Christi, was keeping an apprehensive eye on San Diego Creek. Some 6 inches of rain has fallen in an almost constant, 30 hour rain there.

There is almost no drainage in this flatland area.

While more rain was predicted along the coast and at scattered points over the state, the bulk of Texas was generally dry with almost comfortable temperatures.

Rainfall for the 24-hour period ending at 6:30 a.m. was heaviest along the coast.

The Coast Guard hurried distressed or missing vessels off the lower end of Texas and rescued fishermen from lowlands.

Gladys was breaking up in Mexico's mountains, but heavy rains still threatened Tampico, an important port and petroleum center, with a major flood.

Meanwhile, weathermen watched a new era of potential danger. A rough of low pressure stretched from Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula across the Gulf toward Florida. It had not yet formed a storm center, but could prove to be the spawning-ground for another tropical storm.

The persons who fled their homes at Corpus Christi returned to their later last night. The squalls slackened for a time and allowed the storm sewers to drain off the down-pour. Up to almost 11 inches fell

In some Corpus Christi Bay areas. Winds reached 55 m.p.h. in gusts at Corpus Christi, but there was surprisingly little wind damage.

Many residents of the north beach community on Corpus Christi Bay left voluntarily as high seas hammered the area last night. Trailer homes were hitched to cars and pulled through flooded streets. Piers were washed away and there was considerable flooding, but no major damage.

At least two ships were in trouble as angry seas pounded the Texas beaches. The Mary Ellen, a 60-foot shrimp boat out of Aransas Pass, Tex., was feared smashed on Padre Island, two unidentified men were aboard her.

The Don II, an 85-foot craft with no other identification available, was missing in the long ground swells off Port Aransas.

Gladys slammed inland, into Mexico south of Texas Monday afternoon.

Roaring California Forest Fire Sweeps Down On Town

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—One of the worst forest fires in Pacific Coast history roared down on Yreka, a little northern California logging town today.

Other mammoth fires raced across tens of thousands of acres of parched timber and brush land elsewhere in California and neighboring Oregon.

Klamath National Forest officials alerted the 3,500 residents of Yreka to connect their garden hoses and stand by when a three-day-old fire exploded out of control and thundered through 11 miles of dense timberland to within four miles of town. By midnight 100,000 acres were ablaze.

Fire fighters frankly said they had no chance of checking the fire's onslaught. However, Klamath Forest Supervisor Russell Bowers said Yreka, some 20 miles south of the Oregon border, appeared to be in no immediate danger.

Huge clouds of smoke obscured the skies and a shower of dead cinders rained down on Yreka. Townsfolk hauled out hoses and prepared to douse their roofs if burning embers began cascading from the thundering fire.

More than 1,500 men battled the blaze and hundreds more, including 400 soldiers from the Presidio in San Francisco, were rushing to the scene.

But Bowers was pessimistic. He said the blaze had developed into a fire storm, the worst of all fire conditions, and that only two things would help—a change in weather conditions or the fire's running out of fuel. Forecasts predicted another day of hot, windy weather.

A fire storm is a maximum of burning conditions—extremely low humidity, dry fuel and adverse winds—which the Forest Service says it is powerless to combat.

An estimated 6,000 men battled other fires in the two states.

In Oregon, more than 210 separate fires blazed over national forests. Lightning touched off 25 new ones in the Fremont National Forest in south central Oregon.

The biggest blackened approximately 10,000 acres near Medford in southwestern Oregon, destroyed five homes and forced families out of the Toio district. Another swept over 2,000 acres of scattered pine and brush on the Ochoco National Forest, west of Seneca, where a fire fighter was trapped and killed Sunday. A third raced out of control over 1,000 acres on the Rogue River National Forest near Medford.

Several hundred miles to the south, a fast-moving brush fire destroyed three dwellings and halted four trains when it burned out 20 feet of ties on the Southern Pacific Railroad, 12 miles north of Santa Barbara on the southern California coast. The 3,000-acre blaze was touched off by an explosion in a lightning plant at a ranch.

