OLD PIPE USED TO SUBIRRIGATE FRAME GARDEN

"I asked my husband to put my frame garden in full view of the kitchen window, so I could watch it when I wash dishes by the window," Mrs. Powell Yates, food demonstrator of the Valley View home demonstration club said recently when showing her new frame garden to club members.

Subirrigation has been provided for the frame garden by the use of a drain pipe formerly used in a laundry. Nail holes are a short distance apart in the pipe to allow sufficient seepage of water.

One row of pipe was laid thru the center of the garden at a depth of 10 inches from the surface of the ground. The garden is built 4 feet wide and 12 feet long.

The frame enclosing the garden is 24 inches high at the back, which is the west side, and slanting to a height of 12 inches to the front. An inexpensive grade of muslin is used for the permanent cover to give protection from cold, wind, sand, and heat.

Deduction Tractor Received

It was revealed by M. E. Thompson of the county agent's office that the deduction tractor was received from the state AAA office Wednesday. The county office is notified of this factor as soon as 60 percent of the applications for payment are approved from a county, and has been received by other counties just a few days before checks arrived, so AAA checks should start arriving in Martin county soon.

The factor was 2.5 this year, which means that at cost 2 1/2 per cent of the total expected payment to administer the program within the county, such as measuring, clerical help and supplies. The factor was 2.2 in 1937, in this county. The total expected payment for the 1938 program in Martin county is \$235,000.

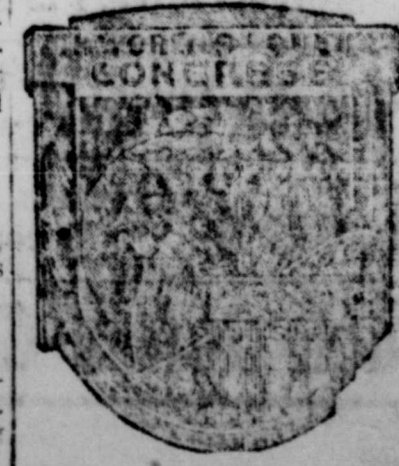

CITY OF STANTON, SANITARY SEWER ORDINANCE

PROVIDING FOR: CREATION OF THE OFFICES OF SUPERINTENDENT; PLUMBING INSPECTOR; DESCRIBING CHARACTER OF PLUMBING; BOND AND LICENSE FOR PLUMBERS; REGULATING PLUMBING WORK; SEWER CONNECTIONS; PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

AN ORDINANCE

SECTION 1:—There is hereby created the offices of Superintendent of Stanton Sewer System, and Plumbing Inspector of Stanton Sewer System, either of both of which offices may be held by one and the same person, and either or both may be filled by the Water Superintendent of the City of Stanton, Texas. The offices herein above created shall be filled by the City Council as soon as practicable after the passage of this ordinance and shall continue therein until removed by the City Council for cause, by death or resignation. All vacancies shall be filled by the City Council.

SECTION 2:—It shall be the duty of the Superintendent of Stanton Sewer System to maintain said Sewer System in operating condition at all times, and perform such other duties as the City Council may prescribe.

SECTION 3:—The term plumbing as used in this ordinance, is meant to cover and pertain to all plumbing of whatsoever nature or character, such as the installation, construction, reconstruction, and repair of gas piping, sanitary house plumbing, running supply lines, drain lines, and further described in the several plumbing ordinances now in force, and relating to the different kinds of plumbing to be done in the City of Stanton.

SECTION 4:—Any person, firm, or corporation desiring to engage in the plumbing business in the City of Stanton, shall, before engaging in the business of plumber in said City, execute to the City of Stanton, a good and sufficient bond, in the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000) Dollars, having two or more good sureties, or with a responsible surety company, conditioned to protect the City of Stanton, and also to protect any and all persons for whom such person, firm, or corporation does plumbing work, against all loss or damages, occasioned by the negligence of the principal therein, in failing to properly execute, and perfect all work done by such person, firm or corporation, or under his, their or its supervision in any way whatsoever. And further conditioned that such person, firm or corporation observe and comply with all Ordinances then existing, or at any time enacted by said City, relating to plumbers, or plumbing work. Such bond shall be subject to approval by the Mayor or City Council of the City of

Stanton. In case the bond herein provided for shall be decreased on account of any recovery which may be obtained, or arising out of the violation of any condition of the same, the Mayor and City Council shall require upon notice of such fact, an additional bond to be given by such person, firm or corporation, in accordance with this Ordinance, in any amount sufficient when added to the unexpired amount of the original bond given by such person, firm or corporation, to at all times equal to the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000) Dollars.

