MORE THAN \$1100 IN CASH WAS TAKEN

Believe Driver of Robbery Car Wounded As Volley Was Sent After Fleeing Bandits

(By The Associated Press)

ANSON, March 1.—Officers in pursuit of the three men who held up the First State Bank of McCauley, and escaped in an automobile with \$1100 today telephoned the sheriff's office here, tonight, asking that reinforcements be sent them at the Larry Chittenden pasture near Anson, 10 miles west of Anson, where they believed they had the robbers cornered. It was in this pasture that the robbery automobile, a coupe, was found abandoned. The license number showed the machine to have been stolen from the Texas company and that it had been registered in Dallas county. It contained empty money trays but no cash.

Advises from the office of the Texas company at Dallas were that the machine had been reported stolen from G. B. Landry, representative of the company, who works out of Ohio.

The robbery at McCauley today was the second Fisher county hold-up within a few months. The robbers escaped after herding bank employees into the vault, but without locking it. Cecil Evans, assistant cashier, emerged immediately with a shotgun and with two traders of the town fired a volley at the fleeing automobile. The robbers, who were thought to be having in an effort to surround them.

AUSTIN, Mar. 1.—An attempt to get into the record of the Texas-New Mexico railroad hearing a report of the state railway raid resulting in about 150 arrests recently at Wink, west Texas oil town, was squelched Thursday by chairman Clarence Gilmore of the state railroad commission, which is hearing application for permit to build a 35-mile line. Reference to the report was ordered stricken from the record.

WHITESIDE SENTENCED

Gets 18 Year Term For Death Of Wife

HOUSTON, Mar. 1.—Thomas F. Whiteside, Jr., young Houston attorney, was sentenced to 18 years in the penitentiary for the death of his wife, Rosa Marsh Whiteside, by a jury in Judge Whit Boyd's court Thursday afternoon. He was charged with murder but was found guilty of homicide.

The verdict was returned after the jury had deliberated one hour and 20 minutes.

Not Bothered

Hickman Says He Enjoys Jail

HALL OF JUSTICE, LOS ANGELES, March 1.—Convicted of murder, condemned to hang, accused of a second killing and alleged in some quarters to be insane, all make no difference to William Edward Hickman now on trial here for the murder of C. J. Toms, druggist.

Supporting the defense assertion that Hickman is of unsound mind, his elder brother, Alfred, took the stand today and said: "Only the other day my brother told me he had enjoyed his stay in the county jail more than all the last two years."

"I asked him if he did not realize too terrible it was for us that he should be sentenced to be hanged. He said it did not make any difference."

Furey, Caught By Norfleet, Is Alive, Officers Declare

Man Convicted For Swindling at Kansas City Is Identified, Reports Aver: Yesterday

Doubt that Joe Furey, head of the confidence gang that Prince Norfleet of Hale Center tracked over the nation and brought to justice, is dead as shown by Texas prison records raised yesterday when a man convicted of swindling at Kansas City admitted that his name was Joe Furey.

According to Kansas City officers who knew the man whose Norfleet brought to justice, the man convicted of swindling at Kansas City was identified by Norfleet records as the real Furey. Meanwhile, prison officials at Huntsville have scoffed at the Kansas City reports and prison physicians and others have declared that there is no doubt but that the real Furey died there in 1922.

Efforts to get a statement from Mr. Norfleet were made by the Avalanche last night but Mr. Norfleet could not be reached at his ranch near Hale Center.

MAN IDENTIFIED AT KANSAS CITY

Another Inquiry In Manipulation Of Market Voted

Senate Committee Cloaked With Full Power To Probe Descent of Cotton Price From All Angles

MANY WITNESSES WILL BE CALLED

Group Has Power To Call Witnesses and Prove Is To Be Thorough One, Say Senate Leaders

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, March 1.—Another Senate investigation is to be put under way next week, that into the cotton industry to determine whether there has been a manipulation of the market to depress cotton prices.

The inquiry will be conducted by a subcommittee of the agriculture committee headed by Senator Smith, Democrat, South Carolina, and will be started either Tuesday or Wednesday. Besides Senator Smith, the investigators will be Senators Russell, Louisiana, and Heflin, Alabama, Democrats; and Capper, Kansas, and Prasier, North Dakota, Republicans.

Senator Smith said he had received a large number of inquiries from all over the country concerning the investigation and he expects a large number of witnesses to be heard. The committee has the power to subpoena witnesses, books and papers and the senators are determined to make the inquiry a thorough one.

No More Marines Will Be Detailed

Wilbur Declares Corps Is Accomplishing Purpose; Texan Was Badly Hurt In Ambuscade

WASHINGTON, March 1.—Making known that no further marine reinforcements will be sent to Nicaragua, Secretary Wilbur observed today that while the corps is suffering additional casualties in the little republic, the marines are accomplishing their purpose—the elimination of General Augusto Sandino.

The secretary said the recent killing of five marines in an ambush would not cause any change in the present campaign.

TEXAN BADLY WOUNDED

MANAGUA, Nic., March 1.—(P)—White American marines today were mauling in northern Nicaragua, in pursuit of the Sandino rebels, eight of their comrades, wounded from ambush Monday were under treatment in the town of Comed.

The five men killed by the burst of machine gun and rifle fire that met the marine detachment near Darul Monday were buried near the place they fell.

'Misfeasance' On Part Of Coolidge Is Charge Of Reed

Failure To Assist In Senate Investigation Of Naval Oil Leases Is Cited By Missourian

MAKES DENUNCIATION OF ADMINISTRATION

Showdown Between McAdoo, Reed and Smith Forces Is Expected In California Primary

(By Associated Press)

LOS ANGELES, March 1.—President Coolidge was charged with misfeasance in office for "inactivity" in connection with the Senate investigation of naval oil leases by Senator Reed of Missouri, in a speech today at Long Beach, near here.