One of the few notes of cheer came from Sequoia National Forest in east central California, where fire fighters reported they had checked a 15,000-acre blaze that once threatened the famed Grant Grove of giant Sequoia trees. One of the trees, the Gen. Grant, is believed to be the oldest tree in the world.

Integration Goes Smoothly But Most Districts Await Decision

Integration of white and Negro students went smoothly where it was tried, but most school districts Wednesday awaited the State Supreme Court's decision on how the step will affect state aid.

The Texas Supreme Court announced Tuesday it would cut short its summer vacation and meet Sept. 16 to hear the appeal of a suit that cleared the way for desegregated schools to collect state funds.

The court's ruling is expected to have a strong effect on how soon integration is accomplished across the state.

At Big Spring, Dist. Judge Charles Sullivan ruled recently that segregation portions of the state's school financing laws are void.

His ruling in effect, told school districts they could go ahead and

desegregate without losing state aid. The ruling was appealed. Originally, 64 Texas school districts said they would end segregation this fall. But some, including Waco and Kerrville, decided to wait and see what the Supreme Court had to say about the Big Spring appeal.

The U.S. Supreme Court has ordered an end to segregation in public schools, but left it up to local officials to work out the details.

A half-dozen Negro children were integrated smoothly in the lower grades Tuesday at Big Spring. Austin, where 14 Negroes are enrolled in formerly all-white high schools, also reported smooth sailing. One white youth transferred to a formerly all-Negro school.

Thirty-six Negro students at San Marcos ignored the Negro high school and enrolled at San Marcos High. The students were given

their choice. Two full-time and one part-time Negro teachers from the Negro high school, which was closed Tuesday, were transferred to the elementary schools, which are still segregated.

Principal Yancy Yarbrough said of the Negroes who enrolled in his school: "They are a well behaved and a nice group of young kids. I don't think we will have any difficulties."

More than 200 Negroes are enrolled in classes with whites in San Antonio and Bexar County schools. No trouble was reported.

Eight white children who reportedly registered at a former San Antonio Negro school did not attend classes Tuesday, however. E. E. Arnaud, superintendent of the district, said the parents may have kept the children out of George Washington Carver Elementary School because of the school's run-down condition.

Most Texas school districts, however, ordered studies made of the problem and postponed any action on desegregation. Many said they were awaiting final action on how integration would affect the state aid. Texas school laws concerning state assistance to school districts are based on segregated schools.

The Big Spring suit, brought by a Texas Citizens Council, tried to prevent integrated schools from receiving state aid. The council is one of several formed to fight desegregation.

East Texas and the Gulf Coast, which contain the bulk of the Negro population, have stood solidly for continued segregation.

Most Of South's Integrated Schools At Military Bases

Integrated public schools have begun the fall term in scattered sections of the South but most of those accepting both Negro and white pupils for the same classrooms are at government installations.

Three Florida Air Force bases have opened integrated schools. They are MacDill AFB at Tampa, Eglin AFB at Valparaiso and Tyndall AFB at Panama City. School principals said no count was made of the number of Negro pupils enrolling.

Oak Ridge, Tenn., where public schools are financed by the Atomic Energy Commission, opened the Oak Ridge High School and Rogersville Junior High to Negroes yesterday. About 45 Negroes registered at the high school in a total enrollment of about 1,700. Fifty Negroes entered the junior high school, which has a total of about 1,000 pupils.

The high schools were the first public schools in Tennessee to have mixed classes.

Principal T. H. Dunigan of Oak Ridge High named a Negro teacher to the faculty. He is Fred Brown, who will teach printing, home mechanics and plastics.

At Ashland, Ky., six Negro students enrolled at the junior college after the Board of Education announced Monday that the school would open to both races.

At Birmingham, Ala., Federal Judge H. H. Groves granted the University of Alabama a four-month stay of a court order to

accept Negro students.

Several Texas communities began integrated schools without incident yesterday. A half dozen Negro students enrolled in lower grades of former all-white schools at Big Spring, and 14 Negroes at Austin.