SECTION 5:—The City may for itself, or any person or persons, sue on these bonds in any Court having jurisdiction, to recover for any injury, or damages done any person, or persons, caused by reason of the failure or refusal of any person, firm or corporation to comply with the conditions of any Ordinance of the City, relating to plumbers, or plumbing work, or for failure or refusal to pay any and all fees required by any of the Ordinances, pertaining to plumbers, or plumbing work to be done in the City of Stanton.

The bond herein required shall expire on the first day of January following the date of approval by the Mayor and City Council, and thereafter on the first day of January of each year, a new bond in form and substance as herein required, shall be given by any such person, firm or corporation, to cover all plumbing work as shall be done during the year, beginning on January, the first, and no person, firm or corporation, shall do any plumbing work in the said City, until they or it, has furnished the said bond, and the same has been approved, as a valid and sufficient bond, by the Mayor and City Council of Stanton, Texas.

SECTION 6:—Upon approval of said bond by the Mayor and City Council, the person firm or corporation, desiring to do plumbing work in the City of Stanton shall file the approved bond with the City Secretary, and at the same time shall obtain from the City Secretary of the City of Stanton, a license which shall run until the first day of January, next succeeding its issuance, unless sooner revoked, and shall not be transferable, in the event of the dissolution of any partnership, firm or corporation holding such license, the member retaining such license, shall be required to renew the license, and also renew the bond as herein provided for, before doing any plumbing work as herein provided for.

The person, firm or corporation obtaining such license, shall pay to the City Secretary of the City of Stanton, the sum of Ten (\$10.00) Dollars, as an annual license fee, therefor, provided, however, if said license is issued after January the first of any year, the license fee shall be that proportionate remaining part of the year, computed from the first day of the quarter in

which the same is issued.

The bond and license herein provided for shall, when properly executed, entitle the person, firm, or corporation, holding the same to engage in the plumbing business, and to do all kind and character of plumbing work, as is described in the City Ordinances, so long as the bond and license are in full force and effect.

SECTION 7:—No person, firm, or corporation, shall do, or have done, any plumbing work of any character in the City of Stanton, until a permit to do such work, has been secured from the City Secretary, describing the kind and character of plumbing to be done, and the exact location of the work, provided, however, that no permit shall be necessary in making of minor repairs, stopping leaks in pipes, traps, or cracks in fixtures, sitting in place, replacing, repairing, broken fixtures or appliances. Provided that such repairs are not so extensive as to change the character of the plumbing, or its connections, in which case a permit shall be necessary.

Anyone desiring a connection to the Stanton Sewer System shall apply to the City Secretary for a permit to so connect. It shall be the duty of the City Secretary to collect from the said applicant one month's service in advance, and the Secretary shall notify the Plumbing Inspector of such application, and it shall be the duty of the Plumbing Inspector to inspect and pass on all such plumbing and if said Inspector finds any plumbing being done in an imperfect manner, it shall be his duty to stop same until same shall have been properly remedied, and to this end he shall have the authority to enter any house at any time for the purposes herein set forth, and he shall perform such other duties as the City Council may prescribe.

SECTION 8:—Each applicant for a permit to connect with the Stanton Sewer System shall, at the time of obtaining said permit to so connect, pay to the City Secretary the sum of One (\$1.00) Dollar for Plumbing Inspector's fee.

SECTION 9:—The opening of a "Y" or any other part of the Sewer mains or laterals shall not be made except in the presence of the Superintendent of the Stanton Sewer System, or his duly authorized assistant or agent.

All excavation and backfilling of ditches where tap is made shall be done by the plumber in charge.

Wherever a connection is to be made where there is no "Y" the main or lateral shall be tapped and connection made by the Plumbing Inspector.

