Superfund help cited

State Representative Robert Junell met with Texas Water Commission (TWC) and Fina Representatives on Wednesday, at the Highway 80 bridge, west of Colorado City, to learn about the oil seepage that possibly meets the Texas Registry Superfund Program requirements.

The State Superfund was established in 1985 to identify and respond directly to hazardous waste sites in Texas.

The primary purpose of the program is to protect human health and the environment through the removal, treatment, or containment of abandoned hazardous wastes.

The pool of oil seeping through the ground close to the Colorado River was discovered on April 22 by local Texas Highway Department and Department of Public Safety members.

TWC officials were in Colorado City Tuesday and again Wednesday to make an initial inspection of the problem area and to take samples.

The first step TWC officials take when alerted to a potential problem is to research existing information about the site.

Investigators usually use previous site inspection reports and existing articles pertaining to the site to determine when and by whom the site was abandoned.

Kenneth Krueger, TWC District 9 Manager, San Angelo, said that these efforts have been hampered. "Due to changes in jurisdiction, we are limited to files dating back to 1977."

The site was possibly abandoned in 1968.

TWC officials are reviewing legal documents and deed records to See SUPERFUND, page 2

Shooting reported

Dwayne Edward Jackson, 26, is being held at the Mitchell County Jail for his alleged involvement in a July 4th shooting incident involving his brother.

Larry Lee Jackson, 34, of 420 Cypress, was admitted to the Emergency Room of Mitchell County Hospital for the treatment of two small caliber gunshot wounds received to his right side.

Colorado City Police was summoned to the Hospital at 8:50 p.m.

Larry Lee Jackson was listed in

stable condition, according to Police reports which also indicate he refused to provide information on the incident.

Police Officers located a witness who identified the suspect.

Police Chief David Montgomery noted that Dwayne Jackson "was arrested for aggravated assault and placed in Mitchell County Jail."

"It is the intention that formal charges will be filed by the District Attorney's Office," Montgomery said.

TDC option proposed

State Representative Robert Junell met with civic leaders Wednesday to discuss possible steps needed to pursue a Texas Department of Corrections facility for Colorado City.

Junell noted that state prisons "are a growth industry" which offer stability.

"I don't care one way or the other (if Colorado City has a prison), Junell said, "unless you care. If you care, I care."

"Everyone has to be behind it," he said. "I would propose that the

first step be of getting a feel from the community."

"Also, talk to leaders in towns where prison bids have been accepted, such as Lamesa, Snyder, and Childress. Find out how prison operation has affected their towns."

Governor Ann Richards mentioned building 12,000 new beds in the State of the State Address, but attempts, most notably by Senator Turner, have introduced legislation attempting to raise that level to as high as

Stenholm visits Colorado City

U. S. Congressman Charles Stenholm spoke about America's problems and opportunities to a joint luncheon meeting of the Colorado City Kiwanis, Lions, and Rotary Clubs on Wednesday.

Stenholm is currently serving his 7th term in Washington for the 35 county district.

"As celebrations get underway for the July 4th holiday," Stenholm said, "we should take time to refocus on what made America great and make us 'We the people'."

"Operation Desert Storm changed us a little," he said. "As successful as the military operation was, we celebrated with a patriotic spirit again."

"Three years ago communism seemed to have buried the desire for democracy," Stenholm said. "But things in Czechoslovakia and Poland have changed. Democracy is again what countries thrive."

"It is with great wisdom that our forefathers drafted a constitution that still works so well," Stenholm commented.

"Other countries see something in the United States success story," Stenholm said. "It is the fact that we compromise for the greater unit of 'We the people'."

