Pope Given Six-Year Prison Term In Bank Case

Graf Zeppelin Nearing Azores On Atlantic Flight

Ship Averages 85 Miles Hour From New York

Dirigible Last Reported At 1,825 Miles From Starting Point Within 500 Miles Of Isle Of Fayal, Azores

Follows Schedule

Eighth Ocean Crossing For Giant German Liner Due To Culminate At Spain Late Tonight; Winds Favorable

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, June 4. (Wednesday)—The Graf Zeppelin radiated at 5:50 a. m. C. M. T. (midnight E. S. T.) that it was in position 38 north latitude, 30:30 west longitude, heading toward the Azores at about 85 miles an hour. The position given was about 1,825 miles east of New York and about 500 miles west of the Isle of Fayal, Azores.

By midnight tonight the German dirigible Graf Zeppelin should be at Seville, Spain, the eighth ocean crossing added to her list of many laurels.

Fifty hours it would take, Dr. Hugo Eckener said before lifting his great sky cruiser up against the stars at 9:15 E. S. T. Monday night and scattered reports from ships and the dirigible itself have indicated that this schedule would be easy to maintain.

Holds To Route
During the first few hours of the flight, the most serious leg of its journey above four continents and twice across the equator, the ship held closely to the route outlined at Lakehurst, N. J., just before the takeoff. Northeast from New York for about eight hours, southeast then for four hours to the 40th parallel, which leads eastward close to the north of the Azores and so direct to Spain.

Interest Here In Co-Op Plan

Movement Gains Momentum For Organization Of Cooperative Association For Dairy Products In County

Country-wide interest is reported in the movement to organize a cooperative marketing association for handling dairy products, according to County Agent D. F. Eaton.

A dozen or more dairy farmers and business men of Lubbock are due to leave from the county agent's office at the courthouse at nine o'clock this morning for a day's visit to the Hale County Creamery at Plainview. This creamery is a cooperative plant, owned and operated by dairy farmers and Hale, Floyd and Lubbock counties.

Mr. Eaton, L. A. Howard, George C. Cooper, B. Sherrod, J. H. Rix, Gerald Wren, T. N. Nelson, Moss Cavender, J. T. Collier and others are expected to make the trip today. While at Plainview these men will investigate the plan of operation of both the cooperative organization and the creamery plant itself.

Society Woman Gets Jail Term

DENVER, June 3. (P)—Mrs. Martha F. Carson, 36-year-old society prominent here, was sentenced to 30 days in jail today for possession of a gallon of alcohol. Mrs. Carson pleaded guilty to the charge. Tears sprang into her eyes when she heard the jail sentence pronounced. "But can't I pay a fine and go?" she asked Justice of the Peace Albert T. Orndorff. He shook his head negatively. Officers testified they received an anonymous tip that a delivery of alcohol was to be made at a well known hotel and they arrived in time to see a man step from the curb, receive a package from an automobile and hand it to Mrs. Carson.

Noted Explorer Slain By English Student

S. M. U. Annuals "Objectionable"

DALLAS, June 3. (P)—The degree of Kenneth Mahoney of Huntington, Ind., editor of the Rotunda, yearbook of the Southern Methodist University, today was held up by the board of trustees because of matter termed objectionable in the publication. Distribution of the yearbooks was stopped after more than 1,000 had been given to students. Mahoney said the objectionable matter will be torn out of the remaining books.

Prof. A. F. Henning of the journalism department, also warned Mahoney to leave out certain pictures and reading matter which he considered would be objectionable to officials of the university.

Officers Deny Seeing Storey During Search

Prisoner Tells Of Talking With Sheriff; Expresses Surprise At Hunt; Held On Number Of Charges

DENTON, June 3.—Officers here today denied having seen or talked with Yancey Storey, Denton county rancher sought by officers for the last several weeks and now under various charges, jail sentences and a prison sentence. Storey was arrested yesterday by Texas rangers as he attempted to enter the Texas penitentiary at Huntsville, to begin serving a five-year term for robbery of the Krum State bank.

Surprised At Search.
In jail today at Fort Worth, awaiting transfer to Denton, he was reported as expressing surprise that a recent search by officers failed to reveal his whereabouts, saying he had seen Sheriff Ted Lewis of Denton every few days and had a conversation with the district attorney about a week before he went to Huntsville.

The last time I saw Storey was in the jail here in January," Sheriff Lewis declared, "and we have been to his home many times in efforts to locate and arrest him." Seen in Dallas. Earl Street, county attorney, said "I last saw Storey in Dallas. Once since then, when Storey was out on bond, he called me to tell me he would run for Denton county sheriff. That was the last time I saw him. He was accompanied with him and I never talked with him or told him 'everything was ready' for him to begin serving his sentence. Before he begins his sentence in the penitentiary, we are going to keep him in the Denton jail at least a hundred days for stealing turkeys."

CHICAGO, June 3. (P)—Reprisal for the "Little Gang" massacre at Fox Lake early Sunday was started today. That was the police view when they found in an alley the body of Thomas Sommer. He had been tortured. His wrists had been wired. A well around the neck indicated he had been garrotted.

Precipitation for Month of May Falls Below Average with only 1.71 Inches

PRECIPITATION for the month of May fell under the average by .44 of an inch with a total fall of 1.71 inches, according to a statement issued yesterday by Don L. Jones, superintendent of the state experiment station, located three miles east of the city. Average fall for May is 2.15 inches. Wild Oil Well Shut Down At Hobbs Tuesday

Area Of Two Miles Sprinkled By Oil And Gas As Shell A-1 State Goes On Rampage At 4,000 Feet

Extinguish Fires
Production Is Estimated At 2,500 Barrels Of Oil Daily And Thirty Million Cubic Feet Of Gas

(Special To The Avalanche)
NEW HOBBS, N. M., June 3.—Following a desperate fight of several hours in which oil and gas blew wildly from a calcitrant well to sprinkle an area of two miles, the Shell A-1 State was shut in late today with 14,000 pounds of back pressure. The well blew in last night at 4,400 feet and flowed wild today for several hours at a rate estimated by operators at 2,500 barrels of oil daily and 30,000,000 cubic feet of gas.

Only 4,000 barrels of storage was available and it was thought likely that the Shell company would extend its pipe line from Wink, Winkler county, Texas, to the Hobbs area, a distance of 80 miles.

All rigs under threatening influence of the well were shut down today so that fires could be turned out as a safety measure. The Shell No. 1-A State is 2,310 feet from the north line and 1,850 feet from the east line of section 22-18-38, about one and one-quarter miles southeast of the Humble Oil & Refining company's No. 1 Bowers.