During a scathing denunciation of the Republican administration, the Missouri Democratic presidential candidate dramatically raised his hand and in measured words declared:

"I charge President Coolidge with misfeasance in office."

He had just complained that Mr. Coolidge had failed to assist the Senate in its investigation of the naval oil reserve leases and had neglected to remove Attorney General Daugherty at that time in response to a request of the Senate.

The president, failed to act, he said, "when he should have acted, and failure to do your duty when

Fire In Montana Mine Fatal To 3

Origin Of Fire Unknown; Three Were Trapped In Shafts By Fumes Caused By Blaze Underground

BUTTE, Mont., March 1.—Fire which broke out in the Badger copper mine of the Anaconda Copper Mining company this morning, cost the lives of three men, according to an announcement here tonight.

Workers in the Elm Oreb, a nearby copper mine, were called off because of gas.

The dead are: JAMES WHITE, shift boss, married; EDWARD BARNES, married; WILLIAM HASTY, married.

These men were working in the Diamond mine, adjoining the Badger State, putting in brattices on the 3,000-foot level to shut out the fumes from the Diamond when they were overcome by smoke and gas.

REED OPENS FIGHT

State Rests In Dynamiting Case

OTTAWA, Ill., March 1.—Hiram Reed began his fight to avoid imprisonment today after the state rested its case against the young farmer, charged with bombing a school house. A dozen witnesses testified that Reed admitted placing dynamite in the stove of the Pleasant Valley school where his sweetheart, Lola Bradford, was teacher.

He hoped to avoid marrying her, he asserted. Reed was also quoted as saying he had never intended to wed the girl.

His first confession made to the state's attorney at the county jail was admitted as an exhibit and read to the jury.

INDIANA HARBOR, Ind., March 1.—The body of another boy, about 9 years old and with a wire tightly twisted about his waist, was found in the muddy waters of Indiana Harbor canal late today. The body was found less than five blocks from the spot where a child of similar age and appearance was taken from the canal February 22.

Doctor Assessed Death Penalty In Illegal Operation

Is First Capital Penalty To Be Meted In Chicago Since Execution Method

(By The Associated Press)

CHICAGO, March 1.—After three and a half hours of deliberation, a jury tonight convicted Dr. Amoretto Rongetti of murder and fixed his punishment at death for performing an illegal operation on Loretta Enders, 18, causing her death. This is the first death sentence passed in Cook county (Chicago) since electrocution displaced hanging as means of execution in this state.

His case went to the jury shortly before 5 o'clock. It was reported that he was voted guilty on the first ballot, the remaining ballots being taken to determine the extent of his guilt and the penalty.

He was accused of performing an illegal operation on the young woman and refused to do another operation that may have saved her life because she did not have sufficient funds.

The doctor claimed that the state's case against him was a conspiracy and that the young woman did not come to the hospital until after she had undergone an operation elsewhere. Several witnesses told of threats to intimidate them and the court indicated he would investigate their charges.

\$50,000 Suit Is Aftermath Of Rape Case

An aftermath to the trial of P. T. Calloway on charge of rape perpetrated on the person of Jewel Morris, 11-year-old daughter of Mrs. G. W. Morris, which resulted in a five-year penitentiary sentence for Calloway, was observed yesterday in a suit filed in the Ninety-ninth district court by Jewel Morris and Mrs. Morris as next friend against Calloway, asking \$50,000 damages.

Of the damages asked, \$25,000 is for actual and \$25,000 is for exemplary damages. Lookha, Garrard and F. D. Brown are attorneys for the plaintiffs.

Many women are doubtful about the permanency of the electric needle cure for superfluous hair.

An operator of wide experience in this line tells me that if the needle really reaches the root of the hair and the electricity is kept on long enough to kill that root, there can never be a return of that particular hair. If there be a seeming failure permanently to remove that hair it is caused by the fact that the needle did not come in contact with the root at all, and this slip may have occurred by reason of lack of skill on the operator's part.

Or it may have been that the particular hair did not follow the regular line of growth, and so the needle missed sliding down along its shaft. Perhaps the current of electricity was not allowed to remain on long enough, due to an error of judgment on the part of the operator or too much hurry.

So it will be understood that no matter how good the machine or the theory, a first-class operator is essential. It is up to you to select one who knows her job.

Sour Cream Waffles. One and one-fourth cups flour, 1-3 teaspoon soda, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 2 eggs, 3 tablespoons melted butter, 1 cup sugar.

Beat eggs until very light. Stir in sour cream and add dry ingredients mixed and sifted. Beat well and add melted butter. Beat hard for two minutes and bake on a hot waffle iron.

If the eggs are beaten until very light it is not necessary to beat the yolks and whites separately. Be sure that the soda is thoroughly mixed with the flour before adding the dry ingredients. And keep in mind that a waffle batter is a "pour" batter.

These waffles are deliciously crisp and tender.

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Heeney Checks Heavyweight Ambitions of Jack Delaney

Bruising Tactics Of Big Anzac Give Win At New York

Determined Rally In Last Four Rounds Offset Fine Boxing Skill Of Bridgeport Pugilist

(By Associated Press.)
MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, NEW YORK, Mar. 1.—The heavy-weight ambitions of Jack Delaney crumbled once again tonight, this time before the bull-like attack of the iron-jawed fighter from New Zealand, Tom Heeney.

Before a crowd of more than 18,000 that paid \$175,000 to see the first of the heavyweight elimination semi-finals, Heeney carried off the decision over the erstwhile French-Canadian sharp-shooter in fifteen mauling, bruising rounds.

It was not a one-sided victory for the blocky, square-jawed boxer from the antipodes, but it was decisive, nevertheless, and gained as the result of a determined rally in the last four rounds.

In a struggle that was fast if not spectacular, punctuated by bruising clinches, Heeney emerged the victor because he was the aggressor all the way.