Nearly 200 Negroes enrolled in integrated schools at Bexar County, where the county seat is San Antonio.

Soviets Ready Antarctic Trip

LONDON (AP)—Moscow radio said today a Soviet scientific expedition made up of two ships and several planes will leave in November for a two-year stay in the antarctic.

The broadcast said the expedition will set up three bases, one in the vicinity of Knox Land, another near the South Magnetic Pole and the third in the central polar region.

The expedition will be part of a preliminary program to prepare for more extensive exploration during the International Geophysical Year, 1957-58.

The broadcast said it "will co-operate with expeditions outfitted by the U. S. A. and other countries."

More Greenlease Money Shows Up

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—A \$20 bill from the \$300,000 ransom money in the Bobby Greenlease kidnap-murder has been found in Florida.

Charles E. Weeks, special agent in charge of the Miami FBI office, said last night the bill was discovered at the Jacksonville branch of the Federal Reserve Bank and was sent there by the Florida National Bank & Trust Co. of Miami.

Several other bills from the missing ransom money have been found recently in the Midwest.

Carl Austin Hall and Mrs. Bonnie Brown Heady were convicted and executed for the kidnap-slaying of the 6-year-old Greenlease child in 1953. They got \$300,000 ransom money but only \$300,000 of it was found.

Chances Better If You Hit The Tree

DETROIT (AP)—Your chances of surviving an auto accident are somewhat better in a head-on collision with another moving vehicle than if you crash, at the same speed, into a tree or bridge abutment.

Traffic safety specialists here for a two-day Ford-sponsored national safety forum and crash demonstration say this has been established by scientific research. They explain that two colliding cars would mesh each other, each absorbing and dissipating some of the impact energy.

Defense Cut Studied

WASHINGTON (AP)—Military planners reportedly are studying the possibility of cutting another billion dollars from planned defense spending to help balance the government's budget by next June 30.

AEC Permits First Inspection Of Testing Base

BRAWLEY, Calif. (AP)—The Atomic Energy Commission has permitted an inspection by newsmen of its once-secret testing base on the shore of the Salton Sea.

The \$15-million-dollar base, located 37 miles northwest of here, tests the falling characteristics of various types of atomic bombs.

No live nuclear weapons are used.

Planes from Kirtland Air Force Base at Albuquerque, N.M., drop dummy bombs on the target area, which is in the water.

Some of the drops are made from altitudes as high as seven miles and ground instruments determine the fall, trajectory and impact of the bomb.

The base comprises 81 square miles, two thirds of which is water. About 100 persons are employed there.

Quick Trial Expected For 2 Whites In Negro's Death

SUMNER, Miss. (AP)—Two white men who pleaded innocent to the kidnap-murder of a 14-year-old Chicago Negro were expected to go on trial in the next three weeks.

The men, Roy Bryant, 24, and his half-brother J. W. Milam, 35, were indicted by an all-white grand jury yesterday and entered their innocent pleas shortly afterwards.

They were charged with kidnapping and murdering Emmett Louis Till after Till allegedly whistled at Bryant's wife in their country store in the Money community.

Circuit Judge Curtis Swango Jr. said he would set the trial date tomorrow and Sheriff H. C. Strider said, "We expect to try them in this term of court." The three-week term began Monday.

Because of the early trial, Bryant and Milam did not seek bond.

They were taken to the Tallahatchie County Jail in nearby Charleston.

If convicted, they face a possible death sentence on the murder charge. The minimum sentence is life imprisonment.

In Chicago, NAACP attorney William Huff said he would file a \$100,000 damage suit against Bryant and Milam "unless the men are given death in the gas chamber."

Till's body was found in the Tallahatchie River last Wednesday. He had been shot. He was visiting his uncle for a two-week vacation. Bryant and Milam admitted taking the boy from his uncle's home but said they freed him unharmed.