Eleven Dangerous Inmates Of Criminal Insane Hospital At Liberty After Daring Escape

Fugitives Armed With Knives And Razors As Officers And Hospital Attendants Patrol Highway; Warnings Issued To Countywide; Two Captured Shortly After Break

TOLSON, Mich., June 3.—Thirteen dangerous inmates of the state hospital for criminal insane made a daring escape from the institution today. Eleven were still at liberty tonight.

The eleven fugitives were armed with knives and razors. Throughout the day, state police, county officers, hospital attendants and volunteers patrolled highways, examined thickets and woods, searched buildings and spread warnings to the country side.

Two Captured.
Two were captured a few hours after the break. They were found in different places on a highway to which they evidently had gone in home-made vehicles. One of those still at large, four were sent to the hospital because they had committed murder; one charged into a court room with two pistols and threatened the judge; another ran into a downtown Detroit bank and snatched \$1,000, and others were adjudged insane after committing robberies.

The men captured were Stephen Goodard, Detroit killer, and Charles Kennedy, committed from Detroit for robbery.

Rule Aids Escape.
The escape was effected through a rule from a third floor ward in which 18 men were confined. Two guards, U. S. Davis and Bert Hill, were informed by an inmate that some of the men were trying to saw their way out of a window.

The rules of the institution require that an official be present when a ward or cell is opened at night. The guards summoned Owen Owen, night supervisor, when the three went into the ward, they were

Fifteen Enter Demo Campaign For Governor

Intentions Not Announced By Pink Parrish, Dan Moody, Or Lynch Davidson; Other Applications Not Received

DALLAS, June 3.—Nearly 24 hours after the time for filing had expired, 15 candidates were presumed to be "officially" in the democratic race for governor, although three of the most important still had not announced their intentions.

Names of Gov. Dan Moody, Lynch Davidson of Houston, former lieutenant-governor, and Senator Pink L. Parrish of Lubbock, were filed by their friends. Davidson was expected to make a statement tomorrow or Saturday, Moody maintained his silence, and Parrish, reported to be attending a Shrine convention at Toronto, Can., had not been reached for a statement.

Applications Not In.
Albert Sidney Johnson, of Dallas, secretary of the state executive committee, had not received the applications of Paul Loven of New Braunfels, "wet" aspirant, and Rep. T. N. Mauritz of Garza, but both said they had mailed the request before the deadline last midnight.

A half-dozen or so other applications were expected to come in.

Former Southland Banker Is Found Guilty Tuesday After Ten Minutes Of Deliberation

Defendant Charged With Accepting Funds In Institution He Is Alleged To Have Known Insolvent; Motion To Be Made For Appeal; Six Other Counts Are Faced

(Special To The Avalanche)
POST, June 3.—A verdict of guilty, with penalty assessed at six years in the penitentiary, was returned here tonight by a jury in the trial of J. M. Edge, former owner of the now defunct Bank of Southland, after a deliberation of only 10 minutes. The case went into the hands of the jury at 6 o'clock and at 6:10 the verdict was ready. Edge was convicted of accepting deposits in a bank he was alleged to have known was insolvent.

Announcement was made by defense counsel tonight that a motion for new trial probably will be filed tomorrow morning. Edge's conviction was on one count only and he is yet to go to trial on six others of a like nature. The others will not be taken up until the next term of court which convenes in October.

Arguments Heard.
Arguments in the case were heard this afternoon after testimony had been concluded. Andy Hills, of Littlefield, closed the arguments for the defense while T. L. Price, district attorney, closed for the State.

Seven witnesses for the State were heard in the trial which opened Monday while the defense waived testimony and did not call a single witness in Edge's behalf. Those who testified were C. L. Blair, Southland farmer; Ira Weakley, Post banker and receiver for the Bank of Southland; W. F. Cato, Garza county sheriff; Miss Alice Hord, Edge's assistant in the bank; John Hord, Post banker; Dennis Zimmerman, Tulsa lawyer, and T. Wade Potter, Lamb county attorney.

Jury in the case, all of its members being farmers, was composed of Z. P. Lusk, Elmer Cudworth, Jeff Reed, J. T. Ritchie, Leslie Hughes, W. C. Morris, Joe Reed, J. L. Wallace, F. B. Ceeley, Allen Bird, Forrest Puffing and Ed Drake.

Complete Jury In Alsop Case

Testimony Will Start Today In Trial Of Former Policeman Charged With Murder Of Two Negroes In Robbery

FORT WORTH, June 3.—Testimony will be opened tomorrow in the trial of John Alsop, former policeman on a charge of murder for the slaying of two negroes in the attempted robbery of the First State bank of Polytex, April 10. The jury was completed late today after 38 alternates were picked up by deputy sheriffs when the special venire list of 450 names became exhausted.

This is the second trial of Alsop. A hung jury resulted in the first. He is accused of framing the bank robbery in order that the robbers, Will Tate and George Terrell, might be killed for the "dead bank bandit" reward.

Hoover Sticks By Guns After Veto Defeated

New Enacted Spanish War Pension Measure Given To State Department For Incorporation As Law

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, June 3.—While the newly enacted Spanish War pension measure was being transmitted to the state department for incorporation into the country's laws, President Hoover reiterated today a statement of his policy in vetoing the legislation. The bill will benefit approximately 114,000 Spanish War veterans, the Philippine insurrection and the China relief expedition, and will cost approximately \$11,500,000 annually. It liberalizes in many respects existing legislation.

At the same time this act was being enrolled among the national statutes, the senate finance committee was working on a house measure liberalizing World War veteran's compensation.

Leaders Called

WASHINGTON, June 3. (P)—Calling in the leaders of the rebellious republican congressional forces which yesterday rode rough shod over his pension vote, President Hoover today caused policies of future co-operation and demanded prompt consideration of the London Naval treaty.

Senator Watson, of Indiana, the republican pilot, and Senator Moses of New Hampshire, the president pro tem of the senate, were invited to the White House for breakfast. They informed the President that the legislators were restless and anxious to get home for the campaign but Mr. Hoover was firm for an immediate special session of the senate on the treaty and gave notice he would call it the day after this session ends.

TO PROBE LYCHING

Hundred Witnesses Expected In Chickasha Hearing

CHICKASHA, Okla., June 3. (P)—As many as 100 witnesses were expected to be called tomorrow in an inquest into the death of Henry Argo, 19-year-old negro who was fatally injured in the county jail here last Saturday by members of a mob which sought to lynch him for an alleged attack upon a white woman.

Four Arrested In Government Liquor Drives

Sixteen Now Being Held For
Alleged Conspiracy To Vi-
olate National Prohibition
Laws In Oklahoma

OKLAHOMA, June 3. (AP)—Four more persons were arrested by G. A. Demos, deputy United States marshal today as the government continued its campaign to break up alleged liquor traffic in the state and lead mining fields of Ottawa county.

