1 KILLED; 2 INJURED WHEN 3 CARS COLLIDE

R. C. Malone of this city, was reported Monday at noon to be resting very well at the home of his daughter, Mrs. W. E. Harvey, on Sixth Street, following an automobile accident Saturday night, two miles south of the city, in which one Mexican was killed and another badly injured.

Mr. Malone suffered a bad cut on his forehead and had bruises about his chest and arms. He was carried to the Halley & Love Sanitarium Saturday night following the collision. Sunday morning he was removed to Mrs. Harvey's home. John Wooten, who was driving the Malone car, was slightly hurt.

The Mexican killed was Francisco Barrera, 17, of Del Rio, who had been picking cotton in this section. He, with a party of other Mexicans, traveling in two Ford cars, were returning to a farm south of the city where they had been working. He was instantly killed.

There were some ten or twelve Mexicans in the two cars and only one other was hurt. He was a man, whose name was not learned. Several others in the two cars were shaken up but were not given medical attention.

It appears that the Mexicans were racing and that both cars were on the wrong side of the highway. Mr. Malone and Mr. Wooten were on the right side, coming from the Concho River where they had been fishing. The tracks of the Buick car showed that it was almost in the ditch when the three cars collided. The two Fords were damaged beyond repair and overturned, while the Buick was damaged considerably, the left front side being smashed and several windows, including the windshield were broken.

Parties en route to the city and others en route to their homes after spending part of Saturday in Ballinger stopped at the scene of the crash and assisted county and city officers in removing the two wrecked Fords. A wrecker brought the Malone car into the city.

Three Girls Hurt

Three girls were slightly hurt here about 9:15 o'clock Saturday night when a Ford touring car and a Dodge touring car collided on Hutchings Avenue in front of The Ledger office.

These cars collided head-on, but it was the fault of neither of the drivers of the cars, as the street was packed and jammed with double-parked cars. There was only space for one car to pass and neither saw the other car until just before the crash. Both machines were damaged quite a

The plane was nose heavy and Pilot Wilmer Stultz said it was impossible to keep her up. His navigator, Brice Goldsborough, pulled the wire which dropped 260 gallons of gasoline.

The flight was then postponed until tomorrow.

LEVINE PLANS ATLANTIC MAIL

Levine, the only trans-Atlantic air passenger, came home today and announced that he would fly the reverse journey from Europe to America, next summer, and that within two years he would have in operation an ocean air mail service carrying letters to Europe for fifty cents each.

She was taken to a hospital, suffering from a possible fracture of the skull and a broken arm.

FALL-SINCLAIR TRIAL BEGINS

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—With the weight of the United States Supreme Court decision standing against them, Albert B. Fall and Harry F. Sinclair went to trial today on a charge of criminal conspiracy growing out of the infamous Teapot Dome naval oil lease.

A jury of twelve men, selection of which began immediately, will decide whether the two men shall go free or be imprisoned up to two years.

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, Oct. 17.—Diendonne Coste and Lieut. LeBrix in the plane Nungesser-Coli, arrived here today from France.

TWO GIRLS SHOT DEAD

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—Two 19-year-old girls were shot to death today and then thrown from an automobile which sped on for a block before skidding to a stop against a curb with a man dead at the wheel.

The driver, a bullet through his right temple, was Wilfred Winters, 22, at one time a taxicab driver but recently unemployed. The girls killed were Catherine Stadler and her chum, Margaret Martin, both high school graduates of last year.

Winters had been casually attentive to Miss Martin for several months, her father said, but he did not believe the two were in love.

The two girls left home last night to go to a dance.

KANSAS DEAN KILLS SELF

(By Associated Press)
LAWRENCE, Kas., Oct. 17.—Dean Perley Walker, of the school of engineering and agriculture of the University of Kansas, shot and killed himself in his office today. The body was discovered by a watchman.

Several letters to friends were found on his desk, including one to Chancellor Lindley, in which he expressed the hope that the chancellor "would not think I am too much of a coward."

Relatives know of no reason for his act.

RIVER VICTIM FOUND AFTER 16-DAY SEARCH

The body of Willie Littlefield, 19, of Concho county, who met death by drowning in the Colorado River on October 1st, was found buried in sand and drift of the Colorado some 500 yards from where he went into the stream on horseback, while the river was on a 12-foot rise, Sunday morning about 9:00 o'clock by parties who had been searching the banks of the stream since the fatal day. The youth's body was badly decomposed and was covered by sand and drift.

The body was discovered after the searching party had scented an odor near where they camped on the river Saturday night, it was reported here. They started a search in the immediate vicinity and soon found the remains.

The searchers covered the body with dirt and notified King Holt undertakers here, who went to the scene and prepared the body for burial.

