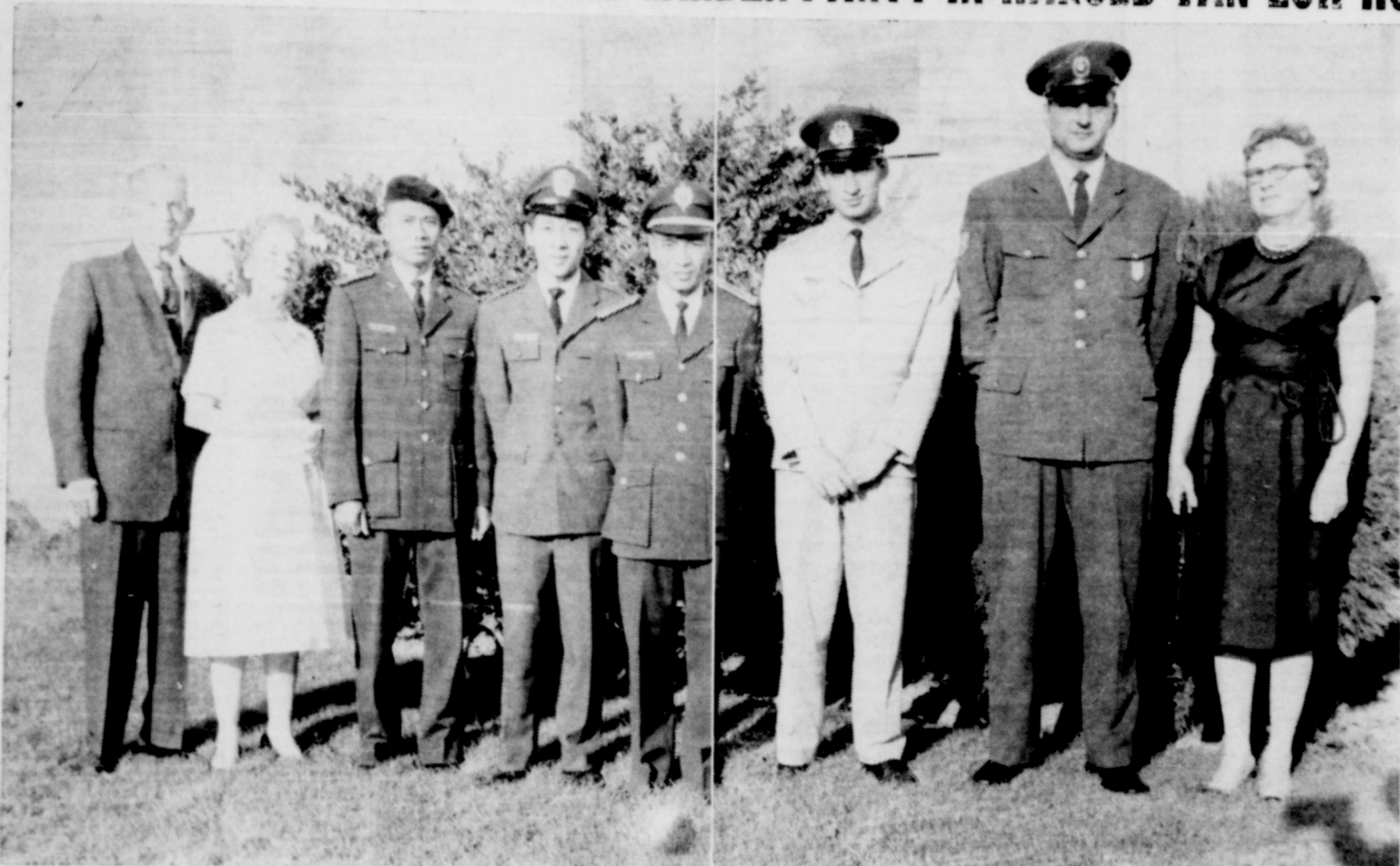

"Your Pre-Adolescent Child" will be the topic of the first public education program presented by the Wichita Mental Health Association. The free program will be held at the Midwestern University Student Center Ballroom October 17 at 10:00 a. m. Free nursery care will be available at the First Presbyterian Church. Speaking for the Association will be Dr. John Meeks, Child Psychiatrist from Sheppard Air Force Base hospital.