Today's arrests include Joe Nolan, Picher chief of police, who had been taken into custody last week on a similar charge and released on \$5,000 bond after being arraigned at Vinita, Nolan now is in the county jail awaiting action by United States District Court Judge F. E. Kemmerer on an application for an additional \$5,000 bond.

Conspiracy Charges
The arrests today, made as part of the roundup of officers, former officers and others on federal charges of conspiracy to violate the prohibition laws, brought the total number held in the present roundup to 16 and the grand total of the investigation to 32.

Last night M. F. Sweet, Cardin, special highway officer; P. T. Leffler, assistant Picher police chief; Herman Brewer, Picher patrolman; and Louis Carmel, merchant at Picher, were arrested.

Councilman Taken
Earlier in the day Demos apprehended William Harrington, Picher councilman; Joe Anderson, special officer; William Schumacher, Picher merchant policeman; and M. L. McElroy, Picher constable. Charles Weaver, Picher attorney representing the first group of six arrested, was taken into custody at Bartlesville on a similar charge.

The arrests reduced the local police force to two men and a former policeman who was acting as a merchant patrolman.

LEAPS TO DEATH

Suicide Indicated In Fall Of
Ten Stories Tuesday

LONG BEACH, Cal., June 3. (AP)—Isaac Brown, 65, of Bluebonville, O., today leaped to his death from his room on the tenth floor of a hotel here. Papers in his room identified him as district manager in Bluebonville for the Metropolitan Life Insurance company.

Police said their investigation disclosed that Brown came here a short time ago apparently for his health. They said letters indicated he had contemplated suicide.

START 40-HOUR WEEK

Reduced Earnings Make New
Arrangements Necessary

BALTIMORE, June 3. (AP)—Shopmen of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad will go on a 40-hour week next Saturday. Instead of the 44-hour week they have been working for the last several months, it was announced today by railroad officials.

Reduced earnings made the arrangements necessary, it was said. The 40-hour week will be effected by not working on Saturdays.

STRUCK BY LIGHTNING

Two Girls And Two Boys Meet
Death; Others May Die

BLATTINIZ, Czechoslovakia, June 3. (AP)—Ten boys and girls were struck by lightning while seeking a shelter today under a tree from a downpour of rain.

Two boys, 15 and 16 years old, and two girls, 14 years old, were killed instantly. The others, it was feared, were burned fatally.

