Former Drug Users Seeking Aid For Rehabilitation Center

Four former drug abusers are in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico from Jan. 8 to Feb. 20 contacting cattlemen to procure the beef necessary to feed young men and women who live in Synanon, the drug rehabilitation center which has grown in fourteen years from a small group

of addicts to a unified community with centers in five California cities and in Michigan.

The four are Roy Gewant, Les Hart, Arlene Heede, and Don Thornton.

Roy Gewant used heroin and other drugs for 15 years, served

time in many state and federal institutions, and was considered incurable when he arrived at Synanon's door five years ago. Roy is an example of what can happen at Synanon for those declared "incurable" -- he has remained free of drugs for five years now, and is a role model for newer residents of Synanon. Roy, 36, is now married and he and his wife live in Synanon's ranch community near Tomales Bay in Northern California.

Les Hart is from Gruver, Texas, where his father, Don Hart, operates feedlots. In 1971, two Synanon representatives were in the Gruver area, contacting local cattle feeders. They met Don Hart and told him about Synanon's program for drug rehabilitation and reeducation. Don asked them to talk to his son, Les, who was using pills and psychedelics and had found other "cure" tries totally unsuccessful. The Synanon representatives talked to Les, and four days later he came to Synanon where he has been successfully rebuilding his life for almost two years.

Arlene Heede, 25, began smoking marijuana in college, then went on to pills and finally heroin. Three years ago she came to Synanon, after spending time in hospitals and jails trying to end her addiction. Now she's one of the team members for Synanon's Supply

Department, the department with the responsibility of seeing that Synanon obtains the food and other needs to keep it operating.

Don Thornton is 38. He started using pot and pills when he was in his teens, and after he got out of the Army began with heroin. For the next eight years he was in and out of jails and hospitals because of his heroin addiction. Then he came to Synanon in 1965 and he's been completely free of drugs ever since, able now to offer a helping hand to others still caught up in the

Grain Program

Castro Farmers Making Choice

Castro County farmers may want to do some "pencil pushing" now to determine which of the two options offered under the 1973 Feed Grain Program will work best for them. If so, here is an example how a producer can figure out his total preliminary set-aside payment and the rate per acre of set-aside.

Under Option A, the producer sets aside 30 percent of his feed grain base and earns a set-aside payment computed by multiplying the program yield for the farm times half his base, times 35 cents for corn, 33 cents for grain sorghum, and 28 cents for barley.

Using the national average yields announced with the 1973 feed grain program, (87 bushels for corn, 57 for grain sorghum, and 44 for barley) here is an example of how a farmer would figure his payment under Option A. (Note: each producer should use his own program yield and feed grain base to figure his payments.)

In this example, the farmer has a 200-acre corn base, 100-acre grain sorghum base, and a 50-acre barley base. His total feed grain base is 350 acres, so his set-aside would be 105 acres (350 x .30). His preliminary payment would be figured on his corn, grain sorghum, and barley bases and then totaled. First, he multiplies half of his corn base (100 acres) times the established yield (87 bushels), times 35 cents, for a sub-total of \$3,045. Next, he multiplies half of his grain sorghum base (50 acres) times the established yield (57 bushels) times 33 cents, for a sub-total of \$940.50. Then he multiplies

half of his barley base (25 acres) times the established yield (44 bushels) times 28 cents for a sub-total of \$308. The total of these three figures,

which is \$4,293.50, will be his preliminary payment for setting aside 105 acres. This figures out to be \$40.89 per acre for Continued On Page 6

Leading Duroc Sale Set Feb. 23-24 In Plainview

The leading Duroc hog sale of the nation is slated for Feb. 23-24 in Plainview, according to Area Swine Specialist, Dr. Gilbert Hollis of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Lubbock.

The 17th annual National and Southwestern Duroc Winter Type Congress, sponsored by Southwestern Duroc Breeders Association whose president is Lanny Tucker, is expected to draw more than 100 consignors and breeders from 20 states with a slate of 30 bred gilts, 150 open gilts and 150 boars on tap for sale.