Littlefield is survived by several brothers and sisters. His father, Ryor Littlefield, who had been in bad health for several years, died early in September at his home, 12 miles from Paint Rock. Mr. Littlefield was formerly in the Halley & Love Sanitarium here and was removed to his home only a short time before his death.

RAPS OCEAN FLIGHTS

LONDON, Oct. 1.—Lord
Thomson, air minister in the
Macdonald labor government,
calls the passion for flying over
the Atlantic "magnificent but
not aviation."

"It is something like certain
suicide to embark upon an
Atlantic flight without proper
care and preparation. No pas-
senger should go on a flight over
the Atlantic while aviation has
not made sufficient progress to
safely get over the hundreds of
miles of water," says the former
air minister. "I am against
legislation prohibiting Atlantic
flying, but something should be
done to stop what is 'air suicide.'
"It seems to me to be a question
on which concerted action could
be taken by the airmen them-
selves."

BEARCATS WIN
OVER COLEMAN

The Ballinger high school Bear-
cats, led by Willie Cervenka,
halfback, scored a great victory
Saturday afternoon when they
defeated the Coleman Blue Cats
31 to 0, on the Coleman gridiron
before a small crowd.

The Bearcats took the ball after
the kickoff, when Coleman was
forced to kick, and after recover-
ing a fumble, scored a touchdown
in hurry. Joe Beck, playing right
half, took the ball over the goal
line. Arthur missed the drop-
kick for extra point.

The Bearcats came back and
scored two touchdowns in the
second period, Cervenka carrying
them both across the goal line.
Arthur missed the first try for
extra point in this quarter, while
an end run failed to gain the
extra point in the second.

Cervenka made a very pretty
broken field run of 65 yards for
the third touchdown of the game
when he brushed off right tackle
thru the Coleman defense and
packed the pigskin the entire dis-
tance to the goal line without a
falter and without being hindered
after he got thru the first line of
defense.

The first half ended with the
score 18 to 0 in favor of the Bear-

cats.

In the second half Beck went
to quarter and James Parrish
went to a halfback position.
Parrish and Cervenka in this half
shared equally in making the
gains with each averaging about
the same number of yards thru
the line of scrimmage. They both
toted the ball with ease and made
many good gains. Cervenka has
a little twist which he takes with
him thru the line as he carries the
ball and would-be tacklers fall as
they try to stop him. Several
times during the afternoon this
twist worked effectively while on
other occasions Cervenka got his
feet mixed and would fall to the
ground before he could be
tackled.

Arthur missed a field goal from
the 25-yard line in the third
quarter. It fell short to the right, but
in a few minutes one of the Cole-
man forward passes fell into Cer-
venka's arms in about midfield
and he ran some 50 yards for a
touchdown. Middleton kicked
this goal from placement.

The Bearcats did not score an-
other in the third quarter, but
Jervis Robison, Bearcat right
end, came out of the game with a
touchdown to his credit when
Joe Beck put the oval thru the
air for 20 yards to Robison who
received it and ran 20 yards to
the goal line before a Coleman
defender could get hold of him.

Middleton missed this goal.
That was all of the scoring. The

final tally was 31 to 0 in favor of
the Bearcats.

Take the Santa Anna and Bal-
linger people from the field that
afternoon and there would have
been a mere handful of Coleman
citizens to see Frank Stringer's
charges go down before the Bal-
linger huskies. The Ballinger
delegation put much spirit in
this contest and the pep squad
led by Miss Lucibel Taylor per-
formed during the period be-
tween halves as did the Coleman
pep squad. Both demonstrations
were good.

"Smoky" Lusk and "Kraut"
Schuhman got to play in this
game and it was much to their
delight that they could get a
chance to help stop the Blue Cats.
Both the youngsters will be good
with a little more experience. It
was Lusk's first chance on the
squad.

The entire Ballinger line
showed lots of pep and get-away
in the game and took things to
heart. Forman and Springer
were outstanding defense and
offense stars of the Blue Cats.

The Bearcats are preparing this

week to meet the Brownwood
Lions in Brownwood, Saturday.
Coach Wright is expected a good
game and with the proper moral
support the Bearcats should
count this as another victory
away from home. Merkel, Jun-
ction, Brady and Sonora all come
to Ballinger during the last five
weeks of the season.

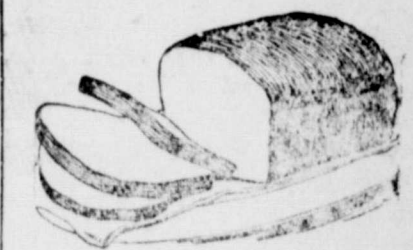