Captain Meeks comes to Sheppard from Cincinnati, Ohio, where he was affiliated with the Neuro - Psychiatric Department of the University of Cincinnati. After serving three years as a resident and senior fellow in the University hospital, Captain Meeks specialized in Child Psychiatry and has practiced in that field for the past year. "TO SECURE LIBERTY"

Today is July 4, 1962—186 years after the Declaration of Independence brought the United States of America into being at Philadelphia.

In the Declaration of Independence it said: "We hold these truths to be self evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness—which the Laws of Nature and Nature's God entitle them — And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the Protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred honor."

Upon the above enunciated principles, underscored by a firm faith in God, the United States of America was born. Our nation has survived thus far, because we have daily and weekly newspapers—a Free Press.

Human nature being what it is; selfish, covetous and desirous of power over other fellow beings, the United States would not have lasted long, had there not been newspapers free to criticize and expose.

If our American newspapers were now not free, but government controlled, like TV and radio now are, in five years our county, state and Federal governments would all rule in a totalitarian manner, more tyrannical than England imposed on the American Colonies.

When radio first, and then TV began news broadcasts, many people predicted that the circulation of newspapers would sharply decline, if not finally be completely replaced by radio and TV listeners. Such has not been the case.

Since the advent of TV, the new subscribers to daily and weekly American Newspapers has been more than all the TV sets sold. What's the reason? There are many. First, the TV newscasts are skimpy, just whetting the viewer and listener's curiosity for more details—the only place where he or she can get these full details is from

their newspaper—if they are not getting a daily paper they subscribe.

Another thing that causes radio and TV listeners to subscribe for daily and weekly papers, is because Mr. John Q. Public knows that all TV and radio stations can only operate through a Federal license, and that most TV and radio systems only give a one sided or slanted picture of controversial news—slanted to please the "high brass" of the Federal administration that happens to be in power.

I am informed that the number of weekly newspaper subscribers have increased nearly double since the end of World War II. There are several reasons for this. Our metropolitan cities in recent years have greatly increased in population, from the rural villages and towns. These men and women from the rural areas that come to the city, still have nostalgic memories of their "back home" communities and most subscribe for their "home paper," and read every line in it each week.

Another reason for the upsurge in weekly newspaper subscribers, is that many of these weeklies have editors that can, and do, write fine editorials on controversial issues, that attract subscribers far beyond home—such as the Pecos Independent.

So long as our daily and weekly newspapers survive, as a Free Press, our nation will survive as a Free United States—But, if ever our newspapers are required to have a Federal license to operate, like radio and TV, we will have a controlled press, controlled economy and a totalitarian government where there is no individual liberty and freedom.

Family FINANCIAL PROTECTION

Policyholder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance

Q. While looking over my life insurance policies recently, I discovered that I had accidentally made a mistake in stating my age at the time the policy was issued. Does this mean the policy is void?

A. No, but you should notify your life insurance company at once so that the mistake can be corrected. When you misstate your age, the benefits payable



under most current policies shall be increased or decreased to the amount that your premiums actually would have purchased at the company's established rate for your correct age.

Q. I have a total of \$25,000 of life insurance, spread out among eight different policies, ranging in size from \$1,000 to \$5,000. I have taken them out at various times during the past 15 years. Wouldn't I be better off to combine them all into a single policy?

A. Many life insurance companies offer a slightly lower premium rate for larger policies because of the higher relative cost of administering smaller policies. If two or more of your existing policies are term (or temporary) insurance, it would be worthwhile for you to consider combining these and at the same time converting to permanent policies.

But you would definitely not be better off to cancel any permanent life insurance acquired at a younger age in order to take out a larger policy at your present age. You would have to pay a higher premium now because you are older, and this would probably offset by many times the small "quantity discount" you might receive for a larger policy. Furthermore, your cash values and other benefits usually build up at a faster rate after a policy has been in force for several years.

If two or more of your permanent policies are with the same life insurance company, it might be possible for you to arrange with the company to combine these into a single policy without losing the benefits you have built up through the years. However, this would be a special arrangement. You normally do not have an "automatic right" to do it.

Some people find it more convenient to pay their annual premiums when they have several smaller policies, because they can stagger their payments throughout the year.