The two-day meeting scheduled at the Hale County Agricultural Center, ranks among the nation's leading sales of Duroc swine, says Hollis, who works with swine producers, breeders and organizations on the Texas High Plains.

"All the breeders participating will bring the best of

their herds to the winter-type Congress and sale," says Hollis. "But even the hogs in lower brackets are still top hogs for producers to consider for purchase. Consignors will have top competition because some of the nation's leading breeders have been consigned."

Entries will be accepted on Feb. 22, with judging of barrows and gilts getting under way at 8 a. m. the next day. Junior open gilts, senior open gilts, junior boars and senior boars will be judged in order. Over \$6,000 in premiums will be awarded. Trophies will be donated by the Plainview Chamber of Commerce.

A banquet and business meeting will be at 7 p. m. Feb. 23, at the Holiday Inn.

The sale of open gilts and boars will start the next day's activities at 9 a. m.

Cotton Harvest Resumes On Drying South Plains

Cotton harvest operations began increasing on the South Plains as fields dried out, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office of the U.S.D.A. Most activity was in the counties west and south of Lubbock but activity is increasing over the whole area.

Samples from 30,000 bales were tested and classed at the South Plains U.S.D.A. cotton classing offices at Lubbock, Brownfield, Lamesa and Levelland during the week ending Friday, Jan. 19. This brought the total classed for the season to 1,318,000 bales.

Estimates indicate that approximately three-fourths of this season's crop is now out of the fields.

Grades at Lubbock were about the same as the previous week. Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42) was the predominant grade, making up 20 percent of all cotton classed. Strict low Middling (41) made up 17 percent, Low Middling (51) 16 percent and Low Middling Light Spotted (52) 11 percent.

Average staple length also

remained about the same. Staples continued to be predominantly 30 to 33. Fifteen percent had a staple length of 30, 17 percent stapled 31, 30 percent was 32 and 27 percent was 33.

Micronaire readings were slightly higher. However, only 19 percent of all cotton classed at Lubbock had micronaire readings in the premium range of 3.5 through 4.9, 10 percent "miked" 3.3 through 3.4, 34 percent was 3.0 through 3.2, 29 percent 2.7 through 2.9 and 8 percent was 2.6 and below.

The Agricultural Marketing Service of the U.S.D.A. reported brisk trading on the Lubbock market. Prices were \$2.50 to \$5.00 per bale higher on all cotton, but demand continued strongest for better grade, premium micronaire cotton. Prices ranged from \$2.50 per bale over the loan for low grade, low micronaire cotton up to \$50.00 per bale over the loan for high grade, premium micronaire cotton.

Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 premium micronaire range were: Strict Low Middling (41) staple 32 - 27.15 cents per pound, Strict Low Middling (41) staple 33 - 28.65, Low Middling (51) staple 32 - 25.80, Low Middling (51) staple 33 - 26.35, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42) staple 32 - 26.15 and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42) staple 33 - 26.80.

Cottonseed prices were steady and farmers received \$46 to \$56 per ton for their cottonseed at gins.

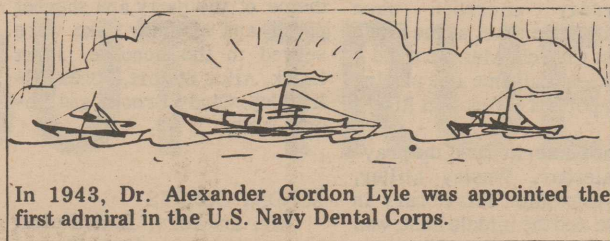
Date Changed

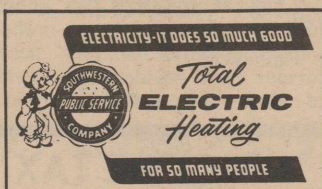

IT'S A GASSER

This first dirigible to be built in West Germany since 1945 is 197 feet long, 48 feet wide, and cruises at 62 miles an hour.



Filled with helium, which can't burn, the airship can carry seven passengers and flies at an altitude of about 5,000 feet, powered by two Rolls Royce engines.

