The annual meeting of the Court-house Singing Convention will be held Sunday at the Dawson County Courthouse in Lamesa. It was announced by the president, Tracy Campbell.

Farmers Must Report All Sharecroppers For Parity Payments On 1940 Crops

Since all farm operators will be signing their 1940 applications for parity payments in the near future, it is very important that all operators be very careful to report all sharecroppers or persons interested in crop acreages on all applications for payment. All sharecroppers must be shown on the application and may sign the application as an interested party regardless of any previous or outside agreement with the operator.

A number of cases are being reported where persons are working on the farm for a certain wage and in addition the farm operator is allowing them a certain crop acreage. These persons are sharecroppers and must be shown on the application for payment for both parity and conservation payments.

In the event the farm operator fails to report all persons interested in crop acreages and it later develops that other interested parties

should have been shown and adjustment application must be submitted and if the operator refuses to refund the amount due the sharecropper the operator will be placed on the debtors list in the State AAA Office and the indebtedness will be withheld from any AAA check due the operator at a later time.

The following is an extract from the 1940 Agricultural Conservation Program regulations relating to division of payments and deductions: "The net payment or net deduction computed for any farm for special and general crops shall be divided among landlords, tenants, and sharecroppers in the same proportion that such persons are entitled, as of the time of harvest, to share in the proceeds of such crop grown on the farm in 1940."

Lamesans Return From Long Trip

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Site Is Three Miles Southeast Of Discovery

An announcement of a great deal of interest to Lamesa and Dawson County people was made this week by the Magnolia Petroleum Company. They will seek an extension to the Cedar Lake Field, over into Dawson County. The operations were scheduled to get under way Wednesday. The test will be south-east of the Standinold discovery well and will be one and one-half miles north in Dawson County. It is about 14 miles northwest of Lamesa.

The extension try will be known as No. 1 Sandhage hole, and it will be drilled with rotary 2200 feet from the south and west lines of section 110 block M. EL&R survey, 14 miles northwest of Lamesa and only a mile and a half east of the Gaines-Dawson line. The test is slated to go to 5,000 feet unless production of sulphur water in the lime is encountered at a lesser depth. Operations were scheduled to start August 7.

Further north in Dawson, Ray A. Albaugh of Lamesa No. 2 John Robinson, 660 feet out of the northwest corner of section 54, block M. EL&R survey, is drilling a hard lime at 5,355 feet, carrying over 4,400 feet of sulphur water in the hole. Rain-bow show of oil and odor of gas was logged at 5,334 to 5,335 feet. Five and one-half inch casing, set on shoulder at 5,256 feet, successfully shut off water encountered higher in the lime section, but more water was found at 5,257 feet, with increases to present depth.

Standinold Oil and Gas Company No. 3 American Warehouse Company, section 5, block H. D&W survey, northwest edge test in the Cedar Lake pool of Northeastern Gaines County, was reported Monday to have swabbed 759 barrels of oil in three hours, natural, from total depth of 4,740 feet in lime. The test was shot with 720 quarts of nitro from 4,600 feet to total depth and was moving in unit to clean out.

Standinold No. 1 Bremond, section 3, block C-39, P&L survey, north offset to the discovery well in the Cedar Lake pool, was drilling below 4,258 feet in lime and anhydrite.

Standinold No. 1-B Riley, section 9, block H. D&W survey, on the northeast edge of the pool, was building derrick.

Dawson County Ray A. Albaugh No. 2 John Robinson, section 54, block M. EL&R survey, well at 5,355 feet in Northwest corner of section 54, block M. EL&R survey, was drilling a hard lime at 5,355 feet, carrying over 4,400 feet of sulphur water in the hole. Rain-bow show of oil and odor of gas was logged at 5,334 to 5,335 feet. Former Lamesan Declared Insane In Wife Murder

The bodies of a woman who was hanged to death with a noose and a man who was shot to death, were found in a field near Lamesa Tuesday. The bodies were found by a patrolman who was on duty at the time. The man was identified as a former Lamesan and the woman as his wife. The man was declared insane and the woman was found to be dead.

