CONGRESSMAN HOPEFUL FOR RIVER PROJECT

LIQUOR PLAN IS LEFT WIDE OPEN BY HOUSE GROUP

Wets and Drys Cautious As Test of Strength On Control Due to Come

3 WAYS OPEN TO RETAIL LIQUOR

Showdown Drink Today on Sale by Public Places

AUSTIN, Sept. 25.—Opposing factors advanced cautiously today toward a test of strength on the liquor situation.

An anticipated clash in the house liquor traffic committee over control of plans failed to materialize as the committee agreed unanimously to report three bills. The house will choose between an absolute state monopoly over all sales, a monopoly over wholesale sales and a license system by the drink in bonafide restaurants and hotels.

The senate voted 29 to 8 for a showdown Thursday on a bill to prohibit sales by the drink. The bill would define an open saloon as a place where liquor was sold for consumption on or near the premises.

Senate repeal leaders opposed the motion, but Senator Clint Small of Amarillo offered it to clear the way for a bill to authorize package sales by private dealers or a state monopoly. Wet bloc members asserted the bill, if passed, would perpetuate pre-emption conditions.

Dry leaders, led by Bishop H. J. Crum, president of the Texas Drys, rallied to the state monopoly plan at the house committee hearing. Hotel and restaurant operators defended sales by the drink as legitimate establishments.

The license system is fundamentally wrong in principle, Bishop Boaz said, recommending a bill that would eliminate private profit from the liquor traffic as far as possible.

Joe Crum, Fort Worth, representing the restaurant association, said mere sales of liquor in a legitimate restaurant would not make it a saloon and added:

"There should be a provision that 50 per cent of the revenue of restaurants selling liquors should come from food sales. We don't want a person to be able to sell 10 cents worth of hamburger and \$100 in whiskey."

NO GAME BOOKED FOR EAGLES TEAM

Will Remain Idle Tomorrow; May Play October 4

Chillicothe high school Eagles will be idle this next Friday, Sept. 27, because of the rain.

The following Friday, October 4, Coach Jim Muse carries his charge to Archer City for a conflict against the Wildcats.

It will be a conference game. The Eagles and Wildcats were not scheduled to meet until November 22, but this game has been moved up, and thus gives an earlier start of the District race for these two. The coach was unable to book non-league games for tomorrow and October 4, so it is presumed he would rather begin the conference schedule one week earlier in order to keep his lads in shape, and arrange a tilt on November 22 later on in the season.

STRONG VARSITY TEAMS TO CLASH SATURDAY NIGHT

Game Between WTSTC and SOSTC Stated at Vernon's City Park

VERNON, Sept. 25.—Two of the outstanding varsity college elevens in this region will collide on the City Park gridiron in Vernon on Saturday night, Sept. 28. The teams are West Texas State Teachers College, of Canyon, and Southeastern Oklahoma State Teachers College, of Durant, Okla.

It will be a gala "homecoming" for Coach Al Bazzett of the Canyon team, who, in 1924, piloted Vernon High school to its only district football championship prior to 1932. Assisting Bazzett in coaching at W. T. S. T. C. is another former Vernite, Bob Cox, who captured the 1927 edition of the Vernon High Lions and later won all-America mention as a fullback at Duke University.

Two former Vernon players are on the Buffalo squad. Toby Wagoner, crashing end, and Ray Cox, sophomore halfback. Wagoner is generally regarded as one of the finest winemen in West Texas college circles.

The Bazzett-coached Buffaloes are expected to unveil a fine set of running and aerial plays from the Notre Dame formation. The running attack will be featured by Elwood Dow of Littlefield, an ace half-back. Ezzell Champion of Memphis will do most of the punting and passing. Frank Van Noy, former Amarillo star, will direct the team. John Rankin of Miami, a guard, captains the Buffaloes.

Reports from Durant indicate the Southeastern Teachers will boast their usual strong team with a heavy line and a veteran backfield.

Advance ticket sales for the game, the first varsity game ever played in Vernon and the only one of its kind to be played here this season, are reported brisk.

Much interest in the game is expected on the part of high school coaches and their teams, most of them planning to attend to witness the two strong varsity teams in action.

BASES OPINION ON RESULTS OF CONFERENCE HELD RECENTLY IN WASHINGTON WITH ENGINEER

Addresses Pease River Valley Development Association at Vernon This Past Week; Plans Trip to Washington Soon to Further Interest WPA Officials, He Tells Group; Two Chillicothe Men Members of Association

Congressman W. D. McFarlane of Graham declares he still feels hopeful of obtaining approval of the Pease River Valley Development Association's works program for building a dam near Margaret in Graham county, he told officials and directors of the group at Vernon this past week-end.

The project would cost \$4,500,000.

The congressman based his assertion on results of a conference in Washington, D. C., shortly before his return to Graham, with General Markham of the United States army engineers. United States Senator Morris Sheppard also attended the conference with General Markham.