Seeing the dirigible at night can be an illuminating experience, for 5,000 colored electric lights shine from the exterior. The dirigible was built at the Essen/Mulheim Airport in West Germany, and is now flying for an advertising firm. A second dirigible will soon be delivered to Japan where it will be used as a flying laboratory.

Dirigibles were originally called 'zeppelins', named after Ferdinand von Zeppelin who invented them. Born in Germany, he came to the United States in 1863 and joined an exploring expedition bound for the sources of the Mississippi River. At St. Paul, Minn., he made his first ascent in a captive balloon. His first successful dirigible was flown in 1900.

his set-aside land.

Using the same example for Option B, under which the farmer sets aside 15 percent of his feed grain base and earns 24 cents per bushel for corn, 23 cents per bushel for grain sorghum, and 20 cents per bushel for barley, his total set-aside payment is \$2,963.50 or \$56.45 per acre set aside.

An example of how this is figured follows:

Fifteen percent of his 350-acre feed grain base is 52 1/2 acres that he sets aside. Then, as above, the farmer multiplies half his corn base (100) times his established yield (87) times 24 cents for a sub-total of \$2,088; next he multiplies half his grain sorghum base (50) times his established yield (57) times 23 cents for a sub-total of

\$655.50. Then he multiplies half his barley base (25) times the established yield (44) times 20 cents for a sub-total of \$220. The total of these three figures is \$2,963.50 for setting aside 52 1/2 acres, or \$56.45 per acre set aside.

Option A participants are guaranteed that if the difference between the 5-month (Oct. 1973 - Feb. 1974) national average price received by farmers and 70% of parity (Oct. 1, 1973) for corn is greater than 35 cents per bushel, the difference will be made up in supplemental payments after March 1, 1974. The guarantee for grain sorghum and barley is similar, taking into consideration their relationship to corn in feed value. Option B participants agree to forgo this guarantee and are not eligible for any supplemental payment.

Option A participants are not limited in the total amount of feed grain they may produce after maintaining their set-aside and conserving base. Option B participants agree not to

increase their 1973 feed grain acreages above what they had in 1972. However, no limit is placed on their soybean acreage or production of other non-quota crops.

drug scene.

Roy, Les, Arlene and Don personify the clean-cut, personable, healthy young men and women produced by Synanon, where the emphasis is on hard, rewarding work, wholesome socializing, self-reliance, honesty, and personal responsibility.

While in the three states, the four Synanon people will be available to local youths who may be in need of Synanon's environment. They will speak publicly or privately to individuals or groups requesting their appearance.

From a storefront operation in 1958, founded by Chuck Dederich, an ex-alcoholic, and subsidized by his \$33 unemployment check, Synanon has become in 1972 the oasis for nearly 2,000 men, women and children from every corner of the United States.

Synanon is responsible for the pioneering and development of the self-help concept of drug addict rehabilitation, an approach that is now widely accepted as being, by far, the most effective.

In late 1971, Synanon turned its energies toward the lost generation -- America's teenagers. At no charge, with no federal or state welfare aid, Synanon welcomed 500 addicts, mostly teenagers, juvenile delinquents, some Vietnam war veterans.

One of the facilities Synanon operates is a factory building encompassing one square city block in San Francisco, a gift from N L Industries (Dutch Boy Paints). This additional space will enable another group of addicts to enter Synanon this year.

Another unprecedented change has taken place at Synanon, allowing it to accept more new residents. Two full-scale ranches have been acquired in California. There young people are developing character, getting in top physical and mental condition in the clean country air, and gaining their self-respect in Synanon's drug-free, alcohol-free, crime-free, violence-free and tobacco-free community.

Roy Gewant, Les Hart, Arlene Heede and Don Thornton have three purposes in their current Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico trip: to thank the cattle industry for the tremendous support it has given Synanon in the past, to impart the need for continued support of Synanon in its efforts to reshape the lives of the many additional troubled individuals who are seeking help, and to provide information to anyone who may wish Synanon's help in solving their own problems of drug addiction, alcoholism, alienation, or other character disorder.