Mrs. Bessie Johnson, 25, was killed Feb. 1 in the bedroom of their home. Johnson's throat was slashed but he recovered.

The letters introduced into evidence in Criminal District Court, revealed that the slain spouse had written her relatives, telling of her husband's mental condition, and suggesting that he be placed in a state hospital in Galveston. The first letter was dated Jan. 27, only four days before Mrs. Johnson was killed.

A W. Johnson of Tulsa, a brother of the slain man, testified that he had talked Johnson into going to a hospital only two weeks before the slaying occurred.

Dr. W. T. Johnson who had been treating Johnson for several years prior to the slaying, testified that the defendant was insane at the time and is insane now. This testimony was corroborated by Dr. A. F. Tasci, county psychiatrist of Dallas County.

Both said Johnson was suffering from dementia praecox and had illusions of persecution.

Garner Johnson a former citizen of Lamesa and employee of both local newspapers, is well known in Lamesa, having lived here for several months.

Mr. Morris expects to be gone from Lamesa about a week, he states today. The school will open Monday morning and run for five days.

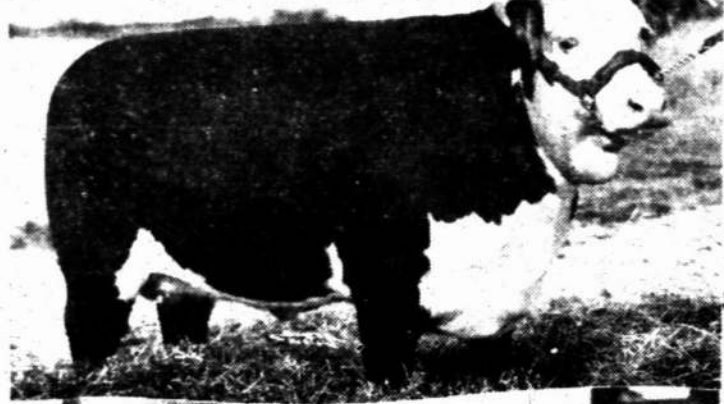

SO THAT THE PEOPLE MAY KNOW

A Statement of Policy by the Examining and Supervising Board of Plumbers:

On July 1, 1940 the City Commission of Lamesa created the "Examining and Supervising Board of Plumbers" as made mandatory by the laws of the State of Texas in the case of towns and cities of more than five thousand population. The following members were appointed by the Commission:

R. H. Williams, president; S. F. Reynolds, secretary; E. J. Tanner, city plumbing inspector; Dr. J. C. Lovell, city health officer; and J. A. Pruitt, city engineer.

The law provides that the board shall consist of a master plumber, a journeyman plumber, the city health officer, the city plumbing inspector, and the city engineer.

Following its organization, two local men, plumbers residing and following their trade in Lamesa, came before the board and took the examination as required by law.

It was the opinion of the board that these two men did not show sufficient technical knowledge and skill to be granted a license in accordance with the law.

We, the undersigned, fail to see why, because one taking such an examination should claim extenuating circumstances because at the time of examination, he spilled soldering lead on the floor because of alleged "nervousness."

The board refused to grant licenses to the two men.

The City Commission, at a later meeting, asked the Examining and Supervising Board of Plumbers to permit the two aforementioned plumbers to practice plumbing until some later date, when a new examination could be given them.

WE, THE UNDERSIGNED, BELIEVE THAT TO DO THIS WOULD BE TO VIOLATE THE LETTER AND SPIRIT OF THE STATE LAW.

We believe that the examination given the two aforementioned men was a fair one in every respect. It was not a rigorous or difficult examination, but one of a minimum grade of difficulty.

We believe the people of Lamesa are entitled to protection of health, especially insofar as competent plumbing can guarantee it.

The action of the board is open to inspection by the citizens of Lamesa. If any person desires to inspect samples of work submitted by the two aforementioned men for examination by the board, he may do so. If any person desires to re-submit these samples to ANY COMPETENT BOARD OF PLUMBING EXAMINERS IN ANY OTHER TOWN IN TEXAS, WE WOULD BE GLAD TO HAVE HIM DO SO, AND WE WILL ABIDE BY THE DECISION OF THAT BOARD.