Army engineers sometime ago rejected the project from an "economic standpoint." The project was approved by the directors of the Pease River Valley Development Association's works program for building a dam near Margaret in Graham county, he told officials and directors of the group at Vernon this past week-end.

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NEGLIGENCE?

Every conscientious-minded American endorses the effort of President Roosevelt to determine whether official negligence was in any way responsible for the loss of more than 300 lives of war veterans in the recent Florida hurricane.

Since these men were working on a Federal Relief Administration project to link by highway construction the small islands that string out into the sea off the southernmost tip of Florida, the government was morally responsible for their safety.

Therefore it is up to officials in charge of these former service men to explain why, in the face of continuous warnings for several days in advance of the storm, they were

not evacuated from their flimsy camps before it was too late. Florida storms are no novelty, and to say that it was impossible to foresee how severe this storm would be is hardly justification for exposing hundreds of men to death.

THE JAW DISEASE

What is this strange—what shall it be called? Well, perhaps "disease" does as well as any name. The symptom of this particular malady is a decided tendency on the part of the afflicted to wiggle his lower jaw up and down, back and forth; in some severe cases the jaw even appears to rotate.

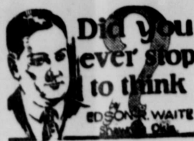
High school students are very susceptible, and even the teachers, perhaps from repeated exposure, at times have been known to succumb.

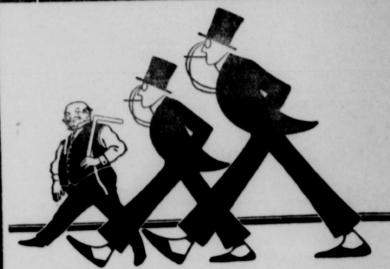

that he was being "forced out." "I feel I am being forced out of my job," he said. "They offered to let me head the government contact and promotion division of the show at a salary of \$15,000 a year, which is less than I can afford to work for."

He denied to the Dallas Times-Herald, however, of having resigned, but intimated he would quit should the central exposition corporation enforce a proposed organization change at the exposition.

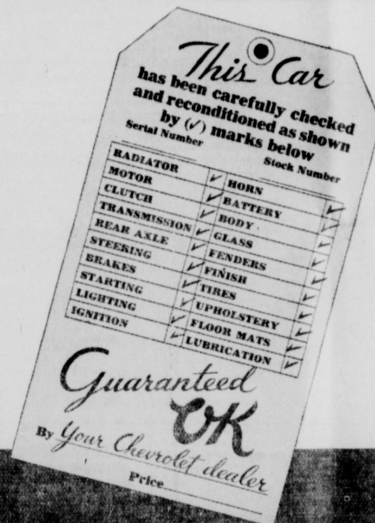

Timely Topics as Viewed By

The Problem of a Record
Feed Crop

In the August 15 issue of Farm and Ranch the following comment is made on the bumper feed crops which have been produced in the Southwest. The article says in part: "In some sections of the Southwest the lessons of last year's drought will not be quickly forgotten. Dr. Knapp, president of the Texas Technological College, at Lubbock, reports that farmers on the Plains and in the Panhandle are storing immense quantities of feedstuffs, and that the great grain sorghum crop now in the making will not be harvested if any way can be found to save it."

"The Plains and Panhandle, however, are not the only sections that have a feedstuffs problem. Every section seems to have an abundance of grains and hays, and its disposition is of urgent importance. Feed it and save it and insure for yourself a prosperous year. One of the greatest handicaps Southwestern farmers have had to overcome in past years is to secure at a reasonable cost enough feed for use during the winter and spring months. Money from cotton has been spent for feed. This year, money from cotton can be diverted to other uses, provided farmers will take care of what they have produced."

Processing Taxes and the
Consumer

"After all," says the Farmer-Stockman of August 15, "the expense of processing taxes depend upon the tolerance of consumers the nation over. Once consumers decide to wipe them out, they will go to the polls and vote for legislators instructed to do so."

"The producer is in the political minority."

"Only one-fourth of all persons in the United States live on the farm. This places three-fourths of the nation in the consumer class."

"For this reason all true supporters of the crop adjustment program should support every act of officials designed to protect the consumers of the nation to the end that they will continue to tolerate the processing taxes levied upon them."

Foreign Wheat Notes

Earlier predictions of a reduction in the 1935 wheat crop in Argentina compared with the 238,000,000 bushels harvested last year have been confirmed by reports recently received by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics from its Buenos Aires office. Drought over a large part of the wheat area forced a reduction in acreage and seriously hampered germination. Recently, the crop in some districts was damaged by frost.

What Kind of Prosperity?

"For years," says Wallace's Farmer and Home, "the United States has permitted industrial groups to evade some of the responsibilities of individual ownership and to open the way to rigid price structures and higher profits."