It takes 400 head of cattle a year to feed the Synanon population, and organizations like the National Livestock Feeders' Association, Texas Cattle Feeders Association, Kansas Livestock Association, Nebraska Livestock Feeders' Association, Colorado Cattle Feeders Association, Arizona and California Cattle Feeders, and Iowa Livestock Feeders Association and Iowa Beef Producers Association have given Synanon their full support.

Synanon continues to grow and provide a service to the community, and a home to those in need. In addition to cattle, the American business community provides other food

items, clothing, automotive parts, building materials, and other essential items.

Education is a key word in Synanon today. A wide variety of on-the-job vocational training takes place. The Synanon School (approved by the State of California Department of Education) offers a full range of subjects. A research institute, where Synanon will study its own processes, has recently been added to the educational opportunities available to Synanon residents. A full-fledged animal husbandry training program is conducted at the Synanon Ranch.

Synanon has revitalized the Good Samaritan concept. It has become everybody's good neighbor, not just by creating wholesome, responsible human beings out of addicts and alcoholics and criminals, but by expanding its horizons and going out to help others.

Some of its good neighbor moves have been to develop two fire departments which respond to fire and emergency calls outside of Synanon, including national forest fire assistance; to bring the Synanon process into the San Francisco County Jail to reduce tensions there; and to operate a search and rescue boat in Northern California to aid in swimming and boating accidents.

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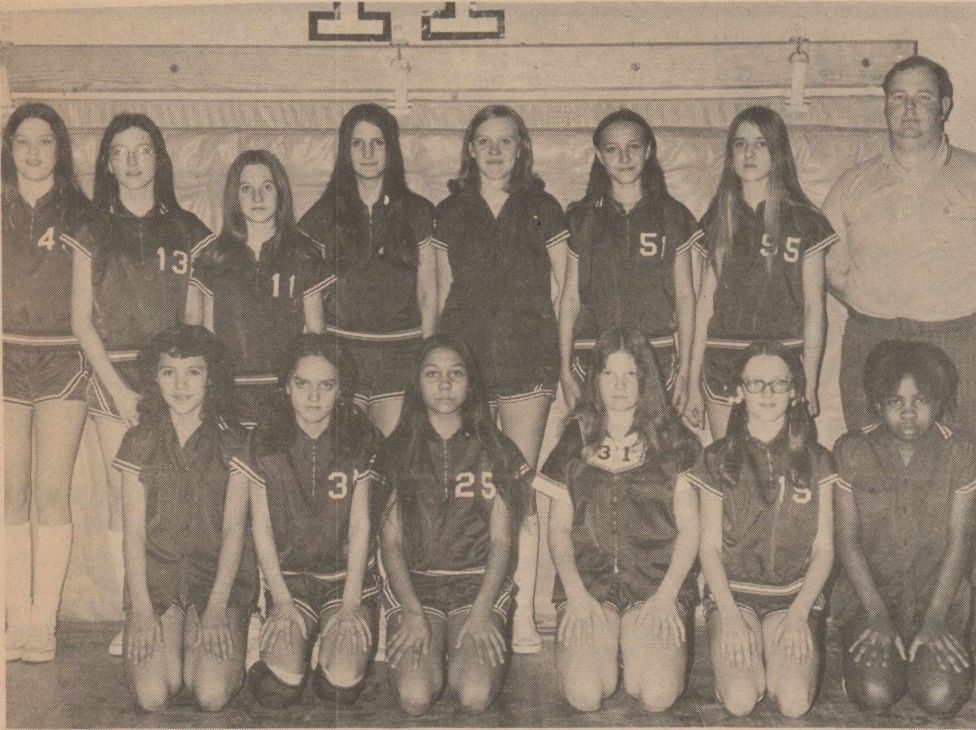

