## Saturday Explosion

# Two Injured

Once again tragedy has hovered over Hart with two residents seriously injured Saturday in an explosion at Danny's Motor Service.

Willie Diaz and Rodolfo Gonzales Jr. were taken to Central Plains Hospital in Plainview and transferred to

Lubbock General Hospital. The two were admitted to Intensive Care Unit of the Lubbock Hospital.

Diaz remains in ICU at presstime but reports were that his condition is improving. He suffered second and third degree burns over 45 percent of his body.

Gonzales was removed from ICU early this week and is doing "good". He was burned on the left side, back and face.

Danny Rodriguez, owner of the shop, was out of town at the time of the explosion. Cause remained unknown at presstime. Investigation has shown it was not a butane explosion as had been presumed since Diaz was installing a butane tank on a pickup.

## Board Rules 'Belt Tightening' Raises Taxes Just 1.5%

Trustees of Hart Independent School District in their meeting Wednesday evening voted to "tighten belts" and hold the increase in taxes for 1980-81 to one and a half percent.

Board members approved a new budget of \$1,250,155 for expenditures during the 1980-81 school year, with the tax rate raised from .65 per hundred dollars valuation to .66. Estimated revenue from Federal, State and local taxes is estimated at \$1,199,106.

In other action, board members approved a Halloween Carnival for grades kindergarten through sixth grade to be held from 1 to 3:45 p.m. Friday, Oct. 31.

Six emergency transfer students were approved.

Elementary Counselor Shirley Barnes met with the board and presented results of a survey for adult education for the local community. Approval was given to her recommendation that adult education classes be held one night each week

beginning in October.

Superintendent Ted Averitt gave an enrollment report showing 338 students in kindergarten through sixth grade and 258 students in junior high and high school.

Breakdown by classes showed enrollment at kindergarten, 39; first grade, 53; second, 60; third, 53; fourth, 34; fifth, 54; sixth, 45; seventh, 40; eighth, 48; ninth, 49; tenth, 47; eleventh and twelfth, 37 each.

Comparing enrollments from 1976 to 1980, Averitt reported, 1976, 648 enrolled; 1977, 681; 1978, 640; 1979, 643 and 1980, 596.

John Darryl McLain, 10, is still in critical condition in Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. He was admitted there Sept. 6 after suffering injuries in a fall from a pickup.

He and his wife, Merle Allison, are parents of two children, Mark and Sheila.

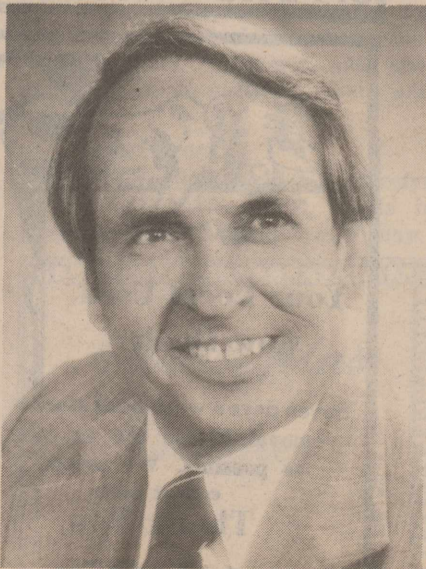
A graduate of Midland High School, he attended Hardin-Simmons University and the University of Corpus

Christi. He studied at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth.