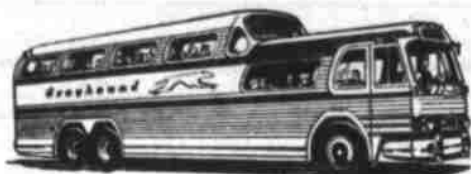

The second presentation of the Big Spring Concert Association will be in January, with the showing of the comedy, "Pygmalion," by the late George Bernard Shaw. To be given by The Dublin Players, it is the modern version of the Greek legend of the sculptor who fell in love with the statue that he had made of a beautiful woman.

It would be hard for the Greeks to recognize their story, since Shaw gave it a setting in London and made his main characters a professor and a Cockney flower girl. In teaching the girl manners, correct speech and the right way of dressing, the professor creates many problems for himself.

New Blood Type Makes Paternity Tests Easier

EAST LANSING, Mich. (U-P)—Paternity tests can be made much more accurate through discovery of an entirely new kind of blood type, two Canadian scientists reported today.

They find your blood has a "protein type," in addition to the usual A, B, AB or O type of blood. Your A-B-O blood type is governed by the kind of red blood cells you have inherited.

The scientists find you also inherit one of three types of particular proteins, never before detected, which float in the serum or liquid part of your blood.

Your protein type apparently is not connected with your red cell or A-B-O type.

Thus if both your parents had A type red cells you are also an A type. But if your parents' protein types differed, you inherited a different kind of protein type than they had although all three of you have A type blood.

Inheritance of the protein type seems to follow exactly the same laws of genetics as does inheritance of red cell types, said Dr. Norma Ford Walker, geneticist, and Dr. Oliver Smithies, biochemist, of the University of Toronto.

Paternity tests are based on analyzing the red cell blood types of a man and woman and then seeing whether the child could be their offspring.

These tests can only disprove that one individual man could not be the father of a child by one individual woman. They cannot prove he is not the father if the child happens to have a blood type which could have resulted from the union of a different man and a woman with those same blood types.

What the protein type tests can do is to refine the question further. If the child's protein type could not have resulted from the combination of the man and woman's protein types, it would be evidence that he was not the indicated father.

68 Escape Death In Crash Of Transport

ALBUQUERQUE (U-P)—Sixty-eight men miraculously escaped death yesterday in the white-hot pyre of a four-engine C124 Globemaster which crashed on takeoff during a dust storm. One man was killed.

One of the 68 was reported in serious condition at the Sandia Base Hospital. Three others were released after treatment.

The huge Air Force transport, from Biggs Air Force Base, El Paso, went almost the full length of the runway at Kirtland Air Force Base on the last leg of a "restricted mission" to March Air Force Base, Calif. It cleared the ground but then hit again and skidded several hundred feet before pancaking on a shoulder of the runway.

Earlier in the day, a C119 Flying Boxcar on its way to Kirtland AFB crashed soon after leaving England Air Force Base, La. Four men were killed in the crash and two injured. The plane was carrying classified cargo.

Cause of yesterday's crash was unknown. An Air Force board will investigate.

The aircraft rose a few feet in the air, dragged a wingtip and crashed, "an unidentified eyewitness told the public information officer. "Visibility was restricted by dust at the time of the crash. The plane burst into flames upon impact."

One fireman, as he sprayed chemical foam on the plane, said: "It was a miracle anyone got out of there."

Officials at the base said the alert crew had all hatches open within one minute after the plane crashed. Intense heat prevented rescue crews from reaching the lone victim, whose name was withheld.

The seriously injured man, one of the 13 crewmen was A. J. C. Fred W. Stephens, 22, New Philadelphia, Ohio.

Egypt Tells Story Of Commando Raids

CAIRO (U-P)—The tightly censored Egyptian press reported yesterday all Egyptian commandos had returned to Cairo after a week of "defying death each minute" in raids into Israel.

Reports from Israel last week said commandos penetrated 3 miles into Israeli territory, blowing up an Israeli radio station 10 miles from Tel Aviv and killing seven Israelis in terror raids.