ROUND BY ROUND

Round One.
Delaney was a picture of bronze majesty as he danced from his corner and dug a solid left hook into Heeney's body. Heeney drove into the ropes with a volley of rights and lefts to the head. As they circled away Heeney threw his whole weight on Delaney and nearly wrestled him to the floor. The Anzac piled in with a solid right to the head but Delaney cracked him full on the chin with a right uppercut. Heeney belted left and right to Delaney's body and the bridgeport warrior hung on tightly. Heeney was using his weight to great advantage, driving close through Delaney's guard to smash the French Canadian about the head. They were snapping clouds freely, both hands flashing to the head and body at the will.

Round Two.
Heeney's bull-like aggressiveness never slackened. He tore and clashed at Delaney's body but Jack nearly upset him with two cracking left hooks to the chin. Tom never batted an eyelash, failing right back at the broken body of the tall and imposing dancing master. They danced in the center of the ring for a few seconds and again Delaney lashed a pretty left hook to the chin. The Anzac stormed in with the blow and they clung like a pair of kangaroos.

Round Three.
Delaney began to box his heavy shaggy rival and did a little better until Heeney's short right charged solidly to the chin. Delaney cracked two left hooks on the Anzac's granite chin but Tom just bowed his head and drove Delaney into a corner with a ripping head attack. Tom was relentless, a plunging, swinging fury as Delaney tried and backed into the ropes. Delaney danced out, took a new hold and flashed both hands to Heeney's chin. Delaney lost his mouthpiece as the round ended and had to chase around the ring during the minute rest to get it back.

Round Four.
Heeney whipped a solid right to Jack's chin at the bell, but took the short cut and came in with a left into a clinch. The Anzac dug a left hook into Delaney's body that sounded all over the arena. Jack stabbed with his left and Heeney bounded far back out of danger as Delaney cocked his mighty right. Heeney tore right back and they smashed at short range to each other's head. They were still pounding at close quarters when the bell rang.

Round Five.
Tom whaled in again but looked extremely foolish as Delaney jabbed him off balance with a left and cut him around the ring. The Anzac rounded and wrestled to an advantage but Delaney tied him up neatly. As they wrestled near the ropes, Tom broke his right hand loose and smashed Delaney full in the mouth. Jack lost his mouthpiece and some of his composure as Heeney whaled him with both hands. Delaney's left hooked close quarters again but Tom wrestled him around, threw him into the ropes, and had blood coming from Jack's nose when the round ended.

Round Six.
The durable Heeney was fresh and unmarked as he brushed Delaney's smashing left and right aside and pounded into close quarters. Delaney adopted a new style of attack, whipping his left hook to Tom's head, and then dropping into a tight clinch. He did it a half a dozen times before Tom drove him into a corner and dug a deep right into Jack's body. Delaney was spearing Heeney neatly with a left and crossing a solid left effectively at the bell.

Round Seven.
Delaney came out to box his man and clinched when the going became too rugged. Not once in the first period of the fight had Delaney landed his crushing right fist on Heeney's chin. Tom wouldn't box, and shook Delaney with a left and right to the head and pinned him on the ropes. Delaney fought his way clear, left hooks and short clipping rights beating a steady staircase on the invader's body. Jack infuriated his man with three stinging left hooks to the ear. Heeney piled into him like an angry grizzly, but Delaney danced away and was sporting at the bell.

Round Eight.
For the first time, Delaney took a full right hand shot at Heeney's chin, but the Anzac just stormed ahead, his short arms crashing through Delaney's guard to the chin. Jack wobbled a bit under the clouting. The fight degenerated into a clinching duel with each hitting and holding until prior clutches. Heeney emerged the victor because he was the aggressor all the way.

Round Nine.
The splendid condition of both fighters was apparent when they both came up fresh and eager at the bell. With Delaney still playing his left hook to the head and body, Tom bruised in, ramming short drives to the ribs, but Delaney tied him up rather effectively. Heeney twisted Delaney half way around and clipped him solidly with a right and left to the chin. Delaney smashed his right uppercut full into Tom's chin as the Anzac missed a long overhand right. They wrestled and bulled at close quarters with the crowd shouting disapproval until the bell sent them to their corners.

Round Ten.
Heeney did his best to make a fight of it, swinging free with both hands, but Jack insisted on trying him up. Delaney complained of foul and dashed around the ring in pain when Heeney shot a punch into the border-line territory. The referee sent him back into action but he was a bit slow and Heeney cracked him with solid hooks to the chin. Delaney shot a stinging right uppercut to Heeney's head, and this time the Anzac was holding. Heeney was hurt, quite obviously, as he swayed a bit coming into close quarters. Delaney lashed him with both hands right up to the bell, but could not catch him clean again.

Round Eleven.
Delaney lashed Heeney's head with left hooks and jabs and the crowd roared as the fighting form they had expected of the picture-que Canadian appeared at last. Undismayed, Heeney came right back with his short, puggy arms, striking steadily to the body. Delaney missed a left. Heeney sprayed him with lefts and rights to the head. The tide was turning again, as the sturdy Irishman from down under belted Delaney into a corner and worked on his head and body. Jack appeared tired and was holding quite strenuously at the going.

Round Twelve.
Heeney, waving not a second, drove Delaney into a neutral corner to pound for the ribs. Jack blocked all but one right hand. Tom whipped him with his left. Delaney tied the Anzac up helplessly at arm's length and the crowd laughed. Breaking a hold, Heeney slipped inside with perfectly-timed right and left uppercuts to the head. Jack came back with a looping left hook to the body, but Tom brushed short clips on the chin. Tom ran full into Delaney's left smash to the mouth as the going rang.