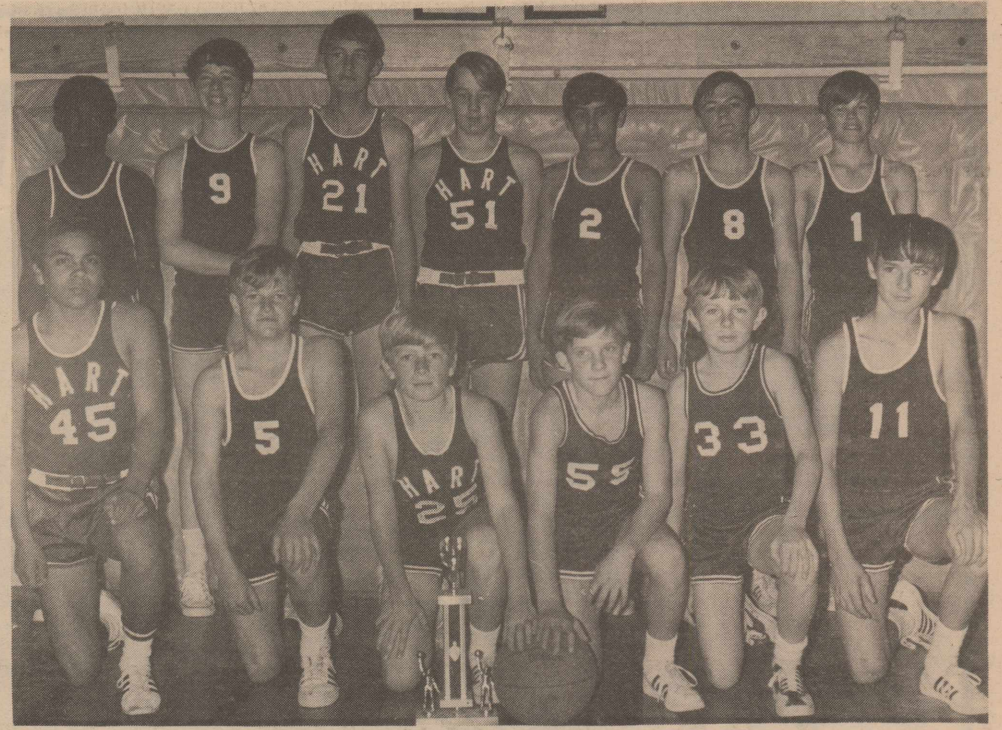

Fort Worth Stock Show To Feature New Breeds

A swelling record of 13,008 head of livestock will be on exhibit during the 77th Annual Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, Fort Worth, Jan. 26 through Feb. 4, reports W. R. Watt, Jr., Stock Show general manager.

The Stock Show office staff has processed entries of 4,569 in cattle classes; 1,460 swine, 1,741 sheep, 1,738 horses with an estimated 3,500 entries for rabbits, poultry and pigeons being processed.

In noting that junior entries are up over 400 head above the previous year, Watt said, "The increase indicates gaining interest among our young people in the livestock and agricultural fields. This is a good thing, as our youngsters are our future."

Another boost in show entries was in the Polled Hereford division, the Stock Show being host this year to the Golden Anniversary of the American Polled Hereford Association.

The show will also host the National Meet of the American Bantam Association, with an estimated 2,500 entries in the poultry division.

The Stock Show opens Friday for a ten-day run through Feb. 4 on Amon Carter Square. All show facilities are open to visitors, and the show has ample parking space.

New breeds showing this year include Simmental and Limousin in the Junior Steer Show, and Peruvian Pasos in the Horse Show. An exhibition

is planned for an exotic Italian cattle breed, Chianina. Also set is a sale, the First National Gelbvieh Cattle Sale.

Sales planned include commercial Hereford females, performance tested Angus bulls, Polled Hereford, Limousin and Simmental cattle, Charolais bulls, and Quarter Horses. An estimated \$1 million is expected as the gross of the Stock Show breed sales.

The sale of champion steers will be held at 9 a. m. Tuesday, Jan. 30. Other sales will be held for champion barrows and lambs.