We fail to see why this disagreement regarding the outcome of these examinations should have become an issue. The law is plainly stated, and the board, in refusing to grant these licenses only followed the terms of the law.

But the fact is that it HAS BECOME AN ISSUE, AND WE BELIEVE THE PUBLIC IS ENTITLED TO KNOW THE TRUTH, THE WHOLE TRUTH AND NOTHING BUT THE TRUTH REGARDING THIS ISSUE.

The City Commission has the perfect right to dissolve the present board and appoint another composed of other persons qualified as members. We do not believe

the City Commission has any right to ask the members of the board to violate the laws of the state by permitting unqualified plumbers to practice their trade AND PERHAPS JEOPARDIZE THE HEALTH OF LAMESA CITIZENS.

WE NOW INVITE THE CITIZENS OF LAMESA TO READ THE LEGAL PROVISIONS INVOLVED IN THIS CASE.

THE LAW WAS UPHELD IN A STATE COURT OF CIVIL APPEALS IN THE YEAR 1926, IN THE CASE OF WRIGHT ET AL VS. PARRISH. We reproduce here articles of the state law regarding the organization of Examining and Supervising Boards of Plumbers, to be found in "Vernon's Texas Statutes, Chapter 7, page 267, edition of 1936:

"Art. 1076. (986).—Every city in this State, however organized, having underground sewers or cesspools, shall pass ordinances regulating the tapping of said sewers and cesspools, regulating house draining and plumbing.

"Art. 1077. (990).—In any such city, where there is no city inspector of plumbing provided for by special charter, the governing body shall elect such inspector of plumbing, who shall hold office for such time as fixed by such board. Such inspector of plumbing may be the city engineer, if the board see fit to elect him.

"Art. 1078. (987-8-9).—Such cities shall create a board for the examination and supervising of plumbers, to provide for an inspection of plumbing. Members of said board shall receive no compensation for services on said board. The said board shall consist of the following five persons: A member of the local board of health, if there be such a board of health, and if not, then the city physician or the city health officer, the city engineer, the city inspector of plumbing, a master plumber of not less than ten years active and continuous experience as a plumber, and one journeyman plumber of not less than five years of such active and continuous experience. The mayor and the governing body shall regulate the term each member shall serve; they shall fill all vacancies for the unexpired term of the member whose place is filled.

"Art. 1081. (997).—Except in cities of less than five thousand inhabitants, a license shall not be issued to any person to carry on or work at the business of plumbing, until he has appeared before an examining or supervising board for examination and registration and shall have successfully passed the required examination."

The following provision is made for punishment in violation of the above articles, and is to be found in "Vernon's Texas Statutes, Penal Code Section, Chapter 4, page 1594, (1936 edition):

"Art. 122 (131).—Any person, whether as master plumber, employing, or journeyman plumber, engaged in, working at, or conducting the business of plumbing without license as provided by law, shall be fined not less than twenty-five nor more than two hundred and fifty dollars."

WE EARNESTLY HOPE THAT EVERY PUBLIC-SPRITED, FAIR-MINDED CITIZEN OF LAMESA WILL GIVE DUE CONSIDERATION TO THE FACTS IN THIS CASE AND THEN THINK AS HIS MIND AND CONSCIENCE DICTATES. WE ASK NOTHING MORE.

Approximately 43 percent of all the beef cattle, 71 percent of the sheep, and 4 percent of the angora goats in the United States are on rangeland, and the remainder on farms.

Slumping 16.4 per cent from the like period of 1939, livestock shipments of 1940 have totaled only 1,074,000 head, compared with 1,274,000 in 1939.

Portworth stockyards and out-of-state points from the first six months of 1940 have totaled only 362,788 carloads, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

Falling cattle movement accounts for most of the decline, the bureau report indicates, while sheep shipments show the only gain.

The June movement of livestock followed the 1940 trend, dropping 17.9 per cent from June 1939. A total of 2,212 carloads of cattle moved, a drop of 23.5 per cent; calves 799 cars, down 12.2 per cent; hogs, 583 cars, down 21.6 per cent; and sheep, 1,016, down 5.1 per cent.