Round Thirteen.
Right at the going they fell together, tugging, shoving and slipping over surreptitious clouts at close quarters. Tom three-clouted to the ground and tore into Delaney, head down, in a desperate effort to reach a vital spot. Delaney snatched him with a vicious left uppercut as he came in, poked him away with the left and flashed another left hook to the head. Tom smartly wrestled Delaney from his feet with an army hold, but took a solid clouting that brought blood from a cut on the bridge of his nose, right up to the bell.

Round Fourteen.
There was an ugly gash in Heeney's nose at the pounded forward, vigor and stamina undiminished. The crowd booed heartily as Heeney wrestled Delaney in a half circle with his right, meanwhile clouting him with lefts to the body. The boys turned to cheers as they met in the center ring and hammered each other about the head. The exchange was vicious, but even, and Delaney went back to long range, Tom plugging for Heeney's chin. Tom wouldn't have it, however, and they wrestled right back to close quarters, with Heeney connecting occasionally with overhead rights to Delaney's neck. They were locked tight at the bell.

Round Fifteen.
With the match still in doubt, the fighting was still close and bruising. Delaney missed a terrific right uppercut and fell into a clinch and escaped harm. Heeney of the few clean open punches the round was vicious, but furnished, swing Delaney about the ring with both fists and smacked at his body on the ropes. Heeney's short left hook landed on Delaney's chin. An overhanded right stung the French Canadian, but they were still belting at the final bell.

Johnston's Legs Are Played Out, Mary Brown Says, But Bill May Beat Back

Little Bill Johnston has passed from the ranks of the big ten of American tennis for the year 1928, but I do not believe permanently unless he decides not to compete again in eastern tournaments.

Little Bill told me just after his unsuccessful attempt to hold the fort against the French "offensive" that he would not join the tennis "A. E. F." on its pilgrimage to the United States. He has had enough Davis Cup play. He thought the youngsters should be given a chance. He wanted to devote himself more to business and less to tennis.

Johnston has had a remarkable record in Davis Cup play, having won 11 of 12 Davis Cup matches covering a period of six years up until last season's play when he tried against the French "offensive" but he could reach top form with only 10 days' practice on grass and did not enter any of the preliminary tournaments leading up to the Davis Cup matches.

He felt he should conserve every atom of strength in his career, more than an atom of body, because he knew the French tactics were to prolong the rallies with the idea of exhausting him. Big Bill Tilden overdid things in the opposite direction. He played enough tennis to spread himself over a period of two seasons. Funny, he could not have had two more widely different methods of training for the same event.

Both were wrong in going to opposite extremes. The Frenchmen carefully conserved their energy, holding in reserve their best efforts until the crucial moment arrived, when they then unleashed their full strength. How my heart ached for Little Bill in these historic matches which gave the famous trophy to France! His last match against Henri Cochet, decided the issue. Little Bill struggled valiantly against too great odds. Here was youth in its first flush of Davis Cup play pitted against the tired and trail-looking veteran of seven years of defense.

Bill Johnston was glorious in defeat as he always had been in victory. He never gave way when he was twice within a point of losing the match. He rallied and took the game and the set, only to fall a victim finally to his own lack of stamina, rather than his lack of skill.

Ty Cobb Signs With Athletics
Famous Star Will Again Twinkle About Majors' Diamonds, Despite Report Of Retiring

PHILADELPHIA, Mar. 1.—Ty Cobb has signed a contract to play with the Philadelphia Athletics again this season, manager Connie Mack announced tonight in a telegram from the Athletics training camp in Port Myers, Fla. "I have come to terms with Cobb," said manager Mack's telegram, "and Ty will play in the Athletics outfield again this year."

I remember then being struck by the thought that here was Little Bill with just as fine a record as ever, one of the greatest match players the game has ever had, just as keen of eye and brave of heart—but his legs had lost the urge to go.

Sports history repeating itself. Further proof that legs go first. At that identical moment when Johnston was playing a losing game on foot, the older veterans of international polo, Devereux Milburn, Watson, Webb and Malcolm Stephenson were playing a winning game because they were mounted on fast ponies with young legs.

I have known Little Bill for many years and know him to be sensitive about his frail physique. He hates to be teased. Time and again he has left the east determined to put on pounds of weight, but he cannot do it. He has been over 150 pounds and loses rapidly when playing in competition.

Well I remember the historic match when Big Bill and Little Bill, each with "two legs" on the national trophy, met in the finals and the match was the permanent possession of the trophy. Tilden's entire game was designed to exhaust Johnston. The first two sets he just kept the ball in play as much as possible. Tilden told me afterwards he dared not bring forth his best shots against the untired Johnston, for they would come back and he, Tilden, would lose his endurance.

Johnston was the first two sets and many thought that Little Bill would make it three straight. However, before the third set progressed, he was not hard to see the hand-wringing sweat. Little Bill began to tire, his shots lost their sting and depth. Then Tilden started to fire over his cannonball service and stinging drives, and Little Bill wilted under the steady barrage. He played the last set on his nerve, completely exhausted, and lost the match.

Little Bill, in discussing the match afterwards, told me that when he began to tire, Tilden seemed to assume the proportions of a giant, and to grow larger and larger. I could visualize Little Bill, who would frankly for his bean stalk.

It is to be hoped that tennis fans have not seen the last of Little Bill in tennis competitions, but it would be unkind to expect more of him in Davis Cup play.