1956 Landslide Predicted By GOP Chieftain

WASHINGTON (U-P)—National Chairman Leonard W. Hall predicted today a "landslide victory" for the Republicans in 1956. But Senate and House campaign committee heads said it will not be easy for the GOP to win control of Congress.

Hall said in a talk prepared for the opening session of a campaign school for Republican state chairmen that if the GOP can get its machinery operating effectively at the precinct level "we can look forward to a victory of landslide proportions in 1956, not only for the presidency but in recapturing control of both houses."

Sen. Goldwater (R-Ariz.) and Rep. Richard M. Simpson (R-Pa.), chairmen of the party's Senate and House campaign committees agreed in other prepared talks that control of Congress can be won but said it will require hard work.

"Today our Republican party has great assets," Hall said. "We have the magnificent and dedicated leadership of President Eisenhower and the rest of the team which has made good government the rule rather than the exception in America for the past three years."

He spoke also of "the greatest prosperity this nation has ever known," and said it has been achieved "while the country has been at peace."

While Hall said nothing about the possibility that President Eisenhower will run again, many of the state chairmen made it clear they feel the President's presence on the 1956 ticket is essential to victory.

The chairmen will fly to Denver, Colo., at the close of their classes Friday for a Saturday morning breakfast discussion of campaign plans with Eisenhower.

Some GOP leaders said they think the presidential invitation implies that Eisenhower intends to seek another term.

As far as the battle for control of the Senate is concerned, Goldwater said, "We start out... with the cards stacked in our disadvantage." He said this was true because 5 of the 15 Democratic seats at stake next year are in the South while the Republicans can count as "sure" only a "very few" of their 17 seats to be contested.

Goldwater said, however, that "Republican prospects have definitely improved since the 1954 election" when Democrats wrested control of both houses from the GOP.

To help in House contests, Simpson announced a series of meetings at "neighborhood levels" would be held in 94 congressional districts in 29 states where the victor's margin in 1954 was 5 per cent of the vote or less.

Oil Well Still Produces, And So Does Portion Of Old Ranch

A well which Col. C. C. Slaughter dug on his famous Long S Ranch early this century still is an important source of water in eastern Martin County.

It supplies the farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Castle, 14 miles west of Big Spring and just off the Andrews Highway. The place was the Herald's "Mystery Farm" last week. It is owned by Mrs. Joe R. Phillips of Big Spring.

The old well, dug in 1903, still has an early-day windmill standing above it, but rural electrification has turned the mill into little more than a landmark. Col. Slaughter's well now is equipped with an electric pressure pump which sends water right into the Castle home.

Running water is just one of the conveniences to be found in the modern farm home. The Castles also have electricity, gas and telephone service any time they want it.

The two-section farm was chopped off the old Slaughter spread in about 1910. The names of its purchasers have been forgotten by the present owner, but they sold the place to Witt Hines of Mitchell County in about 1930. Hines sold the ranch to B. F. White of Stanton, former Martin County Judge, in about 1936.

Mr. and Mrs. Joe R. Phillips

bought the place from Judge White in 1941. They completely rebuilt the home and outbuildings before moving on the place on October 13, 1941. The rock house and garage and the new barns the Phillips erected make up the present farm headquarters.

Mr. and Mrs. Phillips operated the place as a ranch until his death on Dec. 11, 1947. Mrs. Phillips then leased the farm to the Castles and moved to her home in Big Spring. She now resides at 803 W. 16th.

Mr. Phillips became well-known in this area for the Hereford cattle he raised on the place. Ranching was the fulfillment of dreams of "retirement." Before purchasing the farm, he worked as chief engineer for the Crawford Hotel in Big Spring for 12 years.

A son of the couple, Capt. James D. Phillips, now lives in Fort Worth and works as a pilot for Delta Air Lines on a flight from Fort Worth to Atlanta, Ga.

Mr. and Mrs. Castle have lived in Howard and Martin counties for more than 40 years. Prior to moving to the Phillips place, they had a farm in the Brown community near Knott. They also own a 16-acre place in the Grady community of Martin County, which is farmed by Floyd Martin. Martin

grew up in the Castle home, following the death of his mother. The couple also raised another boy, Mrs. Castle's son, Hughey Warner of Sweetwater.