AT HOME

...in inner or outer space

There's a new day coming for those of you who want something other than the severe modern look in the living room. The warm, rich comfort of the Biedermeier period is about to be revived, together with memories of the good life in Vienna when the 19th century was very young.

No one has ever known exactly why this fine, classic furniture, which takes its inspiration from ancient Greece, should have been named for dear old "Papa Biedermeier", an amusing fellow much celebrated in song and story, who never actually existed. However, both the name and the style have endured for almost 200 years, and now, thanks to designer-decorator Henry Sheehan and other discerning interior stylists, is about to reappear in an adaptation suitable for contemporary homes.

Mr. Sheehan has long proclaimed that interiors need warmth, and interest and a certain richness of detail to give those who live in them a sense of comfort and well being. To this end he has just created a classic Biedermeier setting in his own New York apartment, and judging by the way the cameras were clicking there the other day, you will be seeing many pictures of this distinguished new interior.

The window treatment, I thought, was one of the most interesting details. The windows are hung from ceiling to floor with a damask pattern

of white printed on a warm "golden ochre", and the window shades are screen printed in exactly the same color and pattern. There now, is a new idea and one that is surprisingly inexpensive to copy.

After dusting Venetian blinds the past quarter of a century, a lot of us are going to welcome the return of the simple window shade, especially since it has emerged in an infinite variety of styles, colors and patterns.

Window shades of such elegant materials as pleated boucle are now being made by the Joanna Western Mills, and there is also a host of decorative stripes and floral and other patterns from which to choose. The shades are all treated with plastic so they are sturdy and long wearing and wipe clean with a damp cloth.

There is no end to the ways you can make them fit into your own decorating scheme by adding ball fringe, decorative bands across the bottom, or simply by using interesting shade pulls. Recently I have seen everything from harnes brass to Japanese tea kettle handles used for this purpose, not to mention handsome tassels from the trimmings counter, sea shells, and ordinary wooden drapery rings either plain or painted.

So do investigate the new decorated, plastic-treated window shades as a simple, practical way to give your windows a touch of fresh design.

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Family FINANCIAL PROTECTION

Policyholder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance

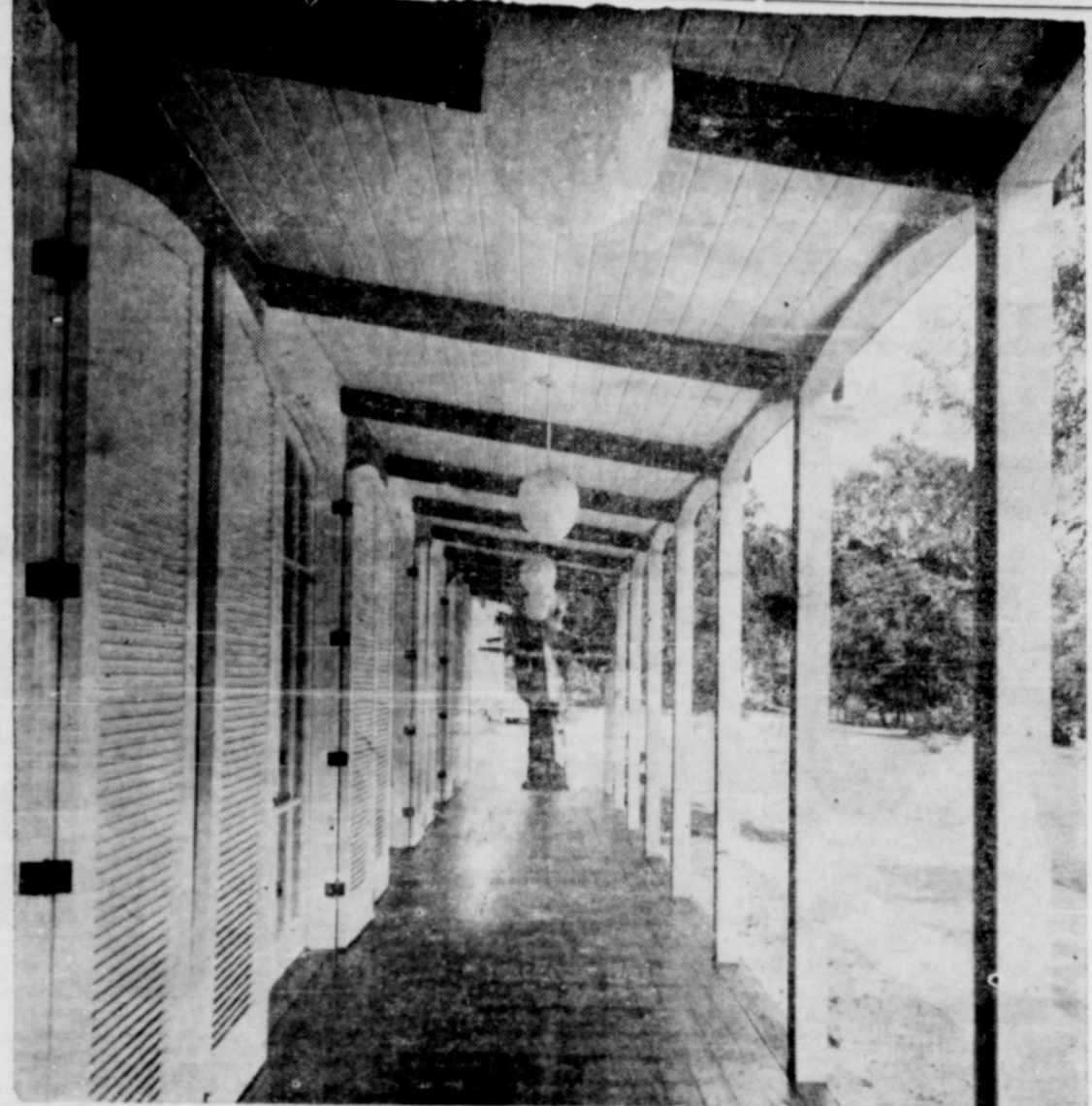
Q What is the maximum age which a person can take out life insurance?
A Theoretically, a person could be insured at any age under 100, because the standard mortality tables now in effect throughout the United States set 100 years as the policyholder's maximum expectancy for insurance purposes. Reserves and cash values of most whole life policies are calculated to reach their maximum value at age 100. It's true that some people live to well beyond 100, in which case they collect the face values of their whole life policies while they are still alive.