THE GOVERNMENT IN BUSINESS

Sometimes when the matter of "farm aid" is being discussed, we hear an echo from "Big Business", to the effect that it would "put the government in the farming business" and "the government must not get into private business. But for years and years the government has been in private business, because it has been placing the business cards and addresses on stamped envelopes for firms, individuals and corporations, and doing that work at a price that not only does not pay the cost of the envelope, and the work of printing them—in fact it furnishes the envelope to the customer, and does the work for less money than the manufacturers of envelopes can make them, and for less money than the printers of the country can buy them. Thus the government not only is in competition, but unfair and ruinous competition to job printers in all parts of the country. Some of these job printers are large concerns, and many of them are small daily and weekly newspapers in the smaller cities of the country, with job printing plants in connection, struggling to make an honest living in the printing business, and the government is taking millions of dollars worth of business from them that is rightfully and legitimately theirs. And no profit to the government in this—the government does not get a price that pays for the making of the envelope. Of course the excuse is made that the government furnishes these envelopes because to do so encourages the use of the mails—a very flimsy and sorry excuse. If that were so the government should go into the printing business generally and lithograph and print all sorts of letters, circulars, pamphlets, drafts, checks, bills and statements, because all these things encourage the use of the mails. The fact is congress should pass a law putting a stop to the government doing any sort of private business printing, and else it should provide for the government doing all classes of printing and publishing and doing it at competitive prices, because it is manifestly unfair for the government to furnish the envelope and do the work of printing to return address thereon for less money than the commercial job printer can buy the envelope from the manufacturer.

MORE AUTHORITY FOR LEAGUE OF NATIONS COUNCIL

Although not represented in the Geneva meeting that is endeavoring to formulate an arbitration convention reaffirming the League of Nations Covenant, the United States is in sympathy with its purpose. Washington does not see why it should send a delegation to a body whose principal concern is to adjust the conflicting policies of European lands. Besides, the discussions on security, arbitration and conciliation are connected with the League's political activities. France and its allies—Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia, Rumania, Poland and Belgium—desire better assurance against aggression before consenting to reduce their defense forces. Another group, including Germany, contends that armaments themselves provoke war, and therefore urges reduction as the first step in the program. This Nation's military and naval establishments are considerably below the minimum which ordinary prudence demands. Washington recently offered to abolish the submarine if other governments would do likewise, and it is seeking arbitration treaties with Great Britain, Italy, Germany and Japan, which would renounce war as an instrument of national policy. The United States maintains 118,500 enlisted men in the Regular Army, and 27,000 of them are stationed in the Canal Zone, Porto Rico, Alaska, Hawaii, the Philippines and North China. These figures do not include 6,800 Philippine Scouts, who are not available for service beyond their native land. Washington therefore cannot offer to reduce its defense forces further, but it is willing to

present its views to the Preparatory Commission next month, when that body re-assembles to consider the report of the Committee on Arbitration and Security. The United States favors regional compacts for land or air armaments and a general understanding on naval establishments, particularly among the Great Powers. It does not believe that any single formula could be applied to all armies, as they differ widely in geographical situation, distribution, organization and training. France is striving to strengthen the League and takes the view that the Council should be given still more authority, including power to define neutral zones between lands which are at odds, and also to restrain their navies if desirable. The French delegation to the Geneva gathering also suggests that five or six trained investigators be stationed at League headquarters, empowered to serve notice on governments which threaten belligerent action that they must maintain the status quo until the Council can act. These details show that the European nations are still far apart regarding a general security compact. Soviet Russia has sent an observer to the committee meetings, but has offered merely an unworkable plan which would scrap all national defense forces. Even the spokesmen who presented the scheme do not take it seriously.

THE WOMEN ARE DUPES

Statistics are accumulating to show that the women of the country are easy dupes of so-called bond and stock-salesmen, and the patrons of "get rich quick" artists. It is disclosed in New York and other financial centers of the country, that a ring of these artists exists with members in all cities of the country and as soon as an estate is left in the hands of a woman the sharks are on her heels with all sorts of mining and oil stocks and impossible schemes that are made to look enticing by the oily and lying lips of the salesman. An association is being formed in New York now to train and advise women on investment matters, and to protect them against the work of the grafter. There is also a wide-spread disposition on the part of the women to take up political matters, and the nation is full of politicians pleading eloquently to the sympathies of the female voters. They are led into endorsement of so-called moral issues, that look good on the face, but are used by smooth political manipulators to secure the woman vote and ride easily into public office. Of course there are in this country thousands of able, well posted women capable of handling any business, and as capable of taking care of a political situation as any man would be, but there are women well trained in all lines of business and when they are trained and learned, they are just as efficient as men. The trouble is the women of this country were kept in ignorance of business and outside political affairs for more than a hundred years, and having only acquired citizenship in the last decade, it is not to be expected that they could be able to handle the business and political affairs of the country as well as men experienced from boyhood, and by years of experience and training. But the women are making good. They are not neglecting the home for the forum, and while the birth rate has declined some, the home is still the center of attraction for the family, and the women of the country are advancing in all lines of commerce and politics.

QUEER PROCEEDINGS

Hickman can die but once. That fact is obvious to all the courts and lawyers and alienists in Christendom. When the life of a criminal is snuffed out on the gallows or in the electric chair, he expiates all his crimes, no matter how numerous and brutal they may be. Why, then, waste the time of the court putting the murderer on trial a second time, when he is already under sentence to die. It seems the wiser course would be to wait until the outcome of the first trial is finally determined. If the court of last resort decides that the death sentence shall be carried out, then that ends the matter. In the meantime the courts could be clearing their dockets by considering other criminal cases. We are told the delay of the courts in final disposition of important law suits is because of their inability promptly to transact all the business on hand. Yet there is often an apparent duplication of effort, such as that now being put forth in the Hickman case. We have some queer legal proceedings in this country. Our system is so clumsy and long drawn out that justice often suffers.

YOUR HEALTH

By DR. MORRIS FISHER, Editor Journal of the American Medical Association and of Hygiene, the Health Magazine.

One of the questions which most disturbs mothers whose children go considerable distances to school is the provision of a satisfactory lunch. Many mothers wish their children to come home to a hot lunch, but this is not always practicable, particularly where only 30 to 45 minutes may be allowed for the luncheon period. If the lunch time is so short that the child has opportunity only for dashing home, snatching a hasty meal, and returning at once, it is undoubtedly better to carry a suitable lunch and to eat it leisurely.