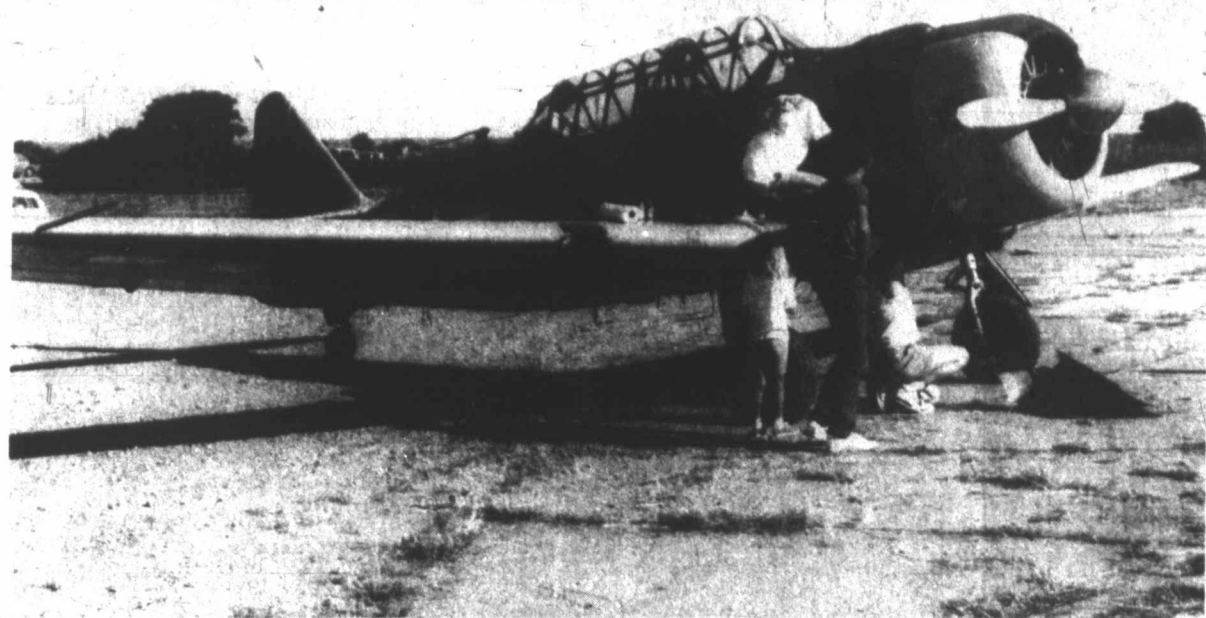
"We have the same type of problems or opportunities today that our forefathers had."

"The number one domestic issue is the Energy Policy," he stated. "It has failed America."

"The free market shifted energy purchases to the Mideast," he noted. "We shifted our dependence away from America. As recent events in the Middle East testify, the Energy Policy must be changed."

ascertain previous site ownership and potential responsible parties."

"Our job is to determine if an immediate response is required," Stennie Meadours, Head of the TWC Pre-Remedial Unit, said.

"There is a release at this location," TWC officials noted but declined to comment further on contamination levels.

Meadours reported that State Superfund action may be available if requirements of the plan are met.

These include; if hazardous waste enforcement has failed, the site has been abandoned, and the site failed to qualify for the federal list.

Data from the samples gathered by TWC officials will be given a

numerical rating on the Hazard Ranking System.

The EPA designed system takes into account - where contamination is being released, - the distance to human population, - and the potential effect on the area environment.

If the site ranks high, it may be added to the Texas State Registry of hazardous waste sites.

A site placed on the Texas Registry receives a more comprehensive evaluation, called a remedial investigation and feasibility study, to determine the extent and nature of the contamination.

As of December 1990, there are 29 sites on the Registry with eight additional sites proposed for the listing.

The nearest sites listed on the Registry are located in Odessa, Ector County, and Ranger, Eastland County. A proposed site is located in Munday, Knox County.

28,000.

A determination on the number of new beds is expected to come from the Special Session or Sessions this summer.

"There are two basic prison sizes," Junell said. "The 1000 bed facilities are minimum-medium security and the 2250 bed facilities are maximum security."

"If the community supports the program, I would suggest a formal proposal be sent for both size units," Junell said.

The formal proposal is a detailed

document listing specifications of the site being offered, which must be at least 300 acres.

Other sections of the proposal must list areas as diverse as utility services, roads, hospital capabilities, school district facts, college offerings, unemployment rates, and incentives.

"It would take an economic effort," Junell said, "to provide the land and utilities."

"If Colorado City does provide the support, I recommend hiring an attorney/lobbyist with experience in the application process," he noted.

"A broad segment of the community should be involved," Junell said.

The next Department of Corrections selection process is anticipated for November 1991.

7 fatalities reported on highways

7 fatalities were reported statewide for the holiday reporting period.

Department of Public Safety Trooper Ballarta of Midland reported that "the number of fatalities across the state was less than expected."