SECTION 10:—Compensation of the Superintendent and Inspector of Plumbing of Stanton Sewer System shall be determined by the City Council.

SECTION 11:—At all restaurants, hotels, lunch stands, boarding houses, and all other places where meals are cooked and/or served the public and having connection to the Stanton Sewer System, standard grease traps shall be installed under the direction of the Plumbing Inspector.

All garages, service stations, and other establishments having grease and/or wash racks shall have standard sand traps, with not less than 8-inch water seal.

SECTION 12:—All service charges shall be paid at the office of the City Secretary of the City of Stanton, Texas, between the first and tenth day of each month and in advance, and in the event such charges are not so paid sewer service shall be discontinued, and in the event sewer service shall be discontinued for failure to pay service charges, service shall not be reinstated except upon payment of all past due service charges, and in addition thereto a fee of Five (\$5.00) Dollars for re-nstatement of service.

SECTION 13:—Each building connected with the Stanton Sewer System shall be supplied with separate plumbing fixtures and shall be directly connected with the Sewer System; EXCEPT by special permission of the Mayor or City Council, in cases where the property to be connected, does not extend to a street or alley where there is a sewer main. The Mayor or City Council may give special per-

mission to the property owner by written agreement to make connection to the Sewer System.

SECTION 14:—All plumbing shall be properly trapped and ventilated before connections shall be made to the Sewer System. That portion of the house drain inside the foundation walls and underneath the buildings and two feet outside of area of the foundation walls shall be constructed of standard cast iron soil pipe and fittings. House drains shall be securely anchored to the walls, not less than five feet apart or laid in trenches of uniform grade, or suspended to the floor timbers, by strong hangers. Drains and soil pipes shall have a uniform fall of not less than one-fourth inch per foot toward the sewer line.

All places having one or more water closets shall have at least one four inch drain, and vent or stack pipe connected as close as practicable to the trap, and shall continue on through the roof to a point at least one foot above the roof, not closer than 15 feet of any opening of any building. All other fixtures shall have standard size traps and waste lines, and any such fixtures set more than four feet from the main stack shall have separate vent pipe which shall not be smaller than the waste pipe and shall continue on through the roof, or return to the main stack, and join at a point at least one foot above the lowest waste pipe connection. Black iron, lead, or galvanized pipe may be used in making small vent connections.

All drain line connections shall be made with "Y's", one-sixth, one-eighth or one-sixteenth bends. Tees and crosses may be used only in vent pipe connections. All drain lines shall be run in a straight course to the sewer connection. If necessary to change course, "Y's" and one-eighth bends shall be used. All house drains must have proper clean outs.

The property owner and plumber, either or both, shall be responsible to the City of Stanton, Texas, for any injury the plumber may cause to the City's Sewer System, or any street or alley in making connections.

All paving or dirt removed from streets or alleys in making sewer connections shall be replaced by the plumber in charge, in as good condition as it was, and maintained in good condition by him for a period of sixty days.

In the course of construction, the plumber in charge shall keep all ditches and holes properly guarded with lights and barricades, and keep the ends of all pipes plugged, in order to prevent injury to any persons, or to the Sewer System.

SECTION 15:—No rain water pipes, range boiler, or any other pipes used to convey water or substances of like character, shall be connected to the Sewer System; Except pipes necessary to the plumbing system.

SECTION 16:—It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to throw or deposit, or cause to be thrown or deposited in any vessel, or receptacle, manhole, lamp hole or clean-out connected to the Sewer System, any newspaper garbage, hair, fruit, ashes, vegetable peeling, rags, rubber, or of any kind cotton, cinders, offal, dead birds or animals, malt, mash, or any other substance having a tendency to obstruct the flow of sewerage, or injury to the Sewer System, including the pump well and disposal plant; Except faeces, urine and the necessary toilet paper and liquid slops.

SECTION 17:—No plumbing work or drains shall be covered, or concealed until same has been inspected and accepted by the Plumbing Inspector.