Shipments for the first half of the year include 21,745 cars of cattle, a decline of 24 per cent from the corresponding period of 1939; calves 5,066, down 5 per cent; hogs 4,312, down 9 per cent; and sheep 5,155, up 9.4 per cent.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article 8, Section 9, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section 9-A; providing that the Commissioners Court of Red River County, after a majority vote of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein, shall have the authority to levy a tax not to exceed Twenty-five (25) Cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for a period not exceeding fifteen (15) years for the purpose of refunding the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of the County by the issuance of bonds under the provisions of the General Laws regulating the refunding of outstanding debts of the County; providing for the necessary proclamation, and appropriating funds to defray the expenses of the proclamation, publication, and election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 8, Section 9, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto another Section to be known as Section 9-A, which shall read as follows:

"Section 9-A. Upon the vote of a majority of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein so authorizing the Commissioners Court of Red River County, Texas, may levy an annual tax not to exceed Twenty-five (25) Cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for a period not to exceed fifteen (15) years for the purpose of refunding all the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County and issue bonds under the provisions of the General Law regulating the issuance of bonds to refund said indebtedness.

"At such election, the Commissioners Court shall submit for adoption the proposition of whether such outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County shall be refunded into bonds, the amount of special tax to be levied, and the number of years said tax is to be levied. The funds raised by such taxes shall not be used for purposes other than those specified in the plan submitted to the voters.

"The provisions of this Section 9-A shall apply only to Red River County; and the provisions hereof shall be self-enacting without the necessity of an enabling act of the Legislature of the State of Texas, but shall become effective immediately after the official canvass of the results has been made and it is determined that this Amendment has been adopted by a majority of the voters of the State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution providing that the Commissioners Court of Red River County may, upon a vote of the qualified electors therein, levy a tax and issue bonds to refund the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation and to have necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election, which shall be refunded to the State of Texas by Red River County out of its General Fund or any other available fund. Provided that no election shall be held until Red River County shall first deposit with the State Treasurer the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) with which to pay such expenses of said election.

Home For Cotton Is Planned By Government

A model "cotton home" where Federal agencies may exhibit their plans for every known use of cotton in an effort to raise America's standard of living for both the 10 million cotton producers and the 130 million cotton consumers, may result from current conversations at Washington.

This demonstration of cotton's contribution to the American standard of living is still in the preliminary stages, but its sponsors, the National Cotton Council believe it will help cotton make a major advance into both industrial and household mass markets for cotton. According to Mrs. Bernice Clayton, specialist in home improvement for the A. and M. College Extension Service, such a home could have: cotton insulation walls covered inside and out with cotton fabric; a roof covered with cotton-reinforced concrete shingles; furnishings including cotton rugs, drapes, shades and curtains; cotton upholstery and slip-covers; cotton mattresses, blankets, spreads, sheets and pillowcases; cotton towels and bathmats, table and dish cloths; groceries packaged in cotton bags; a larger stocked with cottonseed salad oil, margarine, and shortening; cotton clothes for the wardrobe closets.

Thiamin Is New Vitamin B1

Within a few months the word thiamin or vitamin B1 will be just as familiar in the lay person's vocabulary as vitamin or aspartophene or submarine in the equities. Nora Ellen Elliott, specialist in food preparation for the A. and M. College Extension Service.

She admits that even though the scientists do not know all there is to know about this vitamin they are certain it must be provided in the well-balanced diet.

Among the sources which contain thiamin in considerable quantity are whole-grain cereals such as rice, wheat, oats, barley and brown rice. Other excellent sources are dried beans, dried peas, soybeans, and peanuts and lean pork. Green peas and green lima beans, both on the market in large quantities now, furnish good supplies of thiamin and other vegetables now in season also contain some.

However, this point should be remembered, Miss Elliott says, that the method of cooking makes a

great difference in the amount of thiamin people actually get from vegetables. More of the thiamin is retained if the vegetables are cooked in as little water as possible and if they are taken off the fire as soon as they are tender. As much as 15 percent of the thiamin from vegetables may be dissolved in the cooking water, and this can be saved if "pot liquor" is served with the vegetables.

