YOU WILL WANT to tip your hat to Mrs. Peggy Gallagher, of the secretary at the Chamber of Commerce. She is pioneering a new industry for the Cisco area — the production of eggs in the new age-Hen program.

Mr. C. W. Henry, whose company has pioneered the new idea of egg production, took us out to Mrs. Gallagher's place just east of town Friday. The last of 504 eggs were being put into their cages.

Mrs. Gallagher erected a building, 24 feet by 80 feet, for the hens. It has a dirt floor, open sides and an aluminum roof built for proper ventilation. The hen cages are in long double rows. A water trough runs down between each double row of cages, enabling the hens to drink when they like. They are fed in special troughs on the front side of the cages.

Eggs roll out of the cages in front and under the feed troughs. Mrs. Gallagher's hens started laying in Thursday and they got three eggs. Friday, they got 30 more. Eventually, they'll get 100 per cent egg production from the flock.

It costs about \$5.50 per hen to get into the business, and that is for everything — building, cages and hens. A 500-hen project costs about \$2,750. Profits from egg sales run between \$4.50 and \$5 per hen per year, enabling you to pay for your project within 18 months.

The eggs will be marketed through local grocery stores in special cartons.

Norman Gallagher, son of Mrs. Gallagher, was in charge of the operation when we went out to look.

Understand there are several other local residents interested in the cage-hen program.

