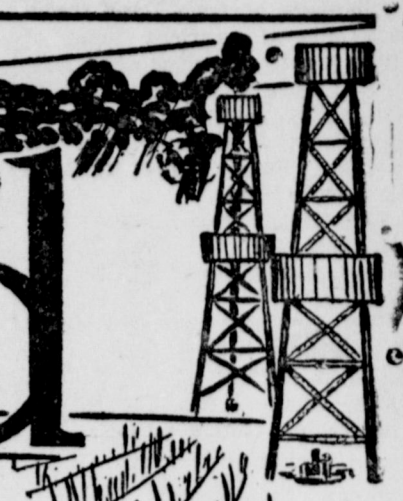

DISSATISFACTION IN THE AIR

I have been asked to say something nice about Democrats.

About the nicest thing I know of at the moment is that my whole family has supported the Democratic party as long as I can remember and by some quirk of fate all my close friends are Democrats too.

My only complaint with the party this year is that I simply don't care for the candidates, with one exception, and she is a local person. Before someone fusses at me for making such a sweeping statement, let me broaden the swath even further and say that I couldn't work up much enthusiasm for any of the nine or 10 who ran for the Democratic presidential nomination. That leaves with a predicament I've never faced before, since I'm not a bit more pleased with the Republicans' offerings either.

Of course this is all personal opinion. In my case I think what's wrong is that John Kennedy spoiled me to a youthful, exciting, intellectual personality, and Lyndon Johnson had the air of a strong, deliberate leader, with the added factor of sounding like someone from home.

Both had their weaknesses, and both made mistakes, yet there was something about them that instilled great confidence in some of us. No doubt the very traits that made me trust them caused others to turn away. More than once I heard New Yorkers say they didn't like the "Kennedy charm" or that they found the "Johnson drawl" offensive.

Unfortunately, personality does play a large part in elections, whether we're aware of it or not. Oddly enough, I find both top candidates equally blah, which may be good. It is forcing me to listen more carefully to both sides and to weigh the issues as issues and not as mere political frills.

Voting will be difficult for me this year, and I've heard too many other people say the same thing to feel bad about admitting it.

Those of us who do agree about having an election year dilemma can't change recent events or political personalities to suit us, and it is now a certainty that there is no strong third party candidate as an alternative.

Nor can we simply avoid going to the polls. Inaction never has solved much, if anything. About all we can do is to be as informed and as objective as possible and then see to it that this situation doesn't recur.

Again, this is strictly personal opinion. Those who feel strong enthusiasm for their candidates are, in a way, fortunate to have made their decisions. On the other hand, my current indecision has taught me how difficult it is to be thoroughly objective, and I wonder if we aren't all prone to wearing blinders in election years.

Whatever the case may be, let us hope the better men win. To that degree, at least, we are all united.

Bird Lore

A friend related this story to me about our little wren that is noted for sticking his bill in other birds' business. The cardinal and wren were nesting in his backyard about 10 feet apart. The cardinals were already feeding their young but apparently the wren eggs hadn't hatched yet.

So, Papa Wren decided to help feed the cardinals. There was no doubt about it since the family watched him make many trips to feed them.

We are fortunate indeed to have three members of the wren family in our area—the house wren, the Bewick's and the Carolina wren.

Wrens are small, restless, brownish birds and have finely barred, narrow rounded tails that are often cocked upward. They live almost entirely on spiders, grasshoppers, caterpillars, beetles and bugs. Our little Bewick's wren relishes peanut butter balls and snut placed on my window ledge.

Under wild conditions the nesting site of a wren is usually a cavity made by a woodpecker. Now a bird box or almost any sort of cavity about our homes is preferred. Our little Bewick's wren nested in a house placed under the eaves of our house.

My friend had a Carolina wren nest in an old straw purse. Be sure the entrance hole is no larger than a quarter, so the house sparrow cannot enter. You may wonder how the adult birds ever get in and out through the tiny entrance—but they do, quickly and easily, many times a day feeding their brood until the children are able to find their own food.

The male wren begins his song early in the morning and I have read that he presents over 200 recitals a day. Fortunately, his cheerful song is the kind you can enjoy all day without becoming tired of hearing it.