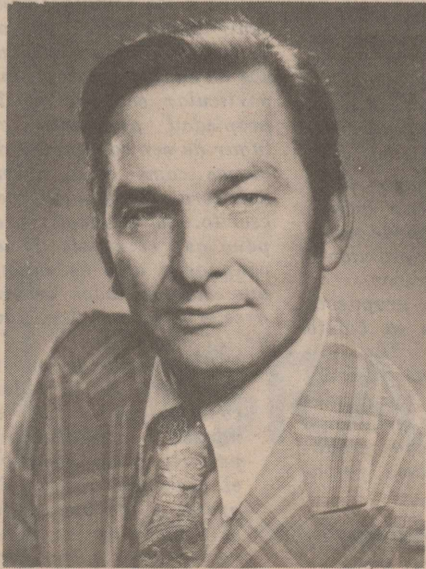

**PROPOSICION NO. 1  
EN LA BOLETA**

**Resolución Conjunta #35** del Senado propone una enmienda constitucional que autorice a la Legislatura permitir a los bancos establecer y operar máquinas registradoras automáticas (teller machines) dentro del condado o ciudad en donde están los bancos compartiendo el uso de las máquinas registradoras de acuerdo con las leyes antimonopolistas, si acaso esta operación resulta conveniente para el público. La Legislatura ya aprobó la autorización de esta legislación (H.B. 1510) para la proposición de esta enmienda.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional permite a la Legislatura autorizar que los bancos usen máquinas registradoras automáticas (teller machines) dentro del condado o ciudad de su domicilio en un plan de cooperación para conveniencia pública."

**PROPOSICION NO. 2  
EN LA BOLETA**

**Resolución Conjunta #97** de la Cámara propone una enmienda constitucional que conceda al Estado y al acusado el derecho de una apelación interlocutoria en los siguientes fallos de la corte en causas criminales: los fallos antes del juicio sobre la constitucionalidad de una ley; sobre la petición para anular, destituir, o desechar una acusación; y sobre una petición para suprimir la evidencia.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional autoriza la apelación de ciertos fallos antes del juicio de una corte en una causa criminal por el Estado o por el acusado."

**PROPOSICION NO. 3  
EN LA BOLETA**

**Resolución Conjunta #98** de la Cámara propone una enmienda constitucional que requiera una evaluación de todos los bienes sujetos a los impuestos de ad valorem y proveerá únicamente una junta para

revisar avalúos dentro de cada condado. El requisito constitucional de que la corte de comisionados del condado sea la junta de avalúos será eliminado, y a los oficiales electos del condado o de la comisión directiva de la unidad fiscal se les prohibirá servir como miembros de la junta de revisión de avalúos.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional requiere solamente una evaluación y una junta para revisión de avalúos en cada condado para determinar los impuestos de ad valorem."

**PROPOSICION NO. 4  
EN LA BOLETA**

**Resolución Conjunta #18** del Senado propone una enmienda constitucional permitiendo a la Legislatura el autorizar juegos de bingo por grupos con propósitos caritativos solamente sujetos a las limitaciones de que la operación de los juegos tiene que ser aprobada en elecciones de opción local, y que todas las ganancias tengan que ser usadas en Texas.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional autoriza los juegos de bingo bajo elecciones de opción local si los juegos son dirigidos por, ya sea, una iglesia, una sinagoga, una asociación religiosa, un servicio voluntario de bomberos, una sociedad no lucrativa de veteranos, una organización fraternal, o una sociedad no lucrativa que apoya la investigación médica o programas de tratamiento médico y si las ganancias son usadas en Texas para los propósitos caritativos de las organizaciones."

**PROPOSICION NO. 5  
EN LA BOLETA**

**Resolución Conjunta #86** de la Cámara propone una enmienda constitucional que permite a la Legislatura autorizar al Gobernador para que ejerza control fiscal de los gastos de ciertos fondos financieros previamente asignados, sujeto a las condiciones y

limitaciones proveídas por la ley y sujeto a la aprobación de un comité ejecutivo del presupuesto que constará del Gobernador, Gobernador Teniente, Presidente de la Cámara de Representantes, Presidente y Vice-presidente del Comité de Finanzas del Senado, y Presidente y Vice-presidente del Comité de Asignaciones Fiscales de la Cámara de Representantes.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional concede al Gobernador el poder para ejercer control fiscal de los gastos de los fondos asignados según la ley."

**PROPOSICION NO. 6  
EN LA BOLETA**

**Resolución Conjunta #8** del Senado propone una enmienda constitucional que permita al Gobernador remover a un oficial de su cargo aunque este haya sido previamente nombrado por el Gobernador y confirmado por el Senado. El remover al oficial será únicamente bajo el consentimiento del Senado, y si la Legislatura no está en sesión, se convocará una sesión extraordinaria del Senado, la cual no durará más de dos días, para considerar la eliminación del oficial en caso.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional autoriza que el Gobernador remueva a los oficiales nombrados bajo consejo y consentimiento del Senado."