County Oil & Gas News

Four new producers with widely varying potentials have been completed in Mitchell County's Westbrook Field, about three miles northwest of Westbrook.

The wells are designated as the Nos. 1403, 1043, 1042 and 624 Southeast Westbrook Unit.

They showed ability to pump 36, 104, three and two barrels of oil per day, respectively.

Fina Oil and Chemical of Midland is the operator.

The wells were perforated to produce from 2,978 to 3,109 feet into the hole. Water production ranged from 78 to 136 barrels daily.

The No. 1 Barber "A" has been written off as a dry hole in Mitchell County's part of the East Howard-Iatan Field, about six miles southwest of Westbrook. The Astin Corp. of Dallas was the operator. The well probed to a dry bottom at 1,850 ft. TD in the T&PRR Survey Section 18 Block 28.

It was perforated to produce from two intervals 2,486 to 2,807 and 2,838 to 3,262 feet into the wellbore.

Water production totaled 58 barrels daily.

Anadarko Petroleum of Midland is the operator.

A depleted oiler has been plugged and abandoned at a location in the East Howard-Iatan Field, Mitchell County, four miles southwest of Iatan. With Mobil Producing of Midland as the operator, the well was known as the No. 67 Mary Foster. It was located in the T&PRR Survey Section 8 Block 29 with total depth of 2,810 feet.

Obituaries

James T. Hull

HEREFORD: James T. Hull, 60, President and General Manager of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, Inc., and Chairman of the Board of Golden Spread Electric Cooperative, died Wednesday morning in an Amarillo Hospital following a lengthy illness.

Mr. Hull was active in community affairs since coming to Hereford in 1969 and was recognized as a rural energy leader of Texas and the nation. Services will be at 10 a.m. Saturday at First United Methodist Church in Hereford with Rev. Doug Manning from Fellowship of Believers Assisted by Rev. Randall Stotts of Blue Springs, Missouri, with burial in West Park Cemetery in Hereford under the direction of Rix Funeral Directors of Hereford.

Mr. Hull was born in Dawson in Navarro County of East Texas on December 10, 1930. He graduated from Dawson High School in 1948. He graduated from Sam Houston State University at Huntsville in 1956 and did graduate work at Sam Houston and Texas Tech University. He also had a four-year tour of duty with the U. S. Air Force during the Korean conflict.

After graduating from college, Hull went to work for Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative at Colorado City. He was named manager of the Co-Op in 1964, then accepted the manager's job at Deaf Smith Rec in 1969.

Mr. Hull became known in national energy circles for his work in Deaf Smith County. He was one of the key leaders in organizing the Golden Spread Electric Cooperative, composed of 12 distribution Co-Ops on the high plains.

Hull conceived the idea of uniting all of the rural electric cooperatives into a single bargaining unit back in the 70's. His theory was to purchase electricity as a group.

The Golden Spread Co-Op was formed in January 1984 with Hull as president.

Texas State Senate and House resolutions recently commended Hull for his contributions to rural electrification and his role in the formation of the regional cooperative.

U. S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen and Rep. Larry Combest also sent letters of commendation.

Mr. Hull was a director at Hereford State Bank, a past president of Hereford Lions and Colorado City Jaycees, a past director of Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce, a former director of Water, Inc., an active volunteer worker in United Way and Boy Scouts of America, and an honorary Chapter Farmer and State Farmer of the FFA.

Mr. Hull was a member and officer in various professional organizations, including serving as chairman of the National Rec Resolutions Committee, a past president of Texas Electric Cooperatives, past chairman of the Texas Rural Electric Education Research Committee at Texas Tech, a past director of Texas Federation of Cooperatives, and a director of Wester Power Producers.

Mr. Hull was an active member of Texas Electric Cooperative Legislative Committee. He received a special resolution of the Texas Senate, from Senator Teel Bevins.

The resolution sponsored by Senator Bevins and John Montford recognized Mr. Hull for his vision and leadership in forming Golden Spread, a consumer owner wholesale power supplier.

Mr. Hull was recognized for his accomplishments by Rep. Combest in the U. S. Congressional Record for his accomplishments in the Head of Rural Electrification.

Mr. Hull married Mary Sue Tinsley on October 3, 1954 in Dallas.