Q As a practical matter, however, are premiums charged for life insurance policies issued to persons extremely advanced age would be prohibitively high?
A Life insurance companies do issue straight life policies to people as old as 75, if they are insurable, and some companies insure people well beyond that age. The premium rate on a type policy issued at age 75 would be about \$125 per year for \$1,000 of insurance.

Q Regardless of the age at which a straight life policy is issued, can a policyholder keep it in force without any increase in premium for the rest of his life?
A Yes, until he collects the full face value at age 100.

Q Why should I take out an individual life insurance policy, when I already have all the insurance I need through my group policy with my employer?
A Your group life insurance provides protection as long as you remain with your present employer and he continues to keep the group policy in effect. But if you should retire or leave your job for any reason, or if your employer should drop the policy, your protection would normally end. Of course, you would have the privilege of converting your group insurance to an ordinary policy. But your premium would then be based on your age at the time you converted. And you might find that it would be a lot more costly in the long run than permanent, individual life insurance taken out at your present age. A permanent policy is not affected by any change in your employment.

IT'S UP TO YOU

PRESIDENT KENNEDY is right in demanding that wage increases be geared to corresponding increases in productivity. Disregarding this essential principle, Walter P. Reuther made a plea to the United Auto Workers Convention calling for pay increases greater than productivity gains. Reuther said this would strengthen our economy by increasing the purchasing power of our workers leading to increased output.



Mr. Reuther overlooks the essential fact that pay increases lead to rising prices, less demand and fewer jobs. Pay increases, when not made possible by more efficient production, must come from the public in the form of higher prices or from decreased returns to owners—that is, lower dividends. If the wage increase is taken from the public they will buy less and more men will be thrown out of work. If it is taken from the owners, it will discourage saving and sooner or later capital will not be available to supply new and improved machinery and tools for the use of the worker. That, in turn, will lower their earnings. There is another principle involved. The most equitable way to distribute fairly the fruits of rising production is lowering prices to the public. This raises the standard of living by enabling everyone to purchase more, which in turn supplies more jobs for workers. It is the savings of the people, when invested in better tools and equipment, that make it possible for workers to produce more. Surely the people who save the money and make this possible are entitled to some consideration. If they do not receive it, saving will decline, workers will have to use less efficient equipment resulting in lower income for them and higher priced goods for the public. That will mean fewer sales and fewer jobs for workers.