What Experts Say. Nutrition experts give the following advice:

When lunches must be carried to school it is wise to purchase some kind of thermos bottle or container in which one warm food can be carried. This hot dish may be cocoa, milk soup, vegetable stew, macaroni and cheese, stewed lima beans, or other similar easily prepared nourishing dish. In addition to a warm food the lunch should provide each of the following:

1—Milk. At least one-half pint to drink as such, or in cocoa, milk soup, etc.
2—Protein food, as cheese, cottage cheese, egg or meat. These may be served separately or in sandwiches. If a full pint of milk is used this extra protein is not so essential.
3—Bread, as bread and butter or sandwiches.
4—Fruit or vegetable. Fruit is more easily carried and can be used most of the time, the vegetable being served at the night meal. The fruit may be raw—as a bunch of grapes—or in form of a sauce. When the fruit is cooked it is wise to add a few pieces of celery, a whole tomato, or lettuce to provide the desirable element of freshness in the lunch.
5—A sweet, if desired, as a cookie, a raisin sandwich, jam to eat with bread and butter, a piece or two of candy, a few peanuts or raisins. The sweet should not be overdone, merely a little top-off to the meal.

Following are some suggestions:
1—Cocoa (made of milk) one-half to one pint. Peanut butter sandwiches. Ripe banana slices. 2—Vegetable stew, small amount of meat, potato, carrots, onions, etc. Bread and butter. Milk. Red apple, graham crackers.
3—Potato soup. Lettuce sandwiches. Baked apple. Ginger bread.
4—Stewed lima beans. Bread and butter. Milk. Ripe peaches. Cup cake.

It must be remembered that merely packing the right lunch is not sufficient. Provision must be made at school for a suitable place and the right atmosphere in which to eat it, else the meal may be as hurried and unsatisfactory as before.

Throckmorton In Celebration For First Rail Train

Special Program Given At
Woodson Before A Large
Crowd In Observation Of
End To New Line

(By the Associated Press)
WOODSON, Mar. 1.—Five thousand people from West Texas gathered here Thursday to celebrate the arrival of the first train to enter Throckmorton county. The train, a special one over the Cisco and Northeastern railway's new extension, arrived in Woodson at 10 a. m., bearing a delegation of railroad men, citizens of Breckenridge and Fort Worth and others.

Wild cheering greeted the arrival of the train and a long procession of Throckmorton county citizens escorted the passengers to the main business street of Woodson, where a short program of speeches was held. Ollie B. Webb, assistant to the president of the Texas and Pacific, James R. Record, managing editor of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, W. S. Cooper, manager of the Breckenridge chamber of commerce, and others spoke.

At noon a special train from Cisco bearing R. Q. Lee, former president of the West Texas chamber of commerce, the man who obtained the permit for the line, president J. L. Lancaster of the Texas and Pacific, and 125 citizens of Cisco with Lobo band arrived and took possession of Woodson for an hour. Barbecue was served to all at noon while the official party held a special luncheon at the Woodson Christian church. Here president Lancaster in an address declared that his road had conferred on West Texas and Throckmorton county and had built the line as evidence of it.

Mr. Lee, former president of the Cisco and Northeastern who has twice pioneered railroad construction into West Texas counties, congratulated the citizens of Woodson on acquiring the railroad.

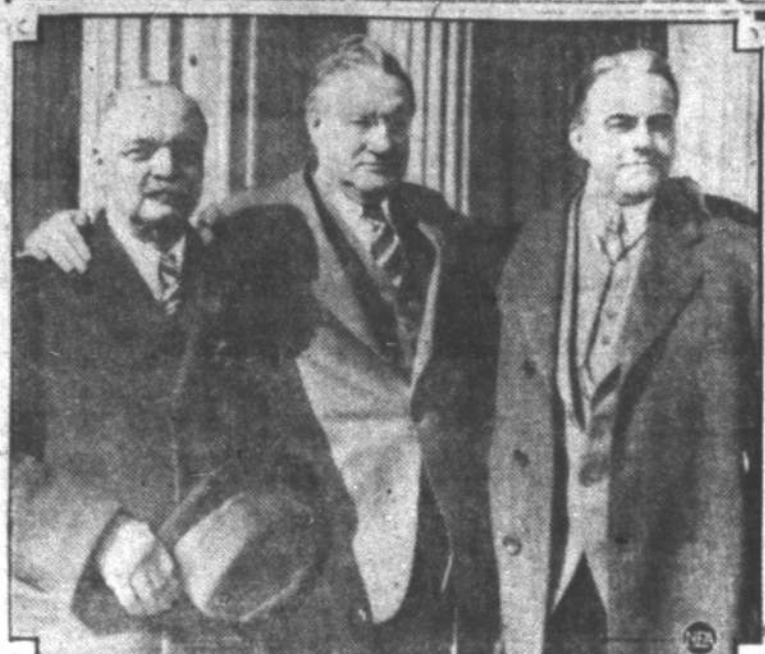

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Firing Range Of Ships Increased

Appropriation Will Boost Maximum Range of Guns On Two Vessels By Ten Thousands Yards

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 1. — An increase of ten thousand yards in the firing range for the big target guns on the battleships Pennsylvania and Arizona would be provided for under a \$14,800,000 expenditure approved today by the House Naval committee for the modernization of the two vessels.

Representative Britten of Illinois, ranking Republican on the committee, said this would prevent the ships from being outgunned by those of any other power and also would approximately equalize the "extreme range of all battleships of the world."

The committee in approving the authorization disregarded the navy department's request for an appropriation of three additional capital ships, the New Mexico, Mississippi and Idaho.

May Authorize Later Britten said that if the conference to be held in 1931 under terms of the Washington naval treaty should not prohibit further modernization he felt sure that the committee would authorize the work on the other three ships.

The \$14,800,000 authorization will include the installation of additional protection against submarine attack, of anti-air attack deck protection, the installation of airplane catapults and of a modern fire control and the reboiling of the vessels.