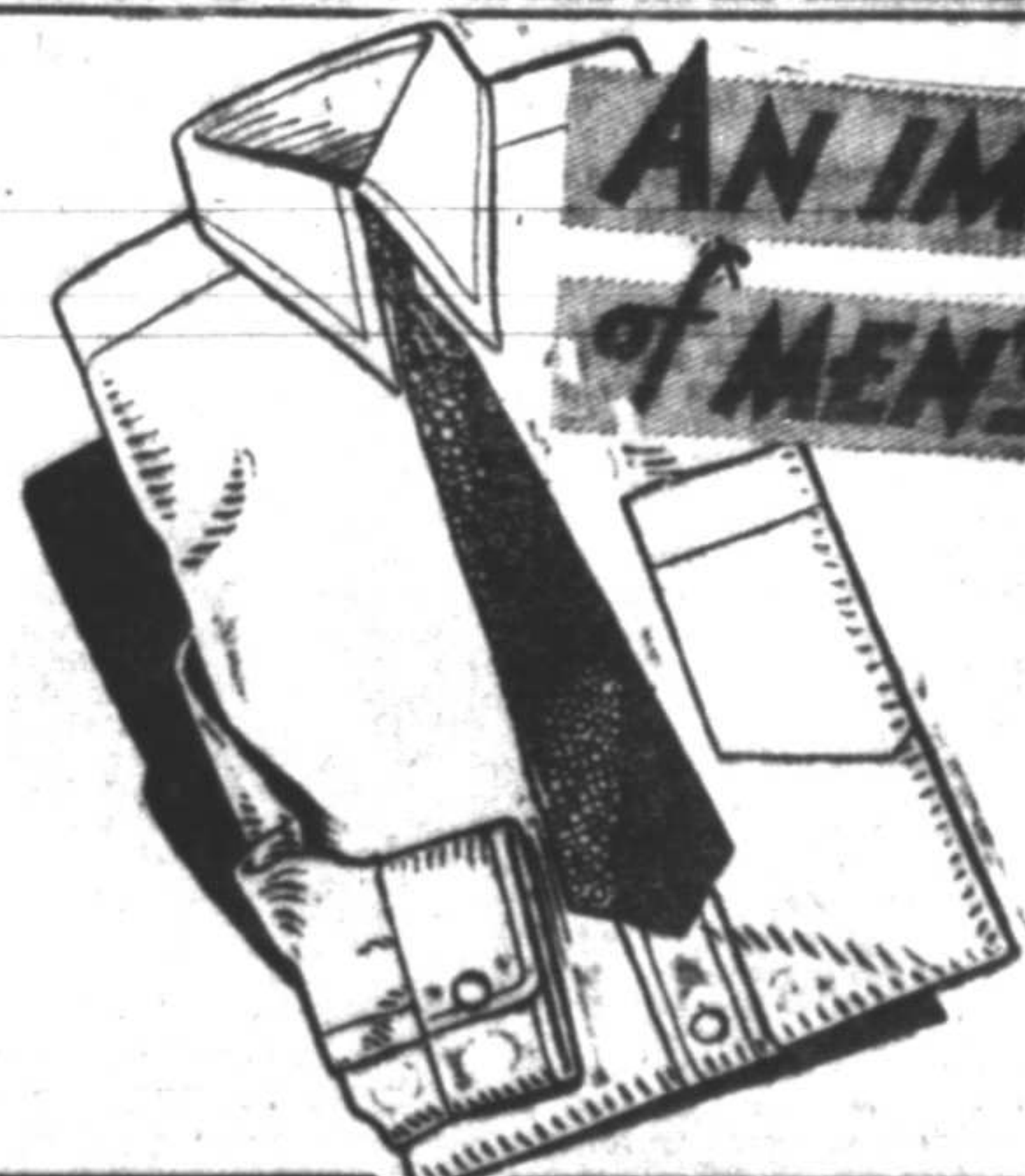

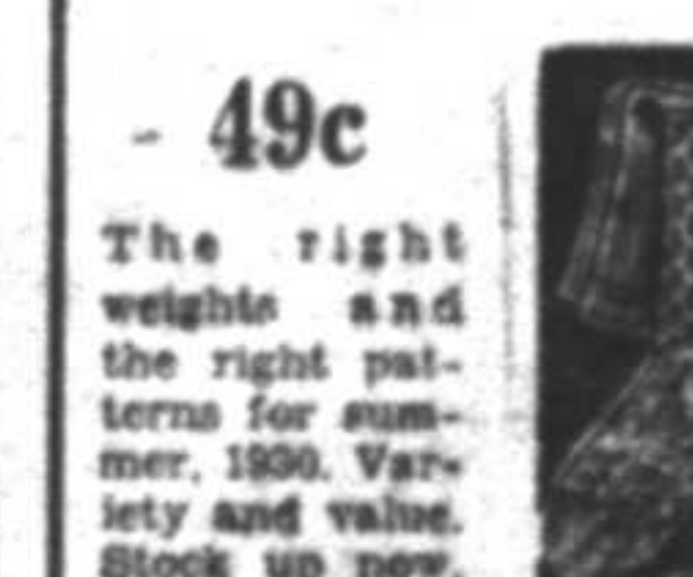

Lester Given Four Years In Liquor Trial

Case Is To Be Appealed To Higher Court, According To Defense Attorneys; No Effort Made To Make Bond

Chas. C. Triplett, member of the defense counsel representing R. B. (Blackie) Lester, who drew a four-year term on pro-law charges at the conclusion of his trial here yesterday, said last night that the case would be appealed to a higher court.

Mr. Triplett, a member of the law firm of Schenk & Triplett, stated that an effort would be made to have the decision reversed.

Lester, who has been at freedom on bond, was found guilty by a jury in the 72nd district court before Judge Homer L. Pharr, verdict read at 1:45 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. Arguments in the case were concluded at noon. The defense did not interpose an insanity plea in the case as had been expected.

Following decision of the jury Lester was again lodged in the Lubbock county jail and officers last night stated that no efforts have been made to secure bond pending result of the appeal.

Britain Takes Move Against Indian Riots

Troops March Into Villages In Effort To Offset Three-Fold Threat Of Resistance And Of Communism

BOMBAY, June 3. (AP)—In the Peshawar, beset by a three-fold threat of civil resistance, wild tribesmen and communism, Britain today made the outstanding move in the strategy that is advancing her army across the map of India.

British troops marched into two villages of the northwest frontier, gateway to the Punjab, Charnada and Prang.

Leaders Arrested
They arrested eight leaders of the situation and established martial law. Peshawar city itself today was quiet, as was the most of the rest of India, in nearly every center of which Mahatma Gandhi's "day of silence" was as usual made the order of the day.

Salt Raids End
Salt raiding came to a virtual end with yesterday's en masse attack upon the Wadala depots, in which police and military charged 15,000 volunteers and 130 or more persons were injured. There were no reports of the use of firearms.

Today, the coming of the rainy season ended salt raids.
The raiding was succeeded by a far more serious menace—tax resistance. To meet its necessities, the government put forth a new regulation providing grave penalties not only for refusal to pay taxes, but for inciting to tax disobedience.

Three Men Get \$3,040 In Loot

Bandits Rob Kansas City Bank After Forcing Cashier And Teller To Lie On Floor Of Institution Tuesday

KANSAS CITY, Kan., June 3. (AP)—Three men entered the Victory State bank late today and, after forcing George H. Gray, cashier, and Dorothy Smith, teller, and G. Max Keating, a customer, to lie on the floor, robbed the cashier's cage of approximately \$3,040.

The men, police said, arrived at the bank and departed after the robbery in two motor cars.

Pointing revolvers at the two bank employees and the customer, the robbers ordered them to lie on the floor. They then scooped up all the change in sight in the cashier's cage.

Williams Speaks At Co-Op Confab

CORPUS CHRISTI, June 3. (AP)—Several hundred farmers and business men from 41 South Texas counties, comprising district of the new Texas Cotton Cooperative association, today heard Carl Williams, cotton member of the Federal Farm Board, discuss the history and plans of the board, particularly regarding cotton.

Williams, riding on an airplane over Nueces county, viewing farms which last year produced 125,000 bales of cotton.

Speaking of this, he said, "I never knew there was so much cotton in the world. Its foolishness, downright foolishness. This overproduction of cotton is the item which can defeat the purposes of the Farm Board act. Stabilization boards can acquire surplus and cooperatives can aid in marketing, but acreage in these crops must be reduced."

After the meeting, chairman of the delegations from 29 towns scattered from the Rio Grande valley to San Antonio, met to organize the district & council of the Texas Cotton Cooperative association. T. N. Blackwell of Taft was named chairman and a 20-yard drive was outlined, in which members would be enlisted.

Renewed Wars In China Are Held Certain

Apparent Brief Cessation Of Hostilities Is Expected To Come To End Between Nationalists, Alliance

SHANGHAI, June 3. (AP)—After an apparently brief cessation of hostilities between the nationalist government and the northern alliance, which is seeking to create an independent government in North China centering at Peiping, advice from the Honan province zone of police today indicated renewed fighting was imminent.

Dispatches indicated that at least 100,000 troops might oppose each other on the Honan front.

Armies Deadlocked
Despite the multifarious claims of each group claiming victories, independent advice indicated that the opposition armies continued virtually deadlocked along the Hainan-Tungkuang railroad across Honan province.

The nationalists seemingly were holding a slight advantage, reports disclosed, having forced the nationalists to retreat as far east as Kwei-tieh in the northeastern part of the province.

The nationalists were reported to have increased their forces to at least 150,000 indicating that Chiang Kai-Shek has ordered a general advance and lending strength to the belief that renewed hostilities were imminent.

Hostilities Likely
Hostilities in Shanghai province along the Yellow river in the vicinity of Tsinan also seemed likely. The nationalists during the last week have threatened Tsinan, causing foreigners there to perfect plans of defense or evacuation in the event that should become necessary.

Troop concentrations were being conducted in that area, the nationalists seeking to bring Shanghai into their alliance while the nationalists were just as determined to hold the northern rebels north of the Yellow river.

Naval Treaty Approval Seen

Conservative Motion Seeking To Delay Consideration Of Pact Defeated In House Of Commons By Government

LONDON, June 3. (AP)—The London naval treaty today seemed well on its way toward final British approval. A conservative motion which, if passed, at least would have delayed approval, was beaten last night in the house of commons by a vote of 282 to 201.

The liberals voted with the government. The motion was presented by Stanley Baldwin, former conservative prime minister, who stated that the treaty be subjected to a rigid inquiry by an especially appointed board of 11 house members.

Nervous Over Treaty
In presenting his motion Mr. Baldwin disclaimed any anti-American feeling, but declared that he had been made nervous as to Britain's safety by certain provisions of the treaty, and felt that it should be subjected to the same kind of inquiry it was receiving in the United States.