Stunning, Strawberry—And New!



There's a bit of real springtime in this fall recipe—it is the new fresh fruit taste of strawberry flavor gelatin. 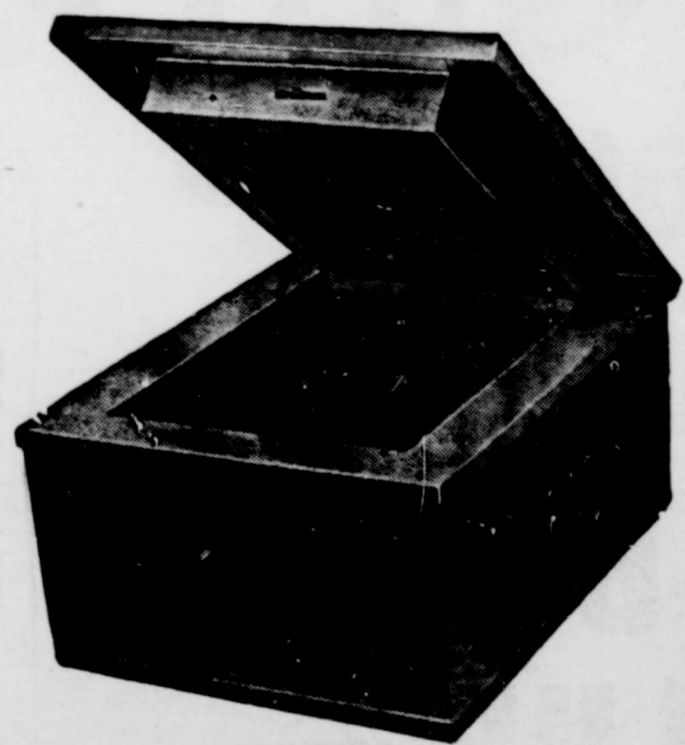

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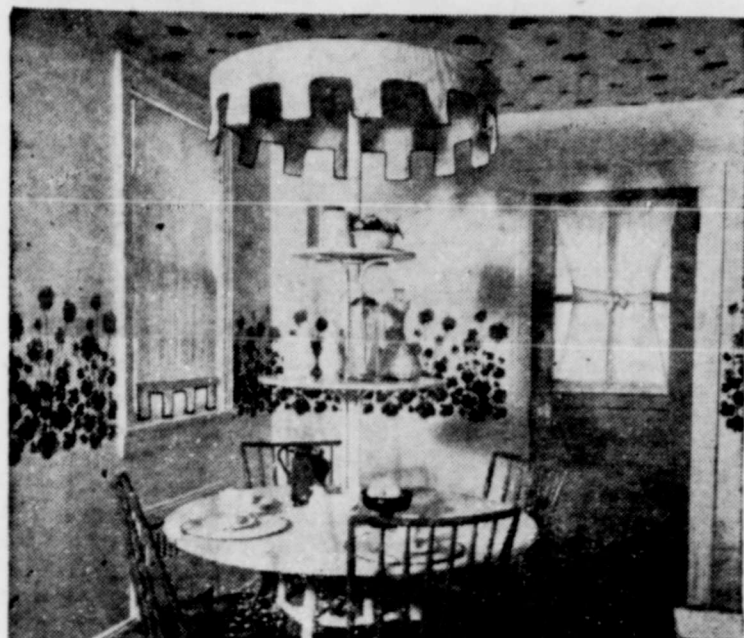

Make the Most of Wood To Add 'Warmth' to Rooms



A red-and-white striped shade attached inside the wood window frames matches the decorative canopy over this cheerful breakfast nook. White batiste is stretched over the window panes in the panel door, then gathered with a center tie-back.

"Use lots of wood windows, and let the wood show as much as possible, if you want to give a room a happy look," advises Lee Berman.

Mrs. Berman, who is a partner in the firm of Aronin-Berman Associates, New York interior decorators and designers, says that one of the best ways to make a room comfortable, cheerful, and practical is to make the most of windows.