Installation of a five-inch anti-aircraft battery is also provided for each ship in accordance with standards adopted for all of our first line battleships," he added. "When modernized to better withstand air-attack and submarine attack the Pennsylvania and Arizona will afford much greater protection to officers and men aboard and will continue in the first line of the nation's right arm of defense for an additional ten years."

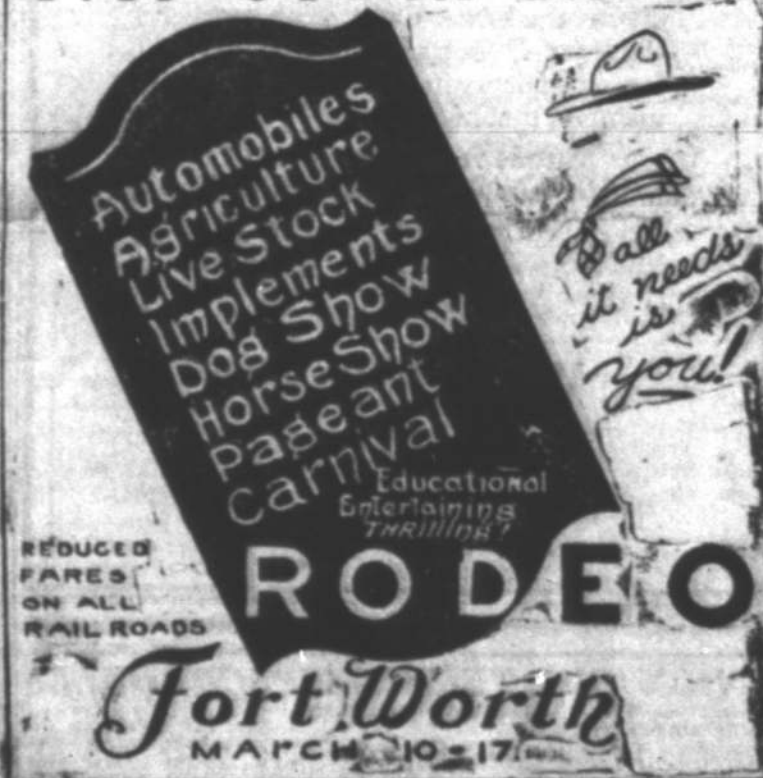

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French Divorces Are Not In Peril

No Need To Worry Over
Annulment If Decree Was
Granted Recently, Survey
Of Lawyers Shows

(By The Associated Press)
PARRIS, March 1. (AP)—Americans who have been divorced in France, even if they maintained only a "paper domicile," have little need to fear the Versailles decision which threw out of court the suit of Brainbridge Cully. This was the opinion of a dozen lawyers who were consulted today by the Associated Press.

In some of the earlier cases, the attorneys thought, there might be instances in which divorces granted here could be annulled in state courts, but this danger does not exist for any recent suit.

The attorneys pointed out that it was a fundamental basis of French law that a judgment once given and confirmed by the appellate court, must stand, even if later discovered facts show that the court was misled. This was the opinion expressed today by the attorneys. A retrial is permitted only if there was real error in procedure.

The possibility of annulment in the state of some of the American divorces arises from the fact that until a semester or so ago French courts, once a French domicile seemed established, granted divorces on the same grounds as to French citizens. These grounds included incompatibility, insult or a dozen other causes which are not recognized in several states of the Union.

The opinion was expressed that annulment proceedings could be started in home states provided it could be shown that the person obtaining the French divorce did not actually change his or her domicile to France and state laws were not complied with. These persons might find themselves legally divorced in France still securely tied together at home.

Sinclair Bonds Traced To Hays

\$260,000 Given For Use Of
Republican Committee
After Oil Operator Had
Leased Teapot Dome

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, March 1.—W. H. Hays, former oilman general, testified today before the senate oil committee that Harry F. Sinclair had handed him a total of \$260,000 in Liberty bonds for use by the republican national committee after the oil operator had leased Teapot Dome.

Of this amount, \$100,000 actually was used to help extinguish the committee deficit resulting from the 1920 presidential campaign, which Hays directed as chairman of the national committee, the remaining \$160,000 being returned to the oil operator.

The transaction occurred in 1923 after the Continental Trading company of Canada had made its \$3,000,000 in profits and gone out of business, but Hays said and Senator Walsh, Democrat, Montana, agreed with him that he knew nothing of the Continental at that time.

When testifying before the same committee in 1924, the former cabinet officer and now a major figure in the moving picture industry, placed Sinclair's contribution at \$75,000 and on that point was sharp and Senator Sinclair, Democrat, New Mexico, He explained that the \$75,000 was all he was asked about at that time and he did not volunteer information about the other because the plan had been to return all of it to Sinclair.

Reading a prepared statement to which he referred repeatedly later during cross examination, Hays explained that he took a hand in wiring out the 1920 campaign deficit because he felt a personal responsibility in the matter. Although he had retired as chairman of the party organization, Hays said he personally solicited funds from Sinclair, among others.

The oil operator's personal contribution toward the deficit was \$75,000, the witness testified, but he advanced \$125,000 in Liberty Bonds to be used by the committee in making a report to the country that the deficit had been wiped out in advance of the 1924 campaign.

Hays told the investigators that he met Sinclair in New York either in his own or Sinclair's office, and had received from his hands a package containing the \$200,000 in bonds. There was no memorandum or other evidence of the transaction.

DAILY MARKETS

NEW ORLEANS COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, March 1. (AP)—An early advance was not maintained in the cotton market today and although prices had several good rallies from declines, the general trend was downward. May contracts after trading up to 18.35, or 16 points to 18.38 was followed by a 16 point decline and the option closed at 18.22, 3 points net up. The general market closed barely steady, 6 points net up to 4 down.