In answering him Ramsay MacDonald, prime minister, said the fact the "die-hard" in each of the three countries signatory to the treaty were fighting it was indication to him that the safety of each of the countries was well provided for. He pointed out such an inquiry as was taking place in the United States senate was customary in the treatment of treaties by that body, whereas British procedure was different.

ITALY DESIRES PARITY

Foreign Minister Says France Refuses Special Meet

ROME, June 3. (AP)—Foreign Minister Grandi told the senate today that Italy desired a special meeting of Italo-French representatives and experts to clear up the naval difficulties of the two powers but that France, refusing, had declared that future negotiations must be conducted through the regular diplomatic channels of ambassadors.

The statement was made in a long exposition of Italy's position at the London naval conference regarding parity with France which he said France had admitted at the Washington conference of 1921.

E. T. Wharton Admits "Plot"

Suspect Surrenders To District Attorney, Confesses To "Framing" Liquor Count Against W. L. Edwards

HOUSTON, June 3. (AP)—E. T. "Curly" Wharton, who surrendered last night to District Attorney O'Brien Stevens after authorities had conducted a nationwide search for him for two weeks in the investigation of circumstances leading up to the shotgun killing of W. L. Edwards, made a statement to officials in which he admitted "framing" a liquor charge against Edwards.

The statement also involved a federal prohibition agent as one of several men participating in the trumped up charge against Edwards. The charge was filed by prohibition officers about a week before Edwards was "taken for a ride" on the night of May 18.

Wharton was held incommunicado at a police substation by orders of the district attorney. He was held in default of \$10,000 bond on a charge of violating the liquor laws.

SUSPECT IS ARRESTED

Youth Held As Attacker Of Four-Year-Old Girl

HOUSTON, June 3. (AP)—A man about 39 years old was arrested today as a suspect in police continued a search for the attacker of four-year-old Naomi Louise Morris.

Forty Bodies Are Recovered

Thirty-Five Members Of Crew Saved After Passenger Ship Sinks Due To Explosion Of Boiler; Captain Perishes

BOGOTA, June 3. (AP)—Forty bodies were recovered today following the sinking of the passenger steamer Goenaga in the Magdalena river yesterday after a boiler explosion. The captain of the steamer went down with the vessel and his body was among those recovered.

Thirty-five members of the crew were saved. Eleven of them were seriously burned by fire which followed the explosion. The vessel sank almost immediately. The survivors arrived in Barranquilla early this morning and the injured were sent to a hospital at Tenerife.

Worker Buried to Neck in Wreckage

NEW YORK, June 3. (AP)—Buried to his neck in the wreckage of a building demolished by a boiler explosion, a stationary engineer was fed restoratives for more than two hours today while police and fire emergency squads dug him out.

John Terczycki, 69, was on duty in the boiler room of a rendering plant in Brooklyn shortly after midnight when the boiler exploded. The explosion hurled the boiler from the roof of the building.

The engineer was caught beneath the wreckage with only his head visible when rescuers reached him.

Before police and firemen ventured to remove the debris which held him fast, they shored up remaining portions of the building for fear they would fall and crush the imprisoned man.

At Queensboro hospital Terczycki was found to be suffering from a fracture of the skull and a broken leg.

Suspect Arrested In Holdup Series

WICHITA FALLS, June 3. (AP)—Officers quizzed a man arrested here today in an effort to learn whether he had any knowledge of a series of holdups in Oklahoma City which were climaxed March 22 by the slaying of J. W. Gates, Oklahoma City policeman.

W. G. Bralley, sheriff, said he had been asked by Oklahoma authorities a few days after the slaying to watch for the man.

The suspect, who said he knew nothing of the Oklahoma City occurrences, was quoted by the sheriff as asserting that he was released from the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth several months ago after serving a term for the \$2,000,000 robbery of a Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul mail limited near Chicago in June, 1924.

Large Crowds Are Expected For Opening

Formal Opening Of \$110,000 Unit Of City Light Plant Will Be Held Today; Program Is Arranged

Large crowds are expected today to attend the formal opening of the new \$110,000 unit to the city light plant, located in north Lubbock and an informal program of entertainment has been arranged for the evening.

Today the plant will be open to the public for inspection while tonight, beginning at 8 o'clock, a short program under the direction of Harley D. Woods, former mayor, will be presented.

New unit to the plant is housed in a large fireproof building, 38 x 75 feet, and is so constructed that as the smaller units become obsolete new ones can be added from time to time.

Equipment inside the building, all of which has been installed and is now in operation, includes a 1,250 horse power Nordberg Diesel engine, a Gardner-Rex air compressor and a panel switchboard. The Lubbock plant formerly had 4,000 horse power but with the addition of the new unit it now has 5,250. The entire plant, valued at \$600,000, has a working force of about 30 men under Superintendent J. J. Graham.

Nine engines of varied sizes are included in the equipment. Music for the entertainment tonight will be furnished by the Lubbock High school band and a string orchestra under direction of Jess Levens, assistant city attorney.

R. J. Murray, president of the Lubbock Board of City Development, is scheduled to deliver a short address on the subject "Cities Do Not Happen—They Are Built," the slogan of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce. Following the entertainment program the new unit is to be dedicated.

So he darts out of line and cuts in. His safety depends on the other fellow's good brakes. Sometimes he gains as much as a tenth of a second at the expense of everybody else's comfort and peace of mind.

Experience proves that his rate of progress is not much higher than that of the orderly, decent, courteous driver. He dashes ahead and in and out and across everybody's path from the first showing of the amber light. But he is held up by the red at the next important crossing. At the first intimation of a change of signal he blares his horn as a warning to the rest of the world to make room for him.

In the dense traffic of the city he marks his trail with bruised fenders and hub caps and ruined tempers. But in the country, where the speed limit is less exacting, he knows no limit, and there he too frequently signals his time-saving achievements by tragedy. The in-and-outer is responsible for more of the motor accidents than any other factor. His control and suppression form the biggest problem in the safety program.

CONTROL OF CHILD'S POSTURE CAN HELP AVERT RHEUMATISM LATER

Anyone with a pain, ache, or trouble anywhere in his bones, muscles, or joints is likely to say that he has rheumatism.

Rheumatism is the scientific word for a pain in a joint. It may, of course, be rheumatism involving muscles and not localized in the joints. Dr. Ralph Pemberton has described in Hygiene two types of arthritis—one affecting people particularly at and below middle-life, which runs a crippling and devastating course; the other affecting people beyond middle life and likely to be a little milder.

While rheumatic constitutions are not inherited, apparently the body structure or makeup which is rheumatic runs in families. Pemberton describes the rheumatic type as people with flat chests, weak backs and prominent abdomens who do not stand the strain and stress incidental to fatigue, worry or hard work. If the child tends to be of this body structure, the parents may do much for it by early education in posture and by proper control of its general hygiene and diet.