Thiamin losses are even greater if vegetables are cooked with soda. Soda should never be used in cooking vegetables.

Dr. Cox Says:-

Pellagra, while not a communicable disease, is of concern to the State Health Department since the Texas pellagra mortality over the last five years shows an annual rate of 697, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health officer.

"Pellagra is a dietary deficiency disease caused by insufficiency of the proper foods. The disease infects a person slowly and may not be recognized until the victim begins to have a sore mouth, stomach trouble, and reddening and scaling of the skin. When these symptoms appear, the disease has been present for some time," Dr. Cox said. The longer period of time a person has been infected with pellagra the harder it is to cure, so one should be on the lookout for the early symptoms such as nervousness, indigestion and burning of the feet and hands. In its late stages, pellagra may be so severe as to affect the mind.

Pellagra is not contagious. If a person maintains the right dietary and is not otherwise diseased, he is in no danger even if he lives with a pellagra patient.

The prevention of pellagra is easier than its cure. Simplest rule of prevention is careful attention to the diet at all times. To make sure that your daily quota of foods includes pellagra-prevention vitamins, it should include plenty of milk, some fresh meat, and as many fresh vegetables as possible. Tomatoes, whole wheat products, salmon, and brewer's yeast are particularly valuable for their pellagra-prevention qualities.

Having provided the essentials in your dietary, you should by all means consult your family physician when you need specialized assistance in diet correction or procedures.

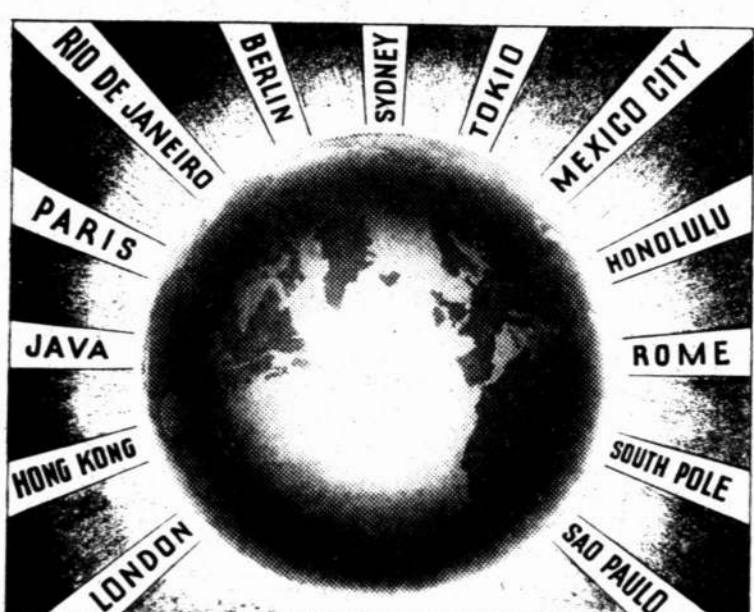

Texans Prominent In AAA Program

Texans and Oklahomans play a major part in the administration of the Federal farm program, according to Texas delegates who have just returned from Washington, D. C., where the annual national conference of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration was held.

Mr. E. N. Holmgren of College Station, state Triple-A administrative officer and spokesman for the Texas group said he was particularly impressed by the number of men from the southwestern portion of the Southern Region who are in key positions in administration of the farm program.

"At the top of course," Holmgren said, "we have Grover B. Hill of Amarillo, the Assistant Secretary of Agriculture, who is as much at home in the range country as he is in his Washington office. Hill helped write the AAA range conservation program with which most ranchmen in Texas are cooperating."

Since Hill's promotion, the range program in the Southern Region has been under the supervision of Fred R. Merrifield, of Stillwater, Oklahoma, the administrator continued. In addition to the range program, Merrifield also handles wheat and western conservation practices. Working in close cooperation with him are Morris P. 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Cement Stocks Rise In June

Despite curtailed production, stocks on hand at Texas cement plants rose 9.5 per cent during June. June production totaled 672,000 barrels, 11.3 per cent down from May. Production still was 25.1 per cent higher than in June of last year, and stocks 30.5 per cent higher, while shipments declined 7.8 per cent.