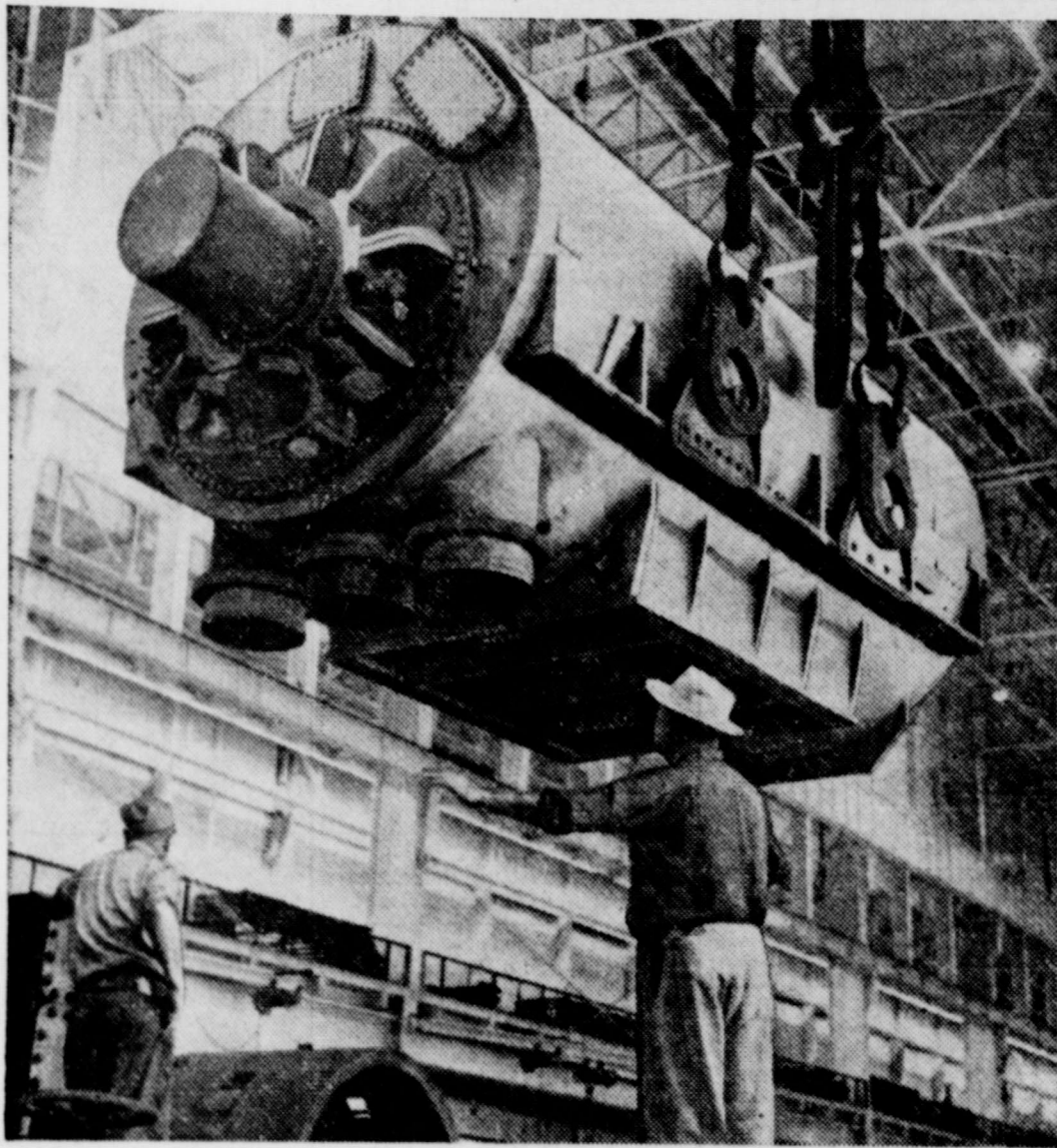

Social Security Man Will Be Here For Conferences

E. Glen McNatt, representative of the Social Security Administration office in Abilene, will be at the Chamber of Commerce office in Cisco at 2 p. m. on Wednesday, October 28. Persons wishing assistance in connection with applications for retirement payments or applications for survivors' payments, should call at that time.

His next visit will be at the same time on November 4. In the past the visits have been made on Thursdays, but beginning with this month, the representative will be here on Wednesdays.

"The importance of properly using one's social security card can hardly be overstressed," Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene office said in a statement made today. "The omission of even a single wage report could conceivably lead to the loss of thousands of dollars in old-age and survivors insurance benefits to the family of a worker who died," he explained.

"Social security records, which are kept by name and number, not only are used to determine how much will be paid, but whether benefits can be paid at all. Consequently, part-time workers or those whose work is irregular may barely meet the minimum requirements even when all wages are properly recorded. Omission of one or two wage items could easily result in ineligibility," Fisher said.

Every worker can guard against this happening by making sure that his social security number has been entered correctly on his employer's records. Lost cards can be replaced easily by the local office on request. Application forms to get either new or duplicate social security cards can be obtained from any social security office, any post office or State employment office. The social security office will also provide a free post card form to be used in getting a statement of wages credited to the worker's social security account.

Workers Asked To Complete Canvass

Number Of Truck Law Violations Up For Last Year

AUSTIN, Oct. 15. — Truckers arrested last year for highway law violations jumped to more than 23,000, according to the annual report released this week by Kent Odom, Chief of the License and Weight Division of the Department of Public Safety.

The report for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1953, shows truck law violators paid \$516,842.00 in fines. This is an increase of more than \$52,000.00 over the previous year. These fines were paid into the road and bridge funds of the county in which the truck operator was arrested.

A sharp increase in the number of truckers arrested is shown by the report. The 23,319 arrested last year exceeded the previous year by more than 2,200. The offenses consisted principally of operating overloaded trucks, failure to pay sufficient registration fees and operating faulty and unsafe equipment upon the highways of the State.

Of the total fines and additional registration fees of \$1,366,734.00 collected by the counties in Texas as a result of the increased law violations, more than \$849,000.00 was for the payment of additional registration fees.

When a truck is apprehended upon the highways with a gross weight in excess of the amount for which it is registered, the law requires that the operator must pay the additional amount of the license fee to the county tax collector.

Major Odom's report covers the activities of only the 65 men in the Department of Public Safety who are charged with the duty of protecting the 44,179 miles of the State highway system from unlawful and unwarranted abuses. Under Texas laws, sheriffs and constables are not permitted to stop or arrest the driver of an overloaded truck.

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COMMUNITY COLLEGES

Vernon A. McGee, director of the Legislative Budget Board, tossed a challenge to community college administrators during a meeting at Texas A. and M. College which had many of them re-examining future plans for their schools. Speaking during the recent 10th Annual Junior College Conference, he said, "for too long the curricula of community colleges have been too much under the domination and influence of state universities and other large institutions of learning."

"Those curricula have been too much a replica of the first two years in a senior college. Let's stop imitating. Let's build more educational programs that meet the realistic and functional needs of students, whether they be young people or adults."

McGee's talk, he said, was not meant to say that preparation of students for entry into four-year colleges was not a proper function of the community college — but that it was not the only function of those colleges.