Crops are looking better on the Castles' farm this year than in several seasons. They made only a fair crop last year the first of any kind in four years.

Mr. and Mrs. Castle have around 45 acres of cotton this year. The remainder of their 135 cultivated acres is in feed. They also operate a half section of farmland adjoining the Phillips place.

Some of the best rains in this area have fallen on the Castles' land. Two rains of three inches were gauged, along with smaller amounts.

The couple raised some cattle prior to the drought of the past few years, but dry weather forced them to sell all their stock. With grass returning this year, Castle has pastured stock for others, but hasn't started rebuilding a herd of his own.

Mr. and Mrs. Castle are members of the Church of God, 10th and Main, in Big Spring. He is a veteran of World War I.

Mrs. Phillips is a member of the West Side Baptist Church and also is active in the Rebecca Lodge here.

Negro Couple To Move Into White Section

SOUTHERN PINES, N. C. (U)—A Negro couple from New York state will move into their house in an all-white section of this resort town after Sept. 15, provided no one has offered them \$20,000 for the home by that date.

Mr. and Mrs. Martin L. White, who recently bought the home for a sum believed to be about \$12,000, agreed to the option yesterday. Lawyer W. D. Sabiston of nearby Carthage said details of the plan were worked out at a meeting with Henry L. Graves, who developed the Kenwood section where the house is located.

The Whites, formerly of Jamaica, N. Y., purchased the house from Mrs. Louise Way Spence, who said she had told Graves of the sale beforehand.

Sabiston said the Whites had received threatening telephone calls, and that their attitude was that "if the neighbors object so strongly to their presence, then they (the neighbors)—or someone—should be willing to pay."

TWO FOR ONE Tax Exemptions To Both Child, Parent

Did your son or daughter work during the summer vacation? Regardless of how much the child earned in the summer, you can still claim him as an income tax exemption, according to Ben Hawkins, chief administrative officer in charge of the local Internal Revenue Service office. That is, he added, provided you furnish over half the total cost of the child's support for the year.

Also, Hawkins said, the child is entitled to claim himself as an exemption on his own personal tax return, if he earns less than \$600. He will probably get a refund.

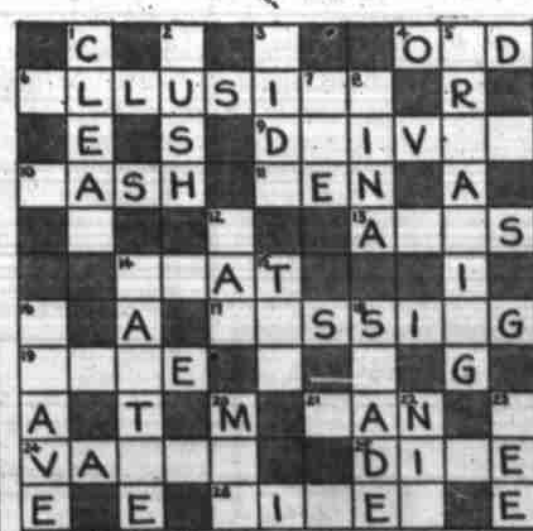

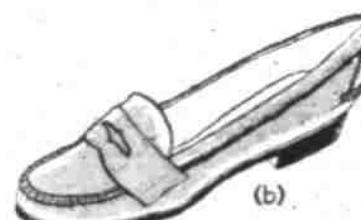
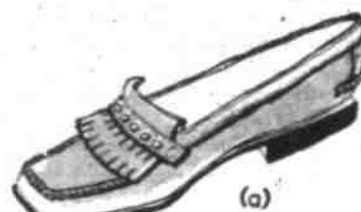

Mystery 'American' Claims He's German

BERLIN (AP) — The mystery "American" the Russians freed Monday now claims he's a German. U.S. officials say they're not convinced of that story either.