Texas Chickens Lay More Eggs During June

Texas chickens out did themselves laying during June.

Carload shipments of Texas eggs to other states jumped 193 per cent over June 1939 to total 120 cars.

Poultry forwardings remained about the same 42 cars. Turkey shipments of 19 cars were five and a third times greater than those of June, 1939, but chicken shipments—23 cars—were down 43 per cent.

Receipts of eggs from other states totaled 12 cars, compared with 8 in June a year ago.

University Of Texas Wants Old Magazines

Remember that old box of magazines in the attic? Don't take a sudden spurt of ambition one of these days and burn the lot—instead, send them to the University of Texas library.

That's the plea of Donald Coney, University Librarian, who points out that popular magazines, even the pulp-paper ones like "Argosy," have their value to University research students.

"They mirror their own times," he declared. "In tracing a record of the changing times they are quite worth having."

Due to the expense involved, the library has not been able to keep up files of "Colliers," "Liberty," "Ladies Home Journal," "Woman's Home Companion," and others of similar nature, he explained.

"But there should be such files in many Texas homes, and we would appreciate knowing of their whereabouts," he said.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to be known as Section 30b of Article 16; providing that the provisions of Article 16, Section 30, of the Texas Constitution limiting the duration of all offices not fixed by the Constitution to two (2) years, shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipalities that are placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of the Civil Service Law applicable thereto; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of such amendment; making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding

thereto a new Section to Article 16 to be known as Section 30b which shall read as follows:

"Section 30b. Wherever by virtue of statute or charter provisions appointive offices of any municipality are placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service and rules are set up governing appointment to and removal from such offices, the provisions of Article 16, Section 30, of the Texas Constitution limiting the duration of all offices not fixed by the Constitution to two (2) years shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of the Civil Service Law or charter provisions applicable thereto."

Sec. 2. Such proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas at the general election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that Article 16, Section 30, of the Constitution shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipality placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service."

Those voters opposing said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that Article 16, Section 30, of the Constitution shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipality placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service."

Sec. 3. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or as much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

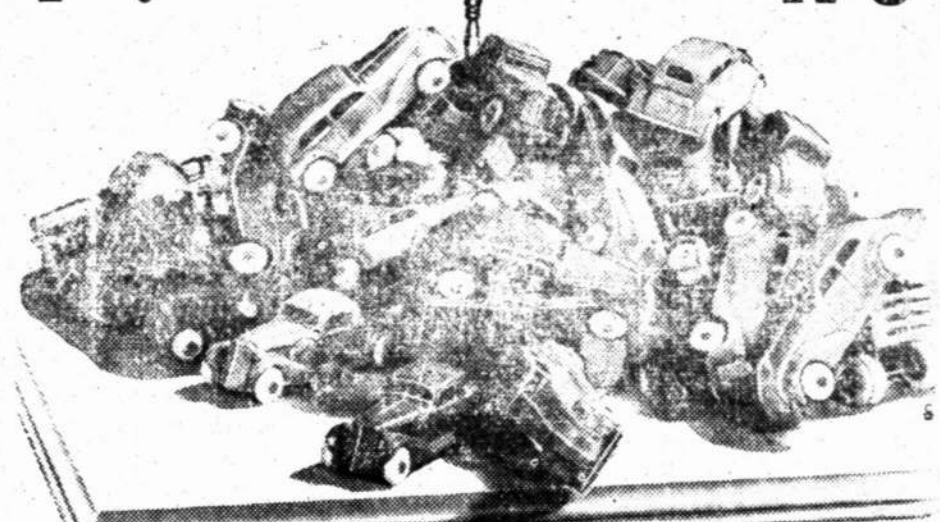

Railroads Pay More Taxes Than Usual In 1939

Class I railroads in 1939 paid \$38,445,076 in taxes to federal, state and local government, or an average of nearly one million dollars per day. The Association of American Railroads announced today.