The information has been widely circulated for many years that the chief cause of a rheumatic attack is infection at the roots of the teeth or the tonsils. Not all people who have infection at the roots of the teeth or in the tonsils have rheumatism, but many people who have rheumatism have infection at the roots of the teeth and in the tonsils.

Obviously there are other factors beside the possibility of the germ getting into the blood and locating in the joints. If a person's diet is bad, if his general hygiene is bad, if he is of a body type that tends toward rheumatic infection, the germ is more likely to set up a disturbance than in a person not so afflicted.

Doctor Pemberton emphasizes particularly the importance of rest for the rheumatic type. Indeed, because of the fatigue which is so commonly manifested by these people, he insists there should be periods of rest twice a day, one in the middle of the morning and one in the middle of the afternoon, of about one and a half hours each, during which time the patient should lie nearly flat and during which he should rest completely.

Among certain forms of treatment which have particular value for the rheumatic are massage, the application of heat and the use of sunlight. Massage can be given properly only by a trained masseur. Light rubbing can be carried out by anyone, particularly if some instruction is had from a masseur. The physician or the trained masseur knows enough to avoid motion to inflame joints.

Doctor Pemberton mentions particularly the value of heat applied to the painful portions and light massage to the points of the body thereafter.

SENATE'S OUTSTANDING CASES OF EXECUTIVE CAMPAIGN FUNDS RECALLED BY CURRENT PROBE

Beginning With Newberry

The senate began to be cautious and nervous concerning campaign funds when senators who voted that Truman H. Newberry of Michigan had a right to a seat in the senate were themselves defeated after Newberry resigned. Charles P. Stewart tells vividly in this second of a series of four articles on campaign funds how senators' teeth chatter when they recall the days of the "Newberry slaughter."

WASHINGTON, June 3.—The first senate candidate to get into serious trouble over the large size of his campaign expense account, following adoption of the direct primary and popularly elective method of choosing U. S. senators, was Truman H. Newberry of Michigan.

Mr. Newberry was elected (in 1918), but his victory cost approximately \$100,000.

Although seated, his right to remain was challenged, and a long contest ensued. While it ended in the incumbent's triumph (of a sort), it was not a satisfactory one. For one thing, it takes a two-thirds vote to expel a senator, one admitted, and the anti-Newberryites could not muster that many; but they did foot up an uncomplimentary substantial total. Moreover, the senate also "severely" condemned and disapproved "such excessive expenditures" "either with or without" a candidate's "knowledge and consent," as "contrary to sound public policy, harmful to the honor and dignity of the senate, and dangerous to the perpetuity of a free government."

Senator Newberry liked this so little that he promptly resigned. Subsequently an extraordinarily large proportion of the senators who had voted in his favor were beaten for re-election—producing a sensation which is talked about yet, to an accompaniment of chattering political teeth.

Even more painful (to its victim) was the case of William S. Vare of Pennsylvania; Mr. Vare never got into the senate at all.

The high cost of winning his senatorial nomination, on the Republican ticket, was the obstacle into which the Pennsylvania ran, head on—away in advance of election day—though his election was contested, too.

The irony of the situation was that the campaign of Senator George Wharton Pepper, who was seeking renomination in the 1926 primary, in opposition to the Vare attempt to take his toga away from him, cost a lot more than Vare's—roughly, \$2,000,000 to Vare's \$800,000 or a trifle more—and yet Vare won. And then failed to get his seat and was panned to a turn besides; whereas no one bothered to ask any embarrassing question of Pepper despite his fight's record cost—because who cared?—he was beaten, anyway.

It was the James A. Reed slush fund committee which put the skids under Vare, although it was not until months after Reed's retirement from the senate (only last winter) that the senate finally voted to exclude him.

The fate of Frank L. Smith of Illinois was less tragic than that of William S. Vare, only in that it was mercifully swifter.

Smith, like Vare, was impaled on his primary expenses—not on the cost of his campaign for election at the polls. Like Vare, he was a winner on the face of the election returns and appeared, to demand his seat, with credentials from his governor. In proper Smith's expense account was smaller than Vare's—about \$450,000—though even that, it will be noted, was about a quarter of a million larger than the sum the senate had "condemned and disapproved" as "excessive" in the case of Truman Newberry.

Yet it was not alone the size of the Smith fund to which the Reed committee took exception: it was also, and more especially to its largest contributor—Samuel Insull, the Illinois public utility man.

States' rights enthusiasts, it is worth bearing in mind, dispute the senate's right to give any weight to evidence relative to a duly accredited senator-elect's primary expenditures. Charges of irregularities in his election, they recognize may properly be taken into consideration, inasmuch as they affect his title to his seat; but the master of his nomination, they insist, is solely his state's, not the federal government's business.

Nevertheless, the precedent was established by the Reed committee, and the present committee's chairman, Senator Nye, is concerning himself even more intimately (perhaps because his committee was appointed earlier and he is therefore able to do so) with this year's candidates' primary campaigns.

Another precedent set in the Vare and Smith cases is that of refusing to admit a doubtful senator-elect into the upper congressional chamber at all until he has definitely established his eligibility.

It takes a two-thirds vote to expel a senator, once admitted, and two-thirds is hard to get; a simple majority excludes, which is easier.

According to legal Hoyle or not, it is thus that the present senate interprets its powers; the constitution makes each house of congress absolute judge of its own membership, and no earthly authority exists which can force the existing majority to modify its procedure.