Citing statistics offered by the professions themselves, he said that even the medical profession has become so stratified that it needs many persons other than physicians, surgeons, and psychiatrists. Those people do not need a degree from a regular, four-year or six-year college — but do need technical training beyond the high-school level.

Other professions bear out the argument, he said. For every job requiring a degree from an advanced institution of the older type, there are five jobs requiring technical training beyond the high school level, he said.

"These figures are fairly typical of the needs in many of the cities served by community colleges," he said. "Why do they remain unmet? Are our colleges actually producing the kind of product — the kind of graduate most needed?"

"We can all agree that excellent facilities are necessary and valuable for technical education," he continued. "But can you find better equipment for many of those courses in the laboratories and industrial shops of the communities you serve? Are there any better homemaking laboratories than the homes of the students themselves?"

"This is not an argument for economy. Actually, community colleges need to invest more money in highly trained faculties, and

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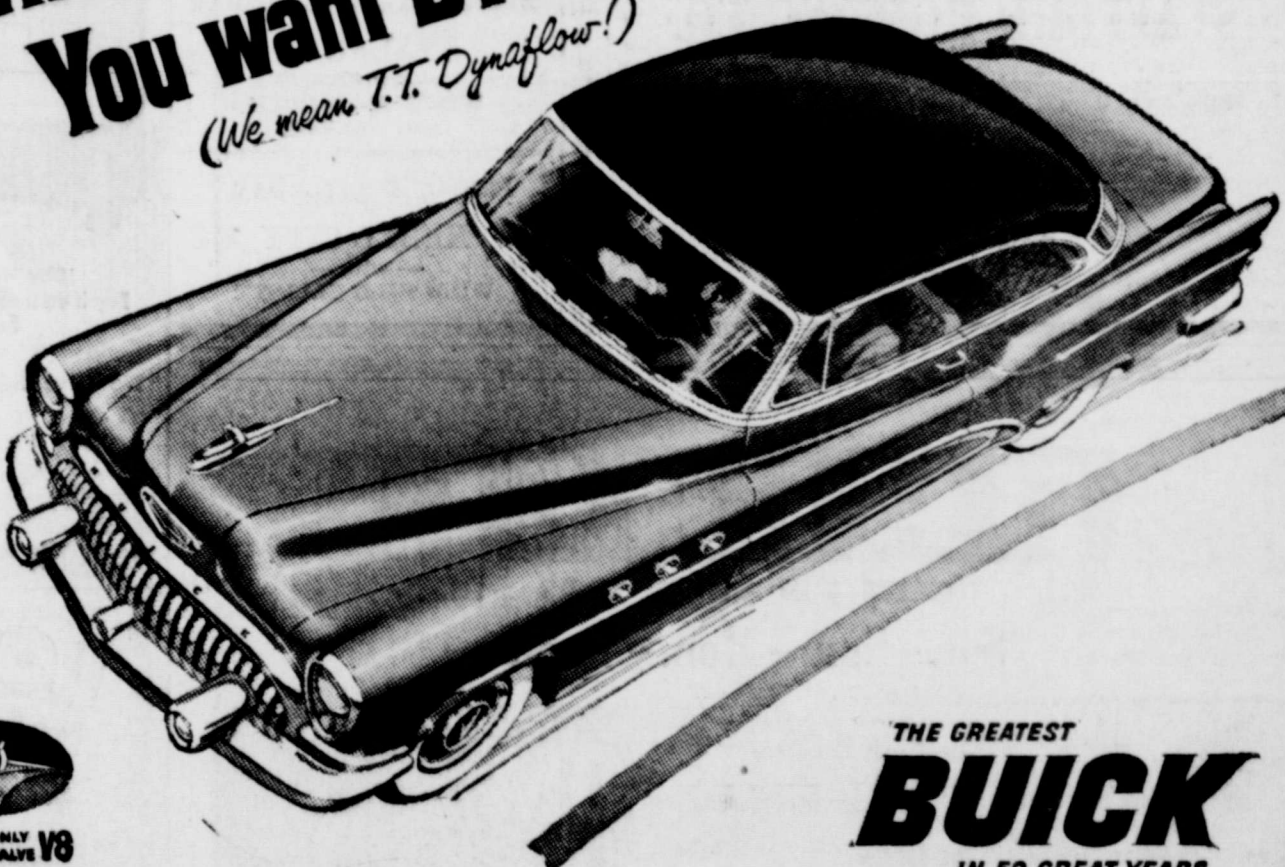