"This was the greatest amount for any year since 1929 when the railroad tax bill amounted to \$398,394,711, although the net operating income of the Class I railroads in 1939 was only about one-half of that ten years ago.

Railway taxes in 1939 were an increase of \$15,251,286 compared with 1938, and an increase of \$29,044,122 compared with 1937. The railroads in 1939 paid in taxes 37.7 cents out of each dollar of net earnings before taxes as compared with 24.1 cents out of each dollar of such net earnings in 1929. Taxes paid to the Federal Government by the Class I railroads for the most part, represented income taxes for corporations and payroll taxes. The principal taxes paid to state and local governments are assessed on railroads and other property.

What To Tax And How To Tax It Is Subject Study

"What to tax and how to tax it"—a vexing problem for Texas municipal assessors—will be answered by two service-minded State agencies before long.

The University of Texas Bureau of Municipal Research and the State Division of Vocational Education on August 1 will begin preparation of "An Assessing Manual for Texas Municipalities." S. A. MacCorkle, bureau director, has announced.

Following the publication of the study—a companion piece to last year's "The Education of the Municipal Assessor"—the department's vocational education division will hold statewide classes for municipal officials. MacCorkle is preparing the manual.

Material for the publication will be gathered by Alldredge Jenkins, former member of the Wisconsin tax department, who joins University research forces in August.

Coordinators will be J. R. Eddy, State vocational education division director; E. E. McAdams, executive secretary of the Texas League of Municipalities; A. W. Noonan, executive director of the National Assessing Officers' Association; and Dr. MacCorkle.

Fewer New Firms Open For Service During June

While fewer new firms started operation in Texas during June than this time last year, the ones already in business held their own unusually well, University of Texas business statisticians report.

A total of 97 new charters were granted in June compared with 123 in May and 120 in June 1939. Capitalization of the new firms totaled \$1,960,000 in June, as compared with \$2,403,000 in May and \$1,933,000 in June a year ago.

Only 15 firms were reported bankrupt during June, with liabilities totalling \$169,000, University Bureau of Business Research figures show. In May 25 firms failed with liabilities of \$463,000 while in June 1939, there were 27 failures with total liabilities of \$291,000.

During the first six months of 1940, 766 charters had been granted to new businesses, 121 firms had failed.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas giving the Legislature authority to provide for appeal direct to the Supreme Court in cases involving injunctions granted or denied on the grounds of constitutionality or unconstitutionality of any statute or on validity or invalidity of administrative orders; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary proclamation and expenses of publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 3-b, which shall read as follows: "Section 3-b. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law, for an appeal direct to the Supreme Court of this State from an order of any trial court granting or denying an interlocutory or permanent injunction on the grounds of the constitutionality or unconstitutionality of any statute of this State, or on the validity or invalidity of any administrative order issued by any state agency under any statute of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the general election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR APPEALS DIRECT TO THE SUPREME COURT IN INSTANCES INVOLVING THE CONSTITUTIONALITY OF CERTAIN LAWS AND ORDERS."

and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR APPEALS DIRECT TO THE SUPREME COURT IN INSTANCES INVOLVING THE CONSTITUTIONALITY OF CERTAIN LAWS AND ORDERS."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

Civil Service Examinations Are Announced

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open competitive examinations for the positions listed below. Applications must be on file with the Commission's Washington office not later than the closing date mentioned in each case. For two of the examinations two closing dates are given—the first date governs receipt of applications from States east of Colorado; the second, from Colorado and States westward. The salaries given in each case are subject to a retirement deduction of 3½ percent.

Junior graduate nurses, \$1,620 a year. U. S. Public Health Service Federal Security Agency and Veterans Administration. High-school study and completion of a specified training course in a recognized school of nursing are required, except that applications may be accepted under certain conditions from persons now in attendance in their final year of training. Because of the demand for eligibles the minimum height requirements has been reduced to 60 inches. Applications must not have passed their thirty-fifth birthday. For this examination applications will be rated as received until further notice.