"These grants of governmental power to private groups have been made without consideration for consumers. In no tariff, in no set of corporation laws, is there any such provision for the protection of consumers as is found in the Agricultural Adjustment Act."

"Yet some beneficiaries of these governmental grants of power not only want their own special privileges continued, but insist that similar grants to farmers under the AAA should be abolished."

"The question before the nation in 1860 was whether a nation could exist half slave and half free. The question now is whether the nation can endure a return to a price structure half steel and half putty, to an economic structure half protected and half naked to the winds of disaster, and to leave the nation half boom and half broke."

TEXAS WELL ON WAY TO DISPOSE OF DOLE SYSTEM

Work Programs Started Over
State Gives Employment
Instead

SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 25.—With several thousand men engaged in swinging picks and shovels on dozens of projects in Texas, state Works Progress Administration officials today had plunged well into the second phase of the program intended to eradicate relief rolls in Texas.

Workers on the Lake Trammel flood damage repair project near Sweetwater Friday became first group of relief clients to receive pay checks from Works Progress Administration. On that day also, 600 laborers began to earn their pay on four projects in the Houston WPA district.

First on the list of WPA projects to receive federal appropriations for flood damage repair jobs are already under way in several sections of Texas. All of the \$300,000 federal allocation for that type of work has been allotted to Texas districts. State Project Director E. A. Hatch reported.

In addition to this lump grant, Texas has received federal allotment of \$1,534,208 in local projects, many of which have already been started or will start soon throughout the state.

At first authorizations to begin work were being mailed out to the districts whose projects were given early federal approval; state officials had completed final details on the handling of labor problems.

State officials adopted the 140-hour month as standard working time on projects. H. P. Drought, State Administrator, announced early last week.

Explaining that some deviations from this policy would be necessary due to such variable factors

as location of the projects or the availability of equipment, Drought declared that the 140-hour month will be maintained as closely as possible. Due to the nature of canning plant and sewing room activities, women will generally work 138 hours per month. Mrs. M. K. Taylor, State Women's Consultant, declared. In order to realize the full benefits of these projects, it will be necessary in some instances to work two shifts per day. Mrs. Taylor said. Women employees on other types of projects are expected to work the regular 140-hour month.

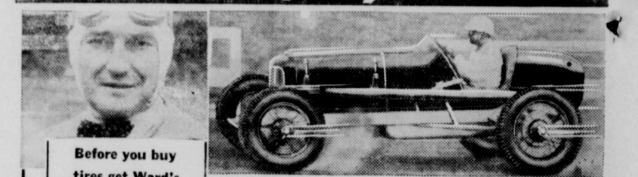

INDICATED NOW LINDBERGH WILL SAVE HAUPTMANN

Father of Slain Baby Not Sure One Person Could Commit Crime

Edward J. Reilly, chief of the defense staff for Bruno Richard Hauptmann during his trial for the murder of the Lindbergh baby, this week declared that the German carpenter's friends damaged his case by bringing the German-Jewish racial issue into the spotlight.

"Hauptmann's conviction and his approaching execution in the electric chair at Trenton, N. J., brings this factor to the forefront of public discussion, since many are still debating his innocence or guilt," Reilly states in an article in the current issue of a popular magazine.

"Expressly against my orders,"

he says, "Hauptmann's friends tried to make it seem that a Jew, Attorney General Wilentz, was persecuting a Christian. They maligned Wilentz at every opportunity from the platforms of halls where they were trying to raise funds for the defense and by issuing inflammatory printed leaflets which set forth that the whole case was a racial conflict."

This was one reason why Reilly quit the defense staff. "It was not because of non-payment of his fee, as most persons seem to think," the lawyer writes. "And it was not because I believed that Hauptmann is guilty. I cannot believe, as the State of New Jersey contended, that any one person could have kidnapped the Lindbergh baby."

I have never been able to set my mind at rest as to why Violet Sharpe committed suicide, nor why no one in the house on that fateful night heard a man entering the nursery window. I cannot adjust in my mind the fact that Hauptmann, a stranger, would know that the Lindberghs would be at Hopewell that one night when they never before had stayed there during the week, nor can I understand the strange actions of Jafie, whose offer of \$1,000 reward brought response when there were numerous rewards of \$25,000 that went unanswered.

Throughout the day I shall enjoy all the beauty of my surroundings. I shall glory in my associations and aspire to the exaltation that come with love of God and my fellow man.

I shall forgive freely before forgiveness is asked, and shall harbor ill thoughts toward none. I shall fulfill every trust, and remain poised and serene in every trial, and face every emergency without fear. I shall revere God and have the utmost respect for the religious convictions of others.

To obtain the most from life I shall give the best I have. At all times I will enliven service and perform each task cheerfully—I shall build and not destroy. And, as will I come to the end of each day with the satisfaction brought by service, serenity, kindness and love, and I shall go to my rest.