Application for inspection must be made to the Plumbing Inspector, when any work is ready for inspection at least four hours before inspection is desired. The Plumbing Inspector shall use approved methods in making test of all plumbing work, and all joints must be made air and water tight, by the plumber in charge. And when the work has been completed, properly inspected, tested and approved by the Inspector, the Inspector shall issue a certificate of acceptance to the plumber in charge, and no plumbing fixtures shall be used until the

plumber, or owner has obtained a certificate from the Plumbing Inspector.

No permit for basement drain shall be granted until the owner of the building has executed a written agreement releasing the City of Stanton, Texas, from any and all damages that may result from basement being flooded by the stoppage of sewers, which agreement in writing shall be filed with the City Secretary.

SECTION 19:—Any person, firm, or corporation violating any section, or provision of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction in the Corporation Court of the City of Stanton, Texas, of such misdemeanor shall be fined in any sum not less than One (\$1.00) Dollar, nor more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, and each day shall constitute a separate offense as such violation continues.

SECTION 20:—Nothing in this Ordinance shall be deemed to repeal any existing Ordinances of the City of Stanton, Texas, except where points in other Ordinances are in direct conflict, but shall be cumulative thereof.

This Ordinance shall be in force and take effect upon and after due publication thereof.

SECTION 21:—By reason of the fact that the Mayor and City Council considers a public necessity exists, and the passage of this Ordinance necessary for the protection, safety, happiness, and the preservation of the public health of its citizens, it is hereby declared to be an emergency measure, demanding that the rule requiring Ordinances to be read at more than one meeting, be suspended, and that this Ordinance take effect immediately after passage, and due publication. And it is so Ordained.

Passed and approved this the 7th day of February, A. D. 1939.

Mary Katherine is a junior this year.

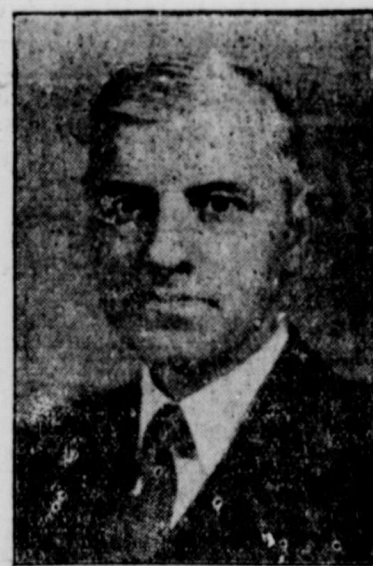

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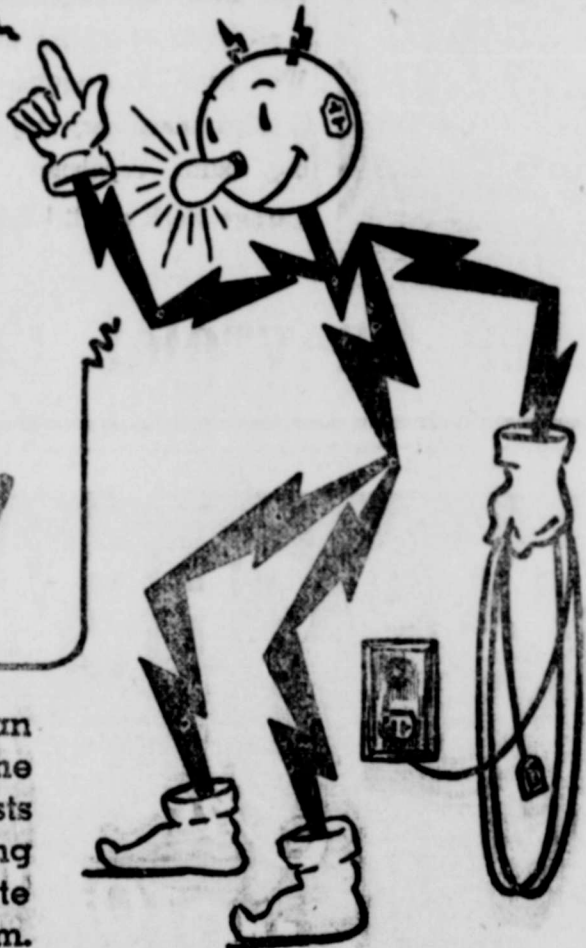
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