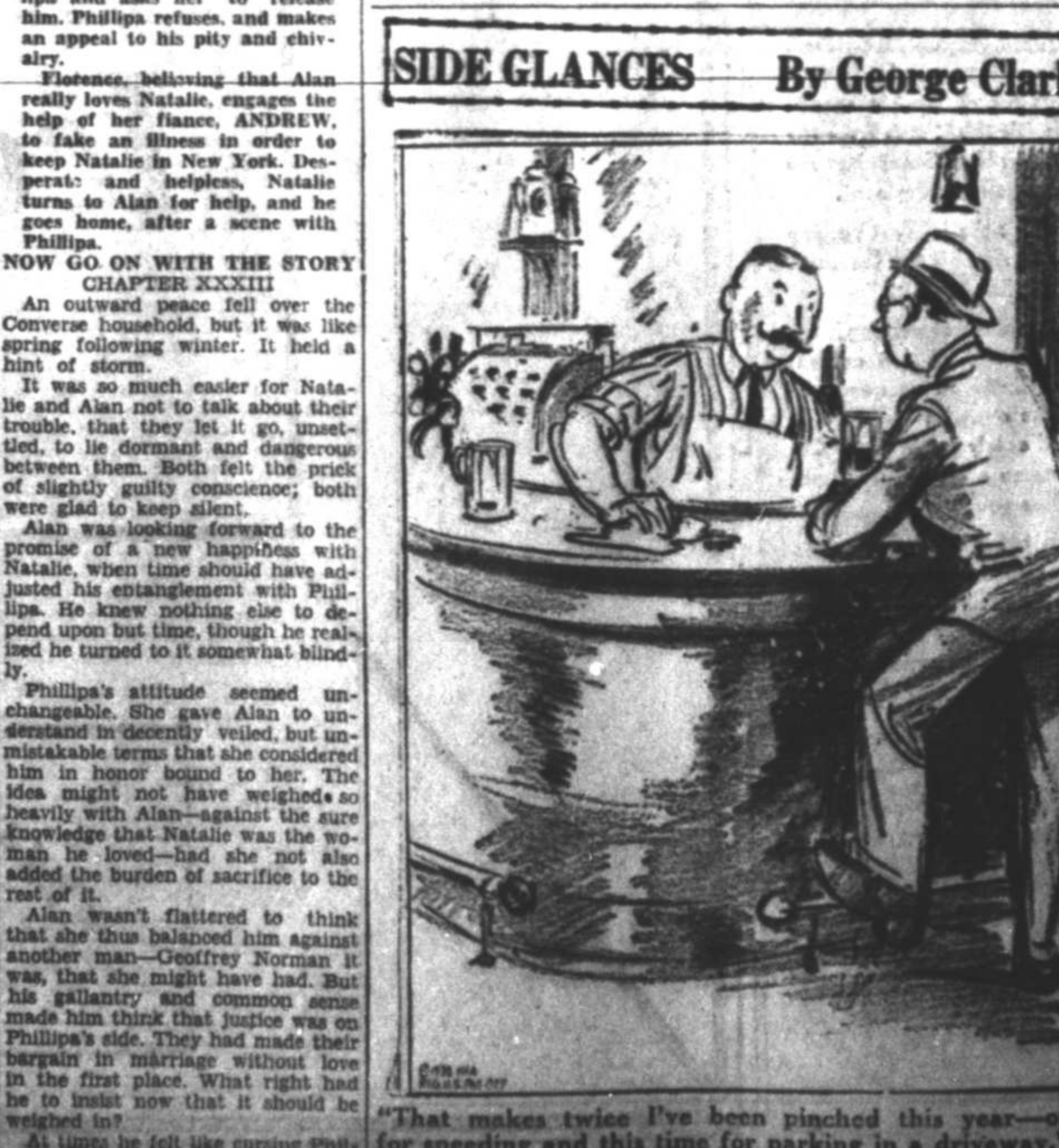

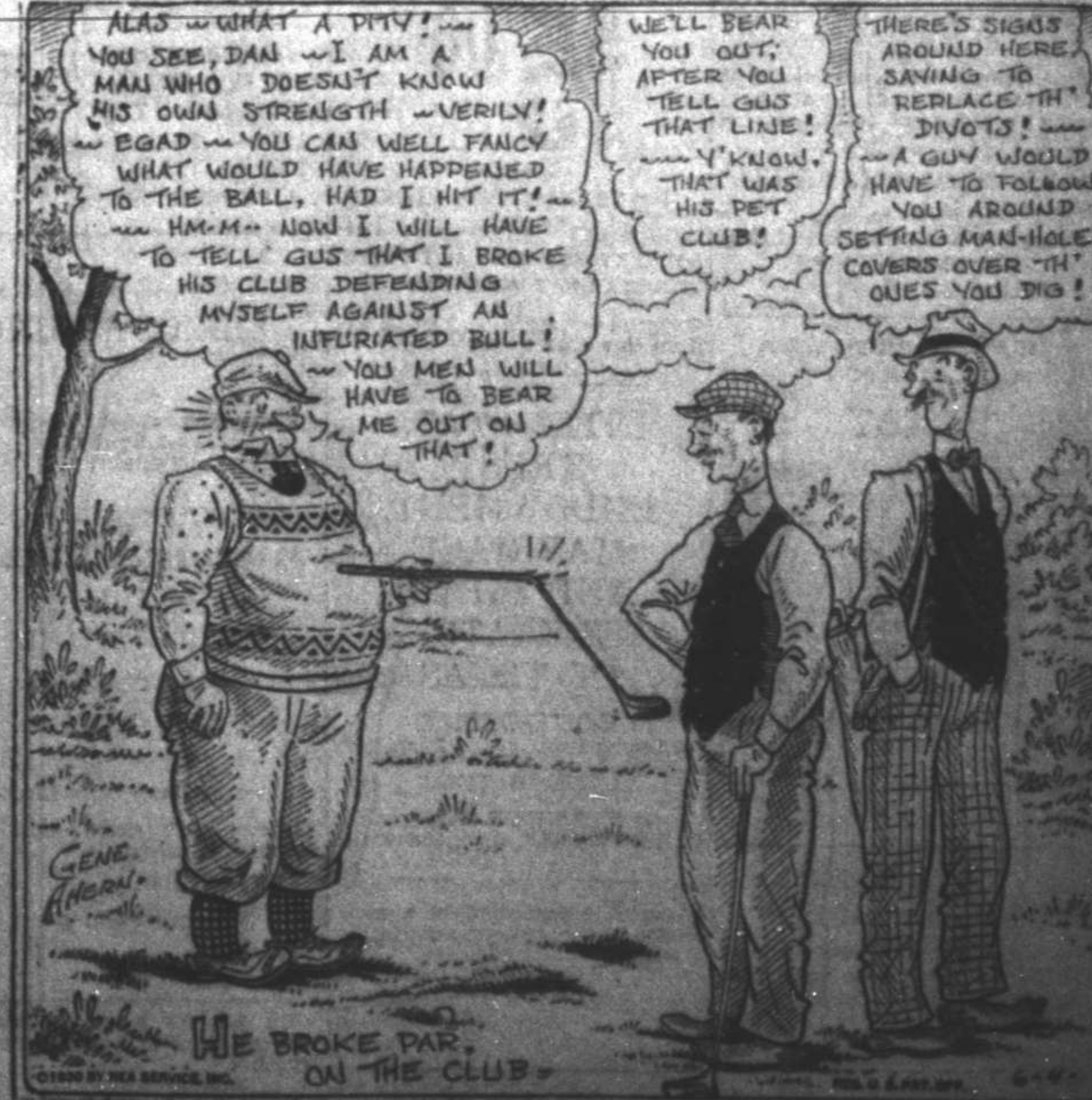

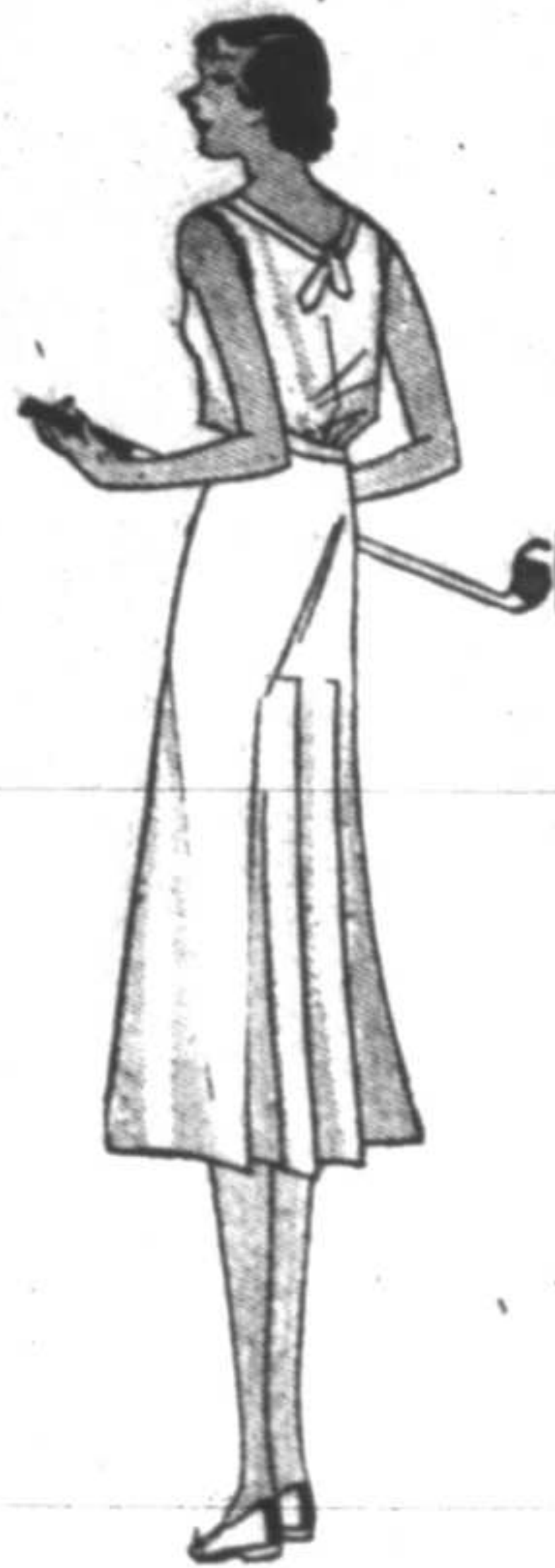

Divorce Laws Are Unconstitutional

MEXICO CITY, June 3. (AP)—The supreme court of Mexico today ruled that the divorce laws of the state of Morelos are unconstitutional, and news of the decision created a furor among those whose matrimonial bonds have parted under the laws—many of them Americans.

The decision was made in connection with only one case, but the divorce law was held invalid, nevertheless, because there is no appeal above the supreme court in Mexico.

The generally accepted interpretation is that all divorces granted under this law including those to Americans, are subject to question.

More than 1,000 Mexicans were separated by the Morelos courts, and since many of them have remarried they are considerably perturbed.

It is estimated that several hundred Americans are affected in similar manner. Cuernavaca, capital of the state of Morelos, has been the mecca for several years of those who sought easy divorces. A divorce usually could be obtained in one week, the only residence required being registry in the local hotel. For a fee averaging \$150 anyone lured by matrimonial ties could recover his liberty in short order.

BILLOXI, Miss., June 3.—Appetites sharpened by gulf breezes, the army of Confederate veterans, here in reunion, feasted at dinner on southern fried chicken tonight and then marched from the mess tent to the big tent auditorium where the fortieth reunion formally opened.

The main tent, large enough to accommodate a two-ring circus, was gaily decorated with associated flags strung from side to side. A huge Confederate flag was draped over the speakers stand which was almost hidden from view by flowers and plants.

"Dixie" Is Played
As the tent filled with veterans and members of the Sons of the Confederate Veterans, sponsors of the opening session, and the women of the Southern Confederate Memorial association, as well as thousands of visitors, the U. S. Marine band kept music in the air. This band, the president's own, opened the night's program with "Dixie."

Rear Admiral Thomas Pickett Magruder, recently appointed commander of the New Orleans naval base, was the principal speaker. Brief greetings were extended by officials including John Ashley Jones, commander of the Sons of the Veterans, and Mrs. A. Mod. Wilson, president general of the Southern Memorial association, which opened its annual meeting today with a brief afternoon session. General R. A. Sneed, commander of the veterans, responded.