"I like to use livable materials for a feeling of what I call formal informality, and wood windows fall in this category," she says. "When windows are attractive, we often leave them almost completely exposed. For example, on double-hung wood windows with many small panes, I may stretch batiste tightly on rods placed inside the frames at the top and bottom of the window, leaving most of the wood exposed. A narrow tie around the center of the stretched curtain also exposes some of the grillework. The wood, whether painted or stained, is an important decorating element in the room."

"If a house has metal windows, we usually cover them with wood frames to give them a warm look."

Tiebacks for curtains and draperies are very popular these days, says Mrs. Berman, and so are window shades. Both of these window treatments make wood windows important, since they expose the framing sections. "It's very easy to install window shades on wood windows, leaving the frames exposed," she notes.

Mrs. Berman points out that most of the windows she and her partner work with are stock units of ponderosa pine that come from building material dealers ready to install.

"We use wood all the time for a variety of effects," Mrs. Berman says. "We recently did a children's room, using black burlap on one wall and a patterned paper on the others. The wood floor was stained red and wood shutters were stained a dark natural color. The wood windows were painted red. With lots of good artificial lighting and plenty of daylight when the shutters are open, it's a very happy-looking, red-white-and-black room that's quite practical to care for."

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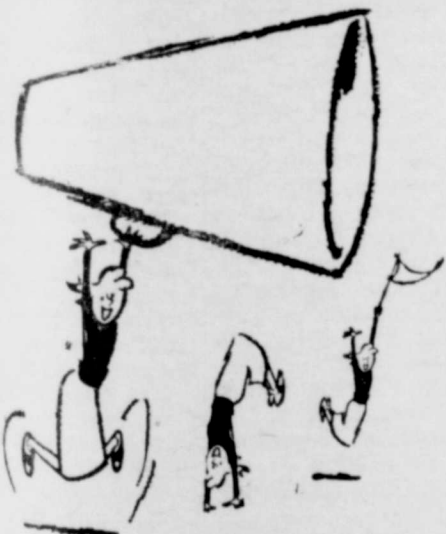

The Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program has not completed eradication of this costly livestock pest in the Southwest, but if letters and comments received by the staff of the "screwworm fly factory" at Mission, Texas, are any indication, a large number of livestock producers and sportsmen are extremely pleased with the program. B. T. Haws, county agent, reports.

A DeWitt County ranchman said, "I have had only one screwworm case up to midyear. Normally I would have had 15 to 20 cases. I have found several egg masses which have not hatched. They have just dried up and indicate the release of sterile flies in the area is helping now."

An East Texas cattleman (Kilgore) recently stated: "Not having to treat screwworms this year has already saved me more money than the 50 cents per head I contributed to the program last spring. I'm ready to put up again this year."

Members of the board of trustees of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation comment that just such an attitude will be needed on the part of livestock men and sportsmen in order to carry the planned program to its completion.

The foundation was instrumental in raising \$1.7 million toward a \$3 million goal last spring and hopes to raise the remainder in October. The eradication program entails the production and sterilization of screwworm flies at the Mission plant and the release of the sterile flies over a 60,000 square mile area of the Southwest. The mating between the sterile male flies and naturally-occurring females will result in the production of infertile eggs.

Federal inspectors within the sterile fly release area have been making weekly reports which are extremely favorable. Many reported cases at the beginning of 1962, falling off to none during the past few weeks.

In Gillespie County, a producer described how he found a baby calf with its navel covered with screwworm eggs. It was not doctored but the eggs did not hatch. This section of the county has been a "hot spot" for screwworms according to the County Agent, C. A. Stone.

U. S. Department of Agriculture, Texas Animal Health Commission and SWAHRF say the next few months will "tell the tale" on the program as they hope winter weather will destroy the flies in the northern areas of the Southwest, while the release of sterile flies eradicates the pest in the overwintering area.

Q. Why can't pinworms be started in schools? I have spent a small fortune on medication and now the doctor tells me that my children can become infected again. I dread to send them to school. What can I do to start a control program?

A. Recently developed drugs are highly effective and, with proper hygiene, will clear up pinworm infestation in short order. However, reinfestation can occur any time. An outbreak among school children does present problems unless every parent is willing to cooperate. Don't become over-alarmed, but should you encounter more difficulty, why not discuss the matter with the school nurse or principal? We realize that it is a delicate subject, but with a tactful approach, you may accomplish a very worthwhile educational endeavor.