The Soviets released the man as Charles Frederick Hopkins, an American civilian, along with two soldiers who had been prisoners of the Reds for seven years. The civilian said then he was from New York City.

Last night, after extended questioning by U.S. intelligence officers, the Army command in Berlin said in a statement Hopkins now claimed to be Klaus Frederick Glaubitz, a 27-year-old German national who had been in Soviet hands since 1947.

"U.S. authorities are continuing to check his story and status," the announcement added. He is still being held incommunicado.

American officers commented that the man spoke excellent English in a manner not characteristic of Germans. They said he obviously is older than 27 and that his story of capture by the Russians was vague.

One source said he thought the man still might turn out to be an

American, perhaps one who is wanted by police in the United States.

The two soldiers, Pvt. Wilfred C. Comish, Amesbury, Mass., and Pvt. Michael Feingersch, alias Murray Fields, Jamaica, N.Y., are being held incommunicado in an Army hospital while getting medical checkups. They disappeared from their units in Western Europe in 1948 and the Army is investigating whether to court-martial them.

Chiang Tells Of Anti-Red 'Holy War'

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — President Chiang Kai-shek told army cadets in a commencement day speech yesterday that they must be ready to sacrifice their lives in the "sacred war against the Chinese Communists and Soviet Russia."

Among those who heard the generalissimo's exhortation was his 15-year-old grandson Chiang Hsiawen, who has just begun his four-year training course.

Scottish Springs Dry Up, Whisky Production Drops

GLASGOW, Scotland (AP) — Thorium, zinnwaldite, glauconite and biotite, plus amphibole, pyroxene, uranium, a dash of sphene — and you're off to a running start on a batch of Scotch whisky.

Trouble is, a spokesman for the Scotch Whisky Assn. said yesterday, these minerals are found in just the right amounts only in brooks which run through the red granite formations of the Scottish highlands.

And a drought has dried up the brooks, forcing the distilleries into idleness.

"The special quality of this water," a spokesman for the association said, "is the whole secret of Scotch whisky. Analyze it and reproduce it chemically? Lawks, mon! That's been tried."

The distilleries had planned to complete their 1955-56 output by early next spring. The way things look now, there may be a delay of months.

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — Maj. Gen. Hunter Harris Jr., deputy chief of operations of the U. S. Far East Air Force, today inspected bases of U. S. 18th fighter-bomber wing in Formosa.

Abortion Drug Clue In Death Of Heiress

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — A drug containing an herb sometimes used in abortions was introduced into the body of wealthy Mrs. Doris Silver Oestreicher an hour or two before her death, according to Dist. Atty. Samuel Dash.

And since a criminal abortion caused the young food chain heiress' death, Dash said yesterday, "there has to be an arrest." But he indicated the arrest might not come soon. It will not be made until his office has sufficient evidence to go into court, he said.

An inquest last Friday disclosed Mrs. Oestreicher died from an attempted criminal abortion in which a drug was administered professionally "by a person or persons unknown."

The girl, who eloped June 24 with motorcycle policeman Earl M. Oestreicher of Miami Beach, Fla., died Aug. 24 in Philadelphia a few days before her 23rd birthday. She had returned from Miami Beach without her husband 10 days before.

Dash said yesterday pathologists found that the drug administered to Mrs. Oestreicher was an oily compound "just loaded" with small hard pieces of bark or root.

The bark, Dash said, is of a type

used sometimes under controlled conditions to induce abortion. It is known as a powerful irritant and its function is to produce strong muscular contractions, he said.

Singapore Visitors Find Going Rough

SINGAPORE (AP) — Things got tougher than ever today for visitors to Singapore.

Workers at a big steam laundry serving Singapore's main hotels, airlines, shipping companies and hospitals went on strike because a woman union committee member was dismissed. Tens of thousands of articles awaited cleaning when the laundry shut down.

A strike of 1,000 employees at five leading hotels continued with the managements firm in their refusal to grant wage increase demands. The hotel guests are waiting on themselves.