Boy Scouts Busy
More than 500 Boy Scouts were busy between the spot and the camp and all available automobiles were carrying the veterans to the registration quarters and then to Camp Sneed.

Missing Pilot Reported Safe By Oklahoman

Maurice Graham Makes Known
Identity in Elk City, Okla.,
Air Mail Pilot Missing Since
Last January

ELK CITY, Okla., June 3. (AP)—J. B. Miller, owner of a motor company here said tonight, a man employed by him by the name of Maurice Graham claimed to be the air mail pilot by that name who has been missing since last January 10.

Miller said the man, a former aviator had been working for him about two weeks. He is about 35 years old. Miller said, about the same age as the missing flier.

Graham disappeared in January 10 on a flight from Los Angeles to Salt Lake City. He last was seen the night of January 9 when he left Las Vegas, Nevada, for Salt Lake City in a snowstorm.

A report gained circulation that the Western Air Express plane carried \$300,000 in currency and other negotiable securities, but this was denied by postal authorities, who said the plane carried 200 registered letters which contained only \$300 in currency and \$1,700 in securities.

Miller said Graham told him after taking off from Las Vegas, he flew into a severe storm as he neared the Utah line, and battled the terrific wind at an altitude of 12,000 feet for an hour before his plane weakened and went into a spin, he leaped to safety, Graham told Miller, and landed about half a mile from the plane.

Mail Sacks Saved
Miller and Graham told him he came to earth in Death valley 100 miles from St. George. The plane was not demolished and the pilot saved about ten sacks of mail, and took gasoline from the ship and lighted flares, but without attracting attention.

Graham told his employer he remained with the ship two days before starting to the Indian reservation. He walked three days and nights through deep snowdrifts before reaching the Indian camp, where at first he said, the Indians were reluctant to approach him and offer assistance.

The flier said they finally gave him food and shelter after learning of his plight. He remained there three months, eating bear meat, venison and corn pone, he said, before the Indian agent came to the reservation from St. George.

By this time, Graham said, the snowdrifts had disappeared and it required only a short time to return to St. George and civilization.