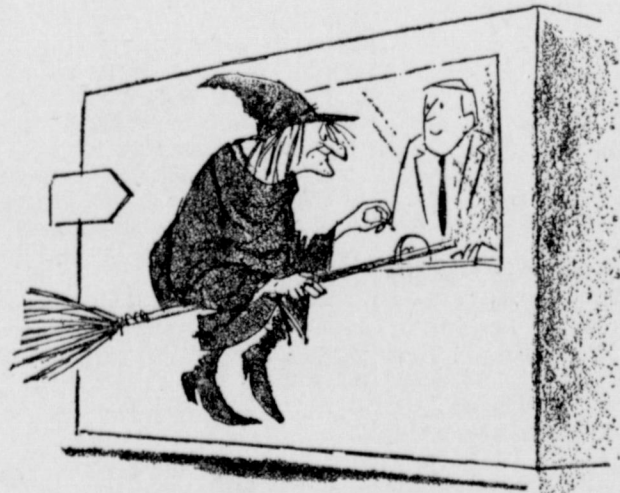

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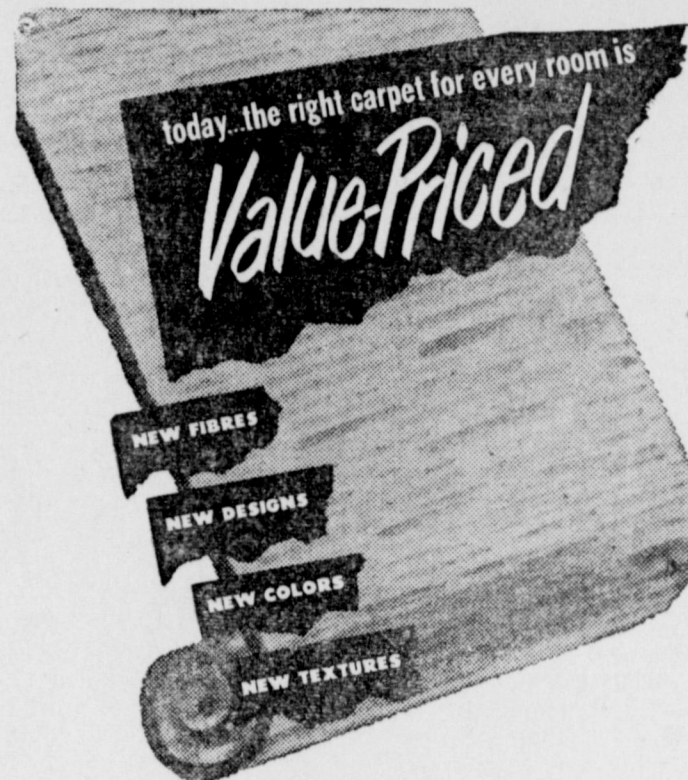

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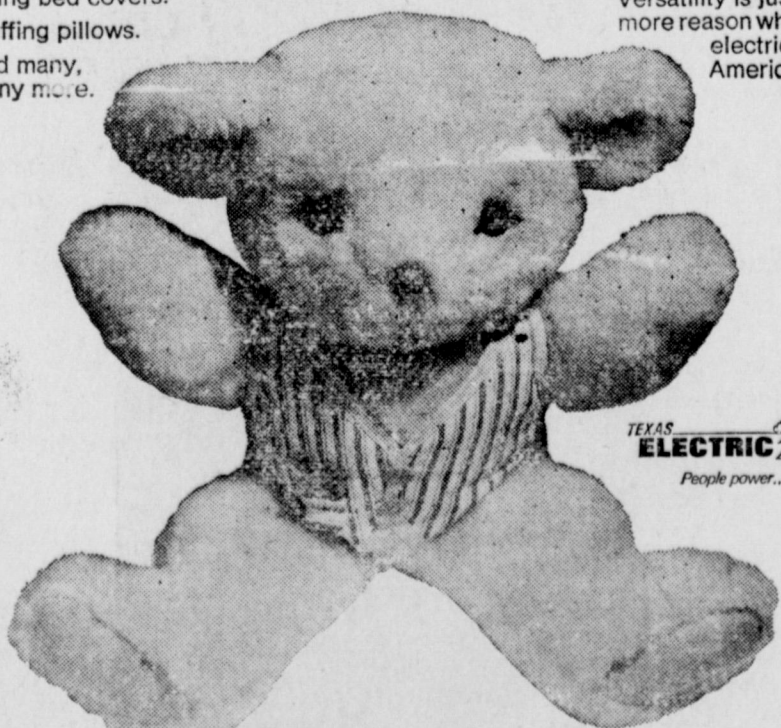