Liverpool futures were much better than did at the start here and spot sales in the foreign market totaled 10,000 bales. First traders here showed gains of 8 to 9 points. The advance extended to 18.38 for July and 17.93 for October, 8 to 14 points above the previous close.

The early gain attracted realizing and before the offerings were absorbed July dropped to 18.15 and October 17.83, 12 to 13 points down from the highs. The market quieted down around these levels but became more active in the afternoon trading on moderate buying promoted by favorable spot and textile news. July recovered to 18.30 and October 17.98, 8 to 15 points up. The recovery did not hold, however, due to additional realizing and July closed at 18.15 and October 17.83, or 15 points higher to four net lower to the day.

Exports for the day totaled 22,440 bales.

COTTONSEED OIL

NEW YORK, March 1. (AP)—The cottonseed oil market ruled firm today, closing with net gains of 3 to 10 points. Prime crude 4.00, prime summer yellow spot 9.10, March closed 9.25, May 9.50, July 9.87, August 10.00, September 10.06.

WOOL

BOSTON, March 1. (AP)—Trading in wool continues very limited. An unusually small amount of wool is being offered in any domestic line below 64's grade. Even the off and defective wools of 56-60's and lower grades are well cleaned up, some houses reporting nothing to offer except limited quantities of finer wools.

FORT WORTH LIVESTOCK

FORT WORTH, March 1. (AP)—Bidding on most classes of cattle here today was weak with indications of a narrow demand. A few steers sold from 9.50 to 10.00. Light bulls brought from 5.50 to 6.00, heavier kinds 6.00 to 6.50, cows 8.10, canners 4.50 to 5.00, cutters 5.00 to 5.50. A few stocker calves sold at steady prices when a lot sold at 12.50.

Sheep trading was steady with a light supply. Woolen feeder lambs sold at 14.00 to 14.50. The hog trade was 5c to 10c higher than Wednesday's average. The top price was 8.25 with the bulk of receipts selling from 7.25 to 8.15. Packing notes brought 6.75 to 7.25 and pigs 6.00 to 6.75.

NEW YORK COTTON

NEW YORK, March 1. (AP)—The cotton market was comparatively quiet today with irregular fluctuations. After selling up to 18.72 at the start, May reacted to 18.41, advanced to 18.70 and closed at 18.65. The general market closing very firm, with a slight upward bias. Early estimates ranged from 18.35 to 18.75, which was 10 points lower.

The market opened steady at an advance of 1 to 6 points and sold about 8 to 10 points net higher in early trading in response to the relatively steady showing of Liverpool. As prices approached the high figures of late last week on old crop positions, offerings increased and

Mexico Overflow Due To Political Condition Charge

Supply Of Labor From The
Southern Republic Held
Vital to Ranchmen in The
Southwest Of Texas

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, March 1. (AP)—The immigration of Mexicans to the United States was attributed to political conditions in Mexico by Howard Oliver, of New York and Mexico City, today in appealing to the House Immigration committee not to set up barriers against Mexico by enacting the Box bill to restrict western hemisphere immigration.

He described the population of Mexico as consisting of "20,000,000 human beings and ten million beasts of burden" and asserted that there was insufficient food in Mexico to feed her people.

Conditions in Mexico are desperate, he said, "if we set up barriers to prevent Mexican immigration we probably soon will find ourselves sending the Red Cross to Mexico to help alleviate conditions."

Describes Mexican Conditions
A picture of Mexico filling with Chinese and Japanese, drawn there to fill the vacuum caused by migration of Mexican laborers to the United States was laid before the committee in a telegram from the Sacramento, Calif., church federation which urged passage of the bill.

Beside it was the contention of Texas and Iowa representatives, farmers and ranchers that if this labor supply which annually flows across the Rio Grande to till America's soil and shear her sheep is cut off, they did not know where to turn for workers.

At the same time the Senate Immigration committee was listening to similar contentions against the bill from western and southwestern beef sugar manufacturers.

Colorado Needs Labor
Senator Waterman, Republican, Colorado, told the Senate committee that the state was unable to fill the vacuum caused by migration of Mexican laborers to the United States during the growing season of the year "agriculture in Colorado must necessarily falter and fail."

Hubert L. Shattuck, of the Denver chamber of commerce, Harry A. Austin of Washington, secretary of the United States Beef Sugar association, J. J. Bailey, vice-president of the Holly Sugar company, Colorado Springs, and T. G. Gallagher, vice-president of Continental Sugar company, Toledo, told the Senate committee that curtailment of Mexican labor would seriously hurt the beef sugar industry.

Representative Hudspeht and Mansfield of Texas appeared before the House committee with arguments against the measure, holding the restriction would work great harm among Texas ranchers and farmers.

Representative Dickinson, Iowa, several farmers of that state, appealed against passage of the bill.

W. E. Weatherbee, Del Rio, and J. R. Sanford, Eagle Pass, said that ranchers along the border would not know where to turn for labor if Mexicans were excluded.

CONTEMPT CITATION

Dismiss Charge Against The
Sheriff Of Neuces

SINTON, March 1. (AP)—Citation for contempt against Sheriff Ben Lee of Neuces county was dismissed here today by Judge T. M. Cox of the Thirty-sixth Judicial district, who had issued the citation. Judge Cox said that in his opinion the contempt was not willful and that it had been the result of faulty advice by Neuces county officers and "some other officers."

The case resulted from Sheriff Lee's refusal to deliver to Sheriff R. F. Hunt of San Patricio county, R. L. Terrell, against whom an indictment charging murder in the death of Abelardo Gonzales, had been returned by the San Patricio county grand jury. Terrell was being held in Neuces county on a warrant issued by Justice of the Peace W. W. Sharp.

Lee testified that he disregarded the capias pending consultation with his own district judge and District Attorney A. W. Cunningham and George Westervelt, that the bench warrant was never served on him; and that there was no willful intent to disobey the order of Judge Cox.