**PROPOSICION NO. 7  
EN LA BOLETA**

**Resolución Conjunta #121** de la Cámara propone una enmienda constitucional que autorice a los condados con una población de 5000 o menos, que construyan y mantengan caminos privados cobrando razonablemente por el trabajo. Por ley, la Legislatura puede limitar esta autoridad. Los ingresos recibidos por trabajo en caminos privados se pueden usar solamente para construcción, para adquisición de derecho de paso, o para el mantenimiento de caminos públicos.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional autoriza que los condados con una población de 5000 o menos trabajen en caminos privados."

**PROPOSICION NO. 8  
EN LA BOLETA**

**Resolución Conjunta #36**

del Senado propone una enmienda constitucional que cambie la jurisdicción y autoridad de las cortes de apelación del Estado. La enmienda cambiará el nombre de Cortes de Apelaciones Civiles a, Cortes de Apelación, dando a estas cortes jurisdicción de apelación sobre casos criminales y civiles. La enmienda cambiará el título de los Jueces Asociados de la Corte Suprema a, Jueces, y requerirá que los miembros de la Corte Suprema sean abogados con licencia del estado de Texas mientras permanezcan en el puesto.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional que cambia el nombre de Cortes de Apelaciones Civiles y el nombre y requisito de los Jueces de la Corte Suprema y dicta la jurisdicción y autoridad de las cortes de apelación."

**PROPOSICION NO. 9  
EN LA BOLETA**

**Resolución Conjunta #54** de la Cámara propone una enmienda constitucional que define la propiedad que posee cualquiera de los cónyuges como separada, incluyendo las dos clases—de bienes raíces y los bienes inmuebles—los tales fueron propiedad de alguno de los cónyuges antes del matrimonio o fueron adquiridos después como un regalo, ya sea un legado de bienes raíces, o de descendencia. Las parejas que están por casarse o los que ya están casados, y sin la intención de defraudar a sus acreedores preexistentes, pueden repartirse de vez en cuando, entre si y por escrito, toda o parte de su propiedad. Pueden también intercambiar un interés común en bienes poseídos o que van a poseer por un interés común en la comunidad de bienes. La enmienda permitirá a los cónyuges convenir por escrito que los ingresos o bienes derivados de cualquier propiedad particular seguirá siendo propiedad particular en lugar de ser comunidad de bienes como sería si no existiera este convenio por escrito. La enmienda propone que el regalo de un cónyuge a otro se supone que incluye todos los ingresos y bienes derivados de tal regalo.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional permite a los cónyuges el consentir que los ingresos o los bienes que se derivan de los bienes particulares permanecerán como bienes particulares."

# Longhorns And Mustangs Battle To 7-7 Deadlock

Hart Longhorns traveled to Shallowater to face the Mustangs before a packed homecoming crowd. Both teams scored early and the Mustangs survived "four" Longhorn threats to manage a 7-7 tie game.

The Longhorns received the opening kickoff and were forced to punt after three downs. The Mustangs took the ball at their own 32 yard line and drove 68 yards in 11 plays for the first score of the game. Rufino Maldonado took the ball in from 2 yards out. Robert Sanders added the PAT so with 3:29 left in the first quarter the Mustangs led 7-0. The drive was highlighted by a 16 yard run from Maldonado. Also QB Mark Jungman hit Sanders with a 20 yard pass to set up the touchdown. This TD marked the first score of any kind against the Longhorn defense.

The Longhorns received the ensuing kickoff and after an 18 yard runback by Clay Barnes, the Horns' offense began to roll. Starting from their own 39 yard line QB Derek Rich wasted no time in putting the ball in the air. Rich hit end Chad Black on successive pass plays for 19 and 13 yards. After several running plays up the middle, Rich, behind good line blocking, found Black wide open for 22 yards and the score. The TD capped an 8 play 61 yard drive. Clay Barnes added the PAT and with 2:26 left in the first quarter the score was knotted 7-7.