Senior medical officer, \$4,600 a year; medical officer, \$3,800 a year; associate medical officer, \$3,200 a year; various optional branches. The places of employment are: Public Health Service, Food and Drug Administration, Veterans Administration, Civil Aeronautics Authority and Indian Service. Applicants must have been graduated with an M. D. degree from a recognized medical school, and must have had professional experience

in a special branch of medicine. For the associate grade applicants must not have passed their fortieth birthday, and for the other grades they must not have passed their fifty-third birthday. For this examination applications will be rated as received until further notice.

Pathologist (medical), \$3,800 a year; veterinarian (research), \$3,800 a year; Chemical Warfare Service, War Department, Edgewood Arsenal, Md. For each of these positions applicants must have appropriate education, either in a recognized college, medical school of veterinary school, and appropriate experience. Applicants must not have passed their fifty-third birthday. Closing date for receipt of applications are September 9 and 12 1940. Ornithologist, \$3,800 a year, Fish and Wildlife Service, Department of the Interior. Applicants must have completed a 4-year college course with major study in zoology and must have had experience in taxonomic and curatorial ornithology. Applicants must not have passed their fifty-third birthday. Closing dates are September 3 and 6 1940.

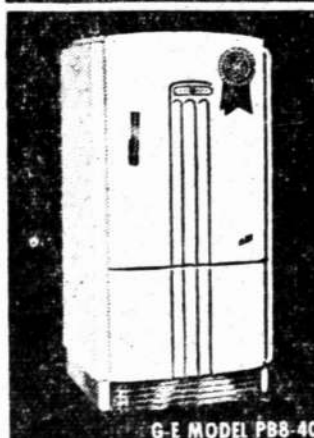

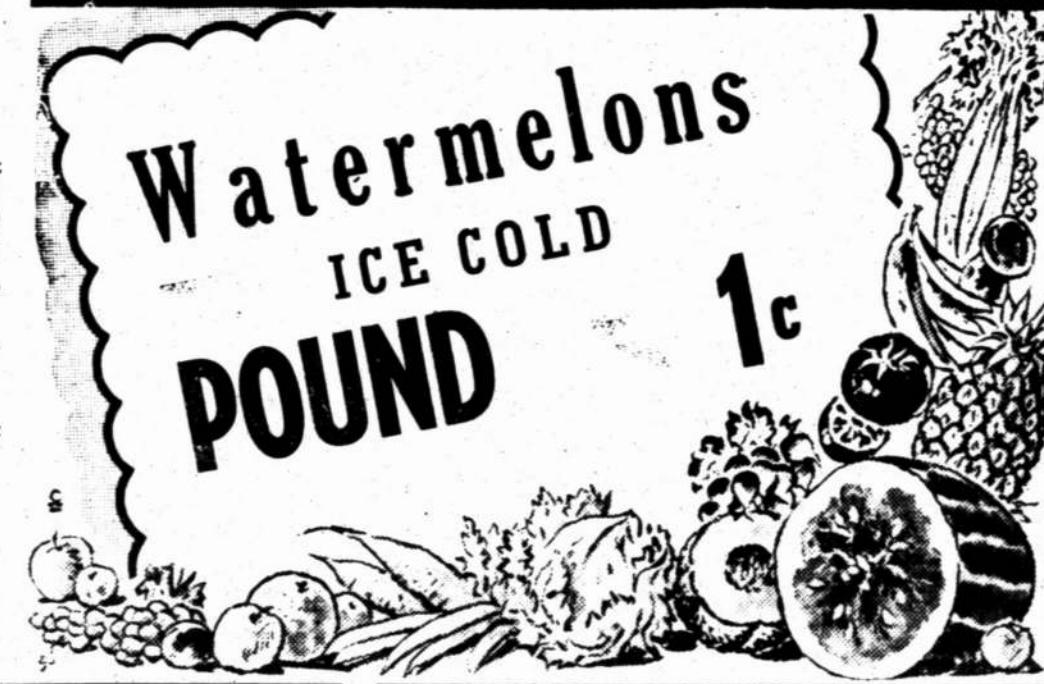