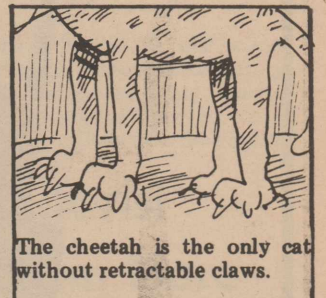

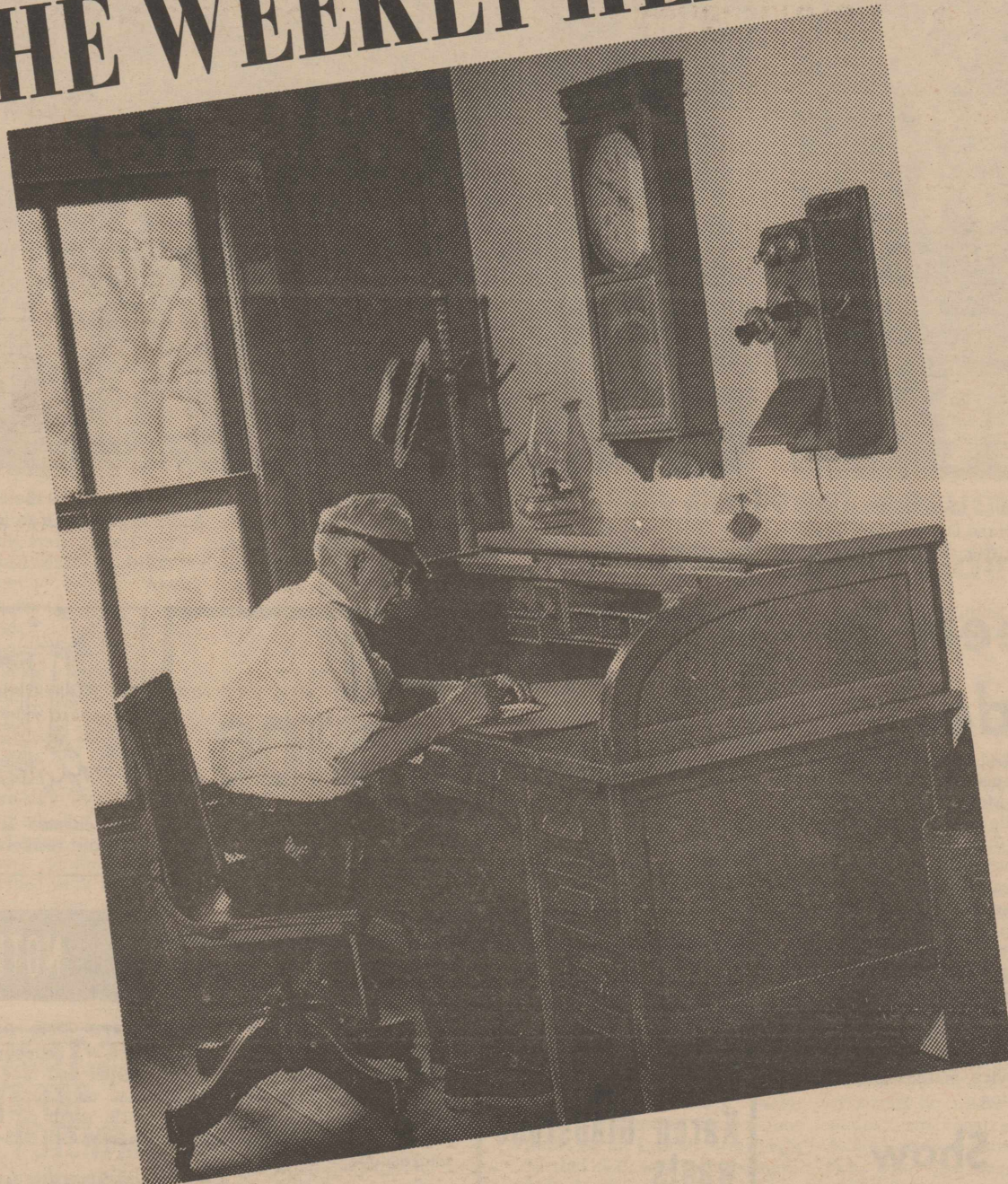