Neither team threatened in the second quarter as both defenses settled in and played good ball. The score at halftime still read 7-7.

Shallowater took the ball to begin the second half of play. On the very first play from scrimmage Isais Ponce caused Mustang FB Richard Smith to fumble, and DE Benny McLain pounced on the loose ball at the Mustangs' 30 yard line.


Spurred by runs from Leonard Washington and Ponce, the Horns reached the 13 yard line before a fumble halted the drive.

The Mustangs took over, but could not move the ball against a "fired up" Longhorn defense. After a short punt the Horns found themselves again in good field position. Runs by Washington and Ponce, and the passing combination of Rich to Black got the ball down to the 5 yard line. On fourth and two from the 5, the Longhorns again fumbled and the

Mustangs recovered at their own 2 yard line.

Shallowater never presented a real threat after their first scoring drive. Yet, the Longhorns came close several times. Behind the running of Daniel Guzman and the passing of Rich the Horns knocked on the door late in the game. With time running out Manuel Castenada intercepted a Mustang pass at the 16 yard line. QB Rich went to the airways and threw what appeared to be the game winning TD, but the Horns were flagged for an illegal man down field. The Longhorns moved down to the Mustangs' 23 yard line before a last second field goal attempt was short, leaving the game in a 7-7 tie.

Even though the Horns were at a size disadvantage, they kept fighting until the final seconds ticked off the clock.

## PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1980

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate unmanned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with anti-trust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or the city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve the public convenience."

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 97 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the State and the accused the right to an interlocutory appeal from the following trial court rulings in criminal cases: pretrial rulings on the constitutionality of a statute; on a motion to quash, dismiss, or set aside an indictment; and on a motion to suppress evidence.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing appeal of certain pretrial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused."

### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 98 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require a single appraisal of all property subject to ad valorem taxation and would provide for a single board of equalization within each county. The con-

stitutional requirement that the county commissioners court sit as a board of equalization would be eliminated, and elected officials of the county or governing body of the taxing unit would be prohibited from serving as members of the board of equalization.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment requiring a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes."

### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations."

### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the Governor to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of certain appropriated funds, subject to any conditions and limitations provided by law and subject to the ap-

proval of a budget execution committee that would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to grant the governor power to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated funds as provided by law."

### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Governor who appointed a previously confirmed official to remove that official from office subject to the advice and consent of the Senate; and if the Legislature is not in session, to call a special session of the Senate which may last no longer than 2 days for consideration of the removal.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the governor to remove appointed officers with the advice and consent of the senate."

### PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 121 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize counties with a population of 5000 or less to construct and maintain private roads if they impose a reasonable charge for the work. The Legislature by general law may limit this authority. Revenue received from private road work may be used only for the construction, including right-of-way acquisition, or maintenance of public roads.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties with a population of 5000 or less to perform private road work."

### PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitution-

al amendment that would change the jurisdiction and authority of the State's appellate courts. The amendment would change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals to Courts of Appeal and provide that these courts have intermediate appellate jurisdiction over both criminal and civil cases. The amendment would change titles for the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court to Justices and would require members of the Supreme Court to be attorneys licensed in this state while holding office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals and the names and qualifications of the justices of the Supreme Court and to prescribe the jurisdiction and authority of the appellate courts."

### PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment which defines separate property owned by either spouse as all property, both real and personal, of a spouse owned or claimed before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent. Persons about to marry and spouses, without the intent to defraud pre-existing creditors, may by written instrument from time to time partition between themselves all or part of their property. Spouses may exchange a community interest in property owned or to be acquired for a community interest in other community property. The amendment would allow spouses to agree in writing that income or property arising from any separate property is to be separate property rather than as community property as it would be in the absence of an agreement. The amendment proposes that a gift from one spouse to another is presumed to include all income or property deriving from such gift.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing spouses to agree that income or property arising from separate property is to be separate property."
